

C. Teachers College Scholarship Holders

Students enrolled for the Fall Quarter, 1949, with Teachers College Scholarships numbered 283 which is an appreciable gain of 81 over the total of 202 for the Fall Quarter, 1948.

D. Veterans' Enrollment, Fall Quarter, 1949

Veterans using Illinois Military Scholarships for the Fall Quarter, 1949, numbered 34 as compared with 35 such schol arships used one year ago.

The total enrollment of veterans numbered 400, including 3 women students. This is a decrease of 166 from the 566 en rolled one year ago, or a decrease of 27.39%. The 397 men veterans in college is 135 less than the 532 non-veteran men enrolled.

The following report is submitted from Illinois State Normal University.

**Preliminary Statement.** This report is the first one submitted since that of August 16, 1949, at which time graduates of June 13 and August 12, 1949, were included.

c. Computation of Per Capita Cost

Total Expenditures  $$1,565,199.71 \div 2379 = $657.92$ 

The per capita cost of \$657.92 for the past fiscal year is somewhat higher than the \$596.56 representing the per capita cost for the previous year. This is to be expected when the increase in enrollment, additional services, and higher costs are taken into consideration. Illinois State Normal University will always have a comparatively high per capita cost because of educating teachers in all fields and levels of education, including special education and the Graduates School. In these areas, there are many advanced classes with relatively small enrollments. However, as compared with most colleges and universities, the per capita cost in any teachers colleges is low.

#### 7. Scholarships Certified

- a. As a matter of record, the attention of the Teachers College Board is called to a list of scholarship students attending the 1949 summer session which has been sent to the Coordinator for approval by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board. Clearance of this list will result in a transfer of funds by the State Treasurer from the General Revenue Account to the Income Fund of Illinois State Normal University to the extent of \$1948.00, with an additional \$468.75 transferred to the Illinois State Normal University Trust Fund for Activity and Graduation fees, Graduation fees amounting to \$35.00. It is recommended that this action be approved by the Teachers College Board.
- b. As a further matter of record, attention of the Teachers College Board is called to a list of scholarship students attending Illinois State Normal University during the current first semester of the 1949-1950 school year, which is being sent to the Coordinator for approval by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board. There are 758 names of scholarship students on this list involving the total of \$30,061.00. It is interesting to note that one-third of the Teachers College Scholarship holders from the entire State of Illinois are in attendance at Illinois State Normal University. It is recommended that this list as submitted be approved by the Teachers College Board.

The foregoing listing includes first field or major students. Every department carries a considerable load beyond the major students, especially second field or minor students. It should be noted that the entire group of 50 special tuition students represents nurses from Mennonite and St. Joseph's Hospitals, with which the University has an affiiliation. The unclassified students are those preparing to teach but not definitely working toward a degree. The . post graduates are persons who have completed work for a bachelor's degree or perhaps even a master's degree but are not regularly enrolled in the Graduate School working toward a master's degree. It is interesting to note that there are 345 persons majoring in elementary education. The increased enrollment in this area in the last two years should help within a year or two in relieving the great shortage in this field.

#### b. Scholastic Qualifications of Entering Students

It is interesting to note from the following table the scholastic ability of entering freshmen over a period of eight years as revealed by their rank in their high school graduating classes. These figures rather refute the idea that only students with mediocre scholastic ability prepare for the teaching profession, especially when one finds that two-thirds or more of the students entering each year are in the upper half of their high school classes. Attention is called to the 1940 figures during a period when the enrollment of the University was limited, quotas were used for admission to departments and only those in the upper three-fourths of their high school classes were even con-

sidered for admission. It is hoped that it may be possible to return to the high standards that were used in 1940.

c. Holding Power of the University

Frequent reference has been made to the student holding power of Illinois State Normal University. By reference to the fall enrollment, No. 5 of this section, it will be noted that the seniors listed for this year total 447, which is exactly the same number of juniors of one year ago. It may also be noted that the sophomores a year ago totaled 485 and the juniors of this year total 463. Of course, these do not represent the same persons but it should be pointed out that Illinois State Normal University will soon be graduating 500 or more students each year as was true before the war when the two-year course graduates were included with those completing the four-year program.

It will also be noted that the holding power between the freshman and sophomore years is not good, which is a matter of concern to this school, as well as to most others. This situation is receiving special consideration this year in the development of a better and more continuous orientation program.

- II. FACULTY
  - 1. Deaths
    - a. Miss Flora P. Dodge, who has been listed as Secretary Emeritus for a number of years, died September 17, 1949. Miss Dodge served as secretary to four presidents and one acting president, beginning her services in 1892 and continuing until July 1, 1941. Her efficient service extended over many interesting years of the University in which as secretary to the president she exerted considerable influence.
    - b. Miss Christine A. Thoene, Assistant Professor of Education and Supervising Teacher in the Fifth Grade of the Thomas Metcalf Elementary School, died November 6, 1949. Miss Thoene began her service with the University in 1919 and for a period of thirty years many present citizens of this and other communities came under her influence as children in her fifth grade. Miss Thoene was respected by all who knew her as a generous, considerate, patient, and tireless teacher and friend, always ready to give of her time and ability to help any and all persons.

Her presence and influence at Illinois State Normal University will be missed but her many excellent deeds will long be remembered.

2. Resignations

As a matter of record two resignations, both at the Childrens School where salaries are paid through the Department of Public Welfare, are reported at this time.

- a. Miss Myrtle Imhoff, Instructor and Supervising Teacher in the First Grade at the Affiliated Childrens School, effective September 12, 1949, because of illness in her immediate family and the necessity of moving to Arizona. Miss Imhoff's position is being filled at the present time by a substitute teacher.
- b. Miss Elizabeth Trout, Instructor in Social Science in the Junior High School at the Childrens School, effective October 7, 1949, in order to engage in other work. Miss Trout's position has been filled as indicated later in this report under New Appointments.
- 3. Leaves of Absence
  - a. Mr. Eugene L. Hill, Assistant Professor of Health and Physical Education, effective for the months of March, April, May, and June, 1950, in order to complete work for his doctor's degree at the Colorado College of Education. Arrangements are being made to absorb the work that Mr. Hill is doing. This is a sabbatical leave, for which he qualifies and should receive one-half of his salary for the four months.
  - b. Dr. Richard G. Browne, Professor of Social Science and Head of the Department, effective February 1, 1950, for the remainder of the school year, in order to accept an invitation to serve as Research Director for the Illinois School Problems Commission. It is understood that Dr. Browne will continue with this Commission until the opening of school in September, 1950. This leave of absence is without pay, since Dr. Browne will be on a salary basis with the Illinois School Problems Commission. Arrangements are being made to absorb his classroom work. He feels that he can still continue to give attention to any work involving the headship of the department.
  - c. Miss Thalia Tarrant, Instructor and Supervising Teacher in the Second Grade at the Affiliated Childrens School, effective from April 1 for the remainder of the 1949-1950 school year and the 1950 summer session in order to do further work toward her doctor's degree at the University of Chicago. This leave is without pay.

4. Change in Status and Salary .

The following changes in status or salary are recommended for reasons listed.

- a. The salary of Miss Ella Leppert, as listed at the bottom of Page 9 of the June 6, 1949, Board Report, should be changed from \$1890.00 to \$1935.00 on a half-salary basis, due to error in computation.
- b. The salary of Dr. Ralph A. Micken, listed at the bottom of Page 14 in the August 16, 1949, Report, should be \$4995.00 in place of \$4985.00 as listed, due to error in typing.
- c. The salary of Mr. Charles A. Slagle, listed as the second person on Page 15 of the August 16, 1949, Report, should be changed from \$3654.00 to \$3645.00, due to a transposition of figures.
- d. Miss Esther Vinson, listed in the Report of June 6, 1949, on a full time basis, has asked to be given a four-fifths teaching assignment at a four-fifths salary rate. Therefore her compensation for the school year 1949-1950 should be \$3924.00 for the nine-month period.
- e. The salary of Miss Florence Benell should be changed from \$460.00 per month to \$375.00 per month, because of a lighter load being assigned to her at her request.
- f. Mr. Harold Niven, listed at the top of Page 15 of the August 16, 1949, Report, did not take the position it was assumed he would accept and therefore his name should be eliminated, as another person (Mr. Wilbert Hunt) has been recommended for this position in this present (January 9, 1950) Report.
- 5. New Appointments
  - a. Dr. George H. Agate, as Director of the University Health Service, to take the place of Dr. Thomas D. Fitzgerald, resigned, effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$605.00 per month, or \$7260.00 for a twelve-month period. Dr. Agate has a B. S. degree from the University of Illinois, an M. D. degree from the College of Medicine of the University of Illinois, and an M. P. H. degree from the University of Michigan. His experience includes private practice in Bloomington, Illinois, work with the Illinois State Department of Public Health, the University of Michigan Health Service, and the serving as Director of Health for Public Schools, Spokane, Washington, and Director of Health Service, Georgia Institute of Technology, Atlanta, Georgia. He has also taught in Washington State College, Spokane, Washington.

- b. Miss Florence B. Benell, as Assistant Professor Biological Science with special reference to Health Education, effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$460.00 per month, or \$4140.00 for a nine-months period. Miss Benell has A. B. and M. S. degrees from the University of Michigan and has had additional work at Washington University, Wayne University, Northwestern University, and the University of Chicago. She has taught in the Junior High School in Muskegon, Michigan, State Teachers College at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Eastern Illinois State College, and Southern Illinois University.
- c. Miss Eunice Blackburn, as a part-time substitute Instructor in Geography, effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$200.00 per month or \$1800.00 for the school year of nine months. Miss Blackburn has done her work on her bachelor's degree at Illinois State Normal University and on her master's at the University of Chicago. She has had extensive teaching experience on both the public school and college level and for the past two years has substituted on a regular half-time, or more extensive, basis in our Department of Geography.
- d. Mr. Perry R. Hackett, as Instructor in Music-Piano, effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$415.00 per month, or \$3735.00 for a nine-months period. Mr. Hackett has B. Mus. and M. Mus. degrees from Northwestern University, with further work at the University of Wisconsin, Julliard School of Music, New York City, and The American Art Schools, Fontainebleau, France. His teaching experience has been at Northwestern University and Iowa State College at Ames.
- e. Mr. Wilbert F. Hunt, as Instructor in Speech (Dramatics) effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$415.00 per month, or \$3735.00 for a nine-months period. Mr. Hunt has a B. S. degree from New York University and an M. A. from Teachers College, Columbia University, with further work at Miami University, at Miami, Florida. His teaching experience has been at New York University.
- f. Mrs. Christine Stombaugh, as part-time substitute Instructor in Home Economics, effective September 1949, at a salary of \$325.00 per month, or \$2925.00 for the school year of nine months. Mrs. Stombaugh has her bachelor's degree from the State Teachers College at Stevens Point, Wisconsin, and Stout Institute at Menomonie, Wisconsin, and her master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. She has had successful teaching experience in several high schools and during the past several years has

substituted on a part-time basis in University and University High School classes.

- g. Miss Isabelle Terrill, as Director of Fell Hall and Assistant Dean of Women, to take the place of Miss Frieda Ann Grieder, resigned, effective from October 15, 1949, at a salary of \$385.00 per month, or \$4620.00 for a twelvemonth period, aside from maintenance, including apartment, food, and laundry. Miss Terrill has an A. B. degree from Knox College, a Mus. B. from Knox Conservatory of Music, and an A. M. from Teachers College, Columbia University, with further work at the Chicago Conservatory of Music, the Institute of Musical Art, New York City, the University of Wisconsin. Her teaching experience has been in the unior high school at Galesburg, Illinois, the high school at Buda, Illinois, and Knox and Ripon Colleges.
- h. Miss Sadie B. Udstuen, as Instructor in Education and Supervising Teacher in the Seventh Grade of the Thomas Metcalf Elementary School, effective January 5, 1950, to take the place of Miss Ethel Stein, who was transferred September 12, 1949 to the eighth grade to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation, previously reported, of Miss Lorle Dean. Miss Udstuen's salary will be at the rate of \$410.00 per month or \$3690.00 on a nine-months basis. She has her bachelor's degree from Northern Illinois State Teachers College at De Kalb and her master's degree from Northwestern University. She has had teaching experience in rural schools in Illinois, in junior high schools in Batavia and Highland Park, Illinois, and in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and in the high school at Blue Island, Illinois.
- i. Miss Lucile M. Koenig, as Instructor and Supervising Teacher in the Sixth Grade at the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School, effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$335.00 per month, or \$4020.00 on a twelvemonths basis. Miss Koenig has her A. B. degree from Nebraska State Teachers College at Wayne and her M. A. from the University of Nebraska. Her teaching experience has been in rural and town elementary schools in Nebraska, and at the University of Nebraska. This position is paid for by the Department of Public Welfare and is here listed only as a matter of record.
- j. Miss Margie Jeanne Miner, as Instructor and Supervising Teacher in Health and Physical Education for Girls at the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School, effective September 19, 1949, at a salary of \$335.00 per month, or \$4020.00 on a twelve-months basis. Miss Miner has a B. S. in Ed. degree from Wester Illinois State College at Macomb and her M. S. in Phys. Ed. from the University of Wis-

consin. Her teaching experience has been in Roosevelt Junior High School at Tulsa, Oklahoma. She has also had experience in supervision of playgrounds in Tulsa, under the City Park Department, and a wide range of student teaching experience while completing work for her bachelor's degree. This position is paid for by the Department of Public Welfare and is here listed only as a matter of record.

- k. Mr. Leslie D. Park, as Instructor and Supervising Teacher in Health and Physical Education at the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School, effective from September 1949, at a salary of \$335.00 per month, or \$4020.00 on a twelve-months basis. Mr. Park has B. S. and M. A. degrees from Northwestern University and also attended George Williams College. His teaching experience has been in the Y. M. C. A. at Oak Park, Illinois, the Foster School in Evanston, Illinois, and at Northwestern University. This position is paid for by the Department of Welfare and is here listed only as a matter of record.
- 1. Miss Jean Phipps, as Instructor and Supervising Teacher in Home Economics at the Affiliated Illinos Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School, effective October 17, 1949, at a salary rate of \$335.00 per month, or \$4020.00 on a twelvemonths basis. Miss Phipps has a bachelor's degree from the University of Kentucky and her master's from Purdue University. She has had experience as a Graduate Counselor in the residence halls for women at Purdue University. Miss Phipps takes the place of Miss Edith L. Maas, resigned. Mr. Ryden takes the place of Miss Elizabeth Trout, resigned. This position is paid for by the Department of Public Welfare and is here listed only as a matter of record.
- n. Mrs. Mardelle Fike, as Executive Assistant in Education and Administration, at an annual (twelve months) salary of \$3000.00, effective September 1949. Mrs. Fike is the chief assistant to Mrs. Gertrude M. Hall, Director of Publicity.

- o. Miss Marie Reilly, as Executive Assistant in Education and Administration, at an annual (twelve months) salary of \$3000.00, effective September 1949. Miss Reilly is the chief assistant to Dr. Anna L. Keaton, Dean of Women.
- p. Mr. Carl Chris Jensen, Graduate Assistant, at a salary rate of \$150.00 per month, or an annual (nine months) salary of \$1350.00, effective September 1, 1949.

# VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

- 1. Progress on Present New Buildings and Campus Mechanical Distribution System
  - a. Administration Building. Satisfactory progress is being made on the completion of the Administration Building which should be ready for occupancy April 1, 1950. Lists of furniture and furnishings needed have been prepared and bids will be called for before the end of January.
  - b. Special Education Building. This building is now under roof and entirely enclosed and with heat available in the structure satisfactory progress is being made on the interior with the expectation that it will be ready for occupancy when school opens in September 1950. The lists of furniture and furnishings are being prepared and requests for bids on these items, together with special equipment, will be made about May 1, 1950.
  - c. *Beef Cattle Barn.* The necessary excavation and pouring of concrete footings for the two wings have been completed and work started on the general structure of these additions at the University Farm. Unless delayed by unusual weather conditions, this structure should be completed by March 1, 1950.
  - d. Mechanical Distribution System. The appearance of the campus, with ditches everywhere, indicates all too well the activity in connection with the distribution of heat, water, sewer, and electric lines over the campus. Heat is already being supplied to both the Administration and Special Education buildings.
- 2. Proposed Work on New Structures
  - a. *Residence Halls.* All information desired by the architects on the two new self-liquidating residence halls has been provided and it is understood that satisfactory progress is being made on the working drawings and specifications

for these structures in order that final approval may be given about February 1 and bids taken prior to March 1, 1950.

- b. Addition to Fell Hall. Preliminary conferences have been held with the architects working on the plans for the addition to Fell Hall together with the change of the top floor of the present structure into student rooms.
- c. Elementary and High Schools. Preliminary work on the part of the faculty has been started in order to provide the architects with necessary information for drawing plans for the proposed new University Elementary and University High Schools.
- d. Student Center. A preliminary conference with the representatives of the bonding company as to possibilities of financing, on a self-liquidating basis, the student center has been held and information will be available to the Board at any time desired.

## VIII. STUDENT LIFE

# 1. Student Center

15.

As the population of the University increases the need for a Student Center becomes increasingly evident. This need expresses itself in both the variety of services to be rendered to the student body and the accommodation of a large number of persons who need a social center at the University. Limited dormitory facilities, especially for men, resulting in inadequate off-campus rooming places, make all the more necessary a social center for the students. The present cafeteria is rapidly being outgrown and the space where it is temporarily located is needed as a part of the Fell Hall recreational facilities. A student center would provide adequate quarters for a cafeteria, which would be an important source of income in connection with a self-liquidating program. It is hoped that the report from the bonding company will be such that the Teachers College Board may give favorable consideration to working out some satisfactory plan for starting on such a structure. This should result in a solution of the problem of what to do with the present unsightly remnant of a once stately Old Main.

### 2. Student Publications

a. The Vidette

The quality of the weekly student paper, *The Vidette*, has been improving within the last year, but it was a source of genuine satisfaction to find that the paper received certain awards at the annual meeting of the Illinois Collegiate Press Association on Saturday, December 3, 1949. The papers from twenty-two colleges were given consideration. *The Vidette* awards were

- (1) Best weekly paper (over-all) for an Illinois college with a four-year course.
- (2) Best individual feature story.
- (3) Best individual sports story.
- (4) Best individual original advertisement layout.
- b. The Index

The yearbook of the University was not entered in any competition in the state consideration. However, it is a pleasure to note that a first place certificate was awarded *The Index* in the 50th Annual Yearbook Critique and Contest conducted by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association in New York City, October 7, 1949.

# IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. University Foundation Organized

Some considerable time ago the Constitution and By-Laws of the proposed University Foundation were approved but it has been impossible to get the personnel of the Executive Committee of the Foundation completed and officers elected until December 12, 1949, when at a meeting held on the campus of the University eight of the nine members of the Executive Committee were present and officers were elected. The University Foundation is now properly organized and chartered under the laws of the State of Illinois and ready to receive additional gifts to those already in its possession concerning which action could not be taken until officers had been elected and the secretary-treasurer authorized to proceed under bond and in directions approved by the Executive Committee.

2. Auditor's Report

Illinois State Normal University has received the official audit of the fiscal year July 1, 1948 to June 30, 1949, through the office of the Auditor of Public Accounts in Springfield, as presented by Mersinger and Allison of East St. Louis, Illinois, Certified Public Accountants. The auditors did their work during the month of August and their report was submitted to Springfield under date of November 23, 1949. It is a pleasure to report that this audit indicated that all records and accounts were in excellent condition.

3. Progress Report on Agriculture Situation

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On December 14, 1949, the committee selected by Mr. Vernon L. Nickell, Executive Secretary of the Board for Vocational Education, to visit the campus of Illinois State Normal University and inspect the facilities for the education of teachers of vocational agriculture, met with all seven members of the The committee, aside from Dr. John R. committee present. Holbert of Bloomington serving as chairman, consisted of representatives from the Colleges of Agriculture of the University of Illinois, Michigan State College, and Purdue University, a representative of the Illinois Vocational Agriculture Association, a representative of the Grange, and a representative of the Illinois Agriculture Association. Mr. Nickell and Mr. J. E. Hill, Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, met with the committee during the forenoon and the committee then spent the afternoon looking over facilities at the University Farm, as well as on the campus proper. They will have another meeting which is scheduled for February 16-17, 1950, at which time they will complete the gathering of information and, if ready at that time, will take action so as to make a report to the Illinois Board for Vocational Education.

4. Loan of Staff Members

As will be noted under Leaves of Absence recommended in this report, Dr. Richard G. Browne is being loaned to the Illinois School Problems Commission to serve as Research Director from February 1, 1950, until the opening of school next September. At the present time Dr. Victor M. Houston is on a year's leave of absence to serve as Associate Director of the State High School Curriculum Study operating through the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Dr. Chris A. De Young is likewise on leave for the entire year and until the opening of school next fall to serve with the American Council on Education and the National Education Association in Washington as Coordinator of the Commission on Occupied Areas.

Mention is made of these three persons to indicate that the absence of such key individuals does set up certain problems on our campus but we are glad to have persons whose services are desired and we believe that the service they render will be of value to the organizations concerned and such contacts will be of value to them and to the University.

Much interest and enthusiasm is being shown among members of the student body who plan to bring a D.P. student to the campus this spring. The project is being sponsored by the Human Relations Council working through the World Student Service Fund which in turn works through the refugee office.

# II. FACULTY

- 1. Deaths
  - a. It is with regret that we report the death of Mr. Swen F. Parson, professor emeritus, Department of Mathematics. Mr. Parson died on November 27 at the age of 88. We quote in part from the tribute paid him by Reverend Russell Lambert: "The minimum tribute we could offer is that he was a man of noble character, wide culture, deep experience, appreciative spirit, a good father and friend, devoted to intellectual interests and one with an uncommonly wide breadth of knowledge and depth of wisdom. He taught as much by his own nobility as by his formal instruction. He was true to himself and therefore honest with others. His thoughtful words of commendation or helpful criticism were genuine and sincere. He had a love for and a patience with youth that were the natural evidence of his mission as a good teacher. His college associates, both students and faculty, had an admiration and affection for him that were their own witnesses of his worth to campus and community."
  - b. It is with regret that we report the death on December 17 of Miss Ida S. Simonson, former head of the English Department. Miss Simonson served the college from 1902 until her retirement in 1933 and had a large following among alumni all over the country. She died in Tucson, Arizona where she had gone to spend the winter months. She was 77 years old.

  - c. Mrs. Joy Lucille King, faculty assistant, at a salary of \$75 per month for the fall quarter, teaching one course in English. Mrs. King has her bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois and has had teaching experience in the teaching of rhetoric at the Navy Pier Division of the University.
  - d. Mrs. Margaret Kohler, instructor, Department of Biological Sciences, at a salary of \$350 per month until June 15, 1950. Mrs. Kohler has served previously in the same capacity. She has her bachelor's degree from Eureka College and her master's degree from the Colorado State College of Education.
  - e. Miss Christine Niekamp, college nurse with chief assignment at the McMurry Laboratory School at a salary of \$275 per month for nine months beginning in September. Miss Niekamp has her bachelor's degree from Carthage College and her R.N. from the Blessing Hospital School of Nursing, Quincy, Illinois. She has had both hospital and nursing experience as well as college nursing experience.
  - f. Mrs. Dorothy H. Peterson, faculty assistant, at a salary of \$60 per month beginning September 30 to supervise music practice rooms and classrooms during the late afternoons and evening hours and on Saturday mornings.
  - g. Because of an impending operation, it will be necessary for Miss Mary Jane Seed, assistant professor, Department of Home Economics, to be away from her duties at the college for much of the month of January and possibly through the spring quarter.

We are therefore asking permission to employ Miss Gladys Adams to take over Miss Seed's duties until she is able to return and resume her full teaching load or until the end of the spring quarter.

We would, therefore, like to employ Miss Gladys Adams, instructor, Department of Home Economics, at a salary of \$350 per month beginning January 9, 1950 until Miss Seed returns to her duties or until the end of the spring quarter, 1950. Miss Adams has her bachelor's and master's degrees from Iowa State College. She has had high school teaching experience and served as county home economist and clothing specialist in the extension service at Iowa.

# VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

# 1. Adams Hall

Adams Hall, women's new dormitory, has been in operation since September, and was formally dedicated on October 9 in a simple but impressive ceremony. Mr. Wirtz gave the presentation of the Hall which was accepted by Miss Carol Strand for the students and by the president, for the college. The dedication address was given by Mrs. Genevieve Lawless Raudenbush, an alumna of this college. A reception was held following the dedication service.

# 2. Library

The first steps have been taken for the erection of the library. These steps are very faltering ones and consist of moving the magnolia tree from the library site to a site nearer the Science Building. This location was chosen by the Biological Science Department. All of us at Northern are looking forward to the erection of this tremendously important building and hope that it can be used in the autumn of 1951. It is contemplated that the area now occupied by the library which will be vacated when the new library is in use, will be devoted to a complete Department of Business Education.

# 3. Men's Dormitory

In line with permission obtained from the Board at the meeting in Springfield on November 21, representatives of Schaeffer, Hooton, and Wilston Company were on the campus Tuesday, December 6 conferring with us regarding the men's dormitory. It is our thought to present preliminary plans at this board meeting. These plans will show our idea of having one unit of over 300 men instead of two separate units. The dormitory will be located immediately west of the football field and north and east of the McMurry Laboratory School. Mr. Chance S. Hill was on the campus at the same time the associate architects were here to confer with them regarding the location of this building.

"For extension of steam, water, heat, sewer, gas and electrical distribution system and tunnel to proposed new dormitory or dormitories to be erected on an approved self liquidating basis, plans and specifications and all necessary charges incident to the completion of said work ......\$1,000"

This item was inserted in the bill to make it possible, if a contingent fund should develop, to supply the men's dormitory with a tunnel through which heat and utilities could be carried to the dormitory. It was also inserted to make possible the construction of sewers from this dormitory. A storm sewer is greatly needed to drain the dormitory area. The present storm sewer is so inadequate that surface water now backs up and into the McMurry School. The proposed sewer would be constructed to carry storm water from the entire dormitory area into the Kishwaukee River.

Permission is requested of the Board to ask for plans and specifications for the development of this project. Funds necessary for this work are to be obtained from the contingent fund of Northern Illinois State Teachers College. This fund of \$41,000 has been increased by \$500,000 from the library.

4. Football Field

Work on the re-location of the football field and track has progressed remarkably well. All of the rough work is done, so only final grading and seeding will be needed in the spring. It is our hope that we may use this field next spring for track and next autumn for football although our obvious problem is lack of bleachers.

5. West Campus

With the completion of the purchase of 55 1/3 acres located west of the main campus, to which we refer as "west campus," it has been necessary to have a survey made of it. This is being made now by C. K. Willett, consulting engineers, surveyors for the City of DeKalb. It is our thought to work in cooperation with the city in the planning of drainage of the area. If plans for the use of this area are completed before the next biennium, it will speed up greatly our progress toward a heating plant and a laboratory school, both greatly needed at Northern.

6. Committee Visit

When the committee was on the campus on December 15, the morning was spent visiting the buildings and grounds. Particular attention was given to the following:

McMurry Laboratory School, men's new dormitory site,

varsity athletic field, parking lot, men's gymnasium, crowded classroom conditions in the Administration Building, incompleted portions of the Science Building, front porch area of Williston Hall, fireproofing Williston Hall, boulevard lighting on campus, main gate of campus at Lincoln Highway.

# 7. The Lorado Taft Field Camp

Lorado Taft, sculptor, professional lecturer at the University of Chicago and the Art Institute in Chicago, was born in Elmwood, Illinois in 1860. He died in 1936. He is famous in Illinois for his statue of Black Hawk and at the University of Illinois for his Alma Mater statue. Educated at the Universities of Illinois and Colorado, he also studied in Paris and was awarded the degree of Doctor of Letters.

The Lorado Taft "art colony" is the area immediately north of the Black Hawk Monument (Lowden State Park) 2 miles north of Oregon, Illinois on the east bank of the Rock River— 36 miles from DeKalb. The property consists of about 75 acres of high, hilly, wooded land overlooking the Rock River. There are ten houses in all degrees of disrepair. Three of these buildings have native stone walls and the others are of wood.

At the last board meeting, permission was granted to investigate this area with the view in mind of obtaining it permanently from the Division of Parks and Memorials so that it could be used by the college as a field camp to make possible the following major educational objectives:

- 1. To use nature as a textbook and laboratory for practical class work in many courses. For example, it could be used to great advantage for art, biology, home economics, industrial arts, earth science, health, physical science, mathematics, music, physical education for men and women, social science, and other departments.
- 2. To supply new and important experiences for student teachers who are on the job full time and for in-service teachers on the elementary, high school, and college levels.
- 3. To give an opportunity for upper elementary and high school students to study nature in the field. This is extremely important for children of urban areas and applies particularly to northern Illinois.

Field experiences by their very nature tend to develop democratic processes and a great ability to live with each other.

On Thursday, December 15, a committee consisting of the following persons—Director Puffer, Mr. Bohrer, Dr. Reavis, with Mr. Lanphier also attending, met at the college and in the afternoon visited the Lorado Taft field camp area. Mr. Wirtz, who had lunch with the committee, did not visit the area at this time, having been there just before the November board meeting. After carefully inspecting the proposed camp, it was decided to ask permission of the board for this committee to meet with Superintendent Ray Hubbs and Director Charles P. Casey in the very near future to start the process of ironing out the difficulties of transferring the Lorado Taft area from the Department of Public Works and Buildings to the Northern Illinois State Teachers College. Accordingly, permission is asked of the Board to proceed with this next step.

# IX. MISCELLANEOUS

At the request of the DeKalb Township High School Board of Education, a new agreement was made between the college and the high school board, regarding the manner in which the high school staff members under whom our students do their student teaching, are compensated. The agreement is as follows:

The compensation due the high school teachers is paid directly to the school board and the high school board, in turn, adds the compensation to the salary paid the high school teacher. This means that the high school teachers now receive one salary check each month. In the past they received two salary checks—one from the high school board and the other from the college. The board asked for this agreement so that the earnings of the teachers in this manner are increased, meaning that they receive additional benefits under the pension plan operated in their behalf.

# MEETING OF STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD Hotel Morrison, Chicago, Illinois

### January 9, 1950, 9:00 A.M.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents was held in the Walnut Room of the Hotel Morrison, Chicago, Illinois. The meeting convened at 9:00 A. M. Noble J. Puffer, Director of the Department of Registration and Education and Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

Chairman Puffer opened the first meeting of the Teachers College Board for the year 1950 by expressing his appreciation to the members of the Board and Presidents for their fine service during the year 1949, and hoped that they had enjoyed it as much as he did. He wished that the year 1950 would be a still more enjoyable one for all concerned.

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of, corrections, or additions to the minutes of the meeting of November 21, 1949.

Mr. Dunn moved that the minutes be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin, and unanimously carried.

At the last meeting of the Teachers College Board, Chairman Puffer informed the Board that he was going to Washington as a representative of the Governor, to have a conference with Commissioner McGrath to ascertain if he will make a study of the state supported teachers colleges and universities in Illinois, dealing only with the administration of these schools.

Chairman Puffer reported that Dr. John Dale Russell would undertake the survey. He expects to have the staff work completed by July 1st. The report will then be published and put in the hands of the Governor, this Board, the University of Illinois, and Southern Illinois University.

Chairman Puffer reported that while in Washington he happened by the office of the Department of Vocational Education, and dropped in to see if he could obtain some information regarding the training of teachers of vocational agriculture under the Smith-Hughes program at Illinois State Normal University. Chairman Puffer reported that he had asked Mr. Gregory, to whom he talked, if there had been any action by any one to retard the approval of this program. The answer he received was a definite NO. It thus appears that the approval of this program is contingent upon the recommendations of the Evaluating Committee appointed by Mr. Nickell for the Board of Vocational Education.

Dr. Fairchild reported that this Evaluating Committee had had its first in a series of meetings, to determine the qualifications of the University to train teachers of vocational agriculture, and that the next meeting was scheduled for February 16th and 17th, 1950.

# POLICY OF TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD— UNIVERSITY RETIREMENT SYSTEM

At the last meeting of the Board Mr. Lanphier, Co-ordinator, had presented a statement outlining regulations for participation in the University Retirement System. The matter was tabled until this meeting pending receipt of a letter of approval from the University Retirement System. Such a letter of approval was received and copies sent to all Board Members, Presidents, and Business Managers. In view of this Mr. Guin moved that the "Statement of Policy" be approved. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn, the roll was called and the vote was as follows:

The motion was unanimously carried and the statement is as follows:

In the University Retirement System of Illinois there are four (4) classifications as accepted by the Teachers College Board :

# STANDARD SUB-STANDARD NONACCEPTABLE NONEMPLOYABLE

First it must be clearly and definitely understood that it is the duty of the Health Officer of the university or college to classify the risk; the University Retirement System has no authority to reject

an applicant for participation in the University Retirement System after the Health Officer has classified the applicant and the application has been approved by the President of the university or college.

A STANDARD rating means that the applicant passes a physical examination that would be satisfactory to a life insurance company.

Applicants who are classified as SUB-STANDARD are those whose physical examination does not permit classification as STANDARD, but who, in the opinion of the Health Officer, would be a satisfactory risk.

It has been agreed with the University Retirement System that if an applicant passes a physical examination whereby the applicant can be considered only as a NONACCEPTABLE risk, the President of the university or college must write the University Retirement System giving the reasons why the applicant should be employed and participate in the Retirement System, sending copy of the letter to the Chairman of the State Teachers College Board.

NONACCEPTABLE applicants should be approved by the President of the university or college only in rare cases where, in the opinion of the President, the "good of the school" outweighs the possible or probable liability on the University Retirement System.

Applicants classified as NONEMPLOYABLE cannot be employed even on a temporary basis.

All applicants who are classified by the Health Officer and certified by the President of the university or college under the SUB-STANDARD or NONACCEPTABLE rating are limited in their sick or death benefits for a period of five (5) years providing the sickness or death is the result of some trouble which is found at the time of the physical examination. At the end of the five (5) years those who have been classified and accepted as SUB-STANDARD or NONACCEPTABLE have no restrictions either as to sickness or death benefits.

No applicant should be put on the pay roll until the Health Officer has completed the examination, including chest pictures and a blood analysis, and his classification has been established by the Health Officer, approved by the President of the university or college, and certified to the Retirement System.

It will probably be that a few days or maybe a week will intervene between the date of the physical examination and the classification by the Health Officer of the respective institution.

Call attention that if any new employee is put on the pay roll and a deduction is made for the Retirement System before said employee has been classified, approved by the President and certified to the University Retirement System, the Retirement System is liable. Therefore, it is of the greatest importance that no deduction for the Retirement System is made until the applicant has been classified by the Health Officer, approved by the President of the university or college, and certified to the University Retirement System.

In case an applicant is not classified by the Health Officer and approved by the President within a week after the physical examination, such applicant shall automatically be placed on the pay roll for a period of thirty (30) days as a temporary employee, awaiting classification by the Health Officer of the respective institution and approval by the President. In such cases no deduction will be made for the Retirement System. To be explicit, no deduction will be made on any new employee until the classification has been made and approved, and this classification must be completed within the said thirty (30) day period, otherwise such applicant shall be automatically nonemployable.

Again please bear in mind that the University Retirement System, by law, must accept any applicant approved by the President of the university or college and who has certified the applicant for participation in the University Retirement System.

#### NAMING OF ADMINISTRATION BUILDING AT EASTERN

Chairman Puffer read a letter he had received from Mrs. R. C. Hampton, Secretary of the Eastern Illinois State College Alumni Association, petitioning the Teachers College Board to name this building in honor of Dr. L. C. Lord.

Dr. Buzzard was asked to give his comments on the matter. He stated that he had no objection to the renaming of this building, but he felt that the name of "Old Main" had become such a tradition that it would be a difficult thing to acquire the habit of referring to this building as anything but "Old Main."

He said it was his intention, sometime in the near future, to bring to the Board the matter of naming the proposed dormitories in honor of Dr. Lord. He felt that this would be an even greater honor because this is the field in which Dr. Lord pioneered.

After a thorough discussion of the matter, Mr. Guin moved that the Chairman be directed to indicate that: "it is the policy of the Teachers College Board to retain the names of buildings already named, but that the Board will consider, in the immediate future, the naming of a new building at Eastern Illinois State College in honor of Dr. Lord." The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

# NAMING OF ATHLETIC AREA AT WESTERN

After a slight discussion of this matter, it was the unanimous opinion of the Board to table this matter until the next meeting of the Teachers College Board, which is scheduled for February 20, 1950.

Mr. Bohrer presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLVED,

- 1. That this Board reserves the right to name or rename all buildings and other structures on the respective campuses;
- 2. That no action be taken in any case until the Advisory Committee of the University or College involved has reported its recommendation to the Board and after the Advisory Committee has tried to find out the wishes of the Alumni, the Faculty, and the Student Body;
- 3. That no final action shall be taken by the Board before the succeeding meeting of the Board following the report and recommendation of the Advisory Committee.

# REPORT OF ILLINOIS STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY

Dr. Fairchild presented his quarterly President's Report of Illinois State Normal University.

There was some discussion of Item 1. "Division of Junior College Education" under heading IV. THE ORGANIZATION on Pages 18 and 19, and it was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the matter be referred to the Graduate and General Curriculum Committee of the Teachers College Board.

Since there were no other matters for discussion about the report, Mr. Bohrer moved that the report be approved with the exception of Item 1. "Division of Junior College Education" on Pages 18 and 19, which was referred to the Graduate and General Curriculum Committee of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker and unanimously carried.

# REPORT OF WESTERN ILLINOIS STATE COLLEGE

Dr. Beu presented his quarterly President's Report of Western Illinois State College.

Since there were no matters for discussion about the report, Dr. Bradley moved that the report be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Dr. Beu was commended for the splendid outline he presented showing the number of hours per week and the percentage of time each faculty member devotes to teaching and related duties.

After thoroughly discussing the outline submitted by Dr. Beu, Mr. Walker moved that an analysis of the teaching load of each faculty member at all four schools be studied with the Presidents, and the Committee to Codify Board Rules and Procedures, of which Dr. Reavis is Chairman, for the purpose of establishing uniformity, and then submit a subsequent report. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

# REPORT OF NORTHERN ILLINOIS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Dr. Holmes presented his quarterly President's Report of Northern Illinois State Teachers College.

