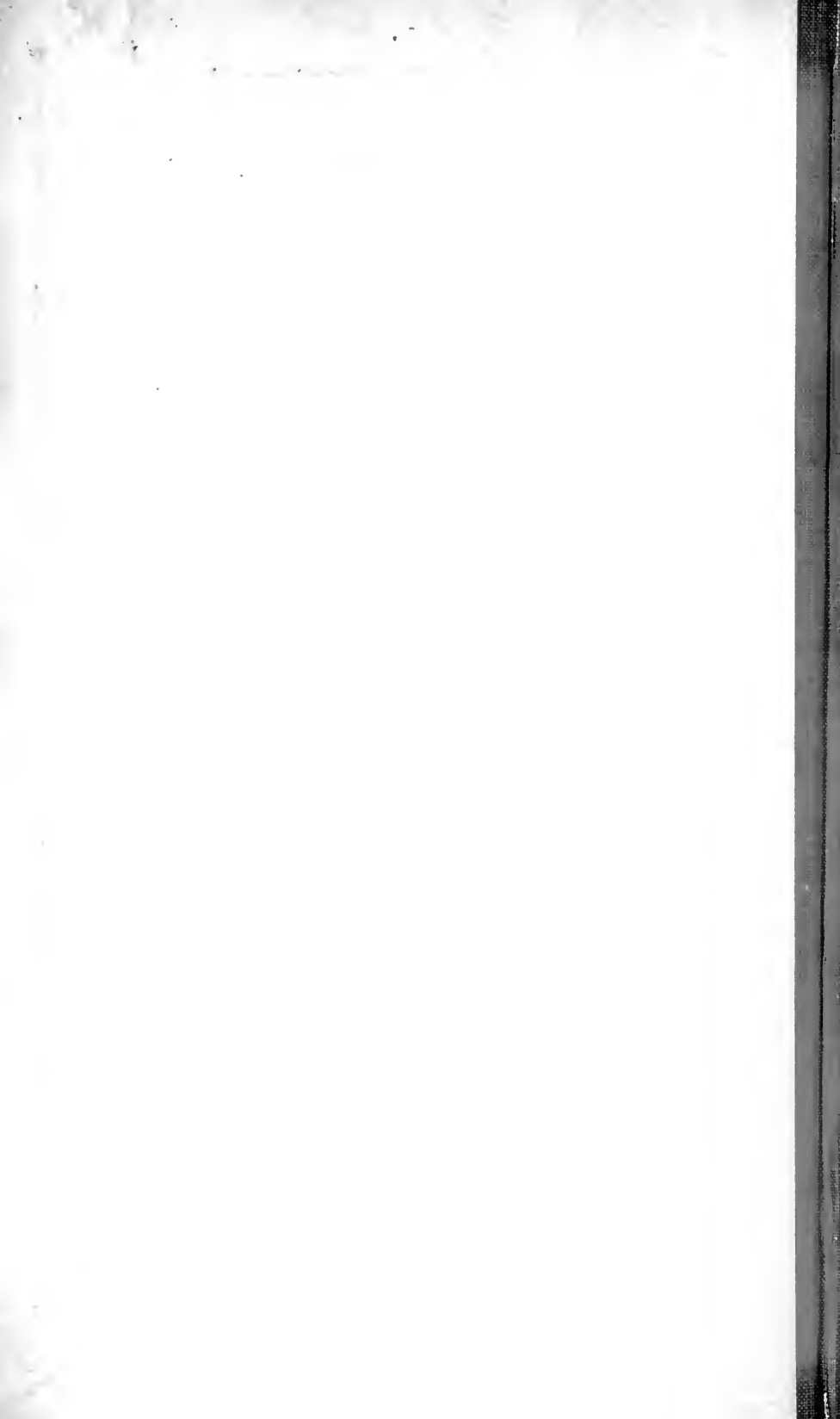
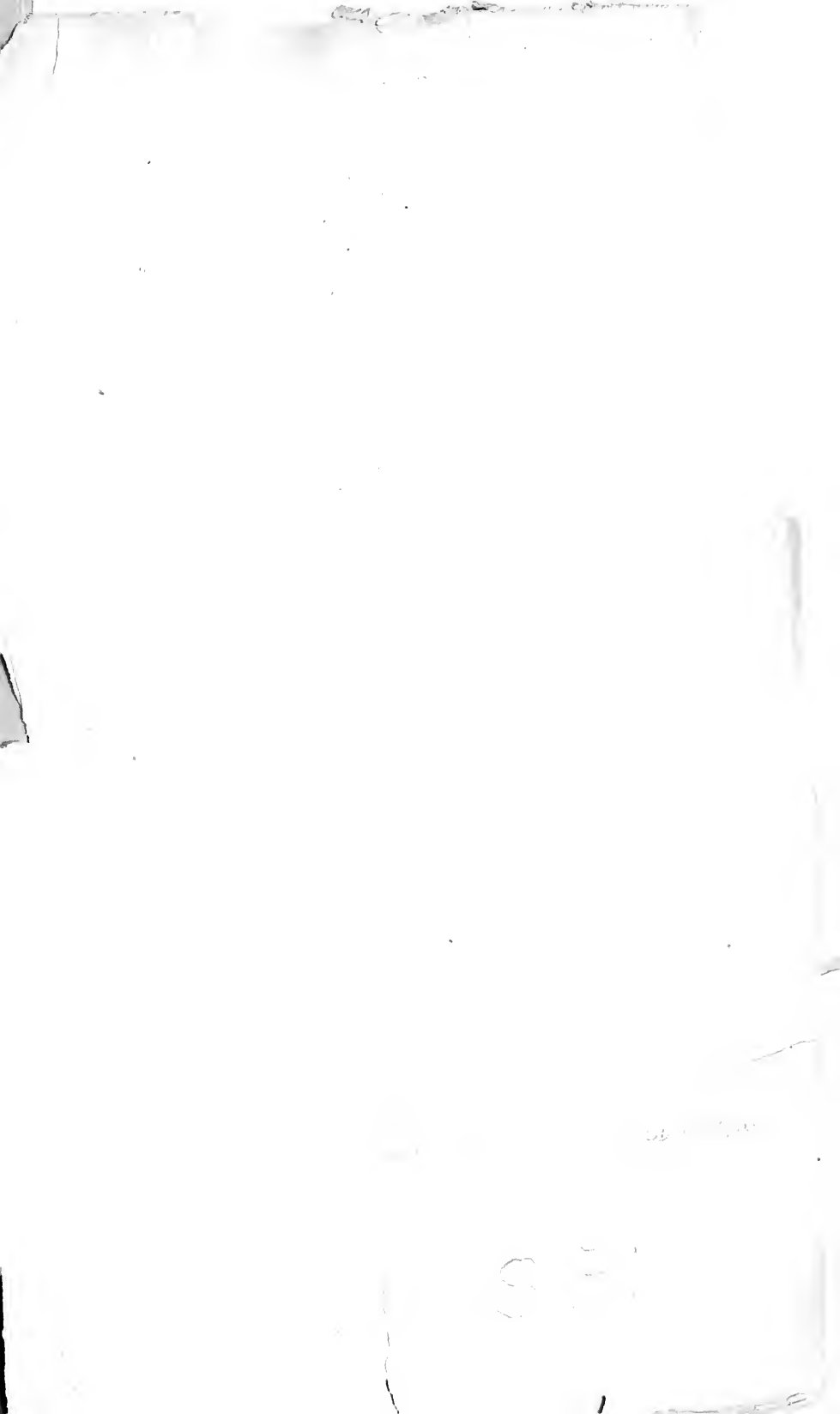

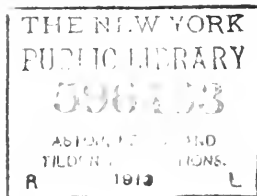

Extract from act of Congress of February 20, 1907, creating and defining the duties of the Immigration Commission.

That a commission is hereby created, consisting of three Senators, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, and three Members of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and three persons to be appointed by the President of the United States. Said commission shall make full inquiry, examination, and investigation, by subcommittee or otherwise, into the subject of immigration. For the purpose of said inquiry, examination, and investigation said commission is authorized to send for persons and papers, make all necessary travel, either in the United States or any foreign country, and, through the chairman of the commission, or any member thereof, to administer oaths and to examine witnesses and papers respecting all matters pertaining to the subject, and to employ necessary clerical and other assistance. Said commission shall report to Congress the conclusions reached by it, and make such recommendations as in its judgment may seem proper. Such sums of money as may be necessary for the said inquiry, examination, and investigation are hereby appropriated and authorized to be paid out of the "immigrant fund" on the certificate of the chairman of said commission, including all expenses of the commissioners, and a reasonable compensation, to be fixed by the President of the United States, for those members of the commission who are not Members of Congress; * * * .

GENERAL SURVEY.

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

Territory covered by the investigation—Method of presenting data—Employees for whom information was secured—[Text Table 555 and General Table 312].

TERRITORY COVERED BY THE INVESTIGATION.

The term "Middle West," for the purposes of this section of the study of immigrants in the iron and steel industry, is used to designate the territory north of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi rivers and south of the Great Lakes, including the States of Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, and all of Ohio except the eastern part embraced in the study of the Pittsburg district.

METHOD OF PRESENTING DATA.

Households of immigrant iron and steel workers were studied and are presented along with other detailed material in connection with Community D, a representative iron and steel manufacturing community of the Middle West of recent growth, and in which immigrants from southern and eastern Europe have found employment in large numbers. Detailed information was also secured for more than 12,000 employees of blast furnaces and iron and steel establishments located in all parts of the Middle West, and the present section of the report sets forth in a summary way the salient facts as regards these iron and steel workers. The number for whom information was received is large enough to be considered representative, and the facts and tendencies exhibited by the succeeding tabulations are thought to be typical of conditions in the Middle West.

EMPLOYEES FOR WHOM INFORMATION WAS SECURED.

The extent of the information received and the source of the statistical material for the general survey in the Middle West is shown in the following table and chart, which set forth the number and per cent of male employees of each race for whom information was secured:

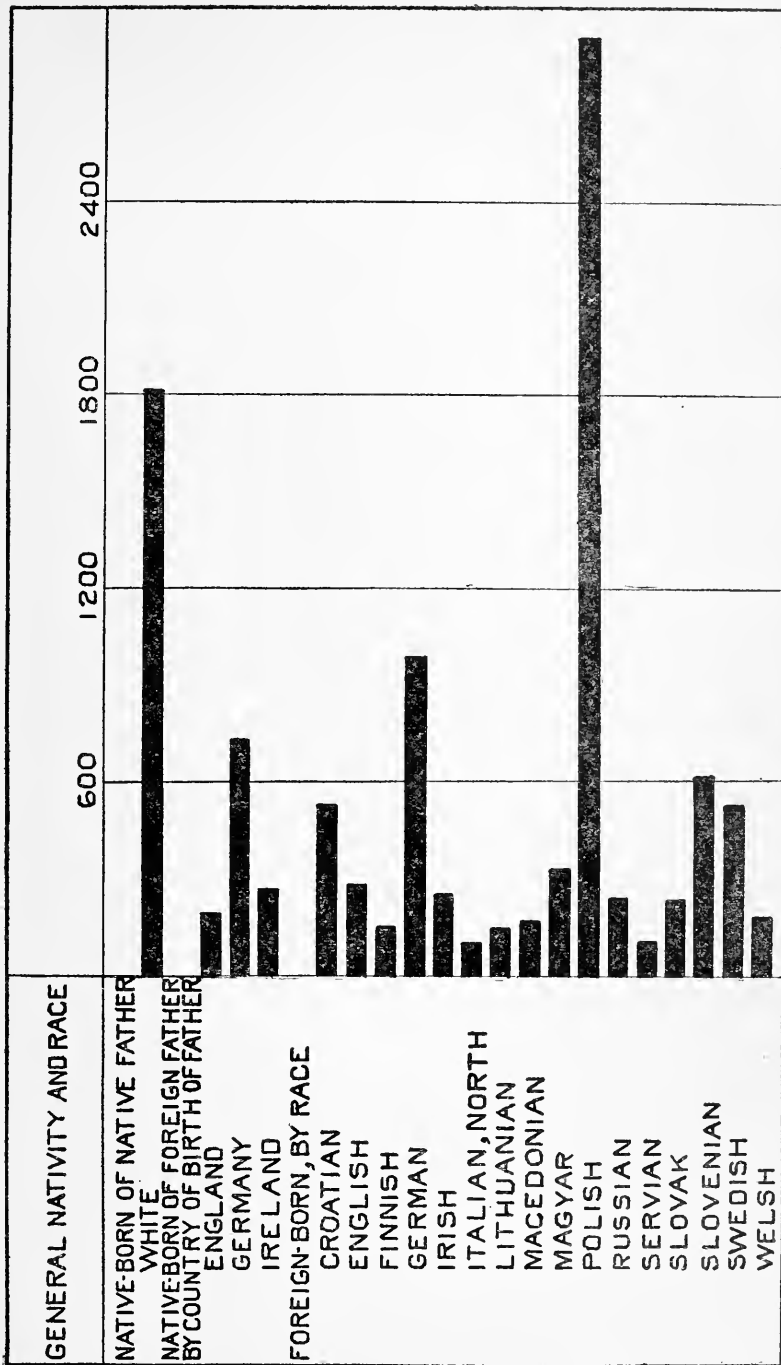

CHAPTER II.

RACIAL DISPLACEMENTS.

History of immigration—Period of residence in the United States of foreign-born employees—Racial classification of employees at the present time—[Text Tables 556 to 564 and General Table 313.]

HISTORY OF IMMIGRATION.

As in the case of other localities no satisfactory statistics are available for the Middle West regarding the present or past employment of the various races of recent or older immigration to the iron and steel industry. From the return of the censuses, however, information may be secured as to the general nativity and country of birth of the iron and steel workers which furnishes an instructive insight into the racial movements to the steel establishments of the Middle West. In the following table is shown the nativity of iron and steel employees in the States of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin, for the census periods 1880 and 1890, and the country of birth of parents of the employees for the census period 1900:

Mention has already been made of the remarkable growth in the number of iron and steel workers in the Middle West and the increase during the period 1880 to 1900 may be readily seen from the above table. In connection with the racial movements to the industry, it is at once evident that the operating forces of the Middle West blast furnaces, rolling mills, and steel works in 1880 and 1890 were composed exclusively of Americans, or immigrants from England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Canada, Germany, Norway and Sweden. After 1890 a change in the racial make-up of the iron and steel workers began and was reflected in a very distinct way in the census returns for 1900. In the table for 1900 it is seen for the first time that a large number of employees were born of parents of Austria-Hungary, Italy, Poland, and Russia. As a matter of fact 13,726 of the total increase of 32,494 iron and steel workers during the period 1890 to 1900 were members of races from southern and eastern Europe, a large proportion of the remainder being Irish and Germans. The same general racial changes in the composition of the iron and steel working forces of the Middle Western States during the past thirty years is also shown by the representative iron and steel producing

communities within the area under discussion. The following tables show the number of iron and steel workers employed in Chicago, Cleveland, Milwaukee, and Toledo according to the nativity of the employees and, in the first table, the country of birth of their parents, for the census periods 1880, 1890, and 1900.

The foregoing tables exhibit in a local way the same general racial movements that are set forth by the tables for the whole Middle West for the same periods. Prior to 1890 only Americans and older immigrants from Great Britain and northern Europe were employed in the steel works, but during the ten years 1890 to 1900 considerable numbers of southern and eastern Europeans entered the industry. Within the past ten years the racial displacements which were characteristic of the last decade of the past century have become steadily stronger. The larger part of the labor necessary to meet the growing demands of the iron and steel mills of the Middle West has, together with the occupations vacated by a large number of English, Irish, Scotch, Welsh, and German employees who have left the industry, been supplied by members of the races of southern and eastern Europe.

Original information was also secured as to the history of the employment of various races in the iron and steel industry in representative localities, and a summary account is given below according to cities. This history of immigration to iron and steel establishments in selected localities not only furnishes an account of racial movements during recent years but also affords an insight into the movements to the industry which have been characteristic of conditions in the Middle West.

SOUTH CHICAGO, CHICAGO, ILL.

South Chicago is that portion of the city of Chicago, Ill., lying between Seventy-first street on the north and One hundred and thirty-eighth street on the south, east of Lake Calumet, and bounded on the east by Lake Michigan. The principal field for employment in the locality is furnished by the steel mills. Machine and foundry shops and shipyards are also located in the community. Natives, Irish, Poles, Swedes, Slovaks, Magyars, and Lithuanians are found employed in the largest numbers in the steel plants and other establishments.

The total population of this portion of the city, or precinct, as it is called, is estimated to be about 90,000 individuals at the present time, apportioned among the different races as shown in the statement next presented.

When the steel industry was first established in South Chicago in 1887, the workmen were principally Americans, English, Germans, and Welsh, together with a few Belgians and Dutch. During the ten years following the starting into operation of the steel mills considerable numbers of Scandinavians, together with a few Bohemians and Poles, were given employment. The Poles first settled in South Chicago during the latter part of the decade 1870 to 1880, and immigration became large in the early eighties and continued so until about 1893. After the country began to revive from the industrial depression of 1893 and 1894, this immigration was even larger than in the previous years. The financial depression of 1907 stopped this movement and at present only small numbers of Poles are arriving. About 1880 the first Bohemians settled in South Chicago, but seem to have come, not from Bohemia, but from the city of Chicago, and were attracted by the opportunities for employment in South Chicago. This immigration practically stopped in 1893. A few Lithuanians arrived in 1890, but not many until 1896 and after.

A few Slovaks and Magyars came in 1892, but the immigration of these races did not attain any importance until several years later. The Croatians began to come in 1893, but this immigration was not large until 1897 or 1898. Roumanians arrived in 1904, and Servians, Turks, North and South Italians, Bulgarians, and Macedonians in 1905 and 1906. The Scandinavians began to leave the steel mills about 1894 in order to purchase small farm and return to the occupation which they had followed abroad. By the year 1900 practically all of the Scandinavian workmen had disappeared.

TOLEDO, OHIO.

It is estimated that there are at present 15,000 Poles in Toledo. The arrival of this race dates from 1850, when a few single men came to Toledo to work in the lumber yards. In 1868, 10 families, and in 1870, 25 families, came directly from their native land in response to advertisements for labor. Other families migrated to the city from various sections of the United States and in 1874 the number of Polish families had increased to 150. Their immigration directly from Europe also steadily increased. In 1876, when the first Polish church was erected in the city, there were 300 Polish families, and by 1890 the number was not far below 1,300. At the present time the number of Polish families is estimated at 4,500. During the past few years only a few Poles have come directly from their

native land to the city, the principal additions to the population from outside sources consisting of Poles from other localities in the United States.

The Magyars first came to Toledo about 1890, and until 1907 there was a steady, though not very large, influx of members of this race. Practically all were from the province of Abang in Hungary. The estimated number in the city at present is 1,800, comprising about 500 families.

The Slovaks have been seeking employment in Toledo during the past fifteen years, but not to any great extent, as the probable number in the city to-day is somewhere near 800 all told, comprising some 200 families. The population of the city also includes about 2,000 Russian Hebrews who have been coming to Toledo since 1898, and a considerable number of whom are employed in the mills or at the ore docks. A very small number of Bulgarians, who have arrived in Toledo during the past four years, are also at work in the steel mills and furnaces. The small numbers of Greeks and Italians in the city are not employed in connection with the steel industry, but are engaged chiefly in small business enterprises.

GARY, IND.

This city was founded in 1906, and has been built according to plans formulated for the purpose of making it the "model steel town of the United States." The property of the local steel company, the mills of which furnish employment to the male population of working age, extends for a distance of 7 miles east and west on Lake Michigan and from Lake Michigan to the limits of the town on the south. From an industrial standpoint the community is important, because it probably represents a movement toward the localization on the southern shores of Lake Michigan of the production of steel on a large scale. As regards the city from the point of view of immigration, it is significant for the reason that it furnishes an example of an industrial community of recent growth of which the larger part of the population and working force is composed of representatives of races of recent immigration from southern and eastern Europe. According to conservative estimates the total population of Gary in 1909 was estimated to be 15,000, composed of the following races:

From the above estimate it will be seen that the Croats largely predominate over the other more recent immigrant races. This race was also the first of this class to be employed here. They came in the summer of 1906 and were first employed in clearing the land for the town site. They were followed in the fall of the same year by the Italians, who worked principally on the railroad tracks in this imme-

diat vicinity. It is claimed, however, that there are only about one-sixth as many Italians here now as then. Since the fall of 1906 there has been such a continual stream of the other races that it is impossible for those most conversant with the history of the town to specify which were the first to arrive. The majority of the more recent immigrants did not come directly from Europe, but migrated from Youngstown and Lorain, Ohio, and Lackawanna, N. Y.

GRANITE CITY AND MADISON, ILL.

These two cities, which are merged to form practically one industrial center, afford, as in the case of Gary, Ind., a striking illustration of a community largely composed of recent immigrants, which has grown up within a few years around the steel industry. The present site of Granite City and Madison, which is on the Illinois side of the Mississippi several miles north of East St. Louis and within sight of St. Louis proper, in 1892 was an unbroken stretch of cornfields. The construction of rolling mills was begun on the present location of the two cities in 1892, and when the plant started operations in 1894 the employees consisted of Americans, English, Irish, Scotch, and Welsh and a small number of Poles who came from St. Louis. Shortly afterwards a plant for manufacturing granite and metal ware was built, and the majority of the operatives of this establishment also was composed of English-speaking and German races. A considerable number of negroes were also employed in the two local enterprises, and until 1900 no other recent immigrants, except the Poles already mentioned, appeared in the community.

In 1896 a large steel plant, however, including blast furnaces, rolling mills, and foundries, was established in the community, and in 1901 another plant of the same description began operations. Four years later a company located a plant in Madison for the purpose of building and repairing wooden and steel cars and offered employment to about 3,000 men. About the same time a large corn-products refining establishment located in Granite City and added to the demand for labor. As a consequence, the local sources of labor supply after 1900 were inadequate, and recent immigrants of races from southern and eastern Europe were attracted to the locality. In 1900 Slovaks from St. Louis were employed in considerable numbers, and two years later Magyars and Croatians arrived. Mixed groups of Roumanians, Greeks, and Servians followed. By 1904 the immigrant population of the two cities was approximately as follows:

During the two years 1904 and 1905 there set in a heavy tide of Bulgarian immigration. Small numbers of this race first came from

localities in Ohio, and new arrivals quickly advised their friends and relatives at home as to the existing opportunities for work. In the spring of 1905, 900 Bulgarians were employed in the local industrial plants and by the autumn of the same year 1,500 had arrived. The influx steadily continued and in 1907 there were 8,000 Bulgarians at work in the two cities. The industrial depression of that year was first felt in Granite City and Madison during the spring of 1908 and resulted in the closing down of the iron and steel manufacturing establishments and the throwing out of employment of the Bulgarians, who were principally employed as unskilled laborers in those plants. A considerable number returned to Europe and the others found work in other localities or on railroad construction work in the Northwest. In May, 1908, the number of Bulgarians in the two cities was about 2,000 and two years later it had dwindled to 700. The other races of recent immigration, consisting mostly of married men with families, who had been employed for a longer period than the Bulgarians, remained in the community. The revival of the local industries has witnessed a return to the conditions existing before the depression, and it is expected that the establishment of normal conditions will see a return of the previous Bulgarian population.

DE KALB, ILL.

This city, which is extensively engaged in the manufacture of wire, is the birthplace of the barbed-wire industry, the manufacture of that product having been started in De Kalb during the early part of the decade, 1870 to 1880. De Kalb is located in a farming community in which the Swedes have resided for a long time and in large numbers. Consequently, when the local wire industry was in its infancy, Americans and Swedes almost exclusively were employed. As the manufacturing of barbed wire expanded it became necessary to secure labor from outside sources, the first labor to be brought to the city consisting of a number of Finns, who were brought from a wire and nail plant in Worcester, Mass., by a former superintendent who had taken charge of the De Kalb plant. The Finns came to the city during the early part of the decade, 1890 to 1900, and the next arrivals were the Lithuanians, who were seeking work in the wire mills in considerable numbers by 1897. The Croatians followed in 1899; the Herzegovinians and Montenegrins in 1900; Bosnians during the two years 1902 and 1903, and the Greeks in 1907. The Bosnians and Greeks have never been strongly represented in the city, and the Italians and Macedonians, although they have been employed from time to time, have never remained. There has been an entire absence of Germans and Irish in any considerable numbers. According to careful estimates the proportion of each race at present employed in the wire industry in De Kalb may be stated as follows:

Of 8,598 employees who reported, 2 per cent have been in the United States under one year, 3 per cent have a residence of one year, 13.2 per cent have been in this country two years, 12.1 per cent three years, and 8.8 per cent have been in the United States four years.

No English, Macedonians, Servians, or Welsh have a residence of under one year, and less than 1 per cent of Croatians, Irish, and Lithuanians have been in this country under one year. Greeks show the greatest proportion in this group, which is 7.1 per cent, followed by Magyars and Finns. In the group of employees with a residence of one year, Macedonians show 43.5 per cent and Bulgarians 35.6 per cent, which is greatly in excess of the percentage of any other race. Bohemians and Moravians, Canadians other than French, and Welsh show no persons in this group. Greeks show 57.1 per cent and Mace-

donians 41.1 per cent in the group of persons with a residence of two years. These two races show considerably larger proportions in the group just mentioned than does any of the other races. Norwegians and Scotch show no persons who have been in the United States two years. Bulgarians and Herzegovinians exhibit the greatest proportions who have been in this country three years, while Scotch, Swedes, Germans, English, Irish, and Welsh show very small proportions, and Canadians other than French no persons who have been in the United States for this period of time. Herzegovinians exhibit a very much higher percentage of persons with a residence of four years than any of the other races, while Canadians other than French, Germans, Irish, Swedes, English, Scotch, and Welsh show small proportions.

Of the foreign-born male employees for whom information was secured, 39.1 per cent have been in the United States under five years, 24 per cent have been here from five to nine years, 8.1 per cent have been here from ten to fourteen years, 9.6 per cent have been here from fifteen to nineteen years, and 19.3 per cent have been here twenty years or over. All of the Bulgarians, 98.2 per cent of the Macedonians, 90.5 per cent of the Greeks, 81.5 per cent of the Herzegovinians, and less than 10 per cent of the Welsh, English, Canadians other than French, and Irish have been in the United States under five years. The proportion of individuals in this country from five to nine years

is largest for the Slovenians, Russians, Armenians, Finns, Croatians, Lithuanians and Slovaks in the order mentioned, and the proportion of individuals who have been here from ten to fourteen years is largest for the Welsh, English, and Finns in the order mentioned. The Swedes, Canadians other than French, Scotch, Welsh, and English, in the order mentioned, have the largest proportions of individuals who have been here from fifteen to nineteen years; and the Scotch, Irish, Germans, English, and Canadians other than French, have the largest proportions of individuals who have been here twenty years or over.

RACIAL CLASSIFICATION OF EMPLOYEES AT THE PRESENT TIME.

The racial make-up of the operating forces of the Middle West is exhibited in the following table, which shows the number and per cent of male employees of each race for whom information was secured. The relative proportions are considered representative of the entire body of iron and steel workers:

Upon comparing the totals in the preceding table it is seen that the native negroes form an unimportant proportion of the employees in the Middle West. The white employees, native-born of native father, also constitute only 15.1 per cent of the total. On the other hand, the employees of the second generation, or of native birth of foreign father, form 13 per cent of the total and the foreign-born 71.5 per cent. Germans, Irish, and English constitute almost all of the second generation, and the principal races of foreign birth employed are the Poles, Germans, Slovenians, Croatians, English, Irish, Magyars, Russians, and Slovaks. The proportion of Polish employees is far in excess of that of any other race.

The table shows that only 9.8 per cent of the 6,970 employees reporting were employed in the manufacturing of iron and steel and its products before coming to the United States, and only 2.8 per cent were engaged in other manufacturing. On the other hand, 62.5 per cent were farming or were farm laborers and 10.5 per cent were general laborers. A small proportion, 6.5 per cent, were in hand trades, 1.3 per cent were in trade, and 6.6 per cent were in other occupations.

A large proportion of the Welsh, or 87.5 per cent, were engaged in the manufacture of iron and steel before coming to this country, and

58.7 per cent of the English were also employed in this industry before leaving Europe. The Swedes and Germans show the next largest proportion, but the percentage in each instance is small when compared with the first-mentioned races. The Slovaks and Croatians show slightly over 2 per cent and North Italians only 1.1 per cent who had had any previous experience in their present occupations.

The Germans, Swedes, English, Irish, and Finns show the highest percents having been engaged in other manufacturing; no Servians were formerly thus employed. The Croatians show 86.3 per cent who were farming or were farm laborers before coming to the United States. They are closely followed by the Servians. Then come the Slovaks, Lithuanians, Finns, Magyars, Slovenians, Poles, Russians, and Irish, in the order named. The English show only 5.8 per cent and Welsh 1 per cent who were engaged in this occupation before coming to this country. The North Italians report the highest percentage who were general laborers, and the Croatians and Welsh show but very small proportions thus employed. The North Italians show the highest percentage in hand trades and the Welsh the lowest. The English and Germans report over 3 per cent, and the Lithuanians, Croatians, Irish, Slovaks, Magyars, and Poles less than 1 per cent, who were in trade before coming to the United States. The Swedes show 22.6 per cent and the English 14.2 per cent who were formerly engaged in other occupations, as contrasted with less than 10 per cent of any of the other races who were thus employed. No Servians were employed in other occupations.

WEEKLY EARNINGS.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race, the per cent of male employees in the Middle West who were 18 years of age or over and who were earning each specified amount weekly:

Of the male employees 18 years of age or over for whom information was secured almost all earn \$7.50 or over per week; 87.8 per cent earn \$10 or over; 63.9 per cent \$12.50 or over, and 40.3 per cent earn \$15 or over. On the other hand, only 14.4 per cent earn \$20 or more, 9.7 per cent \$22.50 or over, and 7.1 per cent \$25 or over each week. The proportion of employees earning \$10 or over per week is largest for those native-born of foreign father, second largest for the foreign-born employees, and smallest for those native-born of native father. The proportion of employees earning \$17.50 or over each week is largest for the native-born of foreign father, second largest for the native-born of native father, and smallest for the foreign-born, while the proportion earning \$15 or over, \$20 or over, \$22.50 or over, and \$25 or over per week, respectively, is largest for the native-born of native father, is second in rank for the native-born of foreign father, and smallest for the foreign-born. In the case of the foreign-born the employees of the races of old immigration from Great Britain and northern Europe have, in general, a larger proportion of individuals earning each of the sums specified than have the employees of the races of recent immigration from southern and eastern Europe. The distinction between these two groups of employees is particularly noticeable in the columns representing the higher earnings.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of individual, the percentage of male employees 14 and under 18 years of age who were earning each specified amount per week.

Of the male employees 14 and under 18 years of age for whom information was secured almost all earn \$5 or over a week, 76.6 per cent earn \$7.50 or over, and 24 per cent \$10 or over, while only 5.1 per cent \$12.50 or over, and 2.3 per cent \$15 or more. The proportion of employees earning \$7.50 or over and \$10 or over weekly, respectively, is largest for the native-born employees of native father, second largest for those who were native-born of foreign father, and smallest for the foreign-born. None of the foreign-born, and a considerably smaller proportion of the native-born iron and steel workers of foreign father than of the native-born of native father earn \$12.50 or over and \$15 or over each week.

RELATION BETWEEN PERIOD OF RESIDENCE AND EARNING ABILITY.

The table next presented includes the same data as Table 566, but presents it in a different form. In this table the proportions of each residence period are grouped under the several races in order to render possible a study of the progress of each race without direct comparison with other races.

It will be noted from the data presented in the preceding table that the increase with length of residence is more uniform with the races of recent immigration included in the table—the Croatians, Magyars, Poles, Russians, Slovaks, and Slovenians—and with the Germans and Swedes than with the English and Irish. In the case of the English, a larger proportion of individuals who have been in the United States under five years than of the individuals who have been here from five to nine years are reported as earning \$12.50 or over, \$15 or over, and \$17.50 or over, per week, respectively.

The table next presented shows, by race and length of residence in the United States, the comparative weekly earnings of foreign-born male employees who were 18 years of age or over. The several races are arranged under the specified periods of residence.

The above table indicates the effect of length of residence in the United States upon the earnings of the individuals of the different races studied. It appears that of the employees in the United States less than five years, the English and Irish have the largest proportion of individuals earning \$10 or over, \$12.50 or over, \$15 or over, \$17.50 or over, and \$20 or over per week, respectively. In the columns representing earnings of \$10 or over, \$12.50 or over, and \$15

or over per week, respectively, the Swedes closely follow the English and the Irish, who take first rank in earning ability. Among employees who have been in the United States from five to nine years, though the English, Irish, and Swedes still have a larger proportion of individuals earning the higher sums specified than have the employees of any other race, there is a considerable increase in the proportion of individuals of the races of recent immigration from southern and eastern Europe earning the higher sums. A further increase in the proportion of individuals of races of recent immigration earning \$12.50 or over, \$15 or over, \$17.50 or over, and \$20 or over per week, respectively, may be noted among the employees with a residence of ten years or longer. The English, Irish, and Swedes still have, however, a larger proportion of individuals earning the higher sums specified than have the employees of any other race.

From a study of 12,011 male employees, the preceding table shows that 88 per cent are able to read and 86.5 per cent both read and write, leaving 1.5 per cent who read but are unable to write. The native-born employees of foreign father show a larger proportion than is reported by the whites native-born of native father, who in turn show a higher percentage than native-born negroes able to read or to read and write, while the foreign-born iron

and steel workers have the smallest proportion with ability to read as well as both to read and write. Of the several races the Canadian other than French, Norwegian, Scotch, and Swedish each shows its entire number to have ability both to read and write. The proportions of the other races who were able to read ranges from 99.3 per cent, as shown by the English, to 70.8 per cent, as shown by the Croatians, while the same races exhibit the largest proportions of those who both read and write. With the exception of the English, Herzegovinian, Slovak, and Welsh, each race has a slightly smaller proportion who both read and write than read only. Those employees native-born of fathers born in Germany and Ireland have less than 1 per cent who neither read nor write, while those native-born of Russian father show 100 per cent able to read and 98.2 per cent able both to read and to write. All other native-born employees of foreign father show their entire number to have ability to read and write.

