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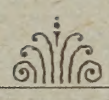

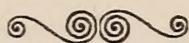

TO CORRESPONDENTS.

1st. The articles on the following list will be furnished at the annexed prices *only* when the quantity specified shall be taken. FIVE HUNDRED will be furnished at the THOUSAND rate, FIFTY at the HUNDRED rate, and FIVE at the TEN rate.

2d. Orders should be sent in as early as possible, as it will be our rule to execute them in the order in which they are received.

3d. All orders should be legibly written out on a separate sheet, and not mixed up in the body of the letter, thereby saving us a great deal of trouble, and tending to prevent mistakes.

4th. Where particular varieties are ordered, and particular ages and sizes of trees, kind of stock, etc., it should be stated whether, and to what extent, substitution will be allowed, in case the order cannot be filled to the letter, as happens occasionally in all establishments. Where no instructions in this respect accompany the order, we shall feel at liberty to substitute other varieties as nearly similar as possible. If the selection of varieties is left entirely to us, we shall endeavor to send only such sorts as are acknowledged to give general satisfaction.

5th. All trees and plants are carefully labeled, and securely packed in the best manner, for which a moderate charge, sufficient to cover cost of material only, will be made; but no charge is made for the delivery of packages at the railroad or express offices at Niles.

6th. It is requested that explicit directions for marking and shipping packages accompany each order. When it is left for us to choose the mode of conveyance, we will exercise our best judgment; but as all articles are at the risk of the purchaser after being shipped, we must not be held responsible for any loss or delay that may occur through the negligence of the forwarders.

7th. As we guarantee the freight on all shipments leaving our establishment, it will be necessary for unknown parties to remit the money with their orders. Orders to be sent by express C. O. D. must be accompanied by at least one-half the amount in cash; otherwise, they will receive no attention.

8th. Our customers are requested to notify us immediately of any errors that may be committed in filling their orders, so that we may at once rectify the same, as we desire to conduct our business in all respects satisfactorily to those who favor us with their confidence.

9th. Orders from unknown correspondents must be accompanied by the cash, or satisfactory reference.

10th. Remittances may be made by draft on San Francisco, Wells, Fargo & Company's and Post Office money orders on Niles, or cash by express, prepaid.

11th. Orders priced at single rates, and not exceeding four pounds in weight, can be forwarded by mail, postage paid; but where possible we recommend having them sent by express, as we are then able to send much stronger and better plants.

WE TAKE PLEASURE in again submitting to the consideration of our friends and the public generally our Price List for the coming season, feeling certain of our ability to please all kindly favoring us with their orders.

OUR STOCK has made a good growth, and is absolutely free from all injurious insects, diseases, and defects.

The assortment in both the fruit and ornamental departments of our establishment having become so extensive, we have found it necessary to divide our Descriptive Catalogue into two parts, (in separate publications,) the first to include Fruit Trees, Small Fruits, Grapes, etc., and the second, Ornamental Nursery Stock only. They will be designated as Nos. 1 and 2, respectively, in our list of Catalogues, and will be issued only from time to time, as circumstances may require. A price list, known as No. 3, (this one,) which merely gives prices and sizes on the contents of Nos. 1 and 2, will be published annually.

We shall include in either only such articles as we have actually growing on our grounds, (being the only firm on the coast that really grows, themselves, all they offer,) and have aimed to confine ourselves to cultivating only such varieties in both departments as, with proper care, will give entire satisfaction to our customers.

A cordial invitation is extended to all to visit our grounds, where the stock may be seen in different stages of cultivation.

Our Nursery can be reached from San Francisco by boats leaving Market Street Wharf, and connecting with trains for Niles, at 8:30 and 12:00 A. M., and 4:30 and 6:00 P. M. SPECIAL NOTICE.

Those only who can show a certificate of recent date, with our signature and the seal of the Company attached, are authorized to solicit orders for us. We wish to call special attention to this notice, as we know it has heretofore been the practice of unprincipled persons to procure the catalogues of prominent nurseries, and take orders in their names, which they fill with poor stock bought elsewhere. If our patrons will notify us of any person whom they have reason to believe is not a regularly appointed agent, we shall consider it a favor.

HINTS ON TRANSPLANTING.

The many excellent treatises on Fruit Culture which have appeared within the past few years—one or more of which should be in the hands of every person intending to plant—render it almost unnecessary to give any directions in that line; yet we are so frequently asked for advice in this way, that we have concluded to offer a few general remarks.

The situation of the orchard having been decided on, the ground should be deeply plowed, subsoiled and thoroughly pulverized. The holes should be dug at least a foot larger in every direction than actually required by the roots, when spread out in their natural position. In planting, the top soil should be broken down into the hole, and worked carefully in between every root and fibre, filling up every crevice, that every root may be in contact with soil, and the whole made quite firm as the filling up progresses. The tree, when planted, may in light soils stand from two to three inches deeper than it stood in the nursery; but in heavy clay or wet ground it is advisable to have it stand at the same height as it was before transplanting.

On account of our long, hot, dry summers, we have found it beneficial to shade the sunny side of the tree with a board or shake stuck in the ground a few inches away from it, for the first two or three years. The tops should be shortened in more or less, in proportion to size and variety of tree, and condition of roots.

A work, "California Fruits and How to Grow Them," by Prof. E. J. Wickson; the "Raisin Industry," by Prof. Gustav Eisen; and "Grape Culture and Wine-making," by Geo. Husmann, will be found very useful to all horticulturists, written as they are for this Coast, and by authors of wide local experience.

RULE—SQUARE METHOD.—Multiply the distance in feet between the rows by the distance the plants are apart in the rows, and the product will be the number of square feet for each plant or hill, which, divided into the number of feet in an acre (43,560), will give the number of plants or trees to the acre.

RULE—EQUILATERAL TRIANGLE METHOD.—Divide the number required to the acre "square method" by the decimal .866. The result will be the number of plants required to the acre by this method.


