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P R E F A C E .



IN accordance with an increasing desire to secure transcripts of early Parish Registers, which are each year becoming less legible, it was our original intention to print those for the Parish of Whitkirk without any additional matter. But in the Vestry Chest and elsewhere we found a number of records, such as the Churchwardens' Accounts for a portion of the seventeenth century, which seemed equally worthy of preservation. Fresh discoveries led to further research, and we obtained a variety of information concerning the general history of the Parish, especially as to the possessions of the Knights Templars and the later annals of Temple Newsam, and including the Genealogy of several Local Families.

This material we have grouped under the title, "Records of Whitkirk." We have introduced sketches which we hope will make the book more interesting, and may themselves prove valuable in case the originals either disappear, or undergo alteration.

We offer our best thanks to the many friends who have given us information, or allowed us to peruse records in their possession.

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Records of the Parish of Whitkirk.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.



PREVIOUS to the year 1846, when the ecclesiastical district of Seacroft¹ was created, the parish of Whitkirk included (wholly or in part) the following townships:—Austhorpe, Seacroft, Temple Newsam, and Thorp Stapleton. Austhorpe includes the hamlet of Manston (and that of Barrowby, in the parish of Garforth); Seacroft that of Killingbeck (and that of Coldcotes in the borough and parish of Leeds); and Temple Newsam those of Colton-with-Whitkirk, Halton, and Newsam-with-Waterside. Temple Newsam includes also the hamlet of Osmondthorpe, in the borough and parish of Leeds.

In Domesday Book the name Whitkirk does not appear, though, with the exception of Austhorpe, the component parts of the parish are there enumerated as follows:—Halletune, Sacroft, Neuhusum, Torp (Thorp Stapleton), Sceltune (Skelton is a small district partly in Osmondthorpe and partly in Whitkirk parish), Coletun, and Mainestune. The three last-named are described as “soke,” or subject territory, of the manor of Kippax. Colton is also described separately as a berewick or dependency of the manor of “Cipetun” (Gipton). The entry is interesting, as it contains reference to a Church. “Manor and Berewick. In Cipetun and Coletun Gospatrick had four carucates of land and a half to be taxed, and there may be three ploughs there. Ilbert now has it, and it is waste. Value in King Edward’s time 40/- now 2/-. There is a Church there, and wood pasture half a mile long and half broad.”² Seeing that Whitkirk Church is within the hamlet of Colton, and that there is no Church within the limits of Gipton, it seems reasonable

to conclude that the Church alluded to occupied the site of the present one at Whitkirk.

The name Whitkirk, or Whitechurch, is considered with great probability to show that it was built at a time when permanent Churches of stone were new and noticeable objects, and had not generally replaced the earlier wooden structures. The early Churches were black, and would therefore present a sufficiently striking contrast to the stone ones to gain for the latter the nickname White Church.³ Assuming this theory to be correct, we infer that at the date of the Domesday survey the stone Church did not exist, or, at least, had not been sufficiently long built to have imposed its name upon the parish.

The earliest occurrence of the name Whitkirk, or Whitechurch, we have discovered is in a charter of Henry de Laci, by which, in the capacity of overlord, he confirms to the Knights Templars the lands in "Nieuhus, Scheltune, Choletune, and Witechurche,"⁴ granted to them by his tenant William de Viliers. The date of this document is proved to have been not later than 1181, and was possibly as early as 1155.⁵

HISTORICAL EVENTS.

The earliest event of historical interest with which the parish of Whitkirk is specially associated occurred in the year 655, when the battle of Winwœd was fought, between Oswi, King of Northumbria, and Penda, King of Mercia, in which the latter was slain, and the cause of heathendom, which he championed, received its death-blow.

Bede,⁶ who is the earliest historian of this battle, records that it was fought near the river "Vinwed," in the country of "Loidis" (Leeds), which river, being at the time in flood, swept away large numbers of the fugitive Mercians as they attempted to cross it. The scene of the engagement, called in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle "Winwidfield," is identified by Thoresby⁷ as Whinmoor.⁸ The event, he holds, is commemorated in the names Whinmoor and Seacroft. The former name he derives from the Saxon "winn-an," to contend, the latter from "saec," battle, and "croft," a field—the one, in his opinion, marking the ground where the armies met and began to skirmish, the other the place where the fight raged fiercest. A short distance west of Cross Gates station is a hollow known as Hell-dike, a name which Thoresby derives from the Saxon "hell," the grave, and which he considers to be indicative of the spot where large numbers of the slain were buried. His notion, therefore, seems to be that the Mercians fled from Seacroft, through Cross Gates, and across what is now Temple Newsam park, to the nearest point of the Aire. Whitaker⁹ ridicules this theory, and suggests that the fight took place on the banks of the river Went, near Pontefract; but it appears to us that he fails to

support his opinion by any cogent reasons. On the other hand, tradition points to the locality indicated by Thoresby as having been the scene of an important engagement at an early period.

Half a mile north of Seacroft the York road makes a steep descent to the Cock beck, which at that point is known as Grimesdike. It is a common tradition of the neighbourhood that at a remote date a great battle was fought near this spot. This tradition seems to be supported by the word Grimesdike, which we take to be derived from the Anglo-Saxon "grim,"¹⁰ fury or rage. To the south of the York road, between Grimesdike and Seacroft, is Penwell farm, which, says tradition, takes its name from a king, Pen or Penda, who was slain in the above battle, and who, previous to the fight, drank at a well which is still shown there. It is, of course, possible that this story was suggested by Thoresby's book, still we think it well to record it.

About two hundred yards from Penwell farm the course of a Roman road, running parallel with Stanks lane, is still pointed out. Its mound has now disappeared, but it is said to have been distinct a generation ago. This was no doubt a portion of the road which connected Castleford with Adel, *via* Swillington Bridge.¹¹ For some distance northward from Swillington this road is still in use, and is marked on the ordnance map as "Street;" but before reaching Bullerthorpe the modern lane abandons the line of the Roman road, and runs parallel with it as far as the Selby highroad. This latter portion appears on the map as "Street Lane." The mound of the ancient road can be very clearly traced inside the plantation on the north of the entrance to Temple Newsam, and across the fields beyond, one of which is known as "Roman Rigg" field. North of the Selby road it can be faintly traced as far as the West Yorkshire Colliery, its line pointing in the direction of Stanks and Penwell. If, as has been suggested, the invading Mercians entered by this road, Whinmoor would lie directly in their line of march.¹²

Passing to the Norman Conquest, we have evidence from Domesday Book that at the close of the Anglo-Saxon period this parish enjoyed an ample share of agricultural prosperity. From the same source it is painfully clear that the process of conquest had reduced the district to little better than a wilderness. For example, the rateable value of Seacroft fell from £4 in King Edward's time to 4/- at the time of the survey; that of Halton from 20/- to 2/-; and that of Newsam from 60/- to 6/-. Of these the two former are described as waste.

The whole of Whitkirk parish was included in the Conqueror's grant to Ilbert de Laci, of Pontefract, the founder of the powerful family of Laci, Earls of Lincoln, whose extensive possessions in this part of the county are still known as the "Honor of Pontefract."¹³

From the Conquest to the present time the historical associations of the parish have been briefly these:—1. The establishment of a Preceptory of the Knights Templars at Newsam about the year 1181. 2. The rebellion and death of Thomas Lord Darcy. 3. The birth of Lord Darnley, the unfortunate husband of Mary Queen of Scots. Of these three events we shall treat more fully under Temple Newsam. 4. A fight at Seacroft,¹⁴ on March 29th, 1643, between Sir Thomas Fairfax and a strong detachment of the Royalist army. Sir Thomas was in the act of marching a small force from Tadcaster to Leeds, and had reached the entrance to Seacroft village, from Whinmoor, when he was attacked and completely routed by a superior force of the enemy, who had followed him across Bramham Moor. 5. Lastly, though not least important, the birth, at Austhorpe Lodge, on 8th June, 1724, of John Smeaton, the great engineer.

Notes on Historical Sketch.

(Note 1.)

The Church of St. James, at Seacroft, was opened 28th November, 1845, and a chapelry district was assigned to it by an Order in Council, dated 21st January, 1846, and published in the *London Gazette* of January 30th. The principal contributors to the erection of the Church, and that of the Schools, which latter were opened 3rd February, 1840, were the Wilson family, of Seacroft Hall, and the Rev. Arthur Martineau, Vicar of Whitkirk. Subsequent benefactions from the former family were a peal of bells, given by Mrs. Wilson in 1865, and a sum of £3,500, bequeathed for the augmentation of the living by Miss Sarah Wilson, who died in 1867.

Amongst other memorials of this family in the church, a marble font, given in 1878, in memory of Miss Anne Wilson, is especially worthy of notice. The west window is in memory of George Walker, of Killingbeck Lodge, author of "Costumes of Yorkshire."

By another Order in Council, dated May 1st, 1849, and published in the *London Gazette* on the 4th of the same month, a chapelry district was assigned to the Church of St. James, at Manston, in the parish of Barwick-in-Elmet.

By the Act 19 and 20 Victoria, commonly called Lord Blandford's Act, the chapelry districts of Seacroft and Manston became new parishes.

And by an Order in Council, dated September 30th, 1873, and published in the *London Gazette* on October 10th of the same year, an exchange of territory was made between the new parishes of Seacroft and Manston. That portion of the original parish of Seacroft which lay to the south of the original parish of Manston, and contained Old Manston, as well as Manston Lodge and Manston Hall, was assigned to Manston; and that portion of the original parish of Manston which lay to the north-east of the church and village of Seacroft, and contained Whinmoor, was assigned to Seacroft.

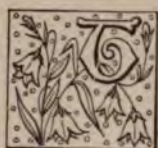

THE RECTORY AND VICARAGE.



TORRE¹ tells us that "the Church of Whitechurch was given by William de Viliers to the Knights Templars; hence the master and brethren of the Temple of Solomon in England have been ever patrons of it till their dissolution."

In early times advowsons of Rectories appear to have been almost always appendant to some manor,² and we may perhaps conclude, from Torre's statement, that the Rectory of Whitkirk was in that position, and that it passed to the Templars as an appendage of the lands granted to them by Viliers, since it is not mentioned in Laci's charter of confirmation.³

During their tenure of Newsam the Templars appointed Vicars to conduct the service of the Church,⁴ two of whom are named in Torre's list.

In August, 1312, the Order of Knights Templars was formally abolished in England. Their estates, however, had been seized by Edward four years previously, and were in his hands at the above date. In 1311 we find the appointment by the Crown of one William de Hillum as receiver of the profits of Whitkirk Rectory.⁵

It will be remembered that shortly after the suppression of the Templars Pope Clement V. bestowed their lands upon the Knights Hospitallers, but it was not till the year 1324 that the statute "De Terris Templariorum" was passed, by which Edward II. gave effect to the gift in England.⁶ By virtue of that Act the Hospitallers obtained Whitkirk Church as parcel of the Templars' possessions at Newsam.⁷ Of its history meantime, we have no record; but we may presume that it was included in the grant of Temple Newsam to Sir Robert Holland, who, as we shall see later, held the estate for a short time during the interval.

We find from the inventory of the Hospitallers' lands, made in 1338, that the Rectory was then appropriated to their House at Wetherby. But at the dissolution of the Order in 1540 (32 Hen. VIII., c. 24), as appears from the "Valor Ecclesiasticus," it belonged to their Preceptory at Newland,⁸ near Normanton. During this period, except in one instance, when Sir Philip Darcy presented, Vicars were appointed by the Prior of the Hospital of St. John. About the above date the Rectorial tithes were given to the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge, who have ever since been patrons of the Vicarage. In the following list of Vicars we have

ventured to correct Torre's obvious error in ascribing the presentation of 1324,⁹ and the two succeeding ones, to the Templars.

In Torre's list, which ends with the name of Jonathan Dade, it will be noticed that a hiatus occurs between the years 1497 and 1572. During that period we have discovered the names of two Vicars—Roger Killingbell, who appears as a witness to the will of Mrs. Alice Dyneley, of Manston, in 1527; and William Herryson, who was Incumbent when the "Valor Ecclesiasticus" was compiled, in the reign of Henry VIII.

TERRIERS.¹¹

In an old MS. book which belonged to Mr. Morkill, churchwarden in 1746, are entered two early terriers of the Rectory and Vicarage of Whitkirk. The former of these is dated 1741, and is stated to have been copied from an older one of the year 1677. The date of the latter is 1748. The following are copies:—

"A True Coppy of a Terrier of the Rectory or Parsonage of Whitkirke in the County of York taken the sixteenth day of September, 1741.

"Impr. There doth belong to the Parsonage of Whitkirke afores^d

"One Tythe Barn containing six pair of posts with one Eling on the north side, along four Baysteads.

"One Foldstead on the south side of the s^d barn contain^e in length 36 yards and in breadth 28 yards.

"There belong also to the said Parsonage all the tythes corn and hay within the town and territories of Whitkirke afores^d

"All the tythe corn and hay within the townfield of Austhorpe and Manstone.

"All the tythe corn and hay within the townfield of Seacroft and Killingbeck.

"All the tythe corn and hay within a parcel of ground in Rounda leys within the afores^d parish.

"All the tythe corn within the townfields and territories of Halton and one tythe spot for hay containing by estimation 1½ acre.

"All the tythe corn and hay within the townfield & territories of Newsam.

"All the tythe corn and hay within the townfield and territories of Colton.

"All the tythe corn and hay belonging Mr. Richard Booth, Henry Wilkinson and Francis Birkdel dwelling at y^e Old Temple.

"There is also twenty shilling a year payable for all y^e tythe belonging Thorpè Stapleton and there doth belong to the s^d parsonage all the tythe corn and hay within the Bottoms belonging to the Old Temple.

"All the tythe corn and hay of the Hunger Hills and two Dunstan Hills and also out of one house in Colton now in the occupation of Wid^e Brook a free rent of twelve shilling payable yearly at Pentecost and Martinmas by equal portions besides corn and hay.

"All the tythe corn within Temple pastures & Staynard & for tythe hay in the Staynard there is paid 15s 4d per year.

“All the tythe corn in one close belonging to the Old Temple formerly in the occupation of Edw^d. Clough, was formerly called the Over Close now Kitchingman Close in Edw^d. Clark’s occupation, and for the hay there is paid 16s per year, and for one parcel of land belonging to the Old Temple formerly in the occupation of Tho^t. Clark now of Edw^d. Prince, 16s per year.

“All the tythe corn and hay within the Parke.

“All the tythe corn within one parcel of ground taken of Halton Moore.

“All the tythe corn and hay within the Quarrill Closes & for one parcel of ground belonging to the Old Temple called Cringlemire Inge 16s per annum.

“There also belongeth to the said parsonage one Chancell in the parish church of Whitkirke aforesaid.

“The above was taken out of a copy of a Terrier which was dated February 20th, 1677.”

“A Terier of the Glebe Lands Houses Ediffices Orchards Gardins Tythes and Offerings belonging to The Vicarage of Whitkirke as Drawn up and given in at the Primary Court of Correction of the most Reverend Father in God Mathew¹² Lord Arch Bishop of York held in the Church of Saint Michael le Belfreys within the City of York on Tuesday 20. day Septem^r. 1748.

“**Imp^r.** The Vicarage House,¹³ one new Barn belonging to it. An Orchard garden ffoldstead one house¹⁴ inhabited by Mary Mason wid^r. One Cottage¹⁴ inhabited by the Saxton.

There is not a Terrier of the Rectory in the Vestry Chest, and the earliest one of the Vicarage preserved there is dated 1809. In the latter occurs the following amusing item—"There remains attached to the Living as heir looms one round mahogany table and leaden tobacco box and two silver tea spoons with a crane engraved on each of them."

It also contains a description of the Communion plate, which consists of the following pieces—Two massive silver flagons, each bearing the inscription, GIVEN BY HENRY LORD IRWIN IN Y^e YEAR 1742 AND ANN HIS WIFE TO THE CHURCHE AT WHITKIRKE; a silver chalice marked "Whitkirk" only; a second bearing the inscription, "The gifte of Henrie Lord Ingram Viscount Irwin to y^e Church of Whittchurch 1666," and the Shield of Ingram surmounted by his Coronet; a silver paten, marked "Ex dono Johannis More An^o Dom. 1687"; and an alms-dish of the same size (now used as a paten), with the inscription, "Ecclesiae Sanctae Mariae de Whitkirke ad Eucharisticas oblationes colligendas Lancem hanc Johannes More de Austhorpe dicavit An^o Dom. 1685," and the arms of More—a chevron between three fleurs-de-lis.

THE side Chapel on the south of the Chancel of Whitkirk Church, now called the Temple Newsam Chapel, was founded by William Scargill, Esq., senior, of Thorp Hall, in Thorp Stapleton (by virtue of a royal license,¹⁶ dated 5th June, 1448), as a Chantry dedicated to the Holy Trinity, with an endowment of 10 marks per annum, for the support of two Chaplains to conduct daily service there.¹⁷ The date of its ordination and confirmation by the Archbishop of York are given by Torre as 20th January, 1448/9, and 1st July, 1449, respectively. The same writer also records the following list of the Chantry Priests, who it appears were of two grades, *primi* and *secundi*, or, as we may translate the words, seniors and juniors. Of the former only five names appear, but eleven of the latter are mentioned; from which circumstance we may, perhaps, infer that the juniors frequently obtained promotion. William Evers, for example, was appointed Vicar of Whitkirk in 1495, and senior Chaplain in 1513.¹⁸

The lists are brought down to the Reformation, when the Chantry was suppressed (by statute, 1 Ed. VI., c. 14). We append, in its original form, a copy of the certificate of the endowment, preserved in the Public Record Office (see next page). The document is without date, but we may presume it belongs to the reign of Edward VI.



THORP HALL.

NOTE.—The Certificate is inaccurate in (1) the description of the Chantry, which was dedicated to the Holy Trinity, not to St. Mary; and (2) the date of the foundation, 1457, which would not be the 27th, but the 35th or 36th year of Henry VI. The former error doubtless arose from a confusion with the patron saint of the church itself, St. Mary; the latter is presumably due to carelessness.

according to Thoresby,²⁰ the estate passed to the Cloughs, by one of whom, Major Clough, Esq., it was sold to Sir Arthur Ingram, senior, who dismantled the Hall. The place derives its name from the Stapletons,²¹ who held it in the thirteenth century.

THE MANSTON CHAPEL.

The space on the north side of the Chancel, now used as an organ chamber, is known as the Manston Chapel, the same to which Dodsworth refers as the "Manston Quire." It appears to have been the burial-place of the Manston family; but we are ignorant whether it received its name from that circumstance, or was originally founded by the Manstons as a Chantry. The present Chapel is evidently of the same date as the Church.

Sir Robert de Stapelton had license from the Templars, at their chapter in London, to build a Chapel “in curia sua de Thorpe” (Thorp Stapleton), and to establish a Chantry there, swearing fealty to the Templars, and reserving all the offerings to the Mother Church at Whitechurche (Whitkirk). THE CHURCH.