CONJUGAL CONDITION.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees in the Middle West 20 years of age or over in each specified conjugal condition:

Of the 11,386 males, 20 years of age or over included in the preceding table, 64.7 per cent are reported as married; 33.5 per cent single, and 1.8 per cent widowed. The employees native-born of foreign father report a larger proportion single than do the foreign-born, who in turn show a larger proportion than either the native-born whites or negroes in this group. With the exception of the Greeks, Herzegovinians, North Italians, Lithuanians, and Servians each race has a larger proportion married than single. The Canadians other than French, Irish, Scotch, and Welsh are the only races showing as high as 5 per cent widowed. The native-born employees whose fathers were born in Russia or Sweden show a larger proportion single than married, while those whose fathers were born in each other specified country show a larger proportion married than single. Less than 5 per cent of a given nativity group are reported as widowed.

Comparing the different age groups in the foregoing table, it is seen from the total that the proportion who are single decreases and the proportion who are married increases, as does also the proportion who are widowed, according to increase in age. This comparison holds true as regards both the foreign-born employees and those native-born of foreign father; also as regards the white employees native-born of native father, with the exception that a slightly larger proportion of those who were from 30 to 44 years of age than of those who were 45 years of age or over are married. Of the several races, it is seen that with the exception of the Macedonians, over 50 per cent of those from 20 to 29 years of age are single. On the other hand, over 70 per cent of the employees, 30 to 44 years of age, of each race, except the Lithuanian, and over 80 per cent of those 45 years of age or over are married.

The significant fact in connection with the married males of foreign birth, however, is that a large proportion had left their wives in their native lands. This situation is disclosed by the following table, which shows by race of husband the per cent of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States, and the per cent who report wife abroad:

From the data presented in the above table, it appears that 77.4 per cent of the foreign-born husbands for whom information was secured have their wives in the United States. All of the English, Irish, and Welsh husbands, and over 95 per cent of the Swedish and Scotch husbands, report wives in this country. The proportion of husbands reporting wives in the United States is very much smaller for the Bulgarians and Macedonians than for the individuals of any

other race. It will be noted that in general the proportion of wives reported in the United States is much smaller among the husbands of the races of recent immigration from southern and eastern Europe than among the husbands of the races of old immigration.

The tendency on the part of the married male employees of foreign birth, who had come to this country without their wives, to send for them after designated periods of residence is exhibited in the following table, which shows, by race of husband and by years husband has been in the United States, the percentage of foreign-born husbands who report wife abroad:

From the data presented in the above table it is seen that the proportion of husbands in the United States under five years who report wives abroad is largest in the case of the Macedonians, Croatians, Slovaks, and Russians, in the order mentioned. The Magyars, Croatians, and Slovaks, in the order named, have the largest proportion of husbands in the United States from five to nine years, and the Croatians, Slovaks, and Magyars, in the order mentioned, the largest proportion of husbands in the United States ten years or over reporting wives abroad. It will be noted that in the case of every race there is a steady decrease in the proportion of husbands reporting wives abroad according to increase in length of residence of husbands in the United States.

VISITS ABROAD.

The fact that considerable proportions of the immigrant labor supply are single men or married men without their wives makes it possible for them not only to adopt a group method of living, but also to move readily from place to place. Moreover, there is a pronounced tendency among all races to visit their native lands, as is

set forth in the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race, the visits abroad made by foreign-born male employees:

Upon referring to the totals in the above table it is seen that the proportion of foreign-born male employees who have made one or more visits abroad is 4.1 per cent in the case of employees who have been in the United States under five years; 11.2 per cent in the case of those who have been here from five to nine years; 12.3 per cent in the case of employees who have been in the United States ten years or over; and 8.9 per cent in the case of all iron and steel workers of foreign birth. The North Italians and Slovaks have the largest proportion in the United States under five years; the North Italians, Magyars, and Slovaks the largest proportion in the United States from five to nine years; and the North Italians and Magyars the largest proportion of employees in the United States ten years or over who have made one or more visits abroad. It will be noted that the proportion of individuals making visits abroad increases, in the case of the majority of the races, with years of residence in the United States.

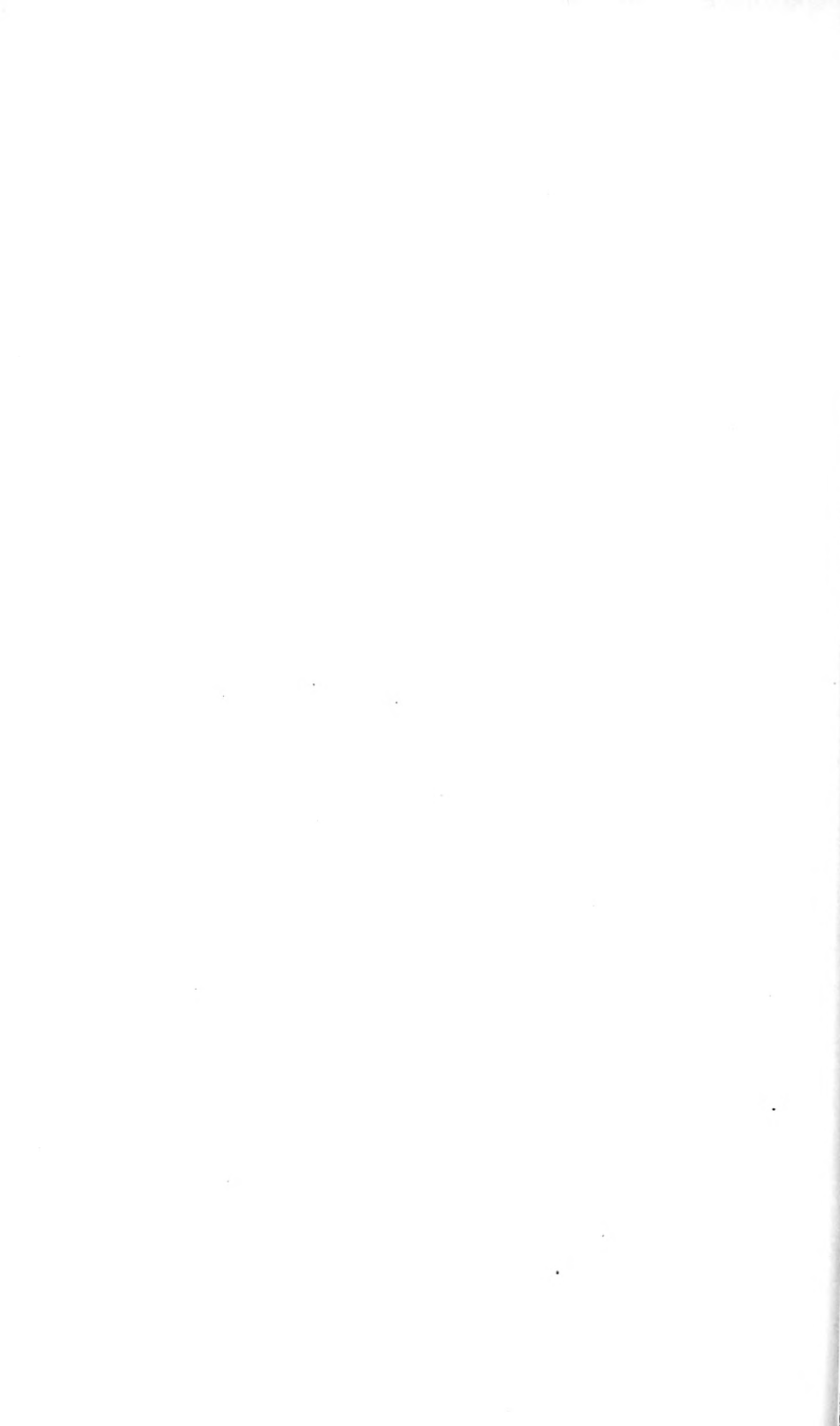

Upon information secured from 12,053 males employed in the Middle West, it is seen that none were under 14; 26.3 per cent were from 14 to 24; and 39.1 per cent from 25 to 34 years of age—leaving 12.8 per cent who were 45 years of age or over. The native-born employees of foreign father have 13.9 per cent of their number from 14 to 19 years of age, as compared with 11.4 per cent of native-born whites of native father; 2.6 per cent of the foreign-born, and none of the native-born negroes. The native-born iron and steel workers of foreign father again show the largest and the native-born negroes again the smallest proportion who were from 20 to 24 years of age. The foreign-born races, except the Irish, Norwegian, and Scotch, show proportions ranging from 14.5 per cent of the Macedonian to less than 1 per cent of the Swedish from 14 to 19 years of age. Each race of more recent immigration from southern and eastern Europe shows over 50 per cent of its number to be from 20 to 34 years of age, the races of older immigration from Great Britain and northern Europe showing the largest proportions above this age.



CHAPTER V.

CITIZENSHIP.

The tendency among iron and steel workers of the Middle West toward becoming citizens is set forth in the following table, which shows, by race, the present political condition of foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming.

From the data presented in the preceding table it appears that 38.4 per cent of the total number of 2,679 foreign-born male employees for whom information was secured are fully naturalized, while 13.5 per cent have first papers only. Of the foreign-born races the Irish, Welsh, English, and Swedes, in the order mentioned, have the largest proportion of fully naturalized individuals and the Magyars, Slovenians, and Germans have the largest proportion of individuals who have first papers only.

The increasing interest in political affairs and the growing tendency of the foreign-born employees to become permanently identified with this country after designated periods of residence is exhibited by the following table, which shows, by race and by years in the United States, the present political condition of foreign-born male iron and steel workers who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming to the United States:

The data in the preceding table show that, in the case of each of the races for which information was secured, a larger proportion of employees who have been in the United States ten years or over than of employees who have been here from five to nine years are fully naturalized. Upon the other hand, there is a decrease with length of residence in the United States in the proportion of all individuals having first papers only due to the greater number of citizens among the races of long residence. This decrease is particularly noticeable in the case of the English, Germans, and Swedes. Of all employees who have been in the United States five years or over the English and Swedes, in the order mentioned, have the largest and the Slovenians and Croatians the smallest proportion of fully naturalized individuals, and the Slovenians and Germans have the largest and the Croatians the smallest proportion of individuals having the first papers only.

ABILITY TO SPEAK ENGLISH.

The table next presented shows, by race, the per cent of foreign-born male employees of non-English-speaking races who have acquired the ability to speak English.

Of 7,747 male employees reporting complete data in the preceding table, 51.6 per cent are able to speak English. The Norwegians, followed by the Swedes, Germans, and Bohemians and Moravians, have the largest proportions, while the Greeks, Herzegovinians, Slovenians, and Macedonians in the order named show the smallest proportions able to speak the English language.

The greater progress of younger than of older immigrants in acquiring the use of the English language is shown by the following table which sets forth, by age at time of coming to the United States and race, the per cent of foreign-born male employees who now speak English:

The preceding table includes 7,747 male employees. Of this number 98.1 per cent of those who were under 14 years of age at time of coming to the United States, as compared with 48.2 per cent of those who were 14 years of age or over, speak English at the present time. That ability to speak English is more readily acquired by those who are younger at the time of coming to the United States, is evinced by the fact that, while the proportion of those who were under 14 years of age ranges from 100 per cent, as shown by the Germans, Slovaks, and Swedes each, to 83.3 per cent, as shown by the Magyars, the proportion of those who were 14 years of age or over when they came to the United States ranges from 97.7 per cent, of the Swedes to 11.3 per cent of the Macedonians.

The relation between period of residence and ability to speak English is exhibited by the following table, which shows by years in the United States and race, the per cent of foreign-born male employees who speak English:

From the data presented in the above table it appears that 24.7 per cent of the foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States under five years, 52.9 per cent of those who have been here from five to nine years, and 86.8 per cent of those who have been here ten years or over speak English. The proportion of employees who have been in the United States under five years who speak English is very much larger for the Swedes than for the individuals of any other race and is smallest for the Macedonians, Slovenians, and Poles. The Swedes, North Italians, Germans, and Slovaks have the largest and the Slovenians the smallest proportions of individuals who have been here from five to nine years who speak English, while, of the employees who have been here ten years or over, all the Swedes and North Italians and a larger proportion of the Germans and Slovaks than of the individuals of any other race speak that language.

COMMUNITY E.

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

Industrial significance of the community—Effects of industrial depression—Households studied—Members of households for whom detailed information was secured—[Text Tables 582 to 585 and General Tables 325 and 326].

INDUSTRIAL SIGNIFICANCE OF THE COMMUNITY.

Community E is made up of two adjoining towns which are for all practical purposes one city, the divisions between them being more artificial than real. They are situated in the southwestern part of Illinois along the bank of the Mississippi River, and are connected by steam and electric lines with St. Louis. The towns are of comparatively recent growth, having, during the past five years, experienced an extraordinary expansion in business and population, brought about by the establishment of new industries and the extension of those already established, especially that of steel. The principal industry is the car shops and foundry established in the year 1889. This company has an annual capacity of 400,000 chilled cast-iron freight and passenger car wheels, 15,000 all-steel freight cars, and 2,000 tons of bolts and forgings. Under normal conditions it employs 6,000 men. One steel foundry company, which began operations in 1895, turns out each year 60,000 tons of railway and other large steel castings and has a force of 1,600 employees. Another steel foundry, established in 1902, has an annual capacity of 50,000 steel castings and employs about 1,400 men. Another establishment, founded in 1894, is engaged in the manufacture of steel and granite ware. There is also in the community a company engaged in the manufacture of corn products, which was started in 1904 and which has more than 600 persons on its pay roll.

Part of the community is in an early stage of growth, and as is usually the case with towns of this character in the Middle West, it covers a large area of territory. Its streets are bad and its buildings largely of frame construction and scattered. Another part has reached a more permanent stage, with good streets, stone and brick buildings, and attractive residential sections.

EFFECTS OF INDUSTRIAL DEPRESSION.

During five months of 1908 the car shops and steel companies constantly reduced their working forces until only a very small percentage of the number of employees before the panic were at work. On the other hand, the depression brought an increasing volume of business to the corn-products company, through their manufacture of a cheap kind of sirup, and this company employed more labor than ever before.

In the general curtailment of work, as is usually the case, married men with families and Americans were given the preference. As a result, the recent immigrants were the residual sufferers and were largely thrown out of employment. Very few had work, and in a great

many instances the few unskilled places that were open were filled by Americans who were normally skilled workmen, but who at the time of the depression were compelled to take any kind of work they could get.

Being unable to secure work, the recent immigrants who had saved sufficient to pay their passage, or who had been able to secure money from home, returned to their native countries. Only those remained in the community who came to this country during the depression and were unable to secure work and save sufficient to return, or those who were unable to return to their countries of origin because of political offenses or other reasons. The estimate is made that between five and six thousand recent immigrants left the community during the first six months of 1908.

Those that remained were supported in large measure by the mercantile houses. The representative mercantile establishments among the Bulgarians adopted the policy of extending credit to their patrons. They permitted them to retain their rooms on credit and supplied them with clothing, meat, groceries, bread, and all kinds of food on their promises to pay as soon as they were able to secure work. The volume of credit extended may be understood from the fact that on April 1, 1908, one mercantile house had on its books \$25,000 and a similar establishment was carrying \$15,000 in small accounts.

With very few exceptions, the Bulgarian firms thus carried the accounts of their countrymen and other recent immigrants. As a matter of fact, the merchants were not taking very large risks in that they so completely controlled the alien population, and for the additional reason that although the credits represented in the aggregate large sums, the individual accounts were small and could be paid without inconvenience as soon as work was resumed. This action of the merchants, however, whether brought about by selfish or disinterested motives, had the effect of lessening the amount of charitable and public relief to the unemployed immigrants, which was necessary in other localities. Only a small amount of relief work was necessary, and this was brought about by several Macedonian mercantile houses, with 400 to 500 patrons, which refused any longer to extend credit.

HOUSEHOLDS STUDIED.

In addition to the statistical data gathered from the records of the local manufacturing plants and their employees, the following table shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the households studied in the community.

The preceding table indicates roughly the relatively numerical importance of the households of each specified race in the community. A larger proportion of Bulgarian than of Magyar households were selected for detailed study on account of the comparatively larger number of such households.

As regards the 808 persons in the 145 households studied in this locality, it will be seen that the entire number are in households the heads of which are foreign-born. In this locality only those households the heads of which are Bulgarians and Magyars were studied, and it will be noted that a very much larger proportion of the total number of persons are in households the heads of which are Bulgarians.

The following table shows the sex of persons in the households studied for whom information was secured, according to general nativity and race of head of household:

The preceding table clearly indicates a preponderance of males in both Bulgarian and Magyar households, although the excess of males over females is less marked among the Magyars than among the Bulgarians. The Bulgarian households show only 6 females out of a total of 517 persons, as contrasted with 73 Magyar females out of a total of 276, or, in terms of percentages, only 1.2 per cent of persons in the Bulgarian households are females, while 26.4 per cent of those in Magyar households are of this sex.

The table next presented shows, by sex and by general nativity and race of individual, the persons in the households studied for whom detailed information was secured:

The preceding table shows that, of the total number of persons covered by the detailed study of households in the community, 98.5 per cent of the males are of foreign birth and 1.5 per cent are of native birth but of foreign father. Of the females, 75.9 per cent are foreign-born, chiefly of the Magyar race, while 24.1 per cent are native-born of Magyar (foreign) father. Very few Bulgarian females, either of the first or second generation, were studied. Among the males for whom detailed information was secured, a much higher proportion of those of foreign birth are Bulgarians than Magyars. Of the males of the second generation, detailed information was only secured from 11, all of Magyar fathers.

CHAPTER II.

RACIAL DISPLACEMENTS.

History of immigration—The industrial depression and the exodus of 1909—The Bulgarians at home—Period of residence in the United States of members of immigrant households studied—Methods of securing immigrants—Destination of immigrants to the community—Racial composition of the community—Distribution of the population—[Text Table 586 and General Table 327].

HISTORY OF IMMIGRATION.

In 1892 the site of this community was an unbroken stretch of cornfields. In the following year a large company began the construction of their present rolling-mill plant, an enterprise which was considerably delayed by the financial depression of that time. The men employed in the construction were Americans, white and black, and some Americanized Germans, all brought from the neighboring city of St. Louis. When the rolling-mill plant began operation in 1894, the pioneer operatives were English, Irish, Germans, and Welsh. In this year also about 75 Polish families, including about 300 adult males, appeared. They came from St. Louis, and most of them had been in the United States for a number of years. As they found regular work in Community E, they remained, the company building frame houses for their use. A plant for stamping granite and metal ware was completed shortly after the rolling mills, and the majority of the operatives of the two establishments still continued to be of the English-speaking races. Among them were many native negroes, who lived in a row of shanties built along the Mississippi River and known as the Levee. For a period of six years, however, no immigrants, with the exception of the Poles mentioned above, appeared in the community.

During the two years 1894–1896 a large steel plant, including blast furnaces, rolling mills, and foundries, was established in the community. In 1901 another steel establishment of the same description began operations. Four years later a large company for the manufacture of corn products was located in the community. About the same time shops were erected for building wooden and steel cars. These shops employed over 3,000 men. By the year 1900, as was to be expected, the demand for unskilled labor could no longer be supplied by English-speaking people alone. Consequently, in that year Slovaks from St. Louis were employed by the local industries. Within a year they numbered about 50 families, or 250 male workers. In 1902 came the Magyars, followed by a few Croatians. In 1903 the Magyars numbered about 20 families, with the usual following of single boarders. Mixed groups of Roumanians, Greeks, and Serbians followed. The latter were from southern Hungary and numbered about 50 male adults, including about a dozen family groups.

In 1904, when the first Bulgarians appeared in the community, the immigrant population was approximately as follows:

About 200 Italians worked in the car shops, but they never settled, commuting each day to and from a neighboring city where was an Italian colony, their employers supplying them with free transportation.

In the years 1904 and 1905 began the swarming of the Bulgarians to the community. The Bulgarian immigration was furthered by the head of one of the three Bulgarian mercantile houses. This Bulgarian came to the United States in 1903 and for one year worked at railroad construction in eastern and southern States, during which time he learned English rapidly and became a gang foreman. In the fall of 1904 he came to St. Louis, with considerable savings, intending to winter there. At that time it happened that an extensive insurrection in his native province, Monastir, was being crushed by the Turks. Early in the winter he heard that a number of his countrymen, refugees from home, had arrived at Dayton, Ohio. He went there on a visit and persuaded 47 men to return with him to St. Louis, and, on finding that cheaper lodgings could be had in the adjacent towns, they moved to Community E. They were the first to arrive. Although by no means penniless, they looked about for work, the future banker who had brought them acting as their spokesman. Employment was soon found for 16 men. Then came to the leader of the party an agent from one of the local steel plants and agreed to employ as many men as the leader could find. The agreement was made during the winter, and already more refugees from the devastated villages in Monastir were arriving. The Bulgarian wrote to them, and they came and were all employed. Then he wrote to the refugees in Bulgaria, that country being then so thronged with them that they could find no work there. Before the spring of 1905 over 900 had arrived and found employment. Meanwhile, a Bulgarian baker in St. Louis had removed his bakery to the community and opened, besides, a saloon and money exchange. He also wrote to his countrymen, and perhaps advanced many of them the expenses of travel at a lucrative rate of interest.

Living quarters in the town proper soon became crowded, and in March, 1905, a group of Bulgarians rented the cottages which had been previously occupied by English-speaking races, and which were located near the mills a short distance from town. This section became known as "Hungary Hollow," and apparently the English-speaking people did not like their new neighbors, for soon the Bulgarians had possession of all the houses. By the autumn of 1905 there were fully 1,500 Bulgarians in Hungary Hollow and its vicinity.

In the winter of 1905 the Bulgarian who had started immigration to the community, in company with several others, capitalized a

company at \$50,000. They opened a general store and erected a building costing \$5,100, paying \$1,000 down and \$100 per month. In the two upper floors they lodged their countrymen; below they established a general store, bakery, saloon, and butcher shop, in addition to the inevitable bank. Business prospered, and by the following spring they erected another brick building of 26 rooms. They also bought four cottages for use in connection with their lodging business. In the meantime another Bulgarian company built one cement and one frame building. About the same time still another Bulgarian came direct from Macedonia with capital of his own, which he had withdrawn from a business he had sold at home, and built another large brick structure, in which he established a general store and bank. Another commercial company, backed by Macedonians, built a large frame house and bought or built ten frame cottages, opening a grocery store and a saloon. These companies established themselves in Hungary Hollow, but the same commercial enterprise manifested itself in the town proper.

The two large Bulgarian mercantile houses began business, one opening with a capital of \$130,000. They built their lodging houses on European plans, so that parts of the Bulgarian quarter present the appearance of a prosperous town in European Turkey, the houses being brick and cement stuccoed, with broad, open, front windows. The increasing Bulgarian immigration seemed to warrant this remarkable business activity. In the autumn of 1907 it reached its high-water mark. At that time there were 8,000 Bulgarians in the community.

The first to feel the influence of the new arrivals were the English-speaking races. The unskilled among them disappeared gradually; even the negroes along the Levee evacuated their homes in favor of the Bulgarians. Finally the English-speaking employees remained only in the skilled departments of the industrial establishments, living in substantial and well-kept cottages in the best parts of the town proper. The early immigrant races also dwindled in numbers, but this is probably due more to the recent industrial depression than to the influx of Bulgarians. In 1906 they numbered about the same as in 1904. In the year 1909 they were estimated to be as follows:

The Magyars, as is evident, have increased since their arrival. The Armenians appeared in the community at about the same time as the Bulgarians. None of these races may be classed as direct immigrants. Most of those who have left the community have returned to St. Louis, whence they came. Some of the races entered as having no families have a few, represented by saloon keepers, but not by employees in the local industries.

THE INDUSTRIAL DEPRESSION AND THE EXODUS OF 1909.

The panic of the autumn of 1907 did not affect the community until the following spring. By that time, however, the mills began to close, and then followed distress among the recent immigrants. Thousands were fed by the commercial houses all summer. One banking house could pay its depositors some of their money, but the others were obliged to suspend payment for the time, giving depositors only bread. Even the municipality donated two wagon loads of flour, and the American saloon keepers and merchants made donations. The Bulgarians suffered most, for they were the unskilled laborers.

In the summer of 1908 a few men were able to get work on the railroads, and this relieved the situation to some extent. These laborers returned in the autumn, but by that time the mills had taken on more men, and by taking turns at the work, helping each other and drawing on their bank accounts, the winter passed better than the summer. The following figures, furnished by the leading immigrant banking house, shows the effect of the business depression on the economic condition of the Bulgarians in Community E. This company forwarded remittances from Bulgarian immigrants to their families abroad in 1906, \$14,000; 1907, \$150,000; 1908, \$10,000. The bank in 1909 sent on an average \$100 a week. During the past year they have received \$4,000 from abroad in remittances for immigrants here.

The spring of 1909 threatened a return to the conditions of the previous year, especially as most of the immigrants had spent all their savings. In the month of May, 1909, however, came a large demand for laborers on railroad-construction work in the two Dakotas, Minnesota, and Montana. There was a general rush in response. This had occurred the previous year, but to a lesser extent. May 25 is a national and a sacred holiday among the Bulgarians, the day of St. Methodius and St. Cyril. At this celebration, in 1908, 2,000 attended in Community E, marching in parade. During the year 1909 less than 100 were present. By the end of May there were only 400 Bulgarians in the town proper, and only 300 in Hungary Hollow. Almost every house, formerly so crowded, was empty. During the previous summer the Bulgarian population never sank below 2,000, although this was a decrease from what had formerly been 8,000. During the winter it increased again to about 4,000. Apparently none of the other races have been affected. The business done by one of the largest mercantile establishments in the community may be cited to illustrate these statements. The Bulgarians use bread different from the ordinary American product, baked by a member of their own race. The bakery conducted by the mercantile house sold bread during the designated periods of the years 1906-1909 as follows:

The decrease would be more noticeable except for the fact that the company established a trade among the Magyars during the last year specified, while in previous years its business had been exclusively with the Bulgarians.

THE BULGARIANS AT HOME.

Of the Bulgarian immigrants, not only in Community E but in the whole country, it may be estimated with a fair degree of accuracy that about 90 per cent are from Macedonia. Of the Macedonian Bulgarians practically all are from Monastir, in southwestern Macedonia, the center of revolutionary disturbances for the past fifteen years. Practically none of the Macedonian immigrants in Community E are from outside that zone. Moreover, it may be estimated that fully 75 per cent of the Macedonian Bulgar immigrants are from one small district in southern Monastir, known to Europeans by its Greek name Castoria, though locally known as Kostur. The district is wholly mountainous, and fit for agriculture only on the small plateaus among the high, rugged ridges, where grapes, grain, and tobacco are grown in limited quantities. Sheep raising is one of the important occupations.

In spite of the unfavorable environment of Castoria, however, the people are more prosperous than in any other part of southern Macedonia. Some of the villages have, or had before the insurrection of 1904, the appearance of small cities, the houses being substantially built of stone, almost all being two stories high. The people are also more enlightened, for the reason that almost all the male adults are stone masons, who spend part of each year abroad, in Greece, Bulgaria, or Roumania, working at their trade. In all the Balkan countries the masons from Castoria are considered the best, and are always in demand. They are usually at home during the harvest months, to help the women and children in the fields.

Racially the Castorians are slightly different from other Macedonian Bulgarians. In appearance they are darker; nearer, possibly, to the original Bulgarian stock, their mountainous regions having protected them to some extent from infusion with the later-coming Slavs, although their language is Slavic. In Bulgaria, where the Macedonian immigration has been heavy, the Castorians are considered the shrewdest and the most pugnacious. Many have there succeeded in commercial enterprises, and they fill many lucrative government posts. The same is to be observed in Community E; they are the successful bankers, merchants, and saloon keepers.

The Castorians have always prospered. The character of their region made it unfavorable to the large landownings beys. Each

peasant has usually owned his land, always enough to supply his own wants. The grapes and tobacco are unusually good, and command high prices, while the absence of a Musselman population has rendered Albanian brigandage less common there than in the lowlands. The earnings of the men abroad as masons escape the heavy property taxation, while their sheep in the mountains could also be kept from the eyes of the assessors.

When revolutionary agitation began in Macedonia fifteen years ago the Castorians were the first to respond. They organized a secret league, which spread over other parts of Macedonia, but always remained strongest in Castoria, financially and numerically. In 1904 an insurrection was declared, and the fiercest fighting took place in Castoria. Every one of the stone villages was wholly or partly demolished by Turkish cannon. With the crushing of the rebellion thousands of refugees fled to Greece and Bulgaria.

A few refugees had gone to America directly after the insurrection. Their letters of encouragement drew on the rest. It also happened that in other districts the revolutionary leaders discouraged emigration, but in Castoria the local chiefs encouraged it, for those in America sent back substantial contributions to the revolutionary treasury, and they considered money more important than men.

Almost whole villages were depopulated. In one—the town of Boof, of 400 houses—almost 250 houses were empty of men, all being in America. The women were left under the care and protection of the men that remained. The men from this village had no intention of remaining in America. America had simply been substituted for the closed field of labor in other countries, but on account of the expensive journey the stay abroad must necessarily be a longer one. The Bulgarians from other parts of Monastir are usually purely agriculturists, but their reasons for emigration are similar to those of the Castorians, though more from Turkish than Greek persecution.

Of the Bulgarians from this principality a vast majority are from the district about Turnova, the ancient capital of the Bulgarian Empire. They are almost purely Slavs. The district was long ago overpopulated, and emigration began across the Danube into Roumania, where most of the Bulgarians succeeded as bakers and market gardeners. In Roumania they first came in contact with Macedonian refugees, and were by them led off to America, rather than by any special internal impulse. They are much inferior to the Macedonians in enterprise, though better schooled, for in Bulgaria education is compulsory, while in Castoria no schools are allowed except in a language foreign to the population. Secret schools are established, however, which accounts for the literacy of many of the Castorians.

PERIOD OF RESIDENCE IN THE UNITED STATES OF MEMBERS OF IMMIGRANT HOUSEHOLDS STUDIED.

The table following shows, by race of individual, the percentage of foreign-born persons in the households of the Bulgarians and Magyars who have been in the United States each specified number of years, and substantiates the racial movements to the community, so far as these races are concerned, as outlined above.

The above table shows that all of the Bulgarians from whom information was received have been in the United States less than ten years, and 96.7 per cent under five years. On the other hand, only 80.7 per cent of the Magyars are of a residence less than five years, and 96.7 per cent under ten years, 3.3 per cent being in the United States between ten and twenty years.

METHODS OF SECURING IMMIGRANTS.

Employers disclaim any special efforts to secure immigrant labor. In times of scarcity, one company sometimes resorts to advertising. The common practice, it is asserted, is for the foremen to secure their unskilled workers from applicants at the gates.

In the course of the investigation it was impossible to determine whether or not the mercantile houses were conducting employment agencies. There was no direct evidence to that effect, and the managers of the various establishments vigorously denied that they were engaged in this business. At the same time it was evident that they were the potent factors in controlling public opinion and in bringing about the constant changes in the composition of the labor supply. It was also evident that they acted in an advisory capacity, to say the least, in writing and providing the means for aliens to come here. In these services they claimed they were acting in a disinterested way. At the same time it was apparent that the existence of a large and more or less stable labor supply added greatly to the profits of their business. Whether, in addition to this, any fee was charged for securing employment for their countrymen was not discovered.

DESTINATION OF IMMIGRANTS TO THE COMMUNITY.

The activity of mercantile houses and saloon keepers in influencing their countrymen to come to the community is indicated by a study of the addresses given upon the manifests of steamers by incoming immigrants. An examination of the records at the post-offices in the community revealed the following facts as regards the addresses to which a large number of immigrants destined to these two places were going:

Box 72, a large Macedonian mercantile house.

Box 316, immigrant saloon keeper.

Box 351, Macedonian saloon, lodging, mercantile house.

Boxes 430 and 431. Same as 351.

Box 86. Same as 316.

Box 37, Macedonian mercantile house.

From this exhibit as to the holders of post-office boxes, it is apparent that in almost every case where a large number of immigrants were giving a common destination, the address was that of a saloon keeper or of a mercantile house.

This fact becomes more marked when it is seen that in the majority of cases where a post-office box number is not given, but that of a person or firm, these persons or firms are either the managers of mercantile houses or the mercantile house itself. Moreover, in the answers to the question "Whom going to join?" it may be said that with few exceptions the destinations given for immigrants are those of mercantile houses or saloons.

The real significance of these facts is doubtful. It may be and probably is true that the mercantile houses and saloon keepers assisted immigrants to come to the community in order to profit in an indirect way by getting them work and securing their patronage after they had secured work. In many cases this is probably true. On the other hand, it must be borne in mind that the address of the mercantile house was the same as that of the four or five hundred immigrants who were living in the rooms which the establishment rents. It may be true, therefore, that a large number of immigrants having a common destination were simply coming to join friends or relatives who had rooms above one of the mercantile houses' storerooms.

RACIAL COMPOSITION OF THE COMMUNITY.

This community has under normal conditions, as has been seen, the largest Bulgarian colony in the United States. Before the existing depression, it is estimated that there were 8,000 Bulgarians in the locality. Almost the entire Bulgarian population are single men, or married men who have left their families in Europe. Altogether, there are not over 40 families and about 50 women. The next largest element of foreign population is probably furnished by the Magyars, of whom there is estimated to be more than 1,000 in the two cities. There are, under normal conditions, also between 800 and 1,000 Armenians, between 300 and 500 Servians, and a considerable number of Austrian-Servians, Roumanians, Lithuanians, Poles, Slovaks, and Austrians. The total number of recent immigrants in the two cities is estimated to be 12,000. In addition, there are also a large number of older immigrants, made up principally of Germans and Irish. The total population of the community is estimated to be about 20,000.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE POPULATION.