Since there were no matters for discussion about the report, Mr. Wirtz moved that the report be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

# DISCUSSION REGARDING VARIOUS SELF-LIQUIDATING PROJECTS

At the afternoon session of the meeting Mr. C. Herrick Hammond, Mr. Joseph Booton and Mr. E. M. Nedved, representing the Division of Architecture and Engineering; Mr. Archie Schaeffer and Mr. Phil Hooton, representing the firm of Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, Architects; and Mr. R. C. Ashton of the Bureau of Community Facilities of the United States Government, were also present.

There was some question as to the proper procedure for the approval of preliminary and final plans for self-liquidating projects.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Bohrer moved that where changes are made, subject to the approval of the State Architect's office, in preliminary plans already approved by the Board, that the revised plans are then to be resubmitted to the Board for final approval before working plans are drawn up, from which bids are to be received. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn advised that at the meeting of the Self-Liquidating Committee of the Teachers College Board held on Wednesday, November 2nd, 1949 at Illinois State Normal University they (the Committee) had approved the final preliminary plans with the changes suggested by the University officials, and had directed the architects, Schaeffer and Hooton, to prepare final plans for the erection of two dormitories to house 308 persons on the campus of Illinois State Normal University.

Mr. Dunn then moved that the action of the Self-Liquidating Committee, as reported in the minutes of their meeting held on Wednesday, November 2nd, be approved by the Teachers College Board, subject to the approval of the State Architect's office. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

The next item for discussion was the matter pertaining to fire alarm systems in the self-liquidating projects; specifically the dormitories now in the final planning state at Illinois State Normal University.

After a thorough discussion on the various types of fire alarm systems, Mr. Dunn moved that the Teachers College Board direct Schaeffer and Hooton, Architects, to specify the installation of a break-glass fire alarm system, to be connected up with the local Fire Department, and the 2½ gallon fire extinguisher equipment in each of the self-liquidating dormitories, subject to the approval of the State Fire Marshal's office. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker and unanimously carried.

Mr. Hammond recommended and requested the Board's approval of the employment of Mr. Clarence W. Doll as Associate Architect for the planning of the Home Management House at Eastern Illinois State College.

Mr. Walker moved that Mr. Clarence W. Doll be employed as Associate Architect for the planning of the Home Management House at Eastern Illinois State College. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

At the request of Mr. Hammond, Mr. R. C. Ashton of the Bureau of Community Facilities of the United States Government appeared before the Board and spoke at some length on Public Law 352, which provides for advance planning of public works exclusive of housing. He explained the provisions of this law and the requirements that must be met to benefit by it.

A discussion regarding the site for the proposed dormitories at Eastern followed.

A master plan showing the existing buildings and the proposed buildings was shown by the representatives of the Division of Architecture and Engineering.

At the time this master plan was prepared, the proposed dormitories for women were located in one area and the dormitories for men in another area, as recommended by the Division of Architecture and Engineering. The Administration of the school would now like to change this plan.

After considerable discussion on the matter, Mr. Dunn moved that we follow the respective master plan of each of the four State Teachers Universities and Colleges for the location of men's and women's dormitories. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Bohrer moved that Barcus-Kindred and Company be requested to submit to the individual Board members their financial data with reference to the self-liquidating Student Union Building at Illinois State Normal University before the March meeting of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

There being no further business before the Board Mr. Means moved that the meeting be adjourned until the next meeting, which is scheduled for February 20, 1950, in Springfield, Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

A special meeting of the Presidents of the four State Teachers Universities and Colleges together with Director Puffer was held in Director Puffer's office on Tuesday afternoon, February 7, at 1:30 P. M.

The purpose of this meeting was the discussion of the critical coal situation.

Director Puffer informed all that he had advice that no more coal could be routed to any of the teachers colleges; it must go to institutions under the Department of Public Welfare and the Department of Public Safety; that is, state hospitals, prisons, etc.

Figures had been supplied by each school as to the number of tons on hand, shipments enroute, consumption per day, number of days they could run by heating the buildings as usual, and the number of days they could run by cutting the heat to 50% of normal. These figures, as of February 6, 1950, are as follows:

## MEETING OF STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD

Director Puffer's Office, Capitol Building

## Springfield, Illinois

## February 20, 1950, 9:15 A.M.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents was held in Director Puffer's office, Capitol Building, Springfield, Illinois. The meeting convened at 9:15 A. M. Noble J. Puffer, Director of the Department of Registration and Education and Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

Chairman Puffer opened the meeting by reviewing for the other members of the Board the special meeting he called with the Presidents because of the critical coal situation. He also read to them the minutes which were recorded of said meeting.

At the above-mentioned meeting it was requested that the Presidents bring information to this meeting regarding their current coal supply.

Dr. Buzzard reporting for Eastern advised that they have 100 tons or more on hand, are using about nine tons a day, and running on the reduced load will be able to run for about ten days or two weeks.

Dr. Fairchild reporting for Normal advised that they have about 200 tons on hand, are using about ten tons and possibly twelve tons a day, (depending on the weather), and running on the reduced load will be able to operate for approximately twenty days.

Dr. Beu reporting for Western advised that on February 18 they had only twenty-one tons on hand, but that on February 15 they had made a confirmatory requisition to the Bruketta Company for 100 tons of coal to be delivered within the next ten days.

Dr. Holmes reporting for Northern advised that they have enough coal to run only through Thursday, February 23, and are using about six tons daily.

Further discussion of the coal situation continued, and Mr. Dunn asked what the current situation was as of today with respect to the possibility of diverting some coal to the Teachers Colleges to enable them to resume classes on February 27.

Since no one in the group could answer Mr. Dunn's question, it was the unanimous feeling that Mr. McKinney, State Purchasing Agent, be requested to come and sit in on the meeting, and perhaps answer some questions which were in the minds of the Board members and Presidents.

When Mr. McKinney arrived he was asked what the possibility was of diverting enough coal to get the schools opened as soon as the strike was over. He said it was possible to supply the schools with coal, and that it would be only a matter of two or three days after the miners went back to work, providing they went back to work this week.

Mr. McKinney was then asked if his division would approve of the schools buying coal locally. He advised they (Central Purchasing) would buy coal any place they could to get the schools opened.

The Board thanked Mr. McKinney for giving his time to answer the questions presented.

Mr. Bohrer moved that provided the general coal strike has then ended, the respective Presidents may open school on February 27 or at any time thereafter, when, in their judgment, they have or can obtain sufficient coal. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried. Mr. Means moved that Mr. Bohrer, Mr. Dunn, and Mr. Wirtz be requested to draft a resolution and send it to the proper authorities in Washington deploring the condition of this State and Nation as a result of the coal strike. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried. The resolution is as follows:

Be It Resolved by the Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois that we deplore the fact that conditions in this State and Nation have reached a situation where the ordinary and fundamental functions of public education, in time of peace, have been curtailed, crippled and discontinued because of an impasse which has developed between the miners, operators and government in the basic coal industry of the country; and,

Be It Further Resolved that we urge our public officials and all concerned, regardless of party affiliation, to merge their efforts not only to bring an end to this present situation, but provide some vehicle which will prevent such catastrophies in the future in this or any other basic industry.

Mr. Dunn presented and moved the adoption of the foregoing resolution. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

The next matter of business before the Board was the approval of, corrections, or additions to the minutes of the meeting of January 9, 1950.

Mr. Dunn moved that the minutes be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

## HOLIDAYS

The matter of holidays for academic employees as well as nonacademic employees was discussed in detail.

Mr. Bohrer moved that the Teachers College Board go on record as favoring the present operating schedule of the colleges as regard to the granting of holidays to academic employees. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn.

More discussion followed and Mr. Dunn offered as a substitute motion the following:

Mr. Dunn moved that the entire matter be tabled. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer.

Still more discussion followed and Dr. Reavis moved that the Presidents be instructed to go ahead and have their catalogs printed on the basis of the action of the Teachers College Board on January 20, 1947, and with the additional date of November 11. The motion

was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried. The list of official holidays is as follows:

- 1. January 1, New Year's Day
- July 4, Independence Day
- 3. September, Labor Day
- 4. November 11, Armistice Day
- November, Thanksgiving
   December 25, Christmas
- 7. Illinois Education Association, Division Meeting Day
- 8. Regular vacations as presented in the projected college calendars

Mr. Nickell suggested that we ask the Attorney General for an opinion to find out his interpretation as to how this matter of statutory holidays affects the various levels of education.

Chairman Puffer appointed Mr. Nickell and himself as a committee to obtain an Attorney General's opinion and report to the Board at its next meeting.

## SUGGESTED NAME OF ATHLETIC AREA AT WESTERN

The matter of naming the Athletic Area at Western was discussed briefly at the January 9 meeting with the recommendation that the matter be placed in the hands of the Advisory Committee for Western with the request that they report their recommendations at this the February 20 meeting.

Mr. Means, Chairman of the Advisory Committee for Western, advised that the matter had been referred to the Alumni, Faculty and Student Body of Western for consideration and vote, and that now the recommendation of the Advisory Committee is that the field should be named the "Hanson Field."

Since no final action can be taken by the Board before the succeeding meeting of the Board following the report and recommendation of the Advisory Committee, the matter is being placed on the agenda for the meeting on March 27, 1950.

## SUGGESTED NAME OF LIBRARY BUILDING AT NORTHERN

Following the procedure of the Teachers College Board this matter was referred to the Advisory Committee for Northern.

Mr. Wirtz, Chairman of the Advisory Committee for Northern, reported that the matter was submitted to the Alumni, Faculty and Student Body to ascertain their wishes.

After the aforementioned groups had been polled, it was the recommendation of the Committee that the library building be called the "Swen Franklin Parson Library." The Committee further recom-

mended that the browsing room in the library be called the "Ida Simonson Room," and the auditorium be named the "Eva McMahon Auditorium."

No final action was taken by the Board on this matter, but it is being placed on the agenda for the meeting on March 27, 1950.

## REPORT OF SECRETARY NICKELL

Secretary Nickell reported on a matter that had been brought to his attention regarding the training of Industrial Arts Instructors for rehabilitation work.

Secretary Nickell informed the Board that he was not requesting any action on the part of the Board at this time, but merely presented the matter for consideration and discussion at a later date.

## REPORT OF POLICY COMMITTEE

Dr. Reavis, Chairman of the Policy Committee of the Teachers College Board, reported that the Committee had decided they would like to send an inquiry to all members of the faculty, the administrative officials, and non-academic supervisors of the four State Teachers Colleges to give them an opportunity to express themselves and give suggestions for improving the administration of their particular school.

Dr. Reavis moved that the Teachers College Board approve the report of the Policy Committee, and the mailing of inquiries to all faculty members, administrative officials, and non-academic supervisors. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

At the last meeting of the Teachers College Board Mr. R. C. Ashton of the Bureau of Community Facilities of the United States Government appeared before the Board and discussed Public Law 352.

It was the opinion of the Board at that time that if any school was interested, they should contact Mr. Ashton.

Mr. Dunn advised that he had received a letter from Dr. Holmes requesting that he check the accompanying contract between the Community Facilities Services and Northern.

Mr. Dunn advised that he had checked the contract and found it in satisfactory order, and presented it for signature by the Chairman and Secretary. He then moved the approval of the request from Northern for this advance planning under Public Law 352. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

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## SELF-LIQUIDATING DORMITORIES

At the afternoon session, in addition to the Board members and Presidents, the following persons were present: Mr. C. Herrick Hammond and Mr. Joseph Booton of the Division of Architecture and Engineering; Mr. A. N. Schaeffer and Mr. P. R. Hooton of the firm of Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson; Mr. Alan Baird, a consulting mechanical engineer; Mr. Vincent Newman of Barcus, Kindred and Company, and Mr. J. T. Swartz of J. T. Swartz and Company, Inc.

The first matter discussed was the preliminary plans for men's dormitory at Northern, copy of said plans having been sent to all Board members and Presidents prior to this meeting.

After a thorough discussion of the plans, Mr. Wirtz moved that we approve the preliminary plans for the men's dormitory at Northern and that the ratio between the number of water closets and urinals be worked out by the State Architect's office and the Associate Architects. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

The next matter of business was the discussion of the dormitories at Illinois State Normal University.

Mr. Dunn advised that the Self-Liquidating Building Committee of the Teachers College Board has reviewed the final plans and specifications for the dormitories at Illinois State Normal University and recommend acceptance of same. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn moved that we approve the final plans and specifications for the men's and women's residence halls at Illinois State Normal University as submitted by the State Architects and Associate Architects, that they be instructed to take alternate bids on steel desks, chairs, and dressers, and that a copy of the plans and specifications be placed on file with the Secretary of this Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn then reported that the Self-Liquidating Building Committee has reviewed the final plans and specifications for the Facilities Building at Western, which involves the Stadium, found them in acceptable form, approved them, and recommended that they be approved by the Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn moved that the State Architect be instructed to advertise for and receive bids for the construction of the Facilities Building at Western, and that a copy of the plans and specifications be placed on file with the Secretary of this Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

A discussion regarding the date of the next meeting followed, and Dr. Reavis moved that we change the date of the next meeting from March 20, 1950, to March 27, 1950. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried. Mr. Dunn moved that the State Architect be instructed to advertise for and receive bids, together with the Associate Architects Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, for the construction of men's and women's residence halls at Illinois State Normal University, including furnishings and/or equipment for the present Fell Hall which is to be paid for out of the self-liquidating fund, and also the Facilities Building at Western Illinois State College; bids to be received at the office of the Division of Architecture and Engineering, Department of Public Works and Buildings, and that the State Architect be further instructed to open the bids on behalf of the Teachers College Board, codify them, and bring the bids together with recommendations to the Teachers College Board meeting on March 27, 1950, at Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

There being no further business to take up with the architects Chairman Puffer thanked them for appearing and for their assistance.

## INFORMAL REPORTS OF PRESIDENTS

Dr. Beu presented the following informal report:

- 1. We wish to request that the Teachers College Board make application for the Western Illinois State College to the Community Facilities Service, General Services Administration to draw plans for the proposed library building at Western under the provisions of the Advance Planning Program.
- 2. We wish to obtain approval of the Board for the drawing of the plans by the Division of Architecture and Engineering for the self-liquidating stadium project at the Western Illinois State College. This project and the preliminary plans for same have been reviewed and approved by the Advisory Committee for Western.
- 3. Five days of the ten-day enforced vacation period, due to the coal shortage, will be made up by eliminating the regularly scheduled spring vacation; the remainder will be made up by holding classes on Saturdays. If the college is not able to reopen on February 27, as now scheduled, some other plan will be used. According to present plans, the Spring Quarter will open March 13 rather than March 6, as listed in the college calendar.
- 4. We have presented the matter of naming buildings and projects at Western Illinois State College to our Advisory Committee, and we shall appreciate their report to the Board on the same.
- 5. As of Saturday, February 18, we had twenty-one tons of coal on hand. This is a three to four days' supply to keep the buildings above the point of deterioration provided that the outside temperature does not fall below 20°. On February 15, we made a confirmatory requisition to the Bruketta Company, Farmington, for

one hundred tons of coal to be delivered within the next ten days. This was approved in a telephone conversation with Mr. Leimann, coal buyer in the purchasing agent's office.

Mr. Means moved that Dr. Beu's report be accepted. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Dr. Holmes reported informally for Northern. He reported on the conference with Director Casey regarding the proposed leasing of the Lorado Taft Park area for Northern Illinois State Teachers College. Some steps remain to be taken before further conference is to be held with Director Casey on this subject.

Dr. Holmes requested permission to change the date of the Board meeting from May 22 to May 19, meeting scheduled to be held at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois.

Mr. Wirtz moved approval of Dr. Holmes' informal report. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

Dr. Buzzard reported informally for Eastern, and requested permission to appeal to the Community Facilities Service to draw plans for a Women's Physical Education Building and a Vocational Education Building.

Dr. Buzzard next requested the Board's approval of the transfer of Harry White from Maintenance Equipment Operator to Provisional Stationary Fireman, effective January 1, 1950, and also the Board's acceptance of the resignation of Miss Pauline DeHaas.

Dr. Buzzard advised that by March 27 they will present plans for the dormitories at Eastern.

Mr. Bohrer moved that Dr. Buzzard's informal report be accepted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Dr. Fairchild reported informally for Normal and wondered what the possibility would be of putting on the agenda for the next meeting the matter of considering the possibility of a Student Union Building on an approved Self-Liquidating basis.

Dr. Fairchild requested that Illinois State Normal University be authorized to change the organization of curricula from the Divisions of Elementary and Secondary Education to Areas of Elementary and Secondary Education with a Division of Junior High School Education, a Division of Senior High School Education, and a Division of Junior College Education, calling for a Coordinator of Secondary Education, who would serve as Director of one of the three Divisions, the other two Directors to come from existing staff members as a part of their regular assignment. Dr. Fairchild advised that the Graduate and General Curriculum Committee has approved this course for Junior College Education. Mr. Dunn moved that Dr. Fairchild's report and request be approved. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Mr. Means moved that the bids taken by the Division of Architecture and Engineering for the addition to Morgan Gymnasium be accepted and approved by the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

There being no further business before the Board Mr. Dunn moved that the meeting be adjourned until the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board which is now scheduled for March 26 and 27 at Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Eastern is proud to report that the college basketball team, for the second consecutive year, represented the State of Illinois in the 1950 National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball Tournament at Kansas City, Missouri, by reason of winning the play-off tournament between Northern, Western, Millikin, and Eastern. The season record compiles twentyone victories and five defeats.
- B. With equal or even greater pride the college mentions the Medallist rating given The Eastern State News by the Columbia University Scholastic Press Association at the recent annual meeting in New York. This is the fourteenth time the college paper has won this coveted rating, and the thirteenth consecutive year for such an achievement; a record not equalled by any similar institution.

- B. The three-week shutdown, because of the coal shortage, cost a loss of twelve recitations because each course recites four times per week. Subtracting the two holidays of February 13 and February 22, finds us only ten recitations short. Instead of closing the Winter Quarter on March 10, as scheduled by our regular calendar, we shall close on Thursday, March 23rd. We shall hold regular classes on Saturday, March 11, through the regular week March 13-17, on Saturday, March 18, and the four days of March 20-23. This gives us eleven days of extra work in which to make up the ten recitations missed and complete in full the requirements of the Winter Quarter. We shall begin the Spring Quarter without registration day on March 24, hold classes on Saturday, March 25, and extend the college year June 7-8-9, thus ending on Friday, June 9,

instead of on June 6. By using float hours and the brief spring holiday, we will thus complete the Spring Quarter with only one day short.

It is interesting to note that the official enrollment of the second semester of 2255 is only 183 short of the enrollment of the first semester and is 208 more than the second semester enrollment of a year ago. The holding power of the University continues to be very good especially when it is known that probably the largest number of seniors in the history of the school completed work for graduation at the end of the first semester. Interest in teacher education for the school year beginning next September appears to be unusually good in both quantity and quality. Staff members report that they have seldom seen as much interest, on the part of highly qualified students, in teacher education.

2. Extension, Second Semester, 1949-1950

Enrollment in extension courses, the departmental courses offered, the centers, and the instructors are here presented for the second semester of the 1949-1950 school year, with comparisons of total enrollments for the second semester of last year and the first semester of the present year.

The enrollment of 488 in the extension classes during the current semester is apparently the largest second semester enrollment on record. Interest in this work continues beyond the possibility of supplying instructors. The size of the campus enrollment has made it impossible to have teachers available to meet needs in the field.

## 3. Scholarships Certified

a. As a matter of record, certification is here made to the Teachers College Board that a list of persons with addresses given in each case and the amount of money from which they have been exempted under the State Scholarship Law, has been submitted for the second semester of the 1949-1950 school year to the Chairman of the Teachers College Board, through the Coordinator of the State Teachers Colleges. This list with the approval of the Chairman and Secretary of the Teachers College Board provides the transfer of funds by the State Treasurer from the General Revenue Account to the Income Fund of Illinois State Normal University. Recognition of this transfer should be included in Board action at this time.

## II. FACULTY

## 1. Deaths

a. Mr. Herman H. Schroeder, Dean Emeritus of the University, died January 27, 1950. With close to sixty years of teaching experience and having been on the faculty of Illinois State Normal University since 1913 and serving as Dean from 1928 to August 1943 when he retired, Mr. Schroeder made an exceedingly valuable contribution to

education, especially here in Illinois and at Illinois State Normal University. An able administrator, an excellent teacher who thoroughly enjoyed classroom contacts, a student of higher education especially in the field of philosophy, Mr. Schroeder left an imprint upon his colleagues and the many students with whom he came in contact. Even though he had retired he continued to teach at his own request and had been in the classroom as late as January 6 of this year.

- 2. Resignations
  - a. Mr. Harold F. Hall, Director of Alumni Relations, effective April 1, 1950, in order to accept an opportunity to go into business at Lincoln, Illinois, where he will be working in the office equipment line.
  - b. Mrs. J. Loreena Webb, Instructor in English (Journalism), effective June 10, 1950, in order to accompany her husband who is leaving the community on another assignment at a distant point.
- 3. Leaves of Absence
  - a. Sabbatical

The following persons have requested and are entitled to sabbatical leaves under Board regulations, since they have been at Illinois State Normal University for a period of five years or longer and are within the quota of persons entitled to such leaves on half pay, as a result of signing a note to return to their regular work for a period of two years following the completion of the leave of absence. These leaves are effective September 1, 1950, for one year unless otherwise indicated.

- (2) Mrs. Gertrude M. Hall, Director of Publicity. (Twelve months, effective July 1, 1950)
- (3) Miss Blossom Johnson, Instructor in Home Economics.
- (4) Miss Alice Sheveland, Instructor and Supervising Teacher. (First semester only)
- (5) Miss Ethel Stein, Instructor and Supervising Teacher. (Second semester only, February 1951)
- (6) Mr. George Barford, Instructor in Art. (Second semester only, February 1951)
- b. Leaves Other Than Sabbatical (Without Pay)

Leaves of absence have been requested and are recommended for the following persons from the time indicated.

- (1) Mr. Clarence W. Sorensen, Assistant Professor Geography, first semester only, 1950-1951 school year.
- (2) Mr. DeVerne Dalluge, Instructor in Physical Science, 1950-1951 school year.
- (3) Dr. Howard I. Fielding, Associate Professor of English, 1950-1951 school year.

All of the foregoing leaves are for the purpose of continued work for professional advancement.

- c. Continuation of Leaves
  - (1) Miss Ella Leppert, Assistant Professor of Social Science, has requested that her sabbatical leave beginning September 1949 be extended for one more year, or until September 1950. It is recommended that this leave, without pay for this second year of her absence, be granted.

  - (3) Miss Marion C. Allen, Assistant Professor of Art, who has been on leave of absence during the current academic year, to have her leave extended for the 1950-1951 school year due to continued health disability, under the University Retirement System.
- 4. Changes in Salary

There are three members of the faculty who are scheduled to retire as of August 31, 1950, and who are entitled to the regular benefits of the University Retirement System.

a. Mr. Floyd T. Goodier, Associate Professor of Education. Mr. Goodier came to Illinois State Normal University in 1935 from the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction where he was First Assistant State Superintendent, and has been a valuable member of the faculty serving in various administrative capacities for the past fifteen years.

- b. Mr. Clifford W. Moore, Assistant Professor of Social Science, came to Illinois State Normal University in 1928 and has worked extensively both on and off the campus, at one time doing most of his work with extension classes.
- c. Mrs. Laura H. Pricer, Associate Professor of English, who did her first teaching at I. S. N. U. in 1911 and who has rendered thirty-nine years of valuable service both as an instructor and a faculty member interested in the activities of the University.
- 6. Changes in Rank

- 7. New Appointments
  - a. Miss Alma Bremer, Instructor in Education with particular emphasis in the field of special education, effective September 1950 at an annual (nine months) salary of \$3690.00. Miss Bremer has her bachelor's degree from Arkansas State College at Jonesboro and her master's from the University of Illinois. She has had experience in elementary schools in Arkansas and Illinois, and comes to us from the Oak Park Public Schools. She would fill a new position that has been created to meet the needs of special education when the new building is opened in September 1950.
  - b. Mr. Charles Porter, as Instructor in Industrial Arts, effective September 1950, at an annual (nine months) salary of \$3375.00. Mr. Porter has his bachelor's degree from Illinois State Normal University and is scheduled to receive his master's degree during the current school year. He has had teaching experience at Marshall, Illinois, aside from assisting in the Industrial Arts Department at Illinois State Normal University. Mr. Porter would relieve Dr. Ashbrook of certain work in order for him to work in the field of Special Education.

- c. Miss Lillie Mae Rickman, Assistant Professor of Education, at an annual (nine months salary) of \$4140.00, effective from September 1950, in order to fill a newly created position in the Division of Special Education. Miss Rickman has her bachelor's degree from Mississippi State College for Women and her master's from the University of Chicago. She has had additional work at Wayne University and is now taking work toward her doctor's degree at Teachers College, Columbia University. Miss Rickman has had teaching experience in elementary schools in Mississippi and Illinois and comes to Illinois State Normal University, following her leave of absence work, with service in special education in the Department of Public Instruction for the State of Illinois in Springfield.

## IV. THE ORGANIZATION

- 1. Plan for Recovering Lost "Coal Vacation" Time Although Illinois State Normal University plans to make up as much time as possible of that which was lost during the recent enforced vacation, there is merit in the belief that if all of this time can not be regained, students and faculty should not be held responsible since the emergency came about as a result of matters beyond their control.
  - a. It is proposed to make up six days of the seventeen lost by using five of the six days of spring vacation, leaving only Good Friday as a holiday, and using Memorial Day as the sixth day.
  - b. Many graduate and other courses meeting late afternoons, evenings and Saturdays are having additional meetings or adding to the length of the periods. This is likewise true of extension courses off campus, although many of these continued to meet regularly during the enforced vacation.
  - c. Planning by department groups has produced ways of making up part of the work through an intensive program that has been carefully developed.

d. It is proposed to attempt the lengthening of class periods so as to make up approximately one day each week by having periods of sixty rather than fifty minutes. This would call for operating upon the regular summer session program of sixty minutes per class period. The use of this plan would add fifty minutes each week or the equivalent of a class period and during the last six weeks of the semester would produce six more days.

On the above basis, there would be six days from regular vacation periods, six additional days from lengthened class periods, and five days from an intensive program or extra periods that have already been worked out. The use of Saturdays will not work on our semester plan of classes with three and two semester hours, due to difficulty in scheduling days with irregular student class loads. Further, such a very large number of students work on Saturdays that attempting such a program would result in some persons finding it necessary to withdraw from school and still further a number of students and faculty are already scheduled for Saturday classes as a part of their regular program. It is impossible to use a fifth day in the week such as may be possible on the quarter system with classes meeting four days a week. The classes of three and two hours dovetail to form an entire week on the semester plan.

# VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

# 1. Major Repairs

- a. *Roofs.* Approval has been given bids obtained and contracts awarded for new roofs on McCormick Gymnasium and Cook Hall. Extensive repairs will be made to the roof of the Metcalf Elementary School. These buildings have needed such repairs for considerable time and with the release of money originally placed in the budget for this biennium, these repairs are possible.
- b. Lighting. For considerable time there has been need for re-wiring of the Metcalf Elementary School building in order to permit more extensive and better lighting. The present wiring would not carry a load that would permit adequate lighting. On March 28, the Division of Architecture and Engineering is sending an engineer to survey the situation and to prepare specifications with the idea that this important work be undertaken immediately. It is

hoped that this entire lighting project may be completed within the amount of the \$30,000 appropriated.

- c. *Plumbing.* During the year and up to and including the present time, a great deal of change in plumbing in the washrooms at Fell Hall (women's residence) and the shower rooms in Cook Hall has taken place. The improvement of these conditions will relieve the University of much difficulty with loose plastering, repainting jobs, and other damaging conditions.
- d. *Boilers*. Very extensive repairs were made on all four of the boilers in the heating plant. Part of this was made possible by use of an emergency fund and part of it came from the regular Contractual Account.
- e. Water Proofing. A considerable amount of money has been spent on trying to reduce the moisture in the basement of North Hall. A very extensive amount of water proofing has been done on these walls with the hope that plaster will not moisten and drop off and that the walls can be finished and painted in a presentable style.

The foregoing repairs total a little over \$70,000.00 and are illustrative of the nature and extent of repairs required in a school as old as Illinois State Normal University.

- 2. New Construction in Process
  - a. Administration Building. The Administration Building is nearing completion and should be ready for occupancy by May 15. It is hoped to call for bids on the furniture, furnishings, and special equipment by April 21 and with thirty-day delivery promised on ninety-eight percent of such materials, it is hoped that the shift of offices may be made before the end of May so that the commencement season and the opening of the summer session will find the building in complete operation. The next meeting of the Teachers College Board that will be scheduled for the campus at Illinois State Normal University should find the Board Room on the third floor of the Administration Building available for use.
  - b. Special Education Building. Excellent progress is being made on the Special Education Building and it is expected that it will be ready for occupancy when school opens in September of this year. A schedule of furniture, furnishings, and special equipment is being prepared to give ample time for such installation by next September. Plans for occupancy of the east wing by the University

Health Service and the provision of necessary special equipment are also included in the time schedule for opening in September.

- c. Mechanical Services. As will be observed at the time of this Board meeting, the campus appears to be over-run with moles of a large size, or better adapted to trench warfare. This is the result of the provision of a new underground distribution system of mechanical services. Telephone lines, clock system, and electrical wiring will now be underground, as well as the gas, water, sewer, and heating lines. These lines are carried to the new buildings but are so constructed that they may be tapped at all of the intervening buildings on the campus. There was not sufficient money to extend them to all parts of the campus and therefore this will be a part of a future contract when additional buildings demand the extension of the services.
- d. *Beef Cattle Barn*. The two new large wings of the Beef Cattle Barn at the University Farm are rapidly nearing completion and will make quite a contribution to the improvement of the division of animal husbandry in the agriculture program.
- 3. Proposed New Construction and Development of Plant
  - a. New Dormitories. The two proposed self-liquidating dormitories for men and women are becoming reality with the selection of a successful bidder and the awarding of contracts at this meeting of the Teachers College Board. It is hoped that construction may be under way by June 1 of this year.
  - b. Addition to Fell Hall. The first preliminary sketches have been received from the architects for the south wing on Fell Hall and the construction of additional rooms on the top floor of the present structure, as well as in the new wing. This construction should add a total of one hundred beds to the present structure and provide much-needed additional quarters for recreation, laundry, etc. The present Fell Hall was built to accommodate one hundred women students. As a war emergency measure, it was extended to 151 by placing three beds in the double rooms and two beds in most of the single rooms. Where three beds are provided many of the rooms are crowded both as to actual space for the occupants and for taking care of personal belongings. The withdrawal of eighteen beds at the earliest possible date would reduce the number to be accommodated in the present structure to 133, which with the addition of one hundred new beds will make a total 233-bed capacity structure.

- c. Landscaping and Site Preparation. Plans are being completed for changes in walks, installation of turn-around drives (following the elimination of one drive through the campus) to buildings other than those at the edge of the campus, grading and landscaping around the Administration and Special Education buildings, the development of a mall directly south from the present Old Main, the shift in East Fell Gate and the construction of a West Fell Gate, and extensive changes in the drive area to the west of Fell Hall.
- d. The Plans for University Elementary and High Schools. Preliminary work on the part of staff in the preparation of specifications of space for the proposed University Elementary School and the University High School is rapidly nearing completion and will soon be ready for the architects. The designation of the architects and the release of funds for this work have already been cared for.
- 4. Acquisition of Land <sup>•</sup>
  - a. Final steps are being taken in the acquisition of land west of the campus where one piece of property is necessary for the actual location of the proposed new men's residence hall and other properties are desirable in that immediate vicinity. This will be reported on at the meeting of the Teachers College Board prior to the adoption of the resolution for the self-liquidating plan of procedure through the issuance of bonds.

The student body of Illinois State Normal University, through representatives on the Student Council, is pleased to have the opportunity to appear before the Teachers College Board to indicate needs, together with ways and means of making possible the building of a Student Center. It is generally agreed by students and faculty that this is one of the greatest immediate needs on the campus of the University and that having such a center in operation would probably make the greatest single difference for the betterment of social life on the campus. Such a building would also serve to meet certain imperative needs of faculty and student groups in connection with the educational program.

# 2. Forensics

With the program in forensics operating for the first time under a faculty member who has this particular assignment and who is well prepared to carry on this activity, a great deal of interest has developed in debating. The debating teams in their various tournaments and meets with other schools have been very successful. Increased interest has resulted in a large number of students working in this important area of the school program.

# IX. MISCELLANEOUS

# 1. Campus Visitors

Perhaps because of location, size, and the wide range of offerings in all fields of teacher education, Illinois State Normal University has been a center for visits of foreign scholars. There has always been a large number of visitors from other educational institutions and organizations over the country but now groups or individuals from abroad include the school in their itinerary.

In October of this year we had Miss Mahru Kutar of India come to us for a period of six weeks. Just at the present time Miss Fridericke Rametsteiner of Vienna, Austria, is spending at least ten days, and on May 21, Mr. Kees Boeke of The Work Shop, a progressive school at Bilthoven, Holland, visited the University. These persons are additional to others as single visitors and the group of German and Austrian scholars that we had at various times on the campus during the preceding year. Others are scheduled to be on the campus between now and the end of the regular academic year. It is a pleasure to make the facilities and the program of the University available to these visitors.

# VIII. STUDENT LIFE

- A. Eastern, Southern, and Western share the basketball championship in the I. I. A. C. for the 1949-50 season. In the playoff to represent the colleges in Illinois at the Kansas City tournament, Eastern Illinois State College was the winner, defeating Southern for this honor.
- B. Guest Day at the Western Illinois State College will be held on Wednesday, March 22. It is estimated that from 1,300 to 1,500 high school seniors, parents, and teachers will be on our campus on that day.
- C. The Western Choir, directed by Mr. Forrest Wanninger, will make their annual tour March 27-29. They will present concerts at the high schools in Fort Madison and Keokuk, Iowa; Carthage, Roseville, Monmouth, Aledo, Moline, and Orion, Illinois.
- D. The annual tour of Western's Concert Band will be held April 17-21. Their itinerary includes Bushnell, Farmington, Havana, Beardstown, Jacksonville, Carlinville, Greenville, and Winchester, Illinois. In addition to the concerts to be presented in the foregoing high schools, the band will broadcast from a St. Louis, Missouri, radio station. The band is directed by Mr. A. L. Fritschel.
- E. Spring trips, other than those over week ends, originally scheduled in baseball, golf, and tennis have all been canceled due to the elimination of spring vacation. These trips had been contracted for during the spring vacation.

# IX. MISCELLANEOUS

A. Presidents of nine teachers colleges—the five in Illinois, the two at Muncie and Terre Haute, Indiana, and the two at Ypsilanti and Mt. Pleasant, Michigan—met on Thursday, February 24, while attending the A. A. C. T. E. meeting in Atlantic City, to discuss the formation of a new nine-college athletic conference.

The prospects for such a conference being organized are very good as all the men present were interested in having the athletic directors and coaches of the respective schools draw up a constitution for the proposed conference for a three-year probationary period. No official action has been taken on the proposed conference, but we thought that the Board might be interested in knowing that we plan to set up such a conference if agreeable with all the colleges.

B. Plans for making up the time lost due to the unavoidable closing of Western Illinois State College due to the coal shortage:

The three weeks' time will be made up as follows: February 12 and 22 were statutory holidays. We will have school on Good Friday and Memorial Day, both statutory holidays. No spring vacation will be taken. Classes will be held on Saturdays, and we will have concentration weeks—that is, we, those of us on the quarter system, normally hold classes four days a week and have a system of free periods. In the concentration weeks we will have no free periods but rather classes will meet five days a week. Faculty members have been instructed to make allowance for individuals who wish to be absent from classes on Good Friday or for those who must work on Saturdays to earn money to attend college; these students are to be provided an opportunity to make up their work.

We wish to express our appreciation for the excellent cooperation of the Teachers College Board, Mr. McKinney, and other state officials in assisting us in obtaining coal through what might be termed unorthodox procedures.

#### II. FACULTY

 $1. \quad Death$ 

The entire college staff as well as the community was shocked on March 6 at the untimely death of Dr. E. C. O. Beatty, Professor, Department of Social Science. Dr. Beatty died of a cerebral hemorrhage at the age of 55, having been associated with the college since 1931. He was a brilliant scholar and teacher, a man with a large following among students and alumni. His position will be filled as soon as a well qualified person is obtained.

  - e. Miss Clyde Steen, assistant director, Williston Hall, effective June 15, 1950, to be married.
  - f. Miss Bernice Wolfson, instructor, Department of Physical Education for Women, effective at the close of the summer session, 1950, to be available for another position.
- 3. Leaves of Absence Without Pay
  - a. Mr. Roderick G. Kohler, instructor, Department of Industrial Arts, to continue his graduate study at the University of Missouri for the college year 1950-1951, without pay.

#### V. THE CURRICULUM

Following the action of the College Senate, a committee of five members was appointed to study curriculum improvement at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, looking toward the eventual development of a more adequate curriculum.

#### Elementary Teachers

Considerable progress has been made under the plan accepted by the Examining Board to make possible certain upper classmen preparing for high school work to qualify for elementary work. Northern is also emphasizing through all its classes the need for

elementary teachers. This need is particularly critical in the northern part of the state since by the autumn of 1953 the northern twenty-five counties of Illinois will need 1,000 more first grade teachers alone than was needed last autumn.

# VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

### Men's Residence Hall

Satisfactory progress is being made on the plans for the men's dormitory. Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, associate architects, have indicated that these plans will be available for bids by approximately May 1.

### Public Law 352

Satisfactory progress is being made on the process of obtaining a loan under Public Law 352. At the present time it is necessary to obtain the opinion of the attorney general on two questions:

- 1. Whether the State Teachers College Board is the proper agency of the State of Illinois to apply for and receive advances in behalf of the State of Illinois under Public Law 352, 81st Congress and
- 2. Whether the State Teachers College Board has authority to undertake by contract or otherwise the plan preparation of educational structures of the type covered by this application.

This plan is similar to the plan used by the federal government when the state colleges obtained temporary housing.

## Temporary Buildings

Northern Illinois State Teachers College has filed a letter of intention with the Federal Security Agency, Washington, D. C., to purchase two buildings located at Camp Ellis. These buildings are each 20 ft. x 156 ft. in size and will cost us approximately \$43.06 each, plus the cost of dismantling (\$700), loading (\$150), transportation (\$180), and re-erection (\$1,500). All of these figures are approximate.

