



Dragging ourselves up those long steps from the Social Room, wearing loafers and heavy, white socks, the loud-speaker broadcasting piano practice throughout the school at the end of each period . . . walking down a hall and hearing the recordings of "Cry", "Too Young", "Hello, Young Lovers", "Blue Velvet", "Shrimp Boats Are Coming", and "Slow-poke" . . . poodle cuts and pony tails, quilted skirts plus crinolines, Black Satin perfume, scarves, medallions, and big earrings . . . Mary Patterson's picture, the bulletin board, the speaker's stand in the Social Room . . . wicker furniture, mail call, crackers and milk at recess, stacks of laundry bags in the kitchenette . . . dates, T. 



"Hurry up, Jane, we've only got two minutes to get dressed and get to the gym."