In both of the towns proper, the immigrant population is living in sections apart from the natives. The main consideration leading to the location of the immigrant population has been the effort to be near the place of work. In one city of the community they live principally in a long line of rooming houses, situated along the line of

the electric railway, which runs parallel to the car-building and repair works. Some of the lodging houses are located almost under the shadow of the car shops and along the main line of an important railroad system. The entire section is unhealthy. The atmosphere, on account of the proximity to the car shops and railroad, is filled with dust and dirt. The streets even along the electric line are unpaved; here and in the open lots mud and pools of stagnant water abound. On the main streets there are some brick pavements, boardwalks, and cinder paths, but on the side streets there are usually no facilities for walking.

In the American section of the other town or city of the community there are two sections, where between two and three hundred Magyars live in cottages, each cottage usually containing two or three families. Several Armenian boarding houses are also located within the town. Moreover, a few of the educated immigrants of recent arrival live among the Americans, one, an educated Bulgarian, has a family and lives according to the American standard. The older immigrant races, the Germans and Irish, are indistinguishable in living arrangements and in other respects from the purely native stock.

With these few exceptions, the immigrant population of the community lives in a section of its own, separated by the distance of four or five city blocks from each of the two regularly constituted towns. This section, as already noted, has been popularly dubbed "Hungary Hollow." It lies along the tracks of the railroad referred to above, and between the plants of the two steel companies and a short distance from the car shops and the iron products manufacturing establishment. Here the Bulgarians, Magyars, Servians, Roumanians, and Armenians live together, entirely apart from any American influences.

From the preceding tables it will be seen that of 46 females reporting complete data, the total number, or 26.1 per cent, who were employed abroad were working for wages, the largest proportion being shown by those who were employed in domestic service and as factory operatives, with 8.7 per cent for each, while 6.5 per cent were employed as farm laborers, 2.2 per cent in hand trades, and 73.9 per cent were without occupation.

Upon information secured from 683 males it may be seen that the largest proportion, or 44.5 per cent, were working for profit, 42.8 per cent were farmers working for profit and 1.8 per cent in occupations other than farming. Thirty-four and six-tenths per cent were working for wages, 16.8 per cent in hand trades, 9.4 per cent as farm laborers, 1.9 per cent as laborers, other than on the farm, and 6.4 per cent in other occupations. Of the total number 20.1 per cent were working without wages, 19.8 per cent as farm laborers, and 0.3 per cent in other occupations. Only 0.9 per cent were without occupation.

Comparing the two races shown in the above table, it will be seen that of those working for wages practically the same proportions are shown by each race in each different occupation, except for those who were farm laborers and in hand trades. The Magyars show the larger proportion, or 20.6 per cent, while the Bulgarians show 5.6 per

cent who were farm laborers, and of those employed in hand trades these races show approximately the same proportions reversed. Both races report that the largest proportion were employed as farm laborers working without wages, with 29.1 per cent as shown by the Magyar and 16.5 per cent as shown by the Bulgarian, while less than 1 per cent are shown otherwise employed without wages. The largest proportion working for profit were farmers, with 46.4 per cent and 33.1 per cent, respectively, for the Bulgarian and Magyar, less than 2 per cent in any other occupation being reported by either race.

The above table shows that none of the Magyar women are in domestic service or engaged in trade, and none at school, while 82.7 per cent are at home and 17.3 per cent otherwise employed, the large proportion of those thus designated being at work in the corn products and enameling and stamping works.

The preceding table shows that the large majority of the Bulgarians are employed in the iron and steel industry, only 6.9 per cent being at home, 16.6 per cent employed in other industries than iron and steel, and a negligible proportion at school. On the other hand, the Magyars, as already pointed out, display a tendency to move away from the iron and steel industry to other occupations and pursuits, only 18.6 per cent of the males of this race of working age being employed in the iron and steel industry and 74.6 per cent otherwise employed, while 6.8 per cent are at home and none at school.

COMPARISON OF OCCUPATIONS OF RECENT IMMIGRANTS WITH OTHER OCCUPATIONS.

Five years ago the unskilled labor in the steel works was performed by Americans, Irish, Germans, English, Welsh and a few Magyars. Since that time these races have been entirely displaced by the Bulgarians and other southeastern European races. The Germans and English in the employ of the steel companies have advanced in the industrial scale, as well as the Magyars. They do not come into direct contact with the recent immigrants, except in "chipping," as described elsewhere. The Irish who have remained with the steel companies are generally foremen or bosses. The Germans, Irish, and English are practically Americanized. Their children have passed through the public schools and are engaged in clerical, mechanical or business pursuits elsewhere. Very few Magyars have remained in the steel plants. There are some Magyar chippers and molders. Most of them, however, have gone to the granite or steel ware works or the corn-products plant, where the work is lighter and the compensation higher than that of the unskilled laborer in the steel and car plants. To secure these positions in these establishments, they are required to have a fair knowledge of English, and this requirement they have been able to satisfy because of their long term of residence as compared with other southeastern European races.

About 325 Magyars have employment in the corn-products refining company, and the greater part of the remainder are in the granite ware and steel plants. The skilled positions with the steel companies, the granite ware, and the corn-products plant are held by Americans, Irish, and Germans. The entire canning factory of the corn products plant is operated by these races, who receive \$2.50 per day. The mechanical positions and trades are also controlled by them. The Germans are very numerous as machinists and carpenters.

In the steel mills of this community it is found that the positions of trust and those calling for skilled labor, such as clerks, draftsmen, foremen, switchmen, teamsters and watchmen are filled by the Americans, Germans, and Irish, while the positions for unskilled labor such as unloading, floating gang, etc., are filled by negroes, Poles, Bulgarians, and Macedonians. In the smelting departments, the skilled and responsible positions such as melters, ladlemen, charging-machine men, bricklayers and chemists are filled by Americans, Germans, and Irish; while the positions calling for unskilled labor are occupied by Bulgarians and Slovaks. The same is true of the molding departments where the foundrymen, molders, foremen, and carpenters are Americans, Germans and Irish, and the rammers, helpers and common laborers are Macedonians, Bulgarians, and Ar-

menians. In the pattern department no races but Americans and Germans are employed as all the labor in this department is skilled.

In the machinery and power department practically the same condition prevails as all the occupations such as blacksmiths, mechanics, pattern makers, electricians, pipe fitters, etc., call for skilled labor and are occupied by Americans, Irish, and Germans. In the finishing department where both skilled and unskilled labor is employed the Americans, Germans, and Irish have the positions calling for skilled labor and the Macedonians, Bulgarians, Turks, Roumanians, and negroes the positions requiring only unskilled labor.

The foregoing statements may be graphically shown by exhibiting the occupations by race in a number of the departments of the local manufacturing establishments. Immediately below there is submitted a table showing the number of the representatives of the several races in the various occupations of a large rolling mill.

The average yearly earnings for all foreign-born males who are working for wages are shown by the above table to be \$285. The annual earnings of the Magyars are considerably above those of the Bulgarians, the former showing \$339 as compared with \$261 of the latter. About the same proportions of the Magyars and Bulgarians earn under \$200 per year, while a larger proportion of the latter than of the former earn under \$400 and under \$600.

The foregoing table, which shows the range of annual family income for Magyar families whose heads were born abroad, discloses the fact that the great majority of families have a yearly income under \$750, 36.4 per cent an annual family income under \$500, and 13.6 per cent less than \$300. All of the families have an annual income under \$1,500, and 86.4 per cent a yearly income of less than \$1,000.

WIVES AT WORK.

The extent to which the female members of the households contribute to the family support is indicated by the two tables next submitted. The first table shows that, of the 44 wives in households whose heads were foreign-born Magyars, only 2, or 4.5 per cent, were at work outside of the home. The average earnings of these women have not been computed owing to the small numbers involved.

The table above shows that all of the Magyar families have an income from earnings of husband, and 63.6 per cent receive contributions to the family income in the form of payments of boarders or lodgers, while 9.1 per cent have children contributing to the family support, and 4.5 per cent receive an income from the earnings of wives.

The preceding table shows that only 22.7 per cent of the Magyar families whose heads were foreign-born receive their entire income from the earnings of husbands, while 47.7 per cent derive their income from the earnings of husbands plus the payments received from boarders or lodgers. A proportion of the families equivalent to 4.5 per cent are supported by the earnings of husbands and children.

From the above table it is seen that 68 per cent of the total family income of the Magyar families is derived from the earnings of husbands, 26.6 per cent from the payments of boarders or lodgers, and only 2.1 per cent from the contributions of children, and 1.1 per cent from the earnings of wives, the two main sources of family support obviously being the earnings of the husbands and the income received from keeping boarders or lodgers.

CHAPTER IV.

WORKING CONDITIONS.

Regularity of employment—Methods of wage payments—Company houses—Company stores—Relations between the races—Welfare work—Women and children employed—The immigrant and organized labor—Reasons for employing immigrants—Races preferred by employers—Changes in industrial processes and organization—Progress of immigrants—[Text Tables 608 and 609 and General Table 338].

REGULARITY OF EMPLOYMENT.

Normally, work in the industries of this community continues steadily throughout the year. During 1908 and 1909 the car shops and steel companies constantly reduced their working forces until only a very small percentage of the number employed before the panic are now at work. The car shops at the time of the agent's visit were not doing much beyond overhauling and repairing their plants. The steel companies were working a small force, but were planning to shut down completely. The granite and steel ware plant was also operating with a small force. On the other hand, the depression brought an increasing volume of business to the company engaged in the manufacture of a cheap kind of sirup, and they are employing more labor than ever before.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race of individual, months worked during the past year by males 16 years of age or over, in the households studied, employed away from home.

Only 5.6 per cent of the Bulgarians and 18.7 per cent of the Magyars were at work for twelve months preceding the time at which the data were collected. A somewhat larger proportion of the Bulgarians worked six months or over than of the Magyars, but a smaller proportion of the former than of the latter were at work nine months or over. No indication as to the relative industriousness of either race is afforded by the table for the reason that regularity of work offered was seriously interfered with by the industrial depression of 1907-8, especially in the case of the Bulgarians who were employed in the larger numbers in the iron and steel industry.

METHODS OF WAGE PAYMENTS.

In the community wages are universally paid by check every two weeks.

COMPANY HOUSES.

There are no company houses in this community. None of the industrial concerns operate a store nor are they connected with the management of any. The lodging houses of the community are owned and conducted by the large immigrant mercantile establishments.

COMPANY STORES.

The companies do not operate their own stores nor are they connected with any of the stores of the town.

RELATIONS BETWEEN THE RACES.

At work, the only place where the employer could readily influence the segregation of his employees, no attempt is made on his part to separate in any way the different races. Whatever segregation takes place comes about through the action of the employees themselves. In the steel industry, in the molding departments, immigrants work with native Americans and with other races of immigrants. In the finishing department the roughing and chipping is done almost entirely by immigrants and negroes, but here too the different races work together.

Apart from any influence originating with the employers, the recent immigrant races especially segregate themselves in their own boarding and living places. Some localities are inhabited almost exclusively by particular races. There seems to be but very little free association among the different races of recent immigrants after working hours. Men of each race associate largely with their countrymen, though the Poles and Magyars in some cases are beginning to associate quite freely with one another. The same is true of the Poles, the Slovaks, and the Croatians. In addition to not freely associating with one another, there is considerable friction between the Irish, Austrians, and Magyars, on the one hand, and the Macedonians, Bulgarians, Roumanians, and other southeastern European and Oriental races, on the other hand, growing out of the conditions under which employment is given. The unskilled and less skilled employees of the steel companies gather each morning at the gates of the different plants and are designated for work by the foremen. There is not much competition between the races so far as unskilled labor is concerned. The southeastern European peoples may be said to be practically without competition there. In the occupations which require some skill, however, and to which a large number of Macedonians and Bulgarians have attained, there is considerable direct competition. The Irish, Magyars, and Austrians frequently adopt the policy of driving the newcomers by force away from the mill gates. Oftentimes the recent arrivals resent such action and a general fight along racial lines ensues, the weapons employed being fists, stones, and other missiles, and, in some cases, revolvers. This tendency is, of course, much intensified in seasons of slack employment or curtailment of work. The immigrants, except the English, Germans, Irish,

and Welsh, do not associate freely with the natives, but stay largely in the colonies of their fellow-countrymen. There is a general dislike on the part of the English-speaking races for the "foreigner."

The Magyars, Poles, and Slovaks are brought more or less into contact with American people and their habits of living. Their children attend the public schools, and they sometimes join trade unions. With the Bulgarians, Roumanians, and Armenians the situation is different. A few representative men from among editors, mercantile proprietors, and educated men live in American sections according to American standards, but the majority of these races are either unmarried or without their families in this country. Very few attend school or are receiving instruction in English. Practically none are members of labor unions. In their present mode of living they have little contact with American churches, schools, or business houses.

WELFARE WORK.

No company investigated furnishes any medical or hospital service to its employees. These companies, however, have liability insurance, which provides that their employees injured at work shall be furnished free of cost medical and hospital service while such is needed. Further adjustments are made by agreements or by the courts.

With one exception, no company undertakes any welfare work among its employees. This company sets apart a building for a boys' club and a school. The club members are almost entirely natives. The classes in spelling, reading, writing, arithmetic, and drawing are held every night except Saturday and Sunday. They are attended by natives and immigrants alike. About 10 per cent of their immigrant employees avail themselves of the opportunities offered. The Poles, of the recent immigrants, seem to take the greatest interest in these classes and make the greatest progress. The company also furnishes a small library of one hundred or more volumes for use of all employees. Current magazines are also kept on file.

One-half of this community is situated on very low land. The plants are all badly located, and in this respect are not sanitary. Aside from this, sanitary conditions are good. None of the immigrants are in occupations which make them specially liable to disease. Among the steel workers there is the special liability to accident incidental to all steel plants. In the iron-refining plants liability to accident is confined to machine workers.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN EMPLOYED.

No children are employed. In the iron-products refining establishment some immigrant girls are employed. Only a few of the recent immigrants are employed, however, and these are mostly Slovaks and Magyars. They work ten hours per day and receive 12½ cents per hour. Women are employed because of their neatness and their good appearance. The iron house furnishes work especially fitted to women. The recent immigrants were employed to increase the output, all the former employees being retained.

THE IMMIGRANT AND ORGANIZED LABOR.

With the exception of the Magyars, practically none of the members of other races of southern and eastern Europe belong to or manifest any interest in the local labor organization. This fact is exhibited by the following table, which shows, by general nativity and race of individual, the affiliation with trade unions of males, in the households studied, who were 21 years of age or over working for wages:

From computations based upon a total of 534 males it may be seen that only 2.6 per cent are affiliated with trade unions. Of the two races reporting, the Magyars show by far the largest proportion, or 9.4 per cent, as compared with 0.3 per cent of the Bulgarians.

REASONS FOR EMPLOYING IMMIGRANTS.

Representative American laborers and labor leaders claim that the recent immigrants were originally employed as strike breakers at a lower wage than Americans, Germans, and Irish who had done the same work, and that since that time the races from southern and eastern Europe have been retained and their number increased because they have been willing to work at a lower wage than the former employees.

In the year 1904 a strike was declared by unions of unskilled employees. One of the steel plants imported negroes to take the place of their former employees, but the negroes were forced to leave. Four or five carloads of Bulgarians were then brought in during the night and placed in the positions which the strikers had left vacant. These races agreed to work for \$1.25 to \$1.35 per day and to do the same work as the strikers had formerly done and for which they received \$2 to \$2.50 per day. These immigrants were found by the company to be satisfactory. Others were secured, the strikers were defeated, a large number permanently losing their places in the steel works. Others went back to work at a reduced wage, and most of these have since risen in the industrial scale to more skilled occupations. It is claimed by the labor organizations that Americans, Germans, and Irish would willingly do the same work that the recent immigrants are now doing if they were paid higher wages.

On the other hand, the employers claim that the racial displacements in the local industries have been brought about by the natural

working of economic forces. The older races in point of residence, having acquired a knowledge of the English language and a sufficient knowledge of the working conditions of the industry in which they have been located, have been able to do better work and command higher wages, or, on the other hand, their industrial progress in other lines of work has grown out of the fact that older immigrants have had time to acquire the knowledge to enter upon another trade or occupation. For these reasons, they assert, the displacement of the races has been attended with but little friction, individual loss, or maladjustment. The steel companies unite in the statement that recent immigrants have been employed chiefly because of the expansion of business, which produced an urgent demand for labor and made vacant a large number of unskilled places which the Americans would not accept. Also there has been a demand for higher paid and more skilled operatives. The Germans, Irish, Welsh, and Americans who formerly performed the common labor had reached a point in their technical experience when the expansion developed which enabled them to go up in the industrial scale. They were therefore promoted. Their promotion left vacant the positions which had been filled by them, and not being able to get Americans, Germans, Irish, or Welsh to take their places, because of the scarcity of labor, the employer was forced to take what he could get, and recourse was had to the Bulgarians and other races of recent immigration. Other local manufacturers assert that they have been forced to use immigrants to do certain work because the Americans will not do it on account of its disagreeable and arduous nature. The company engaged in the manufacture of corn products also states that it employs immigrants because they are good workers.

RACES PREFERRED BY EMPLOYERS.

Preferences of employers for the different races could be obtained only in very general terms. It seems to be the general consensus of opinion among employers here that recent immigrants in general fall below natives and the English-speaking races and Germans in all qualities except industriousness and sobriety. For all skilled work and work with machinery the English-speaking races and Germans are generally preferred. Practically none of the other races are found in the skilled occupations. For unskilled work the English-speaking races and Germans are again preferred. Next come the Poles. Of the recent immigrants, they are considered the most industrious; more industrious even than native Americans. In effectiveness they are also considered about on a par with the natives and lead the other races. They are thought to be the most tractable, adaptable, progressive, and effective. After the Poles, the Magyars, in the opinion of the employers, have these qualities in the next highest degree. The general opinion seems to be that there is no difference among the races as regards sobriety. One employer states, however, that all the recent immigrants seem to be above the average American standard in sobriety. Again, all employers seem united in saying that the Bulgarians are least preferred of the immigrants in any occupation. They are not adaptable, require considerable supervision, and generally are the least effective of the immigrant races.

CHANGES IN INDUSTRIAL PROCESSES AND ORGANIZATION.

Immigrants have not affected methods of work. The employers claim that they have lowered the standard of efficiency and have made discipline harder, thus requiring a much greater degree of supervision. The employers also claim that wages have shown no change apparently attendant on the competition of immigrants. They have had no effect in causing machinery to be installed or in keeping it from being used. The hours of work have remained the same since the employment of immigrants.

PROGRESS OF IMMIGRANTS.

According to the opinions of employers, immigrants are generally advancing in the scale of wages. The Poles and Magyars are perhaps making the greatest progress among recent immigrants in wage earning. Slovaks and Bohemians are also mentioned as progressive. The Bulgarians are still at work in the occupations that pay the lowest wages. They show less desire than any of the other races to advance themselves. With rare exceptions, none of the recent immigrants become foremen.

CHAPTER V.

HOUSING AND LIVING CONDITIONS.

GENERAL HOUSING AND LIVING CONDITIONS.

The facilities for housing are of two kinds: (1) Large lodging or apartment houses and (2) small three and four room cottages. In the immigrant sections of the two towns of the community the entire alien population, with the exception of the Magyars, live in lodging houses. In Hungary Hollow about one-half live in lodging houses and one-half in cottages.

The typical lodging houses are owned and conducted by the large mercantile establishments. They are large square or rectangular three or four story brick buildings. Space is reserved on the first floor by the business establishment for a saloon, grocery, or other store, and usually part of the second floor is utilized for a dance or assembly hall. The remainder of the building is converted into rooms of different sizes and rented to the alien population. The number of rooms to each building varies from 20 to 50 or more. The interior construction is designed to secure the greatest economy of space. On each floor a hall of good width, from 5 to 8 feet, runs the entire length of the building, and from this hall doors open into the various rooms. The hallways, which are common property, are usually in a filthy and squalid condition. No particular tendency toward filling them with refuse or using them for storage purposes is noticeable; but their appearance is such as to indicate that they are scarcely ever scrubbed or swept. They are also dark and unlighted, except by a window from the rear. The floors are covered usually with mud and dirt and the walls, though plastered, are usually badly discolored.

The rooms in these buildings are usually well lighted. Some of them are rectangular, narrow, and about 12 to 14 feet long and have only one window. Usually they are square, however, or almost square, and have two windows of the average size. The usual size of the square rooms is about 14 by 15 or 15 by 12 feet. The larger rooms will admit two beds and two cots, placed close together, while the smaller rooms have space sufficient for three or, as a rule, four small cots. The walls are thin and plastered. In about one-half of the buildings the plumbing is insanitary and in none are there any baths or sanitary closets. Dry closets, as well as frame buildings for storing fuel, are found in the small yards at the rear. On each floor at the rear of a few of the buildings there are small rooms with running water which are used as laundries. Some of the buildings also have stairways at the back, on the outside, which may be utilized as fire

escapes. In general, the buildings are fairly well constructed. On the other hand, a number have been erected in a very rough and unsanitary way in the effort to secure cheapness and because alien immigrant labor of a more or less unskilled type was employed in their construction. The worst building of this kind was constructed almost entirely by immigrant labor. It is said to be highly insanitary.

There are ten of these large rooming houses in the community, four of which are in Hungary Hollow. Smaller lodging houses in considerable number, which follow the general lines of the larger establishments are also to be found. The smaller places are usually frame buildings, square or rectangular in shape, with a saloon, coffee house, or store on the ground floor. The older immigrants and the American population, as a rule, live in small one-story frame cottages in the towns proper.

As mentioned above, about one-half of the immigrants in Hungary Hollow live in cottages. The cottage district is situated on the open prairie to the south of the business and lodging-house section. The cottages are built in rows, and, in general, it may be stated that there is an abundance of space between the buildings. Almost every cottage has a lot, about 50 by 150 feet, suitable for gardening; but only in a very few cases is this space utilized. The greater number of the cottage plots are unfenced. The buildings themselves are small, one story in height, and usually are in great need of repair. They contain three and four and, in a few instances, five rooms. The larger number have three rooms, with only one window in each of the two smaller rooms. The dimensions of the rooms are about 8 by 6 feet. Two windows are usually found in the remaining room, which is generally about 10 by 12 feet in size. Where there are four and five rooms, the additional rooms are small. The walls are thin and are plastered and whitewashed. Usually there are no doors separating the rooms or only one or two doors shutting off the smaller rooms.

There are very few Americans living in Hungary Hollow. No American families are there and there is only one boarding house occupied by natives. This establishment is situated on the main street, adjoining the foreign section, and is the first building passed in approaching Hungary Hollow. It is a square frame structure, very similar to an Armenian boarding house next door. A saloon is operated in connection with it, and it is occupied by Americans who are engaged in work similar to or more skilled than that of the immigrants. Exclusive of those in this boarding house, the Americans live in the towns proper.

In the immigrant quarter of the two towns of the community there are a few American families. Their houses are three and four room frame cottages, one story in height, situated in the spaces between the immigrant mercantile houses and business establishments, and were probably constructed before the immigrants arrived. These Americans live in the usual American way. They represent, however, a very small portion of the American population. The American section lies east of the foreign and is separated from it by about a half or three-quarters of a mile of open prairie. The American employees of the industrial establishments almost without exception live in small frame cottages one story in height, containing three or four rooms. One family, as a rule, occupies a cottage.

SYSTEMS OF DOMESTIC ECONOMY.

The methods of living practiced by the races of recent immigration are numerous, but all may be reduced to four general classes: (1) A system similar to the "boarding boss" system; (2) a system by which the members take turns in managing the household; (3) boarding; and (4) the family. Each of these general forms has a number of variations.

There are very few families of recent immigrants outside of the towns proper, and where living without boarders they are found in the large rooming houses of Hungary Hollow occupying one or more rooms. No families live in cottages except Armenians. A large number, perhaps almost all of the families of recent immigration, live in the lodging houses, and it is quite common to find families there with boarders. They usually have two rooms, one for the boarders and another for cooking, eating, and the sleeping quarters of the family. Food, light, beds, and heat are provided by the families at a certain fixed charge per month. In addition to this boarding system, which is modeled somewhat after the American idea, it may be noted that the Armenians (with the exception of the families) live almost entirely in large boarding houses, paying a fixed sum to the proprietor for light, food, room, and heat.

By far the larger number in both Hungary Hollow and the towns live on a group system. This system has two forms: (1) That based upon the boarding-boss idea and (2) that form under which the household management is shared among the members of the group. The first form is confined almost exclusively to the Bulgarians and Macedonians and is practiced extensively in the lodging houses. A group of men, usually five or six, rent two rooms, one for sleeping and the other for cooking. A Servian, Austrian, or Polish woman is employed at a fixed amount per month to do the buying and cooking of the food and the washing and household work. The accounts for meat, groceries, and bread are kept under one name at the different stores. At the end of the month each man pays his share of the aggregate expense, including the wages of the housekeeper, the rent, and the store bills.

The second form in which the group idea is followed differs from the first in that the members of the group take turns each day in doing the cooking and housework. The rent and the cost of food is shared proportionately. In most cases the washing is done by Polish or other women, although in many cases the men do their own washing. Under this system, the cost of living is reduced by the elimination of the wages of the housekeeper. This system operated extensively in the large rooming houses and almost exclusively in the cottages.

In a number of cases men are found who are grouped together so far as lodging is concerned but who buy their food separately. Some of them board with families, others at foreign restaurants, and others buy and cook their own food.

RENT IN ITS RELATION TO STANDARD OF LIVING.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the average rent payment per month of the households studied, per apartment, per room, and per sleeping room.

The Bulgarians in the above table show a lower average rent per apartment and per person and a higher average rent per room than the Magyars. The lower rent per person is indicative of more congested conditions and a lower standard of living, and is of interest when it is recalled that the Bulgarian workers in the community usually live in large rooming houses and in apartments of one or two rooms.

The following table shows the percentage of households paying each specified rent per month per apartment, by general nativity and race of head of household.

Of the 138 households studied in the preceding table, 42.8 per cent pay under \$5; 69.6 per cent under \$7.50; and 79.7 per cent under \$10, per month per apartment. Only 8.7 per cent pay as high as \$15, leaving 91.3 per cent paying under this amount.

A larger proportion of households whose heads are Bulgarians than of the households the heads of which are Magyars pay each specified amount up to \$10, while the reverse is true as regards each specified amount above \$10.

The table next presented exhibits the range in rent payments per room, by showing, according to general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households paying each specified rent per month per room.

The foregoing table exhibits about the same proportion of both Bulgarians and Magyars paying under \$2 and under \$3 per month per room, but a considerably larger percentage of the households of the latter than of the former which pay less than \$4 per month per room.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households paying each specified rent per month per person.

All of the households whose heads were Magyars, as can be seen from the preceding table, pay under \$3 per month per person, while nine-tenths pay under \$2 and one-fourth under \$1. On the other hand, no decided advantage in favor of the Bulgarians is indicated. Only four households out of ninety-eight of this race studied, or 4.1 per cent of the total, pay \$3 or over per month per person, while a slightly higher proportion of Bulgarian than of Magyar households have a monthly rent per person under \$2, as well as less than \$1.

BOARDERS AND LODGERS.

The tables next presented exhibit the tendency among the immigrant households to have boarders or lodgers. The first table submitted shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the number and percentage of households keeping boarders or lodgers.

Only 1 household out of a total of 100 whose heads are Bulgarian is shown to have boarders or lodgers, as compared with 28 out of a total of 45 Magyar households, or 62.2 per cent. This situation is not due to a relatively greater tendency of Magyar than of Bulgarian households to have boarders or lodgers but to conditions in this community which are unlike those in other localities studied. As a matter of fact, practically all the Bulgarian households represented in the table are boarding groups, and the one household which is shown to have boarders or lodgers is the one family or household of the usual immigrant type. On the other hand, the Magyar households are representative of conditions of living usually found in immigrant communities, and, although a much higher proportion are found to have boarders or lodgers, yet, for the reasons stated above, the relative showing of the Magyars is probably much better than that of the Bulgarians.

The following table shows the average number of boarders or lodgers per household, based (1) on the total number of households and (2) on the number of households keeping boarders or lodgers.

The preceding table shows that the 28 Magyar households keeping boarders or lodgers have an average of 4.96 boarders or lodgers per household and 3.09 boarders or lodgers per household based on the total number of households. The one Bulgarian household keeping boarders or lodgers has a total of 2 boarders or lodgers, or an average of 0.02 based on the total number of households of this race. In this connection it should be recalled that the prevailing method of living among the Bulgarians in the community is that of the boarding group, under which 4 to 16 males combine to form a household conducted on the boarding-boss system. Practically all of the 100 Bulgarian households, therefore, in a strict definition of the term, are boarding groups.

SIZE OF APARTMENTS OCCUPIED.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households occupying apartments of each specified number of rooms.

The preceding table clearly indicates that the Bulgarian households, as a rule, occupy one or two room apartments, 46 per cent of the 100 households studied having apartments of one room and 36 per cent apartments of two rooms, while only 12 per cent of the total live in apartments of four rooms. On the other hand, only 15.6 per cent of the Magyars live in apartments of one room and 37.8 per cent in apartments of two rooms, while 24.4 per cent have four-room apartments and 13.3 per cent five rooms. The large proportion of Bulgarians in one and two room apartments is due to the prevailing custom of that race of living in boarding groups occupying one or two rooms, while among the Magyars the characteristic feature is that of the family.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households of each specified number of persons.

Of the households whose heads were Bulgarian, the largest proportion is seen to consist of five persons, as compared with ten or more persons, the highest percentage shown for the Magyars. Sixty-eight per cent of the Bulgarian households are of five persons or less than five persons, while 51.1 per cent of the Magyar households consist of six or more persons. The larger number of persons in the Magyar households is not indicative of greater congestion, as compared with the Bulgarian, for the reason that the Magyar households, as a rule, occupy apartments of a larger number of rooms and are representative of a more settled family life, while the Bulgarians, as has been stated, tend to live in boarding groups in small apartments.

CONGESTION.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the average number of persons per apartment, per room, and per sleeping room.

The preceding table, as might be expected, shows a larger average number of persons in apartments occupied by Magyar households than in those of the Bulgarians, while the Bulgarian households show a considerably higher average number of persons per room and per sleeping room, the conditions in all cases being traceable to the fact that the Bulgarian system of living is that of the boarding group occupying a small apartment with a high average of persons per room and per sleeping room as contrasted with the family life which prevails among the Magyars.

The following table exhibits, by general nativity and race of head of household, the range in the number of persons per room:

The striking feature of the above table is that a much larger proportion of the Bulgarian than of the Magyar households have three or more or four or more persons per room, 57 per cent of the Bulgarian households, as contrasted with 26.7 per cent of the Magyar, having three or more persons per room, while 36 per cent of the households of the former race and only 13.3 per cent of the latter have four or more persons per room.

The table submitted below shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the range in the number of persons per sleeping room.

The congestion in the sleeping rooms of the Bulgarian households is at once evident from the preceding table, which shows that 22 per cent have five or more persons per sleeping room, 48 per cent four or more persons per sleeping room, and 67 per cent three or more persons per sleeping room. Much less crowded conditions in sleeping rooms are reported for the Magyar households, which have only 8.9 per cent with 5 or more persons per sleeping room, 22.2 per cent with four or more, and 51.1 per cent with three or more persons per sleeping room.

The effect of crowding upon living arrangements is set forth in the table next submitted. It shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the number and per cent of households regularly sleeping in all except each specified number of rooms.

The above table discloses the striking fact that 73 per cent of the Bulgarian and 51.1 per cent of the Magyar households use all rooms for sleeping purposes. At the other extreme, only 1 per cent, or 1 Bulgarian household out of a total of 100, as contrasted with 6.7 per cent, or 3 out of a total of 45 Magyar households, have two rooms which are not used for sleeping. Of the Bulgarian households, 25 per cent, and of the Magyar households 42.2 per cent, have one room which is not used as a sleeping room.

CHAPTER VI.

GENERAL STANDARD AND COST OF LIVING.

Clothing worn—Furniture—Kinds of food consumed—Sleeping arrangements—General living conditions—General cost of living—Rents—Cost and manner of living of representative families and groups of men—[Text Table 622].

CLOTHING WORN.

Many of the recent immigrants still have some articles of clothing which they brought with them from Europe. Most of their clothing, however, practically all, is made in this country and purchased by them here. The quality of clothing worn, together with the frequency of purchases, may be seen by referring to the transcriptions of the various store accounts, which show in detail the purchases of clothing and small articles by races during a certain period of time. It may be noted here that the price paid for working clothes is usually \$1 to \$1.50 per suit of blue overalls. Shoes are purchased at prices ranging from \$1.75 to \$3, the former being for work and the latter for dress. Summer underwear of the value of 50 cents per garment is generally used, and for cold weather flannels ranging in value from \$1 to \$1.50 per garment. Dress trousers cost from \$1.75 to \$2.25 per pair. From \$10 to \$12 is paid for a suit of dress clothes.

The women wear the cheaper grades of plain white and printed cloths.

FURNITURE.

The household furniture of all races is very meager and consists as a rule of only the most essential articles. For sleeping, iron double beds or single cots are used with mattresses. The cots with mattresses cost about \$3; the beds from \$5 to \$6. There is usually a small sheet-iron stove, valued at about \$3, for cooking and heating. Very few of the families or groups have cooking ranges. The other articles of furniture consist of small kerosene lamps or lanterns for lighting (the rooming houses contain electric lights, and it is only in the cottages that kerosene is used), plain chairs, usually without backs or in bad repair, a bench, and a plain table. There are no carpets. Many of the articles of furniture are of home manufacture. Especially is this true in the case of the chairs, tables, and shelves which are often found in the rooms of the lodging houses. The cooking utensils are limited in number and of the simplest kind.