We hope to purchase these buildings to be used for maintenance and storage shops. At the present time we have one building, 20 ft. x 30 ft. for the use of two carpenters, one electrician, and one plumber. For the sum total of approximately \$3,000, if our bid is accepted, we shall be able to house these maintenance men temporarily as well as provide storage for them and for other areas. It is indeed unfortunate that we must "steal" this money from Contractual Services, for it means that repair work will

suffer in proportion. If we had sufficient money we could have purchased many more buildings, some of which could have been used to relieve pressure on classrooms. However, money is not available at this time.

### New Library

At the Board meeting on February 20, the new library at the Northern Illinois State Teachers College was considered. We respectfully ask that the Board officially name the new library the SWEN FRANKLIN PARSON LIBRARY. We should like also to ask that the Browsing Room be called the SIMONSON ROOM and the auditorium on the ground floor be called the McMAHAN AUDITORIUM. This recommendation has been approved unanimously by the faculty.

# Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois

### March 26-27, 1950

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents was held in Smith Hall at Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois, at 7:30 P. M. Sunday, March 26, 1950. Noble J. Puffer, Director of the Department of Registration and Education and Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

### STUDENT UNION BUILDING

The first matter of business before the Board was the appearance of the following five members of the Student Council of Illinois State Normal University: Marvin Kleinau, William S. Johnson, Barbara Findley, Dorothy Beitsch and Kenneth H. Darr. These students had requested permission to appear before the Board for the purpose of presenting the Council's ideas regarding the necessity of a Student Union Building on the campus of Illinois State Normal University.

A very thorough discussion followed, and the representatives of the Council received a favorable reaction from members of the Teachers College Board.

They were given the Board's blessing to investigate further the acquiring of additional funds from the alumni, faculty and university friends.

Mr. Dunn commended the group for the presentation they made, and assured them that as far as he was concerned, and he felt that this was the opinion of the entire Board, there was no lack of interest on the part of any Board member.

The representatives thanked the Board for allowing them this time, for giving them the go-ahead signal to investigate the possibility of obtaining additional funds from alumni, faculty and university friends, and also for the many suggestions offered.

After a general discussion, Mr. Dunn moved that the Secretary of the Teachers College Board be authorized to acquire a seal showing the name THE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD—STATE OF ILLINOIS—OFFICIAL SEAL. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn moved that the meeting adjourn until 9:30 A. M. tomorrow morning. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

The meeting of the Teachers College Board reconvened at 9:00 A. M. on Monday, March 27, 1950, in Smith Hall at Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois.

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of, corrections, or additions to the minutes of the meeting of February 20, 1950.

Mr. Nickell moved that the minutes be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

# DISCUSSION OF SALARY SCHEDULE

Mr. Wirtz discussed the necessity of considering a revised salary schedule for the four colleges before the Presidents begin making their budgets for the 1951-1953 biennium.

#### TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD

A general discussion followed, and Mr. Nickell moved that the matter be referred to the Salary Schedule Committee for a report at the afternoon session with the recommendations to be considered by the Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Nickell moved that we consider an annual salary of \$12,000.00 for each of the four Presidents for the next biennium. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Dr. Buzzard presented his quarterly President's Report and Supplement of Eastern Illinois State College with the following corrections and deletions:

On Pages 9 and 10, under Proposed Salary '50-51, Items 43, 44, and 45, the amount should read 3870 in all three instances;

On Page 14, under heading "K. Special Contracts," Item 1. should be deleted from this report;

On page 16, under heading "F. One-year contract," both paragraphs should be deleted from this report;

On Page 18, under heading "Maintenance Services," Items 2 and 3 should be deleted from this report;

On Page 19, under heading "Housing Project," Item 1 should be deleted from this report;

On Pages 21 and 22, under heading "Summary," the following items should be deleted from this report : Item 8, Item 19 and Item 21.

On Page 22, under heading "Summary," Item 20 should read: "Transfer of Charles Myers and Ben Edman to retirement as of September 1, 1950."

Dr. Fairchild presented his quarterly President's Report of Illinois State Normal University with the following corrections, deletions and additions:

On Page 3, under sub-heading "2. Resignations," Item c. should be deleted from this report;

On Page 4, under sub-heading "c. Continuation of Leaves," following the word "disability" in Items 2 and 3 the following should be added: "under the University Retirement System."

On Page 7, under heading "Summer Session Faculty, 1950" the name of Mabel Clare Allen should be deleted from this report;

On Page 11, under heading "11. Faculty for the Academic Year 1950-1951," the name of Harry D. Lovelass should be deleted from this report under this heading;

On Page 12, under the heading "11. Faculty for the Academic Year 1950-1951," the initials "Ph.D." should follow the name of Arthur W. Watterson instead of the initials "S.M."

On Page 15, under the heading, "Administration," the following name, academic degree, payroll title, position-nature of work, and salary rate 1950-51 should be inserted in proper alphabetical order: Harry D. Lovelass, Ph.D., Ex. Asst. Ed. & Ad., Principal-University High School, Professor of Education, \$6960.00;

On Page 19, under the heading "Supervisory Staff," the Present Annual Salary 1949-1950 for W. P. Lawson should read 4824 instead of 4324;

On Page 21, under the heading "Bus Drivers," the Present Annual Salary 1949-1950 in both instances should read 2820 instead of 2700, and the Proposed Annual Salary 1950-1951 in both instances should read 2880 instead of 2820;

On Pages 21 and 22, under sub-heading "1. The Calendar," this paragraph on Page 21 and the entire Page 22 should be deleted from this report;

On Page 27, under the heading "Summary," the name of Mr. Wilbert F. Hunt in Item 2 should be deleted from this report;

On Page 28, under the heading "Summary," Item 15 should be deleted from this report;

Mr. Nickell called attention to Section 2. "Plan for Recovering Lost 'Coal Vacation' Time," and questioned using Memorial Day as a make up day.

Mr. Nickell moved that we do not use Memorial Day as a make up day at any of the four schools. The motion was lost for want of a second. However, Mr. Nickell wanted it on the record that he was voting "Aye" for all items in Illinois State Normal University's report as amended with the exception of Item a., Section 2., on Page 23 of Illinois State Normal University's report.

Mr. Dunn moved that the report of Illinois State Normal University be approved with the corrections, additions and deletions as indicated. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

## REPORT OF WESTERN ILLINOIS STATE COLLEGE

Mr. Grigsby, who substituted for Dr. Beu because of illness, advised the Board that Dr. Beu had been ordered to bed by his doctor. He further advised that he had not talked to Dr. Beu today, Monday, so could not report on his condition.

Mr. Grigsby presented the report of Western Illinois State College with the following deletions:

Item B. "College Calendar, 1950-1951," appearing on Page 17, and Item U. "The college calendar for 1950-1951," under the heading "Summary" on Page 20.

It was the unanimous opinion of the Board that Item D. "Uniform Academic Year," appearing on Page 18 should also be deleted from this report.

Mr. Means moved that we name the new athletic field at Western the "Hanson Field." The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Wirtz then moved that it shall be the policy of this Board that no buildings or areas at any of the four State Teachers Colleges under the jurisdiction of the Teachers College Board be named in honor of any living person. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Mr. Guin moved that the report of Western be accepted as corrected. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

Mr. Bohrer moved that whenever the Presidents recommend the fixing of a salary for any person to the Board that at the same time they state to the Board the salary then being paid to that person. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz.

With Mr. Bohrer's consent Dr. Reavis amended the aforementioned motion by requesting that Dr. Beu furnish sheets showing the current salary paid employees. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

### REPORT OF NORTHERN ILLINOIS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Dr. Holmes presented his quarterly President's Report of Northern Illinois State Teachers College with the following corrections: Item b. on Page 18, and Item 20 on Page 23 should be deleted from this report.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the report be approved as corrected. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the new library building at Northern Illinois State Teachers College be named the SWEN FRANKLIN PARSON LIBRARY; the Browsing Room be called the SIMONSON ROOM; and the auditorium be called the McMAHAN AUDITORIUM. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

At this point the matter of the next meeting of the Teachers College Board which was previously scheduled for April 24 at Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois, was discussed. Due to various reasons Mr. Wirtz moved that the date of the next meeting be changed from April 24 to April 17 at Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

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Mr. Dunn presented the following resolution:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the event that a reasonable price cannot be agreed upon as between the respective owners and this Board thru its said member that then the Chairman of this Board be and he is hereby directed on behalf of this Board to request the Attorney General of the State of Illinois to institute condemnation proceedings in the Circuit Court of McLean County, Illinois, pursuant to the laws of the State of Illinois, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if and when compensation to be paid the respective owners of said tracts either thru the exercise of options or thru condemnation proceedings is known, the Chairman of this Board be and he is hereby authorized on behalf of this Board to request the Governor of the State of Illinois to release the amount of such compensation from the proper appropriations of the last General Assembly of the State of Illinois so that requisitions for such funds may be approved and warrants in payment of such amounts may be issued.

Mr. Bohrer moved the adoption of the foregoing resolution. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn presented a letter that he had prepared to the Mayor and Members of the Town Council of the Town of Normal with regard to the Teachers College Board acquiring a tract of land known as Twin Grove Street and a tract of land known as an alley running

North and South thru Block Four (4) of the Third Addition to the Town of Normal, Illinois, and asked that it be made a part of the minutes. The letter is as follows:

"March 27th, 1950

# "To The Honorable Mayor and Members of the Town Council of the Town of Normal, Illinois

# "Gentlemen :

"The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois is about to let a contract for the construction of a combination residence hall and cafeteria to be constructed on recently acquired property of the State as a part of the campus of Illinois State Normal University in the three and four hundred blocks on the West side of South University in your town. In this connection, this Board owns or has contracted all of the abutting real estate on both sides of Twin Grove Street and the land in said street and in the alley running North and through the four hundred block (Block 4, Third Addition).

"The Teachers College Board respectfully requests that your honorable body take appropriate action to vacate said street and said alley. The Board will recommend to the State that the Town of Normal be paid for said land in Twin Grove Street the appraised value thereof as fixed by Russell Armstrong and John Ryan and in addition will reimburse the Town of Normal for \$236.00 which the Town paid on public benefits on the costs of the pavement on Twin Grove Street.

"In the event either water mains or sewers or other public utilities of the Town, publicly or privately owned, are found in the street or alley, the Teachers College Board will, at the expense of the State of Illinois, either reroute such utilities under the direction of your engineers or the officials of privately owned utilities, or pay your Town or the privately owned utility, for doing so with as little interruption of any such utility service as possible.

#### SELF-LIQUIDATING PROJECTS

At the afternoon session, in addition to the regular Board members and Presidents, the following people were present: Mr. C. Herrick Hammond and Mr. Joseph Booton of the Division of Architecture and Engineering; Mr. A. N. Schaeffer and Mr. P. R. Hooton of the firm of Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, Architects; Mr. John Felmley of the John Felmley Construction Company; Mr. J. T. Swartz of J. T. Swartz Co., Inc., and Mr. Vincent Newman of Barcus, Kindred and Company.

At the last meeting of the Teachers College Board the Division of Architecture and Engineering was requested to advertise for and receive bids for the construction of two Residence Halls, including furnishings and/or equipment for the present Fell Hall.

Mr. Hammond advised that on March 23, 1950, sealed bids for the construction of the self-liquidating dormitories at Illinois State Normal University were received, opened and tabulated in the office of the Division of Architecture and Engineering, and the letter from the Division of Architecture and Engineering listing their recommendations is quoted below:

### "ELECTRICAL WORK:

I hesitate recommending an award on the electrical work. The Wilson Electric Company is low on Proposal No. 1, in the amount of \$39,848.00. Anderson Electric, Inc., is the next low bidder, in the amount of \$39,850.00, and either one of these bidders would be affected by the acceptance of Alternate Proposal 1C, which provides for the furnishing and installation of a Type R lighting fixture, as specified on page 201 of the specifications.

Anderson Electric, Inc., proposal No. 1C, is in the amount of \$1,982.00, as an addition to their proposal No. 1, and the Wilson Electric Company, proposal No. 1C, is in the amount of \$3,508.00, as an addition to their proposal No. 1. The acceptance of Anderson Electric, Inc., proposal No. 1C, added to their proposal No. 1, would make their total proposal \$41,832.00, while the acceptance of Wilson Electric Company's proposal No. 1C, added to their proposal No. 1, would total \$43,356.00, in which event they would not be low.

The Anderson Electric, Inc., proposal No. 1C is considerably lower than proposal No. 1C submitted by all other contractors, and it is possible that the fixture which they intend to furnish would not meet specification requirements.

There is also a question as to whether or not proposal No. 1B should be considered. This proposal involves connecting up the fire alarm system in the building with the City Fire Department and, if accepted, will involve a further charge of \$19.00 per month by the Telephone Company, for the rental of their telephone line over which the fire alarm signal would be transmitted.

There has not been sufficient time, between the receipt of the contractors proposals and the meeting with the Normal School Board, to inquire relative to the lighting fixtures included in proposal No. 1C of the respective low bidders, and I feel that the Normal School Board, or your Department, should decide with regard to the acceptance of proposal No. 1B, which covers the fire alarm connection, which proposal, however, would not affect the status of the bidders.

### **"KITCHEN EQUIPMENT:**

You will note that I have recommended the acceptance of the low bid submitted on Kitchen Equipment by The Bensinger Company, 1007 Market St., St. Louis 1, Mo., as it is the policy of this division to consider the low bid submitted, regardless of whether or not it is submitted by an Illinois contractor.

Due to the fact that the out-of-State bidder is but \$72.00 lower than the Sidney Harrison Company of Peoria, Illinois, it is possible that the Normal School Board would feel justified in accepting the Illinois bidder's proposal of \$15,311.00.

There is no question regarding bids received for general construction, heating, plumbing and ventilating work, and the associate architects may have further information regarding the lighting fixture involved in proposal No. 1C of the electrical work.

I will be glad to discuss the proposals on kitchen equipment, as well as all others herein recommended for acceptance with you and the Normal School Board at the Board Meeting on March 27.

Prior to the acceptance of the above recommendations, Mr. Dunn advised that the bonding company had prepared a statement, "Estimate of Cost and Revenues for Two New Residence Halls and Equipment for Fell Hall," which they requested be incorporated in the minutes of this meeting. #### "Enrollment

The University has an enrollment of 2,438 (Fall term, 1949), of which 1,259 were women and 1,179 were men. The University has shown a steady growth since 1928-9, when the enrollment was 1,313 except during the war years. At present, the University operates housing facilities consisting of Fell Hall for women (capacity 152) and Smith Hall for men (capaicty 52). In 1948-9, 311 men and 326 women lived at home, commuted to school, or had living quarters that would prevent them from living in residence halls.

### "Proposed Additional Housing Facilities

It is proposed that a residence hall for women and one for men be constructed, each with a capacity of 156 beds. It is planned that an addition will be made to Fell Hall for which the University has an appropriation to increase its capacity to 230. This would provide space for 384 women and 206 men, including 52 at Smith Hall. Smith Hall is not included in this program and the revenues will not be pledged to the bond issue.

Below is shown the comparison of dormitory space after completion of the proposed residence halls, compared to 1939-40 enrollment and 1948-9 enrollment:-

As the plans for the addition to Fell Hall will not be completed for at least 6 months, it will not be possible to pledge the revenues from this addition to these bonds at the time the bond resolution is passed. The revenue from Fell Hall as it now exists can be pledged. In order to avoid difficult bookkeeping problems and to make the bond more salable, it is recommended that after the resolution authorizing the bonds is passed and before the bonds are sold that the Teachers College Board adopt a resolution to the effect that when the addition to Fell Hall is completed, that it is their intention to operate the entire hall as a unit and that all funds from Fell Hall, including the addition, will be used for the payment of operating expenses and the payment of debt service on the bonds.

### "Estimated Income

Present rates for room and board are \$14 per week, which is divided \$3.15 for room and \$10.85 for board. The dining hall in Fell Hall is operated in connection with a cafeteria and another dining hall and expenses are not segregated. Actual operations for the year ended 6/30/49, show a profit of \$11,337 from all dining facilities. In the estimate set out below, rates are increased to \$4.00 per week for room and \$11.00 per week for board. It is assumed there will be a profit of \$1.15 per week per student on the dining hall operations. Below is shown in (a) the income available for bonds prior to the construction of the Fell Hall addition; and (b) after the construction of the Fell Hall addition and assuming that revenue from this addition is contributed toward the retirement of these bonds.

``Enrollment

The College has an enrollment of 1,544 for the 1949 Fall term, of which 1,013 are men and 531 are women. The enrollment for the 1949 Summer term was 890, of which 427 were men and 463 were women. The ratio of men students to women students has increased substantially since 1933-4 when there were 455 men and 612 women enrolled. Of the 1,013 men enrolled this year, only 361 are veterans. Deducting this number from the total men enrolled still leaves 121 more men than women. This increase in male enrollment has a decided bearing on the future success of the College's athletic program.

### "Present Athletic Field

The College has just completed the construction of a new athletic field situated at the north end of the campus. The football field runs north and south and is surrounded by an oval, concretecurbed running track made of black loam and cinders. Both the east and west sides of the field have natural sod banks running up to a 45 degree angle about 60 or 75 feet. Permanent bleachers which will accommodate 1,500 spectators have been constructed on the east side of the field.

### "Construction of Proposed Stadium

It is proposed to construct a stadium to accommodate 5,000 spectators on the west side of the new athletic field, and at the north end of the field a building to house locker rooms, showers, training facilities, etc.

### "Estimated Income

A student activity fee of \$10 is collected from each student for each quarter and for the full Summer term. From this \$10 the Student Activity Board allocates.\$2 to the Athletic Fund for the purpose of paying for improvements to its athletic field. In the future, this fee will be used to pay principal and interest on the proposed bond issue. Based on the enrollment of the Summer of 1949 and the 1949 Fall quarter, revenue to pay bonds and interest will be available as follows:

#### REPORT OF SALARY SCHEDULE COMMITTEE

Mr. Guin reported that the Salary Schedule Committee had briefly discussed the matter of salaries, but felt that inasmuch as the time they had for discussion was so brief, they were not ready to make recommendations, but did offer the following suggestions to be further

discussed by the Presidents and faculty members and reported on at the April 17th meeting. The suggested revised schedule is as follows:

The Committee did recommend that the Presidents' salaries be increased from \$10,000.00 to \$12,000.00 annually, and that the Administrative Assistants' salaries remain the same.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the Presidents' salaries be increased to \$12,000.00 beginning July 1, 1950. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn advised that during the enforced vacation due to the coal shortage he had taken it upon himself to look into the possibility of converting the heating plants at the four State Teachers Colleges under the jurisdiction of the Teachers College Board from coal to fuel oil.

A general discussion followed and then Mr. Dunn presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois that the Division of Architecture and Engineering of the Department of Public Works and Buildings of the State of Illinois be and it is hereby requested to investigate and report to this Board on the following:

1. Possibility and cost of converting the heating plants at the four State Teachers Colleges, in whole and in part, from coal to oil heat, the comparative cost of oil and coal, and the cost of operation.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

The next two matters for discussion were the granting of a leave of absence to Dr. Fairchild due to health conditions, and the designating of someone to perform the duties of his office temporarily.

Mr. Bohrer presented the following resolution:

In recognition of Dr. Fairchild's devoted service to Illinois State Normal University for the past seventeen years, and in view of the present condition of his health, the Board hereby grants him a well deserved temporary leave of absence starting April 5, 1950, at full pay, but subject to his being called upon for consultation at all times on matters affecting the welfare of Illinois State Normal University; and the Board hereby confers upon Dr. Arthur H. Larsen, as Dean of the University, full authority to perform all acts of the President during the latter's absence, specifically including authority to execute all pay roll certifications, vouchers, requisitions, certifications to the University Retirement System, and any and all other instruments usually signed by the President.

Be It Further Resolved that the compensation of Dean Arthur H. Larsen be increased because of his assuming additional duties as of April 1, 1950, to the rate of \$8,000.00 per annum.

Mrs. Pegelow moved the adoption of the foreging resolution. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

There being no further business before the Board Mr. Guin moved that the meeting be adjourned. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker, unanimously carried, and the meeting was adjourned until the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board on April 17, 1950, at Western State College, Macomb, Illinois.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents convened in the Laboratory School of Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois, at 9:00 Å. M. on Monday, April 17, 1950. Noble J. Puffer, Director of the Department of Registration and Education and Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

The first matter of business before the Board was the minutes of the meeting of March 26-27, 1950.

Mr. Dunn moved that the minutes be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirt and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn advised that Twin Grove Street in Normal, Illinois, has been vacated and that a certified copy of the ordinance has been filed in the office of the Recorder of Deeds in McLean County.

Chairman Puffer cited the great amount of time and effort Mr. Dunn had given to the task of getting approval of the Town Council of the Town of Normal for the vacation of a certain street and alley in Normal, Illinois, so that the self-liquidating residence halls could be erected for Illinois State Normal University.

Dr. Reavis moved that the Teachers College Board give Mr. Dunn a vote of special thanks for his personal services in connection with the residence hall project at Illinois State Normal University. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

#### CONTRACTS

Mr. Dunn advised that on April 10 he had received a letter from Mr. Joseph F. Booton, Chief of Design of the Division of Architecture and Engineering, together with six copies of a contract prepared by Chance S. Hill for the professional services on the site work and landscaping at the Illinois State Normal University on the proposed self-liquidating residence halls.

Mr. Dunn further advised that he had carefully checked the contract and moved that the Teachers College Board enter into a contract with Mr. Chance S. Hill to provide landscaping plans for Illinois State Normal University residence halls, and that the Chairman and Secretary of this Board be authorized to sign the contract as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried. Mr. Dunn next advised that on April 10 he had received another letter from Mr. Booton together with six copies of a contract as prepared by Chance S. Hill for the professional services on the site work and landscaping for the proposed self-liquidating residence hall at Northern Illinois State Teachers College.

Mr. Dunn further advised that he had carefully studied this contract and found it to be in satisfactory form and moved that the Teachers College Board enter into a contract with Mr. Chance S. Hill to provide landscaping plans for the proposed self-liquidating residence hall at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, and that the Chairman and Secretary of this Board be authorized to sign the contract as submitted. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn next advised that he had received a third letter from Mr. Booton together with six copies of a contract as prepared by Nelson and Nettnin, Inc., Associate Mechanical Engineers, covering the cost of the professional services for all of the mechanical work as required for Williston Hall and the electrical street lighting for Adams Hall, all in connection with the proposed self-liquidating residence hall at Northern Illinois State Teachers College.

Mr. Dunn further advised that he had carefully studied this contract and found it to be in satisfactory form and moved that the Teachers College Board enter into a contract with Nelson & Nettnin, Inc., covering the cost of the professional services for all of the mechanical work as required for Williston Hall and the electrical street lighting for Adams Hall, all in connection with the proposed self-liquidating residence hall at Northern Illinois State Teachers College. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Chairman Puffer advised that he had received a statement covering architectural services on the proposed self-liquidating residence halls at Illinois State Normal University from Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson. The statement is as follows:

Mr. Dunn moved that the Teachers College Board approve the payment of the foregoing bill as presented, subject to the approval by the office of the State Architect and subject to the terms of the contract under which Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson were employed. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

# NAMING OF ROOMS IN LIBRARY AT EASTERN

At the last meeting of the Teachers College Board Dr. Buzzard had presented, as a supplement, the matter of naming certain facilities in the Mary Josephine Booth Library.

Following the policy of the Teachers College Board this matter was referred to the Advisory Committee of Eastern. However, inasmuch as this approval of the Advisory Committee was obtained by letter rather than by a meeting of the Advisory Committee, Mrs. Pegelow moved that the recorded music room be named the FRANKLYN L. ANDREWS MUSIC ROOM and the art gallery the PAUL TURNER SARGENT GALLERY, providing the written approval of the Advisory Committee is filed with the Director within the next two weeks. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

#### SALARIES

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At this point Chairman Puffer read to the members of the Board a letter that Mr. Lanphier had written Mr. Guin, Chairman of the Salary Schedule Committee, suggesting an increase in salary for himself and Miss Coleman.

After due consideration, Mr. Dunn moved that Mr. Lanphier's salary be increased to \$525.00 per month, and Miss Coleman's salary be increased to \$242.00 per month, both effective July 1, 1950. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

### COLLEGE CALENDARS

At the March 26-27 meeting of the Teachers College Board the matter of calendars was referred back to the four Presidents with the request that they get together and work out a program whereby there would not be such a wide variance in the total number of holidays or vacation days.

After due deliberation, Mr. Nickell moved that the Presidents work out the number of holidays or vacation periods, i.e., that the total number of days be uniform in all four institutions, and further that the legal holidays be uniform for all schools, and that the Presidents be authorized to prepare and print their calendars for the school year 1950-'51. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

# REPORT ON AGRICULTURE AT I. S. N. U.

Mr. Nickell advised that the Committee appointed by him, at the request of the Illinois State Board of Vocational Education, to make a survey of Illinois State Normal University regarding standards for qualifying as an institution to train teachers of Vocational Agriculture was of the unanimous opinion that Illinois State Normal University meets the required standards for the preparation of Vocational Agricultural teachers. The Committee further found, with reference to the need for Vocational Agricultural teachers, that the supply is adequate to meet the demands for such teachers.

In view of the above report, Mr. Nickell advised that the matter now rests in the hands of the Board of Vocational Education.

Mr. Dunn advised that he and Mr. Bohrer had prepared and now presented for adoption the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois now in regular session is aware of the fact that pursuant to direction of the Illinois Board of Vocational Education a special committee was appointed to inspect the Agricultural Department of Illinois State Normal University for the purpose of determining whether or not said department met the qualifications required to train teachers of agriculture under the provisions of the Smith-Hughes Act, and to also report on the need in Illinois for training such teachers in addition to such training now conducted solely at the University of Illinois, and,

WHEREAS this Board is unofficially but reliably informed that said committee has completed its investigation and has forwarded its report to the Illinois Board for Vocational Education stating in substance that the committee is unanimous in finding the Agricultural Department of Illinois State Normal University is fully qualified in all respects to train such teachers and that the committee by a divided vote of four to two finds that there is no need for such additional training, and WHEREAS this Board through its years of experience in administering the affairs of the Teachers Colleges of Illinois find that there is a need in Illinois for such additional training of agricultural teachers and that Illinois State Normal University is qualified to give such training; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Teachers College Board that this Board hereby requests the Illinois Board for Vocational Education to include Illinois State Normal University in the five-year plan for vocational education and to so certify Illinois State Normal University, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Secretary of this Board to the Illinois Board for Vocational Education so that it may be read by said Board at its meeting on April 28, 1950.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Wirtz moved that Mr. Dunn and Mr. Bohrer be authorized to appear before the Board of Vocational Education on behalf of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

# TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD SEAL

At the March 26-27 meeting of the Teachers College Board Mr. Nickell was authorized to acquire a seal showing the name THE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD—STATE OF ILLINOIS—OFFI-CIAL SEAL.

Mr. Nickell advised that he had asked the Capital Engraving Company to draw up a seal showing the aforementioned name and also the symbol of education.

Mr. Dunn moved that we approve the form of the seal, and instruct the Secretary to press the seal on the page of the minutes where this motion occurs. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

The afternoon session of the Teachers College Board convened at 1:30 P.M. In addition to the regular Board members and Presidents the following persons were present: Mr. Joseph F. Booton of the Division of Architecture and Engineering; Mr. A. N. Schaeffer and Mr. P. R. Hooton of the firm of Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson; and various bidders on the bond issues of Illinois State Normal University and Western Illinois State College.

Prior to the opening of sealed bids for the purchase of \$1,100,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, the bonding company requested that the Board approve the revised report of the Fiscal Agents dated March 29, 1950.

Mr. Dunn moved that the following revised report of the Fiscal Agents dated March 29, 1950, concerning the proposed issue of \$1,100,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, for Illinois State Normal University be accepted and approved and placed on file with the Secretary. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

### The Teachers College Board

The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois was organized pursuant to Chapter 127 of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is comprised of nine members appointed by the Governor. The Director of Registration and Education of the State of Illinois is ex-officio Chairman of the Board and the Superintendent of Public Instruction is the ex-officio Secretary. Under the control of this Board are the four Teachers Colleges of the State of Illinois: Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois; Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois; Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois; and Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois.

#### Illinois State Normal University

Illinois State Normal University, located at Normal, Illinois and founded in 1857, is a State-supported institution and derives almost all of its revenues from appropriations by the State Legislature. It was the second normal school established west of the Allegheny Mountains and the tenth in the United States. It is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. With the 1949-50 enrollment of 2,438 it is the largest of the four State Teachers Colleges. It has a faculty and administrative staff of 249 and 101 nonacademic employees.

The campus consists of 97 acres. Buildings and equipment were valued at \$4,119,913 as of 6/30/49, and \$1,898,764 of building construction

was in progress at that time. In addition to the two new residence halls, an administration building, and a special education building are under construction. Upon the completion of the special education building, the University will open a special education school for the training of teachers of handicapped children. It is expected that this school of special education will attract an increased number of students to the University.

No tuition is charged students attending the University but there is a Registration and Incidental Fee of \$40 per semester. The University maintains teacher training schools which consist of the University High School with 475 students and the University Elementary School, including a kindergarten, with 350 pupils. The University is a member of the Illinois Inter-collegiate Athletic Conference.

### Purpose of Bond Issue

These \$1,100,000 bonds, part of a total authorized issue of \$1,150,-000, are being issued for the purpose of constructing two new student residence halls complete with kitchen and dining hall facilities, and providing additional equipment for Fell Hall, an existing student residence hall. Each of the new residence halls will accommodate 156 students and Fell Hall houses 152 students. Construction contracts have been received and completion bonds will be posted. Cost of projects is as follows:

# Legal Authority and Security

These bonds will constitute a first lien upon the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the two student residence halls to be constructed and the existing student residence hall known as Fell Hall and will be issued by The Teachers College Board of the State of

#### TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD

Illinois for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947, by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to a resolution to be adopted by The Teachers College Board.

The Teachers College Board will covenant to continuously operate said buildings and the facilities connected therewith at all times when the University is in session to their full physical capacity before using any other facilities for student residence purposes; to adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of said buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said facilities; to provide an Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay principal of and interest on said bonds as the same mature; to provide and maintain a Depreciation Account of \$50,000; and to provide and maintain a Bond Reserve Account of \$55,000; and that it will collect, account for and apply the revenues in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution authorizing this issue of bonds.

# Present Student Residence Halls

The University now operates two residence halls and a cafeteria. Smith Hall for men has a capacity of 52 and Fell Hall now accommodates 152 women. The Legislature has appropriated \$640,000 for an addition to Fell Hall which will increase its capacity to 230. The revenues from Smith Hall are not pledged to this bond issue. The existing capacity of Fell Hall is pledged, together with all the dining facilities of Fell Hall. The cafeteria now located in the basement of Fell Hall will eventually be transferred to a Student Union Building. The cafeteria serves an average of about 150 students per day.

Below is shown the comparison of dormitory space after the completion of the proposed residence halls, compared to 1939-40 enrollment and 1948-49 enrollment. Also shown is the total students in need of housing in the 1948-49 year. This figure excludes students living at home or with other relatives, working for room, or commuting to school.

# New Residence Halls

The two new residence halls, designed by Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, Architects, Bloomington, Illinois, in consultation with the office of C. Herrick Hammond, Architect for the State of Illinois, will be of brick construction and located directly across University Street from the present campus on land in the process of being acquired by the University. Each hall, one for men and one for women, will house 156 students and a director. Complete dining facilities are located between the buildings. It is expected that the new residence halls will be ready for occupancy by September 1, 1951.

## Rates

Rates for board and room for both Fell Hall and the new residence halls will be \$15 per week which is divided \$11 for board and \$4 for room. Present rates for board and room at Fell Hall \$14 per week.

# Estimated Revenues and Operating Expenses prior to the Completion of Fell Hall Addition

The estimate shown below is based on present capacity of 152 in Fell Hall and 312 in the new residence halls, a total of 464. At present, a cafeteria is operated in the basement of Fell Hall. This cafeteria will be transferred to a Student Union Building, the construction of which is now being considered. Consequently, revenues and expenses of the cafeteria have not been considered in these estimates.

Included below in the cost of food is \$11,174, which represents the cost of food for student help to serve as waiters and dishwashers and are provided meals for their services. The cost of food is computed on the basis of 80c per day per person. Actual food cost at Fell Hall, Smith Hall and the cafeteria for the year ended 6/30/49, was approximately 79c per day per person.

# Estimated Revenues and Operating Expenses After Completion of Fell Hall Addition

The State Legislature has appropriated \$640,000 for an addition to Fell Hall. Under the law, it is not possible for The Teachers College Board to pledge the revenues of the Fell Hall addition. This addition will provide space for 100 more women but due to present crowded conditions in Fell Hall, the total capacity after completion of the addition will be 230. All students living in both the new and old sections of the hall will eat in the present dining facilities at Fell Hall. This will result in 442 students paying board and room and 100 students paying board only.

Included below in the cost of food is \$13,306, which represents the cost of food for student waiters and dishwashers. Food cost is computed at 80c per day per person as in the figures above.

That for the purpose of providing funds in the amount of \$1,150,000 to pay the cost of the construction of two new Student Residence Halls and equipping the existing Student Residence Hall known as "Fell Hall", as hereinabove provided, there shall be and there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued revenue bonds of said University in the principal amount of \$1,150,000. The said revenue bonds shall bear date of April 1, 1950, shall be numbered from 1 to 1150, inclusive, shall be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, bonds numbered 1 to 180, inclusive, shall bear interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum, bonds numbered 181 to 990, inclusive, shall be rinterest at the rate of two and three-fourths per cent  $(2\frac{3}{4}\%)$ per annum, and bonds numbered 991 to 1150, inclusive, shall bear interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent  $(2\frac{1}{2}\%)$  per annum, payable October 1, 1950, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October of each year and until the principal thereof shall have been fully paid, and said bonds shall mature

\$20,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1953 to 1956, inclusive; 25,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1957 to 1963, inclusive; 30,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1964 to 1968, inclusive; 35,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1969 to 1972, inclusive; 40,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1973 to 1976, inclusive; 45,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1977 to 1979, inclusive; 50,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1980 to 1983, inclusive; and 55,000 on October 1 of each of the years 1984 and 1985;

provided, however, that bonds numbered 181 to 1150, inclusive, shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date at the option of The Teachers College Board for said Illinois State Normal University on or after October 1, 1960, and up to and including April 1, 1965, at par and accrued interest, and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, at par and accrued interest, and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1965, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including April 1, 1970, at par and accrued interest, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof

if redeemed on October 1, 1970, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including April 1, 1975, and at par and accrued interest, if redeemed on October 1, 1975 or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and such notice of redemption shall with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of said bonds, and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date inetrest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

That such bonds and coupons shall be payable to bearer, provided however, that such bonds may be subject to registration as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder thereof on the books of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar of said bonds for the said The Teachers College Board, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said State Treasurer and thereafter the principal of such bonds shall be payable only to the registered holder, his legal representative or assign. Section 3. Both principal of and interest on such revenue bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois.

That said bonds shall be executed for and on behalf of the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois by the Chairman of the Teachers College Board and attested by the Secretary thereof under the seal of said Board, and shall be registered and countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officials, who by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons. This bond and the series of which it forms a part are all of like date, tenor and effect, except as to the date of maturity and provision for redemption, prior to maturity, authorized by The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, and issued to provide funds for the construction of two new Student Residence Halls and equipping the existing Student Residence Hall known as "Fell Hall," and are issued under and pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947.

This bond issue is payable solely, both as to principal and interest, from the revenues derived from the operation of the buildings acquired, improved, equipped and constructed with the proceeds of this bond issue, and the income and revenue derived from the operation of said buildings and facilities shall be paid over from time to time to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and be held by him as a special fund known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois."

This bond shall not be deemed to be an indebtedness of the State of Illinois or of the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, or of The Teachers College Board. However, The Teachers College Board covenants and agrees with each and every holder of said bonds that it will apply the proceeds thereof to the purposes for which said bonds are authorized to be issued; that it will continuously operate the said buildings and facilities acquired and improved with the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds at all times when the said University is in session; that it will adopt such rules and regulations for the use of such buildings and facilities and will fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of such facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said properties, and to pay the principal of and interest on this bond and the issue of which it forms a part as the same become due, all in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution pursuant to which this bond is issued and as adopted by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, on the 17th day of April, 1950.

If, in any month for any reason, there shall not be available an amount equal to the amount required for the payment of the expenses hereinabove referred to, then an amount of revenue equal to any such deficiency shall be added to the amount of revenue otherwise required to be paid into the said Operation and Maintenance Account in the next succeeding calendar month or months.

Funds credited to the said Interest and Sinking Fund Account above referred to shall be used solely and only for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same become due, or are called for redemption as in this resolution provided. Said Treasurer shall make no further remittances to the said bank after there shall have been so remitted a sufficient amount to pay all of the bonds then outstanding and all of the interest thereon to maturity, or to the date upon which such outstanding bonds may then have been called for redemption.

3. On or before the 10th day of April and the 10th day of October in each year, beginning April 10, 1952, after making the transfers provided for in paragraphs 1 and 2 hereinabove, the Treasurer shall transfer on his books from the balance in said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois to a separate and special account to be designated as the "Depreciation Account, Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" the sum of \$3,750 until there shall have been accumulated in said Depreciation Account the sum of \$50,000, at which figure the Depreciation Account shall thereafter be maintained by subsequent transfers from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, as hereinabove provided. Funds credited to the said Depreciation Account shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the cost of any extraordinary repairs, upkeep and replacements in or on the aforesaid buildings and facilities, except in order to prevent a default on the bonds herein authorized, funds held in the said Depreciation Account shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, and if such a transfer is made, it shall be replaced out of the next available funds.

4. On or before the 10th day of April and the 10th day of October in each year, beginning April 10, 1952, after making the transfers provided for in paragraphs 1, 2, and 3 above, including any deficits which may theretofore have been incurred in the aforesaid special accounts the said Treasurer shall transfer on his books to a separate and special account designated as the "Bond Reserve Account, Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" the sum of \$6,250 until such time as there has been accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account the sum of \$55,000, at which figure the said Bond Reserve Account shall thereafter be maintained and which shall be used by said Treasurer from time to time in the payment of interest or principal of the said revenue bonds hereby authorized, whenever there exists a deficiency in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account. Funds accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account may be invested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois in bonds of the United States or fully guaranteed by the United States.

5. Any funds remaining after all the above transfers shall have been made shall be used to pay principal and interest on any bonds issued the pledge of which is subordinate to the bonds authorized by this resolution or to call and redeem bonds prior to maturity.