THE present Church at Whitkirk, dedicated to St. Mary, is built of the sandstone of the neighbourhood, in the Perpendicular Gothic style. It has a western tower, and consists of nave and side aisles (with a south porch, opposite to which was formerly a north entrance), and chancel flanked on the north by the Manston Chapel and the Vestry, and on the south by the Scargill Chantry. With the exception of the Vestry, which has evidently been added, the Church probably retains its original form. Its date is not recorded, but Whitaker's¹ suggestion, that it was built at the same time as the Scargill Chantry, is likely to be correct, since there is nothing in the masonry to indicate that the latter was an addition, but, on the contrary, it has every appearance of having been included in the original plan. According to this argument, 1448, or the following year (in which the Chantry was confirmed), is the earliest possible date of the Church.² We have proof that the Chantry was built before 1454, since by her will, dated 10th July of that year, Lady J. Wombwell directs that her body be buried in the Chapel of the Trinity in Whitkirk Church. During the years 1855-6 a general restoration of the Church took place, when the interior was modernised.³

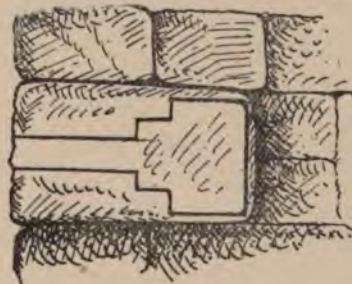

MONUMENTS IN THE CHURCH, A.D. 1891.

The space at our disposal admits of descriptions of only the principal Monuments now to be found in the Church. Amongst these a marble tablet on the north wall of the Chancel in memory of John Smeaton, the engineer, claims the first place. Its inscription is as follows:—

“Sacred to the Memory

of JOHN SMEATON, F.R.S.

A Man whom God had endowed with the most extraordinary Abilities which he indefatigably exerted for the benefit of Mankind in works of Science
And philosophical research:

More especially as an Engineer and a Mechanic. His principal work
The EDVSTONE Light-house, erected on a Rock in the open Sea
(Where one had been washed away by the violence of a storm, And another had
been consumed by the rage of Fire). Secure in its own stability and in the wise
precautions for its safety, seems not unlikely to convey to distant Ages
As it does to every nation of the Globe, The name of its Constructor.

He was born at Austhorpe, June 8th 1724,
and departed this Life Oct. 28th 1792.

Also Sacred to the Memory of
ANN, the wife of the said JOHN SMEATON, F.R.S.,
Who died January 17th 1784.

MEMORIAL WINDOWS IN THE CHURCH.

The east window of the Chancel was presented by Edward Waud, Esq., of Manston, in 1856. He also gave the window now in the tower (lately removed from the Manston Chapel), in memory of Mary, his wife, who died in 1842. The arms of Waud (or, on a pile az. three martlets ar.; quartering, Vert a chev. betw. three horses' heads coupéd ar.) are inserted in a plain window on the south side of the Church.

The remaining windows are in memory of—

(1) Four daughters of John and Naomi Rosa Atkinson, of Austhorpe Lodge.

(2) Faulkner, Barnett Blake, ob. 22 Jan., 1857; Emily Sarah Faulkner, ob. 5 May, 1861; Mary Isabella Faulkner, ob. 5 June, 1861.

(3) Mary Anne, daughter of Abraham Horsfall, ob. 1 March, 1855.

(4) Anne Isabella, wife of William Morritt and daughter of William Graveley, Esq., of Halton, ob. 6 August, 1878.

The handsome brass Lectern was given by Mrs. Wilkinson, in memory of her husband, J. Wilkinson, Esq., of Austhorpe Lodge, who died 19th June, 1873.

MONUMENTS IN THE SCARGILL OR TEMPLE NEWSAM CHAPEL.

The oldest, and perhaps the most striking, monument in the Church, and the only one of those mentioned by Dodsworth which now remains, is an alabaster altar-tomb, in memory of Sir Robert and Lady Scargill. It is erected under an arch of the wall which separates the Chapel from the Sacarium of the Church. Upon it lie the effigies of Sir Robert and his wife, and surrounding them is the inscription—"Orate pro aiab' "dñi roberti scargyll militis & dñe Jahñe uxoris sue et ancetorū "suorū fundatorū hui' cantarie quor[um animabus] propicietur [Deus "ac] etiam hic jacent [filii] eorum."* On a shield at the west end of the tomb are the arms of Scargill and Conyers, impaled. Whitaker, who gives an engraving of this tomb, notices that "the coiffure of the lady is "exactly the same with that in which Queen Anne Boleyn is usually "represented."

* The inscription on the monument is now imperfect.

This Sir Robert was the son of William Scargill, who founded the Chapel; and his wife was Jane, daughter of Christopher Conyers, Esq., of Marske, co. York. Their children were Maria, wife of Sir Marmaduke Tunstall, Knight, of Thurland Castle, co. Lancaster; and Margaret, wife of Sir John Gascoigne, Knight, of Cardington, co. Bedford—the same who gave an annuity of £10 to the poor of Whitkirk parish. The tomb was erected in accordance with the following direction, contained in the will of Lady Scargill, who is described therein as “Jane, Ladie Scargill, of Leade Hall”—

“That is to saie, firste and principallie I yelde and bequeathe my soule to Almyghtie God my Creator and Redemer, to that moste glorious immaculate virgine our ladie Sainte Marie and to all the cōpanyne in heven and my bodie to bee buried in the psh church of Whitkirke within the chauntry quere there besides my saide late husbnde where I will that myne executores within three years nexte and immediately ensuenge my decease shall cause a tombe of albaster to be maide and sette over the boannes of my saide laite husbnde and me withe such armes and scuptures as to my saide executores shall seme moste convenient: the same to be in facion like to one erected within the Colledge at Macclesfeld.”—Will proved at York, 24th Jan., 1546.



MONUMENT OF EDWARD, LORD IRWIN.

The next monument in order of date is a black marble slab in memory of Sir Arthur Ingram, Knt. (the second of that name of Temple Newsam), the inscription upon which is given at length by Whitaker.*

Erected against the south wall of the Chapel are two monuments to the respective memories of Edward (second) and Charles (ninth) Viscount Irwin. The former of these, an elaborate erection of black and white marble, reaching to the roof of the Church, is shown in our illustration (see preceding page). At its base are grouped the statues of Lord and Lady Irwin and their daughter. The principal figure is that of Lord Irwin, who is represented in a reclining attitude in the centre of the group. His statue is noticed by Whitaker as exhibiting some of the best drapery he had seen, but as being peculiar in that the head is turned eastward. The inscriptions upon both these monuments are given in full by the above writer. On the north wall of the Chapel are two marble tablets to the memories of Lord William Gordon, and Frances Isabella Kerr Gordon, his only daughter. This lady, who died 20th Sept., 1831, aged 49, was the study for Sir Joshua Reynolds's famous picture, "Five Cherubs' Heads," now in the National Gallery. Beneath the east window is a handsome alabaster monument in the form of three Early English arches, in each of which is inserted a brass plate. Upon the latter are engraved the names of Hugo Charles Meynell Ingram, Esq., who died in 1869; Georgiana, his wife (daughter of F. Pigou, Esq.), who died in 1868; Hugo Francis Meynell Ingram, their son, who died in 1871; Louisa Elizabeth, sister of the last-named, who died in 1870; and Admiral Henry Meynell, second son of Hugo Meynell, Esq., and the Hon. Elizabeth Ingram, who died in 1865.

There are no memorial windows in the Chapel.

THE CHURCH YARD.

Amongst the graves we may notice those of—

Miss Mary Anne Deane, of the Manor House, Whitkirk, who died 4th Feb., 1807, aged 88. She was an intimate friend of John and Charles Wesley, and of Selina, Countess of Huntingdon, in whose life she is mentioned. She was remarkable for her great piety.—See "Life and Times of Selina, Countess of Huntingdon," vol. i., pp. 296-7.

Mrs. Catherine Wade, of Halton, daughter of John Wycliffe, Esq., of Gayles Hall, near Richmond, Yorkshire. She was the last descendant of the family which produced the reformer, John Wycliffe. She was first married to Walter Sellon Gibson, of Leeds, and secondly to Edward Wade, of Stourton Grange, near Garforth.—See Pedigree of Wycliffe, in Plantagenet Harrison's "History of Yorkshire."

Sir George Goodman, Knight, J.P., D.L., who was born 17th Nov., 1791, and died 13th Oct., 1859. He was M.P. for Leeds from 1852 to 1857, and its first Mayor under the new Municipal Corporations Act in 1836.—*Vide* Taylor's "Biographia Leodiensis."

Robert Hall, M.A., son of Henry Hall, Esq., J.P., D.L., of Bank Lodge, Leeds, who died 26th May, 1857, aged 55. He was appointed Recorder of Doncaster in 1845, and in March, 1857, was elected M.P. for Leeds, after a close contest, the excitement of which hastened his death.—*Vide* Taylor's "Biographia Leodiensis."

Captain Jackson, of the Ivy House, on the York road, near Leeds, formerly of Killingbeck Lodge, whose gravestone bears the following inscription:—

The late WILLIAM JACKSON Esq^r
Who deservedly earned
And honourably maintained
The Character
of a Gentleman and a Soldier
He fought under that brave officer
General Sir Ralph Abercrombie
He was distinguished
By the most zealous and rigid
Attention
To his military Duties
And after having served for Twenty-five Years
With equal Honour to Himself
And Advantage to his Country
He died on the 14th day of September
1822 aged 47 Years
An ornament and an Example
To his Profession.





BENEFACTIONS.

LADY Johanna Wombwell, by her will, dated 10th July, 1454, bequeathed forty shillings for the purchase of bells for the Church, and five marks for the erection of a bead-house. She was the second wife of Thomas Wombwell of Wombwell, Esq., who died in 1452, and daughter of Sir William Fitzwilliam, of Sprotbrough.

“In Dei nomine, Amen. Decimo die mensis Julii A.D. M.CCC.liiiij. Ego domina Johanna Wombwell, sanæ memoriae—Sepeliendum in ecclesia de Whitekirk infra quandam capellam constructam in honore Sanctæ Trinitatis et Johannis Baptistæ. Lego facturæ campanarum de Whitekirk xls. Lego facturæ cujusdam domus ibidem constituendæ vocatæ le Beydhous V. Marcas.”—Printed in “Test. Ebor.,” ii., p. 177.



A modest gift of a penny apiece to thirteen “pure folke” of Whitkirk parish is contained in a codicil to the will of Robert Colynson, of York, mercer. The quaint and somewhat touching bequest runs as follows:—

“That thare be deltt and geven to xiiij. pure folke in ilke parissbyn underwretyn xiiij. ; praying thame hertly the hole parissyhyns to for gefe hym if he hadde ever any gude of thayres be bying or selling or any other wyse. And if any of thame hade evir any grete losse by him thay sall have amendis and asseth for thare losse and thaie will ask it, and if noon aske it, he prayes thame for Goddis lufe hertly to forgefe hym and pray for hym at the reverence of Gode. The whilke parissyhyns are thes [there follow the names of 22 parishes].”—Printed in “Test. Ebor.,” ii., p. 217.

This document is dated 9th April, 1436, and was proved as a codicil to a will of later date, 3rd October, 1458.



Thomas, Lord Darcy, of Temple Newsam, in 1521 founded a Hospital and Free Grammar School for the benefit of Whitkirk parish. Of its endowment we learn the following particulars from Torre's MS.:—

“Sir Thomas Darcy, kt., Lord Meynell, and of Knayth” granted to Sir Thomas Grey, kt., and to several other kts., esqrs., and gents, the following lands and tenements:— In the parish of Whitkirk: “A close called Ellershaw Close, wherein the hospital is situated.” In the parish of Rothwell: “A great close called W. New Intak;” a close called “Le Hoppe, in Rothwell Shaw,” value £8 per ann.; a messuage called “Le High Lodge,” and two closes adjoining, same value; a close in “Le N. Intaks, called Droding (? Deoding) Gate,” same value; a close called “Le Old Lande,” same value; a close called “Hagston Clyff,” value £10 per ann.; a close called “Est Intak,” value £4 per ann.; a free annual rent of 13s. 4d. issuing out of a parcel of land called “Owt ground, alias Capenhoe Hirst.” “All for the founding & ordaining of a Colledge or Hosptall, consisting of 1 Master or Warden, 12 poor people, & 1 heremite, wth a p̄tually Chapell wthin the Limits of ye p̄ish of Whitkirk, to be called by the name of the Hosptall of the High and Individed Trinity of the Father, Son, & Holy Ghost, of Whitkirk. And also for a Free Grammar School & an Hermitage adjoining the said Colledge, to be built under one & the same Roof, whereof the Master or Warden is to have yearly out of the Rents and profits thereof the sum of £16 13s. 4d. for his sallary. And every poor person 1d. per diem, besides a gown yearly containing 3 Ells of Cloath at 20d. p̄ Ell on Xmas Day. And the Hermit 20s. per añ. The Washerwoman 20s. per añ. The Barber 20s. per añ. All which ult. Oct., A.D. 1521, was confirmed by Thomas, Abp. of York,* and statutes and ordinances made for the better governing thereof.”

These Torre gives at considerable length, but they seem of hardly sufficient interest to copy here. We have no record of the fate of this Hospital, but it must either have fallen under the attainder of its founder, Lord Darcy, in 1538, or have been suppressed at the Reformation by the statutes 37 Hen. VIII., c. 4, and 1 Ed. VI., c. 14, by which colleges, chantries, brotherhoods, hospitals, guilds, &c., were dissolved, and their property transferred to the Crown.

The site of the Hospital is denoted by the name, “Hospital Close,” now applied to a field which borders Hollyshaw Lane (the road from Cross Gates to Whitkirk), on the east side. Traces of foundations were discovered here some years ago.

The name Ellershaw Close, mentioned above, suggests that *Ellershaw* Lane would be more correct than *Hollyshaw*. Eller, it may be noticed, is a local name for a common tree—the alder.



A list of benefactors, with particulars of their respective gifts, is preserved in the vestry from the year 1573, as under:—

Lady Margaret Gascoigne, widow of Sir John Gascoigne, knt., of Cardington, Co. Bedford, by Indenture, dated 28th April, 1573, charged her lands in Thorp Stapleton with an annuity of £10, for the benefit of the poor of Whitkirk parish.

This lady was the daughter and co-heiress of that Sir Robert Scargill and Jane his wife to whose memory was erected the handsome alabaster tomb which is now one of the most interesting relics in Whitkirk Church.

There is preserved, in the vestry-chest at Whitkirk, an Indenture, dated 20th January, 1662, by which the then surviving trustees, Sir Thomas Gascoigne, Bart., and Sutton Oglethorpe, Esq., convey the above annuity to a set of thirty others. Except the names of these gentlemen, who represent the principal local families, there is nothing of special interest in the deed. The following is an extract;—

“This Indenture made the twentieth day of Januarie in the fourteenth yeare of the Raigne of o’ gracious Soueraigne Lord Charles the second by the grace of god king of England Scotland france and Ireland, Defendo’ of the faith, And in the yeare of our Lord one thousand sixe hundred sixtie and twoe BETWENE S’ Thomas Gascoigne of Barmbow in the Countie of Yorke, Barronett, And Sutton Oglethorpe late of Oglethorpe in the said Countie of Yorke, Esqr., of th’one partie, And S’ Walter Vavasour of Haslewood, Barronett, Walter Vavasour his sonn and heir apparent, S’ Francis Hungate of Saxton, Barronett, and Phillip Hungate his sonn and heir apparent, S’ Stephen Tempest of Broughton, knight, Thomas Gascoigne, Esqr., sonn and heire apparent of the said S’ Thomas Gascoigne, George Gascoigne younger sonn of the said S’ Thomas, And Thomas Gascoigne and John Gascoigne sonnes of the said George Gascoigne, S’ Myles Stapleton of Carleton, Barronett, S’ — Bland of Kippax Parke, Barronett, S’ John Lewes of Ledston, Barronett, S’ John Savill of Rothwell, Barronett, S’ William Lowther of Swillington, Knight, William Lowther his sonn and heire apparent, John Savile of Methley, Esqr., John Wentworth of Woolley, Esqr., William Palmes of Nayborne, the younger, Esqr., John Ryther of Scarcroft, the younger, Esqr., Bartholomew Leedes of Milforth, Esqr., Nicholas Moore of Austrope, Esqr., John Moore his sonn and heire apparent, Mathew Hall of Leventhorpe, gentleman, Gabriell Layton of Barrobie, gentleman, William Ellis, of Kiddall, Esquire, John Hamerton of Monkrood, gentleman, — Thimble of Snythall, Esqr., Henrie Milner of Coulton, yoman, Martin Clough of Roundhey, yoman, John Taylor, William Vivers, and William Taylor of Scholes, yeomen, Richard Brooke of Morehouse Garforth, and Richard Booth of Temple Newsome, Gentlemen, All within the Countie of Yorke of th’other partie.

“WITNESSETH that WHEREAS the Right worth the Ladie Margaret Gascoigne widdow late wyffe of S’ John Gascoigne late of Cardington in the Countie of Bedford, Knight, deceased, by her Indenture bearing date the eight and twentieth day of Aprill in the sixteenth yeare of the Reigne of o’ late Soueraigne Ladie Queen Elizabeth, Did Clearlie and fullie give and grant unto John Russell and to John Aileford als Taylor of Cardington aforesaid, yomen, their heires and assignes one Annuitie or yearlie rent of tenn poundes of good and lawfull English money issueing and goeing out of all that the Manno’ of Thorpe Stapilton in the Countie of Yorke.”



William Rishforth, in 1616, charged a shop in the Shambles, in Leeds, with an annuity of 18s. 4d., for the benefit of the poor of Whitkirk parish.

This shop was taken down in 1834 by the Improvement Commissioners. At the time it so happened that a house was being built for the schoolmaster at Whitkirk, and by payment of £23 towards its erection, the Commissioners effected a transfer of the charge to this building. The house was built on glebe land, but was never conveyed to the school. In 1862 the school was taken down, and the present occupier of the house pays a rent to the vicar, besides the above charge of 18/4 to the poor.—*Vide* “Vestry Records.”



At a Court held for the Manor of Scholes on the 9th Nov., 1631, Richard Heald, of Walnut-tree Lane, in the County of Surrey, and Richard Heald, his son, surrendered a field on Whinmoor called Hollings Close, “To the use, etc., of Thomas Shore, his heirs and assign^s for ever, from and after the decease of Jane Heald, of Seacroft, widow, paying therefore yearly, & every year immediately next after the decease of s^d Jane Heald, unto the Overseers of the poore of the parish of Barwicke for the time being, the summe of v.^s, and to the Overseers of the poore of Whitchurch, the summe of v.^s, and also to the Overseers of the high wayes of Seacroft, the summe of v.^s, which s^d sev^l summes are to bee paid unto the s^d Overseers for the time being, and disposed unto the s^d poore & mending high wayes about Seacroft yearly and every year for ever, according to the last will & Testam^t of George Heald, late of Seacroft, deceased.”—Extract from a copy of the surrender, made 20th November, 1659, by Thos. Poole and Wi^{thm} Dixon, and entered in the Vestry Book.

In 1887 the field was purchased, subject to this charge, by John Wilson, Esq., of Seacroft Hall.



Nicholas Askwith, Esq., of Hackney, Co. Middlesex, by will, dated 30th September, 1635, (pr. 5th October, 1638) charged his estate in London with an annuity of £8 10s. *od.*, to be distributed in Whitkirk parish as follows:—£5 to the poor; £2 to the Vicar, for preaching two anniversary sermons; £1 to the Clerk; and 10s. to the Churchwardens.