The Magyars, Slovaks, and Armenians usually have more furnishings than the other races. In Magyar and Slovak families a regular cooking stove is generally found, and oftentimes wardrobes and sideboards. They also have more cooking utensils and dishes than the groups and families of other races.

KINDS OF FOOD CONSUMED.

Among the Bulgarians bread is the staple article of diet. Each man will consume a three-pound loaf of bread per day. They also use a small quantity of meat each day, usually about a pound per man. Beef for boiling is the most common form. It is usually cooked as a stew with vegetables and eaten with bread. They also consume all forms of green vegetables in season, but in very limited quantities. They have meat at least once each day. The usual drinks are coffee and beer. Many drink hot milk in the morning.

The Roumanian has the same diet as the Bulgarian and Macedonian, with the noteworthy difference that he consumes less meat than the other two races, eating meat only two or three times per week. As a general statement, it may be said also that he consumes less food than the Bulgarian and Macedonian. The most marked difference, however, is in the case of meat.

Unlike the Roumanian, the Magyar is a great consumer of meat. Eight or ten Magyar men, living in a group, eat from \$1.50 to \$2 worth of meat per day. A Bulgarian butcher states that such a group on an average eats 4 pounds of beef, 5 pounds of pork, 3 pounds of Polish sausage (with garlic), and 4 pounds of veal, and often, in addition, bacon and ham and other cured meats, each day. The Magyar also tends to use beer to excess. Like the other races, he is a great consumer of bread.^a

SLEEPING ARRANGEMENTS.

The sleeping quarters of all races, with the exception of those of the Armenians, are overcrowded and unhealthy. As a rule there are four, five, and six persons to a room, sometimes the floor space being hardly sufficient to contain the necessary beds and cots. The ventilation is bad; the rooms usually have only one window. The bedding in most cases is very much soiled and in disorder, except in the case of the Roumanians and the Magyars. The floors are uncarpeted and usually very dirty. Around the walls are hung articles of clothing of all descriptions. The sleeping rooms, in short, are very stuffy, unclean, and unhealthy among the representatives of all the races except the Armenians. The latter usually live in boarding houses, where two men occupy one room, but sleep in separate beds or cots. In cases of Armenian families the household arrangements are usually according to the American plan.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

The general living conditions may be said to be unhealthy and of a very low standard. This situation grows in large measure out of the methods of living. Living in groups, in a crowded condition, doing their own housekeeping, and the larger number occupying rooms in large lodging or rooming houses, the practice is to use one room for sleeping, cooking, eating, washing, and general living. There are very few separate dining rooms or kitchens. In some of the rooming houses washing may be done on the outside, but clothes

are generally washed and dried in the same room in which the immigrant cooks, eats, lives, and sleeps. Some groups of men and some families have separate rooms for cooking, eating, and washing, but this practice is the exception and not the general rule.

GENERAL COST OF LIVING.

Among the Bulgarians, Roumanians, Servians, and Albanians, living by the group system, either in cottages or rooming houses, the cost of food (groceries, meat, and bread), fuel, and light ranges from \$7 to \$10 per month for each person. The average runs about \$8 per month. Only in rare cases does it go beyond \$9. The food cost of the Magyar and Austrian-Servian is a little higher than that of the above-mentioned races for the reason that more meat is consumed. By reference to the detailed store account of eight Bulgarians, which follows, it will be seen that the expenditures of this group for meat ranged from 27 cents to \$2.90 per week. The Magyars are much larger meat consumers. The same store that furnished the Bulgarian account also carried an account with a Magyar man and his wife who had eight boarders, which showed that the entire group of ten were spending from \$1.50 to \$2 per day for meat. The daily consumption of meat by this group was about as follows:

In addition to the daily outlay of \$1.50 to \$2 for meat, this same Magyar group was spending from \$1.70 to \$1.80 per day for groceries.

To the above items must be added the rent, which costs each individual from 75 cents to \$1.25 per month, the average cost per individual being about \$1 per month. The washing is usually given out to Polish women and costs each person about \$1 to \$1.25 per month. Moreover, the average member of the different races spends from 5 to 25 cents per day for beer.

The total monthly cost of living among the Bulgarians, including expenditures for clothing, amusements, and all purposes, is estimated to be from \$14 to \$18. Among the Servians it is about the same. With the Roumanians it is several dollars less per month, and with the Magyar race a great deal more, the increased outlay being, in the main, purchases for meat, clothing, and intoxicants.

No data were collected as to families living separately, the number of these being very small. Practically all of the families have boarders or the wife acts as head of a boarding group. One Bulgarian and his wife, without children or boarders, who were living in two rooms in a rooming house, stated that their total cost of living per month for everything—rent, food, clothes, and incidentals—under normal conditions was \$40 per month. Of this total \$5 was for rent, \$10 for clothes and incidentals, and \$25 for all food. During the existing depression they have been paying \$4 rent and about \$20 per month for all food and incidentals, and have been buying no clothes.^a

In the table and the transcript of a store account which follow will be found the detailed expenditures for meat and groceries of eight Bulgarians, for thirteen weeks (July 22 to October 20, 1907). The store account is a transcript and translation of the account kept by a Bulgarian meat and grocery store in Hungary Hollow, from whom the men bought exclusively. The table shows in a summary way (1) the total amount purchased each week, and (2) the total amount spent per day and per week for certain commodities. It will be noted that the expenditures for meat and groceries each week ranged from \$3.12 to \$6.64, the general average for the thirteen full weeks being \$5.11. The average Bulgarian eats one 3-pound loaf of bread per day, costing 12 cents. Consequently, the amount for the eight men would be \$7.62 per week for bread, which added to the average of \$5.11 would make a total weekly expenditure for food of \$11.83. The average food expense of each member of the group, therefore, would be \$1.48 per man per week, or \$5.92 for a period of four weeks. This, of course, represents only groceries, meat, and bread. To it must be added expenditures for milk and beer taken with meals, and incidental purchases. It gives a rough idea, however, as to the cost of living, and goes to substantiate the statements received from the people themselves that it costs them from \$7 to \$10 per month for food.

The following itemized statement, upon which the foregoing table is based, is a transcript of a store account, covering a period from July 22 to October 22, 1907, and will show in more detail the amount and character of the daily purchases of the Bulgarians who live under the group system. It is apparent from the frequency with which sausage and similar items appear that the men were buying foodstuffs which could be readily cooked or which were practically ready for consumption. They did this to save the trouble of cooking. The detailed statement follows:

PURCHASES OF CLOTHING, SHOES, AND SMALL ARTICLES.

The following accounts, which have been copied from the books of alien merchants selling on credit, will serve to supplement the detailed showing as to purchases of food. The individuals whose accounts are given bought exclusively from the merchants furnishing the information. They give an exhibit of the average individual's expenditures for clothing and other articles than food. The accounts are, with one exception, taken from periods during the year 1907, in a time of prosperity and steady work, preceding the present depression, and have been selected according to the leading races in the community. They are not submitted as an accurate statement of cost of living, but are considered representative of the kind and quantity of articles purchased by the representatives of the different races.

RENTS.

The rent paid by the individual immigrant is, of course, small, because of the large number of persons who occupy a cottage or room and divide the rent among them. The average alien endeavors not to let his expenditure for rent go above \$1, and the landlord, on the other hand, seems to have departed from the usual method of fixing rents at a point where it will yield a fair return on the amount invested in the house and land by placing the rental charge on the conditions that exist—the occupancy of a room or cottage by a large number of persons who divide the rent among them.

The resultant income is out of proportion to the investment, and excessive. By way of illustration, the cottages in Hungary Hollow may be considered. These cottages usually have three rooms, although some scattered here and there have four rooms. In each of these cottages twelve to sixteen men live, paying a rent from \$14 to \$16 per month. Multiplying these amounts by twelve to get the annual rents, they are found to be \$168 and \$192, respectively. These rentals are the equivalent of an investment of \$2,800 and \$3,200. The original cost of the cottages, it is claimed, was \$1,500, although this seems to be an excessive estimate. On this basis, however, the landlords are receiving from 11 to 13 per cent gross. As the houses are badly in need of repair, practically the only deduction to be made is for taxes and insurance. The cottages are very similar to, but not so good as, those for which the southern cotton mill operatives pay a rent of \$3 to \$3.50 per month.

As far as the rooming houses are concerned, which are conducted by the mercantile establishments, and in which such a large proportion of the population lives, the rents are from \$5 to \$8 per room. Taking an average rental per room of \$5, which is a very low estimate, a mercantile house having 50 rooms to rent would receive \$250 in rentals per month, or \$3,000 annually. This amount represents the annual interest payment on \$50,000 at 6 per cent. In practice a parallel case exists to substantiate this supposition. A mercantile house in the community has 50 rooms for rent, from which it receives more than an average of \$5 per room per month. Its building cost

\$30,000. The lower floor is occupied by a saloon and two large stores. The rental from its rooms above the first floor; therefore, pays over 10 per cent on the money invested in the entire building, or, in other words, the income from the tenants pays more than the ordinary rate of return on the cost of the building, and leaves free of rent the saloon and store rooms, which are the most valuable part of the building for rental purposes.

From these illustrations, it seems clear that although the recent immigrant's per capita outgo for rent is small because he lives in a crowded condition, yet the rent he pays by groups or families is excessive, and yields an unusually large rate of return to his landlord.

COST AND MANNER OF LIVING OF REPRESENTATIVE FAMILIES AND GROUPS OF MEN.

The following summarized facts will give a more detailed conception of the cost, manner, and standard of living, of the alien population of the community, classified according to races. The different methods, as well as the cost of living are brought out clearly in this way.

GROUP 1.—BULGARIAN (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This group consists of sixteen men of Bulgarian race, living in a small frame one-story cottage, valued originally at about \$1,500. The rooms are 10 by 12, 8 by 6, and 8 by 5 feet. The furniture consists of 5 double and 2 single beds, a stove worth about \$3.50, a couple of tables and benches made out of some packing boxes, and a few plain chairs. The total value would be about \$50. There is no separate kitchen or dining-room, and the cooking is done in the largest bedroom. The men live 4 to each room. The rent of the house is \$16. Their living, exclusive of the rent, costs them on an average about \$8 each per month. They do their own cooking and housekeeping, taking turns in doing it. They buy their coal and wood and pick up some along the railroad tracks. All the men are unskilled laborers and receive from \$1.50 to \$1.60 per day in the steel works. Twelve of the 16 are married, with wives abroad, and the majority are going back to Bulgaria. One speaks English. None have taken any steps toward naturalization.

GROUP 2.—BULGARIAN (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This is a group of 16 Bulgarians living in a small cottage of 3 rooms. The rooms are the usual size, 1 large one about 10 by 12 feet, and 2 small ones about 5 by 8 and 6 by 8 feet. The cottage has a small unfenced yard. The rent is \$14, and the men spend between \$7 and \$8 each per month for food. The furniture consists of 8 cots and iron beds, small stove, several chairs and homemade tables and benches, lamp, lantern, and simple cooking utensils. The total value is about \$60. None of the rooms are carpeted. The house was in a condition of squalor, and very crowded, 5 to 6 men to a room. The men have been in the United States only seven months, and have had no work since their arrival. They had about \$20 or \$30 each when they came, but have now spent all their money and are supported by a local mercantile house. None speak English.

Fourteen of the 16 are married and have wives and families in Bulgaria. The majority state that they intend, if possible, to stay in the United States. They take turns cooking and housekeeping, and do their own washing.

GROUP 3.—BULGARIAN (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This is a group of seventeen Bulgarians living in a one-story cottage of 4 rooms. Two of the rooms are about 8 by 10 feet and two are smaller. The cottage has a small yard with dilapidated fence, and the rooms are very crowded and dirty. The rent is \$12 per month. The cost of living is from \$7 to \$8 per month in addition to rent. The men take turns cooking and housekeeping. They have been in the United States eight months. All of them are unskilled and have had little work since their arrival. Fifteen of the seventeen are married and have families in Bulgaria. None speak English. The furniture consists of seventeen cots, small stove and cooking utensils, and kerosene lamps. The total value is about \$60. There is no separate dining room or kitchen. These men had \$15 to \$30 each when they arrived in the community. All this has been spent, and they are supported by occasional work and credit at mercantile houses.

GROUP 4.—ALBANIAN (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This group of fourteen men from Albania, the only group of this race encountered, lives in a small one-story frame cottage of five rooms—four bedrooms and a small kitchen. They pay \$14 per month rent, which includes a large lot (about 50 by 50 feet) which they have converted into a garden and have under cultivation. Their food costs them about \$8 to \$9 per month per man. The garden at the time of the investigation was just beginning to yield and they expected to procure all their vegetables from it. The furniture consists of iron beds and cots, two small stoves and one large one, worth together \$15, a couple of lamps, a home-made table, and cooking utensils. There are photographs and lithographs on the walls. The total value of the furniture is about \$150. The men live four to each room. The rooms in this cottage are larger than the average, and two of the bedrooms have two windows each. The men are cleanly in their housekeeping. They have been in the United States seven or eight months, but none speak English except a 14-year-old boy. All are unskilled and have had little work. The boy, who came to this country alone "to earn money," has worked in the steel works at \$1.35 per day. Four of the men are married and have families in Albania, to which country they expect to return.

GROUP 5.—ARMENIAN FAMILY (CITY PROPER).

This group, of man, wife, and sister-in-law, lives in a three-room frame cottage of one story. The man is naturalized and runs an Armenian coffee house in Hungary Hollow. His wife is an American woman. They pay \$12.50 per month rent, and their food costs them about \$10 per week. They value their furniture at \$150.

GROUP 6.—ARMENIAN BOARDING HOUSE (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This is an Armenian boarding house in Hungary Hollow containing thirty-five men. There are two men in each room. Each room has two cots or beds, a table and a chair. There are no carpets. The men pay \$3.50 per week for rooms, light, heat, and board. Meals without rooms are \$3 per week.

GROUP 7.—BULGARIAN (IMMIGRANT SECTION OF TOWN PROPER).

This group consists of man and wife, and five Bulgarian boarders, living in two rooms in a Macedonian tenement building over a saloon and grocery store. The rent of the rooms is \$5 a month. The husband speaks a little English and is naturalized. He is 28 years old and is a bartender in a Macedonian saloon. The woman is 17 years old and has been four months in the United States. All the boarders sleep in one room. They pay \$11 per month for room and board. The furniture is valued at \$150, and includes beds, stoves, cooking utensils, and plain chairs and tables; no carpets. Each room, except the one used for cooking (an inside room), has two windows. The rooms and hallways are very dirty.

GROUP 8.—BULGARIAN (IMMIGRANT SECTION OF TOWN PROPER).

This family consists of man and wife, with neither boarders nor children. The man is 30 years old, has been in the United States eighteen months, and speaks no English. He expects to be naturalized and to remain in the United States. The woman is 28 years old. They were married in Bulgaria twelve years ago. At the time of the investigation they were living in one room in a Macedonian rooming house because the man was out of work. The rent was \$4 per month. They formerly had two rooms in the same house and paid \$5 rent. They cook, eat, sleep, and do laundry work in the one room. The furniture consists of bed, stove, homemade table, and some broken chairs, of which the total valuation is about \$35. Exclusive of rent, the man and his wife, when work was regular and conditions normal, spent \$35 per month for food, clothes, and incidentals. Their food cost about \$25 per month, and the other \$10 was spent for clothes and miscellaneous items. During the industrial depression they reduced their outlay for food \$5 per month. The kind of food used by them daily under normal conditions was about as follows:

Breakfast: Tea, cream, cheese, bread. Dinner: Bread, some kind of meat or stew. Supper: Bread, meat, meat stew, or eggs.

The man began work in this country as a common laborer at \$1.50 per day, and afterwards became a chipper in the steel works, earning between \$2 and \$3 per day. During the thirteen months during which he worked regularly the husband had saved between \$150 and \$200.

GROUP 9.—BULGARIAN (IMMIGRANT SECTION OF TOWN PROPER).

This group consists of six men (recently eight) living in two rooms in a Macedonian rooming house. The rent for the two rooms is \$5 per month. They use one to sleep in and the other as a kitchen and living room. The bedroom has two windows. The four beds completely fill

the room. The other articles of furniture are a plain table, chairs, small stove, and cooking utensils, the whole valued at about \$30. The men do their own cooking, and their food costs from \$7 to \$18 per month for each member of the group. Under normal conditions they have a Servian or Polish woman to keep house for them. She cooks, launders, keeps house, and buys the food, for which services she is paid \$20 per month. One man speaks a little English, and has taken out his first naturalization papers. The others expect to return to Bulgaria.

GROUP 10.—SLOVAK (IMMIGRANT SECTION OF TOWN PROPER).

This group consists of man and wife and three children. They occupy two rooms in a large rooming house, on the first floor, behind a saloon. They have no boarders. The rent is \$5 per month. It costs the family for rent and food from \$25 to \$30 per month. The furniture is valued at \$150. It consists of cook stove, three iron beds, bureau, cupboard, wardrobe, chairs, and table. The floors have no carpets. The rooms are well kept and clean. The man is 34 years old, has been here seven years, speaks English, and is naturalized. The woman is 27 years old, and has been in this country two years. They were married before coming to the United States. The children are girls, 8, 6½, and 1 year old. The two oldest speak English and attend the public schools. The man is a skilled blacksmith, and belongs to a labor union.

GROUP 11.—BULGARIAN FROM MACEDONIA (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This group of five Bulgarians pays \$7 per month rent for two rooms in a Bulgarian rooming house. All sleep in one room upstairs and have a small room downstairs in which they cook. All are unskilled, none speak English, and all have been in this country only seven months. They have worked irregularly at \$1.50 per day. They do their own cooking and housework and pay about \$8 per month each for food. The furniture consists of one bed, 3 cots, stove, table, and chairs, valued at about \$30. There is no carpet, and the rooms are badly kept and very dirty.

GROUP 12.—BULGARIANS FROM BULGARIA (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

Five Bulgarians, cooking, eating, and sleeping in one room, constitute this group. They have been ten months in the United States and have worked two and one-half months in a glucose factory, at \$2.08 for thirteen hours' work at night. None of them speak English, but they expect to remain in this country. They pay \$8 rent, and their food costs them from \$8 to \$10 per month per man. They take turns at keeping house and cooking, and have their washing done by a Servian woman. The furniture consists of one bed, two cots, stove, small table (homemade), and chairs, all valued at \$40.

GROUP 13.—BULGARIANS FROM MACEDONIA (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

This group consists of eleven Bulgarians living in two rooms in a Bulgarian rooming house. The rooms have two small windows. The group does its own cooking and housekeeping. Some of the men work at night and some during the day, and the night force

cooks for the day, and vice versa. They are all working at unskilled labor at a wage ranging from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per day. They pay \$12 per month rent, and their food costs each about \$7 or \$8 per month. They value their furniture, which consists of four beds, two cots, stove, chairs, and benches, at \$50. None of the men speak English, and all have been in the United States between eight months and a year.

GROUP 14.—BULGARIANS FROM MACEDONIA (HUNGARY HOLLOW).

These five Bulgarians, living, eating, cooking, and sleeping in one room in a large Bulgarian rooming house do their own cooking and housekeeping and pay from \$7 to \$8 per month each for food. They value their furniture at \$30. It consists of two beds, two cots, several chairs, and a homemade cupboard and table. All the men have been in the United States about one year, and have worked in the steel mills and on railroad construction work, at \$1.50 per day. None speak English, and all expect to return to Bulgaria.

CHAPTER VII.

SALIENT CHARACTERISTICS.

Tendency of immigrants to accept charity or become public charges—Honesty—Use of intoxicants—Religious indifference—Money on arrival—Literacy—Conjugal condition—Visits abroad—Age classification of members of households—[Text Tables 623 to 627 and General Tables 351 to 355].

TENDENCY OF IMMIGRANTS TO ACCEPT CHARITY OR BECOME PUBLIC CHARGES.

The inclination of the average recent immigrant in the community is to shift every charge he can upon the community or upon private charities. Their leaders also advocate and follow this policy. A number of recent aliens were discovered to be getting private relief who had ample means for their support. This tendency is not so general, however, as that exhibited in cases of sickness or death. All possible means are adopted to secure the entrance to a public hospital of the alien who is ill. In a similar way the effort is made to have a destitute countryman buried at the public expense, even though friends and leading men among them could well provide for the funeral expenses.

HONESTY.

One of the most striking qualities of all the races is their simplicity and honesty. They trust each other in pecuniary matters in a way that is amazing to an American, incurring debts without giving any evidence and intrusting their savings to the safe-keeping of business enterprises of their fellow-countrymen without demanding acknowledgment. This quality, as may be readily seen, affords a rich field for exploitation and questionable practices by the less scrupulous among the recent immigrants. They are not slow to take advantage of it, and the steamship agent, the labor agent, the immigrant banker, and business man reap immense profits from the credulity of their fellow-countrymen. In many cases they not only exact an exorbitant charge for the services rendered or the commodities supplied, but go further and rob him of all his savings. This was illustrated recently in one place by the failure of a number of so-called bankers to return money committed to their charge, and also by the bankruptcy of a mercantile house which had secured its capital—about \$40,000—in small amounts from the savings of the laborers. These men, who were mostly Bulgarians, had entrusted the various sums to their countrymen without requiring any evidence of the transaction, and when the mercantile house failed they could scarcely avoid losing all their savings (the case is now pending) because they had no proof that they had invested anything in the enterprise.

There seems to be a tendency among the more intelligent and educated immigrants to exploit their more ignorant countrymen. After they have acquired a knowledge of the English language and have become acquainted with the customs of the country, they are naturally called upon to act as advisers to and representatives of their countrymen, and instead of using their attainments and knowledge for the profit and welfare of the members of their own race, the almost universal tendency is for the more educated foreigners to take advantage of his countrymen's ignorance and faith.

USE OF INTOXICANTS.

The Bulgarians, Roumanians, and Servians use beer and other intoxicants in a temperate way. The Magyar, Austrian-Servian, and Croatian tend to frequent saloons and drink beer and other intoxicants intemperately. The Austrian-Servians when under the influence of liquor fight, and are the principal factors in causing trouble and disorder.

RELIGIOUS INDIFFERENCE.

The recent immigrants as a group take little interest in church work or attendance upon church worship. This disinclination, or rather indifference or lack of inclination toward religious matters, grows out of the fact, it is stated, that most of the recent races to come to this community were alienated from their churches during the struggles for liberty in their native countries.^a A further explanation is made to the effect that the alien churches are closely connected with and receive a large measure of support from the State in southern and eastern Europe, and that where transplanted to this country and separated from the State they are at a loss in handling the new situation and tend to become unreasonable in their exactions and thus alienate the people.

MONEY ON ARRIVAL.

As a rule the immigrant on his arrival in the community has in his possession from \$10 to \$20 in money. The usual amount each man has is about \$15.

LITERACY.

The table next presented shows, by sex and by general nativity and race of individual, the literacy of persons 10 years of age or over in the households studied.

The preceding table shows a higher degree of literacy among the Magyar males than among the Bulgarian males, 91.1 per cent of the former as compared with 68.3 per cent of the latter being able to read. Too few females are reported by the Bulgarians for computation of percentages, but 92.6 per cent of the Magyar females are able to read. In all cases, with the exception of a slight falling off in the proportion of Bulgarian males, the same proportion of each race can both read and write as are able to read.

It will be observed in the schedules that literacy, or illiteracy, is often peculiar to groups as a whole. This is accounted for by the fact that each group is usually composed of men from the same village. If the village was favorable to the establishment of a secret school, the whole group is literate. If not, as in a garrisoned town, the whole group is illiterate.

The relation between period of residence and literacy is set forth in the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race of individual, the percentage of foreign-born persons 10 years of age or over, in the households studied, who read and the percentage who read and write.

The preceding table shows a rapid advancement in literacy among the Bulgarians according to period of residence in the United States, 67 per cent of the representatives of this race of a period of residence under 5 years, as compared with 94.1 per cent who have been in the United States from five to nine years, being able to read, while 94.1 per cent who have been here from five to nine years can read and write, as contrasted with 66.8 per cent of a period of residence under five years who are so reported. On the other hand, illiteracy prevails more extensively among the Magyar immigrants of a longer period of residence than among those who have been in the country only a few years, 87.5 per cent of the persons of this race who have been in the United States ten years or over, as compared with 89.7 per cent of a residence between five and nine years and 92 per cent of a residence under five years, being able to read and write. The higher proportion of literacy among those of a short residence is probably due to the presence of children in the households or to better schools during recent years in Hungary.

The following table shows, by age at time of coming to the United States and race of individual, the percentage of foreign-born persons 10 years of age or over, in the households studied, who read and percentage of those who read and write:

All of the Magyars, as can be seen from the table above, who were under 14 years of age when they came to this country are now able to read and write, as contrasted with 91.1 per cent who can read and write at the present time and who were 14 years of age or over when they arrived in the United States. The Bulgarians who were under 14 years of age when they came to this country are not shown in sufficient numbers for the computation of percentages; but of those who were 14 years of age or over when they immigrated 67.8 per cent can read and 67.6 per cent can read and write.

Upon referring to the totals in the foregoing table it is seen that 77.1 per cent of the Bulgarian males who are 20 years of age or over, together with 68.8 per cent of the Magyar males and all of the Magyar females, are married. Twenty-nine and nine-tenths per cent of the Magyar males who are 20 years of age or older, as contrasted with 22.3 per cent of the Bulgarians, are single. Of the Bulgarian males between 20 and 29 years of age, 33.9 per cent are unmarried, together with 59.2 per cent of the Magyar males; but among those between 30 and 44 years of age only 1.9 per cent of the Bulgarians and 1.4 per cent of the Magyars are single, while none of the Bulgarians who are 45 years of age or over are unmarried, and only 8.3 per cent of the Magyars.

VISITS ABROAD.

Among the Bulgarians, Roumanians, and Servians the tendency to move from one place to another is very strong. This tendency grows largely out of the economic motive, the desire to secure more profitable work, but aside from this there also seems to be a desire among these races to seek change of work and environment. In satisfying this inclination to change, a large part of their savings are lost in paying transportation and fees of labor agents.

AGE CLASSIFICATION OF MEMBERS OF HOUSEHOLDS.

The table next presented shows, by sex and by general nativity and race of head of household, the per cent of persons, in the households studied, within each age group:

Of the total number of foreign-born persons studied in the community, it is seen from the preceding table that 89.5 per cent of the Bulgarians are from 20 to 44 years of age, the largest proportion being from 20 to 29 years old. The Bulgarians have practically no children in the households studied and very few persons over 45 years of age. On the other hand, although 68.9 per cent of the Magyars are between the ages of 20 and 44 years, and the largest percentage, as in the case of the Bulgarians, are 20 to 29 years of age, the households of this race, in contrast to the Bulgarians, show

10.5 per cent of children under 6 years of age and 3.6 per cent from 6 to 13 years old. The Magyars also have a larger proportion of persons who are more than 45 years old. As regards the males, the largest proportions both of the Bulgarians and Magyars are 20 to 29 years of age, the next highest percentage shown by the households of each race being between 30 and 34 years old. The Magyars, in contrast with the Bulgarians, also show a considerable proportion of males under 6 years of age and a small proportion between the ages of 6 and 13 years. Of the 6 Bulgarian females 4 are between the ages of 30 and 44 years, while the remaining 2 are under 6 years of age. On the other hand, 16.4 per cent of the Magyar females are between 16 and 19 years old, 37 per cent between 20 and 29 years, and 19.2 per cent between 30 and 44 years old; 17.8 per cent of the Magyar females are also under 6 years of age.

CHAPTER VIII.

IMMIGRANT SOCIETIES AND INSTITUTIONS.

Mercantile houses—Newspapers—Systems of control—Churches and church work.

MERCANTILE HOUSES.

A peculiar form of business organization exists among the aliens both in the immigrant sections of the towns and in Hungary Hollow. It consists in uniting under one head all the different forms of business enterprise which are conducted in the community and really embodies the attempt on the part of one business house to satisfy all the wants of the people. One concern not only supplies bread, meat, clothes, and other necessities of life, but also intoxicants, dance halls, summer gardens, billiard and pool halls, banking facilities, and even the weekly newspaper. Profits are secured from supplying the whole possible scale of wants on the part of the alien population.

These business organizations are termed "mercantile houses," and they consist of a number of separate enterprises united under one central management somewhat like an American holding company with subsidiary corporations. In the case of the mercantile houses, the business of the concern centers in the banks. These banks, which are practically only one part of the firm's business, act as a central point of management, as a clearing house, and as a means of coordinating all the different interests of the concern. The businesses are not incorporated and are usually owned by one man or a group of men under an informal partnership. A typical house of this description will own a number of brick buildings, located perhaps in different sections but usually grouped together, the ground floors of which are used to house its different stores and enterprises, and the upper floors—sometimes containing more than 50 rooms—are rented for living purposes. The extent of the business conducted may be seen from an examination of the following list of undertakings which may be owned and managed by a typical mercantile house:

The stores of these concerns, especially the grocery stores, are as good if not better than the average American store, and the saloons are the counterpart of the average American saloon. The bakeries turn out Bulgarian bread—a loaf weighing 4 pounds—and have a

capacity of 400 to 700 loaves per day. So far as the real estate business is concerned, the mercantile house of course rents its own living rooms, and those in Hungary Hollow usually own a number of cottages and act as agents for American real estate firms which have extensive holdings in adjacent lands and cottages. The steamship-agency element in the business is simply an agency for selling transportation on the different Atlantic steamship lines, for which the mercantile houses receive a commission. It is commonly stated however, that, by taking advantage of his ignorance, they also charge the purchaser of the ticket a commission.

The coffeehouses are of the same kind as those found in other alien localities and are modeled after similar institutions in Europe. They are intended to cater to the tastes and habits of the Bulgarians, Armenians, and Roumanians who do not patronize the American saloon or drink intoxicants after the manner of the Germans, Austrians, Magyars, and the members of other races. The coffeehouses are usually large, well-lighted rooms, furnished with small tables and plain chairs. Tobacco in all its forms, including even the Turkish pipe, is to be had, and tea, coffee, cider, soft drinks, and ice cream are served. The walls are decorated with cheap pictures of representative men and women, scenes, and events in Macedonia and Bulgaria. A phonograph is always at hand. These institutions are primarily a place of rendezvous and social resort for the alien population. They tend to retard Americanization by segregating the alien population, and preventing contact with Americans and American habits, and in preserving Old World customs and institutions.

The immigrant bank, as mentioned before, is the central accounting and executive office of the mercantile house. All the individual accounts are here brought together from the various subsidiary concerns and collected. The steamship and real estate agency is also conducted in direct connection with it. In addition to these functions a banking business is carried on somewhat similar to the American system of banking. Deposits are received subject to check upon the usual American plan. A copy of the deposit slip in general use is presented herewith :

Close working connections are maintained with similar institutions in Indianapolis, Chicago, and New York, and with some banks abroad or some foreign banking association. By means of these connections, bills of exchange are sold and cashed on all domestic and foreign points. Checks of alien laborers are also cashed. The deposits come not only from the immigrants residing in the community but from others in all parts of the country, even as far west as the Pacific Coast. The methods by which they are made productive could not be clearly ascertained. The custom seems to be to lend the funds to aliens engaged in business undertakings in the locality, to use them in the business of the concern itself, or to lend them to other immigrant and foreign banks. As the recent immigrant is likely to be thrifty, his savings in the aggregate are considerable and are allowed to accumulate from month to month without being subject to numerous drafts. The profits arising from the control and use of these savings are a large item in the combined profits of the mercantile houses. The extent of the deposits may be judged from the fact that one of the largest immigrant banks in Hungary Hollow usually carries \$25,000 in deposits.

These banking establishments are equipped with all the modern facilities, including adding machines and typewriters with the characters of the Bulgarian alphabet. While they usually have large safes, they are without vaults and the cash reserve is usually deposited in American banks in the community. A large number of the banks are conducted by men who have had experience in practical banking in Bulgaria or Turkey. There are some small banks of a crude "wild cat" sort. They are not responsible institutions, but are practically controlled by one person in whom other aliens have confidence and with whom they leave their money for safekeeping. The person or banker receiving the money usually puts it into some business in which he is interested. A number of such banks, at the outbreak of the recent industrial depression, were unable to return the money left with them and were discredited. Another banker of the same kind used the money which he received in building a large mercantile house which he failed to conduct successfully and which is now in the hands of his creditors.

Each mercantile house operates in conjunction with its other business one or more saloons. These saloons in their appointments and in the liquors sold are a reproduction of the American institution. In addition to the bar there is usually a large open space filled with tables and chairs, and the larger part of the patronage comes from those who occupy these seats. A billiard and pool room—usually pool tables alone—is operated by the saloon keeper either in the same or an adjoining room. A large part of the business of the saloon arises from the sale of intoxicants—usually beer—in quantities to the aliens of all nationalities who are in the habit of drinking beer with their food. The direct patronage of the saloon comes from the Austrian, Servian, and Magyar, and to a less extent the Croatian. These races drink in saloons and are also the cause of a great deal of disorder. The Bulgarians as a rule do not drink in saloons except on holidays or special occasions. They consume beer chiefly with their meals at home.

Under normal conditions each individual member of these races will drink from two to four bottles of beer per day.

The mercantile houses also go so far as to provide facilities for amusement and recreation. The greater number of them have in their building large assembly halls, containing a small stage with scenery and equipment of the usual kind. Amateur and regular performances are given on these stages. Each week there is also a dance, and the dance and play are usually given together. In one corner of the room a bar is located and the mercantile house sells drinks of all kinds during the play or the dance. In addition to its saloon and dance hall, one mercantile house conducts a summer garden during the warm weather. There all nationalities are said to mingle together, drink and talk, and sing the songs of their native countries. American amusement resorts, such as moving-picture exhibitions and the theater, are also patronized by the immigrant. In their homes and rooms one or more men are usually found who can play on some musical instrument of their native country. Often these musicians gather together in groups to form a sort of band and play together in the streets of the foreign section or in their quarters.

There was no direct evidence to the effect that the mercantile houses were conducting employment agencies and the managers of the various houses vigorously denied that they were engaged in this business.

At the same time it was evident that they were the potent factors in controlling public opinion, and in bringing about the constant changes in the population or the labor supply. They acted in an advisory capacity, to say the least, in writing and providing means for aliens to come to the community. In these services they claimed they were acting in a disinterested way. It was apparent, however, that the existence of a large and more or less stable labor supply added greatly to the profits of their business. Whether, in addition, any fee was charged for securing employment for their countrymen, was not discovered. There is no doubt that all the mercantile house managers kept themselves informed as to the demand for labor in other localities—especially in railroad construction work—and that correspondence with contractors who were desirous of securing workmen was carried on by the mercantile establishments. The usual procedure was to make known privately or at a public meeting the contents of these letters and to advise with the men as regards accepting work elsewhere.

A number of private labor agents were also encountered. Several Chicago and Cincinnati labor agencies published advertisements in the alien press and had representatives in the community.

No detailed information was sought as to the profits of mercantile establishments, but several examples of their rapid expansion of business and the extent of their property holdings will throw considerable light upon this point. One of the leading establishments in Hungary Hollow was started four years ago by a Bulgarian, an ordinary unskilled laborer, who had saved \$90. This was the original capital invested. The company now operates a grocery and dry goods store, a coffee house, bakery, saloon, and bank, steamship and other agencies, and rents about 100 rooms. Its business is housed in one large brick building, one stone building, and one frame building. These buildings have been paid for out of the profits of the business and are worth about \$40,000. The company also owns eight cottages, valued at \$1,500 each, and which are also paid for.

It also owns the semiweekly newspaper and conducts a restaurant. The equipment and stocks of its various concerns at a very conservative estimate must be worth more than \$10,000. Its receipts from collections, exclusive of its general credit and cash business, were about \$12,000 each monthly pay day. At the time of the panic of 1907 it carried \$25,000 in deposits, and since the existing depression started all of its depositors have been paid in full.

Another typical illustration is furnished by the establishment of two Bulgarians from Macedonia. These men started a small bakery four years ago and since that time have extended their business to include a bank, saloon, grocery, dry goods store, mineral baths, steamship agency, assembly rooms, etc. They also rent over 100 living rooms and have recently established a branch house, consisting of a grocery, saloon, and bakery in Hammond, Ind. Their various interests in Community E are housed in three brick buildings, valued at \$75,000. Their deposits before the depression were \$6,000 and have been paid in full since the panic of last autumn. The remarkable fact to be noted in connection with these establishments is that the expansion of business has been made through the profits realized. If their modest beginnings are considered in comparison with their present status, a conception of their profits may be reached. At the same time the inference is almost irresistible that such profits could not have been earned by ordinary business methods and that these concerns must have made exceptional gains from labor agencies or similar sources.

The conception of the business life of the communities would not be complete, however, without citing mercantile concerns which have been established under conditions unlike those mentioned above. Two classes of such concerns will be sufficient: (1) Those established by outside capital, and (2) those established by bringing together the savings of aliens living in the locality. As an illustration of the first class, a Macedonian firm in Hungary Hollow may be cited. This mercantile house was started in 1907. The capital, about \$25,000, was furnished by a merchant who has an establishment in Macedonia, and it is managed by a Macedonian who, until coming to Hungary Hollow, was engaged in the banking business in Constantinople. It has all the varied interests of the establishments mentioned in detail above. An example of the second class is furnished by another Bulgarian house. These men secured from laborers who had confidence in them \$50,000 and built a \$30,000 brick building containing stores, saloon, fifty-two living rooms, and a theater. After the establishment had been operated for a number of months it failed and passed into control of a commissioner in bankruptcy. The explanations for its failure are twofold: (1) That it did not have sufficient working capital, and (2) that it was improperly promoted and managed. The latter reason seems to be correct.

These examples are typical of the larger-scale business enterprises. There are numerous cases of smaller businesses conducted by aliens, including saloons, coffeehouses, smaller general mercantile houses, shops of various kinds, independent bakeries, bottling works, and hotels or lodging houses and restaurants. The larger mercantile houses, as described above, however, control and give the stamp to the business life of the immigrant sections.

NEWSPAPERS.

Two newspapers, one issued weekly and the other twice a week, are published in Hungary Hollow, and both are controlled by mercantile houses. The Bulgarian semiweekly paper has been published for about six months and circulates among Bulgarians throughout the country. It is printed wholly in the Bulgarian language, edited by a Bulgarian who has been in this country five years, and the typesetting is done by Bulgarian compositors. The press work is by an American printing company. The reading matter covers local happenings and a digest of the world's news, with special reference to Bulgaria and the Balkan peninsula.

The weekly publication is published by a so-called Macedonian Association, which is in reality a business partnership controlled by a local mercantile house. It has been in existence only for two years and its tenure of life seems to be uncertain. It is edited by a Bulgarian who was a student at the University of Chicago and later received the degree of doctor of philosophy at the University of Pennsylvania. He has also published several small books in the English language. The newspaper is printed partly in Bulgarian and partly in English, and the composition and press work is done by Macedonians. This publication occupies a small building in Hungary Hollow, while the Bulgarian journal has an attractive office in the town proper. The two newspapers depend largely for their maintenance upon local advertising, but secure considerable general advertising also from steamship companies, labor agencies, and similar sources. Neither of them has a large circulation, as they have been in existence for only a short period of time, and the illiteracy among the Macedonian and Bulgarian peoples is very great. Their combined circulation is probably not more than 3,000 copies. They represent opposing business and political factions in the life of Hungary Hollow.

The motive of the rival mercantile houses in controlling these publications is twofold: (1) they desire to control as far as possible public opinion in the locality, and (2) they can use the papers for advertising their general business in the localities and the banking branch of their establishments among Bulgarians elsewhere from whom they wish to secure deposits.

SYSTEMS OF CONTROL.

The immigrant sections lie within the police jurisdiction of the two regular towns of the community under the control of the regularly constituted police authorities. The immigrants also make the customary complaint against the police and the police judges and justices of the peace. They claim that they have been arrested on various pretexts, some of which had no foundation, and have been fined heavily. They also assert that the fines imposed have not been in conformity with the offense charged, but have been levied according to the judge's opinion of the resources of the prisoner.

Hungary Hollow, which stands in an isolated position so far as the American section is concerned, and which, legally speaking, is governed by the authorities of the larger American town, has a unique system of public control and self-government for the decision of questions which particularly interest its population. Public

opinion is largely influenced by the alien press, and the press in turn, as before pointed out, is controlled by representative mercantile houses. Representative men, however—usually the heads of mercantile houses—are the most potent factors in the control of public opinion. Each mercantile house, as already described, has from 50 to 500 immigrants who room in its buildings or purchase their supplies from its stores. The typical mercantile house will have a patronage ranging in number from four to five hundred persons. These aliens not only make their purchases from the mercantile house, but tend, on account of their ignorance of the language and American customs, to look to the manager of the mercantile house for advice in all the affairs of life. He becomes a sort of patron to them, and develops a paternalistic attitude toward his entire clientele. He communicates to them the opportunities for work and advises them whether they should accept or reject work which is offered to them. In these and other ways he gains and retains a hold on a large part of the alien population.

The population, as a natural result, tends to become divided into certain factions, the leadership of which centers in the various mercantile houses. The immigrants readily follow the advice of their leaders, and the system of control, therefore, narrows down to a contest between a group of leaders resembling somewhat in their influence and activities the small American political boss. In Hungary Hollow the various factors of influence and control seem to extend outward from two leading Bulgarian mercantile houses.

The ostensible control in the community is vested in a mass meeting of the alien population, before which various questions are put and discussed. While these questions are argued pro and con by the leaders, and the population is theoretically free to act as it deems best, practically each individual's decision is influenced by his affiliations with certain leaders and the forces which they can bring to bear upon him. By way of illustration, some southern sugar planters recently offered to employ a number of laborers on their plantations. The communication to the people of the community came through a Bulgarian labor agent who was affiliated in his interests with one of the mercantile houses, which in turn controlled one of the Bulgarian newspapers as well as various business interests. A mass meeting was called to consider the proposition of the southern planters. The faction represented by the labor agent urged strongly the acceptance of the offer. On the other hand its acceptance was vigorously opposed by another Bulgarian mercantile establishment, on the ground of peonage in the South. Men were placed before the meeting who had been in the South, and the evil conditions there were described by the editor of the *Naroden Glas*, the newspaper owned by the opposing mercantile house, and the request made that no Bulgarians accept the work in the South. As the result of this opposition the men decided not to go and the proposition was rejected.

This illustration serves to show that in a segregated community such as Hungary Hollow a form of direct democracy is developed to control local affairs, or, rather, to consider and decide questions and policies that affect the community. Apparently these questions are debated and a decision reached by a popular expression of opinion. In reality the mass meeting is more a form than an actual working

force, and the ultimate factors of control and determination are in the hands of certain leaders, the heads of mercantile houses, who largely direct the community's affairs by the influences they are able to exert through their various interests.

CHURCHES AND CHURCH WORK.

There are no distinctly foreign churches in the community that have been erected and maintained by recent immigrants. The Bulgarians projected and partly constructed a Greek Catholic church, but it was found necessary to discontinue the work on account of the industrial depression. The building is extensive and when completed will cost between \$20,000 and \$30,000. About \$10,000 has been already expended in its erection.

Two Protestant churches maintain alien missionaries at good salaries, who work among the recent immigrants.

The recent immigrants, as a rule, seem to be very lax in their adherence to and support of the church. This is in large measure to be accounted for on the ground that during the recent struggles for liberty and greater personal and civil privileges in their home countries the orthodox church supported the old institutions and rules, and, as a consequence, alienated the population.

CHAPTER IX.

GENERAL PROGRESS AND ASSIMILATION.

Ownership of homes—Schools—Citizenship—Ability to speak English—[Text Tables 628 to 632 and General Tables 356 to 361].

OWNERSHIP OF HOMES.

The following table shows the number and percentage of families owning homes, by general nativity and race of head of family:

From the above table it will be seen that, of a total of 50 families, only 12 per cent are shown as owning homes. Of the two races appearing in the table the Magyar is the only one reporting a sufficient number for computation, 10.6 per cent of the households of this race having acquired their own homes.

SCHOOLS.

Both of the towns of the community are well supplied with school facilities, the largest having a high-school building, the erection of which cost \$50,000. There are also two parochial schools conducted by the Lutheran and orthodox Catholic churches.

Because of the fact that there are few families and children among recent immigrants the school attendance of Bulgarians and other races of southeastern Europe is, comparatively speaking, small. There are at present 10 students of recent arrival, from 18 to 20 years, attending the public schools in the community. Two of these are in the fifth grade and eight in the second grade. Before the industrial depression and the recent exodus there were 25 in the graded schools who had recently come to the United States. The alien missionaries maintained by the local Protestant churches in addition to their other duties teach the Bulgarians and other for-

eigners English on Sunday afternoons. One missionary also maintains a day and night school, where English and other branches are taught to the newcomers, and a small tuition fee charged. The recent immigrants as a rule are very anxious to learn English and oftentimes when visited in their rooms are found to be laboriously studying alone. This tendency does not indicate primarily any desire to become Americans in the full sense of the term, but in a large degree is an economic motive growing out of the realization that they must know the language in order to find full play for their energies in the United States and to work out fully their own economic welfare.

CITIZENSHIP.

The table presented below shows, by race of individual, the present political condition of foreign-born males, in the households studied, who had been in the United States 5 years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming to this country.

In the total of 12 Bulgarians furnishing complete data for the above table, none are fully naturalized and only one has secured first papers. Of the Magyars, none are fully naturalized, but 5 of the total of 28, or 17.9 per cent, have secured their first papers.

ABILITY TO SPEAK ENGLISH.

The Magyar and Slovak men can practically all speak English. Their wives usually can not, or only to a very limited extent, because they do not come in constant contact with Americans, and the native language is spoken in the home. The children in these and other immigrants' families, as well as the young boys who have immigrated alone, can usually speak English fluently.

The Servians, Roumanians, Bulgarians, and Armenians as a rule do not speak English. Not more than 5 in 100 can speak English so as to make themselves understood, and a smaller percentage than this can speak the language intelligently and fluently.

The following table shows, by sex and by general nativity and race of individual, the percentage of persons 6 years of age or over, in the households studied, who are able to speak English:

The preceding table shows the significant fact that only 6.8 per cent of the Bulgarians are able to speak English. A relatively more favorable showing is made by the Magyars, but even in the case of this race only 29.5 per cent of the males and 18.2 per cent of the females, or 26.9 per cent of the total, speak English.

The greater aptitude and progress of the younger immigrants, as compared with the older, in acquiring the English language is exhibited in the following table, which shows, by age at time of coming to the United States and race of individual, the percentage of persons 6 years of age or over, in the households studied, who speak English:

As can be readily seen from the preceding table, the number of the Bulgarians who were under 14 years of age at the time of their arrival in the United States is too small for computation of percentage, and consequently no comparison can be made between those under 14 with those over 14 at the time of their immigration to this country. On the other hand, a much larger proportion of the Magyars who were less than 14 years old when they came to the United States are at present able to speak English, as compared with those who were 14 years old or over at the time of their arrival.

The relation between period of residence and ability to speak English is set forth in the following table, which shows, according to years in the United States and race of individual, the per cent of foreign-born persons 6 years of age or over, in the households studied, who speak English.

The foregoing table shows in a pronounced way in the case of both the Bulgarians and Magyars an increase in ability to speak English corresponding to the period of residence in the United States. Only 5.4 per cent of the Bulgarians who have been in the United States less than 5 years are able to speak English, while 47.1 per cent of a residence between five and nine years have acquired the use of the language. Twenty and nine-tenths per cent of the Magyars who have been in the country under five years, 48.7 per cent of a residence between five and nine years, and 62.5 per cent of a residence ten years or over are able to speak English.

PART IV.—IRON AND STEEL MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY IN THE SOUTH.

GENERAL SURVEY.

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

Territory covered—Employees for whom information was secured—Preparation of data—[Text Table 633 and General Table 362].

TERRITORY COVERED.

In making a study of the iron and steel workers in the Southern States, the investigation was confined to furnaces and mills of Maryland and Alabama for two reasons: (1) The iron and steel industry is more important in these States than in any others of the South with the possible exception of Kentucky, and (2) Alabama and Maryland are the only two States in which persons of foreign birth are extensively employed. In the remaining iron and steel producing localities in the southern territory native white and negro labor is almost exclusively used.

EMPLOYEES FOR WHOM INFORMATION WAS SECURED.

The intensive investigation of households was limited to Alabama and the information secured is presented in connection with the study of the Birmingham district. Detailed information was obtained for 8,325 individual iron and steel workers in Maryland and Alabama. The number reporting, when compared with the total number employed, is considered sufficiently large to render the statistics presented representative.

The following table and its accompanying chart show the number and percentage of male employees of each race studied:

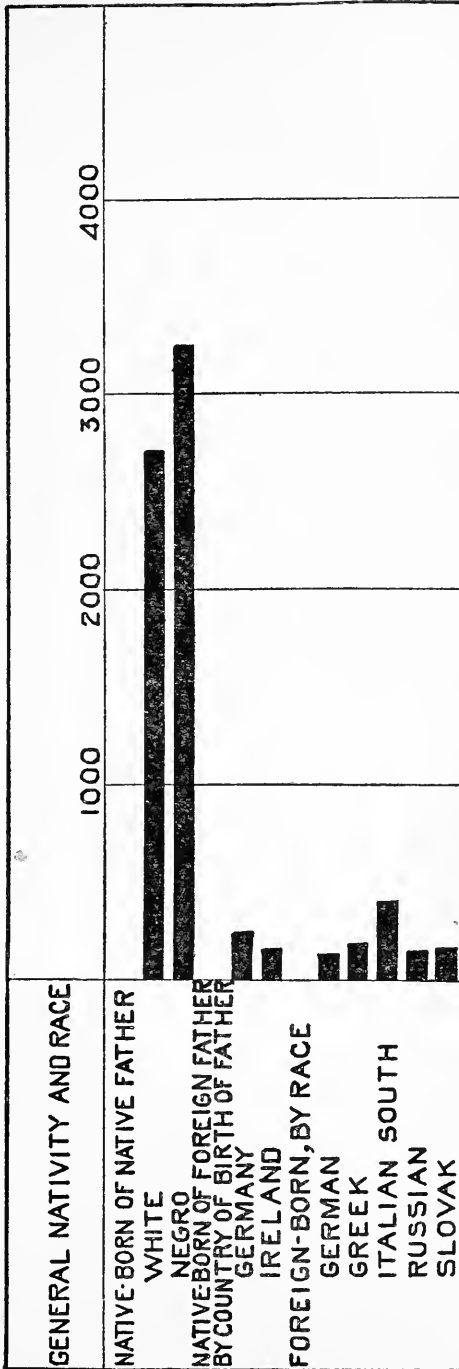

PREPARATION OF DATA.

In preparing this study for publication it was considered advisable to set forth, as in other localities, the salient facts relative to the immigrant iron and steel workers in a general survey based upon the information received from employees. To this has been added a detailed study of the Birmingham district, setting forth the economic and other effects of immigration upon the southern iron and steel center.

CHAPTER II.

RACIAL DISPLACEMENTS.

History of immigration—Period of residence in the United States of foreign-born employees—Racial classification of employees at the present time—[Text Tables 634 to 639 and General Table 363].

HISTORY OF IMMIGRATION.

Data showing in detail the history of immigration to the iron and steel industry in the South according to race are not available. Information of considerable value in this connection is supplied, however, by the reports of the United States Census, showing in a general way the composition of the working forces of the furnaces and steel mills in the years 1880, 1890, and 1900. These statistics are presented in the following tables:

It will be noted that the classification of workers is different for each census. The census report of 1880 presents data showing the country of birth of the workers, both race and parentage being disregarded, and the census of 1890 indicates country of birth and, in addition, the number of colored workers and the general parentage of the native-born whites. In the census of 1900, on the other hand, the principles of presentation followed in both the preceding censuses have been abandoned, and the workers have been classified according to general nativity and color and country of birth of parents. Because of this difference in classification it is impossible to make an exact comparison between the returns for the several periods, but country of birth of parents, in connection with the figures showing the number of native whites of foreign parentage, doubtless indicates origin with a precision sufficient for the purposes of a general study.

In studying the table further it will be noted that none of the countries of southern or eastern Europe were included in the classifications of the censuses of 1880 and 1890, any employees born in the countries referred to being classified under the caption "Other countries." The figures of the tables show that the States of the South leading in the manufacture of iron and steel are, at the present time, Alabama, Kentucky, Maryland, Tennessee, and Virginia. In the composition of the working force according to color and nativity, Alabama and Maryland are seen to be representative of conditions in the section, and for this reason, as already pointed out, have been selected for detailed study.

In 1880 the development of the iron and steel industry in Alabama had hardly begun. The total number of employees reported for the State was 352 as against 1,800, the returns for Maryland. All but a very few of the Alabama employees were native-born, while over 15 per cent of the Maryland employees were of foreign birth. Of the foreign-born employees reported for Maryland the largest number were of German and the second largest number of Irish birth. Only 12 individuals were reported under the caption "Other countries." The classification of this census supplies no information as to color. Undoubtedly, however, a few of the native-born employees in Maryland and a very large proportion of those in Alabama were negroes.

In the decade from 1880 to 1890, while the number of employees in Alabama increased tenfold as against an increase of only about one-third in Maryland, there seems to have been but little change in the composition of the working force in either State. The figures of Table 634 show that in 1890 considerably more than one-half of the employees in Alabama were negroes and that only about 10 per cent were foreign-born. Among the foreign-born, natives of Great Britain, Ireland, and Germany had, in the order mentioned, the largest representation. Of the Maryland employees, slightly over one-sixth were foreign-born persons from Germany, Ireland, and Great Britain, while between 2 and 3 per cent were negroes. Neither in Alabama nor in Maryland were there more than a very few individuals of southern or eastern European nativity.

Between 1890 and 1900 the number of employees in Maryland increased about 50 per cent and the number in Alabama increased more than 100 per cent. At the same time the composition of the working force changed to a certain degree in Maryland, but hardly at all in Alabama. The proportion of negroes increased very materially. Among the foreign-born the proportion of individuals of southern and eastern European nativity was still very small. In Alabama almost two-thirds of all the employees were negroes and only a little over 5 per cent were of foreign birth, a percentage considerably lower than the corresponding percentage for 1890. The proportion of persons of southern and eastern European parentage was even smaller than in Maryland.

The figures of the tables presented show that up to 1900 the South had not received any considerable proportion of the tide of recent immigration which has become so material a factor in the iron and steel industry in other sections of the country. Since 1900, however, the number of southern and eastern Europeans employed has mate-

rially increased, the operating forces of the furnaces and mills in Alabama and Maryland being largely recruited from the labor supply from this source.

PERIOD OF RESIDENCE IN THE UNITED STATES OF FOREIGN-BORN EMPLOYEES.

The period of residence in this country of foreign-born iron and steel workers does not afford as satisfactory an insight into racial movements to the South as in the case in other localities, for the reason that direct immigration to the South is comparatively small, the incoming immigrant usually living for a short time at least in other sections before migrating to the southern States.

The following tables, however, are of value in showing by race the percentage of foreign-born male employees for whom information was received who had been in the United States each specified number of years. The columns showing proportions in the United States under five years in the first table are grouped in one column in the second table.

As regards the 1,788 foreign-born male employees, concerning whom information was obtained in this locality, 60 per cent have been in the United States under five years. Only 8.7 per cent have been in the United States under one year, while 18.2, 17.7, 10.3, and 5.1 per cent have been in the United States one, two, three, and four years, respectively. Of those who have been in the United States for a longer period, 12.5 have a residence of from five to nine, 4.4 a residence of from ten to fourteen, 5.5 from fifteen to nineteen, and 17.6 per cent a residence of twenty years or over. No Swedes or Germans and only 1 per cent of the English and 1.2 per cent of the Irish, as compared with 20.3 per cent of the Greeks and slightly smaller proportions of the Russians and South Italians, have been in the United States under one year. The Bulgarians, 68.3 per cent of whom have been in the United States one year, show a considerably larger proportion with this period of residence than do the Greeks and a very much larger proportion than do the Russians, South Italians, or North Italians, the last named reporting 22.1 per cent. No Irish, Lithuanians, or Scotch, and only 1.5 per cent of the Germans and 2 per cent of the English, report a residence of one year. The proportions of English, Irish, and German with a residence of two and three years, as contrasted with the proportions of the other races, are very low. No Bulgarians, and only 1.2 per cent of the Irish, as compared with 15.2 per cent of the Slovaks and 12.5 per cent of the Lithuanians, report in the four-year group. The proportions of the other races with this period of residence range from 7.8 per cent of the North Italians to 2.1 per cent of the Russians.

The Greeks, Russians, and Irish again show very small proportions, as compared with the other races, with a residence of from five to nine years, while the Slovaks, with 27.8 per cent, closely followed by the Lithuanians, show comparatively large proportions. No Greeks have

been in the United States longer than nine and no Russians longer than fourteen years. The Russians report the smallest proportion with a residence of fourteen years, while the Lithuanians, with 10.4 per cent, report the largest. As regards those who have been in the United States from fifteen to nineteen years, the Germans, with 15.7 per cent, show a slightly larger proportion than the Swedes, Poles, English, or Irish, and a considerably larger proportion than any of the other races. Only 1 per cent of the South Italians and only very small proportions of the other races of recent immigration have been in the United States twenty years or over. The proportions of the Irish, English, Germans, and Scotch with this period of residence range from 71.8 to 48.5 per cent.

RACIAL CLASSIFICATION OF EMPLOYEES AT THE PRESENT TIME.

The racial composition of the operating forces of the industry in the South at the present time is set forth in the following table, which shows the number and percentage of male employees of each race for whom information was secured:

In comparing the totals of the preceding table, the significant feature disclosed is the large proportion of native-born employees as compared with the foreign-born and the native-born of foreign father. The white employees, native-born of native father, form 32.6 per cent of the total number furnishing information, and the negroes of the same nativity group, 39.1 per cent. On the other hand, the employees of native birth but of foreign father constitute only 6.9 per cent and the foreign-born 21.5 per cent of the total. The principal races of foreign birth employed in the South and furnishing information for the preceding table are the South Italians, Greeks, Slovaks, Russians, and Germans, and the second generation is made up principally of Germans and Irish.



CHAPTER III.

ECONOMIC STATUS.

Principal occupation of immigrant employees before coming to the United States—
Weekly earnings—[Text Tables 640 to 642 and General Tables 364 to 366].

PRINCIPAL OCCUPATION OF IMMIGRANT EMPLOYEES BEFORE COMING TO THE UNITED STATES.

The extent of the training received before coming to the United States by the immigrants now in the iron and steel industry in the South is set forth in the following table, which shows, by race, the percentage of foreign-born male employees in each specified occupation before coming to the United States.

The above table shows that of the 1,501 foreign-born male employees in this locality for whom information was obtained a much larger proportion (47.6 per cent) were employed in farming or in farm labor than in any other occupation before coming to the United States; 20.4 per cent were employed in general labor, 8.9 per cent in hand trades, 2.5 per cent in trade, and 9.1 per cent in occupations other than specified, while only 9.2 and 2.5 per cent, respectively, were employed in the manufacture of iron and steel and in other manufacturing.

Not any Greeks, less than 1 per cent each of the South Italians and Russians, and only 6.3 per cent of the Slovaks, as compared with 34.1 per cent of the Germans, were employed in the manufacture of iron and steel abroad. The Germans in other manufacturing, as in the manufacture of iron and steel, show a considerably larger proportion than is shown by the other races. The proportion of Ger-

mans engaged in farming or employed in farm labor, on the other hand, is very much below that of any other race, the largest proportion employed in this occupation abroad, 82.7 per cent, being shown by the Russians. Following the Russians, but with a considerably smaller proportion, are the Slovaks, who in turn show a larger proportion than the South Italians and the Greeks.

The proportion of Greeks employed in general labor is considerably in excess of that shown by the South Italians, which is in turn considerably in excess of that shown by the Slovaks and largely in excess of that shown by the Germans or Russians. With the exception of the Russians and Slovaks, none of whom were in trade, each race shows a proportion employed in hand trades, in trade, and in occupations other than specified. In each instance the Germans show a larger proportion than is shown by any other race, the Russians showing the smallest proportion in hand trades, the Greeks the smallest proportion in trade, and the Slovaks the smallest in occupations other than specified.

WEEKLY EARNINGS.

The average earnings of the iron and steel workers in the South, together with the range in weekly earnings, is exhibited by the following table, which shows, by general nativity and race of individual, the per cent of male employees 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per week.

Upon information obtained for 7,605 male employees in this locality it will be seen that 56.3 per cent earn \$10 or over per week, 32.8 per cent \$12.50 or over, 23.4 per cent \$15 or over, and 13.6 per cent \$17.50 or over, while 7.7, 4.4, and 2.7 per cent earn \$20 or over, \$22.50 or over, and \$25 or over, respectively. The proportion earning under \$7.50 is slightly in excess of that earning \$25 or over per week. The foreign-born report a smaller proportion earning each specified amount than do the native-born.

Among the foreign-born not any of the English, Greeks, or Slovaks, as compared with 19.4 per cent of the Russians, earn under \$7.50. The proportions of Greeks, South Italians, and Russians earning \$10 or over are in striking contrast with the large proportions shown by the English, Germans, and Slovaks. Among those earning \$12.50 or over the small proportions shown for the Slovaks, Greeks, Russians, and South Italians are in striking contrast with the large proportions of English and Germans. No Greeks or Russians and only very small proportions of South Italians and Slovaks earn \$15 or over per week. None of the South Italians and less than 1 per cent of the Slovaks earn as much as \$20. The English, with proportions ranging from 55.6 per cent earning \$15 or over per week to 8.9 per cent earning \$25 or over per week, show a considerably larger proportion than the Germans earning \$15 or over, and a slightly larger proportion earning each of the other specified amounts.

The extent to which boys between the ages of 14 and 18 years are employed and the range of their earning ability is shown in the table next presented. It exhibits, by general nativity and race of individual, the percentage of male employees 14 and under 18 years of age earning each specified rate per week.

The above table shows that of the 314 male employees between 14 and 18 years of age for whom information was obtained in this locality none earn less than \$2.50 per week, 87.9 per cent earn \$5 or over, 50.6 per cent \$7.50 or over, and 10.2 per cent \$10 or over,

while less than 2 per cent and less than 1 per cent earn \$12.50 or over and \$15 or over, respectively. No persons native-born of foreign father earn \$12.50 or over per week, while the proportion earning \$5 or over is slightly above and the proportions earning \$7.50 or over and \$10 or over are slightly below the proportions shown in the total for all employees. No computations have been made for the foreign-born because of the small number involved. Thus a comparison with the native-born of foreign father is impossible.

Among employees native-born of native father it will be noted that the whites, while showing a slightly smaller proportion than the negroes earning \$5 or over, and a much smaller proportion earning \$7.50 or over, show a considerably larger proportion earning \$10 or over per week. No negroes earn as much as \$12.50 a week, as compared with 4 per cent of the native whites. The native whites show smaller proportions earning \$5 and \$7.50 or over, and larger proportions earning \$10, \$12.50, and \$15 or over, than those shown in the total for all employees.

Of 8,240 male employees studied, 83.8 per cent read and 82.6 per cent both read and write. A greater degree of literacy prevails among the white employees native-born of native father than is found in any other group, although the difference between this group and that composed of persons native-born of foreign father is very slight. Of the foreign-born groups, the Scotch and Swedish show the highest degree of literacy, each having 100 per cent who

can both read and write. Next in order come the English, the Germans, and the Irish and Slovaks. The lowest degree of literacy is shown by the South Italians, only about 50 per cent of whom are literate. The remaining races—Bulgarian, Greek, Polish, Lithuanian, North Italian, and Russian—show from 64.6 to 82.5 per cent who can read and write. The standard of literacy for the negro native-born of native father is relatively low.

CONJUGAL CONDITION.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race of individual, the percentage of male employees in the South 20 years of age or over in each conjugal condition:

Of the male employees 20 years of age or over for whom information was secured, 58.9 per cent are married and 4.4 per cent are widowed. The proportion of married employees is largest among white persons native-born of native father, slightly larger among those native-born of foreign father than among the foreign-born, and smallest among negroes native-born of native father. The negroes native-born of native father have the largest proportion of widowed individuals, the native-born of foreign father rank second, and the foreign-born last. Of the foreign-born, the Germans, Bulgarians, Slovaks, South Italians, and Scotch, in the order mentioned, have the largest proportion of married employees, and the Lithuanians and

Swedes have the smallest. The proportion of widowed employees is largest for the Irish, Germans, and English, in the order mentioned.

Of all persons for whom information was obtained in this section, it will be noted that the largest proportion, or 58.9 per cent, are married, while 36.7 per cent are single. Of those who are from 20 to 29 years of age, 59.5 per cent are single and 38.8 per cent married, as compared with 19.4 and 75.6 per cent single and married, respectively, of those from 30 to 44 years of age, and 8.9 and 80.2 per cent single and married, respectively, of those 45 years of age or over. The proportions widowed range from 1.7 per cent of those 20 to 29 years of age to 10.9 per cent of those 45 years of age or over.

Among the foreign-born it will be noted that of those from 20 to 29 years of age the Greeks, with 84.5 per cent, show a considerably larger proportion single than do the South Italians and a much larger proportion single than do the Russians, Germans, or Slovaks, the last named reporting 50 per cent. A decided decrease in the proportions single, and consequently a decided increase in the proportions married, is noted among those from 30 to 44, as compared with those from 20 to 29 years of age. No Greeks from 30 to 44 years of age, and only

0.8 per cent of the South Italians, are widowed, the proportions of the other races in this conjugal condition ranging from 4.2 per cent of the Russians to 1.6 per cent of the Slovaks.

Among the Germans and Irish native-born of foreign father, it will be noted that in each age group the latter show a considerably larger proportion single and a considerably smaller proportion married, than do the former, the proportions of the Irish widowed, among those 20 to 29 years and 45 years of age or over, being slightly in excess of the proportions shown by the Germans, while the reverse is true of those from 30 to 44 years of age.

The question of greatest interest in connection with the conjugal condition of employees is whether or not the married males of foreign birth have their wives and families with them, the absence of wives being conducive to migratory habits and a group system of living. As regards this point the following table shows by race of husband the per cent of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States and the per cent who report wife abroad.

Information was obtained in this locality for 970 foreign-born husbands, of which number the largest proportion, or 57.7 per cent, report wife in the United States, while 42.3 per cent report wife abroad.

It will be noted from the above table that a very much larger proportion of husbands of each of the older than of the more recent immigrant races report wife in the United States. All the English husbands, and all but a very small proportion of the German, Scotch, and Irish, report wives in this country, the proportion of husbands among these races reporting wife abroad in no instance exceeding 3 per cent. Of the more recent immigrant races, the Slovak husbands, 56.8 per cent of whom report wife in the United States, show a considerably larger proportion than do the South Italians. As contrasted with the above, the proportions of Greek, Russian, and Bulgarian husbands who report wife in the United States, ranging from 14.7 to 2.4 per cent, are extremely low.

The table next presented exhibits the tendency on the part of married males of foreign birth to send for their wives after a designated period of residence in the United States. It shows by race of husband and by years husband has been in the United States the per cent of foreign-born husbands who report wife abroad.

No German husbands who have been in the United States from five to nine years, and only 1.2 per cent who have been in the United States ten years or over, as compared with 13.6 and 15.4 per cent, respectively, of South Italian husbands, report wife abroad, while of those husbands who have been in the United States under five years, 22.2 per cent of the German, as compared with 68 per cent of the South Italian, report wife not in the United States.

VISITS ABROAD.

The table next presented shows the visits abroad made by foreign-born male employees, by years in the United States and race.

Of the 1,617 foreign-born male employees in this locality concerning whom information was obtained, only 10.8 per cent have made one or more visits abroad, the Slovaks with 18.6 per cent showing a slightly larger proportion than the Germans, and a much larger proportion than the Russians, South Italians, or Greeks, in the order named. As regards those who have been in the United States under five years, 4.2 per cent have made one or more visits abroad. This proportion is increased to 16.1 per cent of those with a residence of from five to nine years in the United States and to 23.2 per cent of those with a residence of ten years or over. As among the several races the representatives of which have been in the United States under five years, the Slovaks with 19.5 per cent show a considerably larger proportion having made one or more visits abroad, than do the Germans or Russians, and a much larger proportion than do the South Italians or Greeks. None of the Germans with a residence of from five to nine years in the United States, and a slightly smaller proportion of Slovaks in this than in the preceding period of residence, have made one or more visits abroad. On the other hand, the South Italians in this period of residence show a slightly larger proportion, and the Russians a very much larger proportion, having made one or more visits abroad, than is shown by those having a residence of less than five years in this country. Among those who have been in the United States ten years or over, the Slovaks, while showing a slightly larger proportion than the Germans or South Italians having made one or more visits abroad, again show a slightly smaller proportion than is shown by the Slovaks who have been in the United States from five to nine years. The South Italians and Germans, however, show considerable increase in this over the preceding period of residence.

AGE CLASSIFICATION OF EMPLOYEES.

The characteristics of the immigrant labor supply according to age is considered in the following table, which shows by general nativity and race the percentage of male employees studied in the South who were in each specified age group:

Of the 8,325 male employees in this locality, less than 10 per cent are under 19 years old, 43.5 per cent are from 20 to 29, 32.5 per cent are from 30 to 44, and 15.4 per cent are 45 or over. Only 4 per cent are above 55 years of age. The foreign-born show proportions in each age group that vary little from those shown for all employees.

Among the foreign-born it will be noted that, with the exception of the Scotch and Swedes, a much larger proportion of each of the older immigrant races are 35 years of age or over than under 35, while the reverse is true of the more recent immigrant races. The proportions of Irish, English, Scotch, and Germans from 20 to 24 years of age, as contrasted with the proportions of the other races, are very low. This is true of the Irish, English, and Germans from 25 to 29 years of age. The Lithuanians in these age groups report the largest proportions, or 37.5 and 29.2 per cent, respectively. As regards those

from 35 to 44 years of age, from 45 to 54, and 55 or over, the Irish, English, and Germans show larger proportions than are shown by any other race. The Lithuanians report the lowest proportion, or 8.3 per cent, from 35 to 44 years of age, the Russians the lowest, or 0.7 per cent, from 45 to 54 years of age, and the Slovaks the lowest, or 0.6 per cent, 55 years of age or over. No Greeks and Russians, and only very small proportions of the other races as compared with the proportions of Germans, English, and Scotch, are found in this last age group.

CHAPTER V.

GENERAL PROGRESS AND ASSIMILATION.

Citizenship—Ability to speak English—[Text Tables 650 to 653 and General Tables 372 to 374].

CITIZENSHIP.

The tendency on the part of the immigrant employees in the South to acquire citizenship is set forth in the following table, which shows, according to race of individual, the present political condition of foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming:

Information was obtained in this locality for 344 foreign-born male employees, of which number 144, or 41.9 per cent, were fully naturalized, while an additional 36, or 10.5 per cent, have, by securing first papers, declared their intention of becoming American citizens. Because of the small numbers involved, percentages have not been computed. The number of the South Italians fully naturalized is in striking contrast with the figures shown for the Germans or English. This would indicate that both the Germans and English who have come to this country have, in a large measure, determined to make this their permanent home. This, however, does not appear to be the intention of the South Italians if the numbers fully naturalized and having first papers only are to be accepted as evidence of this fact.

ABILITY TO SPEAK ENGLISH.

The ability of foreign-born employees of non-English-speaking races to speak English is considered according to race of employee in the table next presented.

The above table shows that of 1,487 foreign-born male employees for whom information was obtained in this locality 38.5 per cent speak English. All of the Swedes and all but 4.5 per cent of the Germans for whom information was obtained in this locality speak English. These proportions, it will be noted, are in striking contrast to the proportions shown by the more recent races, of whom the Slovaks, with 42.5 per cent, show a slightly larger proportion with ability to speak English than do the Lithuanians or Poles, a considerably larger proportion than do the North Italians or South Italians. The Greeks, Bulgarians, and Russians show comparatively low proportions, the lowest being shown by the Russians, who report but 8.4 per cent.

The greater adaptability and capacity for advancement of the younger as compared with the older immigrants is set forth in the table next presented, which shows, by age at time of coming to the United States and race of individual, the percentage of foreign-born male employees who speak English.

Of 1,487 foreign-born male employees in this locality, for whom information was obtained, 38.5 per cent speak English, the proportion of Germans with this ability, as contrasted with the proportions of the other races, being very high.

Of those who were under 14 years of age at time of arrival in the United States, 90.1 per cent speak English, as compared with 35.9 per cent of those who were 14 years of age or over at time of coming. Among those races reporting proportions both under 14 and 14 years of age or over at time of coming to the United States, it will be noted that in each instance the proportion under 14 who now speak English is in excess of that shown for those 14 years of age or over. The greatest gain in ability to speak English among those under 14 years of age on arrival in this country over those 14 years of age or over is shown by the Slovaks, the difference in the proportions being 49.3. This gain, it will be noted, is very much higher than that shown by the South Italians, who in turn show a much larger gain than do the Germans, the difference in the proportions of those under 14 and 14 years of age or over among this race being but 5.6 per cent. Among the several races, however, the representatives of which were 14 years of age or over at time of coming to the United States, the Russians show the smallest proportion who now speak English, or 8.4 per cent, while the Germans, with 94.4 per cent, show the largest proportion.

The progress made in acquiring the use of the English language is set forth in the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race of employee, the percentage of foreign-born male employees who were able to speak English:

From information obtained for 1,487 foreign-born male employees in this locality, it will be seen that of those who have been in the United States under five years 20.9 per cent speak English, as compared with 59.8 per cent of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years and 88.7 per cent with a residence of ten years or over. Thus it will be seen that their ability to speak English is materially increased by length of residence in the United States. This is evidently true, with but one exception, of each race where proportions are reported in two or more periods of residence. The exception above noted is found in the case of the South Italians who have been in the United States ten years or over, in which residence group a slightly smaller proportion speak English than in the group immediately preceding. As illustrating the above general statement, it will be seen that the Germans report 78.6 per cent of those who have been in the United States under five years who speak English, as compared with 93.8 and 98.1 per cent of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years and ten years or over, respectively. The greatest progress, however, on the part of the representatives of any one race is noted among the Russians, the proportion with ability to speak English increasing from 5.1 per cent of those who have been in the United States less than five years to 80 per cent of those with a residence of from five to nine years.

THE BIRMINGHAM DISTRICT.

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

The Birmingham district—Industrial history—Obstacles and inducements to immigration—Households studied—Members of households for whom detailed information was secured—Employees for whom information was secured—[Text Tables 654 to 658 and General Tables 375 to 377].

THE BIRMINGHAM DISTRICT.

What is known as the Birmingham district includes the counties of Jefferson, Walker, and Bibb in the State of Alabama. The district is included in the Cahaba district, according to the geologic classification, so named because it is in the basin drained by the Cahaba River. It is by far, taking into consideration the coal and iron-ore mining and the iron and steel production, the most important coal, iron, and steel center of the South. Alabama as a State ranks fifth in the production of coal, and 90 per cent of the total coal output of the State is from the territory included in the Birmingham district. The district includes the city of Birmingham, the smaller cities of Ensley and Bessemer, and numerous towns and villages. Ensley has recently been annexed to Birmingham, together with several other nearby towns and communities, so that the city proper takes in a large part of the closely settled section of the district. For the most part the surrounding towns and villages are communities which are growing up around coal and ore mines and the various iron and steel plants. With the exception of the original city of Birmingham, they are purely industrial settlements, and there is a growing tendency to develop into a large industrial community with the business and shopping center in old Birmingham and the industrial sections wherever the plants and mines may be located.

The chief industrial community is Ensley, where the largest steel plants are located, as well as several other smaller plants. Near Ensley are several groups of coal mines on what is known as the Pratt vein, and mining communities are situated at short intervals. Toward Birmingham proper is Pratt City, where coal mines and coke ovens are operated, and a few miles farther is Thomas, where blast furnaces are situated. North of these places are various coal-mining communities. South of Birmingham and toward Bessemer is a range of mountains dotted with iron-ore mining settlements, the mines being operated by the iron and steel companies of the district. Coal mines are also found farther south, with settlements and small towns. At Bessemer are located several small industries and several furnaces and rolling mills. The chief mining communities are

Republic, Cardiff, Pratt City, Wylam, Brookside, Sayreton, and Lewisburg. There are numerous other communities composed entirely of employees living near the openings along the line of the coal or ore veins, making the whole district a fairly well-settled section.

INDUSTRIAL HISTORY.

The industrial history of the Birmingham district, as well as the city of Birmingham, dates from about 1870. The city itself was laid off in 1871, although the movement to develop the coal and other mineral resources of the section began as early as 1854. The building of two railroads for this development was not completed, however, until after the civil war, and it was not until then that a community of considerable size existed. Even in 1880, a population of only 3,086 was credited to Birmingham, although other settlements around the mines existed. By 1890 Birmingham proper, however, contained more than 26,000 people, and the 1900 census gave it a population of nearly 40,000, with over 12,000 population in the neighboring towns of Bessemer, Ensley, Pratt City, Cardiff, and Brookside, in addition to which there were a large number of mining villages.

Practically no coal was mined in Alabama prior to the civil war. The same may be said of ore mining and iron manufacture. In 1870, however, several mines were started, and by 1880 about 250,000 short tons were mined in the Birmingham district. This was rapidly increased to 3,000,000 tons in 1890 and nearly 10,000,000 tons in 1902. Iron-ore properties also began to be developed to an appreciable extent between 1870 and 1880. In 1880 nearly 150,000 long tons were mined in this district, 1,250,000 in 1890, and about 3,000,000 tons in 1902. Charcoal furnaces had been operated on a small scale even prior to the civil war, but it was not until 1876 that the first coke furnace was started. This was followed by other furnaces in 1880 and in 1882. Open-hearth furnaces were put into operation in 1888. In 1898 a large steel plant was completed at Ensley and put into operation, establishing the district as an important steel center in the South. Other furnaces were built about ten years later. Rolling mills and blast furnaces were also established at Bessemer, and within the last decade a number of plants manufacturing special iron and steel products, such as pipe, frogs, switches, and similar products, have been started in the district. Since 1900 the number of plants of all kinds has increased to a remarkable extent, and the total output of iron and steel products in the district will probably show in the last decade an increase of over 60 per cent.

As now constituted, the city proper is situated well in the center of the Birmingham district. Within its limits are practically all of the furnaces and the mills, with the exception of those at Bessemer, 10 miles away, and immediately north of the city is a ring of coal mines which extend on either side, east and west. South of the city are the greater number of the ore mines of the district, and in the center of the circle thus rudely suggested are extensive limestone quarries.

It will be seen from the brief summary above that the most rapid development has taken place since 1890, and especially since 1900. That this fact does possess an important significance in the study of

the immigrant in the industries of the Birmingham district may be stated as follows:

First. The rather gradual development of the district as a mining and steel center did not create a demand for labor which was strong enough to necessitate the importation or the immigration of foreign-born labor. The surrounding country in the State, and possibly in the adjoining States, possessed a sufficient surplus of labor supply to allow enough additional employees to come to Birmingham to satisfy the slowly growing demand. Thus, up until about 1894, the labor employed in the district was composed almost entirely of native whites and negroes. A very few English, Welsh, and Scotch drifted in from northern mining and steel centers. As a matter of fact, no urgent demand upon the general labor market of the nation at large was made until about 1905, when in a period of unusual activity which lasted until 1908, it was found that the usual number of available native whites and negroes in Alabama and the adjoining southern States was not sufficient to supply the rapidly growing demand. It was discovered also that other industries in the South and the North were depleting the southern labor supply.

Second. The demand for immigrant labor made itself evident upon the following occasions:

- (1) During the coal-miners' strike of 1904.
- (2) During the coal-miners' strike of 1908.
- (3) During the periods of unusual industrial activity, 1905 to 1907, and 1909, until the present time.

The first two periods will be seen to be unusual, or rather periods not postulated by the normal development of the district, but the last two are unquestionably the results of natural conditions. The largest employers of labor in the district state that under normal conditions, at the present stage of the industrial development of the district, the ordinary labor supply which may be relied upon continuously affords about 50 per cent of the total necessary to operate all plants and mines at their full capacity. The smaller employers, on the other hand, assert that so far as they are concerned the supply of native labor is sufficient. The truth of the situation appears to be that there is what may be termed a "residual" supply of native labor fairly well distributed all over the district. This residual or basic supply is sufficient for the needs of the smaller operator or the small iron and steel producer. The operation of these mines, a large majority of which produce for the retail trade alone and the special iron and steel producers, is not subject to great increases or reductions. They employ from 25 to 100 and 150 men each, and are not disturbed by fluctuations in the supply of labor. The larger plants and coal operators, as well as the newer ones, who have expanded the most rapidly and have constituted the chief growth of the district, are most affected. They are dissatisfied with the situation for the following reasons:

1. The "residual" labor supply is unsatisfactory. In the first place, the number of native whites who can be drawn upon to furnish additional labor as the demand grows is very small. Secondly, they are, for the most part, not adapted to conditions. They come from the agricultural districts, and the majority are willing to work only during the winter months. Thirdly, the negroes, it is claimed, while possessing many excellent qualities, such as capacity for heavy work

and tractability, are too irregular and shiftless in their habits to be depended upon without a considerable admixture of other races. At the time when the demand for labor is the highest, for instance, and premiums are offered in wages to secure additional labor, the negro is willing only to make a living wage and will work only a sufficient number of days in the week to earn that amount. Fourthly, some of the employers assert that the younger generation of negroes is deteriorating physically, and is less capable of hard work than the older generation which came from the plantations. Finally, it is asserted that a migration of negroes is taking place from the South into the North and West, thus decreasing the supply available to the industries of the Birmingham district.

2. The employers claim that as the result of the increasing demand for more labor, and of the decreasing supply of labor in the section tributary to the Birmingham district, they are seriously handicapped in periods of normal activity. This attitude has been manifested not only in statements made by them in the course of this investigation, but also in conferences on the question of securing immigration into the district from other States and countries. The alleged handicap has existed, they state, in three ways: (a) The Birmingham operators are forced to increase the wages of employees by adding premiums, as was done during the prosperous period of 1907-8, and thus to increase the expenses of production in comparison with other localities in the United States; (b) they are in constant danger of being tied up by strikes, without an available supply of labor to draw upon; and (c) they are at a disadvantage as compared with other localities by reason of the inefficiency of the unskilled labor which is available.

Because of the labor situation, which is an outgrowth of the industrial expansion of the district, a change in the labor supply has already taken place to the following extent:

(1) English, Irish, Scotch, and Welsh miners and steel workers, to some extent skilled, have come into the district of their own accord, as shown by statistics in another section of this report.

(2) The larger employers have brought in Italians, Greeks, Macedonians, Slovaks, Bulgarians, and representatives of other southern European races during the past ten years for use as unskilled laborers in the steel plants and the mines.

(3) The net gain to the labor supply by the coming of these immigrants has been the settling of the Scotch, Irish, Welsh, and English, and to a small extent of Slovaks, Greeks, and Italians. To this net gain may be added those who have come of their own accord because friends and relatives preceded them to this locality. In proportion to the total number of employees, however, the number of immigrants is insignificant, and they have really done very little toward solving the question of a settled labor supply. The immigrants who have already come do not show a tendency to stay, and the difficulty experienced in securing enough of them to form large communities, which would serve to draw others of the various races in those communities has so far been well-nigh insurmountable. In brief, therefore, a survey of the industrial history of the district brings the present situation down to a statement which may be expressed as follows: The rapid industrial expansion of Birmingham as an iron and steel center has far outgrown the labor supply. According to the

larger and newer operators of mines and plants, immigration of some nature must be brought about in order to allow the Birmingham district to retain what natural advantages it possesses in the production of iron and steel and other products.

OBSTACLES AND INDUCEMENTS TO IMMIGRATION.

From an economic standpoint, and aside from other consideration from the point of view of the immigrant, the greatest inducement offered to immigrants is the demand for labor on the part of the newer and larger coal, iron, and steel industries in the district. This is evident from the standpoint of the employer, as shown in a preceding section of this report. As compared with iron and steel centers in other sections of the United States, the climate in the Birmingham district presents a second inducement. On account of the lack of congested conditions and probably superior housing, a third inducement exists over other centers.

Obstacles may be summarized in the following manner:

(1) The lack of established community life among the various races, particularly in the case of southern and eastern European races.

(2) The long distance from the chief ports of immigration.

(3) Prejudice against the immigrant on the part of negroes and native whites. There seems to be a natural prejudice against Italians, as expressed in the term "dagoes," and against other southern European immigrants, as expressed in the term "hunkies," which has been accentuated on the part of native employees on account of the use of immigrants of this class as strike breakers. The same natural prejudice appears in the attitude of the employers, who, with few exceptions, adopt a contemptuous attitude toward immigrants from southern Europe and regard them as desirable only from the standpoint of the lack of an alternative as a solution of the problem of labor scarcity. Employers, too, other things being considered equal, have stated that they prefer negroes to immigrants of this class, because they are better patrons of the commissaries, and in this manner practically receive lower wages.

(4) Slightly lower wages offered in the Birmingham district as compared by occupations with other coal and steel centers of the country.

The obstacles appear to have outweighed the inducements in the past. Immigrants who have been brought into the Birmingham district from New York as they landed or from communities in other States have been brought in only by special inducements, such as free transportation, during the periods of the greatest demand. They have not settled to any considerable extent, except in the case of the Scotch, English, Irish, and Welsh, who came of their own accord years ago, and except a community of Slovaks who have settled because members of this race were present in numbers large enough to establish a community. Finally, the greatest obstacle to immigration into this section should be noted as the general tendency on the part of immigrants, for whatever purpose, to go elsewhere in the United States. The flow of immigration has not been toward the South, and Birmingham employers believe that immigration into their district will not become natural until the immigration movement, in a national sense, is turned toward the South.

HOUSEHOLDS STUDIED.

In addition to the collection of other data, 661 households, the heads of which were engaged in the iron and steel industry, were investigated in the Birmingham district. The following table shows the number and percentage of households studied, by general nativity and race of head of household:^a

The above table shows that of all households studied in this locality 80 per cent were households the heads of which were foreign-born and 20 per cent those the heads of which were native-born of native father. As regards the households the heads of which were of foreign birth, the South Italian households constitute a larger proportion than do the households of all other races combined. The number of Slovak households studied in this locality is slightly in excess of the French or Scotch and largely in excess of the Greek and Bulgarians, while the households of other foreign races constitute a very small proportion of all households studied. Among those households the heads of which were native-born of native father, the whites constitute a very small proportion, while those the heads of which were negroes make up 18.3 per cent of the total number of households.

MEMBERS OF HOUSEHOLDS FOR WHOM DETAILED INFORMATION WAS SECURED.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, persons in households studied and persons for whom detailed information was secured.

Of the 3,203 persons in the 661 households studied in this locality, 85.4 per cent are in households the heads of which are foreign-born, 13 per cent in households the heads of which are negroes native-born of native father, and 1.7 per cent in households the heads of which are whites native-born of native father. Among those households whose heads are foreign-born, it will be noted that the persons in South Italian households constitute 37.9 per cent of all the persons in the households studied. This, it will be noted, is a very much larger proportion than is found for households the heads of which are of any other race. Those in Slovak households constitute the next largest proportion, or 11.2 per cent, a proportion slightly in excess of that shown in Scotch, considerably in excess of that shown in Bulgarian, Greek, or French, and largely in excess of that shown in North Italian, Macedonian, Polish, or English households, in the order named.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the sex of persons for whom detailed information was secured in the households studied.

CHAPTER II.

RACIAL DISPLACEMENTS.

Present immigrant population of the Birmingham district—History of immigration to the Birmingham district—Period of residence in the United States of foreign-born employees and members of their households—Racial classification of employees at the present time—[Text Tables 659 to 644 and General Tables 378 and 379].

PRESENT IMMIGRANT POPULATION OF THE BIRMINGHAM DISTRICT.

The following tables present the location by race of the immigrant population of the Birmingham district at the time of the investigation. While the statistics in Table 659 and those derived from it are in a large sense approximate figures, it is believed that they include practically all of the immigrants at the localities named and in the district at that time.

The following table shows the total population of the city of Birmingham in 1890 and 1900, the number of native and foreign born, and the country of birth of the foreign-born:

Upon referring to the above table the small number of foreign-born in the city at both census periods is noticeable, as well as the fact that there were representatives among the population in 1890, not only of the races of Great Britain and northern Europe, but also of southern and eastern Europe. It is even more significant, however, that with the exception of the Welsh and Norwegians there was a falling off in numbers from the countries of Great Britain and northern Europe in 1900 as contrasted with 1890, the increase in the foreign-born population during the ten years 1890–1900 practically all arising from the arrival of races from southern and eastern Europe. During the past ten years the gain among the foreign-born owing to the local

development of mining and steel manufacturing, and the influx of southern and eastern Europeans, has been much greater than in the preceding decade. At the present time there are estimated, as pointed out below, to be more than 5,000 persons of races from southern and eastern Europe living in the Birmingham district.

HISTORY OF IMMIGRATION TO THE BIRMINGHAM DISTRICT.

A general statement regarding the immigration of foreign-born residents into the Birmingham district is as follows:

Immigration of foreign-born persons into the district began over twenty years ago with the coming of the Scotch, French, English, Welsh, and Irish miners. The next races to come were the Slovak, Polish, and Italian. Within the past ten years immigration has been of a very mixed variety, including Italians, Greeks, Bulgarians, Macedonians, Russians, Roumanians, Croatians, and Swedes. The number of persons of the last-named races is very small, and they are employed in the steel plants as skilled workers, having come from other plants in the northern States along with skilled native white workers.

In greater detail, the history of immigration by races may be stated as follows:

ITALIAN.

Less than half of the North Italians have been in the district longer than five years, although a few have been there as long as fifteen and twenty years. The South Italians began coming to Ensley and Pratt City fifteen years ago, and quite an Italian population existed in Ensley in 1900 and in Pratt City in 1902. By far the largest number, however, have entered the district within the last ten years, and this statement applies mainly to the families of South Italians. The men without families, as a general rule, have been the most recent immigrants of their race, very few of them having been in the district over three and four years.

At the present time the most permanent settlement of Italians is at Thomas, now a part of the city of Birmingham, and there are fewer boarding groups at this place in proportion to the total Italian population than in any other locality in the district. At Ensley there is developing an Italian colony, and a tendency for its members to bring over their families from Italy appears to be growing. This is

also true, but to a less extent, at Pratt City. The larger proportion of Italians in the Pratt City section live in neighboring mine boarding houses and have less encouragement to become settled in homes. The small tendency toward permanent citizenship is evident in all of the mining camps.

MACEDONIAN.

The small number of this race does not warrant their being considered in proportion to the total, but the fact that they have come into the district within the last five years, most of them since 1908, shows a tendency for that race to gain a foothold. None of them, however, have brought their families, and they have not advanced in the direction of forming a permanent colony.

POLISH.

The majority of Polish immigrant families came prior to 1904, some of them entering the district ten and twelve years ago, while the men without families have come irregularly since 1905. The Polish population of the district has actually decreased since 1904. Prior to that time, during the period of demand for labor, numbers of them were brought to the district. When the coal miners' strike of 1904 took place, nearly all of them walked out and were thrown out of employment through their affiliation with the union. Many of them left the district and those who remained secured employment in the steel plants. They form a small colony at Ensley, but are scattered in the vicinity of the Wylam mines.

GREEK.

A very small proportion of immigrants of this race are employed in the coal, iron, and steel industries in the district, and of these, about 200 or less in number, are employed as unskilled labor in the steel plants. The rest, as stated elsewhere in this report, are engaged in small businesses or in street trades in the city of Birmingham and the adjacent towns. Those who are employed in the steel plants are very recent immigrants, nearly all of them having arrived within the last three or four years, and they are employed there only until the time when they feel able to enter into some small business or street trade as their fellow immigrants have done.

SLOVAK.

The history of the immigration of the Slovaks into the Birmingham district is very similar to that of the Poles. Slovaks began coming to the district as early as twenty years ago, probably soon after or about the same time as the Welsh, English, and Irish came. The large majority of them, however, now living in the district came over ten years ago and the immigration of this race at the present time has practically ceased. The most settled and compact community of immigrants of any race in the Birmingham district is that of the Slovaks at Brookside, a mining town, and another small community exists near Wylam. Notwithstanding the fact that in the Brookside community, at least, there has grown up a community life suited to the customs of their race, it does not seem to have attracted other immigrants, and it appears to be a peculiar exception to the rule of race community or colony growth.

FRENCH, GERMAN, ENGLISH, IRISH, AND WELSH.

All of these races are well scattered over the district, chiefly in the mining communities, and, with the exception of the French who came during the past ten years, were the first immigrants to come into the district. No colonies of any size exist, as the members live among the native whites and associate with the native whites on practically an equal footing. The English, Welsh, and Irish came when the first mines were opened.

OTHER RACES.

A very few Croatians have come into the district, so far as can be ascertained at the present time. A few are employed in the steel plants, but they have been there less than five years. It is probable that others were brought into the district during the coal miners' strike of 1908 and left as soon as the strike was over. The same is true of the Bulgarians, although a few of this race have been here as long as eight years. The rest have come within the past two or three years, having been brought in as strike breakers in the mines, but are now employed in the steel plants. A scattering number of Russians, Roumanians, Magyars, and Syrians are to be found, chiefly as unskilled laborers in the plants, but it is not large enough to form colonies and very few have their families. All of these last-named races have come in during the past two or three years and constitute, with others already named, the most recent immigrants into the district.

Unless it be the Italians, it is evident that no one immigrant race predominates in the coal, iron, and steel industries of the Birmingham district. Italians, chiefly from southern Italy, more especially Sicily, constitute about 50 per cent of the total immigrant population who are actually employed in these industries. Greeks constitute a considerable proportion of the immigrant population, but comparatively an insignificant number of them are occupied as miners or steel workers.

The history of the immigration thus presents that of no particular race, but of a miscellaneous drifting in of immigrants of many races. The more recent immigration of Croatians, Bulgarians, Roumanians, Macedonians, Magyars, and even of Slovaks which has supplied so much of the unskilled labor during the past decade in the coal and steel centers of Pennsylvania, for example, has practically not affected Birmingham at all. Many of the Italians who are employed in the Birmingham district, moreover, have come north from the Gulf ports after passing through a period of residence on sugar plantations and elsewhere in New Orleans and Louisiana. There has been, therefore, no decided drift of immigration of foreign-born races to this section, and no well-defined tendency on the part of any one race to come in for permanent settlement and formation of established community or colony life. The peculiar skill on the part of such immigrants as the English, Welsh, and Scotch, and the necessity for additional labor during periods of extreme labor scarcity or of strikes have been the only reason, so far as the employers are concerned, for the employment of immigrant labor; the immigration of foreign-born labor has been forced and artificial importation—not immigration through channels of natural or established direction.

Upon information obtained for 1,093 foreign-born persons in this locality, it will be seen that 69.5 per cent have been in the United States under five years, 11.5 per cent from five to nine, and 11.2 per cent twenty years or over, while 3.4 and 4.4 per cent have been in the United States from ten to fourteen and fifteen to nineteen years, respectively. All of the Bulgarians, and 98.4 per cent of the Greeks, have been in the United States under five years. The proportion of the South Italians—77.9 per cent—with a residence of less than five years, is slightly in excess of that shown by the North Italians and largely in excess of that shown by the Swedes. The Swedes, in turn, with 42.1 per cent, show a considerably larger proportion than the Scotch and a much larger proportion than the English, who show but 14.6 per cent as having been in the United States under five years. The English, however, show a slightly larger proportion, with a residence of from five to nine years, than do the North Italians or South Italians, a considerably larger proportion than do the Scotch, but a slightly smaller proportion than the Swedes, who report 21.1 per cent. The proportion of Greeks, or 1.6 per cent, in this period of residence group is, as compared with the proportions of the other races, very low. No Bulgarians, English, or Greeks, and only small proportions of the other races, have been in the United States from ten to fourteen years; the Swedes, with 8.8 per cent, showing the largest, and the Scotch the smallest proportion, or 2.3 per cent. The Swedes, with 12.3 per cent, also show the largest proportion with a residence of from fifteen to nineteen years, a proportion larger than that shown by the English or Scotch, and considerably in excess of that shown by the North Italians or

South Italians. No Bulgarians or Greeks, only 1 per cent of the South Italians, 2.8 per cent of the North Italians, and 15.8 per cent of the Swedes, as compared with 51.2 per cent of the Scotch and 58.3 per cent of the English, have been in the United States twenty years or over.

Of 1,870 persons reporting, 63.9 per cent have been in the United States under five years, 81.8 per cent have a residence of under ten years, and 92.1 per cent have been in this country under twenty years. The Greeks, Macedonians, and Bulgarians show over 97 per cent, the South Italians, North Italians, and Poles over 50 per cent, and the English and the Slovaks show less than 20 per cent who have been in the United States under five years. The Greeks and Macedonians show all persons as having been in the United States under ten years, and Bulgarians show only slightly smaller proportions, while English and Scotch show low proportions in this group. The Bulgarians, Greeks, and Macedonians show 100 per cent who have been in the United States under twenty years.

Of the 5,477 male employes in this locality, for whom information was secured, 20 per cent are foreign-born, 31.8 per cent are native-born of native father, white; 44 per cent are native-born of native father, negro; and 4.2 per cent are native-born of foreign father. Those whose fathers were born in Ireland, Germany, Scotland, and England have the largest representatives among the native-born of foreign father. Of the foreign-born, the South Italians, Greeks, North Italians, Bulgarians, and Swedes are present in the largest numbers. It will be noted that the South Italians are present in much larger numbers than the individuals of any other foreign race.

Upon information secured from 344 females, it is found that 95.9 per cent were without occupation abroad, leaving less than 5 per cent who had employment. Of those who had employment, 2.9 per cent of the total number worked for wages, and 1.2 per cent of the total number worked without wages. None of those reporting worked for profit. Of the four races specified, French, South Italian, Scotch, and Slovak, none were employed as farm laborers. Of the total number of French females reporting, 5.4 per cent were employed in domestic service, as compared with 0.5 per cent of the South Italians and 2.1 per cent of the Slovaks. None of the Scotch females reporting were employed in domestic service for wages. The South Italian is the only race reporting any females who were employed for wages in hand trades, and of this race the proportion so employed was only 0.5 per cent. None of the French or South Italians were employed for wages in occupations other than those above enumerated, but of the Scotch reporting the proportion so employed was 7.4 per cent, as compared with 4.2 per cent of the Slovaks. The only race reporting any females who were employed abroad without wages is the Slovak, which shows 6.3 per cent of the total number who were thus employed as farm laborers.

The above table shows that, of a total of 1,080 foreign-born males, the largest proportion, or 50.7 per cent, were working for wages before coming to the United States, while 41.2 per cent were working for profit, 5.4 per cent were working without wages, and 2.7 per cent were without occupation.

Among the various races, the Poles show the largest proportion, or 8.3 per cent, who were without occupation, while, with the exception of the Scotch, who show none, the Bulgarians have the smallest, or 0.6 per cent. As regards those who were working for wages, the Scotch show the largest, and the Greeks the smallest, proportion, and of those who were working without wages, the North Italians show

a larger, and, with the exception of the French and Macedonians, which show none, the Scotch a smaller, proportion than any other race. Each race except the Scotch exhibits a certain proportion who were working for profit, the Greeks showing the largest and the French the smallest.

Each of the various races, except the Scotch, shows a proportion of those who were working for wages to have been employed as farm laborers. The South Italians have the largest and the French the smallest percentage thus employed, and each race, except the Bulgarians, North Italians, Macedonians, and Slovaks, has a comparatively small proportion who were general laborers. Small proportions of the Poles, French, North Italians, Scotch, and South Italians, ranging from 8.3 per cent to 0.5 per cent, were employed abroad in the iron and steel industry.

The French and Macedonians are the only races not showing a proportion who were working in their native countries without wages, while each race, with the exception of the Bulgarians, Scotch, South Italians, and Slovaks, show the entire number who were working without wages to have been farm laborers. Of the races showing a proportion who were working for profit, all show a certain number, ranging from 49.4 per cent of the Bulgarians to 3.9 per cent of the French, to have been independent farmers.

Information was obtained in this locality for 958 foreign-born male employes. Of this number, 45 per cent were engaged in farming or employed as farm laborers, 25.3 per cent were employed as general laborers, 9.4 per cent were in hand trades, 2.2 per cent were in trade, and 10.1 per cent were in occupations other than specified, while only 6.6 and 1.5 per cent were employed in manufacturing iron and steel and in other manufacturing, respectively. Thus it will be seen that an extremely small proportion have had previous experience in, or

knowledge of, the industry in which they are now employed. As between the Greeks and South Italians, it will be noted that, with the exception of a considerably smaller proportion of the former than of the latter who were engaged in farming or employed as farm laborers, and a considerably larger proportion of the former than of the latter who were employed as general laborers, the proportions of each race employed abroad in the other occupations are very nearly the same, not any Greeks, and only 0.5 per cent of the South Italians, however, being employed in manufacturing iron and steel.

From the data presented in the above table it appears that of the females 16 years of age or over for whom information was secured, 95.4 per cent are at home, 2.1 per cent at school, only a fraction of 1 per cent in domestic service or trade, and 1 per cent otherwise employed. The proportion of individuals at home is largest for the foreign-born, second largest for the native-born negro of native father, and considerably larger for the native-born white of native father than for the native-born of foreign father. Among the foreign-born, the South Italians have the largest and the French the smallest proportion of individuals at home.