Section 7. That The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, acting under and by authority of the aforesaid Act, hereby expressly covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein directed to be issued as follows:

1. That as long as the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall remain outstanding and unpaid, it will continuously operate and maintain the said buildings constructed and improved with the proceeds derived from the issue of said bonds and the facilities connected therewith at all times when the said University is in session to their full

physical capacity before using any other facilities for student residence purposes, that it will adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of said buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said facilities; to provide and maintain the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds as the same matures; to provide for the aforesaid Depreciation Account, and the aforesaid Bond Reserve Account; and that it will collect, account for and apply the aforesaid revenues in accordance with and as provided for in this resolution.

2. That it will not voluntarily create or cause to be created any debt, lien, charge or encumbrance having priority to or parity with the pledge of the bonds issued under this resolution upon any of the revenues, and that it will not sell, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of or encumber said buildings and facilities, or any part thereof, during the time when the bonds issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid.

3. That as long as any of the bonds issued hereunder remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest or both, it will at all times exercise all of its lawful powers to preserve and protect the security of the bonds and the rights of the bondholders under this resolution.

4. That as long as any of said bonds authorized to be issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, shall maintain insurance on said buildings and facilities and all parts thereof, including all furniture and equipment therein against loss or damage by fire or windstorm in an amount not less than the full insurable value of said properties or the amount of outstanding bonds, whichever is less. Such insurance policy or policies shall be payable to The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, and all monies collected on account of loss or damage covered by any such policy or policies of insurance shall be held in trust and shall be used only for reconstruction, replacements or repairs. In the event said funds are insufficient to restore said facilities to their former condition then said funds shall be paid into the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, and held for the benefit of the bondholders as their interests may appear. The said The Teachers College Board shall also carry adequate insurance against the loss of use and occupancy of said buildings and facilities from any or all risks or from any cause whatsoever in an amount not less than the highest amount due for principal of and interest on all the outstanding bonds payable from the revenues thereof in any year covered by the term of such policies. Any sum received from any such

use and occupancy insurance, after deducting necessary operation and maintenance charges under economical management during the period of such loss of use and occupancy, shall be paid into the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account. All of the said insurance shall be carried in a responsible insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Illinois, and the cost thereof shall be deemed to be a maintenance and operation cost.

5. That The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, shall cause to be kept proper books of records and accounts separate and apart from all other records and accounts in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the cost of constructing, equipping and furnishing the aforesaid buildings and facilities, the expenditures for maintaining, operating and repairing the said buildings and facilities, and all revenues collected therefrom, which said records shall be kept and shall be available for the information of all persons interested; and that there shall be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than thirty days after the close of each calendar month, complete operating and income statements of said buildings and facilities connected therewith, in reasonable detail, covering such monthly period; and that there shall also be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, a complete financial statement of the undertaking, in reasonable detail, covering such fiscal year, signed by the Secretary and certified by independent auditors, who shall be certified public accountants.

6. That at all times while any of the said bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board shall employ or make provision for the employment of some suitable person or persons to supervise the operation and maintenance of said buildings and facilities connected therewith, and such other persons as may be necessary for the proper and efficient operation, management and maintenance of said properties. The cost of such services shall be included as other costs of operating and maintaining said properties and shall be payable in like manner.

7. That while any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board will not issue any additional bonds or incur any other indebtedness, payable from the revenues of said buildings and facilities, unless the pledge of such additional bonds on the said revenues shall be made junior and subordinate in all respects to the pledge of the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder, including the Bond Reserve Account, as provided by subsection 4 of Section 6 of the resolution.

8. That The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, will faithfully and punctually perform or cause to be performed all of the duties and obligations with reference to the said buildings and facilities as are required by the provisions of this resolution and the statutes under which the said bonds are issued, including the construction, equipment and furnishing of the aforesaid buildings and facilities and the operation and maintenance of said buildings and facilities, as herein provided, the making and collecting of reasonable and sufficient fees and charges for the use thereof, the segregation of the income and revenues therefrom to the respective funds created under the provisions of this resolution, and the proper application of said funds.

Section 8. Any holder of any bond or bonds issued hereunder, or of any coupons representing interest accrued thereon, may either by proper court action or in law or in equity compel The Teachers College Board to perform all duties imposed upon it under the provisions of this resolution and under the provisions of the statute hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of the bonds as herein provided, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates and charges for the use of such buildings and facilities connected therewith, and also to enforce the performance of any and all covenants made by the said The Teachers College Board in and by this resolution.

Section 9. That the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the income and revenue derived from the collection of fees and charges for the use of the aforesaid buildings and facilities connected therewith, or with respect to the pledge of the revenue to be derived from the operation of said buildings or facilities.

Section 10. That the proceeds derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds hereby provided for shall be applied as follows:

1. The entire proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to a purchaser shall be deposited immediately with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois pursuant to the terms of the Act hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of said bonds.

2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the State of Illinois to set aside the amount of accrued interest received upon the sale and delivery of said bonds to a purchaser in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, hereinabove provided for, together with the sum of \$45,638 from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, being the amount estimated necessary to pay interest on said bonds during construction, and the remainder of the proceeds of said bonds shall be set aside in a separate special account by said Treasurer to be designated "Student Residence Halls Construction Account of 1950 for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois," and shall be applied to the cost of acquiring, constructing,

equipping and furnishing the said buildings to be constructed and equipped through the issuance of the bonds hereby authorized, all as hereinbefore provided; provided, however, that any surplus remaining in such account upon completion of the construction, equipment, furnishing and improving of said buildings and facilities shall be transferred and credited to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, as hereinabove provided for.

Section 11. That the provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between The Teachers College Board for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and each of them, and the said The Teachers College Board hereby pledges its good faith to the performance of each and every covenant hereof.

Section 12. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this resolution or of the bonds or interest coupons herein prescribed shall either be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision shall not have been contained therein.

Section 13. That the Chairman and Secretary of The Teachers College Board and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois shall be and they are hereby fully authorized and directed to do all things which may be necessary to effect the preparation, execution and delivery of the bonds herein authorized to be issued when sold to a purchaser in manner and form as provided by law.

Section 14. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, has heretofore by resolution duly adopted on April 17, 1950, provided for the construction of two additional new Student Residence Halls and the equipping of the existing Student Residence Hall known as "Fell Hall" and the issuance of \$1,150,000 Revenue Bonds to defray the cost of such construction and improvements pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Act above referred to and said resolution heretofore passed authorizing such construction and improvements and the issuance of said bonds it is necessary that The Teachers College Board establish charges for the use of such buildings;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be and there are hereby established charges for the use of and for the service supplied by the two additional new Student Residence Halls to be constructed and the existing Student Residence Hall known as "Fell Hall" of the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, as follows:

For room and board during the regular and summer terms the charge shall be \$15.00 per person per week.

For a room only during the winter and spring vacations the charge shall be \$2.00 per person per week.

All revenues and monies derived from the operation of the two additional new Student Residence Halls to be constructed and the existing Student Residence Hall known as "Fell Hall" shall be held by the Business Manager separately and apart from all other funds of the University and all of said sums without any deductions whatsoever shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois not more than three days after receipt of the same.

Before the Business Manager shall enter upon his duties with respect to the collection of charges and before he shall receive any funds derived from the operation of the two additional new Student Residence Halls to be constructed and the existing Student Residence Hall known as "Fell Hall", he shall be required to post a corporate surety bond in an amount equal to the amount likely to come into his hands at any time, which bond shall be approved by The Teachers College Board, and filed with the Secretary of said Board, and shall be conditioned upon his faithful performance of his duties as required under this resolution and his accounting for all monies coming into his hands.

## Western Illinois State College

Western Illinois State College located at Macomb, Illinois, was founded in 1899, and is a State-supported institution which derives almost all of its revenues from appropriations by the State Legislature. It is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the American Association of Teachers Colleges. The enrollment for the Fall quarter of 1949 was 1,544. The College has a faculty and administrative staff of 133 and 62 nonacademic employees.

The campus consists of 320 acres including the College farm and golf course. Buildings and equipment were valued at \$4,176,291 as of

6/30/49, and \$1,123,636 of unexpended appropriations are available for additional buildings. In addition to the construction of the stadium, the College has under construction a \$650,000 addition to the women's dormitory, a \$970,000 addition to the training school gymnasium, a \$500,000 enlargement of the College's power plant, a \$400,000 classroom addition to Morgan Gymnasium, and a \$90,000 improvement to campus sites.

No tuition is charged students attending the College, but there is a Registration and Incidental Fee of \$15 per quarter for residents of Illinois, and \$25 per quarter for non-residents. A Student Activity Fee of \$10 per quarter is charged all students except Teachers College Scholarship and Military Scholarship students whose fees are paid by the State. The College has a teacher training school with an enrollment of 379, which provides practice teaching from kindergarten through high school. The College is a member of the Illinois Inter-Collegiate Athletic Conference, which is comprised of the four State Teachers Colleges and Southern Illinois University.

### Purpose

These \$130,000 bonds are being issued for the purpose of completing the College's stadium by the construction of a reinforced concrete structure with a 5,000 seating capacity, and furnishing essential equipment therefor. The existing bleachers and development of the playing field and cinder track were done through an appropriation of \$275,000 by the State Legislature. Plans and specifications were prepared by the office of C. Herrick Hammond, Architect for the State of Illinois. The construction contract has been received and completion bond will be posted.

# Legal Authority and Security

These bonds will constitute a first lien upon the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the stadium and will be issued by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build,

purchase, or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenueproducing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947, by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to a resolution to be adopted by The Teachers College Board.

The Teachers College Board will covenant to continuously operate said stadium at all times when the College is in session; to adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates, fees and charges for the use of said stadium as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said stadium; to provide an Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay principal of and interest on said bonds as the same mature; to provide and maintain a Depreciation Account of \$10,000; and to provide and maintain a Bond Revenue Account of \$7,500; and that it will collect, account for and apply the revenues in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution authorizing this issue of bonds.

# Present Stadium Facilities

The College has just completed the construction of a new athletic field which is situated in a natural draw at the north end of the campus. The football field runs north and south and is surrounded by an oval, concrete-curbed running track made of black loam and cinders. Both the east and west sides of the field have natural sod banks running up at a 45 degree angle some 60 or 75 feet. This angle is just right for the construction of bleachers or stadia. The College has constructed permanent bleachers on the east side of the field to accommodate 1,500 spectators.

### Proposed Additional Facilities

Through the proceeds of this issue, the College will complete its stadium by the construction of a reinforced steel and concrete structure with 5,000 seating capacity, and furnish essential equipment therefor.

# Fees and Charges for Use of Stadium

Each student pays a Student Activity Fee of \$10 per quarter, \$2 of which will be allocated to the Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College, from which these bonds are payable and will entitle each student to attend the athletic events held in the stadium to be completed from the proceeds of this bond issue. Admission to football games will be \$1.00 plus tax for adults, and 50c plus tax for high school students. There will be additional income from Western High School football games and rentals for other events.

# Revenues from \$2 of the Student Activity Fee

These bonds are payable from the revenues of the stadium, the principal source of which is \$2 per quarter of the \$10 Student Activity Fee. This fee has been in effect since the 1948 Fall term, and the College has collected \$17,770 for improvements to the athletic field, \$16,000 of which is being used in this construction program. Based on this student fee alone, the revenue available for those bonds, assuming an enrollment of 1,300 regular students and 750 summer students, compared to an average regular enrollment of 1,537 and 877 summer enrollment for the past 3 years, will be \$9,300 per year as shown below:

### Other Revenues

A limiting factor for attendance at the College's football games has been the small seating capacity of the old athletic field. With the completion of this stadium seating 6,500 people and the installation of lights for the night games, the estimated gross receipts for the 1950 football

schedule are shown below. This does not include any receipts from Western High School, or other miscellaneous events.

The above gross receipts cannot be considered an average year, as Western Illinois State College won the Illinois Inter-collegiate Athletic Conference Championship in 1949, and prospects for 1950 are very good. In addition, the dedication of the new stadium and lighting system will result in greater attendance than usually can be expected. Below is shown income of the athletic field for the past 3 years. This includes contributions from the Student Activity Fund, but does not include the \$2 per student fee which has been set aside for improvements and will be used to pay debt service on these bonds.

It was determined that the joint bid of Barcus, Kindred and Co., and J. T. Swartz and Co., Inc., as stated above, was the lowest and best bid received.

Mr. Dunn moved that the bonds be awarded to Barcus, Kindred and Co., and J. T. Swartz and Co., Inc., in accordance with their proposal and that the Secretary be instructed to hold their certified check uncashed until the time of delivery of the bonds. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

RESOLUTION authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$130,000 of The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, for the purpose of providing funds necessary to complete the construction of a stadium, fixing the date of maturities, form and other details of said bonds, and making covenants and provisions for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon.

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, upon due consideration and investigation does now find and determine that the stadium in and for said Western Illinois State College upon the property now owned by said College be completed by the construction of a reinforced concrete structure of adequate seating capacity for

the needs of the College, with all necessary equipment therefor, it being found that a necessity therefor exists for the good and benefit of the College; and

WHEREAS, this The Teachers College Board has heretofore caused plans and specifications for the completion of said stadium as hereinabove described, and has heretofore adopted plans and specifications therefor which now remain on file in the office of the Secretary of The Teachers College Board; and

WHEREAS, this Board does now further find and determine that the cost of construction in accordance with contract heretofore let, will be as follows:

WHEREAS, under the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, includ-ing sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947, the General As-sembly of the State of Illinois has authorized this The Teachers College Board to issue revenue bonds for and on behalf of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, for the purpose of paying the cost of the completion of a stadium, and to pledge the revenues derived from the use of said stadium;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That the stadium in and for said Western Illinois State College upon property now owned by said College, be completed by the construction of a reinforced concrete structure of adequate seating capacity for the needs of the College, with all necessary equipment therefor, all in accordance with plans and specifications therefor heretofore approved by this The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for said Western Illinois State College and now on file in the office of the Secretary of this Board, and that the stadium completed with such structure and equipment hereinafter shall be referred to as the "stadium."

Section 2. That for the purpose of providing funds in the amount of \$130,000 to pay the cost of completion of the stadium as hereinabove provided, there shall be and there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued revenue bonds of said The Teachers College Board for said College in the principal amount of \$130,000. The said revenue bonds shall bear date of April 1, 1950, shall be numbered 1 through 130, shall be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, bonds numbered 1 to 69, inclusive, shall bear interest at the rate of two and three-fourths per cent (23/4%) per annum, and bonds numbered 70 to 130, inclusive, shall bear interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum, payable October 1, 1950, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October of each year and until the principal thereof shall have been fully paid, and said bonds shall mature on April 1 of each of the years and in amounts as follows:

provided, however, that bonds numbered 98 through 130, shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date at the option of The Teachers College Board for said Western Illinois State College on or after April 1, 1955, and up to and including October 1, 1959, at par and accrued interest, and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, at par and accrued interest, and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1960, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1964, at par and accrued interest, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1965, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1969, and at par and accrued interest, if redeemed on April 1, 1970 or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity; and upon the redemption and payment of said numbered bonds in their entirety, bonds numbered 46 through 97 shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 1, 1965, and up to and including October 1,

1969, at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof and at par and accrued interest if redeemed on April 1, 1970 or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and such notice of redemption shall with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of said bonds, and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

That such bonds and coupons shall be payable to bearer, provided, however, that such bonds may be subject to registration as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder thereof on the books of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar of said bonds for the said The Teachers College Board, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said State Treasurer and thereafter the principal of such bonds shall be payable only to the registered holder, his legal representative or assign. Such registered bonds shall be transferred to another registered holder or back to bearer only upon presentation to the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or approved. Registration of any such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely.

Section 3. Both principal of and interest on such revenue bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois.

Section 4. That said bonds shall be executed for and on behalf of Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois by the Chairman of The Teachers College Board and attested by the Secretary thereof under the seal of said Board, and shall be registered and countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officials, who by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons. That said revenue bonds shall be designated "Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, and shall be in substantially the following form :

The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, created and established under the laws of the State of Illinois, hereby acknowledges itself to owe and for value received promises to pay to bearer, but only out of The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, as hereinafter provided for, and not otherwise, the sum of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000) on April 1, 19...., and to pay interest on said sum from the date hereof at the rate of ...... per cent (....%) per annum, payable October 1, 1950, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year until the principal hereof shall be paid. Interest accruing on this bond on and prior to the maturity date hereof shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they subsequently become due, but no interest shall accrue on this bond after the maturity hereof unless this bond be presented for payment at maturity and be not then paid.

Both principal hereof and interest hereon are hereby made payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$130,000, all of like date and of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 through 130, and bonds numbered 98 through 130 are subject to redemption as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 1, 1955, and up to and including October 1, 1959 at par and accrued interest, and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1960, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1964, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1965, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and includ-

ing October 1, 1969, and at par and accrued interest if redeemed on April 1, 1970, or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity; and upon the redemption and payment of said numbered bonds in their entirety, bonds numbered 46 through 97 are subject to redemption as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 1, 1965, and up to and including October 1, 1969, at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof and at par and accrued interest if redeemed on April 1, 1970 or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond and the series of which it forms a part are all of like date, tenor and effect, except as to the date of maturity and provision for redemption prior to maturity, authorized by The Teachers College of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, and issued to provide funds for the completion of the stadium in and for said Western Illinois State College upon the property now owned by said College by the construction of a reinforced concrete structure of adequate seating capacity for the needs of the College, with all necessary equipment therefor, and are issued under and pursuant to the provisions of "An act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947.

This bond is payable solely, both as to principal and interest from the revenues derived from the operation of the stadium completed with the proceeds of this bond issue, and the income and revenue derived from the operation of said stadium shall be paid over from time to time to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and be held by him as a special fund known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois."

This bond shall not be deemed to be an indebtedness of the State of Illinois or of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, or of The Teachers College Board. However, The Teachers College Board covenants and agrees with each and every holder of said bonds that it will apply the proceeds thereof to the purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued; that it will continuously operate the said stadium completed with the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds at all times when the said College is in session; that it will adopt such rules and regulations for the use of such stadium and will fix, maintain and collect such rates, fees and charges from all persons using or having the right to use such stadium and the services and facilities rendered and afforded thereby, including all students, members of the faculty, and general public as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said stadium, and to pay the principal of and interest on this bond and the issue of which it forms a part as the same become due, all in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution pursuant to which this bond is issued and as adopted by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, on the 17th day of April, 1950.

This bond may be registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of The Teachers College Board in the office of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar for said Board, such registration to be evidenced by notation of said Treasurer on the back hereof, after which no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on said books and similarly noted hereon, but it may be discharged from such registration by being transferred to bearer, after which it shall be transferred by delivery, but it may be again registered as before. The registration of this bond shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons by delivery merely.

This bond is subject to the conditions, and every subsequent holder hereof by accepting the same agrees with the obligor and every subsequent holder hereof, that (a) the delivery of this bond to any transferee if not registered, or if it be registered, if the last registered transfer be to bearer, shall vest title to this bond and the interest represented thereby in such transferee to the same extent for all purposes as would the delivery under like circumstances of any negotiable instrument payable to bearer; (b) the obligor and any agent of the obligor may treat the bearer of this bond, or if it be registered in the name of a holder, the registered holder of this bond, as the absolute owner hereof for all purposes and shall not be affected by any notice to

the contrary; (c) the principal of and the interest on this bond will be paid, and this bond and each of the coupons appertaining thereto are transferable, free from and without regard to any equities between the obligor and the original or any intermediate holder or to any setoffs or counterclaims; and (d) the surrender to the obligor or any agent of the obligor of each of the coupons or of this bond if not registered, or if it be registered, if the last registered transfer be to bearer, or the receipt of the registered holder for the principal hereof if this bond be registered in the name of a holder, shall be a good discharge to the obligor for the same.

Section 5. That from and after the issuance of the bonds herein provided for, the stadium to be completed with the proceeds derived from the sale of these bonds shall be operated on a fiscal year basis beginning on the first day of July and ending on the 30th day of June in each succeeding year, and from and after the issuance of said revenue bonds the gross income and revenue derived from fees and charges collected for the use of said stadium of every kind and character shall within three days after receipt thereof be paid to the Treasurer of the

State of Illinois and shall be set aside by him in a special fund to be known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois," and said fund shall be used only for the following purposes:

- 1. To pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining such stadium:
- 2. To provide and maintain an interest and sinking fund in an amount adequate promptly to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein directed to be issued;
  - 3. To provide a reasonable fund for depreciation, all as hereinafter more particularly set forth; and
  - 4. To provide a reasonable reserve fund.

Section 6. The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, hereby covenants and agrees that while any of said bonds are outstanding it will establish charges or fees for the use of said stadium sufficient at all times to pay maintenance and operation costs, principal of and interest on the bonds hereby authorized, and to maintain a reasonable reserve fund and a reasonable fund for depreciation, all as hereinafter provided for, and that fees and charges and other revenue received from the operation of said stadium shall be collected by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois through agents or employees thereunto duly authorized, and all such revenues shall be deposited with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois when and as received as hereinabove provided, and shall be credited to the special fund as hereinabove provided, and such Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to pay out and disburse said funds so deposited to the credit of said special fund in the following manner:

1. On the first day of each calendar month the said Treasurer shall transfer on his books from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, to a separate and special account designated as "Operation and Maintenance Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" such a sum of money as may be directed to be transferred by order of The Teachers College Board sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining the aforesaid stadium for such calendar month, which expense shall include costs necessary to develop the maximum use of the services and facilities rendered and afforded by the stadium, and any fees due The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, as paying agent on the bonds herein authorized, and the funds so transferred shall be used for such purposes. If, in any month for any reason, there shall not be available an amount equal to the amount required for the payment of the expenses hereinabove referred to, then an amount of

revenue equal to any such deficiency shall be added to the amount of revenue otherwise required to be paid into the said Operation and Maintenance Account in the next succeeding calendar month or months.

2. On the first day of each month, after making the transfer provided for in paragraph 1 first above, the Treasurer shall transfer on his books from the balance in the said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, to a special account designated "Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950", 1/6th of the interest then next due and 1/12th of the principal then next due on the bonds herein directed to be issued, and the said Treasurer shall be and is hereby authorized and directed without any further subsequent order of The Teachers College Board to remit on or before the 15th day prior to the first day of April and the first day of October, to The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, State of Illinois, the place of payment designated in said bonds and the interest coupons appertaining thereto, the amount due on said respective dates. Funds credited to the said Interest and Sinking Fund Account above referred to shall be used solely and only for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same become due, or are called for redemption as in this resolution provided. Said Treasurer shall make no further remittances to the said bank after there shall have been so remitted a sufficient amount to pay all of the bonds then outstanding and all of the interest thereon to maturity, or to the date upon which such outstanding bonds may then have been called for redemption.

3. On or before the 10th day of April and the 10th day of October in each year, after making the transfers provided for in paragraphs 1 and 2 hereinabove, the Treasurer shall transfer on his books from the balance in said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois to a separate and special account to be designated as the "Depreciation Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" the sum of \$1,000 until there shall have been accumulated in said Depreciation Account the sum of \$10,000, at which figure the Depreciation Account shall thereafter be maintained by subsequent transfers from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, as hereinabove provided. Funds credited to the said Depreciation Account shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the cost of any extraordinary repairs, upkeep and replacements in or on the aforesaid stadium, except in order to prevent a default on the bonds herein authorized, funds held in the said Depreciation Account shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, and if such a transfer is made, it shall be replaced out of the next available funds.

4. On or before the 10th day of April and the 10th day of October in each year, after making the transfers provided for in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above, including any deficits which may theretofore have been incurred in the aforesaid special accounts the said Treasurer shall transfer on his books to a separate and special account designated as the "Bond Reserve Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" the sum of \$1,500. Moneys in said Bond Reserve Account shall be retained and used only for the payment of principal of or interest on bonds herein authorized becoming due at any time when there would be a default if moneys were not so used, except that to the extent that there shall at any time be in said Account a sum in excess of \$7,500, all surplus over \$7,500 shall be used on the next interest payment date to call for redemption and retire as many of the bonds as can be retired with the surplus so available. Any payments made from said Account to prevent default shall be promptly reimbursed to said Account from the first revenues of the system thereafter received and available therefor as provided herein. Funds accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account may be invested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois in bonds of the United States or fully guaranteed by the United States.

5. Any funds remaining after all the above transfers shall have been made shall be used to call and redeem bonds prior to maturity or for any proper purpose authorized by law.

Section 7. That The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, acting under and by authority of the aforesaid Act, hereby expressly covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein directed to be issued as follows:

1. That as long as the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall remain outstanding and unpaid, it will continuously operate and maintain said stadium completed with the proceeds derived from the issue of said bonds at all times when the said College is in session; that it will adopt such regulations and fix, maintain and collect such rates, fees and charges from all persons using or having the right to use such stadium and the services and facilities rendered and afforded thereby, including all students, members of the faculty, and general public as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said stadium; to provide and maintain the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, in an amount adequate promptly to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds as the same matures; to provide for the aforesaid Depreciation Account, and the aforesaid Bond Reserve Account; and that it will collect, account for and apply for the aforesaid revenues in accordance with and as provided for in this resolution.

2. That it will not voluntarily create or cause to be created any debt, lien, charge or encumbrance having priority to or parity with the

pledge of the bonds issued under this resolution upon any of the revenues, and that it will not sell, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of or encumber said stadium, or any part thereof, during the time when the bonds issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid.

3. That as long as any of the bonds issued hereunder remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest or both, it will at all times exercise all of its lawful powers to preserve and protect the security of the bonds and the rights of the bondholders under this resolution.

4. That The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, shall cause to be kept proper books of records and accounts separate and apart from all other records and accounts in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the cost of constructing the aforesaid stadium, the expenditures for maintaining, operating and repairing the said stadium, and all revenues collected therefrom, which said record shall be kept and shall be available for the information of all persons interested; and that there shall be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than thirty days after the close of each calendar month, complete operating and income statements of said stadium, in reasonable detail, covering such monthly period, and that there shall also be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, a complete financial statement of the undertaking, in reasonable detail, covering such fiscal year, signed by the Secretary and certified by independent auditors, who shall be certified public accountants.

5. That at all times while any of the said bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board shall employ or make provision for the employment of some suitable person or persons to supervise the operation and maintenance of said stadium, and such other persons as may be necessary for the proper and efficient operation, management and maintenance of said stadium. The cost of such services shall be included as other costs of operating and maintaining said properties and shall be payable in like manner.

6. That The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, will faithfully and punctually perform or cause to be performed all of the duties and obligations with reference to the said stadium as are required by the provisions of this resolution and the statutes under which the said bonds are issued, including the completion of the aforesaid stadium and the operation and maintenance of said stadium, as herein provided, the making and collecting of sufficient rates, fees and charges for the use thereof, the segregation of the income and revenues therefrom to the respective accounts created under the provisions of this resolution, and the proper application of said funds.

That as long as any of said bonds authorized to be issued here-7. under shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, The Teachers College Board for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, shall maintain insurance on any insurable part of said stadium, including all equipment thereof, against loss or damage by fire or windstorm in an amount not less than the full insurable value of said properties or the amount of outstanding bonds, whichever is less. Such insurance policy or policies shall be payable to The Teachers College Board for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, and all moneys collected on account of loss or damage covered by any such policy or policies of insurance shall be held in trust and shall be used only for reconstruction, replacement or repairs. In the event said funds are insufficient to restore said facilities to their former condition then said funds shall be paid into the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, and held for the benefit of the bondholders as their interests may appear.

Section 8. Any holder of any bond or bonds issued hereunder, or of any coupons representing interest accrued thereon, may either by proper court action or in law or in equity compel The Teachers College Board to perform all duties imposed upon it under the provisions of this resolution and under the provisions of the statutes hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of the bonds as herein provided, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates, fees and charges for the use of such stadium, and also to enforce the performance of any and all covenants made by the said The Teachers College Board in and by this resolution.

Section 9. That the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the income and revenues derived from the collection of rates, fees and charges for the use of the aforesaid stadium, or with respect to the pledge of the revenue to be derived from the operation of said stadium.

Section 10. That the proceeds derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds hereby provided for shall be applied as follows:

1. The entire proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to a purchaser shall be deposited immediately with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois pursuant to the terms of the Act hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of said bonds.

2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the State of Illinois to set aside the amount of accrued interest received upon the sale and delivery of said bonds to a purchaser in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, hereinabove provided for, together with the sum of \$3,728 from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, being the amount estimated necessary to pay interest on said bonds during construction, and the remainder of the proceeds of said bonds shall be set

aside in a separate special account by said Treasurer to be designated "Stadium Construction Account of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois," and shall be applied to the cost of constructing the said stadium to be constructed through the issuance of the bonds hereby authorized, all as hereinbefore provided; provided, however, that any surplus remaining in such account upon completion of the construction of said stadium shall be transferred and credited to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Western Illinois State College Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, as hereinabove provided for.

Section 11. That the provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and each of them and the said The Teachers College Board hereby pledges its good fa'th to the performance of each and every covenant hereof.

Section 12. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clauge or phrase of this resolution or of the bonds or interest coupons herein prescribed shall either be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision shall not have been contained therein.

Section 13. That the Chairman and Secretary of The Teachers College Board and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois shall be and they are hereby fully authorized and directed to do all things which may be necessary to effect the preparation, execution and delivery of the bonds herein authorized to be issued when sold to a purchaser in manner and form as provided by law.

Section 14. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

**RESOLUTION** establishing fees and charges for the use of the stadium of Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois.

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, has heretofore by resolution duly adopted on the 17th day of April, 1950, provided for the completion of the stadium in and for said College by the construction of a reinforced concrete structure of adequate seating capacity for the needs of the College, with all necessary equipment therefor, and the issuance of \$130,000 Revenue Bonds to defray the cost thereof pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Act above referred to and said resolution heretofore passed authorizing such completion and the issuance of said bonds it is necessary that The Teachers College Board establish fees and charges for the use of such stadium;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be and there are hereby established fees and charges for the use of the stadium of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, effective July 1, 1950, being the beginning of the fiscal year thereof, as follows:

For each student of the Western Illinois State College the charge shall be \$2.00 per quarter.

For admission to football games, charges to persons other than students of the Western Illinois State College shall be as follows:

Adults\$1.00 per gameHigh School and Grade School Students.50 per game
For rental of the stadium, the charges shall be as follows:
Day

Section 2. Said charges, admissions and rentals shall be payable in advance.

Section 3. It is hereby made a duty of the Business Manager of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, to collect all monies due under the provisions hereof.

Section 4. All revenues and monies derived from the operation of the stadium shall be held by the Business Manager separately and apart from all other funds of the College and all of said sums without any deductions whatsoever shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois not more than three days after receipt of the same.

Section 5. Before the Business Manager shall enter upon his duties with respect to the collection of fees or charges and before he shall receive any funds derived from the operation of the stadium, he shall be required to post a corporate surety bond in an amuont equal to the amount likely to come into his hands at any time, which bond shall be approved by The Teachers College Board, and filed with the Secretary of said Board, and shall be conditioned upon his faithful performance of his duties as required under this resolution and his accounting for all monies coming into his hands.

BE IT RESOLVED by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, that the Treasurer of the State of Illinois be authorized and directed to execute a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$15,000 to protect the "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois" provided for in the resolution authorizing the issue of \$130,000 Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, adopted by this Board on April 17, 1950, payment for the premiums of said surety bond to be payable from the "Operation and Maintenance Account, Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, Stadium Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" of said Fund.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Means moved that we approve the form of the completion bond as submitted by the Division of Architecture and Engineering, and in the event that Chapman and Cutler require changes, that the Chairman and Secretary be authorized to make such changes and sign the bond. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

Mr. Booton further advised that it was necessary for the State to carry insurance on buildings under construction, and that it was the Board's prerogative to name the insurance company they wished to have this business.

After a general discussion, Mr. Bohrer moved that the Teachers College Board authorize the State Architect's office to approve the insurance companies on contracts in connection with all self-liquidating projects. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Nickell moved that a committee, consisting of Mr. Bohrer and Mr. Dunn, be appointed to analyze and determine the amount of insurance to be carried on Fell Hall for the addition to Fell Hall, and to secure insurance in accordance with the bond resolution. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

Mr. Nickell moved that the Teachers College Board extend its thanks to the State Architect and his staff for their kindness and cooperation in making available the plans and specifications and the services of their office in connection with the Stadium to be constructed at Western Illinois State College, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the State Architect. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

# RESIDENCE HALL AT NORTHERN

Mr. Dunn, Chairman of the Building Committee—Self-Liquidating Projects, advised that the committee had carefully examined the final plans for the men's residence hall at Northern Illinois State Teachers College as submitted by the Associate Architects and found them to be in proper form as keeping with the general plan, and recommended the approval of the plans as submitted. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the State Architect be authorized to prepare plans and specifications, to advertise for and receive bids, to open the bids on behalf of the Teachers College Board, codify them, and bring the bids together with recommendations to the Teachers College Board meeting on May 19, 1950, at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the Teachers College Board authorize the Secretary of this Board to advertise the sale of Revenue Bonds totaling \$1,300,000.00 in connection with the proposed construction of a men's Residence Hall at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois, that bids on these bonds be reported to the Board at their next meeting on May 19, 1950, at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois, and that the bonds be sold to the best bidder at not less than par value and accrued interest, with the right reserved in the Board to reject any and all bids. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

# RESIDENCE HALLS AT EASTERN

The matter of constructing residence halls at Eastern Illinois State College on the self-liquidating plan rather than using the money they have appropriated was the next matter discussed.

After a general discussion, Mrs. Pegelow moved that the Teachers College Board authorize the Associate Architects Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson to proceed, using the same general plan which they had already prepared for the Residence Halls at Illinois State Normal University, with minor changes to fit the topography of Eastern Illinois State College, and that the Board request Barcus, Kindred and Co., and J. T. Swartz and Co., Inc., to make a survey to perhaps assist in the financing through self-liquidating bonds before the Board decides on the method of payment. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

# INFORMAL REPORTS OF PRESIDENTS

Dr. Buzzard reported informally on Eastern Illinois State College and advised that the dedication of the Library Building would be on Saturday, May 27, 1950.

Dr. Buzzard further advised that the matter of salaries had been referred to the joint faculty group, and their report is herewith submitted merely for the Board's information.

Dr. Larsen reported informally on Illinois State Normal University and advised that he had had his first faculty meeting since being appointed Acting President, and was very pleased with the fine cooperation and the willingness on the part of all faculty members to help in any way possible.

Dr. Beu advised there was no report on Western Illinois State College.

Dr. Holmes reported informally on Northern Illinois State Teachers College, and advised that the Foundation had been put into operation some time ago. He also showed a picture of a D.P. exchange student who was now on the campus at Northern.

There being no further business before the Board Mrs. Pegelow moved that the meeting be adjourned until the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board to be held at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois, on May 19, 1950.

The regularly s heduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents convened in the Science Building of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois at 9:15 A. M. (C.D.T.) on Friday, May 19, 1950. Noble J. Puffer, Director of the Department of Registration and Education and Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of April 17, 1950.

Mr. Nickell moved that the minutes of the meeting of the Teachers College Board of April 17, 1950, be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Chairman Puffer read a letter that he had received from Dean Morey of the University of Illinois regarding self-liquidating residence halls, and giving his ideas on the matter. The letter was read merely for the Board's information, and no official action was taken.

# BUSINESS MANAGER AT ILLINOIS STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY

The matter of naming a new Business Manager for Illinois State Normal University was the next matter discussed.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Wirtz moved that Mr. Preston Ensign, Business Manager of Illinois State Normal University, continue to be employed after June 30, 1950, on a month to month basis only, and that his employment shall terminate and his salary shall cease on the last day of the month next succeeding the month in which he is given notice by the President of the University or by the Chairman of this Board of the time when his employment shall terminate and his salary shall cease. The Chairman of this Board shall give such notice only upon the authorization of the Teachers College Board. The mot on was seconded by Mr. Nickell, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

In connection with this matter of naming a Business Manager for Illinois State Normal University, Dr. Fairchild had, sometime ago, prepared a list of qualifications he thought desirable for the position of Business Manager, a copy of which was sent each Board member. The list was not discussed thoroughly, but Mr. Nickell did move that the Presidents be instructed to present to the Board, at its next regular meeting, for consideration a suggested list of qualifications for Business Manager at any of the four State Teachers Colleges under the jurisdiction of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

In the course of discussion, the matter of Dr. Fairchild's state of health was brought up and mention was made of the fact that Dr. Fairchild planned returning to work about the fifteenth of July, which the Board unanimously considered was too soon. In view of this information, Mr. Nickell moved that in consideration of Dr. Fairchild's own physical welfare, that before he returns to duty he supply the Board with a full and complete doctor's statement regarding his physical condition. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

# VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE SITUATION AT I. S. N. U.

Secretary Nickell reported at the April 17 meeting that the Committee appointed by him, at the request of the Illinois State Board of Vocational Education, found that Illinois State Normal University met the required standards for training teachers of Vocational Agriculture and that matter has been referred to the Board of Vocational Education for action.

Secretary Nickell now reports that the Board of Vocational Education approved Illinois State Normal University for the training of teachers of Vocational Agriculture and that now the matter is in the hands of the officials at Washington for final approval.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Bohrer moved that the Chairman and Secretary be authorized, on behalf of the Teachers College Board, to write a letter to Dr. McGrath, with a copy to Dr. Gregory, and to also communicate with Senator Lucas and Senator Douglas urging the approval of Illinois State Normal University for the training of teachers of Vocational Agriculture, as recommended by the Board of Vocational Education. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

# **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POLICIES**

A preliminary report of the Committee on Policies had been prepared and copies sent to all interested parties.

Dr. Reavis, Chairman of the Committee on Policies, advised they had received 300 replies to the 500 questionnaires sent, and most of these were signed.

No formal Board action was taken on this report inasmuch as there are a number of changes to be made. However, Dr. Reavis advised that the Committee would present their report again at the June 26 meeting for action by the Board.

Mr. Bohrer expressed his appreciation, as did each member of the Committee, for having worked on this Committee. He further stated that we owe a great deal of thanks to Dr. Reavis for the great amount of time and effort he put forth as Chairman of this Committee.

Chairman Puffer expressed his appreciation, and that of the entire Board, to Dr. Reavis and the members of his Committee for the splendid job they have done thus far in connection with the establishment of a set of rules and regulations governing Board actions.