The following is an abstract of the will, which is preserved at Somerset House:—

“**Item** I give and bequeath unto such person which now is, or that shall be at any tyme hereafter Viccar of the parrish Church of Whitekirke in the county of York the sum of forty shillings a year for ever of lawful money of England to be paid unto him by my heirs or assigns out of the rents issues and profits of my said lands messuages and tenements situate and being in Panyar Alley in the parish of Christ Church aforesaid for him to preach two sermons yearly for ever in the said parish church in remembrance of me the one of them to be there preached yearly upon the first Sunday next after the Twelveth* day of August being the day which formerly and

usually they have used to have a general feasting of mirth* in that parish and the other sermon to be preached on Shrove Sunday yearly for ever And the same sermons are to begin to be preached upon which of these two days shall first happen next after my decease And then the said forty shillings to be paid to the said Vicar or his assigns. **Item** I give and bequeath unto such person which now is and hereafter shall be Clerke of the parish church of Whitekirke aforesaid the sum of twenty shillings a year for ever towards his better maintenance for him to give diligent attendance yearly in the said parish Church at such times as the two sermons shall be there preached To be paid unto him or them by my heirs or assigns at the time aforesaid out of the rents issues and profits of my said lands and tenements situate in the parish of Christ Church aforesaid. **Item** I give and bequeath towards the releife of twenty and five poor men and women which now doe dwell and that hereafter shall dwell & inhabit within the said parish of Whitekirke one yearly annuity or rent charge of five pounds per annum of like money for ever to be paid unto them out of the rents issues and profits of my said lands and tenements situate and being in the said parish of Christ Church near Panyar Alley aforesaid that is to say to every of them two shillings apiece and my further will and meaning is That what poor men and women that shall at any time hereafter dwell and inhabit in Killingbeck in the parish aforesaid shall of all others be chiefest allo^d for ever to every of them two shillings apiece and my will is that all of them the said poor men and women shall give their attendance at the said church at the time of the said sermon so to be preached and then the said two shillings apiece to be paid unto them where most need shallbe by the discretion of the Vicar and churchwardens of the same parish for the time being. **Item** I give and bequeath unto such person and persons which are or shallbe at any time hereafter be churchwardens of the said parish of Whitekirke and to their successors and assigns for ever the yearly sum or annuity of ten shillings of like money to be paid unto them and their successors for ever at the time above mentioned to see theise my legacies given in that parish performed according to this my will And my true intent and meaning is that the legacies by me given in the said parish of Whitekirke shall not begin to be paid until the death of Constance my wife To be paid unto them out of the rents issues and proffitts of my said lands and tenements situate in the parish of Christ Church aforesaid."

The following charitable bequests are also contained in the will:—

To "Christ's Hospitalls" in London, £100 to buy lands.

To "the poore of the parrish of Christ Church, London, whereof I was a Parishioner," £40.

To the Mercer's Company, "whereof I am a member, one Guilte standing Cupp, of the value of fforty pounds, wth my name and Armes to be Ingraved uppon it."

To the poor of Hackney, £20.

To the poor of the parrish of Barwick in Elmitt, in the County of Yorke, £10.

To four score poore men (to be nominated and appointed by his executors), twelve shillings each, to provide and wear mourning, and attend his funeral.

We learn from his will that Mr. Askwith had a brother, Robert Askwith, of Roundhay, gentleman; and another brother, Lawrence Askwith, whose name occurs under Roundhay, in the subsidy roll of 39 Elizabeth. The bulk of his wealth he bequeathed to his four daughters—Sarah Edwards, Alice Meller, Elizabeth Littlebury, and Anne Chamberlayne, who are the only children named in his will.



William Hancock, of Seacroft, by will, dated 7th July, 1677, charged his estate there with an annuity of £4—

“For the sole and proper use and behoofe of the poore of Seacroft aforesaid; and Killingbeck, the sum of ffoure pounds per ann.”—Extract from his will, proved at York.



Richard Brooke, of Killingbeck, gent., by indenture, dated 2nd March, 1702, charged his estate, in the parish of Rothwell, with an annuity of £10 for the maintenance of a schoolmaster at Whitkirk, and for the free education of six of the poorest children of that parish.

When Whitkirk Boys' School was taken down, in 1862, this endowment, under a scheme of the Charity Commission, was divided between the Schools of Halton and Seacroft—at least three poor boys at each to be educated free. The land upon which the endowment was charged came into the possession of John Calverley, Esq., of Oulton, who, in 1865, commuted the charge for an equal sum in Consols. The principal is vested in trustees, who, in 1887–8, transferred it into Indian stock.



John Roades, of Temple Newsam, gent., by will, dated 29th March, 1711, charged his Copyhold estate, in the Manor of Temple Newsam, with an annuity of £3—

“For the clothing of three of the poorest people inhabiting within the lordship of Temple Newsam, to be clothed therewith every Christmas day morn;” and bequeathed the interest of £100 “unto the Rev. the Vicar & Ministers of Whitkirk for the time being, for ever, provided the said Ministers shall & do yearely & every year preach ten orthodox sermons in the said Church, on Sunday afternoons between Midsummer & Michaelmas.”—Extract from his will, proved at York.



John Layster, of Newsam, yeoman, by will, dated 21st October, 1717, gave the interest of £20 to be annually distributed amongst widows of that place:

“**Item.**—I give unto the poor widdows of Newsam y^e sume of twenty shillings yearly for ever; that is to say, my eñtor to pay within twelve months after my decease the sum of twenty pounds into the hands of the Vicar and Churchwardens, to be secured as they think most proper to the use aforesaid.”—Extract from his will, proved at York.



John Thompson, of Newsam, wiredrawer, in 1718 gave the interest of £20, to be annually distributed amongst the widows of that place; and also charged his Copyhold estate with an annuity of £1 10s. *od.*, £1 of which was for clothing two poor children, and 10s. for the Vicar, for preaching a charity sermon on the Sunday after Michaelmas.

There are no documents at Whitkirk relating to this gift, and we have not discovered John Thompson's will at York, or amongst the Temple Newsam wills at Wakefield.



In 1827 Mrs. Mary Rinder and Mrs. Elizabeth Rashdall gave the interest of £200 to the poor of Whitkirk and Seacroft, to be annually distributed in sums not exceeding 20/- nor less than 10/-



In 1835 Lady William Gordon, of Temple Newsam, gave £900 to Trustees upon trust to invest the same in Government or real securities, and to distribute the annual income therefrom amongst the poor of the township of Temple Newsam, in sums not less than 10/- or greater than £5 to each person; and in 1839 the said Lady William Gordon settled the sum of £1,000 Three per cent. Reduced Annuities, upon the same trusts, for the benefit of the poor of the township of Temple Newsam.

Lady Gordon's gift is now invested in £875 Four-and-a-half per cent. Guaranteed Stock of the Caledonian Railway, and £1,027 1s. 10*d.* Indian Three per cent. Stock.

In the Churchwardens' accounts for the seventeenth century we find frequent mention of "Bellasse's" and of Thomas Royston's doles, but of these we have no other record.

HALTON FEAST.

The first Sunday after the 26th of August is known in Whitkirk parish as Halton Feast Sunday, and is observed in the neighbourhood by means of family gatherings, christenings, etc. The few days succeeding the Feast Sunday are kept as a general holiday, and of late years this season has been rendered additionally attractive by Cross Gates Flower Show, which is held on the Monday and Tuesday.

As to the origin of this feast, the following suggestion was made some years ago by the Rev. John Bickerdike, Vicar of St. Mary's, Leeds:—"It is allowed that village feasts usually commemorate the "consecration of Parish Churches; and, moreover, that it was usual to "dedicate Churches to the saint whose festival happened on or near "the date of their consecration. The patron saint of Whitkirk is

“St. Mary, the day of whose Assumption, August 15, is observed as a festival in the Roman Catholic Church. In 1752 a reformation of the Calendar was effected by the omission of the eleven last days of that year. Many people, however, who either did not understand or did not approve of the alteration, continued to observe ‘the old style’—thus the 15th would be marked in the Calendar as the Festival of the Assumption, but the 26th would be generally kept, just as was old Christmas Day.”

In brief, then, Mr. Bickerdike supposes that Halton Feast was originally a festival commemorative of the consecration of Whitkirk Church, that the latter event took place on or about the 15th August (Assumption of the Virgin), and that the Church was on that account dedicated to St. Mary.

From Mr. Askwith's will we find that in the seventeenth century Halton Feast was held on the first Sunday after the 15th August (or the 12th, according to the copy at Somerset House), a circumstance which seems to support Mr. Bickerdike's theory.

We may notice that the consecration in question need not necessarily have been that of the original Church, but was possibly that of the first stone one. It may still be objected that since the beginning of the present century the two “styles” have differed by twelve days, so that old Assumption Day would now fall on August 27th; but it appears to us that the day from which Halton Feast is reckoned was not likely to be changed again from the 26th to the 27th, particularly as its connection with the Assumption of the Virgin was probably forgotten long before.

While fully admitting the probability of the above theory, we feel tempted to speculate whether an even earlier origin may not be assigned to this festival. Its name, *Hallon* Feast, seems to militate against the theory that it was connected originally with the Church of St. Mary at Whitkirk, and to suggest rather that it is the survival of some ancient religious festival held at Halton, either in Christian or in heathen times. Thoresby* mentions a tradition that Halton anciently possessed a religious house, and raises the question whether it may not have been the site of Thrydwulf's Monastery “in the wood of Elmete,” to which Bede alludes.† From the fact that in early documents the name is frequently written Halgton‡ he suggests its derivation from the Anglo-Saxon ‘halig’—holy, as meaning Holy Town.

The feast appears originally to have prevailed over an accurately-defined district, extending from Halton into Leeds. Its exact boundaries

are probably long since forgotten, but we understand that its limit in a westerly direction is the Golden Cock Inn,* in Kirkgate, and that it includes the north side of that street but not the south side.

In explanation of the connection of the feast with Leeds, we suggest that originally it may have been a holiday for the tenants of the Manor of Whitkirk only, who are numerous in the east of the town, and that in process of time it influenced the neighbouring streets.

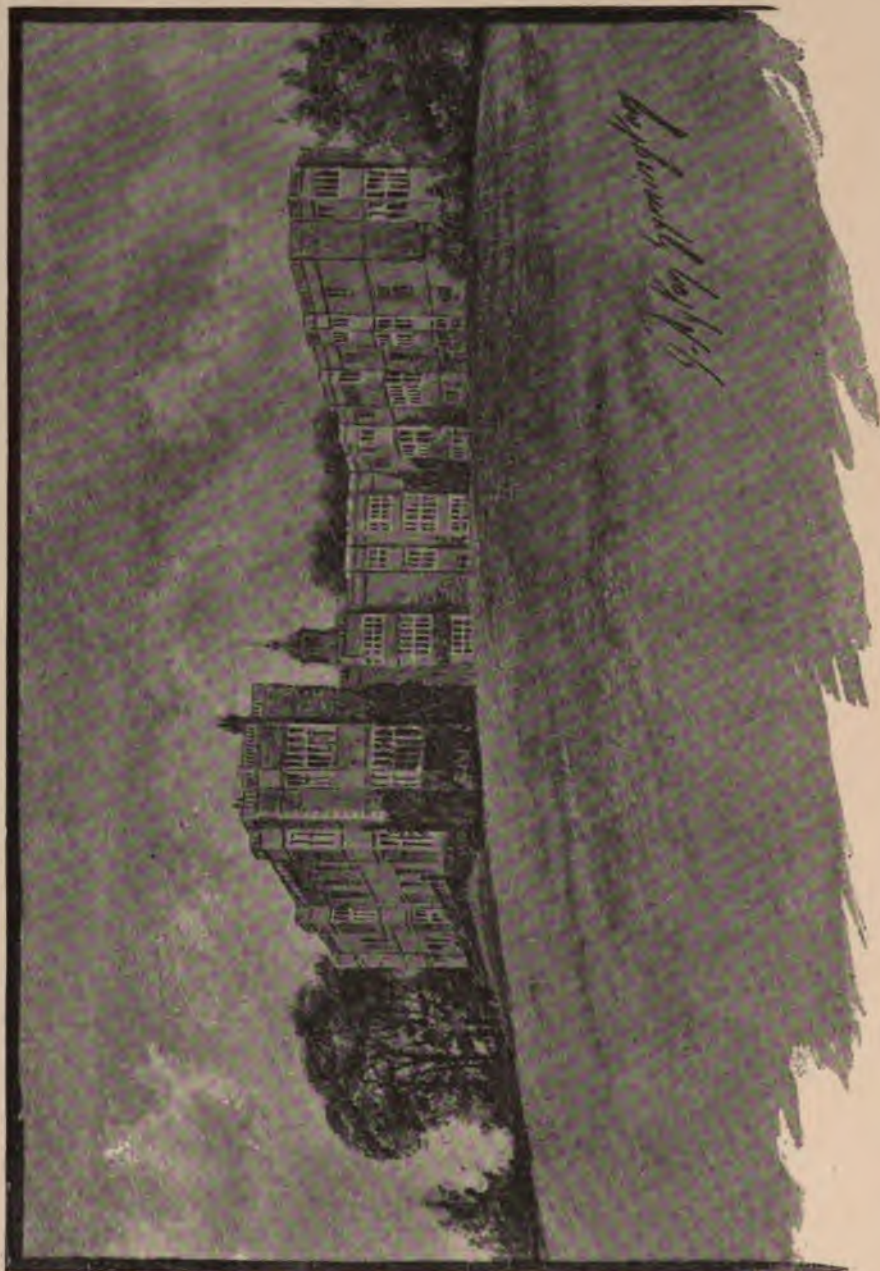
CROSS GATES FLORAL AND HORTICULTURAL SHOW.

At the commencement of this century Cross Gates consisted only of some sixteen cottages, built near a gate† which crossed the road leading from Whitkirk to Seacroft, then merely a by-lane, about fifty yards north of the small piece of ground now called Cross Gates Green. The use of this gate, we believe, was to prevent the cattle pastured on the adjacent common from straying down the lane. By the side of the gate stood a small cottage for the gatekeeper. Since the Leeds and Selby Railway Company made a station there, Cross Gates has steadily grown in size and importance. It lies partly in the township of Barwick and partly in that of Seacroft, and is now included in the new parish of Manston. It is chiefly noted for its Flower Show, mentioned in the preceding article. This Show was first held in 1860, in Manston schoolroom, under the auspices of "The Cottage Gardening Society for the united villages of Cross Gates, Manston, Whitkirk, Colton, Austhorpe, Coal Staith, Whinmoor, Stanks, and Scholes." Since that date its popularity has rapidly increased; and now prizes are offered for various classes of horses, in addition to those for flowers, fruit, vegetables, etc. The handsome sums distributed attract competitors from a distance, besides thousands of spectators from Leeds and the neighbourhood—in fact, the Show has become one of the annual events of this part of the county.

TEMPLE NEWSAM.



THE historical associations of Temple Newsam claim for it a prominent position in a history of Whitkirk, apart from its being the principal mansion of the neighbourhood. As the space at our disposal is limited, we have merely attempted to trace briefly the descent of the estate from the Knights Templars to the family who now own it, and for a more detailed account must refer our readers to Mr. Wheater's books on the subject. Before the arrival of the Templars Newsam was an unimportant hamlet, though, according to Domesday, it possessed considerable agricultural value. In the twelfth century, as we have already stated, it was held of the Lacis of Pontefract by one William de Viliers, who, not later than the year 1181, granted it to the Knights Templars.¹ In their hands it continued till the dissolution of the Order; but during that period we know little or nothing of its history. No trace remains of the ancient Preceptory; nor have we any certain guide as to the site it occupied.²

In January, 1308, a general seizure of the persons and property of the Templars in England was effected, by order of Edward II. Godfrey de Arches, Preceptor of Newsam, and the other members of the Order who belonged to the north of England, were sent to York, where they were kept in confinement for two years. In July, 1310, a Provincial Council (*i.e.*, a Council of the Clergy of the province of York) was held in that city, under which the Templars were examined touching the various heresies and immoral practices of which they stood charged. Having made a very qualified confession of their errors, and having sworn to obey the teaching of the Holy Roman Church in future, they received absolution. At the same time they were released from the civil authority, and on the following day, July 30th, the Council decreed that they should be distributed amongst the Monasteries in the diocese, a pension of 4*d.* a day being allowed them

from their sequestered estates. On August 14th, 1312, Archbishop Greenfield published a decree from Cawood, declaring the Order of Knights Templars for ever abolished.³

Meantime, the Templars' estates had been placed by Edward in the charge of "custodes" or guardians. In 1311 Temple Newsam was in the hands of one Adam de Hoperton, who, on the 1st of December of that year, transferred it to the care of two new officials, Sir Alexander de Cave and Robert Amcotes. On that day a minute inventory was made of the goods and chattels of the Preceptory at Newsam, from which may be gathered that the property of the Order there, especially in live stock, was considerable.⁴

We infer that shortly after the downfall of the Order Temple Newsam was granted to Sir Robert Holland, since it appears in a list of his estates forfeited in 1321. In the same list we find the Manor of Yoxall with Hoar Cross,⁵ in Staffordshire, which is now again united with Temple Newsam, in the possession of the Meynell-Ingram family.

Burke tells us that, when merely a poor knight, Robert Holland had the good fortune to obtain the post of secretary to Thomas, Earl of Lancaster, an appointment which speedily led to further advancement. Extensive estates were granted to him by Edward II. in the first year of his reign, and in 1314 he was summoned to Parliament as Baron Holland. When, in 1321, the Earl of Lancaster placed himself at the head of the rebellious barons, Holland basely deserted him and surrendered to the king, and by this action in no small degree hastened the Earl's capture. But upon Lancaster's downfall, despite his treachery, Holland lost his estates, though he was allowed his liberty. Meantime, his duplicity had rendered him so odious to the people that, in 1328, he was again made prisoner in a wood near Henley, and was beheaded on the 7th October of that year.

Temple Newsam thus passed again into Edward's hands, but by the statute "De Terris Templariorum," to which we have already referred, it was transferred from the Crown to the Order of Knights Hospitallers. Their tenure of the estate, however, was short-lived; for no sooner had the Act passed than the King effected a composition with them, by virtue of which it was restored to him, the Church (at Whitkirk) alone being excepted. The charter⁶ by which the conveyance was made is dated 18th Edward II. (A.D. 1324); and in the same year we find an order from the King to the Sheriff of Yorkshire⁷ to take possession of the property, and also the appointment of one Thomas de Deynill as steward.⁷

Three years later, in 1327, Edward III. granted the Manors of Temple Newsam and Temple Hurst to his cousin Mary, Countess of Pembroke,⁸ for the term of her life, in exchange for which she ceded to him the

castles and towns of Hertford and Haverford, and the Manors of Hegham Ferers, Monemouth, and Hodenak. This lady was the third wife of Aymer de Valence, second Earl of Pembroke, who, according to Burke, was murdered in France, 27th June, 1323. She was the daughter of Guy de Chastillon, Comte de St. Paul, and was great grand-daughter, maternally, of Henry III.⁹

In 1337, during the lifetime of the Countess, the reversion of the above manors was granted by the Crown to John Darcy¹⁰—Baron Darcy—an eminent nobleman who held important posts under the second and third Edwards. In the former reign he was Lord Justice of Ireland and Governor of Norham Castle. Upon the accession of Edward III. he was made Sheriff of Yorkshire and Governor of York Castle, and was again appointed Justice of Ireland, which last office, together with that of Constable of the Tower, were subsequently granted to him for life. In 11 Edward III. he was ambassador to the Courts of France and Scotland, and, in company with his eldest son, shared in the victory of Cressy. He was summoned to Parliament as Baron, 27th January, 1332, and predeceased the Countess of Pembroke, 30th May, 1347.¹¹

Lord Darcy was succeeded by his eldest son, John, who married Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of Nicholas Meinill, Lord Meinill of Whorlton, in right of whom his successors assumed the additional title of Meinill.¹²

In the line of Darcy Temple Newsam descended until the 16th century. Upon the death of Philip, sixth Baron, in 1418, the title fell into abeyance between his two daughters, as co-heiresses, while the estates passed to his brother John, whose wife was Joane, daughter of John Lord Greystock. John Darcy¹³ died 25th March, 1454, and was succeeded by his grandson, Sir William Darcy, whose son, Sir Thomas, was raised to the peerage as Baron Darcy of Darcy, by writ of summons dated 17th October, 1509. This nobleman had won distinction in the reign of Henry VII., and for many years shared the confidence of Henry VIII. He refused, however, to sanction the dissolution of the religious houses, and, in defence of their cause, was finally induced to take part in the fruitless rebellion known as the Pilgrimage of Grace. He was then an old man, but, despite his years, and his previous devotion to his king and country, he was attainted and beheaded on Tower Hill, 20th June, 1538.

The Hospitallers twice disputed the title of the Darcys to the estates of Newsam and Hurst—first in 1379,¹⁴ in the time of Philip, fourth Baron, and again in 1402,¹⁴ upon the succession of his son John, fifth Baron. In both cases the charter of the Prior, Thomas L'Archer, to Edward was held to be a sufficient bar to their claims, though their readiness to set it aside seems to suggest that it had been executed under compulsion rather than of free will.

By Darcy's forfeiture Temple Newsam became again vested in the Crown, and, in 1544, Henry VIII. bestowed it upon Mathew Stewart, Earl of Lennox,¹⁵ whose eldest son, the unhappy Lord Darnley, husband of Mary Queen of Scots, was born there, 1545. Lord Darnley's heir was his only son, James I. of England, who succeeded to the estate, and granted it, in the first year of his reign, to Ludovick Stewart, Duke of Lennox.¹⁶ The Duke sold it in 1622¹⁷ to Sir Arthur Ingram, son of Hugh Ingram, of London, and of Thorp-on-the-Hill, in the parish of Rothwell, whose grandson, Henry Ingram, in return for his fidelity to the cause of Charles I., was created Viscount Irwin, in the peerage of Scotland, by patent dated 23rd May, 1661.

The last of the Ingrams of Temple Newsam in the male line was Charles, ninth Viscount Irwin, who died 19th June, 1778, leaving five daughters; of whom the eldest was married to Francis, second Marquis of Hertford; the second to Lord William Gordon; and the third to Hugo Meynell, Esq., of Hoar Cross, Staffordshire. Upon the death of the two elder sisters, the estate passed to the son of the third, who then assumed the additional name of Ingram.

The present mansion was built by Sir Arthur Ingram, soon after he purchased the property, in place of the ancient hall, which he demolished, with the exception of that portion which contained the room in which Lord Darnley was born. Thoresby's statement that this room, which has always borne the name of Lord Darnley's chamber, was incorporated in the present building, has been confirmed beyond the possibility of doubt, by the discovery of the ancient doorways and masonry during some restorations recently carried out by the present owner.

The following passage in one of Lord Strafford's letters tells us that, shortly after its completion, the new mansion was almost entirely destroyed by fire:—"On Shrove Sunday, 1635 . . . Also Sir Arthur Ingram's house, Temple Newsam, by York, was almost burnt to the ground; household stuff to the value of £4,000 all consumed and lost."—"Letters of Thomas, Earl of Strafford," vol. i., p. 525. This statement, however, is inaccurate, as the fire only extended to the south wing, the shell of which seems to have stood till the year 1796, when it was entirely rebuilt by Frances, Viscountess Irwin.

Sir Arthur died about 1641, and was succeeded by his son, a second Arthur, who appears to have been in possession of the property during his father's lifetime, since we find him holding a Court for the Manor of Temple Newsam, on the 24th of June, 1636 ("Magna Cur. Baron Arthuri Ingram Junior militē"). We append his autograph, copied from a lease granted at this Court, in the possession of the editors.

BARROWBY HALL.

Barrowby Hall, in the neighbouring parish of Garforth, was the residence of a younger branch of the Ingrams during part of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. The estate was purchased by Arthur Ingram, Esq., brother of the first Lord Irwin, from Mr. Layton, whose family had owned it for many generations. The hall, which was probably built by Mr. Ingram, bears the date, 1677. The following inscription, upon a stone slab in the garden, is interesting:—

“ The sun that sets
 “ the next morning gets,
 “ But Bunne gone for ever.
 “ The flowers that dye
 “ next Spring we espy,
 “ But Bunne we shall never.

“ Here lyeth a favorite Squirril of Isabella Ingram, who dyed — of February, 1729.”

Notes on Temple Newsam.

(Note 1.)

Lacis' Charter (see p. 21) tells us that their estate at Newsam was *given* to the Templars by Viliers, but from the general inventory of the Templars' lands, made in 1185 (“Mon. Angl.,” vol. vii., p. 830), it would appear that it was acquired from him by *purchase*. The entry runs as follows:—“Apud Nehus habentur xvi. carucatæ terræ “*ex emptione* fratrum a Willielmo de Viliers et confirmatione Henrici de Laci quarum “sex carucatæ et tres bovatæ sunt in dominio,” etc.

In the ancient Terrier of the Rectory of Whitkirk, of which a copy is given in an earlier part of this book, mention is made of a building called the Old Temple, and of several parcels of land belonging to it. Amongst the latter is Kitchingman's Close, which we find marked on the Tithe-Award Map near the beck which separates the township of Temple Newsam from that of Thorp Stapleton, to the north of Thorp Hall. This appears to be a possible clue to the site of the ancient Preceptory.

Agnes, daughter of Alan de Grymeston, released to them 1 Culture of land in the town of Newsom called [W^d kelflat (*sic*)], for the maintenance of a lamp sett up at the Entrance of the West door of their Chappell to light them every night at their going in & coming out of the same ($\frac{2}{3}$ N 28).

THE SMEATONS OF AUSTHORPE.



AS the home of a family which produced one of England's earliest and greatest engineers, Austhorpe Lodge possesses a peculiar interest. The house was built in 1698, by the engineer's grandfather, John Smeaton, of Leeds, who lived to see the birth there, on the 8th of June, 1724,* of his illustrious grandson and namesake.

As numerous accounts of the life and works of John Smeaton have been published, such as that in Smiles's "Lives of the Engineers," we record only the leading points in his career. The greater part of his education was received at the Leeds Free Grammar School. His father, Mr. William Smeaton, of Austhorpe Lodge, was an attorney, and it was his wish that his son should follow the same profession. Young Smeaton accordingly entered his father's office in Leeds, and later, in 1742, went to London to attend the Courts at Westminster. But he had no liking for the law, and shortly afterwards obtained his father's consent to abandon it.

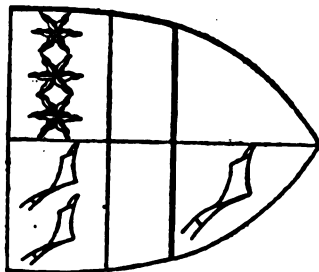
Smeaton then applied himself to the study of mechanics, which from boyhood had been his favourite pursuit. In 1750 we find him working with a mathematical instrument maker in Great Turnstile, Holborn; and

by the year 1752 he had begun business on his own account, in Furnival's Inn Court. This, however, did not prevent his devoting a large portion of his time to study and experiments. On several occasions in the years 1750-52, he read papers before the Royal Society, of which body he was elected a member in 1753. In the previous year, 1752, at the suggestion of Lord Macclesfield, President of the Royal Society, Smeaton was requested to undertake the task of rebuilding the Eddystone Lighthouse—a fact that sufficiently proves the estimation in which he was already held by men of science.

Notwithstanding the success of his Lighthouse, which was finished in 1759, it was not until some ten years later that Smeaton found full employment as a civil engineer. Meantime, in 1764, he had been appointed receiver for the Derwentwater estates—an office which he held till 1777.

Though it is with the Eddystone Lighthouse that Smeaton's name is chiefly associated, there exist, both in England and Scotland, many memorials of his engineering skill. Such are the improved navigation of the rivers Calder and Aire; the Forth and Clyde Canal, which was designed and constructed by him; bridges over the Tweed at Coldstream, the Deveron near Banff, the Tay at Perth (built from his original designs); the construction of Ramsgate Harbour, and the lighthouses on Spurn Point, &c. &c.

In the immediate neighbourhood of his home may still be seen two specimens of Smeaton's ingenuity—the hydraulic ram at Temple Newsam, by means of which water is forced to the level of the hall, a height of twenty-six feet (mentioned by Smiles); and a water-wheel at the Foundry Mill, in the parish of Seacroft. The latter, which has a diameter of thirty feet six inches, is turned by a force of water brought by a conduit from a point in the Wyke beck at Roundhay, about a mile distant. Both these are still in use, and, we believe, have required few repairs since Smeaton's time.

John Smeaton died at Austhorpe on the 28th October, 1792.

Our view of Austhorpe Lodge, copied from an engraving in "Lives of the Engineers," shows the house as it stood in Smeaton's lifetime. This portion of the building, which faces north, remains unaltered, though an addition has since been made to the south side. The tower, to the left of the sketch, was built by the engineer as a workshop, and of this Mr. Smiles gives the following interesting description:—"The building was in the form of a square tower, four storeys high, standing apart from his dwelling, on the opposite side of the yard, as represented in the above engraving. The ground floor contained his forge; the first floor his lathe; the second his models; the third was his *drawing-room* and *study*; and the fourth was a sort of lumber-room and attic. From

"the little turreted staircase on the top a door opened on to the leads. "A vane was fixed on the summit, which worked the hands of a dial "upon the ceiling of his drawing-room, so that by raising his head he "could at any moment ascertain precisely which way the wind blew." The two lower storeys of this tower are still standing, and are used as a cottage by Mrs. Wilkinson, the present owner of Austhorpe Lodge.

We append the autograph and seal of John Smeaton, copied from an Indenture dated the 13th of April, 1790 'preserved in the Vestry-chest at Whitkirk', by which, as surviving Trustee of Brooke's Rent Charge,* he conveys it to ten others. The seal is the same as that affixed to his will.

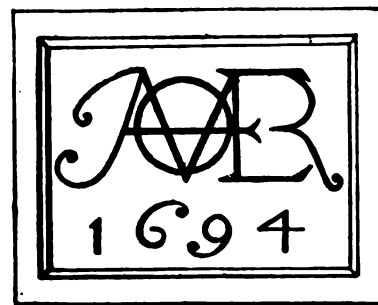
THE MORES OF AUSTHORPE HALL.



FROM the fourteenth to the eighteenth century the Mores were the principal family of Austhorpe; their name first appears in the Return of the Poll Tax in 1379—2 Richard II. —where we find the entry, "Laurencius del More, merchant." This gentleman is elsewhere described as "Lawrence atte More,"† both which names suggest that the situation of his residence, at or near a moor, gave rise to his surname. This was probably Brown Moor—a small tract of ground to the east of Austhorpe Hall.

A pedigree of More of Austhorpe is entered in the visitation of 1584-5, and another of three generations in the later visitation of Dugdale. These we give in a connected form, with additional names and dates supplied from the parish register and other sources, which latter are printed in italics. (See Pedigree.)

Austhorpe Hall is a handsome block of red brick and stone. It was built in 1694, by John More, Esq., and is now the most perfect specimen of a seventeenth century mansion the neighbourhood possesses. Above the front door is an iron plate bearing the date, 1694, and the initials of the owner in monogram—the latter so arranged as to form his name, John More, in full. Over this again was originally a

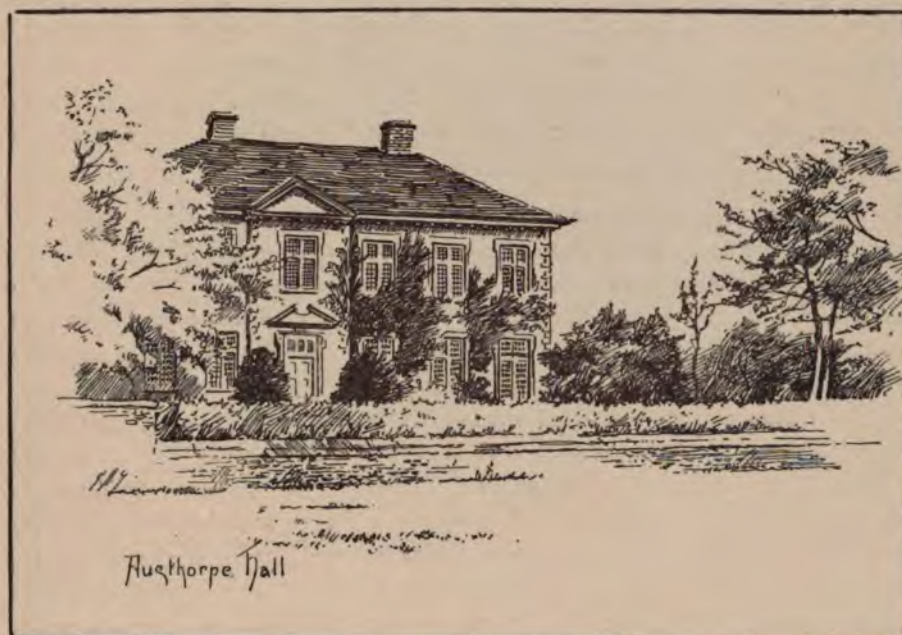

shield, which was accidentally destroyed some years ago. The house contains some fine oak panelling, covering the walls of most of the rooms from floor to ceiling. The oak staircase, a remarkably handsome one, was removed to Seacroft Grange in 1837, when the latter house was remodelled.



We learn from Wilson's MS.* that the last of the Mores of Austhorpe was murdered in London in 1720, though the circumstances of the crime are not stated. It is remarkable that no monuments of the family are to be found in Whitkirk Church. The only memorials of them are two pieces of the Communion plate—a paten and an alms-dish. The former of these bears the inscription:—"Ex dono Johannis More An^o Dom. 1687;" the latter, "Ecclesiae Sanctae Mariae de Whitkirke ad Eucharisticas oblationes colligendas Lancem hanc Johannes More de Austhorpe dicavit An^o Dom. 1685." In the centre of this inscription is the shield of More—a chevron between three fleurs-de-lis.

The following autographs of Nicholas More, and John More, his son, are copied from the Churchwarden's Accounts of Whitkirk, for the years 1666 and 1675 respectively.

AWARD OF SIR WILLIAM GASCOIGNE, KNIGHT, TOUCHING THE DEATH
OF NICHOLAS MORE, 19 EDWARD IV.

The original of this interesting document was formerly in the Burton Constable collection, but is now in the possession of J. E. F. CHAMBERS, Esq., of The Hurst, near Alfreton, Derbyshire, who has kindly presented us with a copy. It is an award made by Sir William Gascoigne, of Gawthorpe, on the 20th July, 1479, after the death of Nicholas More, of Austhorpe, who would seem to have met his death at the hands of one John Sothill, from whom compensation was claimed by deceased's family:—

To all xpēn people this p'sent writyng seyng or haryng William Gascoigne knyght gretyng. Whereas dyverse variances & debates late hade & moved bitwix John Moure son & heire of Nicholas moure, Averay moure, Robert moure, brey^o unto ye sade John moure, William lyndley, John Turna', Robert Worthyngton, Raufe moure, John Moure & Averay moure, Sons unto ye sade John moure oon yat oon pte. 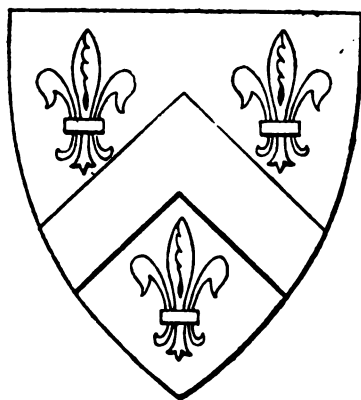

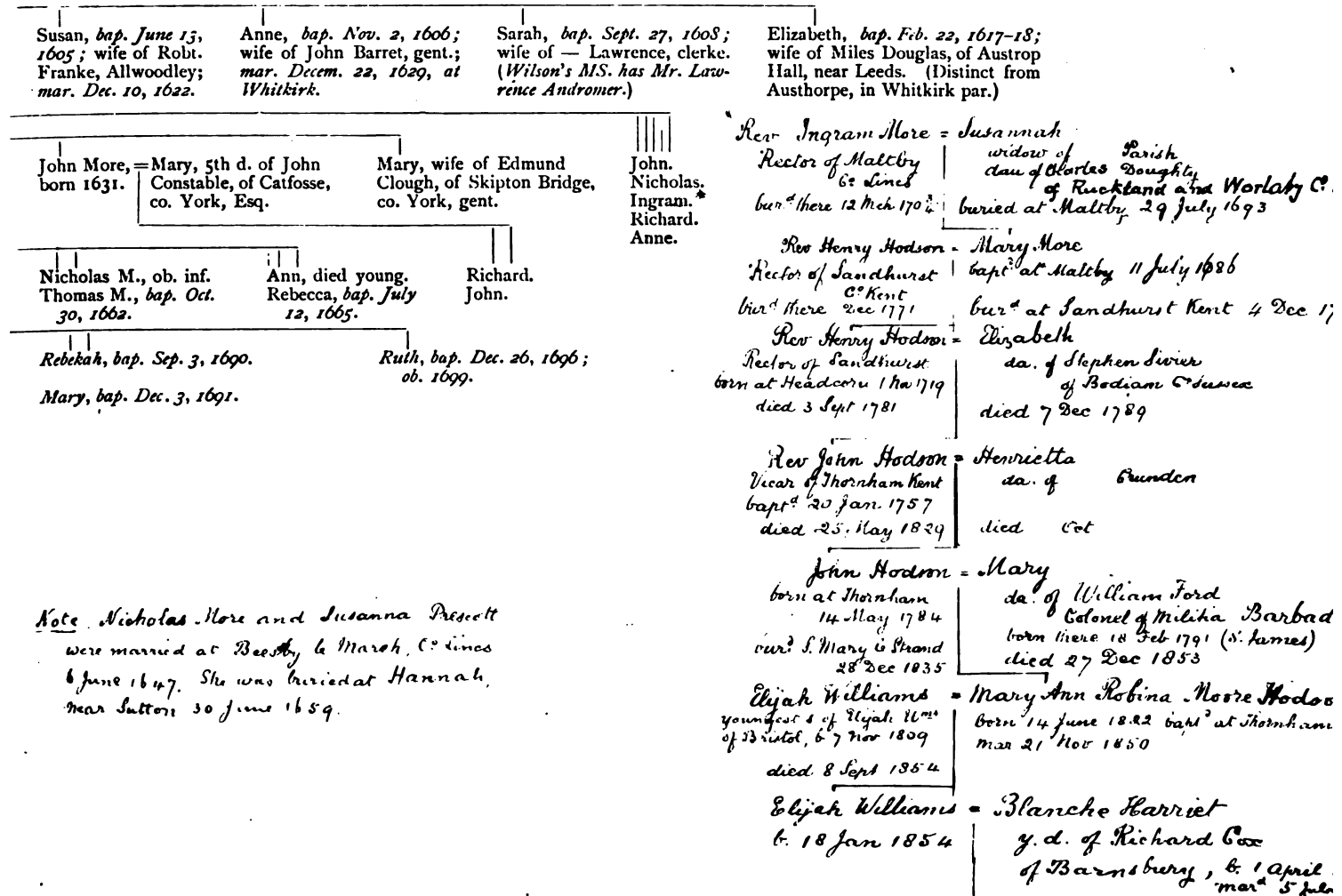

THE MANSTONS OF MANSTON.



MANSTON, or as it is now called, Old Manston, gave its name to a family of some importance, who were seated there from the thirteenth to the sixteenth century. One of them, Alfred Manston, Esq., was an executor of the will of Chief Justice Gascoigne; and we gather that he was his nephew, since he is described as "nepos meus" in the will of Richard Gascoigne, of Hunslet, the judge's younger brother.*

Alfred Manston's will, dated 6th June, 1439, directs that his body be buried at Wkitkirk; but this injunction was, apparently, disregarded, since the following description of his tomb in Harewood Church, is recorded by Glover†—"A knight kneeling, in glasse, wth these arms upon him—Sable "a bend crenellée argent, and written, Orate pro Galfrido Manston, et "Elizabetha uxore ejus."

The same writer describes the arms of Manston impaling Nevill as one of the four shields displayed upon the tomb of Chief Justice Gascoigne‡—"Sable a bend crenellée argent, impaling, gules, a saltire argent, a label of three points azure." This coat is also mentioned by Dodsworth as existing in the "Manston Quire" of Whitkirk Church,§ hence we conclude that Alfred Manston married a daughter of the house of Nevill.|| The tomb of Manston no longer exists at Harewood, and the impaled coat has disappeared alike from the judge's tomb and from the chapel at Whitkirk.

The last male descendant of this family was John Manston, of Manston, whose niece Alice, daughter of his younger brother Robert, inherited his estates. This lady was married successively to Robert Gascoigne, Arthur Pilkington, and Roger Dyneley, by each of whom she had issue. After the death of her third husband, in 1513, Mrs. Dyneley became a *voress*, by virtue of a commission addressed to John, Bishop of Negropont, bearing date 6th November, 1513.¶ She died in February, 1526/7, and was buried with her third husband in the "Manston Quire." Her will, dated 6th February, 1526/7, and proved at York on the 4th March of the same year, contains the following pious bequests:—"To the hie altar "of Whitkirke for all maner of tithes or oblaçõns forgotten xx^d. Itm I "bequeath to the kirks warkes (?wardens) of Whitkirke xiiij^d iiij^d and a "blake vestyment with oñ albe and other stuf thereto belonging and "p̄teynyng. Itm I bequeath to the chauntry altar in Whitkirke ij'. Itm

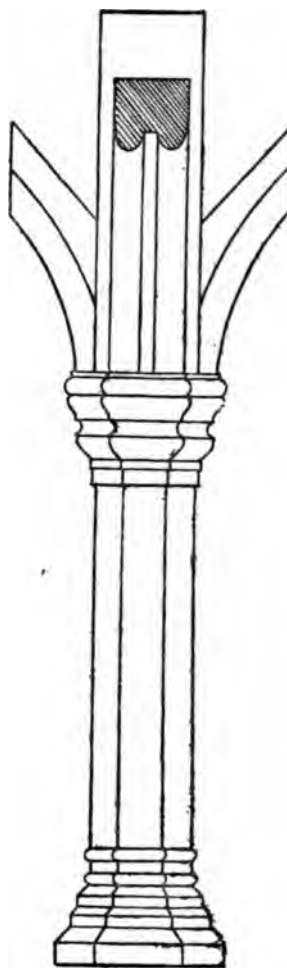

"I bequeath to the kirke of Garford vj^a viij^d. It. I will that there be disposed at the daye of my beriale after the discrecion of my executors viijth sterling. It. I bequeath vij marc of money to oñ prest to reade and syng within p̄ishe kirke of Whitkirke the space of oñ yere next and Imediately folowyng after my decesse and bodely departyng from this transitory worlde for me and my predecessors."

The following persons are named in the will:—Her sons, Peter, John, Roger, Francis, and William Dyneley; George, William, and Humphrey Gascoigne. Her daughters, Dame Jane Gascoigne, Margaret Mallet, Elizabeth Hall, Ann Wentworth. Her grand-daughter Jane Gascoigne, daughter of her son William Gascoigne. Her grandson, John Gascoigne, son of her eldest son and heir, George Gascoigne. Her god-daughters, Alice Hall and Alice Gibson. Her god-son, Will. Stevynson. Her servants, John Dawson and Richard Wilson. Also Henry Elys, Annie Malett, and Malisante Preston. She appoints Thomas Lord Darcy supervisor, to whom she bequeaths her best ambling mare. The witnesses are Sir Roger Killingbell (? Killingbeck), parish priest of Whitkirk; Henry Joye, master of the Hospital in Whitkirk (Lord Darcy's Hospital); Will. Evers and Rob. Totty, chaplains. To her eldest son she bequeathed "these heirlomes—Inp̄mis oñ chales oñ olde vestimente a masse buke oñ portes*;
"oñ leid in the bruhouse oñ maskfatt ij gilecars oñ
"foldyng borde one yron chymnay wth ij side bordes
"in the hall ij candilsticks of yron and ij olde
"cruets in the chapell."

After the death of Mrs. Dyneley, Manston ceased to be a residence of importance, and with its subsequent history we are not concerned, except to notice that about 1846, the owner, Edward Waud, Esq., transferred the name, Manston Hall, from the ancient house to a new mansion which he built near Killingbeck. The old hall is now converted into cottages, and is in a very dilapidated condition; the original windows are gone, and, in fact, all trace of the mansion-house has well-nigh disappeared. The main building is of brick, and probably dates from the end of the sixteenth century, though incorporated with it are fragmentary remains of stonework which are probably portions of an

earlier structure. The accompanying sketch shows the south front, where the main entrance is said to have been. The central portion of the building was evidently, in ancient times, used as the principal hall of the house, and was originally open to the roof, which in that part is remarkably handsome. At either end is a massive tie-beam, twenty inches thick, richly moulded on the under side; on the centre of each beam stands an octagon king-post, four feet high, with carved capital and base; from each post spring four moulded arch-rafters, which support the roof—the whole in oak. Austhorpe Hall and Manston Old Hall are now the property of Darcy Bruce Wilson, Esq., of Seacroft.

Manston Lodge, built on the site of an earlier house, half a mile west of the old hall, has long been the home of the Atkinson family.



SOME MANSTON EVIDENCES.

The will of Alfred Manston gives a curious insight into the religious practices of the fifteenth century; and its special reference to Whitkirk parish will, we hope, be sufficient excuse for presenting it here, although it has already appeared in the second volume of "Testamenta Eboracensia," published by the Surtees Society.

A search in the Public Record Office has discovered the following "Manston" Fines between the reigns of Richard II. and Richard III., which may be of use to some of our readers.

[In early times, as most of our readers will be aware, the common mode of conveying land was by Fine and Recovery. This process may be briefly described as a fictitious suit commenced by the intending purchaser against the vendor, and then compromised, with permission of the Court, by the defendant making his peace with the claimant and abandoning his defence. The transaction was entered on the rolls of the Court, and a document drawn up called the Indenture or Foot of the Fine, which contained a summary of the whole matter, a copy of which was delivered to each party. In the present list occurs an instance of a fine used collusively as a means of settling an estate. The collection of Fines now in the Public Record Office extends from the reign of Henry II. to the year 1834, when they were abolished by statute 3 & 4 Will. IV.]

This fine is a settlement of Mrs. Pilkington's (the heiress of the Manstons) estates, and seems sufficiently interesting to give at length. The following is a translation of the Indenture of the fine.

This is the final agreem^t made in the Court of the Lord the king at Westminster from Easter day in fifteen days, in the 16th year of the reign of Edward the fourth, king of England & France. Before Thos. Bryan, Rich^d Chokke, Thos. Littleton, & Rich^d Neel, Justices & other faithful (subjects) of the Lord the King then and there present. Between John Pilkinton knt, querent, & Alice Pilkinton widow, who was the wife of Arthur Pilkinton Esq., daughter of Robert Manston and heiress of John Manston, deforciant, of the manor of Manston with the appūrt^s & 12 messuages, 474 acres of land, 31 acres of meadow, & 200 acres of wood with the appūt^s in Manston, Austhorp, Ledys, Scolys, Lutryngton, & Garford. Whereupon a plea of covenant was summoned between them in the s^d court: that is to say, that the said Alice hath acknowl^d the af^d manor & ten^{ts} with the appūrt^s to be the right of the s^d John. Of which the s^d John hath the afs^d manor with the appur^{ts} & 9 messuages, 394 acres of land, 29 acres of meadow, & the said wood, with the appūt^s, of the s^d tenem^{ts}, in the afs^d towns of Manston, Austhorp, Ledys, Scolys, & Lutryngton, of the gift of the said Alice. And

for this acknowledg^{mt}, fine, & agreem^t the a^d John hath granted to the s^d Alice the said manor & tenem^{ts} with the appūrt^s. And those he hath yielded in the same Court to the s^d Alice to have and to hold during her lifetime, of the chief lord of that fee, by the services which pertain to the said manor & tenem^{ts}, & without impeachment of waste. And, moreover, the s^d John hath granted for himself and his heirs that 3 messuages, 80 acres of land & two acres of meadow with the appūrt^s of the a^d tenem^{ts} in the s^d town of Garford which William Maulyverer & Johanna his wife, who was formerly the wife of Robert Manston, held during the lifetime of the s^d Johanna of the inheritance of the s^d John on the day on which this agree^{mt} was made, & which after the decease of the said Johanna shall be held to have reverted to the said John and his heirs, after the decease of the said Johanna shall wholly remain to the said Alice to hold during her lifetime together with the a^d manor & tenem^{ts} which by this fine remain to her, of the chief Lord of that fee by the services which pertain to the s^d tenem^{ts}, & without impeachment of waste. And after the decease of the s^d Alice the said manor & tenem^{ts} with the appūrt^s shall wholly remain to Johanna Pilkinton daughter and heiress of the s^d Arthur & Alice, & the heirs begotten of her body to hold of the chief Lord of that fee by the services which pertain to the s^d manor & tenem^{ts} for ever. And if it should happen that the s^d Johanna, daughter of the afores^d Arthur & Alice, die without heirs begotten of her body, then, after the decease of the said Johanna the aforesaid manor & tenem^{ts} with the appūrts shall wholly remain to George Gascoigne son of Robert Gascoigne & the s^d Alice & the heirs male of his body begotten, to hold of the chief Lord of that fee for ever by the services which pertain to the s^d manor and tenem^{ts}. And if it should happen that the s^d George die without heirs male of his body begotten, then, after the decease of the said George the a^d manor & tenem^{ts} with the appūrt^s shall wholly remain to Humfrey brother of the s^d George and the heirs male of his body begotten, to hold for ever of the chief Lord of that fee by the services which pertain to the said manor and tenem^{ts}. And if it should happen that the said Humphrey die without heirs male of his body begotten, then, after the decease of the said Humphrey the a^d manor & tenem^{ts} with the appūrt^s shall wholly remain to William, brother of the said George & Humfrey, & the heirs male of his body begotten, To hold for ever of the chief Lord of that fee by the services which pertain to the said manor & tenem^{ts}. And if it should happen that the said William die without heirs male of his body begotten, then, after the decease of the said William the a^d manor & tenem^{ts} shall wholly remain to the right heirs of the said Alice, To hold for ever of the chief Lord of that fee by the services which pertain to the said manor & tenements.

YORK.

The above settlement, however, must have been followed by a deed of disentailment, since, in 1528, a year after Mrs. Pilkington's (later, Mrs. Dyneley) death, the Manston estate had passed to the Pilkingtons, as appears from the following fine:—

If Arthur Pilkington last named be the same who married Alice Gascoigne (*née* Manston), John must have been his son by a former wife.

MANSTON HALL.

The modern mansion of this name, which, as already stated, was built about 1846 by Edward Waud, Esq., of Manston, and Chester Court, near Selby, stands in a park of some eighty acres, to the south of the York Road, near Killingbeck. The house is of stone, and its workmanship in every detail is of a most finished character. This estate is now the joint property of Edward Simpson, Esq., of Boston Spa, and the heirs of the late Mr. Alderman Stead, of Leeds.

SEACROFT HALL.



ALTHOUGH we have no certain record of its date, Seacroft Hall, the residence of the Wilson family, must be counted amongst the ancient mansion-houses of the neighbourhood. It was probably built by the Shillitos, who, as we shall see later, bought the Seacroft estate from the Earl of Devon, in 1605, and from one of whom, Lady Hansby, it was purchased by the Nelthorpes in 1656. By a descendant of the latter family, the Hon^{ble} Mrs. Lyon, it was sold to John Wilson, Esq., early in the present century.

The richly-decorated plaster ceilings of the principal rooms on the first floor are a striking feature of the interior. These are said to be coeval with the earliest portion of the building, and we certainly cannot assign to them a later date than the beginning of the seventeenth century. Externally the house has undergone considerable alteration. It appears originally to have had mullioned windows, fragments of which remain; but its present form probably dates from the middle of last century.

The following pedigree of NELTHORPE, of Seacroft, is copied from "Wilson's MSS.," in the Leeds Library, with some slight additions from the Parish Registers and other sources.

NELTHORPE OF SEACROFT.

I. JAMES NELTHORPE, of Hatton Garden, in London, Esq., had issue, George (his successor). This James purchased Seacroft of Lady Eliz., wid. of Sir Ralph Hansby of Tickhill (and widow of Geo. Shillito, Lord of Seacroft) about 1660.* In Hillary Term, 1678, he obtained a judgment against S^r Tho. Gascoigne, in Common Pleas, for £203 Damages and Costs in Suit.



II. GEORGE NELTHORPE of Seacroft, Esq., died at York 9th June, 1757, aged 80 (?83), and was bur. at Whitkirk. He married Elizabeth, daur of - - - - - who died at Seacroft 2nd June, 1738, and was bur. at Whitkirk. He had issue—

1. James (his successor).

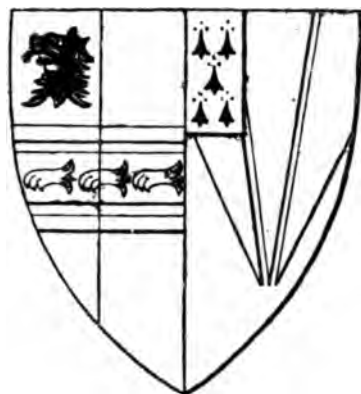

Amongst other Seacroft families whose names appear on the Registers in the seventeenth century are those of Hancock, Tottie, Eamonson, and Norton.

THE HANCOCKS date back at Seacroft to 1379, in which year four of the name, Robert, Warynus, Thomas, and John appear in the return of the Poll Tax, 2 Richard II. In 15 Henry VIII. (1523-4) Henry Hancock paid subsidy for lands in Seacroft. By Fine, 15 Elizabeth (1573) Henry Hancock, gent., conveyed premises in Seacroft to Henry Norton, gent. "Henricus Hancock de Seacroft, gent.," appears in a list of "those reputed to be gentlemen and summoned to enter their pedigree," at the visitation of Robert Glover, in 1584/5. In 39 Elizabeth (1596-7) Albion Hancocke paid subsidy for lands in Seacroft.

William Hancock, of Seacroft, who died in 1677, and who is known as the founder of "Hancock's Dole," appears to have been the last of this family. By his will, dated 7th July, 29 Charles II., he bequeathed legacies to Robert Hancock, of Halton, and Henry his son, "in regard they are of my name, though nothing of my blood or alliance."*

THE TOTTIE family, of Allerton-Gledhow, a pedigree of which is recorded by Whitaker ("Ducat. Leod.," p. 118), were seated at Seacroft early in the seventeenth century. Their residence there, anciently known as Tottie Hall, was remodelled in 1837, and is now called Seacroft Grange.

In the middle aisle of Whitkirk Church are slabs in memory of two of the family—Ruth, daughter of John Tottie, of Seacroft, who died 26th October, 1675; and Martha, widow of John Tottie, of Seacroft, gent., who died 8th May, 1735, in her 83rd year. There is also a handsome monument on the north wall of the Chancel, bearing the following inscription—

"In a vault near this place Lie the Remains of Mrs. ELIZABETH LOWTHER, Relict of Christ^r Lowther of Little Preston Es^r who died April 19, 1751. Her mind and Person were elegant and engaging, and her many amiable Virtues and Endowments rendered her beloved and admired by all that knew her. She was the only daughter of Daniel Maude, of Alverthorpe, Esq^m and Niece and Executrix to M^{rs} Tottie of Seacroft, in respect to whose Memory she chose to be buried near her. She left one Son, Sir Wm. Lowther, Bart., Rector of Swillington, and one Daughter, married to George Thompson, of York, Esq^r"

THE EAMONSONS first appear at Seacroft in the middle of the seventeenth century. They probably migrated there from Leeds, since their name occurs in the Subsidy Rolls of that town during the reigns of James I. and his successor. The family had two residences at Seacroft, which were known as the Upper and Lower House respectively. The latter of these we cannot identify, but the former is the one now called Pigeon Cote Farm. Until some twelve years ago the Eamonson coat-of-arms adorned the mantelpiece of one of the principal rooms of this house.

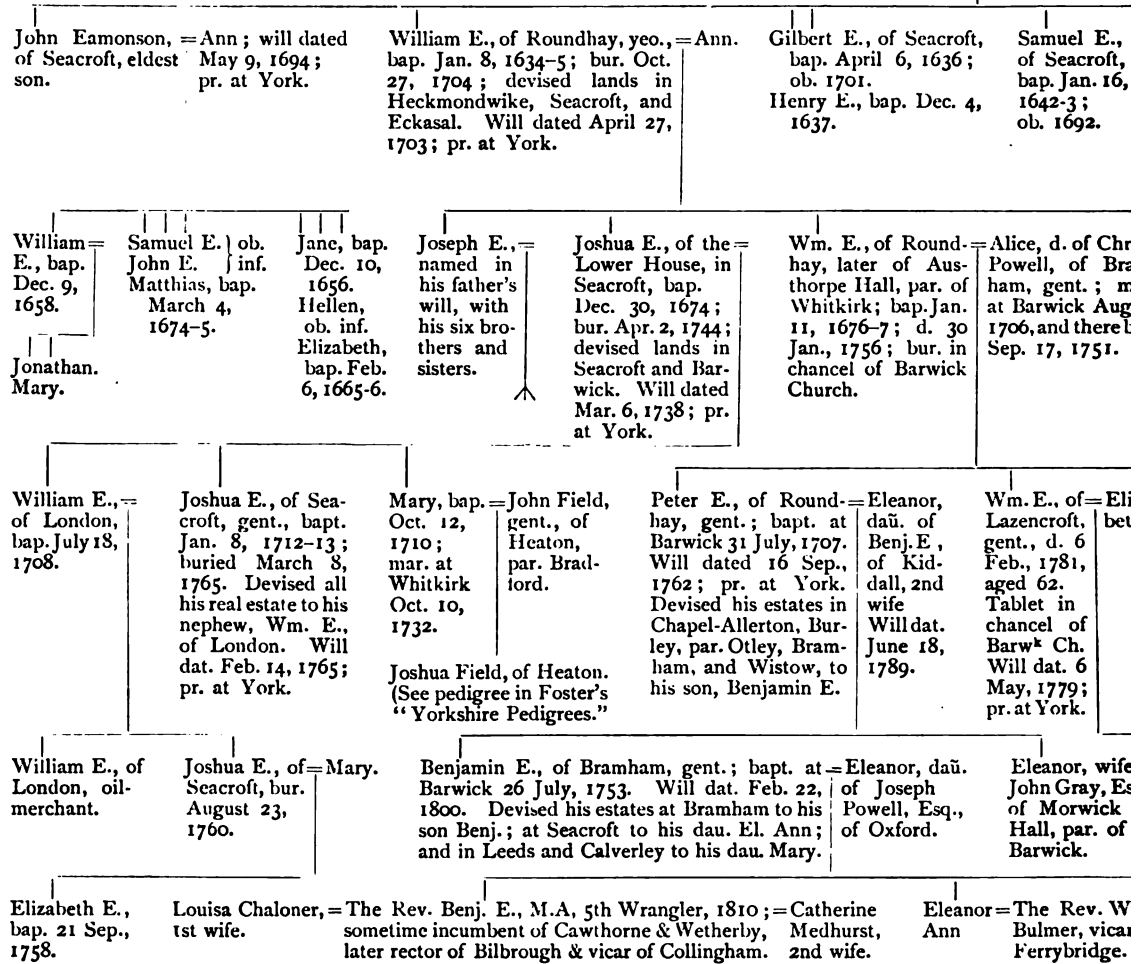
Several of the family are buried in the north and south aisles of Whitkirk Church; and there is a marble tablet in memory of William Eamonson, of Lazencroft, in the Chancel of Barwick Church.

We believe the name Eamonson to be the original of not a few of the many Edmonsons, Edmondsons, or Edmundsons, some of whom, according to Burke ("General Armory"), bear the coat of Eamonson shown with the accompanying pedigree.

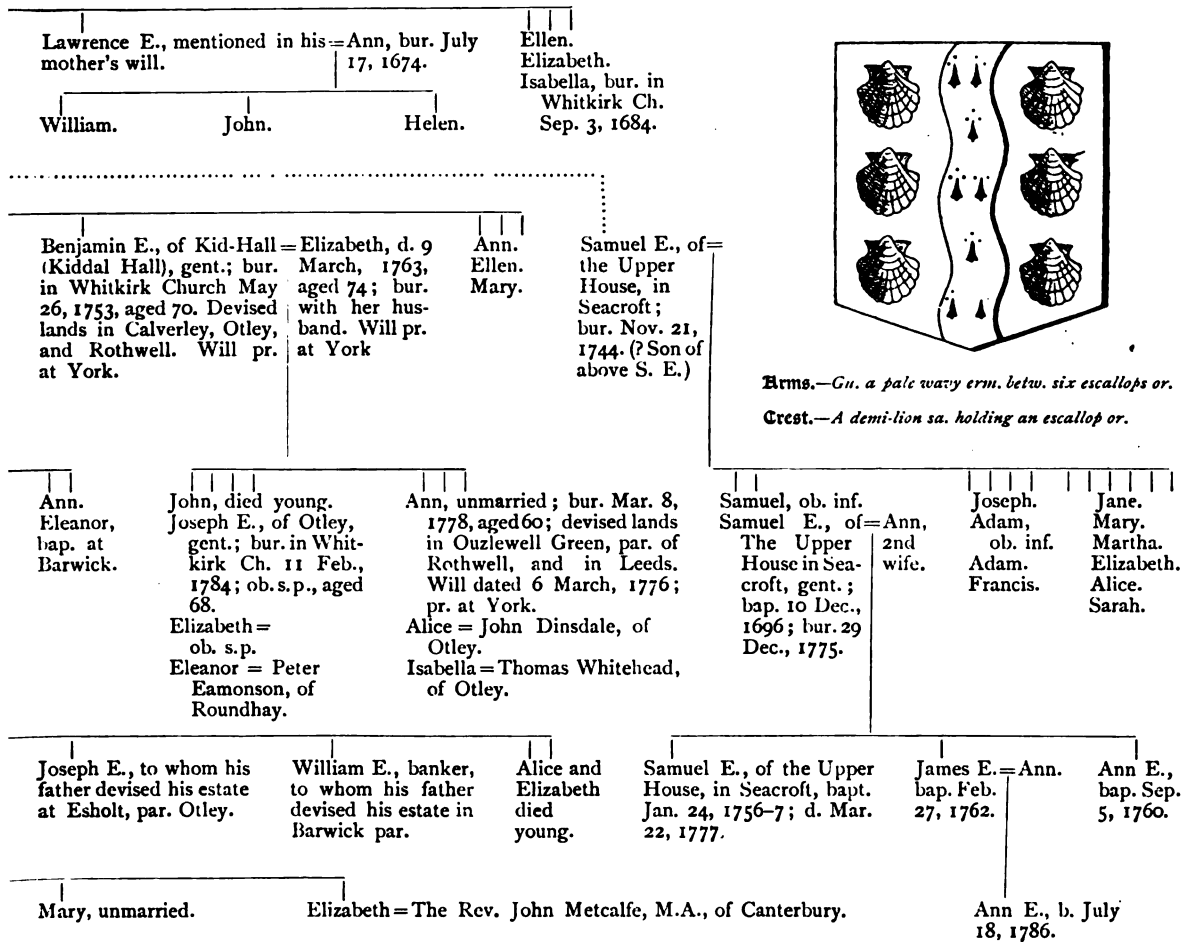

THE BROOKES OF KILLINGBECK HALL.



AT the beginning of the seventeenth century the chief landowner at Killingbeck was Mr. Richard Greggs, whose name appears in the Subsidy Rolls of 39 Elizabeth. At his death, in 1638, the estate passed, by purchase or inheritance, to Mr. Edward Brooke, his son-in-law. In the latter family Killingbeck descended till the end of the eighteenth century, when, in 1788, it was sold to John Hanson, Esq., of Osmondthorpe (Foster's "Yorkshire Pedigrees"). This gentleman shortly after disposed of it to Mr. William Walker, father of George Walker, author of "The Costume of Yorkshire in 1814." The latter, after his father's death, resided at Killingbeck Lodge, where he died, 27th July, 1856, aged 75.



The present hall was built by the Brookes probably early in the last century. Several of this family are buried in the north aisle of Whitkirk Church; and in Barwick Church there is a handsome marble tablet in memory of Major James Croft Brooke, of Littlethorpe, near Ripon. The name Brooke appears in the Subsidy Rolls and Parish Registers of Leeds in the reign of Elizabeth.

In the low ground to the north-west of the hall, and midway between it and Killingbeck Farm, were standing, thirty years ago, the ruins of a mullion-windowed stone house, called the Old Hall. This, as its name implies, was probably the predecessor of the present mansion.

EARTHWORKS AT KILLINGBECK.

The natural configuration of Killingbeck is an elevated plateau, from which the ground falls more or less on all sides, but most steeply on the north and west, where it slopes to the Wyke beck. Along the face of this part of the hill, and encircling it, are cut a succession of terraces which run parallel to each other. These banks, which greatly resemble the terraces of a garden, are most perceptible on the north side, where five of them remain. The two uppermost are seventy yards apart, while the three lower ones are formed at intervals of thirty yards, their depth varying from ten to four feet. In the arable land they have been destroyed, but in the pastures they are in places very perfect. Their course is traceable for about half a mile along the skirt of the hill, where, at a point in the grass field east of Killingbeck pond, they make a turn at right angles eastward in the direction of Killingbeck Hall.

These earthworks are generally supposed to be the remains of a Celtic fortification; but we think it more probable that they are the result of agricultural operations, and that each terrace represents an allotment, or strip of ground, in the common field.

In his book, "The English Village Community," Mr. Seebohm gives a sketch of a set of terraces precisely similar to those at Killingbeck, which exist in the parish of Clothall in Hertfordshire. His explanation of them is as follows:—"When a hill side formed part of the open field, the strips "almost always were made to run, not up and down the hill, but horizontally "along it; and in ploughing, the custom for ages was always to turn the "sod of the furrow down hill, the plough consequently always returning one "way idle. If the whole hill-side were ploughed in one field, this would "result in a gradual travelling of the soil from the top to the bottom of "the field, and it might not be noticed. But as in the open-field system "the hill-side was ploughed in strips, with unploughed balks between them, "no sod could pass in the ploughing from one strip to the next; but the "process of moving the sod downwards would go on age after age just the "same within each individual strip. In other words, every year's ploughing "took a sod from the higher edge of the strip and put it on the lower edge; "and the result was that the strips became in time long level terraces one "above the other, and the balks between them grew into steep rough banks "of long grass, covered often with natural self-sown brambles and bushes. "These banks between the plough-made terraces are generally called "*lynches* or *linces*; and the word is often applied to the terraced-strips themselves, which go by the name of 'the linces.'" Mr. Seebohm adds that the lynch may often be observed remaining when every other trace of an open field has been removed by enclosure, as is the case at Killingbeck.

WHITEBRIDGE HOUSE.



WHITEBRIDGE House, in the hamlet of Killingbeck, though now only a small farm, bears evidence of having had greater pretensions in times gone by. Its name was anciently Wike-bridge,* derived from the Wike, or Wyke (now usually called White) beck, over which the York road is carried a few hundred yards below the house. With the exception of a portion of the upper storey, which is constructed of "post and pan" work, the building is of stone, and is, undoubtedly, of sixteenth century workmanship. The east end, which is stone throughout, is evidently an addition, though it

does not appear to be of much later date. The principal entrance opens into a good-sized parlour in the centre of the house, two sides of which are panelled in oak. This room had originally an open chimney, with seats at either side of the hearth, the form of which is still preserved. Perhaps the most noticeable feature of the interior is a plaster coat-of-arms, in *bas relief*, which adorns the mantelpiece of what we have described as the more modern part of the house. As will be seen from our sketch, the shield displays three bucks regardant, and is surrounded by a border; it is supported by winged goats, and surmounted by the crest—a goat's head between two wings. This coat is probably of the same date as the house, but cannot be later than the first half of the seventeenth century.

The earliest notice of the house we have found is the entry "Elizabeth Thompson, of Wikebridge," in the burial register of 1697. Other evidence of the Thompsons having lived there are the letters "W. T." carved over a door which anciently opened from the principal parlour, but which is now in a passage. These were probably the initials of William Thompson, whose name appears in the Hearth Tax Roll of 24 Chas. II., under Seacroft township. "Thompsons of Killingbeck" occur in the register as early as 1638; and, since Wikebridge is within the hamlet of Killingbeck, it may have been their home at that date.

The coat-of-arms described above is but a doubtful guide to the earlier owners of the house. The tinctures are not shown in the plaster, but, apart from this, we can find no record of "*3 stags statant*," borne with supporters.* "*Ar. 3 bucks statant or*" and "*Vert 3 bucks pass. within a border or*" are both recorded† as coats of Green; and we think it not improbable that Whitebridge was the residence of a family of that name who appear in the Subsidy Rolls of 6 and 19 James I. (under Seacroft), and in the parish registers of the same period.‡ At this date

On Dec. 6, 1629, Administration of the estate of Conand Green of Seacroft was granted to Christ^r G., his son—his widow was Alice G.—"York Register."

supporters would probably be readily granted, but, on the other hand, in the case we are considering, they may have been merely creations of the artist's fancy.

In the last century the farm was owned by a family named Stead, who are said to have inherited it from the Thompsons, and whose descendants, in the female line, still live there. It is now the property of the Hon^{ble}. Mrs. Meynell Ingram.

AMONGST other families whose names occur in the Whitkirk Parish Registers of the seventeenth century, we may mention those of BELHOUSE, or Bellass, as the name was frequently corrupted, of Newsam; CLOUGH, of Thorp Stapleton; GRAVELEY, of Halton; MILNER, of Colton; MORKILL, of Halton and South Milford; OGLETHORPE, of Colton and Roundhay; and SKELTON, of Osmondthorpe. The following short pedigree of Belhouse was recorded with that of Greenwood, of Stapleton, at the Visitation of Dugdale in 1665, and since it mentions several local names, we have ventured to insert it.

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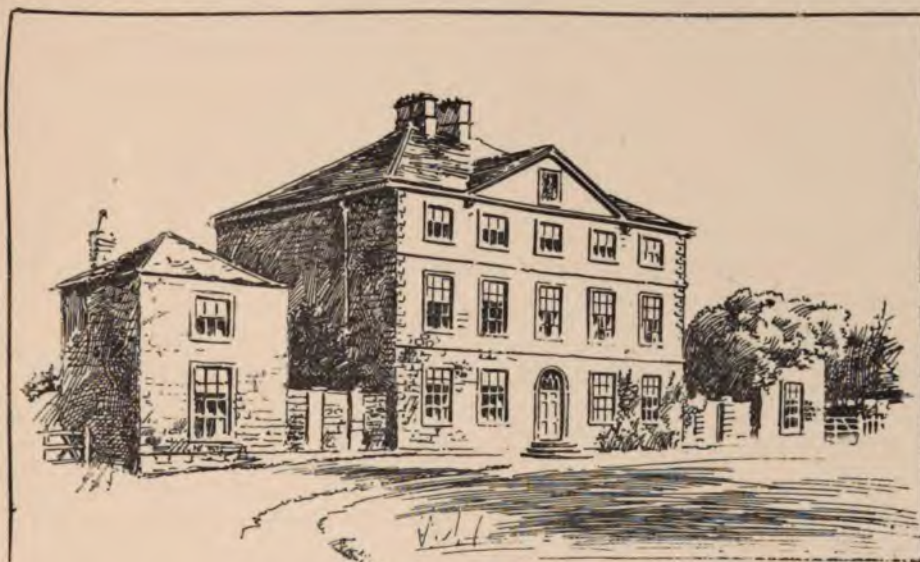
GRAY OF MORWICK HALL.



THE families of GRAY and VEVERS more properly belong to the history of Barwick than to that of Whitkirk; but as neither of them has as yet found a place in any local history, we venture to insert them here.

Previous to its becoming the home of the Grays, Morwick was a residence of the Vevers family, by one of whom it was sold, at the end of the last century, to Edward Gray, Esq., of Kippax. This gentleman, who built the present hall, devised the estate to his nephew, John Gray, great-uncle of the present owner.

Mr. Gray, of Morwick, possesses an interesting collection of family relics, which include several good paintings. The earliest of these is a portrait of Richard Gray, who held the post of "Scrutator" in the port of London in the reign of Elizabeth. In one corner of the picture is the following inscription:—"Effigies Ric̄i Gray Generosi Scrutatoris DÑE Reginae Elizabeth in portu London [ec] qui obiit xiiij die Octobris AN. 1581 ÆTATIS SUÆ 76"; and opposite to it the arms and crest assigned to him in the undermentioned grant, with the motto, "VIA LETHI SEMEL CALCATA EST."

The grant of arms to this Richard Gray, in 1568, which is preserved at Morwick, describes him as being descended from a younger brother of the Lord Gray of Rotherfeld, though it is not stated of which of the five barons of that name. The following is a copy of the document:—

To all and singuler aswell Nobles and Gentills as others to whome these presentē shall come, Robert Cooke Esquier, *alias* Clarencieulx principall herehault, and kinge of Armes, of the Sowth Este and west partē of this Realme of England, from the River of Trent southwarde sendith greetinge in owre Lord God euerlastinge. And beinge required of Richarde Graye of London, gentilman, son and heire of Walter Gray, son and heire of Richarde Gray, descended of a yonger brother of the Lorde Gray of Rotherfelde, to make searche in the Regesters and Recordes of my Office for the auncient Armes and Creaste belonginge to that name and familie whereof he is descendid, whereuppon I haue at his request made search accordingly, and do finde that he may lawfully beare, as his anncestors heretofore haue don, the Armes and Creast hereafter followenge—That is to saye barry of sixe siluer and asur a bende gules, and to his difference a Rose of the first, and to the Creast uppon the healme on a wreath siluer and asur standinge on a mownte vert a Badger proper manteled gules, dobled siluer, as more playnly apperith depicted in this margent. The which Armes and Creast, and eury parte and parcell therof, I the saide Clarencieulx kinge of Armes by power and aucthoritie to my Office annexed and grawnted by letters Patentē vnder the great seale of England do by these presentē ratifie confirme and allow to the saide Richarde Graye gentilman, and to his posteritie with their due differences, and he and they, the same to vse, beare, and shewe, in Shilde, Cotearmour, or otherwise; and therein to be reuested at his and their liberty and pleasure without impediment let or interruption of any person or persons. In witnes whereof I the saide Clarencieulx Kinge of Armes haue signed these presentē with my hand and sett hereunto the seale of my Office. Yeuen at London the xxiiijth daye of June in A^o dōi 1568 and in the tenth yere of the raigne of oure soueraigne Lady Elizabeth by the grace of God Quene of England France and Ireland defendor of the faith, &c.

According to Burke, the Lords Grey of Rotherfield were descended from Robert de Grey of Rotherfield, in Oxfordshire, fourth son of Henry de Grey of Thurrock-Grey, in Essex, whose other sons were Richard, ancestor of the Barons Grey of Codnor; John, ancestor of the Barons Grey of Wilton, and of the Greys of Ruthyn; Walter, Archbishop of York (1216 to 1256); William and Henry.

Robert, the fifth and last Baron Grey, died in 1387, leaving an only daughter, Joane, who was married to John, Baron d'Eyncourt, and through whom the barony rested eventually in Francis, Viscount Lovel, under whose attainder, in 1487, it became extinct.

Another interesting document in Mr. Gray's possession is a grant of arms, in 1623, to Scipio le Squire, whose descendant, Mary, the daughter and co-heiress of William Squire, of Steyning, in Sussex, became the wife of the Rev. John Gray, Rector of Swillington. There is a fine portrait of the above William Squire at Morwick. We append a copy of the grant.

