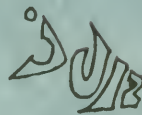

when I come back for Homecoming...

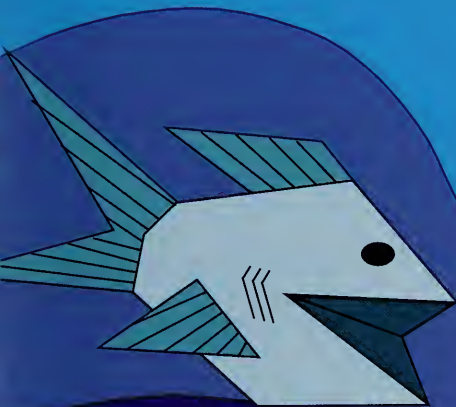

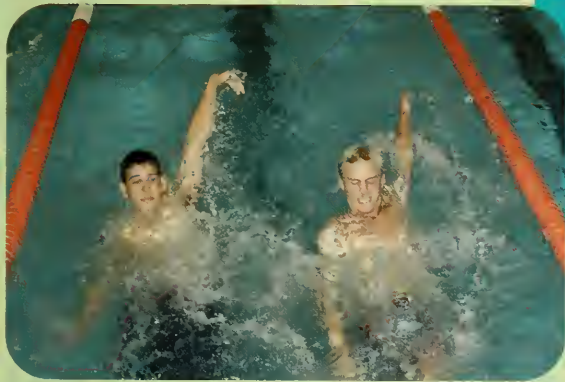

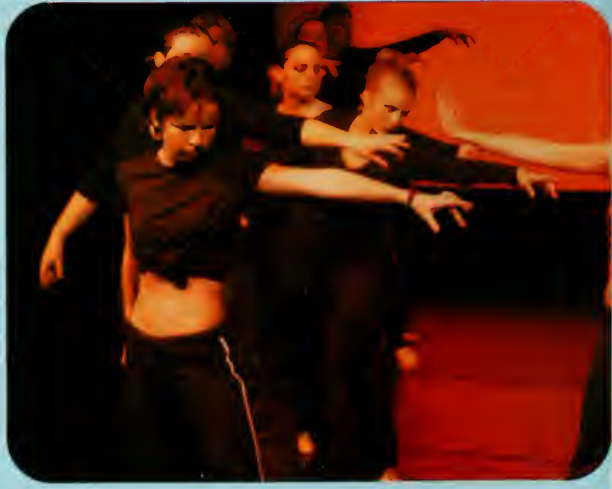

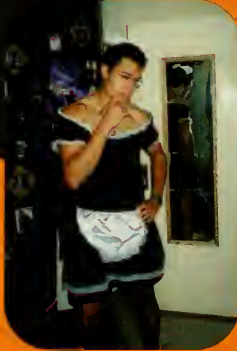

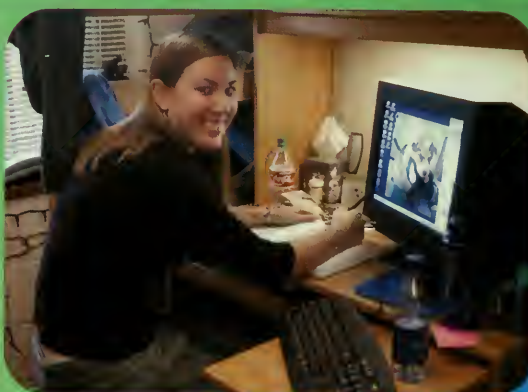

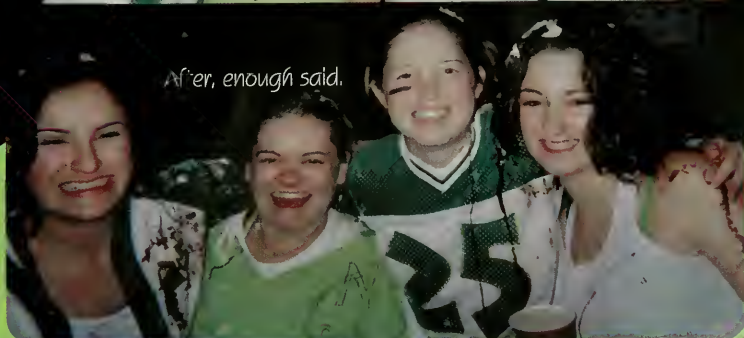

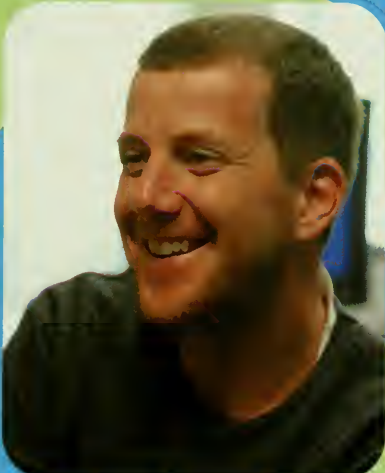

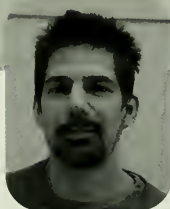

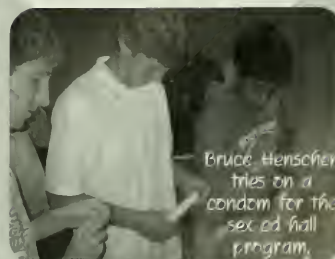

Since then, the Davidson College Pre-Law Society has expanded its mission in order to more specifically focus the needs of students interested in the law and legal profession.

In an attempt to better facilitate the needs of Davidson College Pre-Law students, this year the Pre-Law Society hosted a number of events including: a student/lawyer social, presentations by special interest speakers, and workshops on LSAT preparation, applying to law school, and finding internships. The Pre-Law Society also provides its members with the opportunity to interact with current law students and legal professionals. While allowing students to be exposed to the many facets of the law and legal community is the primary aim of the Pre-Law Society, equally important is our commitment to helping people by providing community service.

During the 2003-2004 school year, the Pre-Law Society was restructured to improve the maintenance of the organization. An Executive Board, comprised of eleven students, serves as the governing body of the Pre-Law Society. Members of the Executive Board also serve as the heads of the Pre-Law subcommittees: Speakers and Panels, Community Service, Internships, Research, Newsletter, Website, and Publicity. Membership is open to all students.

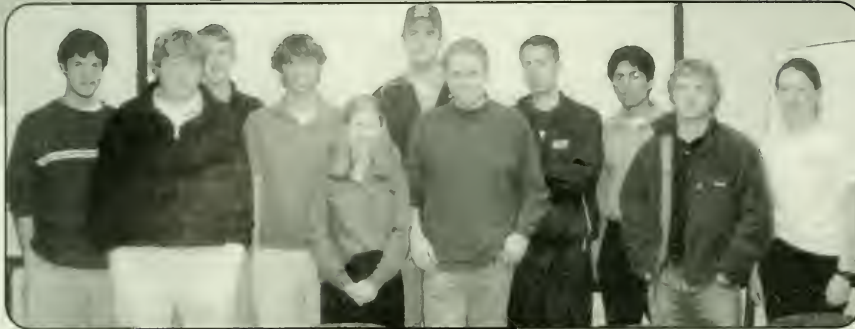

The Bioethics Society was founded in 2001 to promote awareness of current ethical issues in medicine, to provide students with resources needed for conducting research on medical ethics issues, and to be a source of information for students interested in pursuing a career in bioethics.

