No charge is made for cases or packing, nor for delivery to freight or express depot.

Our pots are all "standard" sizes, and measurements of height of plants are from the bottom of the pot.

Millions of French Roman Hyacinths are annually grown for cut-flowers during the month of December for Christmas trade, but a great many are also grown for succession after that period, to be used in January, February and March.
