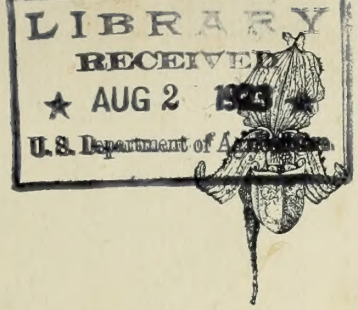

TO OUR CUSTOMERS.

TERMS:

Accounts are made up monthly. Our patrons are requested to remit by checks, express, or P. O. money orders on New York post office, or currency in registered letters. We cannot be responsible for money in unregistered letters. From unknown correspondents either a remittance or a reference is required with each order. Five per cent. allowed on all orders accompanied by cash.

WE SEND GOODS C. O. D. when the order is accompanied by a remittance of at least 25 per cent. of its total value. This guarantees acceptance of goods upon arrival at destination, and prevents the usual delay of investigating the financial standing of new customers. On orders of this kind we also allow a discount of 5 per cent.

NO CHARGES. We make no charges for boxes, packing or delivery to the railroad or express office; bags only are charged for, and these at cost. All plants are carefully packed, and may be forwarded safely to any part of the globe.

EARLY ORDERS. Orders are solicited at as early a date as possible, that we may have ample time for their execution. Please write plainly name, post office, express office, and any other necessary information as to the best method of forwarding.

ADVICES OF SHIPMENT. These, together with the invoice, are sent to purchaser by mail the same day the goods are forwarded.

COMPLAINTS. Complaints arising should be made upon receipt of goods. We promise prompt and just treatment of all claims presented. We guarantee safe arrival of plants and bulbs sent by express, *but do not assume any responsibility if sent by freight.*

PRICES. All are quoted for immediate acceptance, subject to short crops, to change without notice, and to the goods being unsold upon receipt of order. We would advise dealers to place their orders early. All imported and domestic bulbs that we offer are direct from the most reliable growers, and can be depended upon in every respect. 25 bulbs furnished at 100 rate, 250 at 1,000 rate, 2,500 at 10,000 rate.

OUR TRAVELERS being in all sections of the country the year round, they will be pleased to call, upon notification to that effect, with prices and samples.

TIME OF DELIVERY AND SHIPMENT.

The many kinds of bulbs herein catalogued ripen and are in condition for shipment at different seasons of the year. 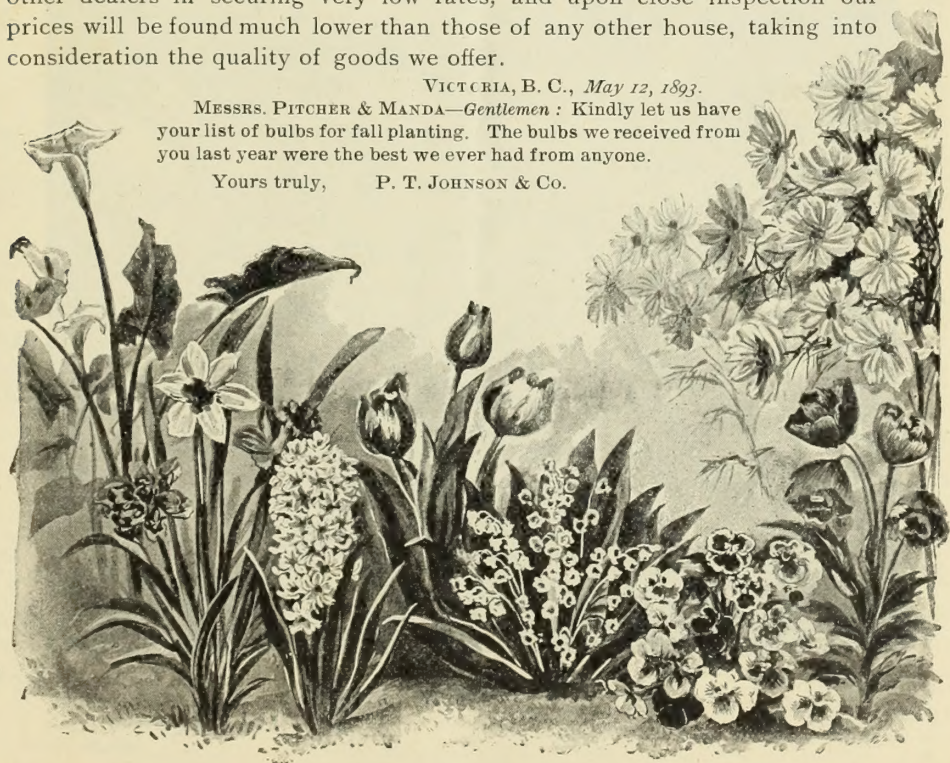

EARLY ROMAN HYACINTHS.