During the fall, the focus was on the new HIPPA privacy and insurance laws passed in April of 2003. With this focus, we had meetings to present research on HIPPA, followed by discussion, and

presentations by various speakers, including a few Medical Humanities adjunct faculty. The semester culminated with a formal presentation at an ethical conference in Charlotte, sponsored by the Bioethics Resource Group. This great opportunity to present was a first for Davidson College students and resulted in the development of a partnership with the Bioethics Resource Group of Charlotte.

The Bioethics Society also helped organize the Speas Symposium held at Davidson in March. The Speas Symposium was established in 1986 by a Davidson alumnus (Class of 1947). This year marked the 17th annual Speas Symposium, entitled "Managing Pain Ethically," and the third year that the Bioethics Society has sponsored the event. During the forum, students, physicians, and lawyers discussed current ethical issues during break out sessions and keynote addresses. Topics included legal issues in managing pain, popular beliefs about addiction, Christian reflections on palliative care, issues of pain management and addiction in the media, and international perspectives on end of life care. This was a great opportunity for Davidson students to interact with distinguished professionals, physicians, scientists, ethicists, as well as students from other colleges and universities.

Purple Bunnies was founded in fall 2002 as a response to a general need on campus for open communication about sensitive issues that yield stress without yielding conversation; Davidson's intimate size and abundance of achievements worth celebrating can also lead to difficulty in voicing personal struggles. With great support from the College community and health educator Georgia Ringle, Purple Bunnies was founded by a few Davidson students. To date, published issues have addressed eating disorders, toxic relationships, sexual regret, and loss of control. We are grateful for the students who have submitted testimonies for publication; our ability to act on our cause depends on your courage. With continued support from Davidson faculty and students, Purple Bunnies will continue creating opportunities for greater empathy and understanding within our community.

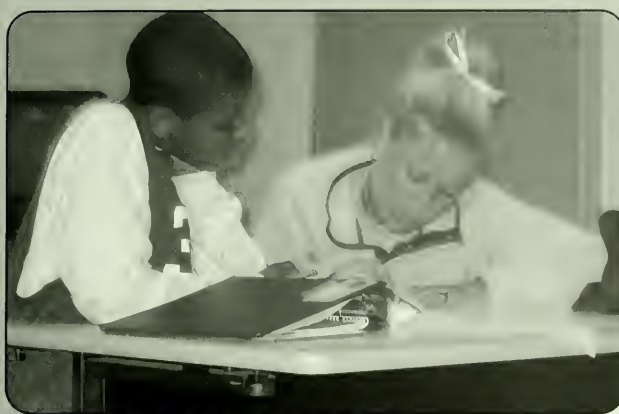

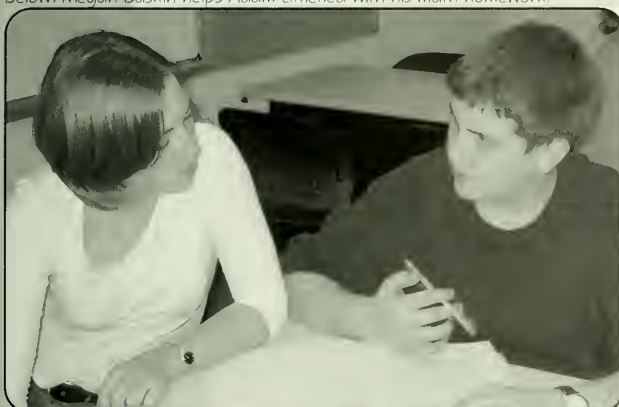

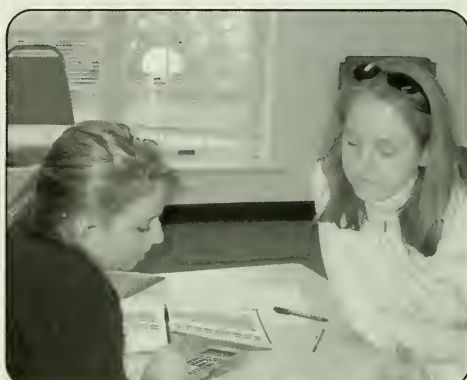

Homework Lab is a free, student-run tutoring service offered to elementary, middle, and high school students, currently serving children in over fourteen schools in the surrounding areas. Homework Lab offers tutoring in most subjects, ranging from elementary reading skills to advanced physics and calculus, although fewer tutors are brave enough to face such challenges :).

Founded six years ago by Davidson College seniors, Homework Lab now serves almost forty students, about half of whom attend regularly. The goals of Homework Lab include making learning fun as well as being role models for the younger students. Tutors who work with the students have a significant impact on their charges through their positive attitudes, patience, and respect for the students, and often develop a connection that goes deeper than just the students' daily homework assignments. 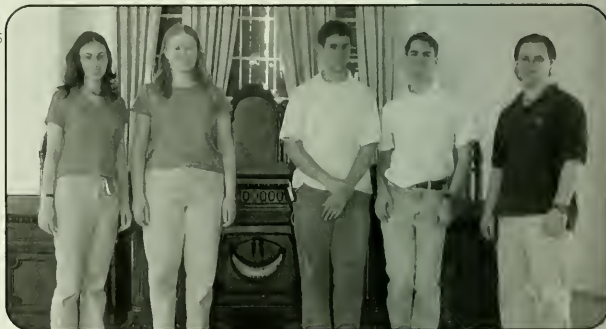