# REPORT OF SALARY SCHEDULE COMMITTEE

In Mr. Guin's absence, Dr. Reavis reported that the proposed salary schedule raises all brackets so that the maximum is about equal to the average of the same bracket at the University of Illinois. However, the matter is being referred to the Joint Salary Committee to be reported on at the June 26 meeting.

### INFORMAL REPORTS OF PRESIDENTS

Dr. Buzzard reported informally on Eastern Illinois State College advising that the dedication of the new Mary Josephine Booth Library would be Saturday, May 27, 1950.

He advised the Board of his continued difficulty with Gertrude Hendrix and that there had been a most unpleasant interview within the past week or so. The Board advised Dr. Buzzard to present before the Board, at the next regular meeting, which is scheduled for June 26, the action he wished taken in connection with Miss Hendrix.

Dr. Buzzard also advised that Dr. Metter, Director of Teacher Training and Placement, who was seriously injured in an automobile accident several months ago, is expected back to duty by June 1, probably for only half-day.

Dr. Larsen reported informally on Illinois State Normal University advising that the faculty continues to be very cooperative.

He further advised that the Special Education Building will be ready for the opening of school in the Fall. The Administration Building, however, will not be ready by the first of June, as had been hoped, but it will be ready for the opening of school in the Fall. The architects have provided drawings for a corner stone for the Administration Building.

Dr. Larsen also advised that he has given to Mr. Lanphier Illinois State Normal University's estimated budget for the 1951-1953 biennium.

Dr. Beu had no report to make on Western Illinois State College.

Dr. Holmes reported informally on Northern Illinois State Teachers College advising that an opinion had been requested of the Attorney General regarding Public Law 352, in which Northern is very much interested. A copy of said opinion was given to all interested parties.

According to the Attorney General, neither the Teachers College Board nor any State Agency is authorized to apply for and receive a loan or advance from the Federal Government under Public Law 352.

Dr. Holmes advised that the Lorado Taft project has moved another notch. The next step is to supply Director Casey with a deed to the property. Director Casey will then request the Attorney General's opinion as to what can be done in order to obtain the Lorado Taft Area for the use of Northern Illinois State Teachers College.

At a previous meeting of the Teachers College Board the Associate Architects were requested to find out how much more it would cost to provide foam rubber cushion chairs for the straight back chairs. They advise that it would cost approximately \$3,300.00 more. In view of this Dr. Reavis moved that the Teachers College Board approve the substitution of foam rubber cushion chairs for the straight back chairs, involving an additional cost of \$3,300.00. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker and unanimously carried.

Mr. Nickell, Secretary, advised that proper publication had been made for the sale of \$1,350,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds for Northern Illinois State Teachers College, and showed the members of the Board the advertisement as it appeared in "The Bond Buyer" of May 27, 1950.

Secretary Nickell then asked if all bids were in his hands. Being so advised that all bids were in his hands, Secretary Nickell was then ready to open the bids. However, before this was done, Mr. Dunn advised that on May 24, 1950, an opinion had been requested of the Attorney General as to whether the property on which the residence hall is to be erected is the property of the State of Illinois.

In the opinion of the Attorney General, ". . . the title to the above-described premises is vested in the Northern Illinois State Teachers College as of January 15, 1947, subject to the provisions contained in the deeds conveying the property in question, that said property should be used for school purposes only."

## The Teachers College Board

The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois was organized pursuant to Chapter 127 of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is comprised of nine members appointed by the Governor. The Director of Registration and Education of the State of Illinois is ex-officio Chairman of the Board and the Superintendent of Public Instruction is the ex-officio Secretary. Under the control of this Board are the four Teachers Colleges of the State of Illinois: Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois; Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois; Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois; and Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois.

### Northern Illinois State Teachers College

Northern Illinois State Teachers College is located about 60 miles west of Chicago at DeKalb, Illinois, a city of approximately 15,000 people. The College was established in 1895 by an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois. It is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the American Association of Colleges for Teachers Education, and is a member of the Illinois Inter-Collegiate Athletic Conference. The enrollment for the fall quarter of 1949 was 1,964, of which 1,153 were men and 811 women. The faculty and administrative staff consists of 137 members and there are 78 non-academic employees. Northern is the second largest of the four State Teachers Colleges.

The campus consists of 152 acres. Buildings and equipment were valued at \$3,370,873 as of 6/30/49. In addition to the proposed residence hall, there is a \$1,562,000 library under construction. Upon the completion of the new library, the existing library will be converted into a school of business education. At present, Northern does not offer courses in the training of teachers in commercial subjects. Due to an existing demand for teachers in these courses, it is expected that enrollment will show further increases when these courses are offered by 1952.

The College is supported by State appropriations and no tuition is charged. There is an Incidental Fee of \$15 per quarter and a Student Activity Fee of \$10 per quarter. Northern maintains an elementary training school with 238 pupils, including a kindergarten.

### Purpose of Bond Issue

These \$1,350,000 bonds are being issued for the purpose of constructing a student residence hall for men, complete with kitchen and dining facilities; remodeling and equipping Williston Hall, existing residence hall for 248 women; and completing Adams Hall with space for 122 women. The new residence hall will provide space for a minimum of 374 men. At present, the College has no residence halls for men. Bids for \$996,320 construction work were received on May 19th. Completion bonds covering these contracts and additional contracts to be let will be posted. The estimated cost of the project is as follows:

### Legal Authority and Security

These bonds will constitute a first lien upon the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the student residence hall to be constructed and the two existing student residence halls known as Williston Hall and Adams Hall, and will be issued by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Northern Illinios State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and

State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947, by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to a resolution to be adopted by The Teachers College Board.

The Teachers College Board will covenant to continuously operate said buildings and the facilities connected therewith at all times when the College is in session to their full physical capacity before using any other facilities for student residence purposes; to adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of said building and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said facilities; to provide an Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay principal of and interest on said bonds as the same mature; to provide and maintain a Depreciation Account of \$70,000; and to provide and maintain a Bond Reserve Account of \$70,000; and that it will collect, account for and apply the revenues in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution authorizing this issue of bonds.

## Present Student Residence Halls

The College now operates 2 residence halls for women, Williston Hall with a capacity of 248 and Adams Hall with a capacity of 122. Adams Hall was first opened at the beginning of the current school year.

### New Residence Halls

The new residence hall designed by Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, Architects, Bloomington, Illinois, in consultation with the office of C. Herrick Hammond, Architect for the State of Illinois, will be of brick construction and located on the campus. The hall will house 374 men. It will include complete dining facilities and is expected to be ready for occupancy by September 1, 1951.

Below is shown a comparison of residence hall space after the completion of the proposed building, compared to 1939-40 enrollment and 1949-50 enrollment. Also shown are the total students in need of housing in the 1949-50 year. This figure excludes students living at home or with other relatives, working for room, or commuting to school.

### Past Operations—Williston Hall

Notes:—(1) Includes cafeteria operations; (2) Operating expenses for this year include 6,511 of repairs and maintenance but excludes 6,250 of new equipment. Both of these items are in excess of the usual expenditures for these purposes. Also included in the expenses is 7,784 for laundry and cleaning, most of which will be eliminated upon the completion of this project as a laundry will be included. At present, laundry expense is high, as it is sent to a private concern.

### Present Debt

Northern Illinois State Teachers College now has \$52,000 Student Union Revenue Bonds outstanding dated May 1, 1948, the balance of an original issue of \$62,000. The College has never defaulted or delayed in the payment of these bonds.

That for the purpose of providing funds in the amount of \$1,350,000 to pay the cost of the construction of a new student residence hall, the remodeling of Williston Hall and the completion of Adams Hall, as hereinabove provided, there shall be and there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued revenue bonds of said College in the principal amount if \$1,350,000. The said revenue bonds shall bear date of June 1, 1950, shall be numbered from 1 through 1350, shall be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, bonds numbered 1 through 195, shall bear interest at the rate of three and one-quarter per cent  $(3\frac{1}{4}\frac{\%}{})$ per annum, bonds numbered 196 through 425, shall bear interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum, and bonds numbered 426 through 1350, shall bear interest at the rate of two and three-quarters per cent  $(2\frac{3}{4}\%)$  per annum, payable December 1, 1950, and semiannually thereafter on the first days of June and December of each year and until the principal thereof shall have been fully paid, and said bonds shall mature on December 1 of each of the years and in amounts as follows:

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provided, however, that bonds numbered 196 through 1350, shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date at the option of The Teachers College Board for said Northern Illinois State Teachers College on or after December 1, 1960, and up to and including June 1, 1965, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1965, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1970, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1970, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1975, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1975, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1975, at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof, and if redeemed on December 1, 1975 or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, at par and accrued interest.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and such notice of redemption shall with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of said bonds, and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

That such bonds and coupons shall be payable to bearer, provided however, that such bonds may be subject to registration as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder thereof on the books of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar of said bonds for the said The Teachers College Board, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said State Treasurer and thereafter the principal of such bonds shall be payable only to the registered holder, his legal representative or assign. Such registered bonds shall be transferred to another registered holder or back to bearer only upon presentation to the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or approved. Registration of any such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely.

Section 3. Both principal of and interest on such revenue bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the city of Chicago, Illinois.

Section 4. That said bonds shall be executed for and on behalf of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois by the Chairman of The Teachers College Board and attested by the Secretary thereof under the seal of said Board, and shall be registered and countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officials, who by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons. That said revenue bonds shall be designated "Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, and shall be in substantially the following form :

Interest accruing on this bond on and prior to the maturity date hereof shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they subsequently become due, but no interest shall accrue on this bond after the maturity hereof unless this bond be presented for payment at maturity and be not then paid.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$1,350,000, all of like date and of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 1350. inclusive, and bonds numbered 196 to 1350, inclusive, are subject to redemption as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after December 1, 1960, and up to and including June 1, 1965, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1965, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1970, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1970, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1975, at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof, and if redeemed on December 1, 1975 or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, at par and accrued interest.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond and the series of which it forms a part are all of like date, tenor and effect, except as to rates of interest, date of maturity and provision for redemption prior to maturity, authorized by The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, and issued to provide funds for the construction of a new student residence hall, the remodeling of Williston Hall and the completion of Adams Hall and are issued under and pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947.

This bond is payable solely, both as to principal and interest, from the revenues derived from the operation of the buildings acquired, improved, equipped and constructed with the proceeds of this bond issue, and the income and revenue derived from the operation of said buildings and facilities shall be paid over from time to time to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and be held by him as a special fund known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois.

This bond shall not be deemed to be an indebtedness of the State of Illinois or of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, or of The Teachers College Board. However, The Teachers College Board covenants and agrees with each and every holder of said bonds that it will apply the proceeds thereof to the purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued; that it will continuously operate the said buildings and facilities acquired, constructed and improved with the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds at all times when the said College is in session; that it will adopt such rules and regulations for the use of such buildings and facilities and will fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of such buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said buildings and facilities and to pay the principal of and interest on this bond and the issue of which it forms a part as the same become due, all in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution pursuant to which this bond is issued and as adopted by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, on the 3rd day of June, 1950.

This bond may be registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of The Teachers College Board in the office of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar for said Board, such registration to be evidenced by notation of said Treasurer on the back hereof, after which no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on said books and similarly noted hereon, but it may be discharged from such registration by being transferred to bearer, after which it shall be transferred by delivery, but it may be again registered as before. The registration of this bond shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons by delivery merely.

This bond is subject to the conditions, and every subsequent holder hereof by accepting the same agrees with the obligor and every subsequent holder hereof, that (a) the delivery of this bond to any transferee if not registered, or if it be registered, if the last registered transfer be to bearer, shall vest title to this bond and the interest represented thereby in such transferee to the same extent for all purposes as would the delivery under like circumstances of any negotiable instrument payable to bearer; (b) the obligor and any agent of the obligor may treat the bearer of this bond, or if it be registered in the name of a holder,

the registered holder of this bond, as the absolute owner hereof for all purposes and shall not be affected by any notice to the contrary; (c) the principal of and the interest on this bond will be paid, and this bond and each of the coupons appertaining thereto are transferable, free from and without regard to any equities between the obligor and the original or any intermediate holder or to any setoffs or counterclaims; and (d) the surrender to the obligor or any agent of the obligor of each of the coupons or of this bond if not registered, or if it be registered, if the last registered transfer be to bearer, on the receipt of the registered holder for the principal hereof if this bond be registered in the name of a holder, shall be a good discharge to the obligor for the same.

Section 5. That from and after the issuance of the bonds herein provided for the buildings and facilities to be acquired, constructed and improved with the proceeds derived from the sale of these bonds shall be operated on a fiscal year basis beginning on the first day of July and ending on the 30th day of June in each succeeding year, and from and after the issuance of said revenue bonds all of the gross income and revenue derived from fees and charges collected for the use of said buildings and facilities shall within three days after receipt thereof be paid to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois and shall be

set aside by him in a special fund hereby created to be known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois," and said fund shall be used only for the following purposes:

- 1. To pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining such buildings and facilities;
- 2. To provide and maintain an interest and sinking fund in an amount adequate promptly to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein directed to be issued;
  - 3. To provide a reasonable fund for depreciation, all as hereinafter more particularly set forth; and
  - 4. To provide a reasonable reserve fund.

Section 6. The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, hereby covenants and agrees that while any of said bonds are outstanding it will establish charges or fees for the use of said buildings and facilities sufficient at all times to pay the maintenance and operation costs under economical management, the principal of and interest on the bonds hereby authorized, and to maintain a reasonable reserve fund and a reasonable fund for depreciation, all as hereinafter provided for, and that fees and charges and other revenue received from the operation of said buildings and facilities shall be collected by The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois through agents or employees thereunto duly authorized, and all such revenues shall be deposited with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois when and as received as hereinabove provided, and shall be credited to the special fund as hereinabove provided, and such Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to pay out and disburse said money so deposited to the credit of said special fund in the following manner :

1. On the first day of each calendar month, beginning September 1, 1950, the said Treasurer shall credit on his books from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, to a separate and special account hereby created and designated the "Operation and Maintenance Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" such a sum of money as may be directed by order of The Teachers College Board sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining the aforesaid buildings and facilities for said calendar month, including adequate provision for insurance and any fees due The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, as paying agent on the bonds herein authorized, and the money so credited shall be used for such purposes and no other. If, in any month for any reason, there shall not be available an amount equal to the amount required for the

payment of the expenses hereinabove referred to, then an amount of revenue equal to any such deficiency shall be added to the amount of revenue otherwise required to be paid into the said Operation and Maintenance Account in the next succeeding calendar month or months and shall be paid with the payment then to be made.

2. On the first day of each month, beginning December 1, 1951 and after making the credit provided for in paragraph 1 first above, the Treasurer shall then credit on his books from the balance in the said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, to a special account hereby created and designated "Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" a sum of money equal to 1/6th of the interest then next due and 1/12th of the principal then next due on the bonds herein directed to be issued, and the said Treasurer shall be and is hereby authorized and directed without any further subsequent order of The Teachers College Board to remit on or before the 15th day prior to the first day of June and the first day of December, to The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, the place of payment designated in said bonds and the interest coupons appertaining thereto, the amount of principal and interest due on said dates, respectively. Funds credited to the said Interest and Sinking Fund Account above referred to shall be used solely and only for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same become due, or are called for redemption as in this resolution provided. Said Treasurer shall make no further remittances to the said bank after there shall have been so remitted a sufficient amount to pay all of the bonds then outstanding and all of the interest thereon to maturity, or, to the date upon which such outstanding bonds may then have been called for prior redemption.

3. On or before the 10th day of June and the 10th day of December in each year, beginnning December 10, 1951, after making the monthly deposits provided for in paragraphs 1 and 2 hereinabove, and so long as the accounts created in said paragraphs 1 and 2 contain funds sufficient to meet the requirements specified in said paragraphs 1 and 2 as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall credit on his books from the balance in said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois to a separate and special account hereby created to be designated "Depreciation Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950", the sum of \$7,000 until there shall have been accumulated in said Depreciation Account the sum of \$70,000 at which figure the Depreciation Account shall thereafter be maintained by subsequent deposits from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, subject to the limitations hereinabove provided. The funds in said Depreciation

Account shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the cost of any extraordinary repairs, upkeep and replacements in, on or about the aforesaid buildings and facilities, except that the funds held in said Depreciation Account to the extent necessary to prevent or remedy a default in the payment of the interest on or principal of the bonds herein authorized shall be used and held for use for that purpose and shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950 and whenever such a transfer is made, the amount so transferred shall be added to the next deposit to be made, and thereafter, until full reimbursement to said Depreciation Account has been made.

4. On or before the 10th day of June and the 10th day of December in each year, beginning December 10, 1951 and after making the deposits provided for in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above, and subject to all provisions therein specified for the maintenance of said deposits, the said Treasurer shall credit to a separate and special account hereby created and designated as the "Bond Reserve Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College of DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" the sum of \$7,000 until such time as there has been accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account the sum of \$70,000 at which figure the said Bond Reserve Account shall thereafter be maintained and which shall be used by said Treasurer from time to time in the payment of interest on or principal of the said revenue bonds hereby authorized, whenever there exists a deficiency in the amount of money on hand in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account necessary to pay maturing principal or interest after application of all funds available for that purpose under any provisions of this resolution. Funds accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account may be invested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois in bonds of the United States or fully guaranteed by the United States.

5. Any funds remaining after all the above deposits shall have been made shall be used to pay principal and interest on any bonds issued the pledge of which is subordinate to the bonds authorized by this resolution or to call and redeem bonds prior to maturity.

Section 7. That The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, acting under and by authority of the aforesaid Act, hereby expressly covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein directed to be issued as follows:

1. That as long as the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall remain outstanding and unpaid, it will continuously operate and maintain the said buildings and facilities constructed and improved with the proceeds derived from the issue of said bonds at all times when the said College is in session to their full physical capacity before using any other buildings and facilities for student residence

purposes, that it will adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of said buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said buildings and facilities; to provide and maintain the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds as the same matures; to provide for the aforesaid Depreciation Account; and to provide the aforesaid Bond Reserve Account; and that it will collect, account for and apply the aforesaid revenues in accordance with and as provided for in this resolution.

2. That it will not voluntarily create or cause to be created any debt, lien, charge or encumbrance having priority to or parity with the pledge of the bonds issued under this resolution upon any of said revenues, and that it will not sell, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of or encumber said buildings and facilities, or any part thereof, during the time when the bonds issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid.

3. That as long as any of the bonds issued hereunder remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest or both, it will at all times exercise all of its lawful powers to preserve and protect the security of the bonds and the rights of the bondholders under this resolution.

That as long as any of said bonds authorized to be issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, shall maintain insurance on said buildings and facilities and all parts thereof, including all furniture and equipment therein against loss or damage by fire or windstorm in any amount not less than the full insurable value of said buildings and facilities or the amount of outstanding bonds, whichever is less. Such insurance policy or policies shall be payable to The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, and all moneys collected on account of loss or damage covered by any such policy or policies of insurance shall be held in trust and shall be used only for reconstruction, replacements or repairs. In the event said funds are insufficient to restore said buildings and facilities to their former condition then said funds shall be paid into the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, and held for the benefit of the bondholders as their interests may appear. The said The Teachers College Board shall also carry adequate insurance against the loss of use and occupancy of said buildings and facilities from any or all risks or from any cause whatsoever in an amount not less than the highest amount due for principal of and interest on all the outstanding bonds payable from the revenues thereof in any year covered by the term of such policies. Any sum received from any such use and occupancy insurance, after deducting necessary operation and maintenance charges

under economical management during the period of such loss of use and occupancy, shall be paid into the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account. All of the said insurance shall be carried in a responsible insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Illinois, and the cost thereof shall be deemed to be a maintenance and operation cost.

That The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois 5. State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, shall cause to be kept proper books of records and accounts separate and apart from all other records and accounts in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the cost of constructing, equipping and furnishing the aforesaid buildings and facilities, the expenditures for maintaining, operating and repairing the said buildings and facilities, and all revenues collected therefrom, which said records shall be kept and shall be available for the information of all persons interested; and that there shall be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than thirty days after the close of each calendar month, complete operating and income statements of said buildings and facilities connected therewith, in reasonable detail, covering such monthly period; and that there shall also be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, a complete financial statement of the undertaking, in reasonable detail, covering such fiscal year, signed by the Secretary and certified by independent auditors, who shall be certified public accountants.

6. That at all times while any of the said bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board shall employ or make provision for the employment of some suitable person or persons to supervise the operation and maintenance of said buildings and facilities connected therewith, and such other persons as may be necessary for the proper and efficient operation, management and maintenance thereof. The cost of such services shall be included as other costs of operating and maintaining said buildings and facilities and shall be payable in like manner.

7. That while any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board will not issue any additional bonds or incur any other indebtedness, payable from the revenues of said buildings and facilities, unless the pledge of such additional bonds on the said revenues shall be made junior and subordinate in all respects to the pledge of the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder, including the Bond Reserve Account, as provided by subsection 4 of Section 6 of the resolution.

8. That The Teachers College Board for Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, will faithfully and punctually perform or cause to be performed all of the duties and obligations with reference to the said buildings and facilities as are required by the provisions of this resolution and the statutes under which the said bonds are issued, including the construction, equipment and furnishing of the aforesaid buildings and facilities and the operation and maintenance of said buildings and facilities, as herein provided, the making and collecting of reasonable and sufficient fees and charges for the use thereof, the segregation of the income and revenues therefrom to the respective funds created under the provisions of this resolution, and the proper application of said funds.

Section 8. Any holder of any bond or bonds issued hereunder, or of any coupons representing interest accrued thereon, may either by proper court action or in law or in equity compel The Teachers College Board to perform all duties imposed upon it under the provisions of this resolution and under the provisions of the statute hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of the bonds as herein provided, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates and charges for the use of such buildings and facilities connected therewith, and also to enforce the performance of any and all covenants made by the said The Teachers College Board in and by this resolution.

Section 9. That the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the income and revenue derived from the collection of fees and charges for the use of the aforesaid buildings and facilities connected therewith, or with respect to the pledge of the revenue to be derived from the operation of said buildings or facilities.

Section 10. That the proceeds derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds hereby provided for shall be applied as follows:

1. The entire proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to the purchaser thereof shall be deposited immediately with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois pursuant to the terms of the Act hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of said bonds.

2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the State of Illinois to set aside the amount of accrued interest received upon the sale and delivery of said bonds to said purchaser in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, hereinabove provided for, together with the sum of \$58,012.50 received from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, being the amount estimated necessary to pay interest on said bonds during the period of construction and the remainder of the proceeds of said bonds shall be set aside in a separate special account by said Treasurer to be designated "Student Residence Halls Construction Account of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois," and shall be applied to the cost of acquiring, constructing, equipping and furnishing the said buildings and facilities to be constructed, remodeled and

completed through the issuance of the bonds hereby authorized, all as hereinbefore provided; provided, however, that any surplus remaining in such account upon completion of the construction, equipment, furnishing and improving of said buildings and facilities shall be transferred and credited to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, as hereinabove provided for.

Section 11. That the provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between The Teachers College Board for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and each of them, and the said The Teachers College Board hereby pledges its good faith to the performance of each and every covenant hereof.

Section 12. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this resolution or of the bonds or interest coupons herein prescribed shall either be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision shall not have been contained therein.

Section 13. That the Chairman and Secretary of The Teachers College Board and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois shall be and they are hereby fully authorized and directed to do all things which may be necessary to effect the preparation, execution and delivery of the bonds herein authorized to be issued to the purchaser thereof, namely, Shields & Company and Associates, at a price heretofore agreed upon, the same being not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery, all in accordance with their proposal for the purchase thereof which is hereby accepted and approved.

Section 14. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

RESOLUTION establishing charges for the use of and for the service supplied by Williston Hall, Adams Hall and an additional new student residence hall to be constructed at the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois.

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, has heretofore by resolution duly adopted on June 3, 1950, provided for the remodeling of Williston Hall, the completion of Adams Hall and the construction of an additional new student residence hall on the campus of said College, and the issuance of \$1,350,000 Revenue Bonds to defray the cost of such construction pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Act above referred to and said resolution heretofore passed authorizing such construction and the issuance of said bonds it is necessary that The Teachers College Board establish charges for the use of such buildings;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be and there is hereby established, commencing September 1, 1950, a charge of \$14.50 per person per week for the use of and for the service supplied by Williston Hall, Adams Hall and an additional new student residence hall to be constructed on the campus of Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois.

Section 2. Said charge shall be payable not less than one week in advance.

Section 3. It is hereby made a duty of the Business Manager of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois to collect all monies due under the provisions hereof.

Section 4. All revenues and monies derived from the operation of Williston Hall, Adams Hall and the additional new student residence hall to be constructed, shall be held by the Business Manager separately and apart from all other funds of the College and all of said sums without any deductions whatsoever shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois not more than three days after receipt of the same.

Section 5. Before the Business Manager shall enter upon his duties with respect to the collection of charges and before he shall receive any funds derived from the operation of Williston Hall, Adams Hall and the additional new student residence hall to be constructed, he shall be required to post a corporate surety bond in an amount equal to the amount likely to come into his hands at any time, which bond shall be approved by The Teachers College Board, and filed with the Secretary of said Board, and shall be conditioned upon his faithful performance of his duties as required under this resolution and his accounting for all monies coming into his hands.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, that the Treasurer of the State of Illinois be authorized and directed to execute a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$70,000 to protect the "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois" provided for in the resolution authorizing the issue of \$1,350,000 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, adopted by this Board on June 3, 1950, payment for the premiums of said surety bond to be payable from the "Operation and Maintenance Account, Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" of said Fund.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

He further advised that he had checked the contract and found it to be in proper form, recommended approval of same and authorization for the Chairman and Secretary to sign this contract. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker and unanimously carried.

Dr. Holmes expressed the appreciation of the entire student body and himself to all who participated in making it possible for Northern to construct this new residence hall.

There being no further business before the Board, Mr. Walker moved that the meeting stand adjourned until the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board, which is to be held in Springfield, Illinois, in Director Puffer's office on Monday, June 26, 1950. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

# II. FACULTY

- A. Changes in Summer School Staff, 1950
  - 1. Mrs. Katharine Higgins, who was listed in our March 27, 1950 report, was not offered a contract for the first summer term as Mr. Howard Cordell was employed for the position of high school librarian, which Mrs. Higgins had been filling temporarily.
  - 2. Mr. George W. Mulder requested a leave of absence without salary for the first summer term.
  - 3. Mr. R. S. Hampleman, fifth grade critic, was assigned to the staff of the workshop for the re-education of teachers, who are prepared to teach in high school, to qualify them for elementary teaching positions. This required extension of Mr. Hampleman's contract through the second summer term at his regular salary of \$415.00 per month.
  - 4. Mr. Cecil Kipling will be employed both summer terms on the workshop staff at a salary of \$330.00 per month, or a total of \$990.00 for the summer. He received the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Western and has had several years' teaching experience in the elementary field.
  - 5. The third member of the workshop staff is Miss Dorothy Dixon who also received the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Western. She will be employed the first summer term at \$330.00 per month, or a total of \$495.00 for the term. Miss Dixon is assistant county superintendent of schools in McDonough County.

- 6. Miss Elizabeth Roark, who holds the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Western, was employed to replace Mr. Hampleman as fifth grade critic during the first summer term at \$330.00 per month, or a total of \$495.00 for the term. Miss Roark is an elementary teacher in the Macomb public schools.
- 7. Mr. Loren K. Robinson, Instructor in the Department of Agriculture, will be employed three weeks in June to teach a workshop course at Monmouth and the last two weeks in August to supervise the college farm and to take care of livestock during the vacation period between the close of summer school and the opening of the fall quarter. He will be paid his regular salary of \$385.00 per month, or \$288.75 in June and \$192.50 in August. Mr. Robinson will not teach the second summer term, as indicated in our March 27 report, as he will be enrolled in graduate work at the University of Illinois.
- 8. Mr. Leslie J. Van Etten, Instructor in the Department of Agriculture, taught a three-weeks' workshop in conservation at Carthage in June 1950. He will be paid his regular salary rate of \$415.00 per month, or a total of \$311.25 for the three weeks.
- 9. Dr. John S. McVickar, Professor in the Department of Agriculture, will teach a conservation workshop at Pittsfield following the close of the first summer term. This will require extension of his contract to include the last two weeks in July (\$285.00) and the first week in August (\$142.50).
- 10. Miss Elna Scott, who is regularly employed as third grade critic, will be employed from July 16 to August 15
- to serve as dean of women during Dean Zimmerman's vacation. Miss Scott will receive her regular salary of \$480 per month.
- 11. Miss Joyce Carter will be employed as Faculty Assistant in the Office of the Dean of Women during July and August at \$150.00 per month. Miss Carter has had experience as a student worker in this office, and her chief assignment will be securing housing for girls, the demands for which are very heavy during these two months.
- 12. Mr. Dean F. Johnson will be employed as Instructor in the Department of Agriculture during the second summer term to replace Mr. Loren K. Robinson. Mr. Johnson received the B.S. degree from the University of Illinois and will complete work at the same institution for the Master's degree in July. He will receive \$350.00 per month, or a total of \$525.00 for the term.

- 13. Mr. Arthur Eicken will be employed as Instructor in the Department of Agriculture during the month of July to teach a conservation course at Hardin, Illinois. His salary will be \$375.00. Mr. Eicken received the B.S. degree from the University of Illinois and is regularly employed as the vocational agriculture teacher in the Augusta High School.
- B. Appointments
  - 1. Mr. Herman Griesenbrock, Jr., will be employed as Instructor in the Industrial Arts Department beginning September 1, 1950 at \$365.00 per month. He will replace Mr. Lawrence Behrends. Mr. Griesenbrock received the A.B. degree from Iowa State Teachers College and will receive the A.M. degree in June 1950 from Colorado State College of Education. He has had teaching experience in the public schools of Tama and Cedar Falls, Iowa, and served three years in the U. S. Army.
  - 2. Mr. Howard Cordell will be employed as Instructor in the Library Department to replace Miss Lillian Scher as high school librarian. Mr. Cordell received the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Western Illinois State College. He has had three years' public school teaching experience and this past year served on the staff of the Burlington, Iowa, Junior College. His rank will be instructor, and his salary will be \$365.00 per month. Mr. Cordell will be employed the first summer term 1950 and the 1950-51 academic year.
  - 3. Miss Grace Pagett will be employed as Faculty Assistant in the Laboratory School (kindergarten) for the academic year 1950-51. Miss Pagett will complete work for the Bachelor's degree during the fall quarter and will be enrolled as a graduate student during the winter and spring quarters. Her salary will be \$75.00 per month for the months of September, October, and November 1950, and \$100.00 per month for the period December 1950 to May 1951, inclusive, for one-half time service.
  - 4. Mr. Jean Alvin Rayburn will be employed as music critic in the Laboratory School, effective September 1, 1950, to replace Miss Georgia Shideler. Mr. Rayburn will have the rank of instructor and receive \$375.00 per month. He received the B.M. degree from Eastman School of Music in 1948 and will complete work for the M.M. degree at the same institution during the summer of 1950. He has taught in the public schools of Brighton, New York, and has also done private teaching.
  - 5. Mr. William L. Carter will be employed as Instructor in the Laboratory School to replace Mr. William Lipsey who will be on leave of absence during the 1950-51 academic

year. Mr. Carter received the B.S. degree from Eastern Illinois State College and the M.A. from Ohio State University; he expects to complete the course and residence requirements for the Ph.D. at Ohio State by the end of the summer quarter. His teaching experience includes the high school at Ashmore, Illinois, and part-time work at Ohio State University. His salary will be \$375.00 per month.

- 6. Mr. Voris V. King will be employed, effective September 1, 1950, as Instructor in the Department of Geography and Geology to replace Mr. Reece A. Jones, who will be on leave of absence in 1950-51. Mr. King received the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Illinois State Normal University and has twenty-six semester hours credit beyond the Master's at Indiana University where he has been enrolled the past year. He has done part-time teaching at Illinois State Normal University and at Indiana University, and he is scheduled to teach at Northern Illinois State College during the summer of 1950. His salary will be \$400.00 per month, or a total of \$3,600.00 for the year.
- 7. Miss Orpha Ochse will be employed as Instructor in the Music Department during the first summer term 1950 and the regular college year 1950-51 as a replacement for Mr. George Mulder who will be on leave of absence. Miss Ochse's degrees are: B.M., Central College of Fayette, Missouri, and M.M., Eastman School of Music. She has taught in the public schools of Graham, Missouri, and at Central College. Her salary will be \$400.00 per month.
- 8. Miss Patricia Joan Steck was employed beginning June 1, 1950 as Faculty Assistant in the Department of Business Education at a salary of \$175.00 per month. She will be employed both summer terms and during the 1950-51 academic year.

### V. CURRICULUM

At the request of the Illinois State Examining Board the Western Illinois State College will offer during the summer of 1950 the three following programs for teachers, now certified to teach in secondary schools, who wish to prepare to teach in elementary schools. The programs planned by Western have the approval of the State Examining Board.

Plan No. 1—Workshop in Elementary Education—Education 450-451-452-453. (To be offered June 5—August 18, 1950, and summer of 1951.)

The purpose of this workshop will be to give persons now holding certificates to teach in secondary schools and college graduates not now certified to teach (1) an opportunity to study intensively the several subject-matter areas which constitute the major portions of the elementary school curriculum, such as: (a) language arts and reading, (b) social studies and geography, (c) elementary science and mathematics, (d) fine arts—music and art, and (e) health and physical education; and (2) to give these groups professional education consisting of (a) directed observation and some student teaching on the elementary level, (b) classroom management and methods, (c) child growth and development, and (d) evaluative procedures. Sixteen quarter hours.

Plan No. II—This plan has been designed so that people enrolled in the secondary school curriculum (Curriculum C) might qualify for an emergency elementary certificate in addition to the regular secondary school certificate. This plan permits the taking of additional courses or the taking of courses necessary for securing the elementary limited state certificate as electives now required in Curriculum C, such as: (1) English 219 or Reading 220, (2) Psychology 421, (3) Social Science 220 or 221, (4) Art 319, 320, 321, (5) Mathematics 100, 219, 221, (6) Music 320, 321, (7) Education 422, 423, 424, 430, (8) Education 325, (9) Education 435, and (10) Education 310.

A selection of the proper courses will give a total of 16 quarter hours of 10 2/3 semester hours. Plan No. III—For those who (1) hold the Baccalaureate degree and (2) whose previous training qualifies them to enter this program, and (3) wish to work for the Master of Science in Education in the elementary field, certain courses will be offered during the summer session which may be used for certification in the field of elementary education. Four courses from the following graduate courses on the elementary level will give 16 quarter hours or 10 2/3 semester hours credit:

First Summer Term: Biology 500, Education 435, English 421, Geography 507 or 519, Mathematics 500, Social Science 500, Education 416 or 436.

Second Summer Term: Psychology 421, Geography 519, Physical Science 400, English 421, English 519.

# VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

A. Contracts were let and bonds sold for a \$146,000 self-liquidating stadium project on April 17, 1950. This entire amount is going to be paid by a \$2.00 per person student assessment per quarter over a thirty-year period. Although it has been mentioned several times, I wish to stress again that none of the money for the building of the stadium will come from tax money or state appropriation.

The bonding company is asking as an added safeguard that the revenue from the stadium be sent to the State Treasurer and that bills for operating the stadium and expenses in connection with the same be sent to the State Auditor. Although there should be ample money from the \$2.00 assessment fee, the foregoing procedure is set up by the bonding company as a safeguard.

- B. The new addition to the Western laboratory school, consisting of classrooms and a gymnasium, will be completed by September 1950.
- C. Work on the power plant addition and the addition to Morgan gymnasium is progressing fairly well.

# VIII. STUDENT LIFE

A. The band and choruses of the Western Laboratory School won the sweepstakes in the state music contest for Class D schools. Out of the thirty-six ensembles and solos entered in the district and state contests, twenty-three placed first in the state finals. We feel that this is an exceptionally fine record in view of the fact that the band and choruses were organized in the fall of 1948 when Mr. A. Oren Gould, the director, began his duties at Western.

- B. Kappa Sigma Kappa, social fraternity, has purchased an eightroom residence which will provide housing facilities for twenty-four men students. Fraternity members are working this summer to remodel the attic, making a dormitory out of the same, and also making other improvements in the house.
- C. Grote Hall, women's dormitory, has been completely reserved for the fall of 1950 since early in February, and there are over a hundred on the waiting list. Rooms on campus for men students have also been filled for next year since May 1. From the foregoing it is indicated that we will have as many students next year as we had in the fall of 1949 or more.
- D. A fourth social fraternity, Delta Sigma Phi, has been organized at Western and a charter issued by the national office. The new fraternity has thirty-five members, and Mr. Richard R. Abbott is the faculty sponsor.

## II. FACULTY

1. Resignations

Miss Ruth Harnack, director of admissions, effective June 20, 1950 to continue her graduate work at the University of Illinois. Miss Harnack plans to change her field and enter library work.

Miss Mary Williams, associate professor, Department of Education, effective June 16, the close of the spring quarter. She will reach the age of 65 on August 20, 1950 and feels she should retire on health reasons. We will miss her.

She has had seven years' teaching experience as well as office experience.
  - (b) Miss Wilma Hill, assistant professor, Department of Fine Arts, had been granted a leave of absence with pay for the year 1950-1951. After consideration and consultation with her department head and with the administration, she has decided to remain on campus as a regular faculty member.
  - (c) Mr. James Meldrum from assistant dean of men and coordinator of veterans affairs to assistant professor, Department of Social Science, effective September 1 at a salary of \$4410 for nine months. Mr. King has his bachelor's and master's degrees from Illinois State Normal University and is working toward his doctorate at Indiana University.   - (b) Dr. Paul E. Martin, associate professor of physics, Department of Physical Science, at a salary of \$900 for eight weeks. Dr. Martin is head of the Department of Physics at Wheaton College and has his doctor's degree from the University of Michigan.

