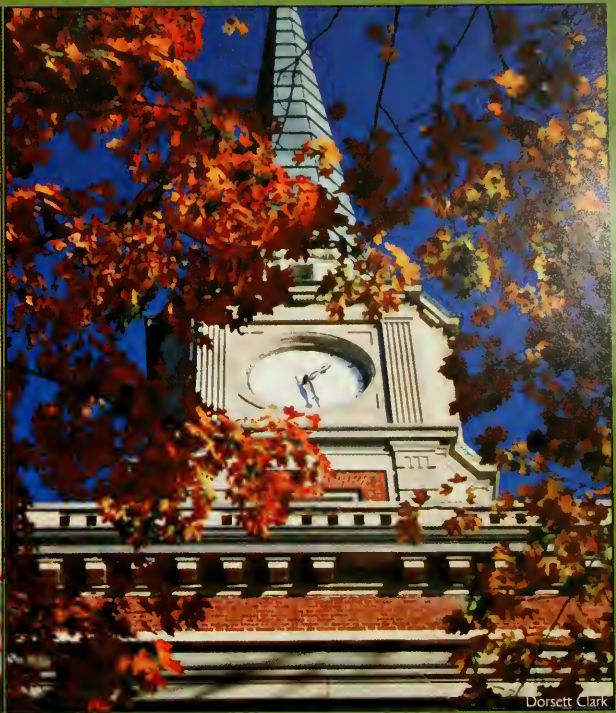

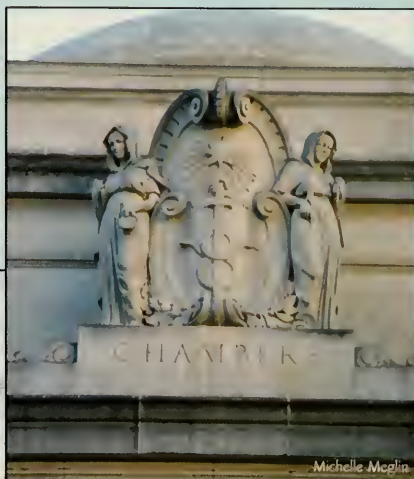

Students frequent Chambers when they attend class, study after class, visit a professor, have a meeting or event in the Gallery, or want to watch a movie on the large screens now in every classroom.

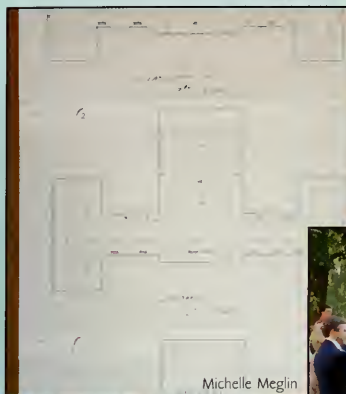
Because the Chambers Building is such an fundamental part of campus, both situated in the heart of campus and as a center of activity, the initiation of the 2002 \$21.5 million Chambers renovation project has received a lot of attention. On Thursday October 7, 2004 the Davidson College community celebrated the

Chambers Dedication and were overjoyed with the completion of the project. The ceremony had several speakers including, but not limited to, Bobby Vagt, College President, senior Katharine Hubbard, SGA President, and Clark Ross, Dean of Academic Affairs. The Davidson Delilahs and Generals gave a beautiful rendition of the Alma Mater moments before the Chambers bell was risen. The bell, once a staple of Davidson College, has been absent since December 2002 in preparation for the renovations. The crowd of alumni, students, faculty and staff cheered as the Clark Ross rang the bell for the first time in years.

The entire community of Davidson College expresses their extreme gratitude to all of the donors who made this renovation possible and are recognized with plaques throughout the building. We also recognize Jenkins-Peer Architects and Rodgers

Builders Inc. for their speedy completion of the project.

