The Davidson College Theater department is relatively small, but the participation is tremendous. Over 200 students participated in the theater productions during this 1988-89 school year. In addition to acting, technical crews, stage crews, and costume and prop committees make up the various ways in which students help get a show off the ground. The inviting aspect of Davidson theater is that previous ex-

perience is not required. All of our productions are top quality and well received by the student body and community.

This school year was particularly good for Davidson theater. Along with Dr. Bill Lawing of the Music department, Dr. Alex Pinkston staged Leonard Bernstein's Wonderful Town, the first musical to be performed by Davidson students in ten years. To accommodate the new semester system, Dr. Rupert Barber established the tradition of the Winter Major Workshop Production. Barber's Sorrows of Stephen inaugerated this tradition as an intimate full-length production staged in the make-shift theater workshop.

Sponsored by the Davidson Theater department, Dipankar Mukherjee successfully staged Badal Sircar's <u>The Procession</u>, an adaptation of an Indian play performed with an entirely South Asian cast. Furthering this international awareness through dramatic communication, the Theater Studio class produced and acted in <u>Food for Thought</u>, a culturally enlightening and intimate show performed in the workshop.

These new theater experiences did not overshadow the traditional fall production, 1918, or the various student-directed one-acts. On the contrary, all that Davidson had to offer this year refreshed the interest of students, faculty, and community theater supporters

year, Diana Titus-Allen approached seniors Melissa Dilettuso and Margaret Hancock with the idea of developing an original video series based on the lives of Davidson students. In the fall of 1988, Dilettuso began work on the story-line that eventually became the pilot script for Between Extremes. The six central characters are recent Davidson College graduates who have decided to remain in the Charlotte area and live together before moving in separate directions. Although the characters are no longer a part of Davidson, they still hold on to the safety net of having the same friends and living in the same area. The problems they face, however, are different. They are the problems of attaining jobs, developing new relationships, losing touch with old relationships, and paying the

Dilettuso and Hancock continued to work on the project throughout the winter. The di-

rector Hancock held auditions in January, and the show was finally under way. Throughout the next month, Hancock scheduled rehearsals and mock shoots, while familiarizing her actors with their characters. Meanwhile, as the producer, Dilettuso focused on securing shooting locations, attaining air time on Central Piedmont Community College's cable television staion, and training an efficient production crew. Dilettuso and Hancock immersed themselves for the next 9 weeks in filming and editing Between Extremes. During this time, they were forunate to have a dedicated, talented and accommodation cast and crew. Everyone devoted much of their free time to work with the production.

The <u>Between Extremes</u> project was developed and executed entirely by Davidson students. Hopefully the dramatic series will be continued next year.

For over fifty years, students, faculty, and staff members have invested time and energy in hopes of bringing the very best entertainment to Davidson. In the mid-1930s, a series featuring visiting musicians was begun by the music department. Around this time, the Dean of Faculty's office also formed a speakers' series. In 1952, the two series merged, and faculty members maintained responsibility for administration and production of events. Students began to play an active role in the 1974 season, and in 1975, student leaders in the new college union accepted primary responsibility for the Artists Series. Their tasks included ticket sales, set up and breakdown of shows, and hosting of events

The events in today's Artists' Series are chosen by a committee of faculty, staff, and students; this committee is led by the Student Co-Curricular Vice-President of the Union. The Artists' Series has become a training-ground for student administrators, as well as a driving force in the development of an arts agenda in the community.

The 1988-89 Series hosted the North Carolina Shakespeare Festival for a Septem-

ber 28th production of Macbeth, as well as the Oberlin Dance Company on February 1st. The Chestnut Brass Company arrived on November 9th, bringing an array of instruments which dated from 1600 to 1900. Finally, America's premier male vocal ensemble, Chanticleer, performed on March 1st, bringing former music professor and choir director Frank Albinder back to the Davidson campus. Their program included the traditional early music of the 15th and 16th centuries, as well as pop and avant-garde pieces.

This year Davidson College affiliated officially with two very special community projects dealing with widespread concems on a local level. Habitat for Humanity provides affordable low income housing for those who need it. D.E.R.S.

The Davidson Emergency Rescue Service has protected the Davidson College campus since 1977. Two state-certified Emergency Medical Technicians and a trainee are on call twenty-four hours a day throughout the school year. DERS members respond to a wide variety of calls throughout the school year, from serious medical injuries to minor injuries. They are dispatched through the infirmary - usually at some ungodly hour of the night - managing to shake the sleep from their eyes, run across campus to the site of the call and deal with whatever greets them.

The Emergency Medical Technician training consists of a course over a hundred and twenty hours long covering topics ranging from asthma attacks to gunshots to childbirth. The need for childbirth

expertise was, thankfully, lacking this year at Davidson, but one never knows when it might be needed.