Dr. Bullington earned his bachelor's degree at Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois, his master's degree at the University of Illinois, and his doctorate at Northwestern University. He has had teaching experience in high schools in Illinois, at Eureka College, and comes to this college from a similar position at MacMurray College, Jacksonville, Illinois. Dr. Bullington will replace Mrs. Margaret Kohler who was employed temporarily.
- (d) Dr. George P. Clark, assistant professor, Department of English, at a salary of \$4320 for nine months beginning in September. Dr. Clark earned his bachelor's degree at the College of Wooster, his master's and doctor's degrees at Yale University. He has had teaching experience at the College of Wooster, Wooster, Ohio, Yale University, served in the Army Air Forces, and comes to this college from a similar position at Coe College, Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Dr. Clark is replacing Mr. Charles Ranous.
- (e) Mr. Joseph E. Clettenberg, director of extension, at a salary of \$5500 for eleven months beginning August 1. Mr. Clettenberg earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Illinois, his master's degree at Northwestern University, and is doing further graduate work toward his doctorate at the University of Chicago. Mrs. French earned her bachelor's and master's degrees at Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia, Kansas where she is now working toward her doctorate. She has had teaching experience in the elementary schools of Kansas and comes to this college from a position as reading clinician at the University of Kansas.
- (j) Mr. Anthony F. Lorusso, landscape engineer and assistant in biology, at a salary of \$4500 for twelve months beginning July 1. Mr. Lorusso will direct the campus landscaping and grounds work, assist with work in biology, and in general take charge of the important task of keeping the campus beautiful in its natural aspect. Much of this work was done by Mr. William Swinbank for many years and following his retirement, no one was employed in this capacity. Mr. Lorusso earned his bachelor's degree at Rutgers University and has had successful experience in landscape design, construction and maintenance, turf management, soils and fertilizers, plant pathology, surveying and mapping. He served in these fields at the Galesburg Division, University of Illinois from which he comes very

highly recommended, and at the Mayo General Hospital, Galesburg where he was responsible for the design and execution of landscape development program. Mr. Lorusso will be classified as executive assistant in education and administration.

- (k) Miss Mary McKoy, assistant professor, Department of Physical Education for Women, at a salary of \$4230 for nine months beginning in September, replacing Miss Bernice Wolfson who resigned. Miss McCoy is a dance specialist. She earned her bachelor's degree at Michigan State College, East Lansing, her master's degree at the University of Minnesota, and is now working toward her doctorate at Ohio State University. She has had successful teaching experience in high school and college work, coming to Northern from a position at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas.
- (1) Miss Coral Matthews, kindergarten assistant, McMurry School, replacing Miss Kathryn Flynn who resigned. Miss Matthews earned her bachelor's degree at the University of Chicago where she expects to earn her master's degree in August, 1950. She earned her bachelor's degree at the Teachers College, Kansas City, Missouri and her master's degree at the University of Missouri where she is continuing her work toward the doctor's degree. She has had successful teaching experience in the schools of Smithton and Kansas City, Missouri.
- (q) Dr. Eleanor M. Volberding, associate professor, Department of Education, at a salary of \$4905 for nine months beginning in September. Dr. Volberding has her bachelor's degree from the Iowa State Teachers College, Cedar Falls, her master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Chicago. She has had successful teaching experience in the public schools of Iowa and Illinois, at the University of Chicago Laboratory School, Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri, and comes to this college from a similar position at the University of Utah.
- (r) Dr. Frederic A. Weed, assistant professor, Department of Social Science at a salary of \$4275 for nine months beginning in September. Dr. Weed earned his bachelor's degree at the New York State College for Teachers, Albany, his master's and doctor's degrees at Columbia University where he also was awarded the Doctor of Laws dagree. He has had teaching experience in the schools of New York, including the New York City College and comes to this college from a position at the New York State College for Teachers, Albany.

## 8. Music Department

Several times during the months preceding the date of the letter shown below, Dean Zulauf, dean of the faculty, had conferences with Dr. Wayne Christeson, head of the Music Department, regarding the administration of that department. The conferences were called by Dean Zulauf because of the dissatisfaction expressed by members of the department.

About the middle of November, I received typewritten statements representing, so I was told, the majority of opinion of the Music Department. These statements covered almost three pages and to say the least, were very critical of Dr. Christeson's administration. On Wednesday, November 23, Dean Zulauf and I discussed the situation in detail with Dr. Christeson at which time he was given a summary of the statements and had an opportunity to see them in their entirety. At that time he said he would do his best to improve the relationship between the department and himself. However, we felt that since he was then in his third year, that we should make it clear to him that tenure could not be obtained by him at the end of his third year. Therefore, the following letter was written to him under date of November 28:

"This note is to confirm part of our discussion of Wednesday, November 23 at which time it was indicated that because of certain administrative problems, it is best to withhold tenure from you until at least the summer of 1952 when we shall again discuss the administrative phase of your work. Of course, in the meantime it is my plan to confer with you many times."

Since the above letter was written, affairs within the department have definitely not improved. In fact, they have become much worse. The Administrative Council, composed of three elected members and three appointed members, including myself, are taking new written statements under advisement. These statements are a composite of the reactions of all members of the department concerning Dr. Christeson. At the time of preparing the board report, it is impossible for me to give the Board the recommendation of the Administrative Council regarding Dr. Christeson and the Music Department. There will be another report of this situation in the next written board report.

#### Extension of Appointment—Faculty Assistant

Mrs. Florence Ignoffo, faculty assistant, registered nurse serving in the Student Health Clinic, at a salary of \$215 per month through the month of September. Mrs. Ignoffo was employed beginning March 15 through June 15 but finds she can stay longer. She is needed in the Clinic so that it may be kept open longer hours.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents convened in Chairman Puffer's office, Capitol Building, Springfield, Illinois, on Monday, June 26, 1950 at 9:00 A. M. (C.S.T.). Noble J. Puffer, Chairman of the Board and Director of the Department of Registration and Education, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

## REPORT OF WESTERN ILLINOIS STATE COLLEGE

Dr. Beu presented his quarterly President's Report of Western Illinois State College.

There being no matters for discussion about the report Mr. Means moved that the report be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz, and unanimously carried.

# REPORT OF NORTHERN ILLINOIS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Dr. Holmes presented his quarterly President's Report of Northern Illinois State Teachers College.

It was brought to Dr. Holmes' attention that Paragraphs 1, 2 and 3, appearing on Pages 16, 17 and 18, under the heading IV. THE ORGANIZATION should first be referred to the Graduate and General Curriculum Committee for approval, and then submitted to the Board for approval.

In view of this, Dr. Holmes requested that Paragraphs 1, 2 and 3, appearing on Pages 16, 17 and 18, under the heading IV. THE OR-GANIZATION be deleted from this report and referred to the Graduate and General curriculum Committee for approval. Also, that Items 18, 19 and 20 under the heading X. SUMMARY be deleted from this report.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the report be approved as amended. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Dr. Holmes presented a supplementary request that Dr. Bedrich Salansky be appointed to the position of assistant professor, to teach European History and Political Science for one-half time during the fall quarter and full-time during the winter and spring quarters, at a salary of \$3780.00 for nine months. This appointment would be for one year only.

In view of the fact that Dr. Salansky is not a citizen, the question arose as to whether or not the Board could employ him. The Department of Finance was asked their opinion in the matter, and they advised that inasmuch as he is a displaced person, he could be employed without being a citizen.

Mr. Wirtz moved that Dr. Salansky be employed as assistant professor for the 1950-1951 academic year. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

# REPORT OF ILLINOIS STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY

Dr. Larsen presented his quarterly President's Report of Illinois State Normal University with the following corrections and deletions:

On Page 8, Paragraph (1) should read as follows: "Dr. Richard G. Browne, Professor of Social Science and Head of the Department of Social Science, who has been on leave during the second half of the 1949-1950 school year, working for the School Problems Commission as Director of Research, asks that his leave be extended on half-time for the first semester of the 1950-1951 school year to complete the project;"

On Page 12, Paragraph (3) should be deleted from this report;

On Page 12, Paragraph (7) should read as follows: "Mr. Joseph L. French, as Faculty Assistant in the Psychological Clinic and to teach classes in Psychology, at an annual nine months salary of \$3015.00. Mr. French has Bachelor of Science in Education and Master of Science in Education degrees from Illinois State Normal University;"

On Page 13, the date in the last line of Paragraph 8, should be 1950-1951 instead of 1940-1951;

On Page 16, Paragraph (8), the salary rate should be \$515.00 per month instead of \$415.00 per month;

On Page 16, Paragraph 13, the 12 month salary of Gertrude Erbe should be \$4224.00 instead of \$4200.00; the 12 month salary of Lucile Koenig should be \$4140.00 instead of \$4020.00; the 12 month salary of Margie Miner should be \$4140.00 instead of \$4020.00; the 12 month salary of Leslie Park should be \$4140.00 instead of \$4020.00; the 12 month salary of Verner Ryden should be \$4140.00 instead of \$4020.00; the 12 month salary of Herbert Sanders should be \$4140.00 instead of \$4020.00;

On Page 19, Paragraph 9, the name of Mr. William R. Bokelman should be stricken from this report.

Mr. Walker moved that the report be accepted as amended, and that action regarding the Business Manager be deferred until the meeting on July 21, 1950. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

With reference to the matter of a new Business Manager at Illinois State Normal University, Mr. Bohrer moved that Dr. Larsen be asked

to interview some of the candidates suggested by Dean Lloyd Morey and that he make recommendations to the Board at the next meeting on July 21, 1950. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker and unanimously carried.

## PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

At the last meeting of the Board, the matter of the location of the Home Management House was referred to the State Architect, who, in turn, was going to have a conference with Mr. Hill and report results of said conference at this meeting.

Mr. Bootan, representing the State Architect, distributed copies of the master plan of Eastern Illinois State College, copies of the plan of the proposed Home Management House in one location, and copies of the plan of the Home Management House in another location. Mr. Booton explained his reasons for the two locations.

After thoroughly discussing the matter, Mr. Walker moved that the plan for the Home Management House, as shown on Sheet No. 1, be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

Mr. Booton then distributed copies of the proposed site plans for the self-liquidating dormitories at Eastern labeled Scheme A and Scheme B. Mr. Booton explained the difference in the two plans.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Bohrer moved that the site plan for the self-liquidating dormitories at Eastern, as shown on Scheme A of Sheet No. 2, be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Booton advised that the J. A. Ross and Company had been requested to submit a proposal for the preparation of a parking area around the Library Building at Northern. A proposal has been received in the amount of \$13,174.55, which the Division of Architecture and Engineering considered fair and reasonable and recommended for acceptance.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the J. A. Ross and Company's proposal in the amount of \$13,174.55, for building a parking area in connection with the Library Building, as shown on Sheet No. 1 of 2 Sheets, be accepted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

While Mr. Booton was present, Chairman Puffer asked him if he could supply the Board with any information regarding the completion of the tennis courts at Eastern, inasmuch as he had recently had some correspondence regarding this matter, and also because this was the third summer this project had been under way and was not completed yet.

#### TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD

Mr. Wooton advised that, off hand, he had no definite information, but would check into the matter and see what could be done to expedite the completion of this project.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the Teachers College Board authorize the Division of Architecture and Engineering to approve payments of all construction costs and architects' fees on all self-liquidating projects as work progresses, and further, that the Division of Architecture and Engineering be authorized to sign all contracts for self-liquidating projects and keep record of accounts, such authorization to be retroactive. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

At a previous meeting, the Fiscal Agents had been requested to make a survey at Eastern with regard to the financing of about fourtenths of the total cost of constructing the two dormitories on a selfliquidating basis and obtaining the necessary balance from the appropriation made in Senate Bill 680 of the 66th General Assembly.

Mr. Newman presented his report showing the cost of constructing two dormitories, which included financing \$400,000.00 through selfliquidating bonds.

No definite Board action was taken on this report.

Mr. Bohrer advised that according to the Agreement and Vacation Ordinance entered into by the State of Illinois and the Board of Trustees of the Town of Normal, Illinois, regarding the vacation of Twin Grove Street and a certain alley in Block 4 to the 3rd Addition to said Town of Normal, the State of Illinois is obligated to stand the expense of relocating any public service facilities; all in connection with the construction of self-liquidating dormitories at Illinois State Normal University.

In the construction of the above-mentioned dormitories, a 6" city water main in Twin Grove Street was encountered and the architects had planned, with the approval from the Water Committee of the Town of Normal, to encase, within a tunnel, this water main.

The President of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Normal advised the architects that the Town of Normal desired to have this water main relocated either one or two blocks to the south of Grove Street.

Mr. Bohrer moved that the Teachers College Board authorize the architects to proceed with necessary steps to have this water main relocated on the first street south of the University-owned property, and that the Governor be requested to release the necessary funds to provide for this relocation of the water main. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Chairman Puffer advised that on June 17 he had received a statement from Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson for architectural services on the Self-Liquidating Project at Northern in the amount of \$33,502.49, or  $4\frac{1}{2}$ % of the cost of the building.

It was brought to the Board's attention that, according to the terms of the contract with Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, their fee would be  $3\frac{1}{2}$ % of the cost of construction.

After a thorough discussion, Mrs. Pegelow moved that the statement presented by Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, in the amount of 33,502.49, be allowed, subject to a visit by Mr. Lanphier to discuss the possibility of reducing the fee to 4%. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Chairman Puffer read a letter he had received from Commissioner McGrath of the U. S. Office of Education, stating that his office had received no letter or communication from any organization protesting the approval of Illinois State Normal University for the training of teachers of Vocational Agriculture.

Chairman Puffer advised that the Teachers College Scholarship law, as now written, has been rightfully interpreted, that a student attending school on such a scholarship is entitled to \$80.00 per term or semester intsead of \$80.00 per school year.

A new bill is now being drawn up by the Legislative Reference Bureau changing this so that a student can receive \$80.00 a calendar year (beginning approximately September 1), or if he completes his studies in three years, he can receive \$106.66, or if he completes his studies in three and one-half years, he can receive \$91.42, making a total not to exceed \$320.00 for a four-year course.

President Buzzard advised that all of the Presidents were going to attend the School for Executives, to be held in Madison, Wisconsin in August, and recommended that Mr. Lanphier be authorized to attend on behalf of the Teachers College Board.

Mr. Walker moved that Mr. Lanphier be authorized to attend the School for Executives, to be held in Madison, Wisconsin (August 20-27). The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

Mr. Walker moved that the meeting stand adjourned until the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board to be held in Springfield, Illinois, on Friday, July 21, 1950, in Director Puffer's office. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow, unanimously carried, and the meeting stood adjourned.

Dr. Arthur H. Larsen, Acting President Illinois State Normal University

Dr. Frank A. Beu, President Western Illinois State College

Dr. Leslie A. Holmes, President Northern Illinois State Teachers College

Mr. Charles G. Lanphier, Co-ordinator Department of Registration and Education Springfield, Illinois

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of June 26, 1950.

Mr. Bohrer moved that on Page 11, Paragraph 2 should be amended to read as follows:

"Mr. Bohrer moved that the Teachers College Board authorize the architects to proceed with necessary steps to have this water main relocated on the first street south of the Universityowned property, and that the Governor be requested to release the necessary funds to provide for this relocation of the water main from the appropriation for acquisition of land. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried."

The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

Mr. Guin moved that the minutes of the meeting of June 26, 1950, be approved as amended. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

Chairman Puffer read a memorandum from the Governor directed to "Heads of all Departments, Boards and Commissions" regarding budgetary procedures for the next biennium. No official Board action was required; the Chairman read it merely as information to the Board members inasmuch as the time is nearing when the budgets for the schools will be submitted.

At the last meeting of the Board, Mr. Lanphier was authorized to call upon the firm of Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, Architects, for the purpose of perhaps getting a reduction of  $\frac{1}{2}$ % for architectural services in connection with the dormitory project at Northern.

Mr. Lanphier reported that after his discussion with Mr. Schaeffer and Mr. Hooton, and after Mr. Schaeffer carefully analyzed the plans of both Normal and Northern, he was of the opinion that they were entitled to their charge of  $4\frac{1}{2}$ % at Northern, inasmuch as the plans are similar in only the most minor sort of way.

Mr. Wirtz moved that Mr. Lanphier's report regarding his visit with Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, in connection with their fee of  $4\frac{1}{2}$ % for the dormitory project at Northern, be accepted, and in consideration of the architect's agreement to accept  $3\frac{1}{2}$ % on the project at Eastern. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

At the last meeting of the Board, the matter of Dr. Fairchild's physical condition and his plan to return to work on July 17 was discussed. It was then decided that Dr. Fairchild should not return to work until the Board had received a report from the attending physician stating that Dr. Fairchild was physically capable of returning to his duties as President of Illinois State Normal University.

Mr. Dunn, Chairman of the Advisory Committee for Illinois State Normal University, advised he had received a report from the attending physician, copy of which was sent to the Chairman of this Board, and proceeded to read the report to the members of the Board. The report was to the effect that Dr. Fairchild was physically capable of returning to work, provided he got plenty of rest.

The Board talked informally to Dr. Fairchild regarding his physical condition.

Mr. Wirtz then moved that the Teachers College Board welcome Dr. Fairchild back to work as President of Illinois State Normal University, effective as of this date, with the request that he make every effort to bring full faculty cooperation to the administration of the school, and that he relieve himself of his extensive administrative duties by delegation. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn moved that we thank Dr. Larsen for taking on the added responsibilities and duties as Acting President of Illinois State Normal University during Dr. Fairchild's leave, and for performing his duties so well and cooperatively. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

Chairman Puffer read to the members of the Board a letter he had directed to Dr. Buzzard regarding matters that had been brought to his attention concerning Dr. Buzzard's attitude in connection with the proposed construction of dormitories at Eastern, which will be on a partially self-liquidating basis.

Dr. Buzzard was questioned as to his willingness to cooperate, and it was apparent from Dr. Buzzard's statements that he was willing to cooperate.

Chairman Puffer next read a letter he had received from H. Stanley Pickford, Chief Revenue Clerk in the State Treasurer's office, regarding the resolutions passed by the Board authorizing the issuance of surety bonds in the amounts of \$50,000.00, \$15,000.00 and \$70,000.00 in favor of the Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for Illinois State Normal University, Western Illinois State College and Northern Illinois State Teachers College respectively; the premiums to be payable from the Operation and Maintenance Accounts of the Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1950 Fund for Normal and Northern, and the Stadium Revenue Bonds of 1950 Fund for Western.

Mr. Pickford stated that inasmuch as there are no funds in the Operation and Maintenance Accounts at any of the three schools, it is impossible to pay these premiums and suggested that the Board amend the resolutions directing that the premiums be paid from Contingencies within the construction account.

In light of the foregoing information, Mr. Dunn moved the adoption of the following resolution.

WHEREAS, on April 17, 1950, this Board adopted a resolution providing for the issuance of \$1,150,000.00 in self-liquidating bonds, the proceeds of which were to be used in connection with the construction of student residence halls at Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois, and

WHEREAS, on the same date the Board adopted a resolution wherein the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois was directed to post a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$50,000.00 and pay the premium for said bond out of the "Operation and Maintenance Account," created under the provisions of said bond resolution, and

WHEREAS, until the said residence halls are completed and in operation, sometime in the year 1951, there will be no money in said fund, and

WHEREAS, said bond premiums may become due and payable before any money is deposited in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," and

WHEREAS, there is a Contingent Fund created in said resolution from funds received from the sale of said bonds; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Teachers College Board that the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois be and he is hereby authorized to pay said bond premiums out of said Contingent Fund until such time as there is money in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," after which time such premiums shall then be paid out of said "Operation and Maintenance Account," and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that until there is money deposited in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," any insurance premiums due because of insurance policies issued on Fell Hall for fire and extended coverage and use and occupancy insurance be paid out of said Contingent Fund created by said bond issue resolution of April 17, 1950.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, on April 17, 1950, this Board adopted a resolution providing for the issuance of \$130,000.00 in self-liquidating bonds, the proceeds of which were to be used in connection with the completion of the construction of a stadium at Western Illinois State College, and

WHEREAS, on the same date the Board adopted a resolution wherein the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois was directed to post a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$15,000.00 and pay the premium for said bond out of the "Operation and Maintenance Account," created under the provisions of said bond resolution, and

WHEREAS, until the said stadium is completed and in operation, sometime in the year 1950, there will be no money in said fund, and WHEREAS, said bond premiums may become due and payable before any money is deposited in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," and

WHEREAS, there is a Contingent Fund created in said resolution from funds received from the sale of said bonds; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Teachers College Board that the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois be and he is hereby authorized to pay said bond premiums out of said Contingent Fund until such time as there is money in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," after which time such premiums shall then be paid out of said "Operation and Maintenance Account," and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that until there is money deposited in said "Operation and Maintenance Account" any insurance premiums due because of insurance policies issued on stadium for fire and extended coverage and use and occupancy insurance be paid out of said Contingent Fund created by said bond issue resolution of April 17. 1950.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

Mr. Dunn moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, on June 3, 1950, this Board adopted a resolution providing for the issuance of \$1,350.000.00 in self-liquidating bonds, the proceeds of which were to be used in connection with the construction of student residence halls at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois, and

WHEREAS, on the same date the Board adopted a resolution wherein the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois was directed to post a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$70,000.00 and pay the premium for said bond out of the "Operation and Maintenance Account," created under the provisions of said bond resolution, and

WHEREAS, until the said residence halls are completed and in operation, sometime in the year 1951, there will be no money in said fund, and

WHEREAS, said bond premiums may become due and payable before any money is deposited in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," and

WHEREAS, there is a Contingent Fund created in said resolution from funds received from the sale of said bonds; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Teachers College Board that the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois be and he is hereby authorized to pay said bond premiums out of said Contingent Fund until such time as there is money in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," after which time such premiums shall then be paid out of said "Operation and Maintenance Account," and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that until there is money deposited in said "Operation and Maintenance Account," any insurance premiums due because of insurance policies issued on Williston Hall and Adams Hall for fire and extended coverage and use and occupancy insurance be paid out of said Contingent Fund created by said bond issue resolution of June 3, 1950.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

## CONSIDERATION OF BUSINESS MANAGER AT I. S. N. U.

At the last meeting of the Teachers College Board, Dr. Larsen was instructed to interview candidates for the position of Business Manager at Illinois State Normal University from a list recommended by Lloyd Morey, Comptroller of the University of Illinois.

Dr. Larsen presented a list of five candidates he had interviewed and recommended William R. Bokelman for the position, assuming he was not to recommend Preston M. Ensign, existing Business Manager, for the position.

Dr. Fairchild was requested to give his views on the matter, who advised he had also interviewed some of the candidates that Dr. Larsen had and concurred in Dr. Larsen's recommendation, inasmuch as he, too, was under the impression that Mr. Ensign was not to be recommended.

Mr. Bohrer advised he had just recently learned of a man whom he thought would be very capable of filing the position and recommended Mr. Allan Andrews for the position.

After a general discussion of Dr. Larsen's and Mr. Bohrer's recommendations, Mr. Wirtz moved that Dr. Larsen's recommendation of Mr. William R. Bokelman be accepted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Guin moved, upon the recommendation of Dr. Fairchild, that Mr. Preston M. Ensign's contract as Business Manager at Illinois State Normal University, at a salary of \$6180.00 per annum, be continued for one year, from July 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

The Salary Schedule Committee will present its formal report at the September 25th meeting, but it is the understanding of the Board that the Presidents will proceed with their budgets based on the figures submitted in the tentative report.

# REPORT ON BUDGETS

Mr. Dunn advised that there was no report on the preliminary budgets at this time.

# REPORT OF POLICY COMMITTEE

Dr. Reavis, Chairman of the Policy Committee, reported that his committee had had an executive meeting the evening prior to this meeting and had made several changes in their report. However, the report, at this time, was not in proper form to be acted on by the Board, but a formal report would be made at the September 25th meeting.

# REPORT OF TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD MEETING COMMITTEE

Mr. Wirtz, Chairman of the Teachers College Board Meeting Committee, reported that his committee had agreed upon, and were recommending to the Board, a schedule of meetings as follows:

Mr. Wirtz moved the adoption of the report. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

# RESIDENCE HALLS AT EASTERN

At the afternoon session, in addition to the Board members and Presidents, the following people were present: Mr. C. Herrick Hammond, Mr. Joseph Booton and Mr. E. Todd Wheeler of the Division of Architecture and Engineering; Mr. A. N. Schaeffer, Mr. P. R. Hooton and Mr. Alan Baird of the firm of Schaeffer, Hooton and Wilson, Architects; Mr. Vincent Newman of Barcus, Kindred and Company, and Mr. J. T. Swartz of the J. T. Swartz and Co., Inc., the latter two being the Fiscal Agents for the Teachers College Board.

The Fiscal Agents presented their revised report following their further study of conditions at Eastern with regard to the proposed issue of \$400,000.00 Eastern Illinois State College Residence Hall Revenue Bonds.

The revised report increased the rate for board and room from \$12.50 per week to \$13.25 per week.

The report recommended that the sale of these bonds be temporarily delayed.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the revised report of the Fiscal Agents, dated July 20, 1950, regarding the proposed issue of \$400,000.00

Student Residence Hall Revenue Bonds of Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, be accepted as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin, the roll was called and the vote was as follows:

These bids will be received on August 15, 1950.

Mr. Dunn moved that we reject the bids received on plumbing, heating and temperature control, and instruct the Division of Architecture and Engineering to readvertise the work involved in these two trades. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer, the roll was called and the vote was as follows:

They advise they have received a proposal from the S. E. McDaniel Company in the amount of \$5,162.00 for this necessary relocation.

Mr. Dunn moved that we accept the proposal on the relocation of this water main from the S. E. McDaniel Company in the amount of \$5,162.00 that he be given a contract for the necessary work, and that payment due be made out of the land acquisition appropriation which has heretofore be approved by the Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell, the roll was called and the vote was as follows:

The first additional work involved additional telephone conduit and a telephone equipment room to provide more trunk lines into each building, with switchboard and automatic equipment at an extra cost to the Contract for Electrical Work of \$1,794.00 and an extra cost to the Contract for General Work for the new telephone equipment room of \$335.00, making a total of \$2,129.00.

Mr. Dunn moved that these additional costs in connection with the telephone system be referred to the Advisory Committee of Illinois State Normal University with power to act for the Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

The second additional cost involved additional electrical receptacles of 220-volt capacity in corridors, for floor washing machines, at an extra cost to the Contract for Electrical Work of \$438.00.

Mr. Dunn moved that this additional charge of \$438.00 for 220volt electrical receptacles also be referred to the Advisory Committee of

Illinois State Normal University with power to act for the Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

The third additional cost involved changing the size of the transformers from 112½ KVA to 225 KVA, due to an error by the Associate Architects in calculating the load for one building instead of two, at an extra cost to the Contract for Electrical Work of \$2,069.00.

Mr. Nickell moved the approval of this additional cost of \$2,069.00 for changing the size of transformers from  $112\frac{1}{2}$  KVA to 225 KVA. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

The last additional charge involved providing VonDuprin coordinating devices on all pairs of Underwriter-labeled doors to permit the inactive door to close ahead of the active door, at an extra cost to the Contract for General Work of \$363.00.

Dr. Reavis moved the approval of this additional charge in the amount of \$363.00 for providing VonDuprin co-ordinating devices on all pairs of Underwriter-labeled doors. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

There being no further business before the Board in which the Architects were interested, they withdrew from the meeting.

# MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

At a previous meeting of the Board, Thomas McDowell appeared before the Board on behalf of himself and six other non-academic employees of Northern Illinois State Teachers College who had received advice that they could not remain on the payroll, inasmuch as they were unable to pass a satisfactory physical examination, as required by the University Retirement System.

At that time the Board requested that Mr. Lanphier investigate the possibility of retaining these employees, due to various reasons.

Chairman Puffer read a memorandum he had received from Mr. Lanphier advising he had been in touch with the University Retirement System officials, who agree that there is a moral obligation to give these elderly employees further employment, and that, therefore, it was Mr. Lanphier's recommendation that these seven individuals be certified as sub-standard risks, certification to be effective August 1, 1950, and not the date of their employment.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the seven employees of Northern be retained, and certified as sub-standard risks, effective August 1, 1950, on the basis of Mr. Lanphier's report to Chairman Puffer. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

Dr. Fairchild and Dr. Larsen advised they would like to have the dedication of the Administration Building and the corner stone laying of the self-liquidating dormitories on Sunday afternoon, October 22,

1950, and extended to all members and interested parties a most cordial invitation to be present at such ceremonies.

There being no further business before the Board, Mr. Wirtz moved that the meeting be adjourned until the next regular meeting, which is scheduled for September 25, 1950, at Eastern Illinois State College, Charleston, Illinois.

B. Complete report on enrollment for the Fall Quarter, 1950, is not available at this date. 495 new students, including freshmen, reported for orientation. At the close of registration day, 1263 students had completed enrollment. Probably total enrollment will reach 1290, a decrease of 140 from the highest enrollment of 1430 one year ago (Fall 1949), yet considerably above the 1152 maximum enrollment at the beginning of World War II.

# C. Scholarship Reports:

# III. ORGANIZATION

- A. The results of using the first day of duty in the college year as "Faculty Day", as has been the plan for four years, brings the conclusion that one or two additional days could profitably be used for an extension of faculty orientation. A detailed plan for such service will be presented later in the year.
- B. Discussion of the development of more democratic administration of the college is producing markedly desirable discussion by and ensuing action on the part of Eastern's faculty. We

hope that the current year will afford opportunity for a functioning participation of the faculty in the solution of administrative problems.

# IV. CURRICULUM

A. Plans are progressing towards the offering of graduate courses in the summer school of 1951. A definite program will be submitted in due time to the Graduate Study Committee of the Board for consideration.

# V. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

# A. Permanent Improvements

- 1. Furniture for the Booth Library is still "trickling" in. It is hoped that inspection by the Board at the September meeting will win commendation for the Division of Architecture and Engineering, and in particular for Mr. Joseph F. Booton, Chief Designer.
- 2. The current status of the project on Site Preparation (of campus) and Athletic Fields, is open for Board inspection.
- 3. "Trailerville" has been moved westward, and bull dozers are busily excavating for the new Residence Halls.
- 4. Plans and specifications for the Home Management House project are now completed and being offered for bids on construction by the Division of Architecture and Engineering.

# B. Budget request for 1951-53

Under date of August 12, 1950, Eastern filed with the Chairman of the Budget Committee, the following request for Permanent Improvements for the biennium 1951-53:

"In keeping with Governor Stevenson's declaration that only dire needs for Permanent Improvements can find a place in the 1951-53 budget, Eastern submits the project for a new *Training School Building* and substantiates the degree of need as follows:

(1) The present building is NOT fireproof. The wooden stairways are an additional fire hazard. The electrical wiring is both inadequate and dangerous because of insulation deterioration. The floors have pulled away from the walls, indicating unsound structural conditions. The window space is inadequate. The sanitary and toilet facilities need

replacement. A third floor corridor and an attic office function as kitchen and dining room for the Federal hot-lunch project. No space is available for (a) nursery school, needed in training Home Economics teachers, (b) a kindergarten for training elementary school teachers, (c) a play room and gymnasium for the required health education program, or (d) shop, laboratory or kitchen for enrichment of the school program. This building, constructed in 1911, is markedly inferior to the average elementary school building of our better school systems.

(2) The development of a program in Elementary Education, now the most critical area in the training of public school teachers, makes a new and modern Training School building a necessity, particularly under the growing pressure of offering a fifth year of preparation in this area. The contemplated building will house (a) nursery school, (b) kindergarten, (c) elementary school of Grades 1-6 inclusive, and (d) junior high school of Grades 7-9 inclusive, together with the facilities expected in a modern Training School building.

(3) The college needs the block lying east of the Heating Plant, bounded by Grant, Ninth, Hayes and Seventh Streets, and the three houses in the northeast corner of the Bishop Heights addition, to complete the site for the Training School Building. Nearness to the college buildings and sufficient building and play space, make this addition of land highly desirable.

The proposed Vocational Education Building will house (1) Industrial Arts, (2) Home Economics and (3) Business Education. Each of these areas is becoming increasingly functional in public education. The building housing Industrial Arts and Home Economics was built in 1927, as a reduction from proposed plans, and is not well-constructed. These departments have now outgrown their allotted space, and the 1927 equipment is now inferior to that of many high schools. Business Education, housed in third floor West, Main Building, has overflowed into hallways for necessary laboratory work. Courses in Distributive Education cannot be offered for lack of room facilities. These three areas, if expanded in a commodious building, can then offer the short course vocational training now needed badly in eastern Illinois. Like the Training School Building, the situation in these vocational areas presents a dire need for a new and ample building.

# 3. Current Enrollment

Although figures are neither due or completely available at this time covering the enrollment for the first semester of the current 1950-1951 school year, it may be of interest to know that early registration has passed the 2400 mark and it now appears that the final figure of 2438 one year ago will be exceeded. The freshman class is fully as large as the one of a year ago, which is encouraging if we look to the future of interest in teacher education.

It is of further interest to note that the number of children in the Metcalf Elementary School, including those in the Metcalf Building and the four additional rooms housed for the first time in the new Special Education Building, is the largest in the history of that school. In addition, there will be recorded, when total figures are finally presented, the enrollment in the Special Education Building in the areas of the physically handicapped (crippled, cardiac, and epileptic cases), partiallysighted up to the blind, hard-of-hearing up to the deaf, all types of speech difficulties, mentally retarded, and the socially maladjusted.

The enrollment in University High School, although heavily restricted, has gone slightly beyond our stated limitation of 350. In the high school, as well as in the elementary area, and likewise in special education, there is need for a great deal in the way of laboratory school facilities to handle the increasingly large number of student teachers. With a graduating class that will be very close to 600 in June and August combined, it is obvious that off-campus student teaching facilities will not solve all of the problem. There are many more elementary and high school pupils seeking admission than it is possible to accommodate.

### 4. Current Extension Program

As stated later in this report, there has been some reorganization of extension work resulting from the death of Mr. Clarence Orr, Director of Extension Services for the last fifteen years. The new director of this work, Dr. L. W. Miller, has been able to extend the offerings until it now appears that there will be approximately 16 classes offered in 14 centers, with the usual heavy demand for this work in each of these centers. A complete report with registration in each course in the various centers will be included in the next Board Report.

# 5. Annual Report

Due to the necessity of obtaining figures that are not available due to a shift in offices and other complications on the campus at this time, the annual fiscal report, including total cost of

operation, number of students on an equivalency basis, and per capita cost, will be included in the next report to the Board.

6. Summer Session Scholarships

As a matter of record, the attention of the Teachers College Board is called to a list of scholarship students attending the 1950 summer session which has been sent to the Coordinator for approval by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board. Clearance of this list will result in an eventual transfer of funds by the State Treasurer from the General Revenue Account to the Income Fund of Illinois State Normal University to the extent of \$1782.25, with an additional \$492.50 transferred to the Illinois State Normal University Trust Fund for Activity and Graduation fees, Graduation fees amounting to \$90.00. It is recommended that the submitting of this list and the transfer of funds be approved by the Teachers College Board. It is understood that the transfer will be made when sufficient funds are available for such transfer from the State General Revenue Account.

- 7. Graduates (August 1950)
  - a. The students whose names appear below completed requirements for the degree of Master of Science in Education at the close of the summer session, August 11, 1950. It is recommended that they be awarded the degree of Master of Science in Education and be granted the diploma of Illinois State Normal University.

# II. FACULTY

1. Death

Mr. Clarence Orr, Associate Professor of Social Science, died on August 15, 1950, after serving as a member of the faculty of Illinois State Normal University since 1929. Mr. Orr had given a great deal of time to handling extension courses and in 1935 was appointed Director of Extension Services and very successfully handled the organization of off-campus course offerings of the University since that time. He was very active in educational circles and in local community life, and his long and valuable service to the University will continue to be appreciated.

- 2. Resignations
  - a. Miss Helen Dooley, Assistant Librarian, effective August 11, 1950, due to a desire not to continue active work for the present.
  - b. Miss Magdalen Eichert, Associate Professor of Social Science, effective August 11, 1950, in order to accept a position in the State Teachers College at Frostburg, Maryland.

- c. Mrs. Clara B. Merrifield, Instructor in Home Economics in the University High School, effective August 11, 1950, in order to accept a position in Missouri.
- d. Miss Ruth H. Richards, Instructor in Health and Physical Education for Women, effective July 20, 1950, in order to accept a position in the Duluth, Minnesota, branch of the University of Minnesota.
- e. Mrs. Jeanne L. Cotton, Faculty Assistant and Registered Nurse in the University Health Service, effective August 27, 1950, in order to accompany her husband to another location where he had secured a teaching position.
- 3. Leave of Absence
  - a. Miss Viola Boekelheide, Instructor in Music, for the school year September through May, 1950-1951, in order to do further graduate work at the University of Minnesota. This leave of absence is without pay since Miss Boekelheide has not been on the staff long enough to qualify for a sabbatical leave.
- 4. Additional Assignments and Reappointments
  - a. The name of Mr. John Carey was omitted from the listing of staff members for the 1950 summer session in the Board Report of March 27, 1950. Mr. Carey should be listed as receiving \$465.00 for each of two months (July and August) or a total of \$930.00 for the summer session.
  - b. Mr. James Goff was omitted from the second of the two months of the summer session because of his not having been included in the listing of teachers in the March 27 Board Report. This later assignment of Mr. Goff should be approved for one month at his regular salary of \$420.00, and this amount is recommended for work already done during the month of August.
  - c. Mr. Preston M. Ensign, as Business Manager at \$515.00 per month, or an annual (twelve months) salary of \$6180.00, effective from August 1, 1950, following a temporary and special provision made for a thirty-day appointment at the meeting of the Teachers College Board on June 26 and recorded on page 16 of the June 26, 1950, Board Report, where the salary was erroneously stated at \$415.00 per month but was later corrected to \$515.00 per month.
  - d. Mr. John R. Claus, as Faculty Assistant in Agriculture, effective September 1950 at a salary of \$310.00 per month for a nine months period, or \$2790.00 for the school year, taking the place of Mr. Leland R. Hughes as indicated on page 14 of the June 26 Board Report.