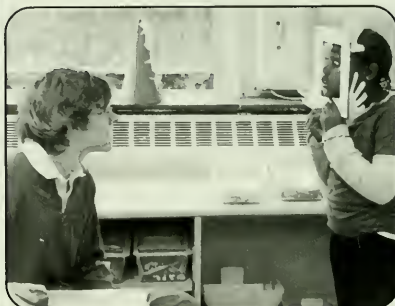

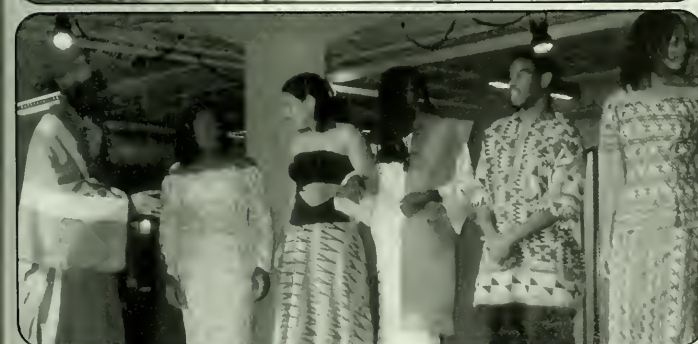

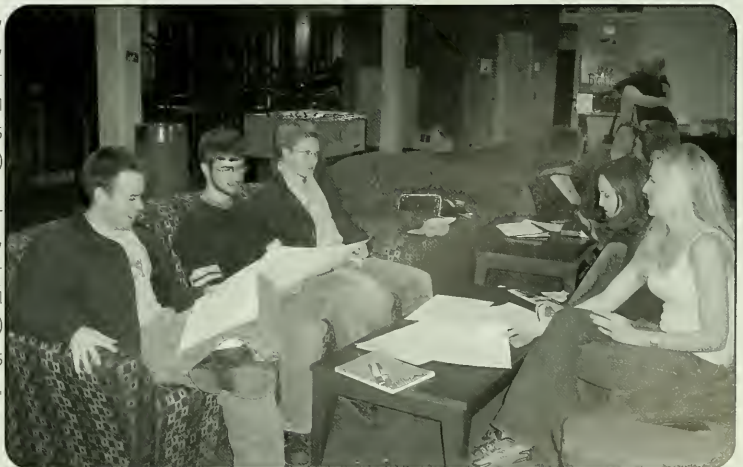

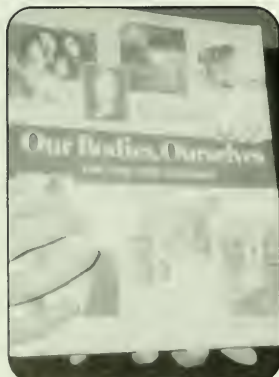

Davidson Rescue is an organization dedicated to raising awareness of opportunities for students interested in fire fighting, rescue, and emergency medical services. We facilitate recruiting activities on campus for local fire departments and rescue squads and we also provide information about local certification courses for emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and fire fighters. Students who are interested in volunteering in a public safety capacity can find information and answers by contacting our members, many of whom volunteer with agencies like the Davidson Fire Department and the North Mecklenburg Rescue Squad. Davidson Rescue members also speak at freshman Davidson 101 classes to raise awareness about the EMS system that serves students in the event of an emergency. 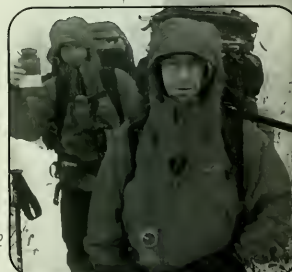

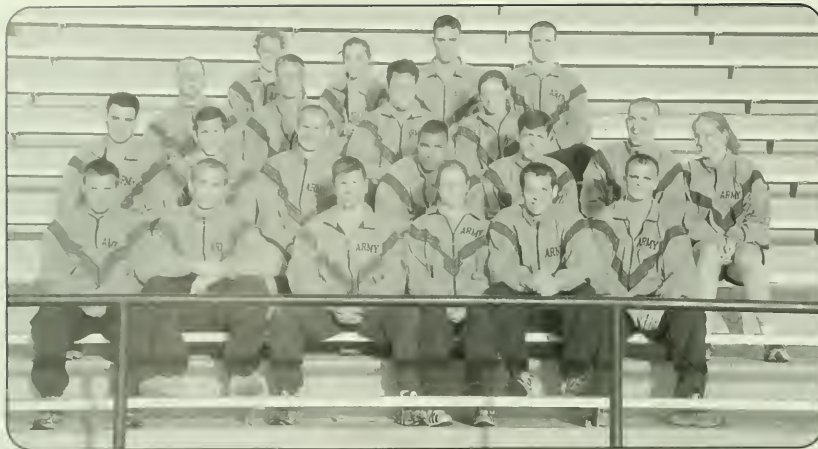

Davidson College Army ROTC continues to improve under the command of Special Forces Major Pat Leslie, who fortunately is able to remain with us for an amazing fourth year. Currently occupying half of the old WDAV building on Ridge Road, B Company is looking forward to the completion of the Chambers renovation so we can set up a full weight room in the other half next year.

ROTC keeps its members busy, what with early morning PT (physical training) two-three times a week (sometimes we get lucky and have Monday afternoon PT) as well as weekly classes and lab. Labs are the time to get solid hands-on training in such important subjects as battle drills, drill and ceremony, tactics, land navigation, and water survival, among others. The battalion's FLRC (Field Leaders Reaction Course), a team-building, mind-bending obstacle course, is perfectly located on campus off Ridge Road. Fundraisers are plentiful in the fall, including hauling ice or vending concessions at Panthers games, and can eat up an entire Sunday afternoon. Other ROTC activities include biannual roadside cleanups of our adopted 2-mile stretch in Concord and blood drives held in conjunction with the Red Cross. Both blood drives this year, attended by faculty, staff, students, and town residents, were extremely successful. The honorable color guard performed at various 9-11 ceremonies, Veterans' Day observances, and other functions.

We also train outside of campus. FTX (Field Training Exercises) consists of 2-3 days of total Army immersion at Fort Jackson, SC for training in land navigation, leadership in battle drills, challenge courses, BRM (basic rifle marksmanship), and basic "hardship" endurance (i.e. sleeping outside and conducting training entirely in the field). MSIII's also participate in separate training days in order to better prepare them for LDAC (Leadership Development & Assessment Course), held each summer in Ft. Lewis, WA. This mandatory five-week course is where our ROTC prowess is judged and scored on an overall scale, which in part determines whether we get our preferred branch and posting. Good luck, Juniors!

As cadets, we get the exciting opportunity to go to such army schools as Airborne, Air Assault, and Mountain Warfare; successfully completing these courses (as we always do!) gives us a leg up when we finally get to our active-duty units. We also have the opportunity for an extra few weeks of training

after attending LDAC. Cadet Troop Leadership Training (CTLT) is conducted at virtually every active-duty post (including Hawaii, Korea, Germany, and Italy) and serves as an internship where we can shadow a platoon leader to get a feel for what the job will be like.

This year, 5 cadets will be commissioned on May 15th, graduating as "butterbars" (2nd Lieutenants). Colby Broadwater will be heading into the Field Artillery branch, Bobby Lippert to the Chaplain Corps, Mark O'Hair to Medical Service Corps and medical school, Julie Perry to the Aviation branch and flight school, and Amanda Yeck to the Finance Corps. Having received ROTC scholarships while at Davidson, all five will serve active duty for a minimum of four years, with the exception of the aviation branch requiring a six-year commitment after flight school. Judging the world situation, we are virtually guaranteed "combat zone" deployments during our service to the country - care packages will be most welcome! ;)

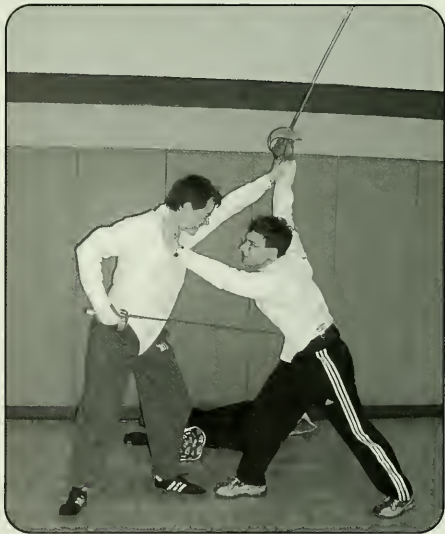

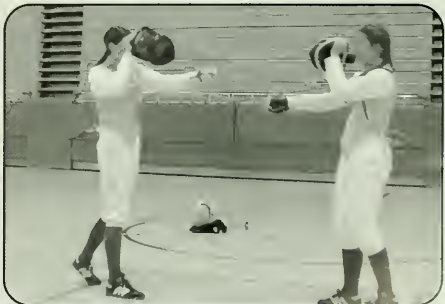

Entering their first full season actually funded by the club sports department, the roller hockey team found themselves battling through some difficult obstacles. With last year's leading scorer Richard Connolly abroad for the first semester and the graduation of team Captain Ryan Auster, this relatively young team had to look for new leadership in their young roster. Plagued by the nagging injuries of senior Josh Voorhees, and his losing battle with sobriety, Davidson often found themselves with a sparse roster with a very inexperienced team. Oddly enough, their offensive leadership came from a pair of defensemen, Arch McClure and Brent McCormick.