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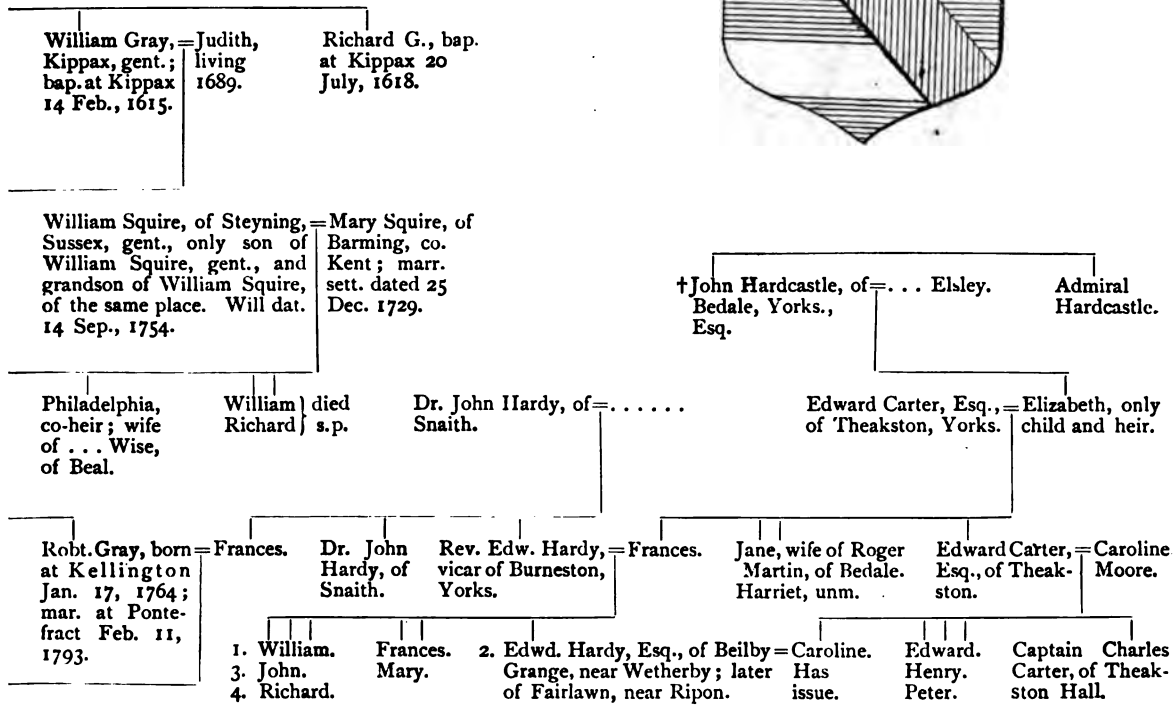
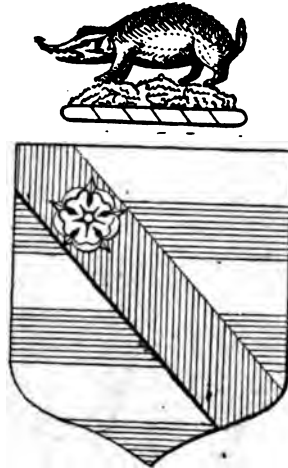

VEVERS, OF SCHOLES HALL.



THE family of Vevers appears to have settled in the parish of Barwick-in-Elmet at the end of the sixteenth, or very early in the following century.* The first of the name there on record is Richard Vevers, of Potterton, tanner, whose will was proved at York in 1611. In it he names his nephew, Richard Vevers, of Scholes, who was probably the first of the family who made the latter place his home. Later, Scholes Hall became their principal residence in

the neighbourhood, but, together with the rest of their property in Barwick parish, it passed into other hands about a century ago. The hall, which is now the property of Mr. John Crosland, is a plain red-brick building, dating, probably, from the middle of the seventeenth century; its rooms are large and lofty, but devoid of decoration.

* The name occurs in several neighbouring parishes late in the sixteenth century, as under:—Richard Vevers appears (under Halton) in a roll of the Manor of Temple Newsam, 1572. The will of Isabella Vevers, of Whitwood, was proved at York, 26th July, 1578; and that of John V., of Little Preston, 19th Jan., 1594. Administration of the estate of William V., of Swillington, was granted 12th March, 1613. The will of Robert V., of Adle, was proved at York, 5th Oct., 1587; and that of Margaret V., of the same place, 27th March, 1588. The will of Mark V., of Rigcote, near Leeds, was proved at York, 1634; and fifty years earlier, in 1584, we find an administration of William Evers, of Rigcote,—the latter possibly an ancient way of spelling the name. (See Note, p. 95.)

There are, no doubt, several branches of the family in existence, but we have only succeeded in tracing the one now settled in Herefordshire, to a member of which, Mr. Henry Vevers, of Highmore House, Hereford, we are indebted for the later portion of the accompanying pedigree. We have also to thank Mr. Robert Lister Vevers, of Chapel-town, who represents a family of this name resident in York in the last century, for his ready assistance. The arms* and motto, as shewn with the accompanying pedigree, appear on a monument in the north aisle of Barwick Church, the inscription upon which is as follows:—

Near this place lies interred the remains of William Vevers, of Scholes, Esq., who died the 1st of Feb^r 1744, aged 48 years. Also his son, Richard Vevers, Esq., who died Jan^r 11th 1767, aged 35 years. Also Priscilla Atkinson, mother of the above, wife of . . . Atkinson, Esq. . . died . . . [partly illegible].

On the floor of the Church are slabs in memory of the following members of the family:—

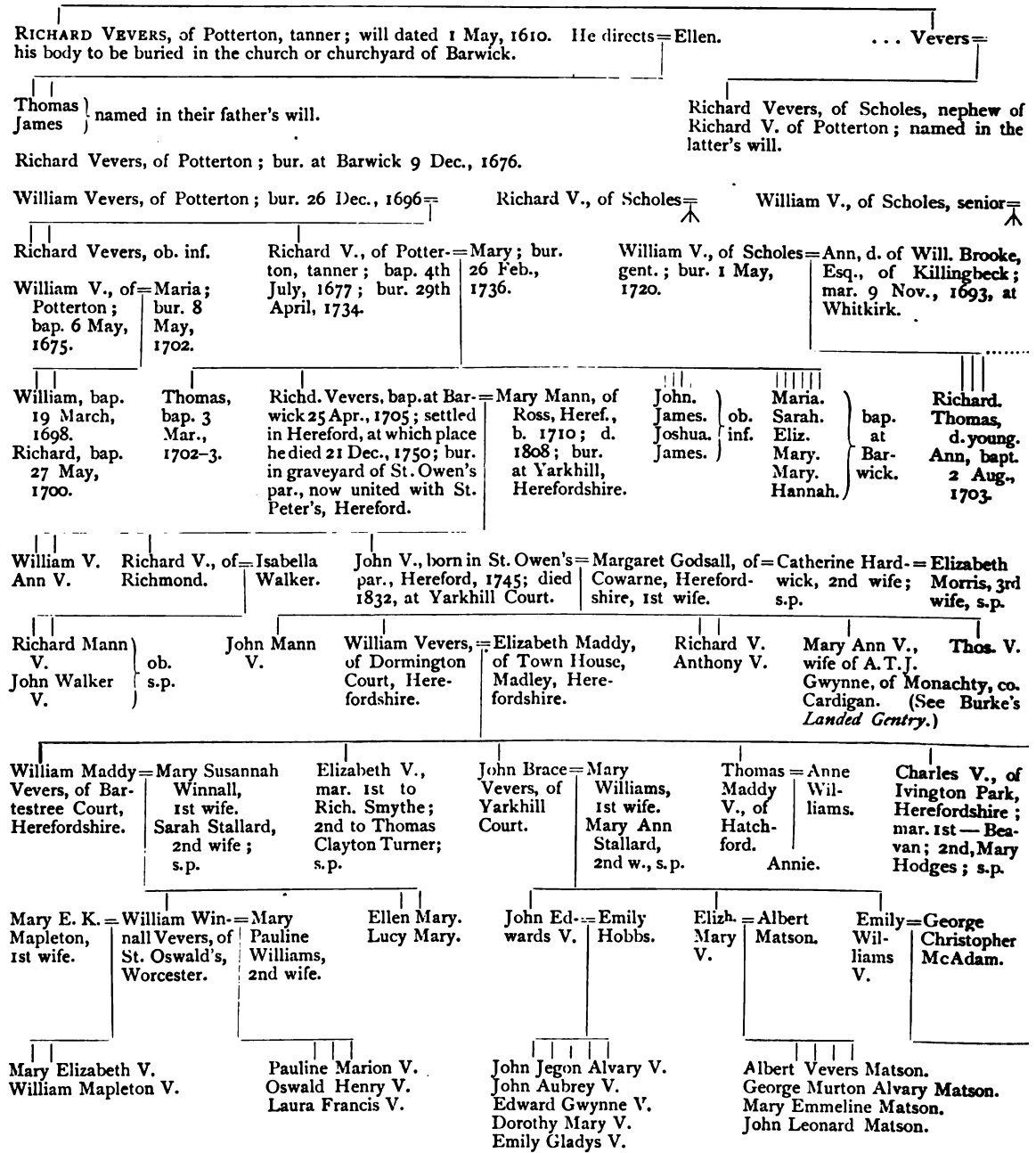
(1) The above William and Richard. (2) William, son of W^m. Vevers of Morwick, who died 28th July, 1717, aged 22. Another son, Francis, who died 13 Decem., 1719, aged 19. Sarah, wife of said W^m. V., who died 23^d Sep., 1729, aged 56. The said Will. V., who died 18 Oct., 1738, aged 67. (3) Alvarey Vevers, of Scholes, who died 8 Nov. [Only a portion of this stone (in the south aisle) remains].

The Vevers family of Scholes were known in the last century as lovers of horse-racing, and their sporting reputation was well maintained by the late Mr. William Vevers, of Dormington Court, Herefordshire. This gentleman, of whom an interesting account, with his portrait, will be found in "The Sporting Magazine," of October, 1850, was one of the best cross-country riders of his time, and the owner of some celebrated racehorses, which he frequently piloted himself.†

* "Quarterly, or and gu. on a bend sa. three escallops ar.," was the coat borne by the ancient family of Eure or Evre; and it has been suggested that Vevers may be a corruption of this name, which appears to have been written in various forms, such as Yver, Yevers, and Evers (see Papworth and Morant's "Dictionary of Arms.")

† Amongst others of the name whose connection, if any, with the above family, we have been unable to ascertain, are (1) Colonel Robert Vevers, sometime of Banbury, an officer under Oliver Cromwell. See Webb's "History of the Civil War in Herefordshire." (2) The Rev. Richard Vevers, a noted pluralist, who died Rector of Kettering, in 1838, aged 87. He married (1778) Theodosia Dorothy, third daughter of the Rev. Sir William Anderson, Bart., of Lea, Lincolnshire; and his eldest daughter, Theodosia Anne, became the wife of Lord Chief Justice Denman.

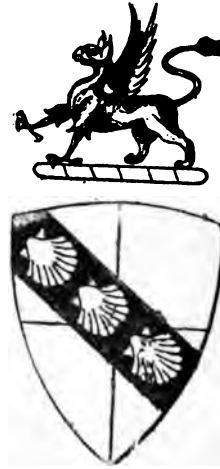

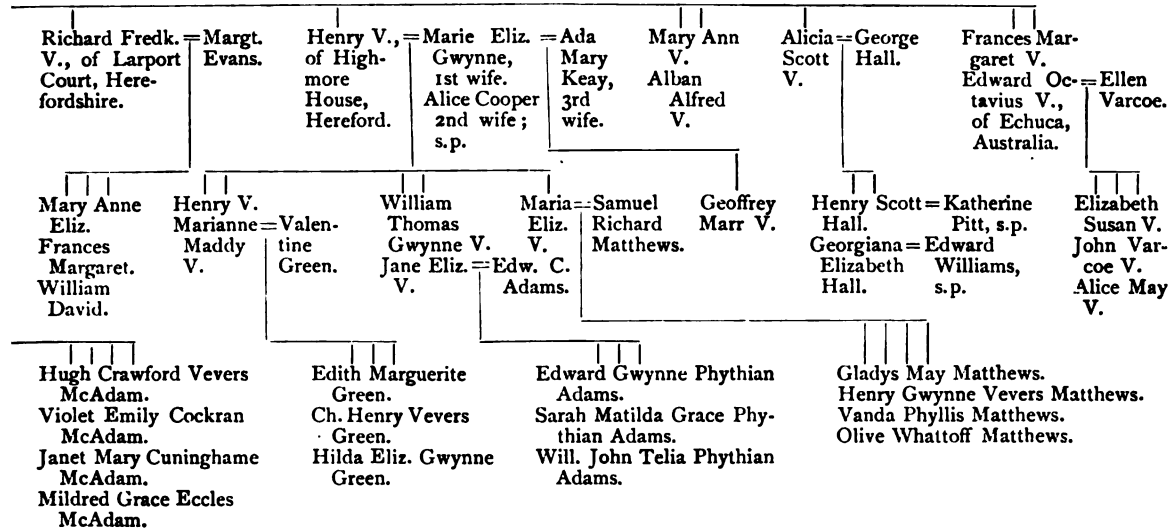

MANORIAL COURTS.



URING a period of the last century no less than five distinct Manorial Courts claimed jurisdiction within Whitkirk parish, viz.:—The Court of the Honour of Pontefract, and those of the Manors of Temple Newsam, Whitkirk, Roundhay and Seacroft. Of these the first and last named have now ceased to be held.

HONOUR OF PONTEFRACT.

A manor as it existed in feudal times may be briefly described as a tract of land held by a lord or great person, who kept to himself as much of it as was necessary for his own use, which was called his demesne, and granted out the remainder to various freeholders, subject to certain stipulated rents or services. This class included those who held by military or knights' service, and those who held by service other than military, called socage tenure. Part of the demesne which surrounded his mansion-house was usually in the lord's own occupation, and formed his park; while the remainder was either wholly cultivated for his benefit by his serfs or villeins, or portions of it were let to farmers, who held by lease or covenant. The barren lands which remained formed the lord's waste, upon which his tenants were allowed to pasture their cattle.

The villeins (*villani*) were the principal grade of the non-free inhabitants of the Manor. They were obliged to remain on the soil (*adscripti glebae*), and were bound to render agricultural service to the lord. On the other hand, they were allowed to occupy plots of land for their own benefit, which were often of considerable extent. This occupancy, which passed from father to son, in process of time came to be recognised as a distinct species of tenure, called tenure by custom, and was the original of the modern copyholds. In Domesday Book two lower grades of inhabitants are

mentioned—the cottagers (*cotarii, cotsetlae, or bordarii*), who in time came to be confounded with the villeins, and the “servi,” who were mere slaves, liable to be bought or sold by the lord.

Each Lord of a Manor was empowered to hold a Court for redressing misdemeanours within his Manor, and for settling disputes relating to property amongst his tenants (see Note 3). When a large district comprising several Manors was held by a single lord, it was called an Honour or Liberty. It had no distinct or separate organisation, but was simply the aggregate of several Manors in the hands of one individual. Frequently only one Court was held for the whole; or, as appears to have been the custom in the Honour we are discussing, a Court was held at various centres for the convenience of neighbouring Manors.¹ In either case that Court was regarded as the Court of each several Manor.

If a Manor were granted away from an Honour, its Court then became the Court of the grantee, distinct from the Honour-court, which thus was bereft of a portion of its jurisdiction. For instance, the Court of Roundhay Manor, after the grant of 1628, was no longer held for the Honour of Pontefract, but for the Corporation of London.² (See Note 11.)

As feudalism decayed Manorial Courts of all kinds lost their importance; their civil and criminal jurisdiction gradually devolved upon the Quarter Sessions, and their business, for the most part, came to be confined to matters dealing with the transfer of copyhold property; but, by recent enactments, these are adjusted at the office of the Steward, so that a Manorial Court is now little more than an empty form. Until some twenty years ago the Court for the Honour of Pontefract was regularly held at Seacroft for some thirteen neighbouring townships (within the Honour), its chief business during the last two centuries of its existence being the appointment of Constables and Pinders.

The following is a specimen of the notices to summon this Court, which were formerly addressed to the Constables within the Honour:—

You are required to give strict Warning and Summons to all whom it may Concern—That the COURT LEET,³ with the View of Frank Pledge, and also the GREAT COURT BARON³ of our Sovereign Lord King George the Third, with the Turn,³ will be held for the Wapontake of Skyrack, Parcel of the Honour aforesaid, Parcel of his said Majesty's Duchy of LANCASTER, at the House of Mr. William Townend, situate in Seacroft, on Wednesday, the fifteenth Day of October next, by Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon of the same Day, when and where all the KING'S Tenants and Freeholders, as also the Inhabitants and Residents within your Township, are required personally to be and appear, to do not only their respective Fealties for the Lands and Tenements they respectively hold of his said Majesty, as

of his said Duchy of LANCASTER, but also what other Service or Suit of Court is from them respectively due and owing, as they will respectively answer the contrary at their Peril.

You are also to Summon good and substantial Freeholders or Tenants of your said Township, to appear at the said Court at the Time aforesaid, to serve upon the Grand Inquest thereof as the Law requires. And you are further required to Warn all your sworn Officers to personally appear then and there to perform the Duties of their respective Offices. And you are also to make a Return to the said Court of proper Persons to take upon them the several Offices within your Township, in which Return you are to present and offer different Persons for each distinct Office, and not one person for two Offices. And you are at the said Court, at the Time aforesaid, upon Oath, to make a Return of this Warrant, and how you have executed the same. Herein fail not, as you will answer the Contrary at your Peril.

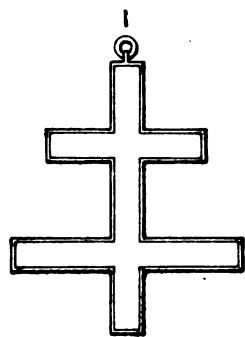
MANORS OF TEMPLE NEWSAM AND WHITKIRK.

THE lordship of Temple Newsam includes both the above Manors. The former comprises the district immediately surrounding the mansion, within which lie the territories of Halton, Colton, Newsam, Water-side, and Thorp Stapleton. The latter, on the other hand, includes a much wider area, and embraces a large district in Leeds. Its extent can be most readily seen by reference to the Call Books of the Manor, which are Registers of all persons owing "suit and service" at the Manor Court, whose names are called over on the Court day. The Call Book for 1875 gives the numbers of "tenants and residents within and belonging to Whitkirk Manor," as follows:—

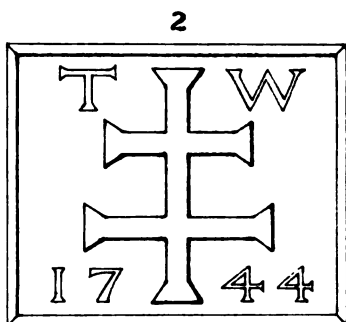

On comparing this with the earlier Call Books which are extant from the beginning of last century, we find the number of names doubled, a circumstance which may be accounted for by the growth of the population of Leeds, and the consequent increase of houses in that part of the Manor.

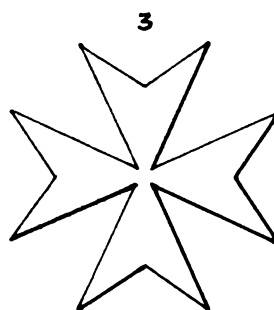

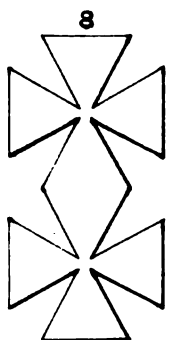
BADGE OF THE KNIGHTS
TEMPLARS.



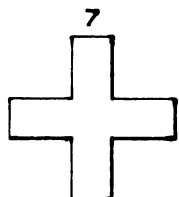
UPON A HOUSE AT WHITKIRK.



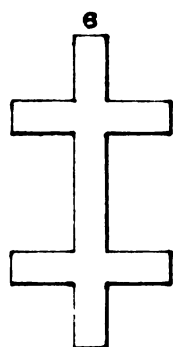
BADGE OF THE KNIGHTS
HOSPITALERS.