- e. Mrs. Ruth Green, who supervised student teachers in the Bloomington Public Schools, was omitted from a previous payroll and in entitled to \$80.00 for her services. It is recommended that such payment be approved and the name of Mrs. Green placed on the August payroll.
- 5. Changes in Position and Salary
  - a. Mr. Douglas Bey, Assistant Professor of Matematics in the University High School, to be named as Dean of Boys, effective September 1950, without change in salary and for this year without change in teaching load.
  - b. The salary of Mrs. Waneta S. Catey, under the changed appointment on a twelve months basis as approved in item 7 on page 13 of the Board Report of June 26, 1950, should be made effective as of July 1, 1950. The time as to when the appointment was effective was omitted from the June 26, 1950 Board Report.
  - c. Because of increased responsibilities and ability to give more time to certain duties, it is recommended that the salary of Mr. Lloyd Eyer, Assistant to the Business Manager, be changed from \$315.00 per month to \$335.00 per month on a twelve months basis, effective from August 1, 1950.
  - d. Miss Ruth Huggins, Assistant Professor of English in the University High School, to be named as Dean of Girls, effective September 1950, at the same salary she is now receiving but with one less class in her teaching load.
  - e. Through error, the salary of Dr. Christine P. Ingram was listed in the March 27, 1950, Board Report as \$500.00 per month for each of two months in the summer session. This salary should have been \$525.00 per month, or \$1050.00 for the summer session.
  - f. Dr. L. W. Miller, Professor of Biological Science, to be named as Director of University Field Services, to take the place of Mr. Clarence Orr, formerly Director of University Extension Services, whose death occurred August 15, 1950. Dr. Miller will receive the same per month salary rate but will be on a twelve months basis rather than nine months, plus two months of summer session. This should be effective September 1, 1950. Dr. Miller will still continue to handle much of his past teaching assignment.
  - g. The transfer of Miss Thalia Tarrant from a position on the staff of our affiliated Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School to a position in the Social Science Department in the University High School to take the place of Miss Frances Alexander, who was granted a leave of absence for the

1950-1951 school year. Miss Tarrant's appointment would be that of Assistant Professor effective September 1950, and at a salary of \$4050.00 for a period of nine months.

- h. The salary of Mr. Kenneth Curry listed in the June 26 Board Report as a Graduate Assistant at \$75.00, should be changed to the full amount of \$150.00.
- i. Mr. Lloyd E. Eichert's name as a Faculty Assistant, listed on page 14 of the June 26 Board Report, should be removed, since he cannot accept the work offered to him.
- 6. New Appointments

    - (1) Miss Eunice Blackburn, as a substitute in geography for the first semester of the current 1950-1951 school year to take the work of Mr. Clarence Sorensen who is on leave of absence. Miss Blackburn was approved in the June 26 Board Report on a half salary of \$1845.00, whereas the approval should have been for \$3690.00 for a half year. The amount of money involved is the same, but the time is different than listed in the June 26 report. This appointment is effective September 1950.
    - (2) Mrs. Myrtle Benton, as a substitute in the Division of Special Education handling part of the program for physically handicapped children, at a salary of \$325.00 per month, effective September 18, 1950.
    - (3) Mrs. Lucilla Randall, as a substitute in the Department of Biological Science, on a per month basis of \$410.00 to care for part of the work of Miss Delma Harding whose leave of absence of last year was continued into the present year. Mrs. Randall has substituted for us on previous occasions. This appointment is effective September 1950.
    - (4) Mrs. Christine Stombaugh, who has substituted for us on numerous occasions in the Home Economics Department, is again recommended for substitute work in the present school year to take the work of Miss Blossom Johnson, on leave this year, whose position could not be filled at this time. This appointment is at a salary of \$410.00 per month and is effective September 1950.

  - (2) Miss Ruth Bird, as Instructor and Supervising Teacher in Health and Physical Education for Girls in the University High School, effective September 1950, at a salary of \$3735.00 for nine months. Miss Bird has B.S. and M.A. degrees from the University of Illinois, with additional work at the University of Southern California. She has taught in elementary and secondary schools in Chicago, and at Butler University.
  - (3) Miss Harriet Mae Black, as Assistant Professor and Supervising Teacher of English in the University High School, effective September 1950, at a salary of \$4050.00 for nine months. Miss Black has a B.Ed. degree from Illinois State Normal University and an M.E. from the University of Hawaii, with additional work at the University of Chicago, University of Southern California. Her teaching experience has been in high schools in Mason City and Galesburg, Illinois; Lagunillas, South America, Miami and Miami

Beach, Florida, and Santa Maria and Reedley high schools and junior colleges in California.

- (4) Miss Anna Margaret Cameron, as Instructor in Home Economics in the University High School, at an annual nine months) salary of \$3735.00, effective September 1950. Miss Cameron has received both her bachelor's and master's degrees from Indiana University and has had teaching experience in four Indiana high schools as well as one high school in Colorado.
- (5) Mrs. Malinda D. Garton, as Instructor in Education to teach the intermediate special education room for the educable mentally retarded in our Special Education Building, at a salary of \$3600.00 for nine months, effective September 1950. Mrs. Garton has her B.A. degree from the University of Oklahoma and her M.A. degree from Bradley University, with additional work at Colorado State College of Education. Her experience has been in public schools in Oklahoma and in Peoria, Illinois.
- (6) Mrs. Josephine B. Howard, as Instructor in Education to teach the combined first and second grade room in the new Special Education Building, at a salary of \$3825.00 for nine months, effective September 1950. Mrs. Howard has her B.S. in Education degree from the University of Kansas, a B.E. degree from National College of Education, and an M.A. from Michigan State College. She has taught in schools in Kansas City, Missouri, Freeport, Texas, Menasha and Milwaukee, Wisconsin.
- (7) Miss Marianna Irwin, as Instructor in Education and Supervising Teacher in the newly organized program in the Special Education Building, but part of the Metcalf Elementary School staff, at an annual (nine months) salary of \$3735.00, effective September 1950. Miss Irwin has bachelor's and master's degrees from Northwestern University with additional work at National College of Education, University of Michigan, Wayne University, the University of California, and the University of Chicago. Her teaching experience has been in the public schools of Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, with teachers college experience at Winona, Minnesota, and Buffalo, New York, coming from Buffalo to Normal.
- (8) Dr. Francis F. Kline, at Associate Professor of Social Science, effective September 1950, at a salary of \$4635.00 for nine months. Dr. Kline has her B.E. degree from the State Teachers College at LaCrosse, Wis-

consin, and her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin, with additional work at Teachers College, Columbia University and Northwestern University. Her teaching experience has been in junior high schools in Irma and Beloit, Wisconsin, in high schools in Randolph, Irma, and Jefferson, Wisconsin, and Rockland, Michigan, and in the University of Wisconsin.

- (9) Mr. John B. McCann, as Assistant Professor of Social Science, effective September 1950, at a salary of \$4050.00 for nine months. Mr. McCann has B.S. and M.S. degrees, and all work completed for his Ph.D. degree, from the University of Illinois, with additional work at Washington University, St. Louis, Missouri. He has taught at Arkansas State Teachers College at Conway.
- (10) Miss Dorothy McEvoy, as Instructor in Education and teacher of the deaf and hard-of-hearing in the Special Education program, effective September 1950, at an annual (nine months) salary of \$3825.00. Miss McEvoy has the Bachelor of Science in Education degree from the University of Nebraska and her master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. Her teaching experience has been in Nebraska, Iowa, New York and Wisconsin, coming to us from La Crosse, Wisconsin, where for six years she has been supervisor in the Special Education program.
- (11) Dr. M. L. Miller, as Associate Professor of Education and Director of Audio-Visual Education. effective September 1950, to fill a position authorized by the Teachers College Board but for which we have been unable to find a suitable candidate until the present time. Dr. Miller has his Bachelor of Science degree from Bradley University and his master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Pittsburgh. He has had teaching experience in the public schools of Iroquois County, Illinois, his home county, the public schools of Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Ohio, the State Teachers College at Indiana, Pennsylvania, Teachers College, Columbia University, and in Lehigh University in Pennsylvania. He was to the present time on the staff of the Air University at Montgomery, Alabama, following his war time service as instructor of United States Army air crews in the field of visual education. He also served part time on the staff of the University of Alabama. The appointment of Dr. Miller would be at a salary of \$7020.00 for the twelve months period, effective September 1, 1950. This fills a very important

position in connection with some new work that the University must undertake at this time.

- (12) Mr. Donald R. Paker, as Instructor and Laboratory Technician in the University Health Service, effective September 1950, at a salary of \$4500.00 for twelve months. Mr. Parker has his B.S. in Ed. degree from Southern Illinois University and his M.S. from the University of Michigan. He has taught in the high schools at Murphysboro and Harrisburg, Illinois.

### IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. Division of University Field Services

Following the death of Mr. Clarence Orr, previously mentioned in this report, it has seemed wise to change the name of the

Extension Services area in which Mr. Orr worked to that of University Field Services, to which area Dr. L. W. Miller is being appointed as Director. Like Mr. Orr, Dr. Miller will be giving a major portion of his time to teaching but will need to organize the extension courses and other activities in relation to the public schools. This merely means a grouping together of services already being rendered that are beyond those of extension classes.

### VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

#### 1. Progress on New Buildings

### a. Administration Building

This building is not completed as yet but on September 9 the last of the offices was moved into the new quarters and for the most part we are able to operate under normal conditions. There still remains considerable work to be done in completing part of the building but with the cooperation of the contractors, we are able to work as they finish their contracts. It is hoped that the building may be entirely completed and formally turned over to the University and the Teachers College Board by November 1.

It is planned to dedicate the Administration Building on Sunday evening, October 22, in connection with the dedication of the Special Education Building and the cornerstone ceremonies of the new dormitories earlier in the afternoon. The meeting of the Teachers College Board on Monday, October 23, will be held in the Administration Building in the Board Room.

### b. Special Education Building

It now seems doubtful if the Special Education Building will be ready for complete occupancy much before January 1, 1951. However, through the cooperation of the contractors, we are able to carry out our plans and obligations to house part of the work in special education and four elementary grades in the west half of the three stories of the main structure. Moving into these limited quarters began on September 14 and despite the failure of furniture to arrive, a sufficient number of desks and other equipment has been located to make operation possible. The other half of the front section, the entire north wing, and the medical or health service units will be turned over to us in the order named with the entire structure completed and in

use we hope by the end of the calendar year. The building will be far enough along so that at the time of the dedication on October 22 it will be possible to see some of it in action and most of it in structure.

c. New Dormitories

The two self-liquidating residence halls, one for men and the other for women, seem to be progressing in satisfactory manner with the work completed up to and into the first floor. Progress seems to be on schedule and, barring unforeseen delays, we still hope to be able to make use of these buildings in September 1951.

d. Addition to Fell Hall

The final preliminary drawings have been completed and approved by those on the campus responsible for reactions as to needs. These plans have now been submitted to members of the Teachers College Board for their approval so that working drawings may be started immediately by the Associate Architects.

### 2. Improvement of the Campus

With funds available for site improvement, as well as general campus landscaping, a first contract has been let to the John Felmley Company for the work around the Administration Building, including the shift of Fell Gate north of the present location at the point of entrance into the eastwest main walk of the University, the construction of a parking area back of the Administration Building, and other needed improvements in that same general area. Other contracts will be let to complete the work throughout the campus and the construction of a west gate to match the present Fell Gate on the east side of the campus. Work will also need to be done in the area of the Special Education Building. It is believed that ample funds are available for that much of the general campus improvement program. If it is possible to go further with the program, this will be done at a point south from the present entrance of Old Main.

- 3. Building Repairs
  - a. Wiring of Metcalf Elementary School

The largest single project being undertaken at the present time is that of re-wiring the Metcalf Elementary School. The allocation in Contractual Services of \$30,000.00, presumably based upon accurate figures of the contractor, who, incidentally, was the low bidder on the project when bids

were opened, proved to be insufficient since the lowest bid was \$38,991.00. By consultation with the contractor, the Division of Architecture and Engineering, and University authorities, it has been found possible to reduce this figure to approximately \$35,000.00. Additional funds will be supplied from our regular, though limited, accounts so as to make possible the completion of this project which has been attempted in four different bienniums and has failed because each time the bids ran higher than anyone dared estimate.

It was the privilege of Illinois State Normal University to serve as host to the Annual Workshop of the Illinois Education Association on September 8, 9, and 10, when over two hundred delegates lived and worked for three days here on the campus. This same meeting was held at Northern State Teachers College at DeKalb a year ago and it is believed that this is one of the services that the teachers colleges can render to the teaching profession in Illinois. This was not a matter of free entertainment since board and room were paid for by the delegates.

#### II. FACULTY

### 1. Leave of Absence

Mr. Rodney Anderson, assistant professor, Department of Mathematics, for the time of his induction into the Army Air Force. Mr. Anderson is an officer, veteran of World War II. He re-entered the service on August 25, 1950.

2. Resignations

Dr. Wayne Christeson, head of the Department of Music, to accept a similar position at the teachers college at Florence, Alabama. In the board report of June 26, 1950, a complete statement of his situation was presented. The members of the department as well as the administration feel that his resignation to accept another position is the best solution to the problem.

Mr. Asa Berlin, assistant professor, Department of Speech, to accept a more lucrative position. Mr. Berlin was employed during July, following the June board meeting and his employment had not yet been formally approved by the Board. We are reporting this only as a matter of record. Mr. Berlin was recommended by the Northwestern University Department of Speech. This department also recommended the second position to him.

- 3. Change of Status
  - (a) Dr. A. Neil Annas, associate professor, Department of Music, as acting head for the year 1950-1951. The members of the department have indicated their desire to work with Dr. Annas during this year. Dr. Annas served as head previously and will retire from his teaching duties in August, 1951.
  - (b) Miss Coral Matthews, kindergarten assistant at the Mc-Murry Laboratory School, was employed as faculty as-

sistant at a salary of \$3150 for nine months, this rank to be changed to that of instructor at a salary of \$3420 should she receive her master's degree from the University of Chicago by September 1. We now have a statement from the University to this effect and we are reporting as a matter of record that Miss Matthews is classified as instructor at a salary of \$3420 for nine months beginning in September.

- (c) As a matter of information for the Board, we wish to report that Mr. Harvey Feyerherm, assistant professor, Department of Biological Sciences, whose appointment was formally approved at the June 26 meeting, was awarded his doctorate by the University of Iowa in August.
- (d) Dr. Frederick Weed, assistant professor, Department of Social Sciences, whose appointment was formally approved by the Board at the June 26 meeting, was granted a leave of absence for military service in July, and after reporting to Army headquarters, was again placed on the inactive list. Dr. Weed began his work at the college on September 11. We are reporting this as a matter of record only.
- (e) Mr. Ralph McKinzie, assistant professor, Department of Physical Education for Men, regularly employed for nine months at a salary of \$4500, will receive salary for 9½ months in order to assist with football practice. He began his duties this autumn on September 1.

### 4. Military Status of Faculty Members

A check of the teaching members of the staff at Northern reveals that at present, we have 19 faculty persons who are on the inactive lists of the services. All served as officers in World War II and their status now is not known but should any of these be called into the service, we shall probably need to replace the majority of them. ### 5. Adjustment in Salary

Mrs. Montgomery has been living in Adams Hall at a salary of \$4500 plus maintenance for twelve months. She prefers to live in town and has moved from Adams Hall but will continue to take her meals there. Her salary has been changed to cover the amount of rent ordinarily paid at the dormitory.

6. New Appointment-Summer Session, 1950

Mr. August Ring, graduate of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College who served as supervisor of the clinicians in the speech workshop on the campus at a salary of \$550. This salary will be refunded by the Division of Services for Crippled Children. Mr. Ring has been serving as speech clinician in District No. 271 during the past year.

- 7. New Appointments, Regular Year
  - (a) Miss Rosalie Baker, librarian, at a salary of \$3510 for nine months beginning in September. Miss Baker earned her bachelor's degree at West Virginia University and her bachelor and master in library science at George Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee. She has had successful school and library experience at the high school at Elkins, West Virginia and at the George Peabody Library.
  - (b) Miss Irene E. Cherhavy, instructor, Department of Speech, at a salary of \$3645 for nine months beginning in September. Miss Cherhavy replaces Mr. Asa Berlin. She earned her bachelor's degree at Illinois State Normal University and her master's degree at the State University of Iowa. She has had successful experience in speech correction and therapy in the schools of North Dakota, Cicero, Illinois, and comes to us from a position at Duke Hospital, Durham, North Carolina.
  - (c) Dr. Eugene B. Grant, assistant professor, Department of Education, at a salary of \$4500 for nine months beginning in September. Dr. Grant earned his bachelor's degree at the State Teachers College, Springfield, Missouri, his master's and doctor's degrees at the University of Missouri. He has had successful teaching experience in junior and senior high schools and has served as supervisor of student teachers in the laboratory school at the University of Missouri.

- (d) Mrs. Clarence Ethel Hardgrove, assistant professor, Department of Mathematics, at a salary of \$4500 (\$500 per month) beginning with the opening of the winter quarter in December. If Mrs. Hardgrove has earned her doctor's degree by the time she comes to the college, her rank will be that of associate professor. Mrs. Hardgrove earned her bachelor's degree at Marshall College, Huntington, West Virginia, her master's degree at West Virginia University and is at present working on her doctorate at Ohio State University. She has had successful teaching experience in the schools of West Virginia and at Ohio State University.
- (e) Mr. Gilman Hertz, instructor, Department of Physical Education for Men, at a salary of \$3825 for nine months beginning on September 1 in order to assist with football practice. Mr. Hertz will receive an additional two weeks' salary for this work. He earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin where he also earned his master's degree. He is a Navy veteran and comes to this college from a similar position at Ripon College, Ripon, Wisconsin.
- (f) Dr. Frederick Kent, assistant professor, Department of Social Science, at a salary of \$3780 beginning in September. Dr. Kent will teach half time during the autumn and full time during the winter and spring quarters so that he may finish his work at Northwestern University where he is working toward a master's degree in political science. He has the doctor of law degree from the School of Law and Economics at Charles University at Prague. Dr. Kent is employed as lecturer for one year and his name has been legally changed from Bedrick Salansky.
- (g) Mr. Carl W. Knox, assistant dean of men, at a salary of \$5500 for eleven months beginning in September. Mr. Knox earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Illinois where he expects to obtain his doctorate this autumn. He is a Navy veteran and has had successful experience in personnel work at the University of Illinois where he served as supervisor for housing.
- (h) Mr. Nye L. LaBaw, faculty assistant, Department of Physical Education for Men, at a salary of \$3150 for nine months beginning in September. Mr. LaBaw earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Illinois where he is at present working on his master's degree. Should he obtain it during the academic year of 1950-1951, his rank will be changed to that of instructor and his salary to \$3825 for nine months.

- (i) Mrs. Florence Mlot, college nurse, at a salary of \$260 per month for nine months beginning in September, replacing Mrs. Florence Ignoffo. Mrs. Mlot is a graduate of the Illinois Masonic Hospital, Chicago, and comes to this college from a position at the Veterans Administration Hospital at Downey, Illinois.
- (j) Mr. Robert B. Morris, instructor, Department of Music, at a salary of \$3735 for nine months beginning in September. Mr. Morris earned his bachelor of music degree at Capital University, Columbus, Ohio, and his master's degree at the Union Theological Seminary Music School, New York City. He has had successful experience as head of the vocal department at Hanover College, Hanover, Indiana and has been soloist at public affairs.
- (k) Dr. Willis Pickard, associate professor, Department of Mathematics, replacing Mr. Rodney Anderson, at a salary of \$4770 for nine months beginning in September. Dr. Pickard earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Nebraska and his doctor's degree at George Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee. He has had successful teaching experience on the high school and junior college levels, has taught at the Iowa State Teachers College, served as head of the Mathematics Department at the Galesburg Division, University of Illinois, and comes to this college from a position as research worker with the Navy at Washington, D. C. Dr. Pickard is an officer of the Navy, having served during the last war.
- (1) Miss Arlene F. Smelser, instructor, third grade supervisor, McMurry Laboratory School, at a salary of \$3780 for nine months beginning in September. Miss Smelser has her bachelor's degree from Drake University and her master's degree from the State Teachers College at Greeley, Colorado. She has had successful teaching experience in rural schools, as kindergarten teacher at Greeley and comes to us from a position as supervising teacher at River Falls, Wisconsin.

### VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The following will give members of the Board a picture of the present status of permanent improvements on the campus.

### Williston Hall

The rehabilitation of the toilets will probably not be completed until about January 1. Plumbing fixtures are in short supply and as the building is being occupied, we will permit them to rehabilitate but one toilet room at a time. This will be done as the fixtures arrive. The contractor has assured us that he will complete the project as quickly as possible. There is no definite information relative the completion date of the fireproof stairways. Everything is being done to make the areas ready for the installations. Progress on this work will be dependent upon the delivery of steel.

### Heating Plant

It will be another three months before the work in the heating plant will be completed, but the work has progressed to the point where we can use it. The work that will have to be done to complete the heating plant will not interfere with the operation of the boilers.

### Library

Work on the new library is about four weeks behind schedule at the present time. Delay has been caused by the lack of cement and a delay in the delivery of steel. The contractor feels, however, that unless we have an extremely cold winter, and unless there is a prolonged delay in the arrival of materials, he will have the library completed by September 1, 1951.

### McMurry Laboratory School

The situation at the McMurry Laboratory School is similar to that at Williston Hall in that the completion date is unknown. Steel for the stairways is hard to get, and until the stairways arrive, no completion date can be set.

### Men's Residence Hall

Even though there has been a delay in the preliminary work, the contractor still feels that he will have the building completed by September 1, 1951, to the extent that it can be occupied although there may be some work that will have to be finished after the building is in use.

### Industrial Arts Building

The contract has been let for the rehabilitation of the Industrial Arts Building and the contractor assures us that he will begin work on the project immediately. The firm having this contract is the same firm which has the contract for the fireproofing of both Williston Hall and the McMurry Laboratory School and he will be able to work on the Industrial Arts Building when not working on the fireproofing project.

### Athletic Areas

We have been given every assurance that the athletic areas will be available for our use in the spring of 1951. We are now using a portion of the north campus for football practice and the blacktop surfacing for the volley ball courts and other areas is being installed at the present time.

We are negotiating with the contractor regarding the repair of the new tennis courts which as yet are in an unsatisfactory condition. The fencing for the tennis courts has not yet arrived. The contractor expects to complete the installation, however, this fall. This includes the football field which at the present time is not acceptable because of the weeds growing on it. A baseball field is being constructed at the present time on the north campus athletic area.

#### Placement of 1950 Graduates

Following the general trend, it is interesting to note that of the 354 graduates of the Class of 1950, 63 were elementary school majors, *all* of whom were placed in teaching positions. Our placement bureau received *993* calls for elementary teachers! Of the 291

No report.

high school majors, 118 were placed in high school teaching positions and a number were placed in elementary positions, while still others entered graduate schools, some married, and others are doing other types of work. We are, of course, stressing everywhere possible the urgent need for elementary teachers. This need will be acute for a number of years to come. Approximately one-half of our freshmen this autumn will be majoring in the elementary division.

### Additional Staff

There are still a number of academic positions to be filled that have already been approved by the Board. However, we have been unable to fill them because there has been no one qualified for the positions at the salaries we could offer. For non-academic employees, there are a number of positions that have been certified but we are unable to get them filled through civil service channels.

### MEETING OF STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD

### Eastern Illinois State College

### Charleston, Illinois

#### September 24-25, 1950

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents convened at 7:30 P.M. Sunday evening, September 24, 1950, in the Mary Josephine Booth Library Building. Noble J. Puffer, Chairman of the Board and Director of the Department of Registration and Education, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of July 21, 1950.

Mr. Dunn moved that the minutes of the meeting of July 21, 1950, be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

On the subject of minutes, Mr. Bohrer moved that the Co-ordinator, within ten days after the Teachers College Board has approved the minutes of the prior meeting of this Board, send to the Librarian of each college or university under the Board's jurisdiction six copies of said minutes, which copies shall be kept by said Librarian and made available for the use of any person interested therein. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

### MR. LAWRENCE RINALDO

Mr. Lawrence Rinaldo, General Representative of the Illinois Council of State Employee Local Unions, had requested permission to appear before the Board and present certain changes in the Standard Policy Agreement for the consideration of the Board.

Mr. Rinaldo, together with the local representative of Eastern, appeared before the Board and presented, on behalf of the Illinois Council of State Employee Local Unions, five changes to the existing Standard Policy Agreement.

Each change was discussed individually but briefly, and it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that the requested changes should be discussed more in detail. In view of this, Mr. Bohrer moved that the changes be referred to the Presidents for further consideration, and that they report their combined opinion to the Board at the next meeting, at which time the Board will act on the changes. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Mr. Rinaldo thanked the Board for allowing him to appear before them on behalf of the entire Council, and assured them that the Council would continue to cooperate as they have in the past.

### VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE SITUATION AT I.S.N.U.

In the absence of Secretary Nickell, Chairman Puffer reported that Secretary Nickell had received a letter from the officials at Washington denying Illinois State Normal University the right to train Vocational Agriculture teachers under the Smith-Hughes Act in the light of the report submitted by the Board of Vocational Education. They further advised that if additional data could be furnished, the matter might be reconsidered.

It was the consensus of opinion that the matter should not be dropped entirely at this time.

### CONTRACTS WITH CHANCE S. HILL

At a previous meeting of the Board, the matter of a contract with Chance S. Hill at Eastern Illinois State College for the resurfacing of the tennis courts was discussed, and it was the opinion of the Board

that no further contracts should be entered into with Mr. Hill until the authorities at Eastern are satisfied with the progress and character of the work.

Both Mr. Lanphier and Mr. Gregg made a report on this situation, which has caused so much argument and misunderstanding between interested parties, but regardless of the fact that both Mr. Lanphier and Mr. Gregg stated they felt the work would be completed to the satisfaction of all concerned, the Board unanimously agreed not to sign any pending contracts with Chance S. Hill, at least for the present time.

### ANNUAL REPORTS FROM PRESIDENTS

Chairman Puffer raised the question as to the advisability of each President making an Annual Report, similar to the report made by Dr. Beu.

After a lengthy discussion, Mr. Guin moved that a committee, consisting of the Presidents and two Board Members, confer on the matter of making an Annual Report, and make recommendations to the Board, either before the end of this meeting or at the next Board meeting. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

The Committee appointed consisted of Mr. Guin, Mrs. Pegelow, Dr. Buzzard, Dr. Fairchild, Dr. Beu and Dr. Holmes.

### REPORT OF POLICY COMMITTEE

Dr. Reavis, Chairman of the Committee on Policies, distributed copies of the Committee's Report.

The report was discussed in detail and several changes and additions were made, after which Dr. Reavis moved that the report of the Committee on Policies be adopted by the Board, subject to such editing as would be required to clarify the meaning, and that 1,000 copies be published, in suitable form, including the salary schedule, for distribution to the faculties of the four colleges and universities and for such use as the members of the Board think advisable. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

### REPORT OF SALARY SCHEDULE COMMITTEE

Mr. Guin, Chairman of the Salary Schedule Committee, reported that his committee had met with the Joint Faculty Salary Committee for the purpose of studying the present Salary Schedule and getting the recommendations of the Joint Faculty Salary Committee in order that the Salary Schedule Committee could, in turn, make recommendations to the Teachers College Board.

The recommended Salary Schedule of both the Salary Schedule Committee and the Joint Faculty Salary Committee is as follows:

### A PROPOSAL TO REPLACE SECTION B-5 OF THE PRESENT SALARY SCHEDULE FOR THE FOUR ILLINOIS COLLEGES

For each rank there shall be three blocks, A, B, and C. Increases are automatic for the lower Block C, partially automatic or automatic increments that can be denied for Block B, and on merit for Block A.

Advancement in the last two blocks is to be based upon the judgment of the President and his faculty representatives selected to advise on salaries and promotions.

Increments for those persons in Block A shall be given *only* for reasons agreed upon in individual cases by the President and the faculty representative, and these reasons shall be presented in *writing* to the Teachers College Board.

Considerable discussion ensued, following which Mr. Guin moved that the Board adopt the Salary Schedule as presented by the Salary Schedule Committee, together with the explanatory statements defining the "Block System" used, and subject to adequate appropriations to make the execution of the schedule possible. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

### BUDGETS

Mr. Dunn, Chairman of the Budget Committee of the Teachers College Board, made the following report:

# TO THE MEMBERS OF THE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS:

On Wednesday, September 20, 1950, the members of the Budget Committee of the Teachers College Board met at Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois. The purpose of this meeting was to hear and give consideration to the operating financial budgets of:

- 1. The Teachers College Board
- 2. Eastern Illinois State College
- 3. Illinois State Normal University
- 4. Western Illinois State College
- 5. Northern Illinois State Teachers College

for the biennium July 1, 1951 to July 1, 1953.

In its deliberations, the Committee had the assistance of Board member Joseph F. Bohrer for a part of the committee session.

The budgets were presented by Charles G. Lanphier for the Teachers College Board and by the Presidents of the respective colleges and universities.

The Committee ascertained that in each instance the budget requests had been assembled upon the basis of departmental estimates which in many instances were in turn based upon practical suggestions from architects, engineers and contractors.

In the progress of consideration, each member of the Committee and Mr. Bohrer frequently and fully questioned items appearing in the respective budgets and, at times, such questioning developed constructive suggestions. Changes were recommended and accomplished in each budget presented.

At the close of the Committee session, the final figures disclosed a general increase in each college budget and for the first time presented the Teachers College Board budget as a separate and distinct item from that of the Department of Registration and Education. This change is with the approval of the Director. The increases of the respective budgets based on General Revenue are as follows:

Comparative tables of the proposed budgets with the previous biennium are attached to each.

The respective budgets as revised have been returned to your committee this morning and we attach hereto a copy of each of said budgets. Some changes are still needed.

We hereby recommend the approval of the budget for the Teachers College Board and approval of the budgets for Illinois State Normal University, Western Illinois State College, and Northern Illinois State Teachers College. We further recommend that the budget for Eastern Illinois State College be again referred to the Committee, with power in the Committee to act for the Board at a meeting of the Committee to be held at Bloomington, Illinois, on September 28, 1950.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents convened at 9:00 A.M. Sunday, October 22, 1950, in the Board Room of the Administration Building. Noble J. Puffer, Chairman of the Board and Director of the Department of Registration and Education, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of September 24-25, 1950.

Mr. Dunn moved that the minutes of the meeting of September 24-25, 1950, be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

#### BUDGETS

Chairman Puffer advised that at the last meeting the Board had approved the budgets of the four State Teachers Colleges and the Teachers College Board. However, since that time the Chairman received a letter from Governor Stevenson, copy of which was sent to all Board Members, Presidents and Business Managers, in which he stated, "Word comes to me that the Teachers College Board is considering budget proposals reflecting an increase of more than  $33\frac{1}{3}\%$ , or more than \$3,500,000.00 for operations from general revenue."

The Governor asked that the Teachers College Board re-examine the budgets item by item in an effort to reduce them, and suggested that the Board investigate the possibility of obtaining funds from some other source other than general revenue.

In the light of Governor Stevenson's letter, Dr. Reavis moved that we, as a Board, reconsider the budgets as we adopted them at the last meeting of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried, and the budgets were submitted for reconsideration. Primarily there seemed to be two questions facing the Board: (1) Can these budgets as presented be reduced; and (2) Can we get additional income from some other source.

Chairman Puffer talked about the possibility of increasing the registration fee, student activity fee, cafeteria fees, athletic events, and other additional operations and auxiliary agencies directly under the control of the Teachers College Board.

Dr. Reavis gave a brief report on a study he had made regarding tuition in various state teachers colleges in the midwest. This study indicated that the trend was for an increase in charges.

Each President was asked to give the fees charged at his school. This revealed a difference among the four schools in the fees now being charged, and it was unanimously agreed that such fees should be uniform.

The Presidents then requested permission to study this matter and make a report to the Board on Monday, October 23, 1950.

The matter of capital improvements was also discussed and the Board considered requests for the four teachers colleges under its jurisdiction in the following amounts:

Eastern Illinois State College	.\$3,710,000.00
Illinois State Normal University	.\$5,995,000.00
Western Illinois State College	.\$4,880,000.00
Northern Illinois State Teachers College	.\$4,395,000.00.

This entire day was spent discussing both operating and capital improvement budgets, striving to reduce them, and searching for a means of obtaining additional income. No definite Board action was taken other than referring the matter of increasing fees to the Presidents for further study in an effort to agree upon a uniform rate of fees to be charged and thereby provide additional income.

In view of the fact that the time for submitting budgets is near and the Board is now reconsidering the budgets, and in view of the fact that the next scheduled meeting is not until November 27, Chairman Puffer thought it advisable and recommended that the next meeting be changed to November 18 and 19, 1950.

Following some discussion, Mr. Walker moved that the next meeting of the Board be held on November 18, at 8:00 P.M., and 9:00 A.M., November 19, in the Board Room of the Administration Building on the campus of Illinois State Normal University. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and uanimously carried.

In view of the cornerstone laying ceremonies for the self-liquidating dormitories here at Illinois State Normal University this afternoon at 4:30 P.M., Mr. Dunn moved that the meeting recess until 9:00 A.M. Monday, October 23, 1950. The motion was seconded by Mrs. seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried. The meeting of the Teachers College Board reconvened at 9:00 A.M. Monday, October 23, in the Board Room of the Administration Building. Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

Chairman Puffer read a letter that he had received from E. W. Oglevee regarding the removal of a building to the rear of the Administration Building.

Due to lack of information, Chairman Puffer appointed Mr. Dunn and Mr. Bohrer as a Committee to study this situation and report back to the Board before the end of this meeting.

Chairman Puffer advised that he had several matters on which he thought the Board should have knowledge and perhaps take action; first,

## TRAVEL FOR APPLICANTS

Chairman Puffer read a memorandum which Mr. Lanphier had sent to all Board Members, Presidents and Business Managers some time ago regarding this matter of travel allowances to applicants for faculty positions.

After some discussion, it was the consensus of opinion that this matter be definitely stated in the minutes. Mr. Wirtz moved "that when an applicant for a position goes to the college for an interview, at the request of the college, and later is not employed by the college, the applicant's travel expense will be paid by the college. If an application is made voluntarily and not at the request of the college, the college is in no way obligated for any travel expense. If an applicant, application made voluntarily or at the request of the college, is employed, no travel expense is allowed." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried; secondly,

### EMPLOYEES ON SELF-LIQUIDATING PROJECTS

Chairman Puffer felt that the letter which Dr. Fairchild had written Mr. Lanphier, regarding employees on self-liquidating projects, should be called to the attention of the Board. This matter was discussed thoroughly and Dr. Fairchild was asked for his comments.

Dr. Fairchild pointed out that on self-liquidating projects the Board independently took care of all matters except the employment of personnel, and it was Dr. Fairchild's opinion that the Board should follow this same line of procedure for the employment of personnel, rather than having to go through regular channels, as they do for other non-academic employees.

The question seemed to be whether the act authorizing "selfliquidating projects" also authorized the Teachers College Board to employ personnel to maintain these projects.

The reason for raising this question is due to the fact that at Northern, where a self-liquidating project is now in operation, this same question was raised as to the employment of personnel: Can the Teachers College authorities employ personnel directly, or do they have to go through regular channels and be subject to Civil Service?

At that time the matter was taken up with the Civil Service Commission officials, and they advised they had talked the matter over with the Attorney General, who had given a verbal opinion that employees on the payroll from this particular Bond Issue would be subject to Civil Service.

In view of the foregoing, Chairman Puffer appointed Mr. Dunn and Mr. Bohrer as a Committee to study the act authorizing selfliquidating projects and write their opinion to the Chairman, who, in turn, will request the Attorney General for his opinion regarding same. At a previous meeting, Mr. Rinaldo had questioned the dismissal of one Mr. Theodore Myers at Eastern Illinois State College. At that time Dr. Buzzard had been requested to report to the Board the reasons for and the procedure followed in this dismissal.

Chairman Puffer now advised he had had a report from Dr. Buzzard on this situation, and after reading Dr. Buzzard's report, was of the opinion that this matter had been settled properly and according to usual procedure.

## ILLINOIS COUNCIL OF STATE EMPLOYEE LOCAL UNIONS

At a previous meeting, Mr. Rinaldo had appeared before the Board on behalf of the Illinois Council of State Employee Local Unions with five suggested changes in the Standard Policy Agreement. At that time the Board referred the matter to the Presidents for their consideration and they were to report their combined opinions at this meeting.

The Presidents' report was as follows :

1. Mandatory certification of all new personnel classified in noncompetitive positions, according to procedure prescribed by the Civil Service Commission. All employees now holding noncompetitive classifications to be certified immediately.

They agree with this except that immediate certification cannot be made until the end of a six months' probational period in accordance with Civil Service regulations.

2. Student payroll funds shall be used only for employment and assistance of students enrolled in the school where funds are available.

The committee (Presidents) does not agree with this because they think that the student payrolls should be used to the best interests of the college and should not be restricted, other than to students who are or have been during the current year enrolled in the college. During the summer, the teachers colleges should be allowed to use student payrolls for persons who have been or are prospective students, and agree that employment should be given to people who are bona fide students.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Bohrer moved that student payroll funds shall be used only for employment and assistance of students, where funds are available, who are, or have been within the preceding six months, enrolled in the school, or who have applied for enrollment in said school. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

3. The Employer-Employee Relations Board, as described in the Standard Policy, shall meet at least once each month to consider business as outlined in the Standard Policy.

It was the intention, in setting up these Employer-Employee Relations Boards, that they meet at the call of any member of the

Board rather than have a regularly scheduled meeting. However, if monthly meetings are desired, they agree that such meetings are acceptable.

Following a discussion, Dr. Reavis moved that the Employer-Employee Relations Board, as described in the Standard Policy, shall meet at least once each month to consider business as outlined in the Standard Policy for a trial period of one year. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

4. Non-academic employee covered by the Standard Policy shall receive not less than \$10.00 per month increase in salary for each fiscal year, or major portion thereof, until the maximum salary of that classification is reached.

The Presidents agreed with this provided budget requests carrying this item as the *regular union increment agreement* are provided for.

Mrs. Pegelow moved that non-academic employees covered by the Standard Policy shall receive not less than \$10.00 per month increase in salary for each fiscal year, or major portion thereof, until the maximum salary of that classification is reached, provided budget requests carrying this item as the *regular union increment agreement*, are provided for. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

5. Time and one-half shall be accrued for all employees covered by the Standard Policy for all time over 8 hours per day and 5 consecutive work days per week.

This request was not approved, because the teachers colleges already provide for any over-time by additional vacation or time off, and the 5 consecutive work days works a hardship, particularly in our offices.

Considerable discussion followed, after which Mr. Wirtz moved that time and one-half shall be accrued for all employees covered by the Standard Policy for all time over 8 hours in any one day or 40 hours in any one week, but the Board feels that we cannot agree to the request of 5 consecutive work days per week. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the Chairman be authorized to write a letter to Mr. Rinaldo based upon the action of the Board and using the motions made by the Board and the interpretation of Item No. 1. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

## RESIDENCE HALLS—EASTERN ILLINOIS STATE COLLEGE

Prior to the opening of sealed bids for the purchase of \$400,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, the bonding company requested that the Board approve the report of the Fiscal Agents dated October 6, 1950. Mr. Bohrer moved that the following report of the Fiscal Agents, dated October 6, 1950, concerning the proposed issue of \$400,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, for Eastern Illinois State College, be accepted and approved and placed on file with the Secretary.