McClure posted an impressive 19 points (11-8) during the regular season at the blue line, and posted an even more impressive five points in Davidson's disappointing first round playoff loss to a red-hot Western Carolina squad. McCormick, in his second season at the blue line, assumed the role of Connolly as Davidson's most potent offensive weapon. McCormick posted 49 goals and 15 assists for a total of 64 points, good enough to secure his position as the third leading scorer in the entire nation. His 8 point (6-2) effort in the playoff game against WCU capped off a strong offensive season for McCormick. However, the leadership does not stop there.

With a squad made up of mostly sophomores, team captain and senior Julie Perry led by example with her smart play and strong physical presence in the defensive zone. Rookies Josh Lancaster and Jim Rastetter, in their first season on the squad, quickly adjusted to the transition from ice to sport court, and provided a potent offensive threat late in the season. Lancaster, an ice hockey goalie, made the switch to forward to make way for veteran net-minder Bobby Kenner, and his 12 goals and 3 assists in 9 games attest to his durability and game sense. Rastetter served as the enforcer, notching 14 points while collecting a collective 42 total penalty minutes.

Newcomer sophomores Ronnie Lofrese and Jake Charlson also made a huge impact on the team. Acquired late last season, Lofrese was forced to make the transition from forward to defense, a position he had never played. Rising to the occasion, Lofrese became an impenetrable force, with the speed and grit unmatched by anyone in the league. His 143 pound body was used more like it was 200, and his offensive minded play added a potent scoring threat from the point. Charlson, acquired midway through the season, has become the journeyman of the Davidson squad. Playing his first ever hockey game, he was forced to play the entire game due to the team's lack of subs, and since then has become a strong physical presence on the ice with his unselfish play and his nose for going hard to the net. Look for Charlson to be lighting the lamp with regularity in the very near future.

The teams other two seniors, Voorhees and Andrew Foerster, were plagued early in the season with injuries, and though they did not post the goal tallies that they had hoped, both contributed as team leaders with their unselfish play. Foerster, in just 9 games tallied 3 points, scoring the game winner against division rival WCU, and getting two points in a very close game against Clemson.

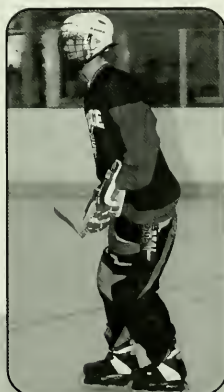

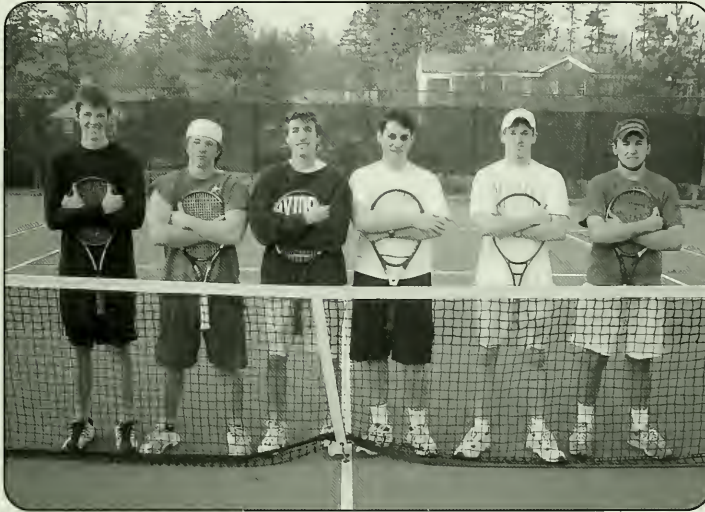


Men's Tennis

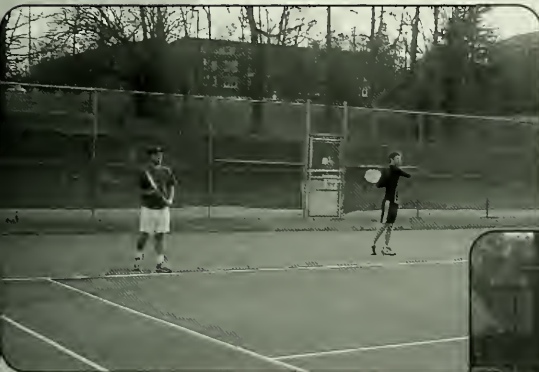

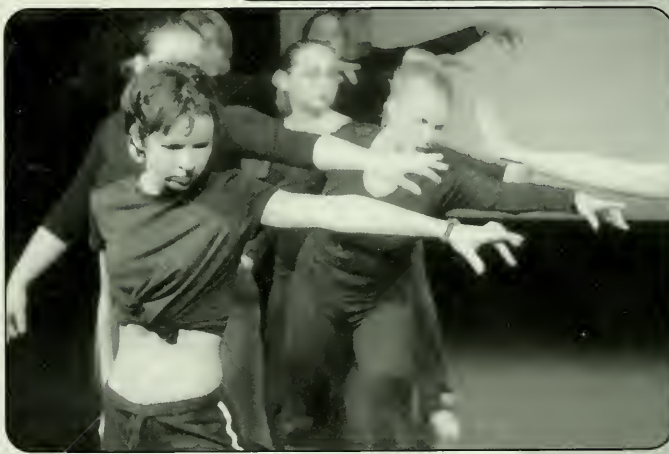

Georgia wins final game in Cats' losing season

The host Georgetown Hoyas gained a 30-10 victory over the visiting Davidson Wildcats. The victory ended the Hoyas' (4-7) three-game losing streak, while the Wildcats (3-8) lost their fourth straight to end the season.

Georgetown amassed 506 yards in the game, 395 coming on the ground, making the third straight game that Davidson allowed at least 344 yards rushing to its opponent. Meanwhile, the Wildcats offense could only muster 231 yards on the day, 210 through the air.

Georgetown won the coin toss and elected to receive. In just two rushes, Sims traversed 63 yards for a touchdown.

It took nearly the entire first quarter for the Wildcats to dent the scoreboard. After going 68 yards on 13 plays, Davidson was held at the Hoya five and had to settle for a 22-yard field goal by senior Chris Costello with 50 seconds left in the opening period.