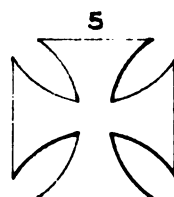

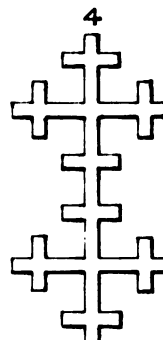

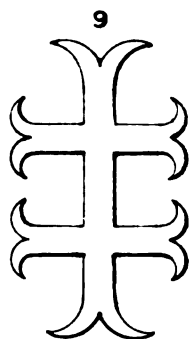

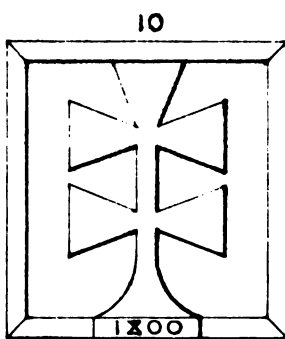

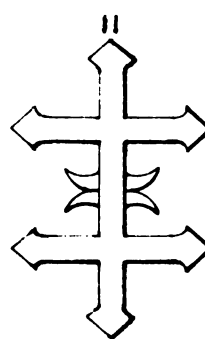

VARIATIONS OF THE TEMPLARS' BADGE, UPON HOUSES WITHIN THE MANOR OF WHITKIRK.

The houses of tenants in Whitkirk Manor are distinguished by a double cross, which, by the rules of the Manor, the householder is bound, on pain of fine, to "erect and continue" upon a conspicuous part of his dwelling.

Owing to the fact that of late years portions of the Manor have been enfranchised, or to the negligence of the tenants, the crosses are rapidly disappearing, though in some parts of Leeds—notably in Templar Street, Lowerhead Row, Quarry Hill, and its neighbourhood—they are still numerous. But in the country we have only succeeded in finding two examples. These are upon old houses in the village of Whitkirk, near the corner of the road which branches to Colton. They are cut on stone slabs, which bear also respectively the dates 1732 and 1744, and the initials of the owners. The former of these is visible from the high road (see copy of it on the titlepage of this book), but the latter can only be seen from the back of the house (Plate A, fig. 2).

Tenants of this Manor in Leeds were exempt from the obligation to grind at the Soke Mill of Leeds Manor;⁴ and it was, doubtless, their anxiety to guard this privilege that induced them to preserve the badge upon their houses as the mark of their exemption.

The cross in question is the badge of the Knights Templars, which, according to Berry,⁵ "was a patriarchal cross, enamelled red and edged "with gold, worn at the breast, pendant to a ribbon" (Plate A, fig. 1), and its presence alone is perhaps sufficient proof that the Manor was once their property. It will be seen from our sketch, which is a copy of Berry's illustration, that the upper bar is shorter than the lower one. The crosses upon the houses at Whitkirk, described above, are the nearest approach to this we have discovered. Except that the points are widened, the proportions of these correspond with Berry's drawing.

Many of the modern crosses have been elaborated to suit the fancy of the particular tenant who has happened to renew them, and bear but little resemblance to the original. Those we have noticed in Leeds are mostly of iron or stone, but occasionally of brick, and vary in length from eighteen inches to three feet.

Turning to the Rolls of the Manor, we find it there described as "parcel of the possessions of the dissolved Priory or Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England." The obvious explanation of this apparent confusion of the two Orders is that the Manor was originally the property of the Templars, and that it was transferred to the Hospitallers by the statute 17 Edward II., cap. 2. As already stated, the Hospitallers, in the following year, restored Temple Newsam to the Crown, reserving the Church of Whitkirk, which they afterwards appropriated to the Preceptory at Newland. Although it is not mentioned in the charter of restoration,

we find that they also retained possession of the Manor of Whitkirk. The following extract from the earliest Roll of the Manor we have discovered, dated 14 Henry VIII. (1522), proves that it was then in the hands of the Preceptor of Newland:—

“Whitkirke. Cur’ Prioris Hospitalis S̄ci Joh̄is Jerusalem in Anglia ac Thome Newporte milit’ Balliu’ Aquile ac precept’ de Newland tent’ ĩbm xviii^a die Novembris Anno Regni Henrici viii. quarto decimo.”

Eighteen years after the date of this roll the Order of Knights Hospitallers was abolished. During the four succeeding reigns the Manor was in the hands of the Crown, as appears from numerous “Admittances” during that period. In 1631 we find record of a Court held for Sir Arthur Ingram, Knt., from which we infer that upon becoming owner of Temple Newsam he acquired the Manor of Whitkirk from the Crown.

The Court for Whitkirk Manor, commonly called “St. John’s Court,” is held every three years; that for Temple Newsam Manor every year. Until recently both Courts were opened at the Manor House at Whitkirk, and were adjourned for business to the Brown Cow Inn, but this formality is now dispensed with, and both Courts are called at the Inn. The jury of the former is brought from Leeds, that of the latter is empanelled in the neighbourhood. We are given to understand that formerly it was part of the duty of the St. John’s Court to pay a visit to Temple Newsam; a custom which is still continued by the courtesy of the Lady of the Manor, but of which the origin is obscure.

Among the records of the Vicars-Choral of York Minster there is preserved an interesting document relating to the Templars’ Court at Whitkirk, which suggests that it was one of more than ordinary importance. It is a bond executed by Peter Midelton, of Nesfield, near Ilkley, by which he engages, under a penalty of twenty shillings to be paid towards the fabric of St. Peter’s, at York, that neither he nor any of his tenants shall take proceedings against the Templars in any Court, canonical or civil; that he will not avail himself of any right of appeal, etc., that might be prejudicial to them; and that if he should be injured by any of their tenants he will bring the cause to their Court at Whitkirk. “Et si tenentes praedictorum contra me delinquant, mediante “justicia, ni curia de Wytekirke, coram praedictis fratribus emendetur. “In cujus rei testimonium, &c. His testibus—Dom’ Will’ de Brocton, “capellano; Will’ de clerico; Gilberto de Scalewra, Tho’ frater “ejus; Elia de Secroft et aliis. Acta apud Neusum die proxima ante “fest. Sti Lucae Evang., A.D. 1269.”—“Gentleman’s Mag.” vol. xlviii., p. 645.

Here we find the Templars assuming a jurisdiction which interfered with the established Courts of Law—an example, probably, of the conduct which excited a feeling of jealousy against their Order, and which ultimately led to their downfall.

Upon the rolls of Temple Newsam Manor there is no historical description, nor mention made of the cross, which does not appear on any of its houses.

The two Manors we are discussing seem to mark a distinction between two corresponding classes of the Templars' property—that, namely, which lay in the immediate neighbourhood of the Preceptory, the whole or the greater part of which would be held in demesne; and that which comprised their more distant and scattered possessions, which latter were probably for the most part small holdings subject to quit-rents. Such a distinction suggests a possible explanation of the use of the cross in the larger and not in the smaller Manor, since without some distinguishing mark it would be matter of considerable difficulty to identify the numerous houses held of the Preceptory at a time when estate-maps were probably unknown. The Manor of Temple Newsam forms an excellent example of our description on page 98, while to that of Whitkirk the name "Manor" is less accurately applied.

It appears to have been the custom of both the Templars and Hospitallers to place a cross upon their property, since we find amongst the Placita de Quo Warranto (15 Ed. I.), the account of an action brought against the Prior of the Hospital of St. John, for having fixed a badge (*levare signum*) or cross (*signum* is later explained by *crucem*) upon a house at Winchcomb in Gloucestershire, to which his Order was said to have no title.⁶

The cross of the Knights Hospitallers was distinct from that of the Templars. Berry describes it as "a white cross of eight points, which all the members of the Order, after taking their vows, are required to wear in waxed cloth on the left side of their cloak or waistcoat (Plate A, fig. 3). When they go to war with the Turks, they wear, over all, a red cassock, with a large white cross before and behind without points."

doorway were perhaps intended to represent a badge of the Knights Templars quite distinct from the double cross we have been discussing. This, a single cross, was worn on the left shoulder of their cloaks, and, from its colour, the Templars gained the name Red Cross Knights. Dugdale mentions it in his description of a Templar's dress. "The "Knights Templars wore linen coifs (like the serjeants-at-law) and red "caps close over them; on their bodies shirts of mail, and swords girded "on with a broad belt; over all they had a white cloak, reaching to the "ground, with a (red) cross (usually represented as a cross pattée) on the left shoulder." Berry states that the cross was added to their dress by Pope Eugenius. Four crosses, similar to those on the Manor House, formed by projecting bricks, are to be seen on No. 79, Quarry Hill; No. 48, Lands Lane; and Nos. 16 and 18, Wheat Sheaf Yard, in Leeds; the three last-named houses forming part of a block of old buildings facing the Church Institute (Plate A, fig. 7).

MANOR OF NEWLAND.

SINCE, as we have shown, a close connection once existed between Whitkirk and Newland, we may be permitted to refer briefly to this Manor, which, in some respects, resembles that of Whitkirk. In his book on "Wakefield and its Neighbourhood," Mr. W. S. Banks tells us that it was a condition of tenure under the Manor of Newland, that a double cross should be displayed upon all buildings. We should have expected to find here not the double cross, but the badge of the Hospitallers, since, in the Inventory of their estates, made in 1338, Newland is stated to have been given to that Order by King John, and it is classed amongst those lands which the Hospitallers held previous to the statute of 1324, by which they acquired the Templars' property. There seems, however, to have been a confusion between the two Orders in regard to Newland, for on the Charter Rolls there appears a grant of it by King John to the Templars, in 1213.⁷ If so, the latter Order can only have held it for a short time, since we find a grant of the advowson of the rectory of Normanton to the Hospitallers of Newland in 1256.⁸ Still the fact that the Templars once owned it might account for the presence of the double cross. Otherwise we can only suggest that when in 1324 the Templars' property became vested in the Hospitallers by the statute "De Terris Templariorum," the latter found it convenient to adopt the double cross as the uniform mark of their possession, and placed it upon buildings which had never belonged to the Templars. We have already seen that they continued the Templars' badge in the Manor of Whitkirk.

MANOR OF ROUNDHAY.

ROUNDHAY, it appears, was anciently a park belonging to the Laci family; its grant to them has not been discovered, but there is extant a charter, dated 6th January, 22 Edward I. (1294), giving to Henry de Laci, Earl of Lincoln (*inter alia*) free warren in his demesne lands of Seacroft, Shadwell, and Roundhay.⁹ With the heiress of the Lacis this estate passed to the Duke of Lancaster, and, later, came into the hands of the Crown with the Duchy. The Manor at that time included Shadwell and Seacroft, but in 1602 the latter place was granted by James I. (28th Feb., 1 James I.), to Charles, Earl of Devon.¹⁰

Roundhay Manor (*i.e.*, Roundhay and Shadwell), however, continued in the Crown till 1628, when, by grant dated 14th June, 4 Charles I., it became the property of the Corporation of London.¹¹ On the 8th December, 1629, the estate was purchased from the Corporation by Stephen Tempest, Esq., of Broughton, for the sum of £850. Mr. Tempest was a captain in the service of Charles I., and for his adherence to the royal cause his estates were confiscated to the Parliament.

The next owner of Roundhay was William Lowther, Esq., who, on 16th September, 1653, contracted with "the Trustees for the sale of Estates forfeited to the Commonwealth for treason," for the purchase of the Manor; but it was evidently not conveyed to him until some months later, since we find that a Court was held at Roundhay Grange on 16th April, 1654, by Thomas Tempest, the son of Stephen.

From William Lowther the estate passed to his nephew, Sir John Lowther, who by lease and release, dated 17th and 18th July, 1688, conveyed it to John Savile, Esq., of Methley, in fee. In this family it descended to John Savile, second Earl of Mexborough, who, in 1804, conveyed this, amongst other estates, to trustees, with power to sell; and from them it was purchased, by lease and release, dated 29th and 30th November, 1811, by Thomas Nicholson, Esq., of Roundhay Park. Upon the death of his successor, William Nicholson Nicholson, the Manor was sold, on 20th April, 1872, to John Musgrave Sagar-Musgrave, Esq., of Bramley and Red Hall, Shadwell, the present lord.

The earliest original rolls of the Manor in Mr. Sagar-Musgrave's possession are of the second and twelfth years of Richard II., but there are copies of some older ones, the originals of which are presumably to be found amongst the records of Barwick Manor. The following is taken from a translation of a roll of the year 1378:—

Cur. tent. apud Berewicke 27th April, An° Rg. Ric̄i secundi primo.

ROUNDHAY. It is p'sented by Ric del West and John Wilson that Adam de Hogholand¹¹⁹⁴ of Thorne^r in last digged one wayne lode of Turves in Wynmore. Withm de Saxton¹¹⁹⁴ one wagne lode there & others for the like.

ROUNDHAY. Itm in The wood of Secrofte are assigned for Gystes to the BOSCUS DE SECROFTE. great Tower of the Castle of Pontefracte thirtie Okes, viij Okes to the Parson of Berwicke for his houses.

MANOR OF SEACROFT.

SEACROFT, as stated above, was granted by James I., in 1602, to Charles, Earl of Devon. Three years later, by a deed of bargain and sale, dated 10th September, 3 James I., the Earl conveyed the estate to George Shillito, Esq., of Houghton, who, by deed of covenant, dated 25th June, 11 James I. (1613), settled it in jointure upon his intended wife, Elizabeth, the daughter of Sir — Bulkeley, of Beaumaris. This lady, who was married secondly to Sir Ralph Hansby, by deed dated 19th February, 1656, conveyed Seacroft to James Nelthorpe, Esq., of Windsor, in whose family it continued till the beginning of the present century, when it was purchased by John Wilson, Esq., grandfather of the present owner of Seacroft Hall.

In the reign of Charles I., a dispute arose between Mr. Shillito, owner of Seacroft, and Mr. Tempest, lord of Roundhay, as to the lordship of Seacroft—the former claiming that by virtue of the Crown's grant to the Earl of Devon the latter place had been severed from the Manor of Roundhay, and had been, therefore, constituted a separate Manor. Whether this question was then brought to an issue does not appear, but we find that a Court for the Manor of Seacroft, independent of the Court of Roundhay, was regularly held by the Nelthorpes from the years 1698 to 1768, and occasionally at later dates.

It is remarkable that, after a lapse of two centuries, the same point came again into dispute, and formed the subject of a trial between the lord of Roundhay Manor and the owner of the Seacroft estate in 1822, the result of which was that the latter, the plaintiff, was nonsuited.

Notes on Manorial Courts.

(Note 1.)

In the 43rd year of Elizabeth a Court was held at Scholes for the Manors of Barwick, Scholes, and Roundhay:—

“Ad Cur’ dñe Rñe cu’ Turno de Barwicke, Scholes, & Roundhay pcell Honor’ sui de Pontfr’ tent’ apud Scoles vicesimo sc̄do die Octobr’ Anno regni dñe nre Elizabeth dei gra’ Angl’ Franc’ & Hibnie Regine fidei defensor etc xliiii^{mo} Coram p̄nobil’ Gilbto Comite Salop clarissimi ordinis gartii mil’ Cap’ Sen^{to} dñe dñe Regine Honor’ sui p̄d inter al’ continet’ sic”—Extract from an admittance of William Oglethorp, gent.—“Roundhay Manor Rolls.”

So long as the above Manors continued parcels of the Honour only one roll was kept for the three, hence a large number of Roundhay transactions appear under Barwick.

The Court Baron was the principal Court of the Manor; it was the assembly of the tenants of the lord, and of these the freehold tenants acted as judges, while the lord or his steward presided. Its jurisdiction was civil, and dealt specially with controversies relating to freehold lands within the Manor.

The Leet, on the other hand, was a Criminal Court; one of the principal matters it dealt with was the View of Frank Pledge, or more properly “Frank Pledges”; that is, the freemen within the district, who in early times were all mutual pledges for the good behaviour of each other, were produced or viewed at this Court. Besides the preservation of the peace, which was its chief concern, it had also power to regulate the quality and price of provisions, to reform nuisances, etc.

The Turn, or Tourn, was the Sheriff’s Court for the County; its jurisdiction was the same as that of the Leet of the Manor, but exercised over a larger area. This Court was appointed to be held twice a year, within a month after Easter and Michaelmas, before the Sheriff in each Hundred, or Wapentake. The name Tourn, or Turn, merely means the *rotation* of the Sheriff’s Court. Within the territory of an Honour, the jurisdiction of the Turn was usually vested in the lord, who sometimes, as in the Honour of Pontefract, amalgamated this Court with his own Court Baron.—See Digby’s “History of the Law of Real Property,” pp. 55–6.

A third Manorial Court which is not named in the above document, but which still exists in numerous manors, as in that of Temple Newsam, is the Customary Court. It deals exclusively with the copyhold lands of the Manor, and records all transactions concerning them. The certified copies of entries upon its rolls are the sole evidence of the copyholders’ title, from which fact his name “copyholder” is derived. The terms upon which copyholds are held vary, and are determined solely by the customs which from time immemorial have prevailed in each Manor. It was the notion of preserving these customs which gave this Court its name.

These Courts, though quite distinct, were usually held at the same time and place.

CHURCHWARDENS' ACCOUNTS,

1653-4 TO 1687-8.



THE earliest extant accounts of the Churchwardens of Whitkirk are those for the year 1653-4. Excepting the years 1657-8, 1660-1, and 1661-2, which are missing, accounts are preserved from that time down to 1687-8, but after the last-named date none are to be found till 1747. We print the accounts for the first year in full, and from those of subsequent years such items as appear to us to be of sufficient interest.

THE Registers for the Parish of Whitkirk are preserved in the Vestry Chest from the year 1603 to the present time, with the exception of a few years during the confused period of the Civil War, when they are either entirely wanting or are incomplete. In the following transcript we have slightly abbreviated the form of the entries; but, to the best of our ability, have accurately copied the names and, where given, the conditions, rank, residence, or other description of the persons. We have also given verbatim all marginal notes and memoranda which occur.

† On 24th August, 1653, an Act was passed by 'Praise-God Barebone's Parliament,' by which the clergy were required to give up their register-books to laymen, who were to be called the "Parish Registers." The Lay-register was to be chosen in every parish by the inhabitant householders, on or before September 22nd, 1653, and as soon as he had been sworn and approved by the local magistrate, his appointment was to be entered in the register-books. This Act also provided that after September 29th, 1653, no marriage should be celebrated within the Commonwealth of England without the Register's certificate that he had published banns on three "successive Lord's Days, at the close of the morning Exercise in the public meeting-place, commonly called the church or chapel, or (if the parties preferred it) in the nearest market-place on three successive market-days." The above Act orders *Births* not *Baptisms* to be entered; and accordingly in many Parish Registers during the period of the Commonwealth, the former only appear, but at Whitkirk both dates are recorded. At the Restoration the parochial clergy recovered possession of the registers, when the legislation of the Commonwealth was ignored.—"Parish Registers in England," by R. E. C. But although the clergyman might have been punishable, it does not appear that it was, previous to the first Marriage Act (26 Geo. ii., c. 33), necessary to the validity of a marriage that it should take place in *facie ecclesiae*; for many marriages solemnized in the Fleet Prison or in its liberties, or in May Fair, were, before that time, considered valid, though irregular marriages.—“Laws of the Church and Clergy,” by H.
