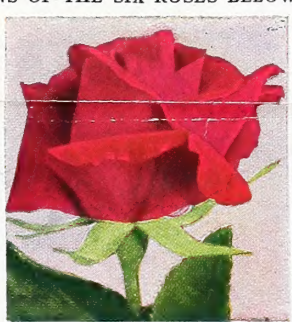

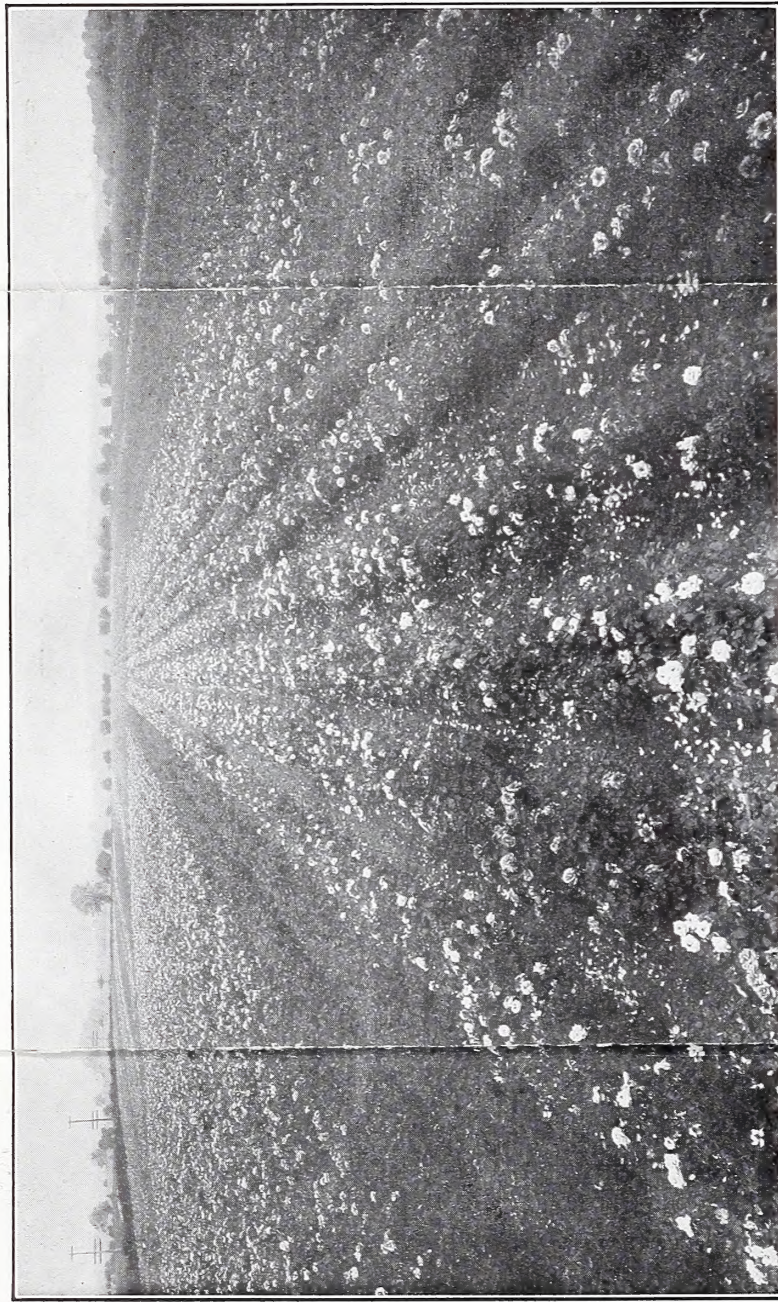
DEAR MR. PYLE: September 24, 1937

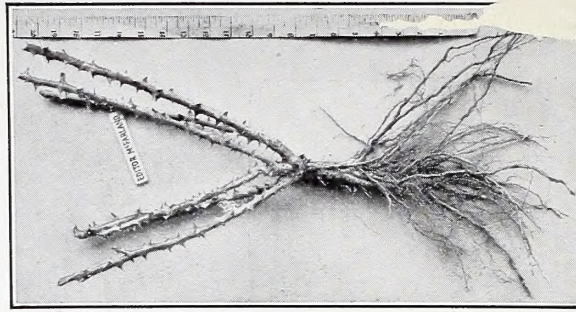

No. 1 ★MRS. G. A. VAN ROSSEM. Pernet. The bud is of the deepest red-orange, almost brownish, with deeply impressed maroon veins. A truly spectacular Rose. The bloom opens rather quickly and shows a gracefully disarranged center as if a handful of small petals had been added. Toward the end, the color tones to old-rose. Delicate perfume. The plant is vigorous, with red wood and deep green, holly-like foliage. \$1.50 each.

No. 2 ★SYRACUSE. H.T. Crimson. This brilliant Rose was introduced and christened by The Conard-Pyle Co. in honor of the "City of Syracuse," N. Y., where Star Roses are great favorites. The open bloom is very double and the outer petals recurve. Blooms last unusually long and the brilliant color lasts equally well. Rose connoisseurs praise Syracuse highly. \$1.50 each.

No. 3 ★DIRECTOR RUBIO. H.T. Cochineal-pink. 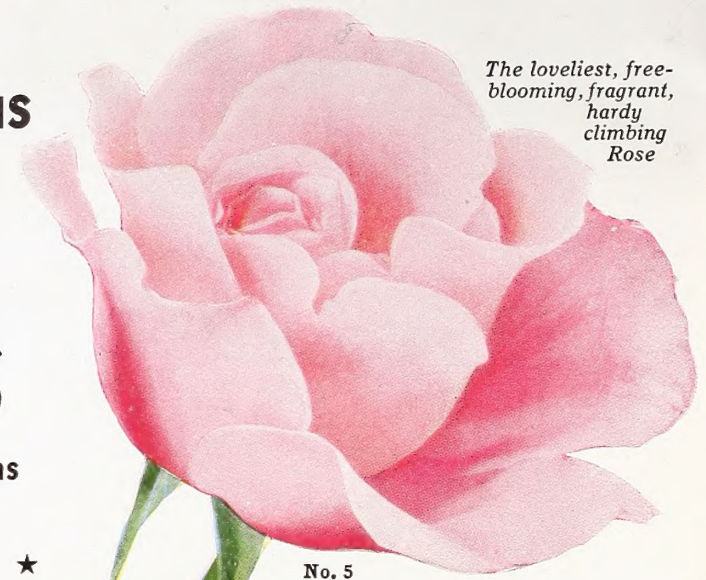

"The Spanish Beauty" MME. GREGOIRE STAECHELIN

September 8, 1931.

Just a word of praise for the most beautiful climbing Rose in my garden, the Mme. Gregoire Staechelin. It is a marvel in color, form, and fragrance, and as sturdy as an oak. I planted this climber in the most exposed north-west location and am astonished at its size and vigorous growth. I would not part with it for all the Roses in my garden.—CHAS. A. LAPWORTH, Campello, Mass.

This is the Queen of Climbing Roses. When the sepals of the long-pointed buds begin to divide, the first color is deep maroon which will leave an indelible imprint to the last, but as the bud develops into a rare and graceful urn-shape, the maroon begins to change into a graduated carmine, paling as the bloom expands into a large, semi-double cup, delightfully fragrant, and borne on stems 12 to 15 inches long. One of the first climbers to bloom.

It blooms but once a year, but the buds come three to five on a 12-inch stem, opening one after the other to make a long blooming period. Price, \$1.25 each or 5 for \$5, delivered.
