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

## ARTICHOKE (Artichoke.)

The seed should be sown in April, in a good soil, in drills 10 to 12 inches apart, and about one inch deep. Protect the plants from freezing during the winter, and the following spring separate and transplant, setting them 3 feet apart in moist soil. Upon the approach of cold weather the stems and leaves should be cut away and the bed covered so as to prevent freezing. With careful cultivation a bed should last three or four years. The suckers, or offshoots, from established plants, may be used for propagating, instead of sowing seed. The plant is a hardy perennial, growing 3 to 4 feet high, with numerous branches. Just before the flower is ready to open, the head is in condition to boil.

## ASPARAGUS.—Spargel.

1 oz. for 60 feet drill; 400 plants,

**CULTURE.**—To grow plants from seed, sow in April or May, in drills about one inch deep, in rows a foot apart. Keep the soil mellow and free from weeds. During the Summer "thin out," and the following Spring the plants may be set out in beds, 6x6 feet wide, with a path two feet wide on each side; set the plants about a foot apart each way, with the plants four inches below the surface. The deeper the soil and the more manure used, the greater the crop. Annually after the first cutting, the bed should be given a liberal top dressing of manure, ashes and salt, which should be well cultivated into the soil. As soon as the tops turn yellow in the Fall they should be cut and removed from the beds, and just before Winter cover the beds with four inches of strawy manure or leaves, which should be removed in the Spring.



Dwarf Beans may not be safely planted until the middle of April owing to the late frost, but may be planted thereafter as desired, until the middle of August.

Select high, rich soil, make drills two feet apart, drop beans along the rows and cover with earth. Hoe often to keep earth to the stems.



# BEETS. (Rothe Rube, Ger.)





# CABBAGE.

French—*Choux Poennes.*

German—*Kopf Kohl.*

Cabbage requires deep, rich, mellow soil, high manuring and good culture to obtain fine, solid heads. For early use sow seeds of the early kinds in the hot-bed or in a box in the house the last of January or early in February, and transplant in the open ground in April, in rows 2 feet apart and 18 inches in the row; or sow a bed of seed outside as soon as the soil can be worked. Transplant in about 4 weeks. For second early cabbage, sow in April, and transplant in May. For late cabbage, sow in May, and transplant in July in rows 3 feet apart and 2 feet in the row. In transplanting it is important that plants be set down to the first leaf, so that the stem may not be injured in case of frost. Be careful not to cover the heart of the plant. Hoe every week and stir the earth deep. As they advance in growth draw a little earth to the plants until they begin to head. To prevent attacks of Cabbage Fly on small plants, dust thoroughly with plaster, air slacked lime or wood ashes. For Cabbage Worm try Slug Shot; (see Insect Destroyers in this Catalogue.) One ounce of seed produces about 2,500 plants. Four ounces will grow enough plants to set an acre.









## ONION SEED. Zwiebel.

Onion seeds should be sown as early as it is possible to work the ground. In drills one inch deep and twelve to sixteen inches apart, in rich soil deeply dug and lightly rolled. Thin to one inch apart. When sowing for sets, seeds must be put in very thick, at the rate of about twenty pounds to the acre. The same patch may be used year after year for onions and never made too rich.

To raise large onions, select a bed of rich soil, work it deeply and add decayed manure plentifully.







## PEAS.

On account of the very short crop in some varieties of Peas prices are subject to change without notice.

Peas mature early in a light, rich soil. For a general crop, a rich deep loam or inclining to clay would be best. They thrive better if the ground has been manured for a previous crop, but if the ground is poor and requires manuring, use well rotted manure, and for the dwarf varieties you can hardly make the soil too rich. When grown for a market crop they are seldom staked or brushed, but are sown in single rows, 1 inch apart and 3 to 5 inches deep, the depth depending on time of sowing, nature of soil, as well as variety. Rows should be from  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to  $3\frac{1}{4}$  feet apart, according to variety and manner of culture desired. When grown in gardens it is best to sow in double rows, 6 to 8 inches apart, the tall ones requiring brush, which is stuck in between the rows. Commence sowing early varieties as early as the ground can be worked in the Spring, and continue, for a succession, every two weeks up to June, discontinuing until the middle of July, when a good crop can usually be secured by sowing the extra early and early sorts. They should be kept clean with the cultivator or hoe, and earthed up twice during growth. Wrinkled varieties are not as hardy as the smooth hard sorts, and if planted early should have dry soil and not planted deep or they are liable to rot in the ground; they are, however the sweetest and best flavored varieties. *One quart sows 80 feet of drill; two or three bushels to the acre.*

(PEAS.—Erbesen.)







## TOMATO.—LIEBESAPFEL.

One ounce will produce about 1,200 plants; quarter pound to transplant for an acre.

For very early fruit the seed should be sown in a hot-bed about the first week in March in drills 5 inches apart and half inch deep. Later sowings may be made until the last of April. Sufficient plants for a small garden may be started by sowing a few seed in a shallow box or flower pot and placing in a window in the house. When the plants are 3 or 4 inches high they should be set out 4 or 5 inches apart in another hot-bed or cold frame, or removed into small pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. Expose to the air as much as possible to harden. Water freely at time of transplanting, and shelter from the sun a few days until the plants are established. Cultivate thoroughly as long as vines will permit, but the last two or three workings should be very shallow (surface cultivation) or the crop may be badly injured, especially if the cultivator is run too near the plants. Tomatoes will admit of training to stakes or trellises, and the fruit is very much improved, not only in appearance but in quality. This mode of cultivation is quite common among gardeners who grow for early market.







These herbs are all of easy cultivation. Sow the seed as early in May as practical in shallow drills about 15 inches apart, thin out when two or three inches high: Generally speaking, it is best to cut the herbs when in flower.





Fig. 652 VERMOREL NOZZLE.