Senior Barrett Johnson became Davidson's all-time leader in receiving yardage on the Wildcats' next possession, catching a key third-down pass for a first down in Davidson territory. He finished the game with four catches for 41 yards, giving him 2,157 yards in his career, three more yards than Mike Kelly '70. The drive stalled near midfield, but Costello's punt was downed inside the one by sophomore Eric Imphong.

The Hoyas got some breathing room, but Andrew Crawford's pass was picked off by junior Zack Drozda at the Hoya 35. The 'Cats couldn't capitalize on the field position, however, as Costello's 48-yard field goal attempt went wide right.

With under three minutes left in the half, Georgetown scored its second touchdown on a three-yard run by option quarterback Alondzo Turner, capping a seven-play, 69-yard drive for a 13-3 lead.

Georgetown added to its lead in the third quarter on a Michael Gillman field goal from 23 yards.

In the fourth quarter with the Wildcats trailing, 23-3, quarterback Tom Cook was sacked on successive plays, forcing Davidson to punt. Costello supplied a beautiful 47-yard boot, and sophomore Preston Moore held up the returner by his jersey. That allowed the coverage team to force a fumble and junior Brendan Dete recovered the ball at the Hoya 28. On the first play, Cook teamed up with Leverett for

a 28-yard touchdown on a screen pass.

Sims scored his third touchdown of the day, this time on a 68-yard run, three plays into GU's next drive for the final points of the day.

Cook finished the day 16-for-42 passing with one touchdown and three interceptions for the Wildcats. Leverett led the team in receiving with six catches for 93 yards. By finishing the season 3-8, Davidson suffered its first losing season since 1997.

Wildcats claim SoCon, fall in NCAA tournie

The men's soccer team's stay in the 2003 NCAA Tournament came to an end as the No. 12 Coastal Carolina Chanticleers posted a 3-0 victory in front of a standing-room only crowd at the Coastal Soccer Field. The Wildcats finish their season at 15-6-2 overall while Coastal advances with a mark of 19-2.

Coastal Carolina's prolific offense showed itself quite early in the game, as the Chanticleer netted the team's first two goals within seven minutes of the opening whistle.

"It's a very big hurdle for any team to overcome two quick goals. I don't fault our defense, but credit great plays by their forwards - they stepped up and made outstanding goals," said head coach Matt Spear.

An early Coastal corner kick deflected off of the foot of Mubarike Chisoni in the box. Coastal's leading point-getter Joseph Ngwenya got a foot on the ball and put it into the net to give the home team the early advantage. Prior to that score, the Wildcats hadn't given up a goal in 329:44 minutes of action, having shutout their last three opponents. Less than two minutes later Chisoni beat a Wildcat defender and, on a breakaway down the far side of the field, sent a cross into the box for Ngwenya to drill it past a diving Bart Creasman.

Davidson settled down as the first half wore on but the damage already seemed done. With about 15 minutes to play in the half, a free kick by

senior midfielder David Peoples resulted in a scramble in the goalie box. Senior forward Nick Hansell headed a loose ball that glanced off the crossbar, but the Wildcats were unable to cut the lead in half. Moments later, the 'Cats had another perfect opportunity as senior defender Justin Porter headed a shot towards goal that was blocked out by a Coastal defender.

Just as the Wildcats started to penetrate the goal, the Chanticleers stole possession of the ball and got ahead of the Davidson defenders. Boyz Khumalo sent a long cross to the far corner of the box where Jordie Hughes was waiting to tuck the ball in the near post for Coastal's third goal.

Despite chants of 'Go Wildcats' by the large crowd of Davidson fans who made the trip, the 'Cats were unable to get its attack going. Chanticleer keeper Andrew Paxton made six saves on 10 Wildcat shots.

Although Davidson's run in the postseason came to an end much too early, it was not before the Wildcats earned an outright Southern Conference regular season title and swept through the conference tournament to bring home the crown.

"Our seniors have had an incredible career," offered Spear, "that's what we're celebrating right now. Making the NCAA Tournament is a massive achievement for our program. This year's experience will aid us in the future."

Kelly Fillnow led the women. The junior, who also plays tennis, finished second overall as the women edged Furman by only one point for the conference crown. Fillnow finished the 5K in 19:01.49, about 20 seconds behind App State's Katie Sujkowski.

Fellow junior Sally Stanhope was next for the Wildcats in 14th with a time of 19:48.11. Following Stanhope were senior Jenna Kruppa (19:55.69) in 17th and junior Anna Brew in 18th (19:57.19). 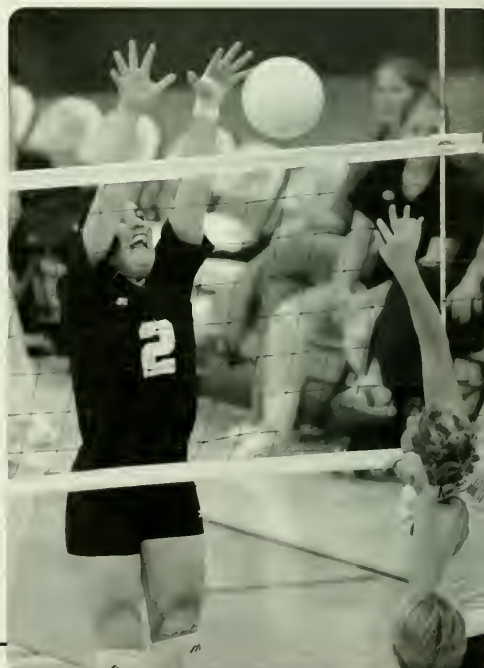
On the defensive front, junior libero Tamara Gallen posted a match-best 11 digs.

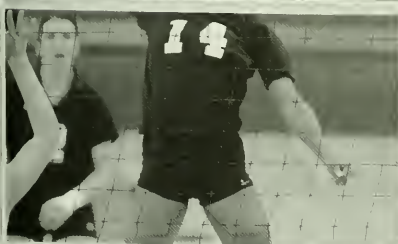

Swimmers post best team scores during CAA's

Davidson capped the final day of the 2004 CAA Swimming and Diving Championships by setting the most important school records of all. Both the men's and women's teams ended the meet by scoring more points at the conference meet than ever before. Along the way, the swimmers toppled even more individual and relay records. The women ended the meet in third with 497 points compared to 383 a season ago. The men were eighth out of 10 teams with 212 total points (182 in 2003). Davidson head coach Tim Kelly earned the women's Coach of the Year award for leading the 'Cats to a top-three finish.

Freshman standout Eli Trefzger opened the final night by setting yet another school record. Her time of 17:17.81 in the grueling 1650-yard freestyle earned her a third-place finish. The women then showed their depth in the 200 backstroke. Senior Sara Laws led the way with a runner-up swim. Carrie Rafer, Leslie Cook and junior Trisha Blackwell followed in sixth, seventh and eighth respectively, giving Davidson four of the top eight finishers in that event.