The following revised report sets out the estimated cost and the estimated revenues available to retire \$400,000 Revenue Bonds, the proceeds of which will be used, together with part of an appropriation by the State Legislature, to construct two Student Residence Halls on the campus of Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois.

The estimated cost of construction is based on actual bids let in the amount of \$1,017,995, plus an allowance for landscaping and an allowance for lounge and dining hall furniture. Estimated income and operating expense are based on figures arrived at through consultation with officials of Eastern Illinois State College.

It will be noted that a somewhat greater amount of the State appropriation will be required than previously estimated due to an increase in construction costs.

#### The Teachers College Board

The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois was organized pursuant to Chapter 127 of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is comprised of nine members appointed by the Governor. The Director of Registration and Education of the State of Illinois is ex-officio Chairman of the Board and the Superintendent of Public Instruction is the ex-officio Secretary. Under the control of this Board are the four Teachers Colleges of the State of Illinois: Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois; Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois; Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois; and Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois.

### Eastern Illinois State College

Eastern Illinois State College is located about 200 miles south of Chicago at Charleston, Illinois, a city of approximately 10,000 people. The College was established in 1895 by an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois in order to provide the southeastern section of the State with a State Teachers College. It is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and has full standing as a college in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and is a member of the Illinois Inter-collegiate Athletic Conference. The enrollment for the fall quarter of 1950 was 1,369, of which 836 were men and 533 women. The faculty and administrative staff consists of 150 members and there are 60 nonacademic employees.

The campus consists of 155 acres. Buildings and equipment were valued at \$4,144,196 as of June 30, 1949. In addition, there were unexpended appropriations for an additional plant of \$1,137,335, making a total investment at the College of \$5,281,531. A new library was recently completed at a cost of approximately \$2,000,000.

The College is supported by State appropriations and no tuition is charged. There is a Registration Fee of \$10 per quarter; a Student Activities Fee of \$10 per quarter; and a Book Rental Fee of \$5 per quarter, which provides students with basic textbooks.

#### Purpose of Bond Issue

The proceeds of these \$400,000 bonds, together with part of an appropriation by the State Legislature of \$1,000,000 are being used to construct two new residence halls, complete with kitchen and dining facilities. Each of the new residence halls will accommodate 156 students. Construction contracts have been received and completion bonds posted. The cost of the project is as follows:

*Notes:-* (1) Includes Wardrobes, Beds, Dresser-Desks, Chairs, Mattresses, etc. (2) The State Legislature has appropriated \$1,000,000 for Student Residence Halls at Eastern Illinois State College. It is expected that only \$764,805 of the appropriation will be required, together with the proceeds of this issue of bonds, to construct the halls. The balance of \$235,195 will be returned to the State Treasury. This balance is available for contingencies in connection with this project.

### Legal Authority and Security

These bonds will constitute a first lien upon the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the two student residence halls to be constructed from the proceeds of this issue, together with a State appropriation, and will be issued by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraving the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings. payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof. and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947, by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to a resolution to be adopted by The Teachers College Board.

The Teachers College Board will covenant to continuously operate said buildings and the facilities connected therewith at all times when the College is in session to their full physical capacity before using any other facilities for student residence purposes; to adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of said buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said facilities; to provide an Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay principal of and interest on said bonds as the same mature; to provide and maintain a Depreciation Account of \$22,500; and to provide and maintain a Bond Reserve Account of \$22,500; and that it will collect, account for and apply the revenues in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution authorizing this issue of bonds.

#### New Residence Halls

The two new residence halls, designed by Schaeffer, Hooton, and Wilson, Architects, Bloomington, Illinois, in consultation with the office of C. Herrick Hammond, Architect for the State of Illinois, will be of brick construction and located on the campus west of 4th Street and south of Grant Street. Each hall, one for men and one for women, will house 156 students and a director. Complete dining facilities are located between the buildings. Construction contracts provide that the halls will be completed by February 15, 1952. However, little occupancy or revenue is expected until the summer session of 1952. The halls will probably not be filled until the fall term of 1952.

#### Rates

Initial rates for board and room at the new residence halls will be \$13.25 per week. Present rates at Pemberton Hall, the existing dormitory, are \$11.00 to \$11.50 per week. The revenues of Pemberton Hall are not pledged to this issue.

In the absence of Secretary Nickell, Chairman Puffer recommended that Mr. Wirtz preside as Acting Secretary for the opening of sealed bids for the purchase of \$400,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds for Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston.

Mr. Guin moved that Mr. Wirtz be appointed as Acting Secretary in the absence of Mr. Nickell. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

At exactly 1:30 P.M., Acting Secretary Wirtz advised that the sealed bids for the purchase of \$400,000.00 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds were in his hands and ready to be opened.

Dr. Fairchild interrupted the meeting to advise that a representative of John S. Nuveen & Co. was calling on the telephone advising he was 10 miles outside the city, had had car trouble and requested that

the opening of the bids be delayed so that he could arrive late and present his bid. The Board requested Mr. Lanphier to talk to the gentleman and advise him that as much as the Board would like to comply with his request, it would be illegal for them to delay the opening of bids, inasmuch as there were other bidders who had no representative here who would have to give their consent to such a delay. Since there were no representatives present representing some of the bids, it would not be possible to get their consent and enable the Board to delay the opening of the bids.

Mr. Wirtz, Acting Secretary, announced he had received four (4) bids for the purchase of \$400,000 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, for Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois. Whereupon the said bids were opened and ready and were as follows:

RESOLUTION authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$400,000 of The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, for the purpose of providing funds necessary to construct two additional student residence halls, fixing the date of maturities, form and other details of said bonds, and making covenants and provisions for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

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WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, upon due consideration and investigation does now find and determine that it is advisable and necessary that two additional new student residence halls complete with kitchen and dining hall facilities and all equipment necessary therefor be constructed in and for said Eastern Illinois State College on the campus of said College west of 4th Street and south of Grant Street; and

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board has heretofore caused to be prepared plans and specifications for the construction of said two student residence halls, and has heretofore adopted plans and specifications therefor which now remain on file in the office of the Secretary of The Teachers College Board; and

WHEREAS, this Board does now further find and determine that the cost of construction of said two additional student residence halls, including all necessary equipment and furnishings therefor and all necessary costs and expenses incurred in the construction thereof is the sum of \$1,164,805 in accordance with contracts heretofore let; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 59a through 59e of Chapter 127 of the Illinois Revised Statutes 1949 and all other laws thereunto enabling, The Teachers College Board is authorized to issue revenue bonds for and on behalf of the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, for the purpose of paying the cost of construction of two new student residence halls, and to pledge the revenue derived from the use of said buildings and facilities; and

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board does hereby determine that it is advisable and necessary that revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$400,000 be issued to pay part of the cost of construction of said two new student residence halls, the balance to be payable from an appropriation made by the General Assembly under an Act entitled "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent and distributive expenses of State government," approved July 21, 1949;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be constructed two additional new student residence halls complete with kitchen and dining hall facilities and all equipment necessary therefor, in and for said Eastern Illinois State College on the campus of said College west of 4th Street and south of Grant Street, all in accordance with plans and specifications therefor heretofore approved by The Teachers College Board for said Eastern Illinois State College and now on file in the office of the Secretary of this Board, and in accordance with contracts let therefor.

Section 2. That for the purpose of providing funds in the amount of \$400,000 to pay part of the cost of the construction of two new student residence halls, as hereinabove provided, there shall be and there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued revenue bonds of said College in the principal amount of \$400,000. The said revenue bonds shall bear date of November 1, 1950, shall be numbered from 1 through 400, shall be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, bonds numbered 1 through 276, shall bear interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum, and bonds numbered 277 through 400, shall bear interest at the rate of two and three-fourths per cent (23/4%) per annum, payable June 1, 1951, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of December and June of each year and until the principal thereof shall have been paid, and said bonds shall mature on December 1 of each of the years and in amounts as follows:

provided, however, that bonds numbered 56 through 400, shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date at the option of The Teachers College Board for said Eastern Illinois State College on or after December 1, 1960, and up to and including June 1, 1965, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1965, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1970, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, if redeemed on December 1, 1970, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including June 1, 1975, at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof, and if redeemed on December 1, 1975 or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, at par and accrued interest.

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Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and such notice of redemption shall with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of said bonds, and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

That such bonds and coupons shall be payable to bearer, provided, however, that such bonds may be subject to registration as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder thereof on the books of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar of said bonds for the said The Teachers College Board, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said State Treasurer and thereafter the principal of such bonds shall be payable only to the registered holder, his legal representative or assigns. Such registered bonds shall be transferred to another registered holder or back to bearer only upon presentation to the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or approved. Registration of any such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely.

Section 3. Both principal of and interest on such revenue bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois.

Section 4. That said bonds shall be executed for and on behalf of the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois by the Chairman of The Teachers College Board and attested by the Secretary thereof under the seal of said Board, and shall be registered and countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officials, who by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons. That said revenue bonds shall be designated "Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" of the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, and shall be in substantially the following form :

thereof; and if redeemed on December 1, 1975 or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, at par and accrued interest.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond and the series of which it forms a part are all of like date, tenor and effect, except as to rate of interest, date of maturity and provision for redemption prior to maturity, authorized by The Teachers College Board for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, and issued to provide funds to pay part of the construction of two new student residence halls, and are issued under and pursuant to the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947.

This bond is payable solely, both as to principal and interest, from the revenues derived from the operation of the buildings and facilities constructed with the proceeds of this bond issue and other funds to be made available therefor, and the income and revenue derived from the operation of said buildings and facilities shall be paid over from time to time to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and be held by him as a special fund known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois."

However, The Teachers College Board covenants and agrees with each and every holder of said bonds that it will apply the proceeds thereof to the purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued; that it will continuously operate the said buildings and facilities constructed in part with the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds at all times when the said College is in session; that it will adopt such rules and regulations for the use of such buildings and facilities and will fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of such buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said buildings and facilities and to pay the principal of and interest on this bond and the issue of which it forms a part as the same become due, all in accordance with and as provided for in the resolution pursuant to which this bond is issued and as adopted by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, on the 23rd day of October, 1950.

This bond may be registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of The Teachers College Board in the office of the State Treasurer of the State of Illinois as Registrar for said Board, such registration to be evidenced by notation of said Treasurer on the back hereof, after which no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on said books and similarly noted hereon, but it may be discharged from such registration by being transferred to bearer, after which it shall be transferred by delivery, but it may be again registered as before. Section 5. That from and after the issuance of the bonds herein provided for the buildings and facilities to be constructed with the proceeds derived from the sale of these bonds shall be operated on a fiscal year basis beginning on the first day of July and ending on the 30th day of June in each succeeding year, and from and after the issuance of said revenue bonds all of the gross income and revenue derived from fees and charges collected for the use of said buildings and facilities shall within three days after receipt thereof be paid to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois and shall be set aside by him in a special fund hereby created to be known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois," and said fund shall be used only for the following purposes:

(1) On the first day of each calendar month the said Treasurer shall credit on his books from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, to a separate and special account hereby created and designated the "Operation and Maintenance Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" such a sum of money as may be directed by order of The Teachers College Board sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining the aforesaid buildings and facilities for said calendar month, including adequate provision for insurance and any fees due The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, as paying agent on the bonds herein authorized, and the money so credited shall be used for such purposes and no other. If, in any month for any reason, there shall not be available an amount equal to the amount required for the payment of the expenses hereinabove referred to, then an amount of revenue equal to any such deficiency shall be added to the amount of revenue otherwise required to be paid into the said Operation and Maintenance Account in the next succeeding calendar month or months and shall be paid with the payment then to be made.

(2) On the first day of each month, and after making the credit provided for in paragraph 1 first above, the Treasurer shall then credit on his books from the balance in the said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, to a special account hereby created and designated "Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" a sum of money equal to 1/6th of the interest then next due and 1/12th of the principal then next due on the bonds herein directed to be issued, and the said Treasurer shall be and is hereby authorized and directed without any further subsequent order of The Teachers College Board to remit on or before the 15th day prior to the first day of June and prior to the first day of December, to The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, the place of payment designated in said bonds and the interest coupons appertaining thereto, the amount of principal and interest due on said dates, respectively. Funds credited to the said Interest and Sinking Fund Account above referred to shall be used solely and only for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same become due, or are called for redemption as in this resolution provided. Said Treasurer shall make no further remittances to the said bank after there shall have been so remitted a sufficient amount to pay all of the bonds then outstanding and all of the interest thereon to maturity, or, to the date upon which such outstanding bonds may then have been called for prior redemption in their entirety.

(3) On or before the 10th day of June and the 10th day of December in each year, after making the monthly deposits provided for in paragraphs 1 and 2 hereinabove, and so long as the accounts

created in said paragraphs 1 and 2 contain funds sufficient to meet the requirements specified in said paragraphs 1 and 2 as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall credit on his books from the balance in said The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois to a separate and special account hereby created to be designated "Depreciation Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950," the sum of \$2,250 until there shall have been accumulated in said Depreciation Account the sum of \$22,500 at which figure the Depreciation Account shall thereafter be maintained by subsequent deposits from The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, subject to the limitations hereinabove provided. The funds in said Depreciation Account shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the cost of any extraordinary repairs, upkeep and replacements in, on or about the aforesaid buildings and facilities, except that the funds held in said Depreciation Account to the extent necessary to prevent or remedy a default in the payment of the interest on or principal of the bonds herein authorized shall be used and held for use for that purpose and shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950 and whenever such a transfer is made, the amount so transferred shall be added to the next deposit to be made, and thereafter, until full reimbursement to said Depreciation Account has been made.

(4) On or before the 10th day of June and the 10th day of December in each year, and after making the deposits provided for in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above, and subject to all provisions therein specified for the maintenance of said deposits, the said Treasurer shall credit to a separate and special account hereby created and designated as the "Bond Reserve Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" the sum of \$2,250 until such time as there has been accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account the sum of \$22,500 at which figure the said Bond Reserve Account shall thereafter be maintained and which shall be used by said Treasurer from time to time in the payment of interest on or principal of the said revenue bonds hereby authorized, whenever there exists a deficiency in the amount of money on hand in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account necessary to pay maturing principal or interest after application of all funds available for that purpose under any provisions of this resolution. Funds accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account may be invested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois in bonds of the United States or fully guaranteed by the United States.

(5) Any funds remaining after all the above deposits shall have been made shall be used to pay principal and interest on any bonds

issued the pledge of which is subordinate to the bonds authorized by this resolution or to call and redeem bonds prior to maturity.

Section 7. That The Teachers College Board for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, acting under and by authority of the aforesaid Act, hereby expressly covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein directed to be issued as follows:

That as long as the bonds herein authorized to be issued (1)shall remain outstanding and unpaid, it will continuously operate and maintain the said buildings and facilities constructed with the proceeds derived from the issue of said bonds at all times when the said College is in session to their full physical capacity before using any other buildings and facilities for student residence purposes, that it will adopt such regulations and fix and maintain such reasonable rates and charges for the use of said buildings and facilities as will provide revenues sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining said buildings and facilities; to provide and maintain the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account in an amount adequate promptly to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds as the same matures; to provide for the aforesaid Depreciation Account; and to provide the aforesaid Bond Reserve Account; and that it will collect, account for and apply the aforesaid revenues in accordance with and as provided for in this resolution.

(2) That it will not voluntarily create or cause to be created any debt, lien, charge or encumbrance having priority to or parity with the pledge of the bonds issued under this resolution upon any of said revenues, and that it will not sell, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of or encumber said buildings and facilities, or any part thereof, during the time when any bonds issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid.

(3) That as long as any of the bonds issued hereunder remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest or both, it will at all times exercise all of its lawful powers to preserve and protect the security of the bonds and the rights of the bondholders under this resolution.

(4) That as long as any of said bonds authorized to be issued hereunder shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, The Teachers College Board for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, shall maintain insurance on said buildings and facilities and all parts thereof, including all furniture and equipment therein, against loss or damage by fire or windstorm in an amount not less than the full insurable value of said buildings and facilities or the amount of outstanding bonds, whichever is less. Such insurance policy or policies shall be payable to The Teachers College Board for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, and all moneys collected on account of loss or damage covered by any such policy or policies of insurance shall be

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held in trust and shall be used only for reconstruction, replacements or repairs. In the event said funds are insufficient to restore said buildings and facilities to their former condition then said funds shall be paid into the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, and held for the benefit of the bondholders as their interests may appear. The said The Teachers College Board shall also carry adequate insurance against the loss of use and occupancy of said buildings and facilities from any or all risks or from any cause whatsoever in an amount not less than the highest amount due for principal of and interest on all the outstanding bonds payable from the revenues thereof in any year covered by the term of such policies. Any sum received from any such use and occupancy insurance, after deducting necessary operation and maintenance charges under economical management during the period of such loss of use and occupancy, shall be paid into the aforesaid Interest and Sinking Fund Account. All of the said insurance shall be carried in a responsible insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Illinois, and the cost thereof shall be deemed to be a maintenance and operation cost.

That The Teachers College Board for the Eastern Illinois (5)State College at Charleston, Illinois, shall cause to be kept proper books of records and accounts separate and apart from all other records and accounts in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the cost of constructing, equipping and furnishing the aforesaid buildings and facilities, the expenditures for maintaining, operating and repairing the said buildings and facilities, and all revenues collected therefrom, which said records shall be kept and shall be available for the information of all persons interested; and that there shall be furnished to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than thirty days after the close of each calendar month, complete operating and income statements of said buildings and facilities connected therewith, in reasonable detail, covering such monthly period; and that there shall also be furnished to the orginal purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, a complete financial statement of the undertaking, in reasonable detail, covering such fiscal year, signed by the Secretary and certified by independent auditors, who shall be certified public accountants.

(6) That at all times while any of the said bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board shall employ or make provision for the employment of some suitable person or persons to supervise the operation and maintenance of said buildings and facilities connected therewith, and such other persons as may be necessary for the proper and efficient operation, management and maintenance thereof.

The cost of such services shall be included as other costs of operating and maintaining said buildings and facilities and shall be payable in like manner.

(7) That while any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest, or both, the aforesaid The Teachers College Board will not issue any additional bonds or incur any other indebtedness, payable from the revenues of said buildings and facilities, unless the pledge of such additional bonds on the said revenues shall be made junior and subordinate in all respects to the pledge of the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder, including the Bond Reserve Account, as provided by subsection 4 of Section 6 of the resolution.

(8) That the Teachers College Board for Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, will faithfully and punctually perform or cause to be performed all of the duties and obligations with reference to the said buildings and facilities as are required by the provisions of this resolution and the statutes under which the said bonds are issued, including the construction, equipment and furnishing of the aforesaid buildings and facilities and the operation and maintenance of said buildings and facilities, as herein provided, the making and collecting of reasonable and sufficient fees and charges for the use thereof, the segregation of the income and revenues therefrom to the respective accounts created under the provisions of this resolution, and the proper application of said accounts.

Section 8. Any holder of any bond or bonds issued hereunder, or of any coupons representing interest accrued thereon, may either by proper court action or in law or in equity compel The Teachers College Board to perform all duties imposed upon it under the provisions of this resolution and under the provisions of the statute hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of the bonds as herein provided, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates and charges for the use of such buildings and facilities connected therewith, and also to enforce the performance of any and all covenants made by the said The Teachers College Board in and by this resolution.

Section 9. That the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the income and revenue derived from the collection of fees and charges for the use of the aforesaid buildings and facilities connected therewith, or with respect to the pledge of the revenue to be derived from the operation of said buildings or facilities.

Section 10. That the proceeds derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds hereby provided for shall be applied as follows:

(1) The entire proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to the purchaser thereof shall be deposited immediately with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois pursuant to the terms of the Act hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of said bonds.

(2) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the State of Illinois to set aside the amount of accrued interest received upon the sale and delivery of said bonds to said purchaser in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Resident Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, hereinabove provided for, together with the sum of \$23,380 received from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, being the amount estimated necessary to pay interest on said bonds during the period of construc-The remainder of the proceeds of said bonds shall be set aside tion. in a separate special account by said Treasurer to be designated "Student Residence Halls Construction Account of 1950 for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois," and shall be applied to the cost of constructing, equipping and furnishing the said buildings and facilities to be constructed through the issuance of the bonds hereby authorized, and funds made available from said appropriation under an Act entitled "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent and distributive expenses of State government," approved July 21, 1949, all as hereinbefore provided; provided, however, that any surplus remaining in such account upon completion of the construction, equipment, furnishing and improving of said buildings and facilities shall be transferred and credited to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, as hereinabove provided for.

Section 11. That the provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between The Teachers College Board for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and each of them, and the said The Teachers College Board hereby pledges its good faith to the performance of each and every covenant hereof.

Section 12. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this resolution or of the bonds or interest coupons herein prescribed shall either be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jursidiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision shall not have been contained therein.

Section 13. That the Chairman and Secretary of The Teachers College Board and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois shall be and they are hereby fully authorized and directed to do all things which may be necessary to effect the preparation, execution and delivery of the bonds herein authorized to be issued to the purchaser thereof, namely, Barcus, Kindred & Company, and J. T. Swartz & Co., Inc., at a price heretofore agreed upon, the same being not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery, all in accordance with their

proposal for the purchase thereof which is hereby accepted and approved.

Section 14. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

Mr. Guin moved the adoption of the resolution establishing charges for the use of and for the service supplied by two additional new student residence halls to be constructed at the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois.

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, has heretofore by resolution duly adopted on October 23, 1950, provided for the issuance of \$400,000 Revenue Bonds to defray the cost of construction of two additional new student residence halls on the campus of said College pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of "An Act to authorize The Teachers College Board to acquire, build, purchase or otherwise construct, equip, complete, remodel, operate, control and manage student residence halls, dormitories, dining halls, student union buildings, field houses, stadiums and other revenue-producing buildings, including sites therefor, for the State Teachers Colleges and State Normal Universities, defining the duties of said The Teachers College Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charging rates or fees for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived

from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 8, 1947; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Act above referred to and said resolution heretofore passed authorizing such construction and the issuance of said bonds it is necessary that The Teachers College Board establish charges for the use of such buildings;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be and there is hereby established a charge of \$13.25 per occupant per week for the use of and for the service supplied, including board and room, by two new student residence halls to be constructed on the campus of Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois.

Section 2. Said charge shall be payable not less than one week in advance.

Section 3. It is hereby made a duty of the Business Manager of the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois to collect all monies due under the provisions hereof.

Section 4. All revenues and monies derived from the operation of the two additional new student residence halls to be constructed, shall be held by the Business Manager separately and apart from all other funds of the College and all of said sums without any deductions whatsoever shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois not more than three days after receipt of the same.

Section 5. Before the Business Manager shall enter upon his duties with respect to the collection of charges and before he shall receive any funds derived from the operation of the two additional new student residence halls to be constructed, he shall be required to post a corporate surety bond in an amount equal to the amount likely to come into his hands at any time, which bond shall be approved by The Teachers College Board, and filed with the Secretary of said Board, and shall be conditioned upon his faithful performance of his duties as required under this resolution and his accounting for all monies coming into his hands.

Mr. Means moved the adoption of the resolution authorizing and directing the State Treasurer to execute a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$50,000.00.

BE IT RESOLVED by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for the Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, that the Treasurer of the State of Illinois be authorized and directed to execute a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$50,000 to protect the "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1950 for the

Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois" provided for in the resolution authorizing the issue of \$400,000 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950, adopted by this Board on October 23, 1950, payment for the premiums of said surety bond to be payable from the "Operation and Maintenance Account, Eastern Illinois State College at Charleston, Illinois, Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds, Series of 1950" of said Fund.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Following more discussion, Mr. Wirtz moved that the foregoing schedule of suggested fees be effective in all four colleges under the jurisdiction of the Teachers College Board as of July 1, 1951. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

#### NORTHERN-WATER MAIN

The matter of installing a new water main across a portion of the campus was the next item discussed.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Dunn moved that we authorize the granting of a right of way to the City of DeKalb for the purpose of constructing across the proposed property a water main, and that

the consideration for granting the right of way be the convenience that it is going to be to the college to get the water. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

### **BUDGETS**—OPERATING

In the light of the Presidents' report and the Board's action with regard to the suggested fees as recommended and agreed upon by the Presidents, Mr. Dunn moved that the Teachers College Board ask the President and his Advisory Committee of each college under the jurisdiction of the Teachers College Board to redraft their operating budget for the next biennium in the light of changes which will be reflected in the Income Fund and in the light of the request to eliminate any general ten percent increase of non-academic employees, and after they have, in each instance, satisfied themselves that each of these budgets is in final form to present to the Budgetary Commission, that they then be brought to this Board for formal presentation before final transmission to the Budgetary Commission. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

### BUDGETS—PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT

Yesterday permanent improvement budgets, as well as operating budgets, were discussed.

In reviewing the permanent improvement budgets, it was noted that three of the schools had a request for a Laboratory School, and due to the wide variance in the cost of this type of building, considerable discussion followed.

In the course of the discussion, it was learned that in surrounding areas there were schools, such as the type here requested, which had been constructed for considerably less money than the figures here submitted, and it was recommended that the Presidents interested in this type of construction should make it a point to visit said schools, in an effort to get data on the cost of such schools.

Following along this same line, it was recommended that Dr. Beu, who has requested the construction of a Science Building, visit various college campuses, in order to get comparable figures for a Science Building.

In the light of the foregoing discussion, Mr. Walker moved that Dr. Fairchild, Dr. Buzzard and Dr. Holmes make a further study on the Laboratory School situation and Dr. Beu make a study on the Science Building situation by making surveys of various campuses already provided with these requested types of buildings and report their findings at the next meeting of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guin and unanimously carried.

### MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

Mr. Dunn advised that he and Mr. Bohrer were ready to report on the matter that had been referred to them earlier today with regard to the letter from E. W. Oglevee, and moved that the Teachers College Board take all necessary action to terminate any current lease with the Illinois Power and Light Company for what is now known as the Station Store property, and that in keeping with the terms of the current lease, notify the Power Company to move the improvement from the grounds, and that no renewal of this lease be entered into. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Since three were no controversial matters in the report, Mr. Dunn moved that the report be placed on file and that the requests for approval set out in the summary be approved. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT ON ILLINOIS STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY

Dr. Fairchild presented his President's Report on Illinois State Normal University.

Since there were no controversial matters in the report, Mr. Dunn that the report be approved and placed on file. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

## MEETING OF STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD

## Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois

## Board Room—Administration Building

## November 18-19, 1950

The scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college Presidents convened at 8:00 P.M. Saturday, November 18, 1950, in the Board Room of the Administration Building on the campus of Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois. Noble J. Puffer, Chairman of the Board and Director of the Department of Registration and Education, presided.

Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken:

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of October 22-23, 1950.

Mr. Wirtz advised that the motion he made in the fourth paragraph on Page 9 needed some clarification and moved that it be changed to read as follows:

"Considerable discussion followed, after which Mr. Wirtz moved that time and one-half working credit shall be accrued for all employees covered by the Standard Policy, etc."

The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Mr. Bohrer then moved that the minutes be approved as amended. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis, unanimously carried, and the minutes stand approved as amended.

## INTERNATIONAL UNION OF OPERATING ENGINEERS

Chairman Puffer advised that he had received a telegram from William A. Beitz, Business Representative of the International Union of Operating Engineers, Local No. 8, asking permission to appear before the Board on behalf of the members of Local No. 8 for the purpose of seeking an increase in salaries for them.

Mr. Beitz presented a letter which in substance requested that provision be made in the budget for a straight increase of 15%, and also adjustments in classification.

Chairman Puffer informed Mr. Beitz that there is a division in the state organization known as Position Classification, which is a division of Civil Service. Under this system an applicant must meet certain requirements as set forth by Civil Service before he can be classified to any position. For example, if a man is now classified as a Stationary Fireman and is desirous of becoming a Stationary Engineer, it will be necessary that he meet particular requirements that will qualify him for that position.

Salaries, Chairman Puffer advised, are similarly controlled. That is, there is a minimum and a maximum for each classification as set by the legislature. The only way these minima and maxima can be changed is by legislative action. Consequently, if a man is classified as a Stationary Fireman and is paid the maximum salary in that classification, the only way he can receive an increase in salary is by either having his classification changed, or by legislative action extending the maximum in his particular classification.

Mr. Beitz advised that inasmuch as he was comparatively new on this job he did not realize the condition that existed with regard to salaries and classifications and was grateful to the Board for enlightening him on these matters.

Mr. Beitz thanked the Board for allowing him this time to appear before them, and assured them of his and his organization's cooperation.

Mr. Means moved that the letter presented by Mr. Beitz be received and placed on file. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow and unanimously carried.

## PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR PROJECTS

The procedure of the Division of Architecture and Engineering for many years has been not to submit plans and specifications of a project to the state agency having a project constructed.

The Board previously discussed this idea of having plans and specifications for any project submitted to them for review and were of the opinion that such a procedure should be followed. In view of previous discussions, Chairman Puffer advised that he had had a letter prepared to the State Architect requesting that in the future plans and specifications be presented to the Board prior to advertising for bids on the project.

Mr. Nickell moved that the letter presented by the Chairman to the State Architect requesting that two sets of plans and specifications be submitted to the Board prior to advertising for bids on any project be forwarded and that a copy of the letter be inserted in the minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means and unanimously carried.

### The letter is as follows:

"November 21, 1950"

"Mr. C. Herrick Hammond Supervising Architect Division of Architecture and Engineering Armory Building Springfield, Illinois

# "Dear Mr. Hammond :

"For years past I understand it has been the practice of the Division of Architecture and Engineering not to submit plans and specifications of a project to the university or college for which the project is intended, or to the Teachers College Board prior to advertising for bids on the project.

"It is the opinion of the Presidents of the four universities and colleges under the supervision of the Teachers College Board, and also the opinion of the Teachers College Board that it would be desirable to have plans and specifications submitted by the Division of Architecture and Engineering so that the officials of the university or college for whom the proposed project is intended should have an opportunity to check such plans and specifications and make recommendations to the Teachers College Board, who would, in turn, advise the Division of Architecture and Engineering the action wanted taken.

"In view of this the Teachers College Board requests that from now on two sets of plans and specifications are submitted to the Chairman of the Teachers College Board for any and all projects, and the Chairman will see to it that one set is forwarded to the university or college for checking and comment.

"I hope very much that this request meets with your approval and that you will see that arrangements are made that will enable both the Division of Architecture and Engineering and the Teachers College Board to follow the policy just outlined.

## DISTRIBUTION OF "GOVERNING POLICIES, ETC."

Dr. Reavis, Chairman of the Committee on Policies, advised that now that the printed copy of the report, "Governing Policies for the Organization and Administration of the State Teachers Colleges in Illinois," had been received he had been asked about the distribution of these copies. In view of this Dr. Reavis moved that we begin our distribution by asking the Presidents to distribute copies to the

members of their present faculties and also to new members of their faculties as they are employed. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickell and unanimously carried.

## LORADO TAFT PROJECT

Considerable correspondence as well as numerous discussions have been carried on with interested parties, namely Governor Stevenson, Attorney General Elliott, Director Puffer, Director Casey, Dr. Holmes, and Mr. Lanphier, regarding the acquisition of this area.

Dr. Holmes advised that they were not requesting any appropriation at this time, but merely the authority to have necessary legislation introduced in the 67th General Assembly for the transfer of this property from one State agency to another State agency.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the Teachers College Board request the legislature to enact appropriate legislation to transfer the title of the Lorado Taft area from the State of Illinois for the Department of Public Works and Buildings to the State of Illinois for the Northern Illinois State Teachers College. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and unanimously carried.

Mr. Wirtz next moved that the Secretary shall keep a file supplementary to the statements of policies, and after each Board meeting shall include in this file a record of any action which can be construed as stating or setting forth a policy. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis and unanimously carried.

Mr. Walker moved that the meeting recess until 9:00 A.M., November 19, 1950, in the Board Room of the Administration Building. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunn and unanimously carried.

The meeting of the Teachers College Board reconvened at 9:00 A.M., November 19, 1950, in the Board Room of the Administration Building. Chairman Puffer called the meeting to order and roll call was taken.

Chairman Puffer advised that there were three guests present and presented Mr. Harold Fearn, Superintendent of Community Unit District No. 1 of Charleston, Mr. Fred Moler, and Mr. James L. Archer, President and Secretary respectively of the Board of Education of Community Unit District No. 1 of Charleston.

Mr. Fearn wanted to know whether the Board would consider a cooperative plan for a High School by furnishing funds in return for the opportunity to train student teachers.

After a very thorough discussion Mr. Nickell moved that we, the Teachers College Board, favor the idea of a mutual arrangement with the Community Unit District No. 1 of Charleston whereby they would agree to work out a cooperative arrangement for the use of their high school for the teachers college training program of high school teachers, and that in turn we would expect a similar cooperative arrangement to be worked out by Community Unit District No. 1 with Eastern Illinois State College for a program at the junior high school level, in which case the junior high school would be located on the campus of the teachers college and be supervised by the teachers college authorities in cooperation with the Unit District authorities, and that neither Unit District No. 1 nor the Eastern Illinois State College will duplicate building requirements to meet the needs of the community above the sixth grade level; this is con-

tingent upon a reciprocal resolution from the Board of Education, Community Unit District No. 1 of Charleston, Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

## DEAN LLOYD MOREY

Dean Morey had been invited to appear before the Board to discuss the University Civil Service covering nonacademic personnel.

Dean Morey outlined the history of the University of Illinois Civil Service system and its general operations together with its strong points and its weaknesses. He reported that the Southern Illinois University Board of Trustees had already indicated their approval of joining with the University of Illinois under their existing Civil Service power.

He further indicated that there may be need of providing for a special Civil Service Board from the University Board of Trustees of which might be integrated for the purpose of better working relationships.

He still further stated that should there be union of the Teachers College Board with Southern Illinois University and the University of Illinois, they would have a situation comparable to the present University Retirement System.

The Board members asked questions of Dean Morey regarding the workings of their system as compared with the State Civil Service, and after a thorough discussion, Mr. Bohrer moved that this Board go on record as favoring a special Civil Service Commission for the four teachers colleges, the University of Illinois, and Southern Illinois University, which Commission shall be separate and apart from the regular State Civil Service Commission. The motion was seconded by Mr. Means, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Dunn requested the floor and advised that he had had a letter of consent from the Bloomington-Normal Sanitary District to provide for payment to the Sanitary District for services rendered to Illinois State Normal University in the operation of the sewage treatment plan.

Mr. Dunn advised that he was bringing this matter before the Board at this time inasmuch as Dean Morey was present and could tell the Board how the University of Illinois handled a similar situation, which they, no doubt, encountered at Urbana-Champaign.

Dean Morey advised the Board not only of their cooperative plan with the officials of Urbana and Champaign in connection with the sewage treatment, but also with regard to their fire and police protection cooperative program.

Chairman Puffer thanked Dean Morey for his time and the information he provided.

### BUDGETS

Chairman Puffer advised that since the last meeting of the Board he had had a conference with the Governor, who would like us to take action for a further increase in suggested fees contingent upon a further increase in fees by the other State supported institutions of higher education.

In view of the foregoing, Mr. Walker moved that the Teachers College Board consider further increases in fees, provided the other State supported institutions of higher education take similar action. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wirtz and unanimously carried.

At the last meeting, the Board approved revisions in fees which in turn made necessary the redrafting of budgets for presentation at this time.

In the order of seniority, Dr. Buzzard presented his revised budget for Eastern Illinois State College for a total amount of \$3,542,514.00.

The members of the Board asked questions of Dr. Buzzard as to how he arrived at certain figures, if the requested reductions had been made, and other pertinent questions regarding the preparation of the budget.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Dunn moved that we approve the budget as submitted by Dr. Buzzard for Eastern Illinois State College. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Pegelow, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows :

The next budget presented was that of Illinois State Normal University; this was presented by Dr. Fairchild for a total amount of \$5,908,037.00.

The members of the Board asked questions of Dr. Fairchild as to how he arrived at his figures, if the requested changes in Educational Operations had been made, and other questions relating to the preparation of the budget.

In the discussion that followed, it was found that for Personal Services Dr. Fairchild had not applied the same method of computing Personal Services as did the other three schools, consequently his Personal Service item was much greater than the other three schools.

In view of this, Mr. Nickell moved that Dr. Fairchild and Mr. Ensign be excused from the meeting for the purpose of recalculating this item. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walker and unanimously carried.

Dr. Beu presented his budget next. He, too, was asked questions pertinent to the preparation of the budget for Western Illinois State College, which were answered to the Board's satisfaction.

In view of this, Mr. Dunn moved that the budget for Western Illinois State College, for a total amount of \$3,403,722.00, be ap-

proved. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows :

The motion was unanimously carried.

Dr. Holmes presented the budget for Northern Illinois State Teachers College, for a total amount of \$3,690,787.00.

Dr. Holmes advised that per instructions from the Board he had revised his budget, basing his income on the suggested fees as recently adopted by the Board.

There was some question raised regarding the necessity of acquiring three school busses. The Board deemed it advisable to purchase only one school bus at this time. Dr. Holmes willingly obliged, eliminating two of the busses from his budget request. This action necessarily reduced the number of Maintenance Workers by one. All in all, this made a combined reduction of approximately \$26,000.00, or made the total request for Northern \$3,665,347.00.

Mr. Wirtz moved that the budget request for Northern Illinois State Teachers College be approved as amended. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reavis, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Sometime ago it had been found that Northern, due to their unanticipated enrollment, was going to earn more money than they had authority to use. In order to obtain this authority it was necessary to have a bill introduced in the coming session of the legislature for this authority.

Chairman Puffer advised that the Legislative Reference Burean had drawn up a bill in the amount of \$178,000.00, and he is now presenting the form of bill for Board approval.

Mr. Walker moved that the Board approve the form of the suggested bill as prepared by the Legislative Reference Bureau for Northern Illinois State Teachers College in the amount of \$178,000.00, to be presented to the 67th General Assembly. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer and manimously carried.

Returning to the budget of Illinois State Normal University, which had been referred back to President Fairchild and Mr. Ensign, due to a difference in computation on their Personal Service item as compared with the other three schools, Dr. Fairchild advised that the changes had been made, as requested. These changes reduced Illinois State Normal University's budget to \$5,783,027.00.

Further discussion relative to the preparation of this budget followed, after which Mr. Dunn moved that the budget of Illinois State Normal University be approved as submitted, with the changes brought out in the discussions. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bohrer, the roll was called, and the vote was as follows:
