During our four years at WSSU, we have witnessed the retirement of some of the University's best professors and have felt the loss of two dear ones (Dr. Joseph N. Patterson & Mrs. Juanita Oubre). We have witnessed a change in administration with the retirement of Dr. Kenneth R. Williams, chief administrator for over sixteen years; and the appaintment of Dr. H. Douglas Covington, the sixth chief administrator of the University.

With changing organizational patterns, we essentially felt a changing atmosphere emerging before us. The occurrence of such multiple changes taking place as they were during out time meant that we were different — for our presence alone

meant we were port of that oggregate change.

Look out WSSU — the Freshman Class of '75 has arrived." This was the attitude of the Class of '79 when we first arrived on the compus. Eager to learn and raring to succeed, the Freshman Class of '75 worked diligently in an effort to get to our

present position - "Graduating Class of '79."

The first night on the compus was in complete darkness. There were no lights anywhere on the entire compus except for street lights. Oh, what a frightful predicament for poor freshmen to be in. But as the days grew into months and months into years, things progressed along very well for class. The first freshmen class talent shaw was presented in the Kenneth R. Williams Auditorium entitled "Shining Stars of '79." The talent show gave us an apportunity to prove what a talented class we actually were. This event proved to be very successful, thanks to the help and cooperation of everyone.

As the acodemic year '75-'76 progressed we had many honored guests, one of whom was Cangressman Yvanne B. Burke.

She was quite inspirational in increasing our political awareness.

1976-77 school year was one in which WSSU continued its stride to upgrade its academic position. This school year was indeed different for us because it meant that we had accomplished our objectives at the callege level. We were, thus, maturing and readying ourselves for another level of educational aspirations. We were now really becoming aware of the importance of the aggregate person and that the individual must possess not only knowledge, but the abilities to use that knowledge wisely when applied to the real world.

With the arrival of the new head coach, Bill Hoyes, in 1976, came the hope of a winning football team. Those hapes were realized a year later, Fall, 1977. We realized just how lucky we were in gaining such an outstanding cooch as the Rams amassed on 11-0 season record. Coach Hayes was named Mutual Black Network's "Black Caach of the Year" after leading

the Rams to their first Gold Bowl in recent history.

The presence of our other outstanding coach, Clarence "Bighouse Gaines was without question a major factor behind the success of our spectular team. Gaines has guided the men's basketball team to victory after victory. These victories have led Coach Gaines to be honored as the "Winningest Active Basketball Coach." Thanks to all the coaches, WSSU has proven to be one of the most outstanding black colleges in the area of sports!

During '77-'78 we looked forward to many things. As juniors, we progressed further up the ladder to academic excellence. the joy and excitement of being away from home had worn off. We were striving even harder to see the arrival of May, 1979. The arrival of the new Choncellor brought many changes to the campus of WSSU. Many of the changes were in the

improvement of the curriculum.

One, among several recent structural additions to the campus grounds, is the Communications Building wich was completed this academic year and occupied during the 1979 spring semester. The 2.2 million dollar, three level structure with a total area of 40,000 square feet aesthetically enhanced the campus grounds as well as served as a means of enriching the existing academic programs. The structure allowed for programmatic expansion, expecially in mass communications. The constructing of the Cammunications Building ultimately would help the University to better serve the career needs of its students, to serve the educational needs of the community, and to have greater capacity in projecting its image.

Also on our compus can be found the newly constructed Atkins Hall, which was dedicated during the fall semester in

remembrance of Dr. S. G. Atkins for his outstanding contributions to the school. Atkins Hall has a housing capacity of 250 students. With the building of the new Atkins came a greater togetherness of the student body. The new dormitory made it

more convenient for the young men to remain on compus.

As seniors, the Class of 1979 entered the compus of WSSU very optimistically. This was the second year that our Chancellar, Dr. Douglas Covington, served as our chief administrator. In the fall term many challenges, both anticipated and unanticipated, were presented to him which required quite considerable attention on his port. Even though there were intricate problems facing him, his official inauguration which lasted approximately a week, did however prove to be quite successful. To us he expressed great dedication to our values and beliefs.

We grew intellectually because we achieved many honors and attained many personal goals. Academics never declined because we were pressing toward the day when we would proudly march down the aisle to embark upon future goals. Socially, the propositions of a Jazz Concert, and the senior class trip to "ATLANTA" were very well taken.

The emergence of the mony new organizations on compus added to the totality of university life. These new organizations

extended services to the students, university, and community.

The R. J. Reynolds multi-million dollar grant to Winston-Salem State University proved to be having beneficial results for society as well as for the school and its students. This was indicated by the diverse fields that were being pursued by the remaining 16 seniors who were scholarship recipients. These seniors are the last scholars to be supported by the R. J. Reynolds Program as it was in its final four-year phase when this class entered.

The aforesaid, has not pretended to inluded every memorable incident of our "Old SU days". Each reader will have a personal set of reflections and thus will always remember their stay at Winston-Salem State University. But, in closing the authors would like to leave you with these thoughts:

"We as graduotes must first begin to ossert ourselves and mointain a frame of mind that will allow us to achieve. We must realize that while our instructors presented the ideas and information required for success, it is our responsibility to use these tools in meeting our committment to society better. We have acquired the knowledge to overcome most of the obstacles that face us daily, but the fact still remains that we must establish our priorities in terms of what we want to achieve."


Bumpy, a native of Winston-Salem and a senior Physical Education major, has been the equipment manager, trainer, statistician and a most important link in the chain of the athletic

department for several years.

He is one of the mojor forces behind the successful Ram football team and basketball team. Without the trainer and equipment manager, it would be impossible for a college team to get on the football field or basketball court. The trainer applies the protective bandaging to those weak points of the body and the equipment manager takes care of suiting the players with the outer protective clothing and padding.

Bumpy starts his year in early August. During football season he reports to the training room before 7 a.m. every day to

receive any player that might be sick or injured.

Head bosketboll coaches of the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association brought their stor players to Henderson, NC recently to look each other over and boast or woil about the upcoming season. On the long trip from Winston-Salem Clarence E. "Bighouse" Gaines fell into a reflective moad.

"Mike," he asked his 6-5 farward Mike Robinson, "do you believe in reincarnation?" After a long, suspicious silence Robinsan replied, "Well, sort of." "What do you want to be when you came bock? I want to be an ont." declored Gaines. "In that case I wont to be a big shae," said Robinsan, his interest in conversation picking up.

"A shoe! Why o shae?"

"So I can stomp ants!"

"Oh, Mike," grimoced Bighause. "That really makes me sad to hear you soy that." "I wouldn't stomp you, Chief. I'd take care of you just like you've taken care of me," reassured Robinson. "I'd put you in a glass ant farm and make you run

Bighouse just looked heavenward and shook his head. It was hard to tell which he dreaded more, the upcaming season or his next life as an ant.

That little conversation just might reveal the key to Bighause's success as a coach at Winstan-Salem State University the last 32 years. He works his players hard, but he also builds a rapport with them that allows them to know the caach as someone they can relax with and opproach off the

His farmer players drap by and call so often that sametimes it's hard far Gaines to meet deadlines. Clea Hill, who was the Number 1 droft choice of the St. Lauis Hawks in 1961 - and the first ballplayer from a Black college to be first round draft choice in the NBA, calls nearly every month to check an his farmer coach and to tell him of high school and junior college players in New Iersev.

Carlos Terry was drafted then let go by the Los Angeles Lakers and is now playing in the prafessional league in the Philippines. He calls Bighause every week. While Earl Monroe was negotiating with the Knicks and several other teams a short while ago, he spent mast of his time in Winstan-Salem. He ran and worked out an compus, and all the while his companian and odvisar was Coach Gaines.

Thomas Paulin is playing pro ball in Europe. One of his first stops in this country between seasons is Coach Gaines' affice. Between the stops of those athletes who made it to the professional ranks are the players and students who chose other professions. They stop by unannounced and are never tald to wait ar to come back same other time. They all know they are welcome and just drap in. Homecoming week is a traffic jam that never clears in the new Athletic Camplex named in hanar af America's winningest active basketball caach.

Since 1947, Gaines' teams have wan 639 games and lost 256, a whopping .714 winning percentage. Those wins include 12 CIAA conference championships, 8 conference tournament wins, a NAIA District 26 championship, 6 trips to the NAIA ployaffs in Konsos City and the NCAA College Divisian Championship in 1967. Along the way he has picked up Coach of the Year anors from the CIAA, NAIA District and the NCAA.

Gaines' 639 wins put him in 6th place on the all-time list of winning basketball coaches. He trails John Waaden (667), Ed Diddle (759), Hank Iba (767), Phog Allen (771) and Adolph Rupp (874). He is already in the CIAA and the Morgan State Sport Halls of

On Thursday, Navember 2, at 7:30 p.m. he joined the North Carolina Sparts Hall of Fame at the Benton Convention Center. Commenting on his election Gaines recently soid, "It's good that achievement at small calleges is getting recognition, and it's nice to be in such good company." Other NC Hall of Famers are Enas Sloughter, Smaky Burgess, Goylard Perry, Roman Gabriel and Bones McKinney.

