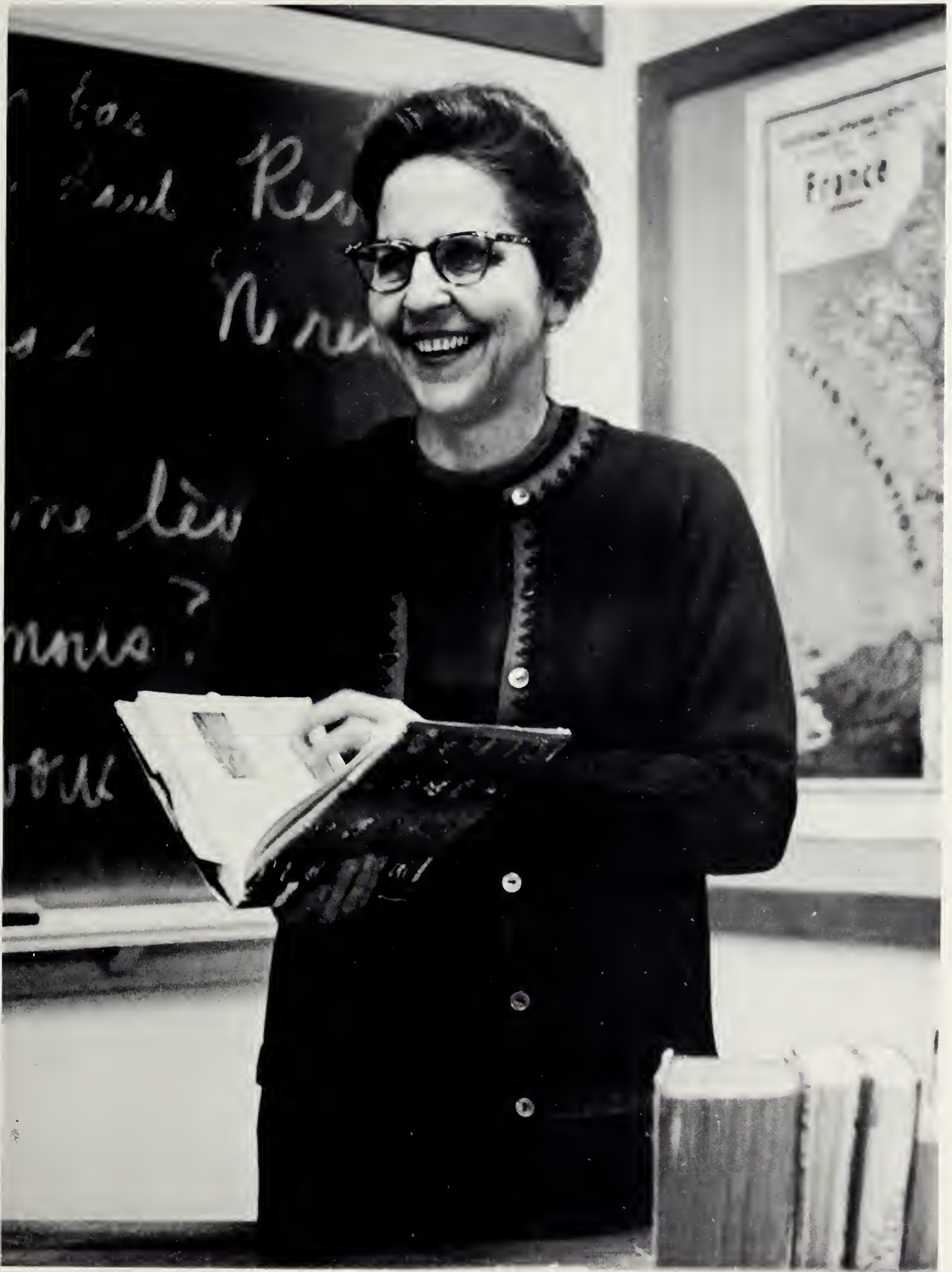
# DEDICATION