Coming off her win in the 100 breaststroke on Friday night, sophomore Megan Hollar swam to third in the 200 breast, cementing her claim as one of the best breaststrokers in the

CAA. Captain Joanie Gidus then finished as the runner-up in the 200 breast consolation finals for 10th overall. Again showing the depth that won them third, the women took three of the top six spots in the 200 fly. Senior Vanessa Witt set a new record in the event with third place swim at 2:07.45. Captain Ashley Cain and Trefzger followed in fifth and sixth respectively. To close out the meet, the women's 400 freestyle relay team of Hollar, Brigit Barry, Kristen Shields and Witt set yet another new school record and finished fourth.

Captain Charlie Hunter again led the men's team. Hunter took fifth in the 200 back at 1:52.90. He then helped the 400 yard freestyle relay team to a seventh place finish. He teamed with Brad Poole, Robert Koch and Steve Tolson to swim a 3:09.09, more than five seconds faster than their preliminary time. Junior diver Chris Wroblewski took home a 10th place finish in the three-meter springboard finals to close out the scoring for Davidson.

The Wildcats close out the 2003-04 season having accomplished more in the CAA than any previous Davidson squad. Kelly won a Coach of the Year award in his first season at the helm. And despite saying goodbye to an outstanding senior class, the future of Davidson swimming looks brighter than ever.

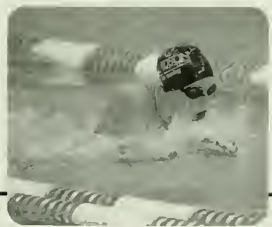
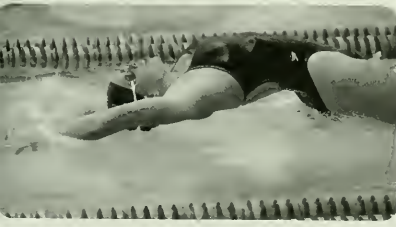

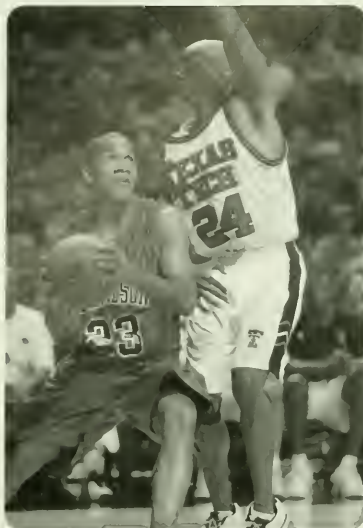

'Cats reach SoCon semi-finals, fall to ETSU

All good things come to an end. The Davidson men's basketball team did the improbable, winning nine straight games to earn the chance at top-seeded East Tennessee State in the semifinals of the Southern Conference Tournament, but the Wildcats came up short, falling 96-84 to the Buccaneers at the North Charleston Coliseum.

"Congratulations to ETSU on a fantastic season," said head coach Bob McKillop. "Tim Smith (game-high 29 point for the Bucs) is a guy who can control the game despite his size and he did just that tonight."

"I'm proud of our guys for not giving up and battling back, but I think we just ran out of gas in those last four minutes. We used too much energy to get back into the game and weren't able to finish."

ETSU held a commanding 14-point halftime lead that it extended to as many as 18 points, 58-40, with 17:25 remaining in the contest. Davidson never gave up, and used a 9-2 run to cut the lead back to 11 with 16:17 left.

Travis Strong was a thorn in the Wildcats' side the entire game, coming off the bench for an injured James Anthony to score 17 points on 5-of-7 from three-point territory. He pushed the advantage back to 14 with a triple at 16:04.

The Buccaneer lead continued to hover around 12 points and Davidson was without

the defensive efforts of Nick Booker and the inside power of Logan Kosmalski as both sat on the bench thanks to four fouls with more than 10 minutes remaining in the game.

Davidson looked to its bench and found Ian Johnson who scored nine unanswered points to get the Wildcats back within five, 73-68, with 9:02 on the clock. Johnson continued to dominate, scoring eight of the next nine Wildcat points, but Davidson was unable to slow the attack.

ETSU's pressure, including four Zakke Wadood steals, prevented the Wildcats from getting any closer than six points for the remainder of the game. The Bucs connected on late free throws to seal the victory and the opportunity to play for the tournament championship on Saturday afternoon.

Smith scored 29 points on 10-of-20 from the field and 8-of-8 from the charity stripe to lead all scorers.

Johnson and sophomore Matt McKillop each has season-highs with 21 points to lead the Wildcats. McKillop netted 5-of-9 from three, while Johnson collected a team-best eight rebounds to go along with his 21 tallies.

ETSU shot 54 percent from the field while holding Davidson to 39.5 percent. The Wildcats still have not been beaten on the boards in the last 11 games, outrebounding the Bucs, 41-38, in the contest.

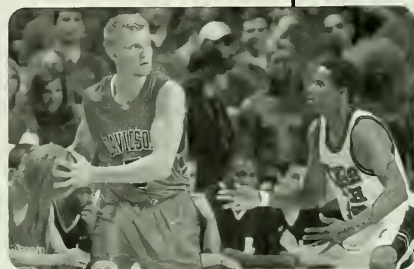

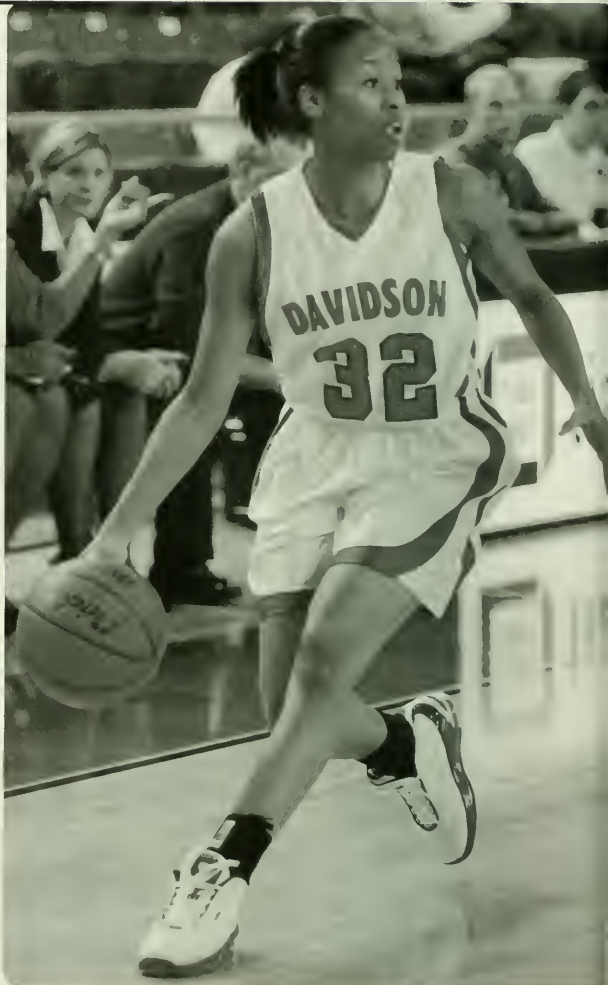
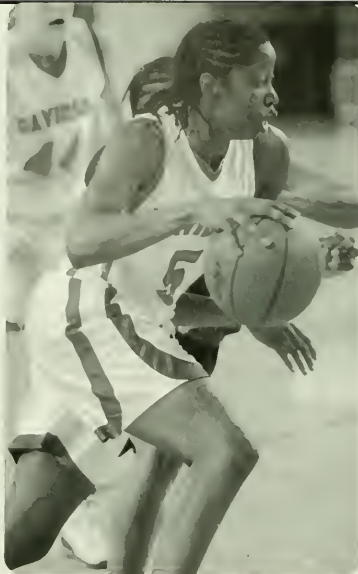

Cats claim final game in overtime, 88-87

It was a perfect day to be out playing in the snow. However, the Davidson women's basketball team was forced to stay indoors and play Furman in its regular season finale. The Wildcats made the most of their situation by pulling out a thrilling 88-87 overtime victory. With the triumph, Davidson took a three-game winning streak into the SoCon Tournament.