DERS members have noted a change in the character and frequency of calls over the last several years. Two years ago, the typical call was an injured intoxicated person (hands through windows were quite popular), most patients were freshmen, and rarely did a weekend go by without a call. This year, the calls that DERS has had have been more on the medical side (appendicitis, fainting, etc.), and few freshmen have been involved. Perhaps the changing nature of Davidson has brought in less violent souls; perhaps it is just coincidence. Either way, DERS members are currently getting significantly more sleep.

R.O.T.C. Excels

... as the Army's future

Davidson's Army ROTC program enjoyed another successful and exciting year of promoting "leadership, scholarship, and excellence" among participating cadets. The program combined rigorous physical conditioning, crucial classroom instruction, and weekly practical training in the field to prepare today's students to be tomorrow's military leader.

The year began with the arrival of many cadets from different Army schools, camps, and training exercises which they attended over the summer. The seniors shared their experiences from six weeks of demanding training at Advanced Camp All-America, located at Fort Bragg, N. C., with the juniors who would be attending next summer. Many cadets also attended Airborne School, Air Assault School, Officer Basic Training, or CTLT. Senior Cadet Major Ray Harschbarger explained, "Through the CTLT program, I was placed in the position of a 2nd Lieutenent in the 1st Armor Division in Nuremberg, West Germany. Basically, I was in charge of a platoon of 30 men and about a million dollars worth of equipment and vehicles."

During the fall, cadets stayed busy with a variety of activities, including rapelling clinics, the fall Red Cross Blood Drive, and a white water rafting trip. The Ranger Challenge team practiced long hours in the areas of physical endurance and conditioning, orienteering, marksmanship, building and crossing a rope bridge, and other military skills. Headed by Senior Cadet Captain John Black and Sophomore Cadet PFC Michael Peters, this outstanding group of nine cadets placed 7th in the regional competition. Davidson ROTC also participated in the Fall Field Leadership Exercise with other schools in the

Foothills Battallion, which gave cadets a feel for barracks life in the military.

Spring brought new challenges and excitement for all cadets, beginning with the annual Military Ball. The Ball was put on in full military splendor for all cadets and cadre, with their dates, from the Carolina Foothills BN. The special quest speaker, Brigadier General Floyd Walters, a Davidson graduate of 1962, and a performance by the 82nd Airborne Chorus, made this year's Military Ball a highlight of the spring. Other spring activities included the spring Red Cross Blood Drive, the Cadet Awards ceremony, the popular Dining In for the upperclassmen, and the Spring Field Leadership Exercise at Fort Jackson, S. C.

The training for the juniors intensified immensely in the spring as they began preparing for the challenges that awaited them at Advanced Camp, with a special emphasis on technical and tactful proficiency, physical conditioning, and leadership skills. The juniors stayed busy with leadership positions, field exercises, classroom and lab instruction, and physical training three times a week at 0700 hours (7:00 AM). The seniors, while remaining busy with the training for the underclassmen, were also receiving their branch assignments and preparing for their futures as Army officers. Seniors were assigned to various branches, including Infantry, Military Intelligence, Field Artillery, and the Medical Services Corps.

Perhaps the most amazing accomplishment of the Davidson ROTC cadets was their ability to remain active in campus activities, keep on top of their school work, and excel in the ROTC program. Congratulations to the continuing success of the Davidson ROTC program!



Davidson's 1988 football team improved significantly, but the Wildcats too often were the victims of heartbreaking defeats. The Wildcats closed the season Nov. 12 with a 38-13 loss to Lafayette which dropped Davidson's record to 0-10.

The offensive leaders on this year's team were Peter Hughes, Mike Wright, and Horace Hamm. Hughes had 1,077 yards total offense on the season and threw for two touchdowns. Despite his freshman standing, Wright supplied the Wildcats with needed scoring power. Wright replaced injured Terry Hines at tailback and rushed for 307 yards on 83 attempts and led the team in scoring with five touchdowns and 30 points while starting only five games.

Another bright spot was the late but quick development of quarterback Nick Crawford. Crawford, a freshman from Kingsport, Tenn., completed 10 passes against East Tennessee State for a total of 147 yards. Against Lafayette, Crawford

completed six of 15 passes for 73 yards. Horace Hamm hauled in 23 passes for 359 yards an two touchdowns. Hamm was among the Colonial League leaders in all purpose yardage, returning 28 kickoffs for 582 yards.

The 1988 football banquet was conducted Nov. 13 at the Charlotte Motor Speedway Club. At the banquet, junior tackle Rogers was named the W. Lewis McColgan Most Valuable defensive player for the second straight year. Sophomore guard Chris Woods received the McColgan Award as the team's most valuable offensive player. Freshman Mike Wright and Frank Watson were selected as the team's most outstanding newcomers.





The 88-89 season marked the end of two different eras for Davidson College. The first was the end of the relationship of


