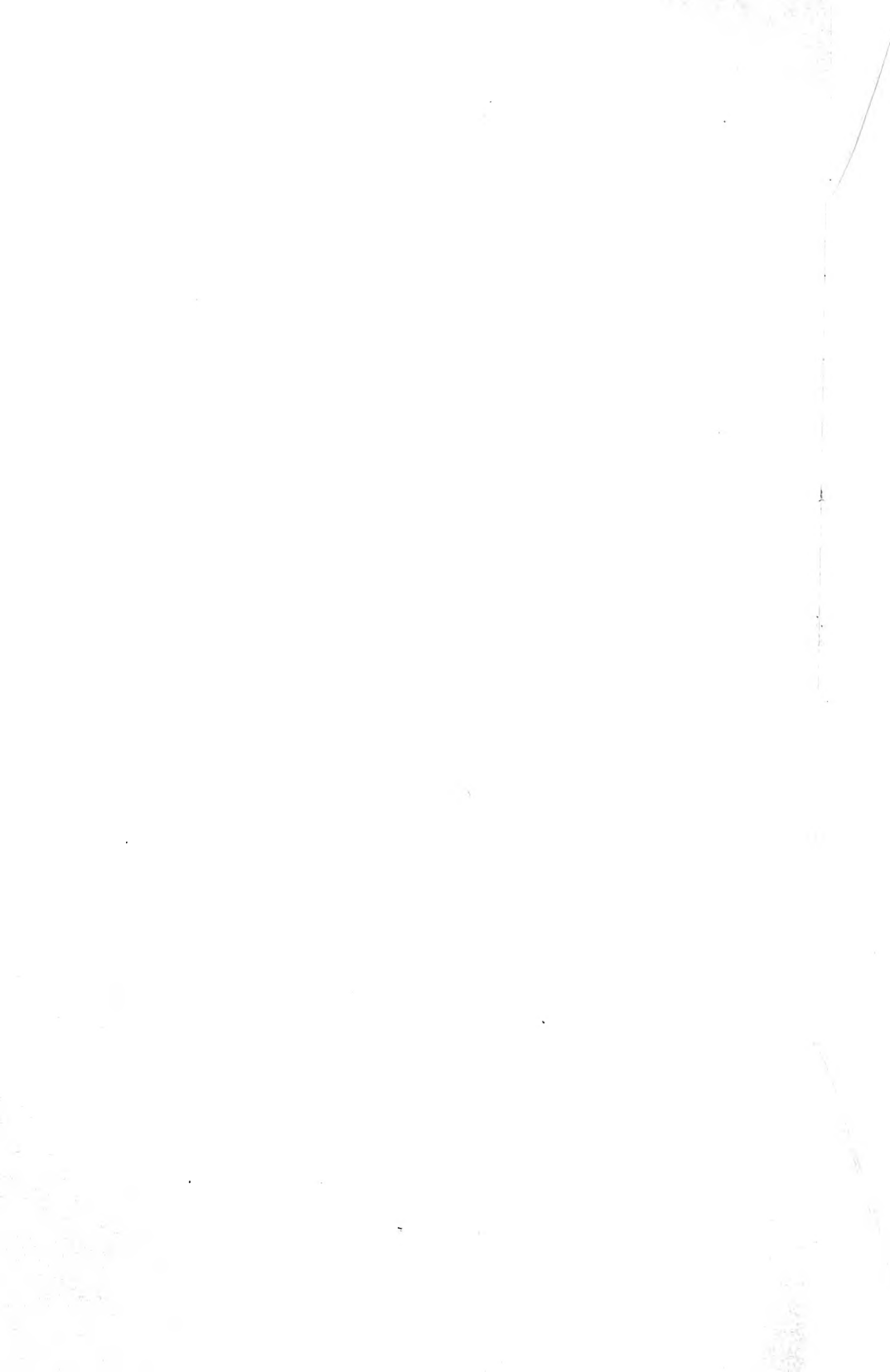

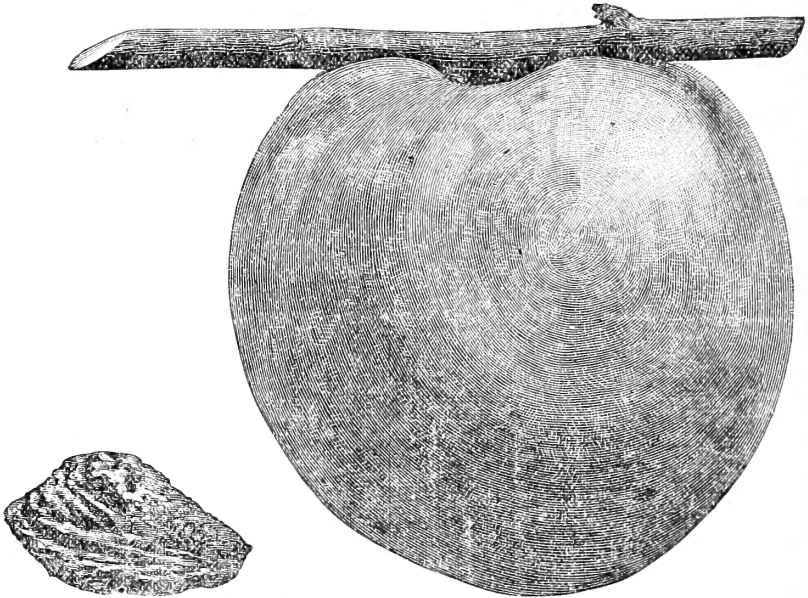

PHILLIPS' CLING PEACHES.

Phillips' Cling peach, shown in the engraving, originated with the well-known orchardist, Joseph Phillips, of Sutter county. It is a fine, large, yellow cling; no color at the pit, which is small. It is exceedingly rich and high colored, and has been described by Mr. Skinner, superintendent of Marysville cannery, as the best peach he ever saw; and we are informed that both the Marysville and Yuba City canneries have paid one-half cent more per pound for it than for any other variety of peach, during the last three years.

A. T. Hatch writes of the Phillips' cling: "It is a beautiful peach, and I

consider it quite an excellent addition to our list of good peaches."

W. H. Wright, manager of the San Jose Fruit Packing Co., writes: "We believe the Phillips' cling to be the best cling peach yet; it is certainly up to date the finest of anything known."

J. T. Bogue, of Tudor, the well known nurseryman, was the first to propagate Phillips' cling, and has now 25 acres in bearing. He says he has never seen a case of mildew in all the trees he has grown. We understand that Mr. Bogue has a stock of trees for sale this season.—Pacific Rural Press.

I desire to call your attention to my extra fine stock of plants, both Fruit and Ornamental, for 1893 and 1894 trade. My stock contains all of the best shipping varieties as well as for home use. Special attention given to orders for Trees and Plants by the hundred and thousand.

Please send me a list of your wants for the Winter trade. The prices quoted will, I think, induce you to place your order at once. If not ready yet to place your order, please state how soon you will be ready to do so.