It is most difficult to predict the quantity required for the demand of this bulb, but there would appear to be much gambling done in this particular article.

French growers this year circulated, quite early in the season, reports that the crop was not more than two thirds, and accompanied the advice with advanced prices over those of former years, which has necessitated all dealers advancing the figures formerly quoted.

We were, however, very fortunate in securing a large quantity before the market advanced, and offered them to the trade at figures similar to those of last year. As they were sold to early buyers, who took advantage of import offers and placed their orders early, we trust it will be an example that other of our customers will follow another year, as it gives us an idea of our wants and the number to import; it also gives the customer the advantage of the early price before the bulbs are harvested. However, we have large quantities for disposal, and believe our prices will be found as low as those of any other responsible firm for our selected sizes.

DUTCH ROMAN HYACINTHS.

There is a steadily increasing demand for this kind of Hyacinth, which is more noticeable from the fact of our sales this year, up to the present date, being two hundred per cent. more than the total quantity we sold last year.

We can recommend this stock to the florist who requires a Hyacinth which blooms later than the French Roman, producing stronger stalks and a better flower-spike, and as the price will be found much cheaper, we feel certain it is a profitable bulb to plant.

LILIUM HARRISII.

(True Bermuda Easter Lily.)

All growers who did not place their orders for *Lilium Harrisii* until late in the season last year will remember the difficulty they had in obtaining bulbs, and the great advance in price. These bulbs are grown only on the island of Bermuda, and the territory is so limited that they are always scarce at time of delivery. There is no flower in greater demand than the Bermuda Easter Lily; they bring good prices all over the country, and are about as safe a stock to invest in as any.

The statements we read, that the "true" Bermuda Easter Lily can only be procured from one or two houses, are overdrawn, as no grower takes more care than we do to have these goods pure and select for size and quality. We supplied the florists in this country and Europe last year with hundreds of thousands of these bulbs without complaint, and our shipments from Bermuda this coming year, we have every reason to believe, will be as large as those of any other house.

It is our usual custom, and we find it more satisfactory, to pack the bulbs in sand, as this preserves and keeps them from heating, which they invariably do when packed in sawdust. But in shipping by express to a customer at a great distance, we always repack in paper or other light material to save charges. We find that by this means the bulbs travel equally well, and it saves considerable to the consignee. We believe that we are exceptional in this mode of packing, and our customers will soon recognize the benefits by a trial order.

LILIUM LONGIFLORUM (Bermuda-Grown).

For late flowering this bulb is in much esteem, and if the demand keeps on increasing as it has in the past two years, it will entirely supersede the *Lilium Harrisii* for late flowering.

Many large eastern growers prefer this, and grow them exclusively, claiming that this bulb is much more desirable for pot plants, and the flowers, having more substance, last longer than the *Harrisii*. As the quantity grown is very limited, florists intending to try some Bermuda-grown Longiflorums should order early.

SPIRÆA JAPONICA GRANDIFLORA.

All we said last year of this most useful and profitable forcing plant was fully realized by all who purchased them from us. The fact is also established by the numerous large orders we have already received this year for fall delivery, and the many voluntary testimonials given.

It is a grand novelty of recent introduction, and will be found most picturesque. When well-grown its flowers are pearly white, *double the size of the common Spiræa Japonica*; close and compact in form, they give the effect of *foam piled in pyramidal shape*, while the dark green, fern-like leaves make a pleasing contrast. The plant will be found very useful for table decoration, forces admirably, and being perfectly hardy, is suitable for borders. There can be no greater evidence of its value than the fact that growing plants always command more than double the price of the old Spiræa Japonica, when in bloom. AZALEA INDICA. (Home Grown.)

IRIS SARI NAZARENA.

Our attention was first called to this new variety of Iris this season, and we think so well of it that we have concluded to offer it under this heading, as we consider it one of the most beautiful Iris in cultivation.

The long, stolon-like shoots are many inches in length; the leaves are relatively large, and the stems tall. The flowers, which are very large, often measuring eight inches across, are marked by rows of dark-red and brown-purple spots on a straw-colored ground, which run towards the center, forming almost a perfect heart-shaped figure of an intense, dark carmine; behind this are two rows of dark purple hairs or diffused beard.

The upper portion of the flower, or nearly obicular standard, is prettily marked with pale blue veins and blotched with red-brown purple on a clear white ground. The margins are powdered with fine gold.

Owing to their ease of culture and willingness to flower in winter, they will doubtless become a prominent florist's flower.