Furman opened the extra frame by taking its first lead of the game, 76-74. The Paladins scored the next seven points to pull ahead, 83-76, with 1:47 remaining in overtime. To make matters even worse for Davidson, both starting post players - seniors Meghan Bryant and Courtney Laird - had fouled out.

Nevertheless, the Wildcats didn't cave in. Freshman Brynn Kelly began the Davidson rally with a jumper at 1:35. On the 'Cats' next possession, senior Ashley Hallsted nailed a three-pointer from the left side to bring Davidson to within three, 84-81. After the Paladins converted just 1-of-2 free throws for the second straight time, senior Lindsay Shade banked in another three-pointer. Suddenly, the Wildcats were only one back.

The two teams exchanged free throws to make the count 87-86 in favor of Furman with just 22 seconds showing. Forced to foul or cause a turnover, Shade and freshman Katie Hamilton trapped the Paladins' Lauren Few in the corner

on the Furman inbound pass. Few stepped out of bounds, turning the ball back over to the 'Cats and setting up the dramatic finish.

After passing the ball around the horn a couple of times, Shade drove the right side of the lane and attempted the game-winning shot, but had it blocked out of bounds with five seconds left. Hamilton took the inbound pass in the corner, drove the baseline and floated an improbable

jumper from behind the backboard perfectly through the hoop to complete the comeback.

"This is just what we needed going into the Southern Conference Tournament," said coach Annette Watts. "The win tonight came from pure hustle."

Davidson certainly looked to be headed for a win after its first half performance. The Wildcats tallied a season-high 48 points in the opening period, thanks in large part to making seven three-pointers, and took

an 18-point cushion into the break. Bryant, Hamilton and Shade each scored eight points in the first 20 minutes while the 'Cats were also 15-of-18 (83.3 percent) at the free throw line.

Hamilton fell one point shy of her personal best as the freshman notched 24 points. Shade finished with a career-best 16 points while Hallsted (12) and Kelly (11) added double figures as well. Davidson's marks in the three-point column (13-of-33) are both single game school records.

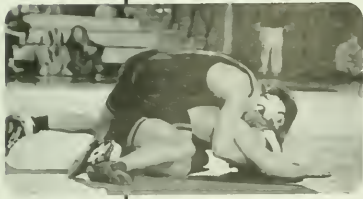

'Cats on path to improvement with young team

The wrestling team's success was based more around the improvement of each individual rather than the group as a whole. The squad continued to improve under the tutelage of head coach T.J. Jaworsky, winning four dual matches as well as finishing first at the Washington & Lee Tournament. Already Jaworsky has added 16 members over the last two seasons — all dedicated wrestlers who intend to make Davidson competitive.

The Wildcat roster featured only two seniors this season with the remainder of the 'Cats of freshman or sophomore status. Sophomore Patrick Coman (125), posted a 12-4 dual record this year, including a 3-1 mark in conference action. He closed the regular season winning six of his last seven matches.

Along with Coman, three other grapplers performed strongly in Davidson's lower weight classes. Freshman Jim Avola had a productive season at 133, recording an 11-9 overall record. Avola earned first place at the Washington & Lee Tournament and also closed the season with four victories in his last five matches. Although the Wildcats struggled to stay healthy at 141, sophomore Matt Leonard, recorded 11 wins, five in dual action. Senior Adam Sperling went 8-8 at 157 in dual action, marking the best totals of his collegiate career.

Davidson competed at the Washington &

Lee Tournament, bringing home the crown for the second time in the last four years. Avola, Coman, Leonard, O'Hair and Marcus Boyd (165) all notched first place finishes as the 'Cats scored 96.5 points, 22.5 more than second-place Cumberland.

Davidson put together its best conference performance of the season at VMI, winning five of the first seven matches. In the driver's season with a 19-6 lead, Davidson gave up 17 points in the final three matches, falling 23-19. O'Hair was the lone Wildcat to earn back-to-back wins the following day against North Carolina and Virginia. His efforts earned him SoCon Wrestler of the Week.

Davidson concluded the regular season with dual matches. Sperling and O'Hair each posted at least one victory on senior day.

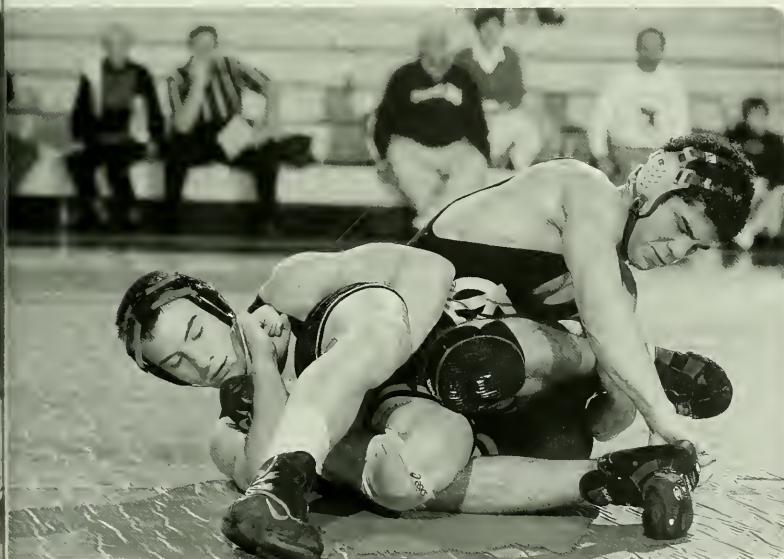
Finally the 2004 Southern Conference Championships rolled around. The stars of Davidson's regular season, Coman and O'Hair, were the top finishers at the tourney as well. Both ended the day with records of 2-2 and in fourth place. Both advanced to the semifinals but they lost their next matches, dropping to the consolation bracket.