Having been reared in western New York where I followed the nursery business for twenty years, and coming to California in 1882, I soon discovered that Sutter county held out great inducements to the horticulturist, and I immediately engaged again in my favorite occupation, as well as in the orchard business. Here I have an orchard of over 100 acres of bearing trees, and am raising fruit from the major portion of all the varieties contained in this circular.

Time to Plant

Our stock will be ready to take up about December 1st, and from that time on purchasers can have their orders filled on short notice. We advocate early planting. Immediately after the first drenching rain, and when the ground is in good condition, is the time to plant fruit trees. Parties high up in the mountains, where the ground freezes in winter and thaws out late in the spring can get apples and plums and pears from us in the latter part of November, thus giving them an opportunity to plant in the fall.



It is not well to plant citrus fruits early. Orange, Lemon and Olive trees, as well as Palms and Shrubbery we will be ready to deliver in February. Our stock of ornamental trees is very extensive and we are confident we can please you both in quality and prices.

This will be a great year for planting. Our farmers have become convinced that the days of profitable wheat growing are gone forever, and they are naturally turning their attention to fruit growing. We have already placed more orders for trees for the coming spring planting than we sold all of last year.

A year lost in the growth of a tree can never be made up, therefore plant this year.



How to Reach Our Nursery

Our Nursery is situated eleven miles south of Marysville, at a new station on the Woodland and Knights Landing branch of the Southern Pacific, named Tudor. Parties taking the 4 P. M. train at San Francisco, or the 7:05 P. M. train from Sacramento will reach Tudor at 9:05 P. M. Returning parties can take either the 5 A. M. train for Sacramento and San Francisco or the accommodation at 3 P. M. There is plenty accommodation at the nursery for all parties coming on business. 


