This two-day series is an entry level program designed to give a broad introduction to the essentials of pruning both trees and shrubs. Topics to be covered include a review of pruning tools as well as pruning techniques on a wide range of common plants.

Pruning Landscape Trees

Pruning trees is the first of the two-part program. This class begins with classroom lectures reviewing pruning tools. Then, techniques and timing relative to training and preserving landscape trees will be covered. The program moves out into the Arboretum collections for instructor demonstrations and further discussions of pruning techniques for specific tree types, including small scale trees, broad-leafed evergreen, deciduous and coniferous trees.

Second of the two-part program, Pruning Landscape Shrubs spends less time reviewing pruning tools, and more time on techniques and timing of shrub renovation from evergreen to deciduous types. The program moves out into the Arboretum for instructor demonstrations and discussions of pruning techniques for specific plant groups, including rhododendrons and azaleas, broad-leafed evergreens, and other common deciduous and evergreen shrubs.

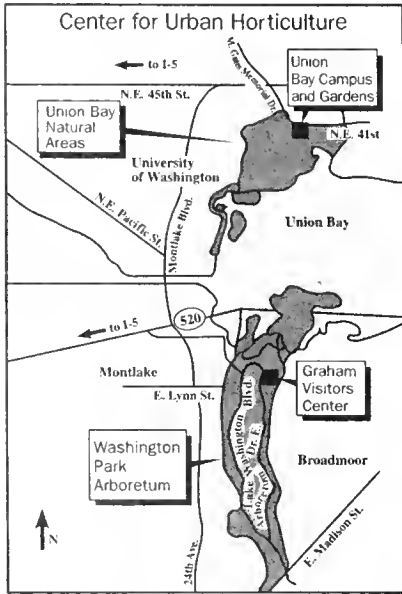