Outstanding as his achievements on the court are, his successes as an Athletic Director are also being recognized. Fram 1946-49 he compiled an 18-9-2 record as WSSU's football caach. The record was the school's best until he hired Bill Hayes. In three years, Hoyes has directed his teams to 22 consecutive regular season wins, 2 perfect seasons, back-to-school CIAA titles and an averall record of 26-8-0.

The faotball team's success is Gaines' success too. At a recent news conference Gaines explained that his job as Athletic Director was to meet NAIA and NCAA regulations and field teams in 8 sports and to see that there was "balance" in the school's sports program. To Gaines, balance means "winning." He has to find coaches who con win and help them chalk up the scores. In years as Athletic Director Winstan-Salem State has wan 2 conference track championships, 3 football championships and 6 CIAA galf titles. Last year he hired Mike Edwards to boost the wrestling program, and this year WSSU is getting its feet wet in competitive swimming. The goal is always to win. "If I play you in marbles," says Gaines in earnest, "I will try my best to beot Thats what he expects from his coaches and athletes.

The other schools in the CIAA are very familiar with Bighause's drive for winning teams. None of the other cooches at Henderson taak Gaines very seriausly as he spoke maurnfully of hoving only a 6-5 center and 6-6 farwards. "I'll be lucky if I break even this season," Gaines told the assembled caaches, players and reporters. The opposing caaches all laaked as though they had heard that before and vated Hampton Institute as the tap team in the Northern Division of the CIAA and predicted that

WSSU would win the Southern Division title, which it did.

Wrestlers Shoot For Top

The Winston-Salem State University Wrestling program took another forward step in its development, with a 25-man roster. The Rams were at full strength for the first time in the school's history. Coach Mike Edwards had mat men in each of the 10 weight classes and depth at each class except the 177 lb.

The full roster, a new weight program, and the plush setting of the \$2.2 million C. E. Gaines Athletic Complex

excited Coach Edwards, the team and Ram fons.

Scheduling changes increased the challenge to Coach Edwards to put together a winning program at WSSU. Pembroke, the perennial Carolinas Conference Champ, stayed on the schedule and the Rams challenged Appalachian State, the Citadel and UNC-Chapel Hill. All of those have highly competitive teams in their conferences. In addition, Edwards took a squad to Gainesville, Florida, the site of the Sunshine Open, a taurnament that attracts top collegiate teams from across the U.S.

Edwards hoped for at least a break even season. In 1975 the Roms were 1-6, then 3-5 in 1976 and last year. This

year WSSU missed CIAA wrestler Reggie Sherrord who is in medical school.

With a lot of hard work the Roms finished 10-3 overall, won 4th place in the CIAA and 3rd in NAIA District 26. Curtis Gore won first place in the 177 class of the CIAA and Ricky Hargrove won first in 134 class of District 26. In the CIAA, Hargrove won 2nd and Thaddeus Wilkins won 2nd in the 167 class. In District 26 Horace Williams won 2nd place in the 142 class and Charles Hooker placed 3rd in the 150 class.

By virtue of their 1st and 2nd place finishes in the District Tournament, Horgrave and Williams became the first Rams to represent Winston-Salem State in the National Tournament in WSSU's wrestling history. Both were

eliminated, Hargrove after 2 wins, and both hope to return next year with more Rams.


Edwards is hopeful that he can continue to recruit well on the East Coast. "WSSU offers what no other college in North Carolina can, the opportunity to wrestle in the CIAA, NAIA and the NCAA Division II, and a quality education at a great location."

With his new recruits and a core of winning upperclassmen, Edwards hopes to surprise other teams in the CIAA and NAIA.



Communications Building

Winston-Salem State's Communications Building is a specialized facility housing the Department of Communication Arts and several academic support services. It is designed to facilitate the use of media and other educational technology and to reinforce the teaching process and enhance learning. Instructional areas range from a 260 seat multi-media lecture hall to individualized instructional areas in the Writing Center, the Academic Computer Center, the Enrichment Center, and the Reading Laboratory.

Central to the building's designated function are a radio station and a television studio both specifically planned to support the educational goals of the university. The academic programs geared to these facilities are designed to maximize student involvement in the practical and theoretical aspects of the cammunication process and to broaden career options.

Other facilities or programs housed in the building include the Media Center which provides technical and service support for the entire complex as well as instructional design support and necessory hardware for general classroom and individual instruction; a 45 station Language and Speech laboratory; the Administrative Data Processing Center, the Special Services Program, and General Studies.