In this locality 55.5 per cent of the individuals for whom information was secured were employed in the iron and steel industry, 41.9 per cent were otherwise employed, and only a very small proportion were at home or at school. The proportion of individuals employed in the iron and steel industry was 57.3 per cent for both the native-born negro and the total foreign-born, and only 19 per cent for the native-born of foreign father. On the other hand, the proportion of individuals otherwise employed is largest for the households the heads of which were native-born of foreign father, and is slightly larger for the native-born negro than for the total foreign-born. Of the foreign-born, the Greeks, Macedonians, and South Italians, in the order mentioned, have the largest, and the Slovaks, French, and Scotch the smallest, proportions of individuals employed in the iron and steel industry.

Of the 5,161 male employees in this locality for whom information was obtained, 58 per cent earn \$10 or over per week, 34.5 per cent earn \$12.50 or over per week, 23.9 per cent \$15 or over, 15.2 per cent \$17.50 or over, 9.2 per cent \$20 or over, 5.7 per cent \$22.50 or over, and 3.6 per cent \$25 or over, while 3 per cent earn under \$7.50 per week. The native-born of foreign father, while showing a slightly smaller proportion earning \$10 or over, show a considerably larger proportion earning each other specified amount than do the whites native-born of native father. The negroes native-born of native father, while showing a slightly larger proportion earning \$10 or over, show a slightly smaller proportion earning each of the other specified amounts than is reported for the foreign-born. As regards the foreign-born, it will be noted that no Greeks, and only 5.6 per cent of the South Italians, earn under \$7.50 per week, and that no Greeks, and only 1 per cent of the South Italians, earn \$15 or over per week. By far the largest proportion of both Greeks and South Italians earn between \$7.50 and \$10 per week. The Greeks, however, with 5.5 per cent, show a slightly larger proportion earning \$12.50 or over per week than do the South Italians.

RELATION BETWEEN PERIOD OF RESIDENCE AND EARNING ABILITY.

The tendency for earning ability to increase as the period of residence in this country is extended is shown by the table following which exhibits, by race and length of residence in the United States, the percentage of foreign-born male employees 18 years of age or over who were earning weekly each specified amount.

As a general rule, the South Italians reporting show an increased earning ability as the length of residence in the United States increases. By way of illustration, only 8.6 per cent of those who have been in the United States under 5 years earn \$10 or over per week, as compared with 21.4 per cent of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years, and 13.3 per cent of those who have been in the United States ten years or over. This may be even better illustrated by reference to the columns showing the proportions earning \$12.50, \$15, and \$17.50, or over per week. This race report no proportions with a residence of less than five years, earning these specified amounts, as compared with 5.4, 3.6, and 3.6 per cent, respectively, of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years. It will also be seen that of those who have been in the United States ten years or over, the proportions of those earning \$12.50 and \$15 or over, are in excess of the proportions shown by those with a residence of from five to nine years.

The preceding table shows that all the native-born and 97.2 per cent of the foreign-born husbands are at work. The average annual earnings of the husbands who are native-born whites are \$521, as contrasted with \$368 of the total foreign-born and \$486 of the native-born negro. Among the foreign-born husbands, the highest average annual earnings are shown by the Scotch, and the lowest by the South Italians. The annual earnings of both the English and Scotch are in excess of the earnings of the native-born whites.

The proportions of male heads of families earning under \$200, under \$400, and under \$600 each year, respectively, are larger for the foreign-born than for the native-born negro of native father. The annual earnings of the adult males in this locality for whom information was secured, as shown by the above table, average \$331. It appears that the average yearly earnings are highest in the case of the whites native-born of native father; they are higher in the case of the negroes native-born of native father than in that of the second generation of immigrants, and lowest in the case of the foreign-born. Of the foreign-born, the Scotch, English, and French, in the order mentioned, have the highest average yearly earnings.

The proportions of individuals earning under \$200 and under \$400 per year, respectively, are largest for the foreign-born, and larger for the native-born of foreign father than for the negroes native-born of native father. On the other hand, the proportions of individuals earning under \$600 and under \$1,000 per year, respectively, are

largest for the foreign-born, but larger for the native-born negro of native father than for the second generation of immigrants.

The average family income for the 476 families studied in this locality is \$492, the foreign-born reporting \$481, as compared with \$542 for the native-born. Of these 476 families, 27.9 per cent have a total income of under \$300, 63.2 under \$500, 85.7 per cent under \$750, 93.7 under \$1,000, and only 2.3 per cent have a total income of \$1,500 or over. The negroes native-born of native father, while showing only slightly larger proportions than are shown in the total for all families earning under \$750, under \$1,000, and under \$1,500, show a considerably smaller proportion earning under \$500. The negroes show only 4 per cent earning under \$300, in contrast with 35 per cent of the foreign-born.

Among the foreign-born, the average family income of the Scotch, \$1,032, exceeds that of any other race. No Scotch, and only 5.7 per cent of the French families, as compared with 26.4 per cent of the Slovak and 52.2 per cent of the South Italian families, have an income under \$300. As regards those families which have an income under \$500, the South Italians report by far the largest proportion, or 86.2 per cent, while the French and Slovaks, of about equal rank in this comparison, show a very much larger proportion having an income under this amount than do the Scotch, who report but 14.7 per cent. As regards those having incomes under \$750 and under \$1,000, respectively, the South Italians in each instance show the largest proportion and the Scotch the smallest, the percents reported by the

Scotch being very low. All South Italian and Slovak families, as compared with 97.1 per cent of the French and 76.5 per cent of the Scotch, having a total income under \$1,500.

WIVES AT WORK.

This table shows that only 1.4 per cent of the wives of the foreign-born are at work, this proportion being made up of one French, three South Italians, and one Slovak. None of the wives of the native-born whites are at work, but 3.1 per cent of the native negroes are engaged in work outside of the households.

As regards the source of family income of the 469 families studied in this locality, it will be noted that 95.9 per cent have an income from earnings of husband, 19.6 per cent from the contributions of children, 11.7 per cent from the payments of boarders or lodgers, 1.7 per cent from the earnings of wife, and 10.4 per cent from other sources. Both the employees of foreign birth and the negroes native-born of native father (with the exception of a considerably smaller proportion of the latter having an income from contributions of children and from other sources) show proportions having an income from each source that vary but slightly from the proportions shown in the total for all families.

Among the foreign-born there is no very striking variation from the total for all families as regards income from husband. The Scotch, with 50 per cent, show twice the proportion of any other race with an income from contributions of children, but have no family reporting the wife at work. This race also has much the largest proportion with income from sources not specified. As regards those who have an income from payments of boarders or lodgers, the proportion of the South Italians is small, and the proportion of the French is large, as compared with the per cent in the grand total.

As regards the 469 families studied in this locality, it will be noted that 62.7 per cent derive their entire income from earnings of husband, 1.1 per cent from husband and wife, 13.4 per cent from husband and children, 8.5 per cent from husband and boarders or lodgers, and 12.6

per cent from source or combination of sources not before specified, while 0.2, 1.3, and 0.2 per cent of the families have entire income from wife, children, and children and boarders or lodgers, respectively.

As contrasted with the proportions of South Italian, French, or Slovak families having entire income from husband, the proportion of Scotch is very low, while of those having entire income from husband and children, the Scotch with 26.5 per cent report a slightly larger proportion than the Slovaks, and a considerably larger proportion than the French or South Italians. The proportion of Slovak families having entire income from husband and boarders or lodgers is larger than that shown by the French, and considerably in excess of that shown by the Scotch or South Italian families. A larger proportion of Scotch families, or 44.1 per cent, derive their income from sources not specified than from any other source. The French, with 22.9 per cent, show the next largest proportion having entire income from this source, a proportion considerably in excess of that shown by the South Italians or Slovaks. Only a small proportion of South Italian families have entire income from husband and wife, a small proportion of Slovak families have entire income from wife, and proportions of South Italian and Scotch families have entire income from children.

RELATIVE IMPORTANCE OF DIFFERENT SOURCES OF FAMILY INCOME.

The table next submitted shows, by general nativity and race of head of family, the percentage of yearly income from husband, wife, children, boarders or lodgers, and other sources.

The preceding table shows that over three-fourths of the total yearly family income is provided by the earnings of the husband, the next highest proportion is provided by contributions of children, and a considerably lower percentage is derived from payments of boarders or lodgers, while the percentages of income from other sources and from the earnings of the wife are very small. Negroes native-born of native father show the earnings of the husbands to constitute a much higher percentage of the total yearly family income than is the case with foreign-born families; the earnings of the wife also constitute a higher percentage of the family income among the negroes than in the foreign-born families. On the other hand, contributions of children form a high percentage of the total yearly income of foreign-born families when contrasted with the per cent coming from the same source in negro families. The per cent of income from boarders or lodgers is slightly higher in negro families than in those of the foreign-born, while foreign-born show a very much higher per cent of income from other sources than do negroes.

Among the foreign-born races, the South Italians show the highest per cent of income from earnings of husbands and the Scotch the lowest. The French show the highest percentage of income from earnings of wives and the Scotch have no revenue from this source. The last-named race shows a very high percentage of income from the contributions of children, while the French have a comparatively low percentage of income from this source. Slovak and French families have a much higher per cent of income from payments of boarders or lodgers than have either Scotch or South Italians; while French families have a considerable per cent of income, as contrasted with other races, from sources not specified.

CHAPTER IV.

WORKING CONDITIONS.

Methods of wage payments—Regularity of employment—Company houses and industrial communities—The company-store system—Relations between employees—Social association—Welfare work by the employers—The immigrant and organized labor—Labor disputes—[Text Tables 685 and 686 and General Table 393].

METHODS OF WAGE PAYMENTS.

In the majority of mines and plants wage payments are made by the calendar month. In a few the payments are biweekly, and in the case of one mining company the payments are made daily. This refers to cash payments. The almost universal practice, however, of payments in commissary checks or by commissary credit during the period intervening between the regular pay days when payments in currency are made practically amounts to wage payments at any time at the will of the wage-earner, and in effect nullifies any system of cash payments. "Pay days" thus have become the days on which a monthly or a biweekly statement of the account between employer and employee is rendered, and on which the latter may at his will draw out the cash balance in his favor if any exists after his own deductions through store accounts, store purchases, and through medical, hospital, and school assessments by the company are made.

REGULARITY OF EMPLOYMENT.

Except during periods of industrial depression, it is claimed by the employers that the demand for labor in all occupations in the mining and iron and steel industries is uniformly regular, and that the work offered is without interruption. This appears to be a true statement of the actual conditions in normal times, with possibly the exception of employment offered in the construction departments of the larger plants and mines, which depends upon causes unrelated to a large degree to the ordinary run of operation. Another exception, too, may be noted in the case of the smaller mines, whose output is for domestic consumption and which is not affected by depressions to any considerable extent. A third exception, of course, is found in periods of labor disputes.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of individual, the months worked during the past year by males 16 years of age or over in the households studied, who were employed away from home.

The preceding table shows that of the 1,273 males reporting, 18.1 per cent worked twelve months during the past year, 53.7 per cent worked nine months or over, 83.7 per cent worked six months or over, and 97.9 per cent worked three months or over. The negroes native-born of native father show 49 per cent who worked the full year, as contrasted with only 28.9 per cent of those who were native-born of foreign father and 13.8 per cent of the foreign-born. The negroes native-born of native father also show a higher percentage who worked nine months or over and six months or over than either those native-born of foreign father or those who were foreign-born. All those who were native-born of foreign father worked three months or over, while the negroes native-born of native father and the foreign-born show somewhat smaller proportions who worked during a like period. Of the foreign-born, the French and Scotch show the highest and Bulgarians and Macedonians the lowest percentage who worked twelve months during the year. The French, Slovaks, Scotch, South Italians, and Poles, in the order named, all show 50 per cent or over who worked nine months or over during the past year. The Macedonians show the smallest proportion who worked during this period of time. The Slovaks, French, and North Italians show over 90 per cent who worked six months or over, as contrasted with 61.1 per cent of the Macedonians. All of the French, North Italians, and Scotch worked three months or over, while the Greeks, Slovaks, Bulgarians, South Italians, Macedonians, and Poles follow as named with decreasing proportions, the last-named race showing 91.7 per cent.

COMPANY HOUSES AND INDUSTRIAL COMMUNITIES.

Throughout the Birmingham district there exists a community or colony of employees around every plant and mine or group of mines. These communities are more or less distinct from the neigh-

boring towns and villages, the essential difference between them being that the former are residential sections for the laborers, while the latter exist largely as commercial centers for the immediate neighborhoods. The industrial communities differ from each other very slightly, except in the style and the arrangement of the houses. At the iron and steel plants the communities are considerably larger than at the mines, although this varies with the size of the individual mine or plant. In each community, in addition to the rows of company houses arranged on either side of streets if the land is level and regular enough, is a commissary or company store which is the real center, the churches or church, two schools (one for negroes and one for whites), and usually a lodge house used for secret or other lodge meetings. In the smallest communities one building is frequently used for the school, lodge, and church. The office of the operating company, with its pay window, is an important feature, and in its immediate vicinity is the mine or the plant.

The styles of the company houses vary with the company owning them. As a general rule the company houses of the mining villages are the more cheaply constructed, while around the steel plants there is usually a variety of grades for the different classes of workmen, the smallest and poorest being usually occupied by negroes. In the ore-mining camps the houses are well built and well kept, as a general rule, although occupied chiefly by negroes. Where immigrants from southern and eastern Europe are employed the large boarding house, with its two stories and its larger number of rooms, is a frequent occurrence. With scarcely an exception the villages present a wearisome sameness to the eye. The houses are of the same color, and are separated by open spaces of equal size. A universal lack of gardens and yards under cultivation or care, with practically no fencing, renders the whole situation bare and uninviting. The coal dust and smoke tend to reduce everything to a uniform color, and probably have much to do with the absence of any attempt toward improving the yards or utilizing the garden space. There is little external evidence of any encouragement of domestic life, a fact which emphasizes the tendency on the part of the employees of all races to get all their pleasures out of what their wages will buy.

While this is unquestionably the inevitable impression when the average community is viewed, several attempts have been made toward providing a greater degree of comfort on the part of the larger companies. In the larger communities around the steel plants there are sewers and water supply, and the houses are kept painted and carefully repaired. The offer for lumber for fencing at cost by the company to the employees is accepted by some, and occasionally a yard or a garden is seen with a fence of some description. The streets are never improved, however, and only in rare cases sidewalks are found. On the whole, however, the disadvantages are not as much of an insanitary nature as of an unsightly appearance. The communities are usually placed with care as to natural drainage; there is an abundance of open space and never any crowding of houses or buildings, and they are accessible to the places of work. The houses themselves, if cheaply constructed, are neatly and plainly built, and with a little care or pride on the part

of the tenants could be made homelike, while the cultivation of the gardens and the care of the yards could not only add to the good appearance of the individual house as well as of the community, but would serve to assist in the provision of vegetables and other truck for the food of the tenants. It is claimed by the employers that there has never been any disposition to take advantage of the space offered, and this statement is undeniably true. When questioned regarding the matter, laborers have said that it was too much trouble, or that they did not know how long they were to stay, or that the ground was too poor.

The foregoing presents a picture of average conditions as they exist generally throughout the Birmingham district. In the smaller communities, which are in coal-mining sections, the conditions are worse; the houses are smaller and more cheaply constructed, with almost a total absence of any attempt to provide ordinary conveniences except of the rudest nature; less attention is paid to keeping them in repair, and whitewash is rarely applied and paint hardly ever; the communities, as a whole, present an unkempt and inadequate condition of living. In the newer and larger communities in and around the iron and steel plants and the principal ore-mining operations the situation is much better. An excellent and a very fair example of the latter is found in the housing conditions at Ensley, which is the largest community in the district. Ensley itself is a few miles from Birmingham, but by a recent legislative enactment is now within the corporate limits of the city.

The company quarters here are located on a slight elevation in the outskirts of Ensley, adjoining the yards of the steel plant, which separates the quarters from the principal residence and business district of the town. Occupancy of company houses is not a condition prerequisite to employment, but in selecting a home the immigrant is usually governed by three considerations, namely, house rental, presence of fellow-countrymen, and proximity to place of employment. The first of these usually exerts the greatest influence, which has resulted in approximately 75 per cent of the immigrants occupying the company houses, which are usually rented to them at a lower rate than houses obtained from other sources. The houses occupied are painted, weather-boarded, frame structures of one story, divided into two apartments of two rooms each, finished with dressed lumber, and provided in front with small verandas. Provision for heat for each apartment is made by a chimney erected in the center of the building. Water is obtained from hydrants outside of the house, one hydrant being provided for every three houses. Water-closets built of rough lumber are placed in the rear of the buildings in the ratio of one closet to every twelve houses. These closets are divided by partitions into twelve stalls or sections. They are flushed by a stream of water that flows through continuously. A public bath for the use of the employees is also maintained. A monthly rental of \$10.50 for each house, or \$5.25 for an apartment, is charged to the tenant.

These houses are occupied almost altogether by immigrants and native whites. In the section of the company quarters occupied by the negroes the houses are smaller and less substantial in construction.

Many are finished on the exterior with rough lumber, to which a coat of whitewash is applied. Only dry closets are provided, and there is no public bath, as in the other section.

THE COMPANY-STORE SYSTEM.

The system of commissaries is practically universal in all of the mining communities and in the iron and steel plant communities. The mines are usually isolated enough to warrant the location of a commissary for supplies of all kinds, while the steel plants employ a sufficient number of men to justify the maintenance of company stores. The small plants within the limits of the city of Birmingham, such as machine shops, frog and switch plants, cast-iron-pipe foundries, and the like, neither own company houses nor operate commissaries, but as a general rule whenever a company employs a sufficient number of workers, or is isolated enough from the residence sections of the city to warrant the owning and the renting of company houses, the commissary system is also one of its features.

The commissary or company store is much the same sort of an institution all over the district in appearance, nature, and variety of facilities, and it may be said in prices. They differ largely in size. Generally the commissary is located in the center or in a very convenient section of the company quarters or camp, which has already been designated as the community. It is usually a long, low, one-story building with no display windows, and possessing one or two entrances. In the center are the bookkeeper's and the check master's offices, sometimes screened off from the rest of the space. Around the sides are the shelves for the stock, the counters, and on the floor is every variety and description of goods. In the larger commissaries the dry goods, grocery, and other departments are kept separate, and sometimes a dividing partition is found which roughly separates the dry goods and hardware from the groceries and the meat department. But in all instances the commissary presents a miniature market, or under the worst conditions an amplified and well organized country general store. Generally everything that the employee needs is kept in stock, and unless there is some want out of the ordinary he need never visit any other store. The wishes of the laborers are catered to as much as possible and their demands studied. The result is that every inducement is offered in a legitimate way to employees in order to secure their patronage.

While the commissaries themselves are operated in a manner which may be justly considered efficient, much of the patronage is induced by the methods of wage payments. As pointed out in another section, the systems of commissary checks and commissary credit is practically universal wherever the company maintains a commissary. The great majority of wage-payment periods are monthly. On pay days alone are payments made in currency; at any time between the pay days payments are made in the form of either (1) commissary checks, whose face value expressed in dollars or cents represent the "time" or currency wages due the employee; or (2) store credit, whereby the employee may deal directly with the store to the extent which his credit for wages on the company books

allow him. In nearly all companies individual employees having good records for financial reliability and steadiness may overdraw their credit at the commissaries within certain limits in time and amount, both under the store credit system or the commissary check system.

The effect of this policy is to encourage, and in many instances to have the effect of compelling, employees to deal with the commissaries. In fact, according to the statements of some of the small operators, commissaries as a rule return not only a 20 per cent net profit in normal times to the company, but the system goes so far as to largely determine the race of employees. In certain cases it was stated that negroes were preferred because their improvident habits prevented them from being able to live on cash incomes paid monthly, and thus forced them to draw their wages weekly, and even daily, in the form of commissary checks or store credits. Currency payments were made monthly partly for this purpose. As a result, the negroes are always a little in debt to the commissaries; they are rarely the possessor of any currency, and stay in the employ of one company as long as their employers will allow them. Their wants are confined to the supply of goods furnished by the commissaries, with the exception of whisky, and they have no funds for any other purpose than that of bare subsistence. Exceptions to this generally improvident class of course were found. For the same reason these employers do not encourage immigrant laborers, and in some cases refuse to employ them altogether. The immigrant exhibits a strong tendency to get his wages in cash and to live on the lowest level possible to maintain subsistence. He patronizes not only as few stores as he can, and as little as he can, but he seeks the cheapest places, and seeks for them first among the merchants of his own race. It is only when he becomes Americanized in his expenditures that he is a profitable employee from the standpoint of the commissary owner.

Another effect of the commissary system is the tendency toward a standardization of the manner in which the wants of the employees are satisfied. While, as it has been stated, the commissary manager makes a study of the wants of his patrons, yet it is true that he supplies a given want by a small variety of goods. The result is an appreciable sameness in the kind of food, the quality and character of dress of the employees, and in the many other commodities that enter into the comforts and the details of the home. The effect of the lack of variety is enhanced, and while it is true that the employees are satisfied, it is also true that no stimulant to variety or originality is afforded by the influence of the commissary. This is particularly true of isolated communities.

A careful and detailed inquiry into a comparison of prices in the commissaries and in the city markets and groceries revealed a slight increase in the general run of prices in the former over the latter. This increase did not exist in all instances, but on the average it was evident. It was not sufficient to warrant any other explanation than the one given by the owners and operators of the commissaries, that the additional expense of transportation of the goods and the maintenance of commissaries in communities with a restricted patronage justified a slight increase in prices.

Whether the slight increase in this case was a warranted one could not be determined, of course, except by a minute inquiry into the average cost of marketing the goods, the regularity of sales, etc. In

any event the difference was so small as to make it possible to state for practical purposes that the prices are the same. No difference in conditions existed where there were private stores competing with the commissaries. The patronage of the commissary under conditions of competition with private stores thus may be ascribed to the element of compulsion already referred to.

RELATIONS BETWEEN EMPLOYEES.

The working, living, and social relations of employees in both mines and iron and steel plants depend to a very considerable extent upon the degree of segregation according to race. It should be noted that in every case, except that of pick miners at work, the native whites are always segregated from the negroes. Rare exceptions occur to this rule. The native whites are separated by occupations, by location in the industrial communities, and by very distinct social lines from the negro. Even in the case of pick mining the whites work on different levels or on different veins unless there is a case where the white miner works on a contract and employs negroes in a subordinate capacity.

This is the general rule for the relations between the two native races, but a different condition exists with regard to other races. Immigrants from southern Europe exhibit a tendency to work in gangs whenever possible, unless there is an effort on the part of the employer to prevent it. Segregation into gangs, however, only occurs in an appreciable degree in one or two of the larger plants and mines, as the total number of immigrants in any one race at one plant is comparatively small. Segregation of this kind is caused primarily by the employment of immigrant foremen, the presence of some local immigrant leader who exercises influence enough to bring in other immigrants of his own race, and the natural racial tendency to congregate.

In one of the larger iron plants the company has developed a policy of mixing races. Italians and negroes and native whites and Italians are purposely mixed in the skilled and unskilled occupations upon the theory that a class or race spirit in any one occupation is prevented and the individual is encouraged to develop his own efficiency. It is claimed that this policy has shown excellent results along the lines intended and has ultimately produced a more efficient workman. Some of the other effects, it is stated, are prevention of unionizing; the inculcating of permanence among the Italians (in this case the only immigrant race concerned) as to employment and residence; and the mutual assistance superinduced by interracial relations, such as the setting of a nonracial standard of efficiency. The last-named effect, as claimed by the employer who is making this experiment of race mixing, is interestingly exhibited, for example, in the interracial effect as between negroes and Italians. The negro's ability to perform hard work in spurts and the Italian's habit of slow, steady labor, in the blast furnaces and coke ovens, where these two races are mixed, in the unskilled occupations connected with this work, form a composite standard of rapidity and quality which is better than if the two races were segregated. In the skilled occupations, however, the percentage of immigrant labor is negligible, and the

individual immigrants who rise to this grade of employment are not segregated from the native whites in any case.

This is seen especially in the instance of skilled Scotch, English, Swedish, or other northern European races, even in the few mines and camps where any considerable number of these races are employed. As practically all of this class of immigrants are skilled, or at least as skilled as the native whites, there is never any segregation.

The relations in living conditions of the different races are exhibited in the location of residence. In communities not under control, the tendency of the members and families of a given immigrant race, as well of negroes, is to congregate in sections, but this is in part prevented by the difficulty of obtaining houses close enough for colony purposes, except in the case of negroes. The immigrant races employed in the coal, iron, and steel industries who live outside of company quarters are not only too few in numbers to form colonies, but they are, with the occasional exception of northern European races who do not segregate themselves to any great extent apart from native whites even when possible, too recent in their residence to have formed a community life of their own. In the company quarters and camps, however, a slightly different order exists. In the first place, the segregative tendency is at work here as elsewhere, and segregation according to race is, so employers state, a matter of preference. In the second place, race prejudice is a strong factor. Native whites, with English, Irish, Scotch, and other northern European races, exhibit a strong aversion toward being neighbors to negroes, Italians, Bulgarians, and other southern and eastern Europeans. Thirdly, the employer owners permit racial segregation, and in some cases require it. As a result, the average camp or quarters is made up of two distinct colonies: (1) The native white, with such English, Scotch, Irish, Welsh, or German immigrants as may be employed there; (2) the negroes. If other races are present, they form a third colony; and if any considerable number of any one or more races live in the community, the principle of racial segregation is still further carried out.

SOCIAL ASSOCIATION.

Two distinct racial lines are drawn in association of a social nature. One of these is the color line between whites of all races and negroes, and the other is the line drawn between native whites and northern European races on the one hand and southern European races on the other. These are well defined and practically universal. The only instance of a disregard of the color line is an occasional instance of association of a social nature between the South Italian and the negro. Several employers made statements to this effect, although instances of it were seldom seen in practice. In the same way, exceptions to the second racial line were noted. In the few instances when southern European immigrants had attained skilled occupations, it was stated that these skilled individuals associated more or less with the native whites and northern European races. A still further drawing of racial lines is evident between the various southern European races. Italians, for example, do not associate in a social way with Slovaks, nor Bulgarians with Poles. The same is true of practically all of what may be termed this class of races. There is no

racial distinction of any consequence, on the other hand, between the Scotch and the Welsh, or either of these with the English or the native white. Consequently company quarters or a camp containing several races presents a community singularly lacking in cohesiveness. They possess no more common aim, pride, or standard other than that of the predominant race, whatever that race may be. There is nothing, it is obviously true, to draw the different elements together with widely divergent habits, speech, standards of life, with not a little race prejudice to operate in the opposite direction.

WELFARE WORK BY THE EMPLOYERS.

The "welfare work" maintained by the employers in the Birmingham district may, for purposes of clearness, be considered under three heads, namely, medical attention to employees, hospital services, and welfare work of a general character. As regards medical attention, a distinction is made between medical services for illness caused by accident and illness caused by disease. The cost of the former is borne to varying extents by the companies, some companies allowing a longer period of free services than others. The great majority, however, provide for the cost of first aid to those injured while at work, the larger mining camps and the larger steel companies employing a regular physician for this purpose as well as for general medical attention, which is described below. The cost of medical attention for illness due to disease and prolonged effects of accidents is in all cases, except in that for one large mining company, borne by the employees through a system of assessments on wages by the company. The amounts are either 50 cents or 75 cents per month for unmarried employees, and 75 cents or \$1 per month for married employees who have their families with them, the cheaper and the more expensive rates of assessments being about equally divided among the companies. This assessment covers all medical attention for all members of the families, except male members, other than the heads, over 18 years of age, and at all times, as long as they are in the employ of the company. The amount assessed is taken out of the wages due each employee at the end of the month or the payment period, and, it is claimed, is turned over to the physician, who does the work under a yearly contract.

There is no fixed rule regarding permanent disability from accident or disease. Some companies do not make any provision; others make liberal provisions for employees who, in the estimation of the employers, have been particularly faithful, either in the form of some employment of a light nature or a pension or the gift of a lump sum of money or a piece of property. The whole matter of assistance to this class of employees depends on the individual employee and the individual employer, even though the latter be a corporation. But medical attention usually continues in the case of long-continued or permanent illness from whatever cause until the patient, if he be an employee and unable to earn his wages, either dies or is known to become permanently incapacitated. In the case of the continued illness of one of the members of an employee's family, the medical attention continues as long as the head of the family continues in the employ of the company and is able to earn his wage.

Hospital service is rarely rendered except in cases of accident while in the employment of the company, and as a general rule is furnished free by the smaller companies. Only the larger mining camps and quarters maintain company hospitals; the smaller companies patronize the nearest public or private hospitals. In some cases, the companies have a yearly contract with some private hospital by which the rate of cost is lessened to the company.

It is interesting to note, however, that the larger companies make an assessment upon all employees for hospital service similar to that for medical service. The best examples of this are found in the case of the larger steel companies, where every employee is assessed 25 cents a month for hospital service, and this acts as a kind of insurance on the part of the employee against the time when an accident will require hospital attention. Nearly all of the companies protect themselves against damages for death or accident by insurance on their own part, and some of them insure themselves against the actual cost of providing medical and hospital attention to injured employees.

The hospitals maintained by the larger operators are adequate for ordinary circumstances and are well equipped. Under extraordinary circumstances, such as in the case of a mine explosion, the city hospitals as well as the many private hospitals are available and accessible.

Welfare work, other than that which may be included under medical and hospital attention and service, is confined entirely to the providing of school facilities, and church and lodge buildings. No welfare work in providing reading rooms, technical or other instruction schools or classes, beautifying grounds, or efforts of any kind toward cultural and esthetic development, is maintained or, so far as the employers themselves indicated, intended. The work of the companies in affording lodge and church buildings occurs entirely in the isolated mining camps, when the companies either build at their own expense a house for lodge meetings or supplement funds raised by the employees. The same is true of church buildings. In the company quarters on the outskirts of Birmingham and nearby towns even this is not always done by the larger steel companies and never in the case of companies owning no company houses. When the industrial community in the company quarters is large enough, there are churches of two or more denominations and several lodges. In these cases, the employees pay for their own buildings. The general principle governing all companies in this respect is the degree of isolation of the communities composed of their own employees.

The provision of schools by employees takes, in all instances, the form of supplementing the public school funds. In the establishment of a camp, for example, the company applies to the local educational authorities for a school which, on account of the number of available pupils, is usually given them. Should the local district school fund be insufficient to provide for a building either wholly or in part, the company usually provides the funds and in many cases makes an arrangement whereby the building can be used for purposes of religious and lodge meetings. Separate schools for whites and negroes are maintained, according to the Alabama laws, and separate buildings are thus provided.

The same policy is carried out in the supplementing of the public funds for the maintenance of these schools. The public rural schools

in Alabama are opened only four or five months in the year, but in practically every instance, when this condition applies, the companies supplement the funds so as to afford the children of the employees an eight or nine months' session. One instance was found where a company assisted a white parochial school. In two cases it was found that the cost of thus extending the term was borne by a method of pro rata assessment of employees, according to the number of children in a family, similar to that used in medical and hospital assessments.

In the case of industrial communities within immediate reach of large towns, such as Bessemer or of Birmingham, the school systems afford facilities sufficient to take care of the children of all employees, and the companies do not contribute except through the regular channels of taxation.

THE IMMIGRANT AND ORGANIZED LABOR.

Labor unions are not recognized by employers in the Birmingham district and the extent of membership among employees is small. The following table shows, by general nativity and race of individual, the affiliation with trade unions of males in the households studied who were 21 years of age or over and who were working for wages:

Of 1,186 males in the households studied in this community from whom information was obtained, only 26, or 2.2 per cent, were affiliated with trade unions, the foreign-born reporting 25, or 2.4 per cent of their number, while the native-born report less than 1 per cent. It is especially interesting to note the large proportion of Slovaks with union affiliations as compared with the other races, the Slovaks reporting 27.6 per cent, while the proportions of the Poles, Scotch, North Italians, French, Greeks, and South Italians, in the order named, range from 5.4 to 0.2 per cent. These comparisons indicate, it would seem, that the employees of the iron and steel industry with union affiliations in this locality are such as were members of unions in localities in which they were previously employed and in which there existed a stronger organization of labor.

LABOR DISPUTES.

Labor disputes, strikes, and all conditions resulting from differences regarding wages and conditions of employment, have been a comparatively slight element in determining the character of working conditions in the Birmingham district for three reasons:

First. All strikes have failed.

Second. The presence of so large a proportion of negroes has to a large extent prevented thorough unionizing of employees. Labor organization, therefore, outside of actual strikes has had little effect upon conditions of employment.

Third. While immigrants have been imported into the district as strike breakers, a very small proportion of immigrants brought in for this purpose have become permanent residents. Labor disputes have, as a result, had little effect upon the racial composition of employees.

These conclusions will, it is believed, be evident in a rapid survey of the history of labor disputes in the Birmingham district.

The first strike in the Birmingham district to affect in any way the immigrant employees was the coal miners' strike of 1904. There was a strike in the coal mines in 1894, but as it was in the early days of the industry in the district, it was of small consequence in its effects, and occurred before the immigration of foreign-born miners or other laborers had begun to any appreciable extent. The 1904 strike, however, bore a relation to immigrant labor because immigrants were brought in to a small extent as strike breakers. A number of Slovaks, some Poles, and a mixture of other races, so far as can be determined at this date, were brought in. In only a few instances have any of these strike breakers remained in the district, the largest Slovak community being the most notable example of permanent immigration as the result of this strike. Practically all other immigrants of this period scattered to other sections of the United States as fast as the striking employees returned to work.