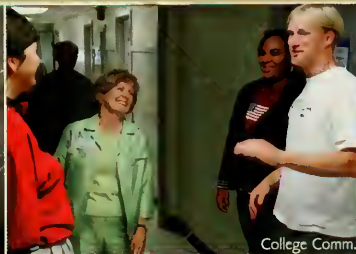

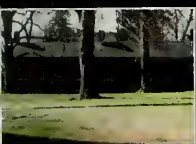

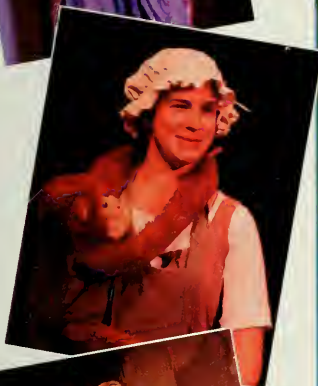

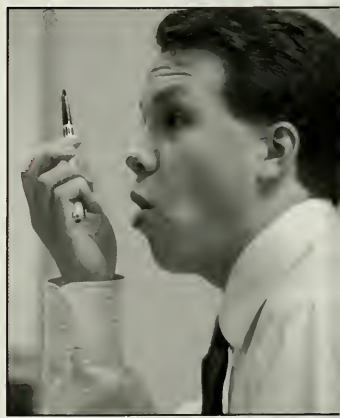

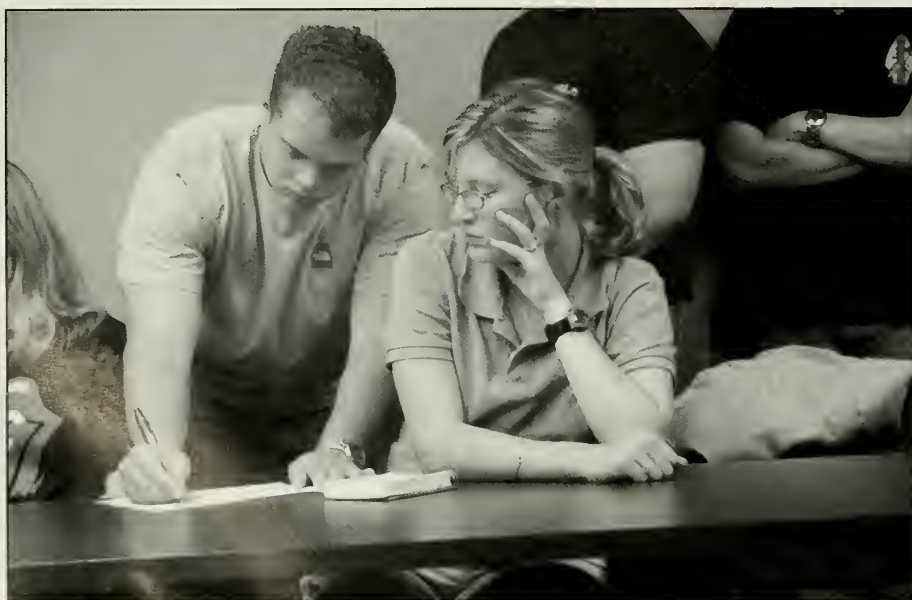

Ars Longa is Davidson's new (and only) student visual arts consortium. It was chartered by SGA and granted money by the ATC in the fall of 2004. The organization is broken down into five separate clubs: Ceramics, Photography, Artistic Projects, Visiting Artists, and Art Travel. 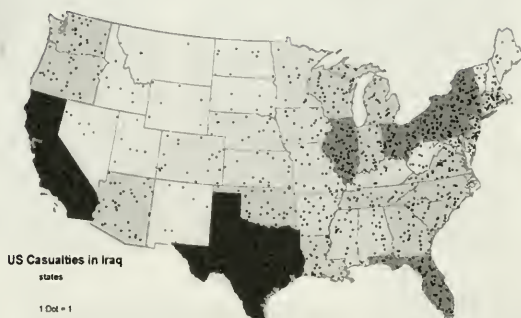