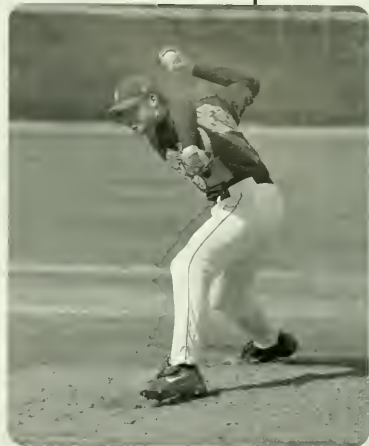

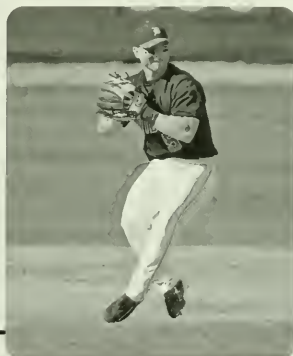

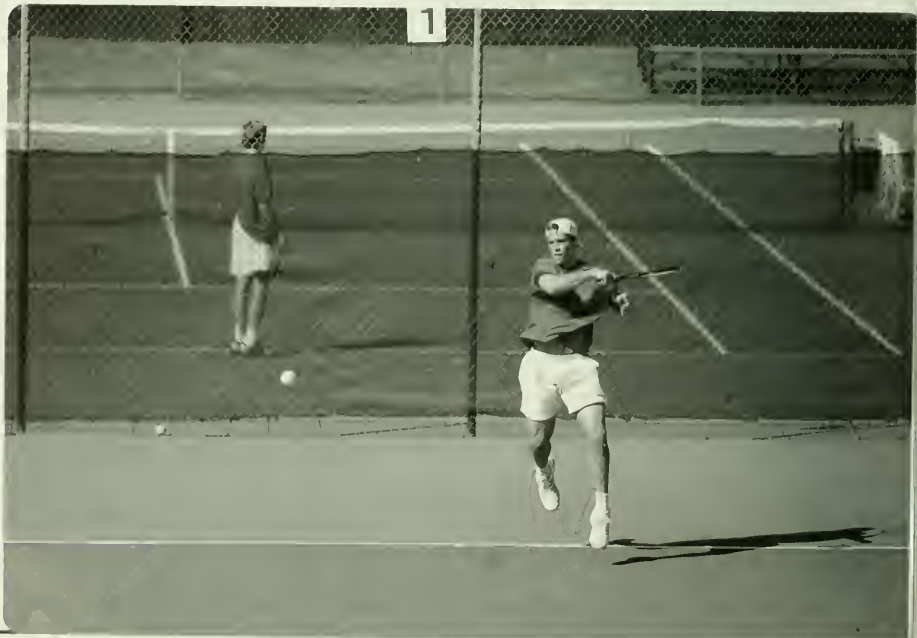

Davidson defeats UNCG despite earlier loss

Less than a week ago, the UNC Greensboro men's tennis team edged Davidson by a count of 4-3, but the Wildcats returned the favor April 22, 2004, with an exciting 4-3 triumph in the first round of the 2004 Southern Conference Tournament. The victory breaks a four-match losing skid for Davidson (10-11) and sets up a quarterfinal meeting with top-seeded East Tennessee State.

Davidson, seeded ninth, started the contest just as it had last week by taking the doubles point. Senior Rob Haywood and junior Russ Burns (#1) were down a break in the early stages of their contest before rallying for a 9-7 win. The third doubles team of senior Bryan Stonestreet and freshman Porus Jetli played a solid match to earn an 8-2 victory.

In singles, Stonestreet (#2) and

freshman John Bolton (#6) easily won their matches. However, the eighth-seeded Spartans (5-18) prevailed at numbers one, three and four singles to level the contest at 3-all.

Sophomore Daniel Bermeo (#5) was finally able to clinch the Wildcat win by defeating UNCG's Pieter Visser in three sets, 6-7, 6-1, 6-3. Last week, both Bermeo and Bolton had lost to their Spartan opponents in straight sets.

"Two things made the difference today," said Davidson head coach Jeff Frank. "We had a great team effort in doubles and the new guys stepped up in

singles. I think [Bermeo and Bolton] have finally settled into their roles in the starting lineup which certainly bodes well for the rest of the tournament and next year."

Davidson and ETSU squared off April 23. The Cats suffered a 4-0 loss to the top-seeded Buccaneers.

Top finishers, freshman Steve Mayo and sophomore Tim Dillon both ended in a tie for 16th place,

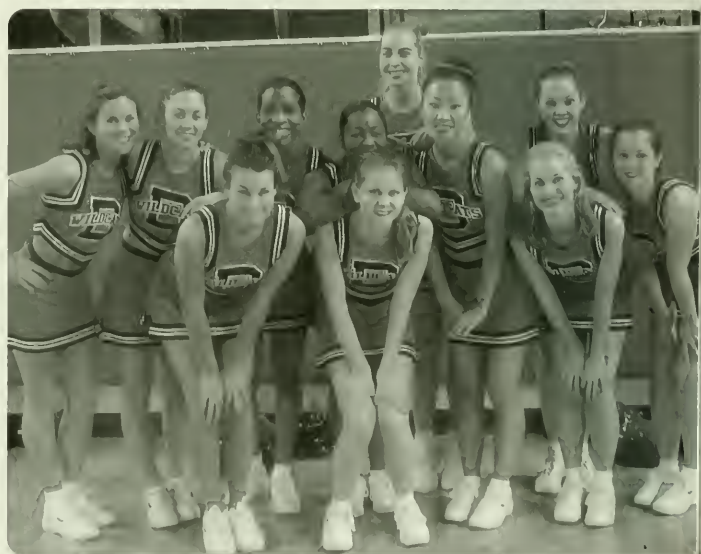
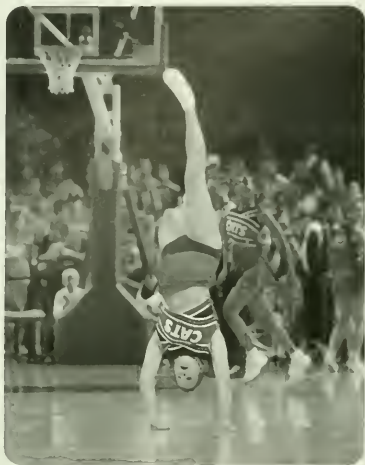

Colophon

The 2003-2004 Quips & Cranks was published by Jostens Publishing Company at their Winston-Salem, NC plant. The 338 page book, an increase of 10 over last year's, was printed on 80 lb gloss paper, 56 of which are full process color. It features a custom litho cover (artwork by Bill Ma) with "swirlpool" graining. The cover font is ATYanamar, as is the primary font throughout the book, with fun exceptions. The cover material is gunmetal litho 478 with black illustration over a silvery blue (Fontenot® 8201 C) background. All images were either scanned at 300 dpi or taken with various digital cameras and edited, if need be, using Adobe Photoshop v7.0. All layouts were created with Adobe InDesign v1.0. Photos were submitted electronically via CD and proof printouts. Portraits were all taken by Lifetouch, and faculty and staff portraits were provided by College Communications. Of the 850 books ordered, 650 were pre-ordered by cool parents and students using the Jostens "My Choice" sales program. 44 senior tributes were purchased, though only one business advertisement was placed. The books cost \$30 each + 7% sales tax (NC only) and will be available for late purchase at \$40 until supply runs out. Printed at the end of the summer, books are always mailed, free of charge, to graduated seniors.