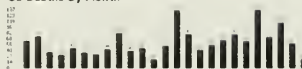
1,501 US Military Casualties in Iraq

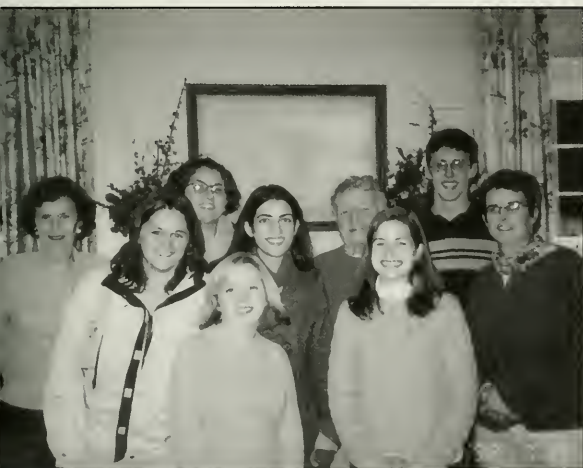

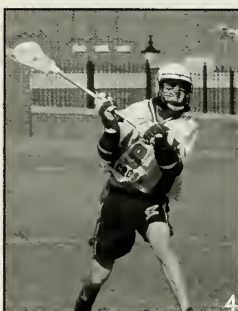

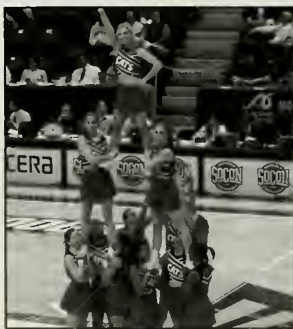

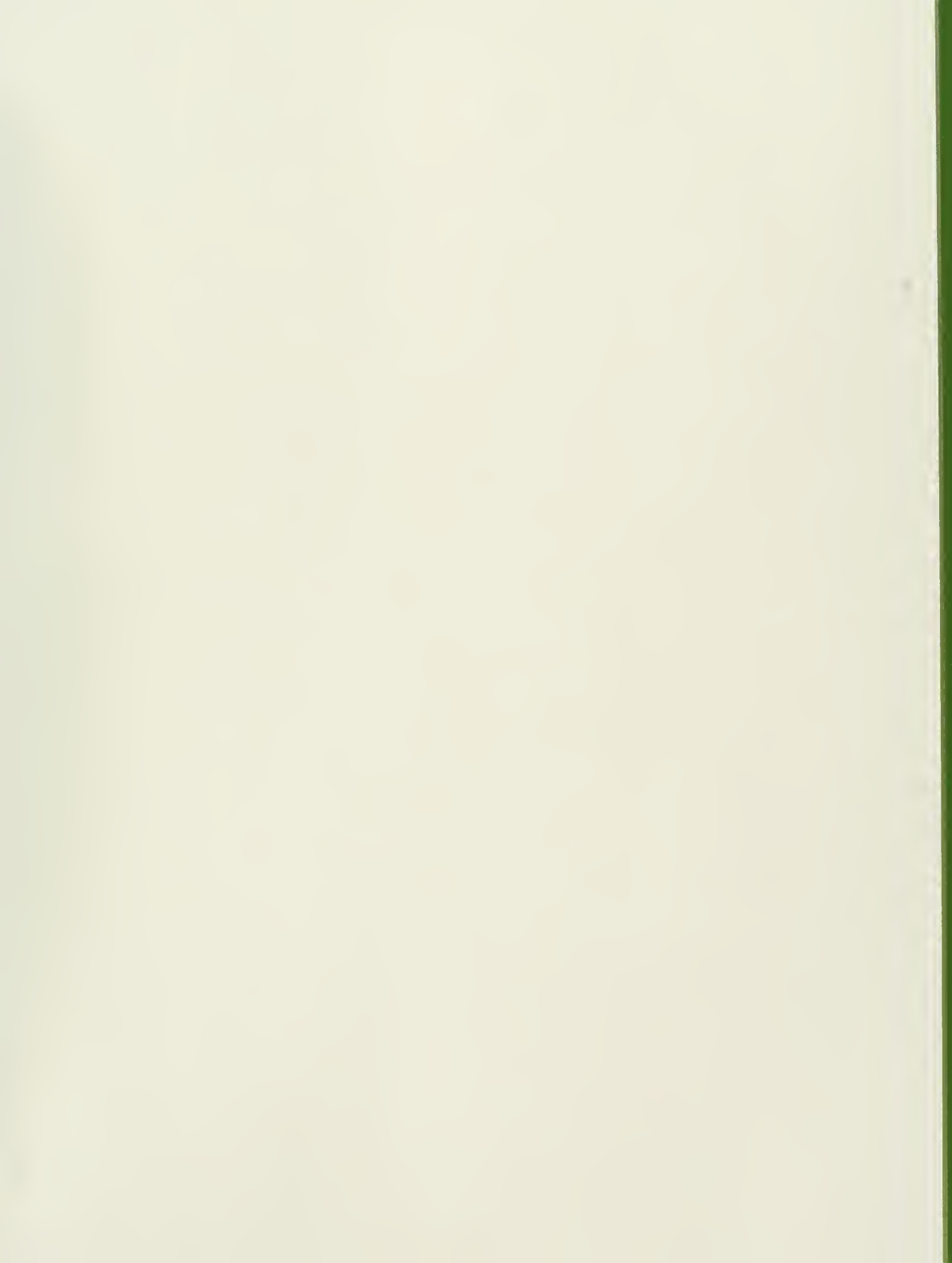
Editor's Piece

Colophon

The 2004-2005 was published by Jostens Publishing Company in their Winston-Salem, NC plant. The 305 page book was printed on 80lb gloss paper. The book features 64 full process color pages, an increase of 8 from last year. The custom litho cover with "sweep" graining features a 4-color tip-lamination and silver embossing. The cover fonts are AYT**Danny** and AYT**JADE**. AYT**ebony** is the primary font throughout the book with some exceptions for headlines, subheadlines, etc. All images were either scanned in or taken digitally and edited with Adobe Photoshop v7.0, if needed. All layouts were created with Adobe PageMaker v7.0 often using Yeartech templates for inspiration. Pages were submitted electronically via CD and Netline online submission and proofed using actual-size paper proofs. Student portraits were taken by Lifetouch and faculty and staff portraits were provided by College Communications. 38 senior advertisements were purchased.