The proximate cause of the 1904 strike of the coal miners was a determination on the part of the operators to institute certain changes in wages, hours of work, and time of wage payments. Theretofore the operators had based the rate of pay upon a sliding scale which operated in conformity to the price of pig iron. The minimum rate prior to the action of the operators was $47\frac{1}{2}$ cents a ton for pick-mined coal when iron was selling at \$8 a ton. They now proposed to reduce the minimum to 40 cents a ton when iron was selling at \$8.50 a ton,

45 cents a ton for coal when iron was selling at \$9.50 per ton, and a maximum of 55 cents a ton for coal when iron was selling as high as \$13 per ton or over. They also proposed to do away with semi-monthly pay days and institute monthly pay days instead, and to require a nine-hour work day. These changes meant an hour longer working day, and a reduction of 10 cents per ton for the minimum for pick-mined coal and 7½ cents a ton for the maximum. Another change proposed was the payment of "outside men" by the hour instead of by the day.

Thirty-one smaller companies, having signed a temporary agreement with the miners, were not directly concerned in the strike.

The United Mine Workers of America met the proposition of the operators by demanding a contract for two years, the eight-hour day, the semimonthly pay day, the contract of the previous year with regard to rates of remuneration to be continued, and a few changes in different classes of employees. In a statement quoted in the local press at the time, a member of the national board of the United Mine Workers stated that for the past ten years the miners had generally met and formulated some scale which they presented to the operators, and that the operators prepared a scale which they in turn presented to the miners. Two weeks, or even less, he said, had been sufficient for the operators and the miners to come to some agreement. In 1904, however, he stated that when the operators had refused to meet the miners on any terms, and dissolved the operators' association, the miners offered to submit to arbitration, which offer was refused. This statement in its detailed showing of the facts appears to have been correct, but the truth was that the operators had made up their minds to refuse to recognize the union in any way. The operators' association, which had existed largely as a formal method of discussing the wage scale and other matters with the union, was therefore dissolved, and the furnace operators, all of whom also operated mines, decided to stand on their own grounds after a general decision was made.

The strike was accordingly called on July 26, 1904, by the United Mine Workers of the Alabama district. It affected about 8,000 men, which included practically all of the miners in the State, with the exception of about 500 men in the commercial companies which had temporary agreements.

The first few months of the strike constituted the really critical period. During that time many instances of lawlessness and disorder and violence occurred. The strikers, especially the white miners of native origin, were supported by the union, but the negroes left the district in large numbers for other States. After the first few weeks many of the strikers, especially the negroes, violated their agreement with the union and returned to work, and the operators allowed all strikers, except those who were strike leaders or who had been guilty of violence to return under the terms of their original proposition. Practically all of the remaining commercial companies, for the most part very small operators, soon signed agreements with the union, and left only the larger operators, who were also furnace operators, in the fight against the union. As soon as it was definitely decided that neither side would yield, the operators brought in Magyars, Slovaks, Greeks, Servians, Italians, and Finns, as well as

native whites, as strike breakers as fast as they could secure them. These immigrants were used largely to take the place of negro labor, both in the mines and in the tipples, and while brought in by only one company largely, many of them spread to other operators. The immigrants were largely direct from Ellis Island, and were found to be very unsatisfactory except for the most unskilled labor. Other laborers and miners were brought in from the mining districts of West Virginia, and the mill districts of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Baltimore. The latter who were native whites, were used to take the place of the native whites who had gone out.

It is difficult to ascertain just how many men belonging to the union were on strike at any given time. The report of the secretary-treasurer of the union on April 30, 1905, stated that on August 12, 1904, there were 9,122 men on strike, but at the time the report was made the union had on its membership rolls only 3,624. Operators state that thousands of union men came back to work, while the union reports indicate that many of the strikers left the district to seek work elsewhere. Both statements are probably true, and the fact is that after the first few months, many of the immigrant laborers as well as imported native white laborers went away from the district as local negroes and native whites returned to work. At the end of two years comparatively few either immigrant or imported white laborers were present; the operators were dictating their own scale of wages, the union had not been recognized, and things had settled down to their normal condition.

The union organization found itself in a badly disorganized condition, and as the price of pig iron went up in January, 1905, the wages of the pick miners were raised by the company to 57½ cents a ton, which was the maximum—a fact which made the continuance of the strike on the part of the union very difficult. This advance in wages, as based on the price of pig iron, had started as early as October, and soon after that time all deputies for the preservation of order were found unnecessary.

About the time of the coal-miners strike of 1904, there was a strike of furnace men in the blast furnaces and steel mills, but it was not a sympathetic movement. In fact it started earlier, its very inception being as early as October, 1903, but it was declared on March 16, 1904. The reduction of wages of the open-hearth men from \$3.40 a day and 6 cents a ton before the closing of the mills in the fall of 1903 to a fixed wage of \$3 a day and no tonnage was the cause of the strike. The men demanded \$3 a day, with 4 cents a ton additional. The strike caused a cessation of work in all of the departments at Ensley for about two weeks, and involved about 60 furnace men. Concessions were made by both sides and work was resumed on April 1. No immigrants were involved, and the strike did not assume proportions large enough to necessitate the calling in of skilled or unskilled men from other sections. No union was involved, as the furnace men were not affiliated with any labor organization.

One result of this first period of labor dispute in the Birmingham district, so far as immigrant labor was concerned, was that a few foreign-born unskilled laborers were left in the district. A considerable number of them had, during the whole period of the dispute, been brought in; but the large majority of them scattered to other sections of the United States as fast as the old men deserted the union,

or as fast as native-born laborers could be secured from outside of the district. None of the Finns, Magyars, Servians, and few of the Italians remained. The Greeks entered into other lines of occupation, notably mercantile pursuits, and a considerable proportion, so far as can be determined, of the Slovaks stayed. The remaining Slovaks constitute practically the only colony of that race in the district.

A second result was the prejudice against the immigrant on account of his being used on this occasion as a strike breaker. Even those natives who had deserted the union and had been given the right to displace immigrants when they returned to work still entertained a dislike for the southern European immigrant for this reason. The years from the end of the 1904 strike, which practically took place in 1905, although the dispute on the part of the union was continued for two years, until 1908, were a period of peace in the labor circles of the district. In the interim the agents of the United Mine Workers continued their efforts to perfect a stronger organization, and by 1908 they considered themselves strong enough to settle the question of "open" or "union" shop. On July 1, 1908, they claimed that the union possessed about 4,000 members, and the sentiment of other miners, native white, negro, and foreign-born, had been carefully tested.

The chance to test the strength of the union came in July, 1908, when the operators announced that owing to the depression in the coal and coke industry, it was necessary to either close down for a time or reduce wages by something like 20 per cent. They stated that they had determined to choose the latter alternative and try it as long as they could. The union replied with a demand for wages that at least were no lower than the scale prior to that time; for the abolition of certain "abuses" and "impositions," such as short weights, etc.; and the recognition of the union and the operation of the mines upon the "union-shop" principle. There is no doubt that the question of union recognition and union shop were the real issues, and the operators refused to grant any of the demands, either of the men individually or of the union organization. On July 6, 1908, a general strike was ordered in the district by the United Mine Workers, and practically every miner walked out. Unlike the strike of 1904, nearly every commercial operator joined in with the larger operators who mined coal for furnace and mill use, and declared for the principle of open shop. Only four small commercial companies signed a wage-scale agreement as demanded by the union, the remaining 25 operators of all kinds refused to recognize the union.

As nearly 8,000 more men than were actually enrolled in the membership of the union walked out, the union felt that it was strong enough to win. Owing to the industrial depression, the operators at this time could afford to lose time. In fact many of them welcomed the opportunity. A few of them who operated furnaces and mills were handicapped because of the delay caused in the carrying out of orders, and attempted to start up three days later with a small crew, and at once began the work of importing miners from other States and immigrants from other coal fields and New York.

On the other hand, the immigrant miners who were in the employ of the operators at the time the strike was called, responded to the call of the union. As shown in another section of this report a con-

siderable number of them had been imported in 1906 and 1907. The operators furthermore announced that no reinstatements would be allowed as long as the strike existed. The issue was much more clearly drawn in this strike than in the preceding one, and the feeling of antagonism ran much higher.

As soon as the strike breakers began to arrive, scenes of violence occurred. Several persons were killed during the attacks of union miners or strike sympathizers upon the strike breakers, and it became necessary, in the opinion of the state governor, to call in the militia and take decisive measures. So frequent were the disorders that public opinion, as reflected by the local press, began to urge that measures of a conciliatory nature be taken to stop the strike, and expressions directly advocating concessions to the miners' demands began to be heard. These instances of violence occurred from time to time all during July, until on August 9 a signally lawless attack was made upon a train full of deputies and imported strike breakers. Unknown parties stopped the train by laying ties across the track, and the attacking party of 50 or more fired into the crowded coaches, killing three men and severely wounding many others. This was the boldest assault that had taken place during the strike, and it aroused the governor of the State to issue a call to the state militia to be in readiness to respond at a moment's notice. Furthermore, he threatened to call the legislature in extra session to take drastic measures if the strike was not terminated by 10 o'clock on August 31, and threatened to destroy the tents of all idle miners. As the companies had ejected all striking miners from the company quarters when the walkout began, the destruction of the tents would have meant that thousands of striking miners would be left without shelter.

By this time, however, the union had lost much strength. It was found difficult to hold negro strikers and to control them as well as immigrant strikers from attempting acts of violence. The native white miners, for the most part, had refrained from any violence and discountenanced the work of the negroes and the immigrants, and internal dissension had set in. The strike had cost the union between \$50,000 and \$100,000 a week, and the funds of the organization were getting low, as receipts were dwindling and the surplus had vanished. The decided stand of the state executive regarding the calling off of the strike enabled the operators to win, as all they had to do was to wait until the last day had expired and to rely on the effect of public disapproval of the lawlessness of the striking miners. As a result, a statement was issued by the officers of the United Mine Workers of America, calling the strike off on September 1, "recognizing," as the statement ran, "the futility of running in opposition to the State," and "bowing in submission to the mandate of the State." As fast as there was need of them, the striking miners, except those who had been leaders or who had been convicted of lawlessness, were taken back by the operators, and the policy of the open shop was established.

During the strike considerable numbers of immigrants were brought in as strike breakers, but in not so great a proportion as native whites from other coal-mining sections.

Comparatively few of these imported miners remained in the district. In fact many of them left very soon after they came, it being alleged that the union paid their expenses back to their homes or to other points where they wished to go. The immigrant population

of the district, especially of the southern European races, was considerably enlarged, however, as compared with what it was previous to the strike. Only those remained who came for permanent employment, and the nucleus thus started was increased by the arrival of friends and relatives. But the proportion of immigrants imported as strike breakers is small when compared with the number brought into the district during the period of industrial prosperity in 1905 and 1906. As a general rule the immigrants were considered a failure by the operators as strike breakers. They were inexperienced, unwilling to undergo risks, and unable to respond in any way to the sudden demand for work after they arrived upon the scene. Furthermore, their importation was the proximate cause of much of the violence. The most serious outbreaks on the part of the strikers or their sympathizers were made upon foreign-born strike breakers on account of a feeling of prejudice against them which had been carried over from the strike of 1904. The striking immigrants, too, were responsible for much of the serious attacks, and with the negroes constituted the lawless element.

Since 1908 the union has maintained a local office and agents and has been waging a quiet campaign of reorganization. It is stated by local union officials that neither the negroes nor the immigrants make good union members. The negro is too shiftless and irresponsible to share in concerted movements for a common aim of any sort, and the immigrant shows too great a racial tendency in matters necessitating congregation of forces, while he is ready to accept any sort of wages and to save by exceeding economy rather than by forcing increases in pay.

The labor disputes in the Birmingham district furnish another instance of the operation of the general rule that working conditions are there peculiarly under the control of the employers, and that the latter are not limited in their control of the conditions of employment except by the natural laws of demand and supply in the labor market. The employers are likely to remain in this position. The facts that the native whites are comparatively few in number and are uneducated in the labor movement; that the large majority of employees are negroes who, experience has shown, can not be relied upon in a sustained effort; and that the number and character of immigrant laborers promise nothing definite or reliable for the union in the future, would appear to indicate that no change in the conditions of employment will be brought about soon through cooperative effort of the employees themselves.



CHAPTER V.

INDUSTRIAL PROGRESS AND EFFICIENCY.

Industrial progress of the several races—General efficiency, by races—Order of preference, by races.

INDUSTRIAL PROGRESS OF THE SEVERAL RACES.

Employers in the Birmingham district agree that the English-speaking immigrant races, especially the Scotch and the Welsh, are advancing faster in the scale of occupations than any others. Very few North Italians are found in this district, but these few are stated to have shown more industrial advancement than other non-English-speaking races. But slight progress has been noted, according to the statements of employers, on the part of Slovaks, South Italians, Poles, Lithuanians, Bulgarians, and other southern European races. So far as advancement in the scale of occupations is concerned, these latter races are classed below the negroes.

It is fair to note two points with reference to this generalization. One is that the division between English-speaking and non-English-speaking races does not necessarily mean that the knowledge of English has enabled the former to achieve the progress that they have attained. In one instance the Swedes were said to have made the greatest progress and to have shown the greatest capability for advancement among all immigrant races. These Swedes had learned to speak English, it is true, but their progress did not depend entirely on that fact by any means. As a general rule the employers who expressed an opinion stated that the basis of advancement was efficiency alone, although the value of a knowledge of English to the employee was of course admitted as a factor.

A second qualification is that a very few employers were able to express an intelligent opinion on the relative progress of immigrants by races, because the southern European races had not been in residence long enough or continuously enough to have proven or disproven their ability to advance in any given occupation in the mines or in the steel and iron plants. The Scotch, Welsh, English, and Irish, on the other hand, are the oldest immigrants in the district. Not only are they the first immigrants, but a considerable number of them were experienced in their particular occupations before they emigrated from their native lands or before they came to the Birmingham district. This is particularly true of the earlier immigrant coal miners, who had been engaged in that occupation either before they left their home countries or had had experience in mining in other sections of the United States. Slovak, Bulgarian, Italian, and other southern European immigrants not only have not been in the district very long, but they were inexperienced before they came. While noting these two considerations, however, the employers who had a basis for an opinion stated that with very few exceptions the southern European races had exhibited no ability to rise in the scale of occupations.

The same tendency was evident with regard to the attainment of executive positions by the various races. Only English-speaking races among the immigrants exhibited any tendency toward becoming foremen. This is especially true of the Scotch and Welsh, particularly the Scotch. In only one mining company was there a southern European foreman—an Italian who had charge of a gang of Italians on a coal tippie. This same company employed two negro foremen over negro gangs, which was an unusual condition in the district. For the most part, all of the executive positions, even the lowest, are occupied by native whites and Scotch. The only reason given for this condition by the employer is that the native white or the Scotch or Welsh is preferred on account of his aptitude as well as his sense of responsibility, which may be translated into confidence on the part of the employers.

The school attendance of immigrant children as an indication of their industrial progress would appear to show a different result than that stated above, for the children of all immigrants attend school. But the second generation has not yet appeared in the Birmingham district, except the children of the older and English-speaking immigrants, so that while the percentage of attendance of immigrant children at school is perhaps high on account of the fact that the employees are assessed by the companies for school expenses, as described in another section of this report, the effect of this attendance has not yet had time to appear except in rare instances.

In these instances, however, where the second generation has appeared, regardless of the races, it has been the experience of all employers who had a basis for an opinion that the second generation is far superior to the first in every way. None of the southern European races of the first generation exhibit any great ability to learn English beyond a certain limit, which is to carry on a simple conversation on restricted subjects; but their children, largely through their attendance upon school and their association with the children of native Americans, exhibit a great progress in this direction.

To sum up, therefore, the consensus of the opinions of the employers regarding the progress of the immigrants by races it appears that very slow progress has been shown by any of the southern European races, and that they do not believe that length of residence would have any effect upon their position. The first generation of these races as a whole is regarded as incapable of progress in industry and is fit for the unskilled occupations only. On the other hand, the older immigrants, such as the Scotch, Welsh, and English, show nearly if not quite the same degree of progress in the industrial scale as the native whites, while the negroes as a general rule are classed as a little better than the southern European races. The question of comparative racial efficiency and preference by race on the part of the employers is given in greater detail in the two following sections.

GENERAL EFFICIENCY, BY RACES.

As a general conclusion from the statement of employers, the native whites, Scotch, Welsh, English, and, in fact, all the northern European races are considered much more efficient than the negroes or the races of southern Europe. Very little if any difference in the various northern European races or among the native whites could be

ascertained. The American whites, English, Welsh, Scotch, Irish, Germans, Swedes, etc., are generally thought to be equally capable and equally good workmen. Only individual distinctions, rather than racial distinctions, were expressed. With the exception of the South Italians, the races of recent immigration were not represented in sufficient numbers for comparison with the native employees. An important fact is the practically universal opinion among employers that South Italians are extremely inefficient and the most inefficient of all races, whether immigrant or native. The only exception to this opinion was that of the officials of one large steel company, who expressed the belief that under conditions of "mixing" races, or making negroes and Italians work together in the same occupations, as described in another section of this report, the Italians could be developed into efficient workers. This company stated that they had attained good results from this system. As a general rule, however, South Italians, who in the Birmingham district are chiefly Sicilians, were classed with Macedonians, Lithuanians, and Bulgarians as inefficient and to be used only when the supply of native or other immigrant labor was inadequate to the demand.

In the opinion of the employers whose experience with all races affords a sufficient basis for comparison, the negro, as compared with both of the classes of employees already described, occupies a position of an intermediate nature. This applies, of course, to unskilled and semiskilled labor, as only native whites and the best class of northern European races are employed in the skilled occupations. In spite of the shiftlessness which is attributed generally by employers to the negroes, they are regarded as distinctly superior in all unskilled work in the steel plants to southern European immigrants.

ORDER OF PREFERENCE, BY RACES.

The preference, according to race, for employees as expressed by the employers in the Birmingham district follows very closely their estimates of the relative racial efficiency of the different races whom they have engaged in their mines and plants. To a very small extent is their preference tempered by racial prejudices, other than the extent to which prejudice influenced their estimates of efficiency. A compilation of the preferences of all employers, particularly the larger ones who have had most experience with immigrants, shows that English, Scotch, Welsh, French, and Irish are classed with native whites as the first choice. No distinctions were made among the above-named races, except where a preference for native whites in skilled occupations was expressed. Germans were preferred first after these races in the one or two cases where they were employed. Negroes were the second choice of practically all employers, only one instance of another race not already included in the above being preferred, the race in question being Italians. Slovaks were preferred by more employers than any other race as third choice, although many grouped all southern European races together. Those having the largest number of immigrants in their employ, however, put Slovaks in a higher class than Italians, Macedonians, Bulgarians, Poles, or Greeks. The last-named races, especially the Italians, were only accepted in any occupation or capacity as a last resort.



CHAPTER VI.

GENERAL COST AND STANDARD OF LIVING.

Explanation of study—Summary statement relative to representative households—Representative household expenditures for food and general living purposes—Retail prices of food.

EXPLANATION OF STUDY.

No detailed study was made of the cost of living of the iron and steel workers and their households in the Birmingham district. Information from selected families was secured, however, which affords an insight into the cost of living in the district, and is chiefly important in its bearing upon the prevailing standards of living. With this material it has been considered wise to submit detailed data relative to housing and living conditions and methods of living, in order that a general conception of the situation may be gathered from the salient facts about representative households and persons. This summary statement relative to selection of households immediately follows. The presentation is by race of head of household.

SUMMARY STATEMENT RELATIVE TO REPRESENTATIVE HOUSEHOLDS.

HOUSEHOLD No. 1.—SOUTH ITALIAN.

This household is composed of husband, wife, son, and daughter, who are respectively 32, 28, 4, and 2 years of age. The husband and wife were born in Italy and have been in the United States six years. Both children were born in the United States. The husband is an alien and does not expect to make his permanent home in this country. The husband and wife can read and write their native language, having attended school abroad, and the former is able to speak English, though the wife and children do not possess this ability.

The house in which they reside is a frame building for which a monthly rent of \$6 is paid. It contains two rooms, one being used as a sleeping room, and one a sleeping room, living room, and kitchen combined. The apartment is in good repair, and is clean and well kept. There is no bath in the house, the water coming from a hydrant near by, which supplies seven other families. The closet, which is flush, is in the yard and is used by seven families. Heat is supplied from the cooking stove and light from oil lamps, no electricity or gas being available.

The husband and wife are the sole support of the family, the former being an unskilled laborer in the steel mills, for which he receives \$1.25 per day, and the latter earning \$8 per month as a seamstress. The husband worked the full time during the year and his total earnings amounted to \$405. The cost of food was \$20 per month, and after paying for rent and fuel, light and clothing, \$150 was saved out of the total year's earnings. A house and lot are owned, worth \$300, on which there is still an indebtedness of \$100. The husband be-

longs to no trade unions or other organizations. A newspaper published in Italian is read. Before coming to the United States the husband was a soldier in the regular army of Italy and the wife was a seamstress. The head of the household stated that he came to the United States to secure higher earnings.

HOUSEHOLD No. 2.—SOUTH ITALIAN.

This household consists of the husband who is 50 years of age, wife who is 42 years old, three daughters who are respectively 10, 8, and 5 years of age, and one son aged 9 years. The man and woman were married in Italy eighteen years ago. The head of the household has been in the United States between one and two years and the wife and children four months. None of the family can speak English and all are illiterate. The husband is an alien, but expects to make his permanent home in this country.

The house in which this family resides is a detached frame structure in an Italian colony. It contains two rooms, which are used as bedrooms, living rooms, dining room, and kitchen. The house is in only fair repair and the rooms show little care or attention. Light is supplied by oil lamps and heat by the cooking stove. A hydrant outside of the house supplies the water. There is no bath. The toilet, which is flush, is in the yard and is used by four other families.

The head of the household is an unskilled laborer in the steel mills earning \$1.15 per day. He worked only nine months the past year, owing to industrial depression. His total earnings amounted to \$269, all of which has been expended for the support of the family. The head is in debt \$166; \$106 of this amount is money borrowed to bring his family over from Italy and \$60 is owed in store accounts. The husband belongs to no trade union or other organization. While abroad he was a farmer. He left Italy hoping to improve his condition and came to the United States because he had relatives here.

HOUSEHOLD No. 3.—NORTH ITALIAN.

This household is composed of the husband, aged 28, the wife who is 25, two sons, aged 4 and 2, and one daughter 2 months old. The house, which is only in fairly good repair, is a detached frame structure of two rooms, both of which are used for sleeping purposes, as well as for living rooms and kitchen. The apartment is not well kept. There is no bath in the house, the water being piped to a hydrant in the yard, where there is also a dry closet. Heat is provided by the cooking stove and light by kerosene lamps. All of the family except the youngest child were born abroad and have been in the United States one year. None speak, read, or write English. The head is an alien and is uncertain as to whether or not he will make this country his permanent home. He is the sole support of the family, being employed as an unskilled laborer in the yard of a steel mill at \$1.25 per day. He worked only eight months during the past year, the short time being due to the industrial depression; he earned \$260, all of which was used for the support of the family. His occupation abroad was that of shoemaker and he had \$60 in cash when he came to the United States. He was a member of a beneficial society in Italy, but has joined no trade unions or other organizations in this country.

The reason assigned for coming to the United States was that his sister and brother-in-law, who were in this country, were very sick, and he came to help them.

HOUSEHOLD No. 4.—NORTH ITALIAN.

This household consists of a husband, wife, son, and daughter, the husband being 43 years of age, the wife 37, and the son and daughter 11 and 9 years of age, respectively. All were born in Italy. The husband has been in the United States eight years and the wife and children five years. This family lives in a four-room frame house of one story. Two of the rooms are sleeping rooms, the other two being a dining room and a kitchen. The dwelling is rented for \$6.25 per month and is only in fairly good repair. There is no bath in the house, all of the water being secured from a well. Light is provided by kerosene lamps, as city gas, electricity, and water are unavailable. There is a dry closet in the yard. The apartment is very unclean and shows little care or attention. The head of the household and his wife speak, read, and write their native language, having attended school abroad. The children speak Italian, but can not read and write that language. They have attended school in the United States and can speak English, the eldest being able also to read and write it. The husband can speak English, but is unable to read and write it, while the wife can neither speak, read, nor write English. The sole support of the family is the husband, who is employed in the steel industry and earns \$2.25 per day. During the past year he was idle five months on account of a strike and a general industrial depression and earned only \$316, all of which was used for the support of the family. No money has been saved, the only property owned being a lot worth about \$150. The head of the household is an alien, but intends to make his permanent home in the United States. He belongs to no trade unions or other organizations. Two newspapers published in Italian and one published in English are read.

HOUSEHOLD No. 5.—BULGARIAN.

This household is a boarding group composed of eight Bulgarians and one Montenegrin, ranging from 26 to 48 years of age. All except one have been in the United States between one and two years, the one exception having had a residence of less than one year. All are aliens and only two stated that they expected to make their permanent homes in this country. None can speak English and two are unable to read and write their native language. The house in which they reside is rented from the company and is a frame structure in only fair repair, containing two rooms, both of which are used as sleeping and living rooms. The rent per month is \$5.25. There is no bath in the house, the water supply coming from a hydrant used by six other households. The flush toilet is in the yard and is used by two boarding groups. The interior of the apartment is very unclean, little attention being given to sanitary precautions. The rooms are heated by coal grates and lighted by kerosene lamps.

All of this group eat at a restaurant and each individual owns his bed and furniture, sharing equally the expenditures for rent, coal, and oil. All are married and all have children, but in every instance

the family is abroad. All are engaged in some form of unskilled labor in the steel industry, some earning \$1.50 per day and others \$1.25 per day. Only one worked the full year, the others having worked from two to ten months, and approximate earnings ranged from \$78 to \$546. Reasons given for lost time were industrial depression and sickness. All except one man in the group sent money abroad, the amounts ranging from \$50 to \$100. The cost per month for food and drink ranged from \$12 a man to \$18. Exclusive of money sent abroad, one man saved \$200 of his earnings, another \$100, another \$37, another \$20, and another \$10. During the past year one individual had a deficit of \$50, one a deficit of \$30, and one a deficit of \$25. None are affiliated with any trade unions or organizations and none carry any insurance. Two reasons were given for leaving Europe and coming to the United States, the most common of which is the desire to earn more, the other reason being political. The occupation abroad of several of these men was farming or farm labor, while one was a laborer on a railroad, another one was a watchman, and one was a charcoal burner.

HOUSEHOLD No. 6.—BULGARIAN AND MACEDONIAN.

This household is a boarding group of six males, three of whom are Bulgarians and three Macedonians. Their ages range from 20 to 26, and all have been in the United States between one and two years. All are aliens, but three expect to make this country their permanent home, one is doubtful, and two expect to return to their native land. Only two are able to speak English, but all can read and write their native language and all except one have attended school abroad. The house occupied by this group contains two rooms, which are used as living and sleeping rooms. There is no bath, the water being supplied by a hydrant outside the house, which is used by six other families. The flush toilet is in the yard and is used by two families. The house is in only fairly good repair and rents for \$5.25 per month. The interior of the apartment is unclean and no sanitary precautions are in evidence. Heat is supplied by open grates and light by oil lamps. All of this group eat at a restaurant and share equally the cost of rent, fuel, and light. Beds and other furniture are owned separately. Only one individual in this household is married, his wife being in Europe. One newspaper, published in Bulgarian, is subscribed to, and no persons are affiliated with trades unions or other organizations. One man in this group earns \$1.50 per day, the others earning \$1.25. During the past year one man worked full time, one lost one month's work, two lost three months, one lost four months, and one lost five months. The time lost was attributed to industrial depression. Total earnings ranged from \$228 to \$495. All except one individual sent money abroad in amounts ranging from \$50 to \$180. Exclusive of money sent abroad, five individuals saved amounts ranging from \$60 to \$220. Food and drink cost three individuals \$9 per month each, and three \$13 per month each. Lodging, fuel, and light ranged from \$1.75 to \$2.10 per month. All were either farmers or farm laborers abroad. Three left Europe on account of low wages and three for political reasons. All came to the United States through the advice of friends.

HOUSEHOLD No. 7.—POLISH.

This household consists of husband and wife, aged, respectively, 27 and 30, and one lodger, who is 29 years of age. The husband has been in the United States six years, the wife nine years, and the lodger five years. Husband and wife can speak, but can not read and write, English, while the lodger can speak English and also read and write it. All three have attended school abroad.

The dwelling occupied by this household is a detached frame structure in very poor repair, containing four rooms, for which a monthly rental of \$11 is paid. The rooms are used as sleeping room, living room, kitchen, and dining room. The interior of the apartment is not clean and shows lack of proper attention. There is no bath in the house, the water being supplied by a hydrant in the yard. The flush toilet is in the house. Neither gas nor electricity is available, the house being heated by coal grates and lighted with kerosene lamps.

The wife is enabled to contribute to the household expenses by taking a boarder who pays \$20 per month for board, lodging, and washing. Both the husband and the lodger are aliens, but expect to make the United States their permanent home. The male members of this household are employed in the iron and steel industry, one as a skilled laborer on a finishing machine and the other as a skilled laborer in the open-hearth department. Each worked about six months out of the past year, earning \$2 per day. The total earnings of the husband were \$364, all of which was contributed to the family fund, and the lodger's earnings were \$336, of which \$240 was paid to the family for board and lodging. The time lost by the head of the household was due to the industrial depression of 1908, and that lost by the lodger was attributed to the same cause and to injuries received while at work. The cost of food and drink purchased for home consumption is \$50 per month. During the past year the family suffered a deficit, which was met with savings from previous years' earnings. Neither the head nor the lodger belongs to a trade union or other organization, and neither carries insurance. In Europe the husband was a carpenter and the lodger a butcher. Both came to the United States with the hope of increasing their earnings.

HOUSEHOLD No. 8.—POLISH.

This household is a boarding group composed of five males, who are 40, 33, 26, 23, and 22 years of age, respectively. All were born in Russia, two having been in the United States four years, two three years, and one two years. None are citizens of the United States, but all expect to make their permanent homes in this country. None can read and write English, but all can speak it, and all can read and write their native language, having attended school abroad.

The house occupied by this group is rented from the company for \$5.25 per month; it is a detached, frame structure of one story, and is only in fairly good repair. There are two rooms, which are used as bedrooms, kitchen, dining room, and living rooms combined. The interior of the apartment is very unclean, little attempt being made at sanitary precaution. The rooms are heated by coal grates and lighted by oil lamps. A hydrant is provided outside for every three

families and a toilet room containing twelve compartments for every twelve households. There is no bath in the house, but a fine public bath is provided by the company for its employees.

The head of this group buys the coal and oil and pays the rent, but he receives no pay for his services, and can admit no new members without the unanimous consent of the group. The members pay their pro rata share each month, buy their own food, and take their turn in doing the cooking. Of the individuals in the group, three are skilled and two unskilled laborers. The skilled laborers are pieceworkers and earn from \$2 to \$2.50 per day, while the unskilled laborers receive \$1.80 and \$1.50, respectively. None worked the full year, the time employed ranging from six to a little over nine months. The reason given for lost time was the industrial depression. Yearly earnings ranged from \$351 to \$592. The cost of food and drink was \$15 per month per individual. Little money was saved, one man sending \$100 to his wife abroad, and one having \$100 in the bank. None of the group are affiliated with trade unions or other organizations. Before coming to this country one man was a common laborer, one was a butcher, two were farm laborers, and one was a clerk in court. The reasons given for coming to the United States are as follows: One man wished to escape military service, one wanted to travel, two hoped to make more money, and one had relatives here. The group subscribes to one Polish newspaper.

HOUSEHOLD No. 9.—GREEK.

This group consists of five Greeks, aged 40, 35, 30, 27, and 23, respectively, with length of residence in the United States varying from fifteen days to fourteen months. Three are married, their wives being abroad. None are able to speak English, and three are unable to read and write their native language. All except one expect to make their permanent home in this country.

The dwelling in which this group resides is a detached, one-story, frame structure, in fairly good repair, for which a rental of \$5.25 per month is paid. The house contains two rooms, which are very unclean. Both rooms are used as sleeping rooms and one also serves the purpose of kitchen, dining room, and living room combined. There is no bath in the house, the water supply coming from a hydrant near by, which is used by six other households. The flush toilet in the yard is used by two households. The apartment is heated by grates and lighted by oil lamps, no gas or electricity being available. The members of the group share equally the expense of heat, light, rent, food, and drink. Furniture is owned individually and each man does his own cooking and washing. All of the group are unskilled laborers in the steel industry, three working in the blast furnace and two in the yard department. Two worked the full year, one worked eight months, one two and a half months, and one four days. Two lost time on account of industrial depression, and one has just started to work. Earnings in the past year ranged from \$5 to \$429, and daily wages from \$1.25 to \$1.62. The cost of food and drink per month is \$8 per individual, and rent and other expenses are \$1.35 each. One man saved \$120 and one \$100 out of the past year's earnings, and \$30 was sent abroad by the group. None belong to trade unions or other organizations, and no newspapers or

periodicals are subscribed to. Every member of the household was a farmer or farm laborer abroad and came to the United States to earn better wages.

HOUSEHOLD No. 10.—GREEK.

This household is a boarding group composed of five Greeks ranging from 23 to 42 years of age; all except one are married, their wives being still in Europe. All have been in the United States from one to two years, and all except one expect to make this country their permanent home. None are able to speak English, but all have attended school in their native land.

The dwelling occupied by this household is a detached frame structure, in fairly good repair, for which a monthly rental of \$5.25 is paid. The house contains two rooms which serve as bedrooms, kitchen, dining room, and living room combined. They are very unclean and are given little care or attention. No gas or electricity is available, and the apartment is heated by coal grates and lighted by oil lamps. The water supply comes from a hydrant outside the house, which is used by six other families. There is no bath and the flush closet in the yard is used by two households.

Expenses for light, fuel, rent, food, and drink are shared equally by the members of the group. One man buys, pays all bills, and cooks for the household, for which he receives no compensation. All are unskilled laborers employed in the steel industry, three receiving \$1.25 per day and two receiving \$1.50 per day. Time actually worked in the past year ranged from three to nine months, time lost being due to business depression. Total incomes for the year ranged from \$117 to \$293, out of which amounts ranging from \$30 to \$75 were sent abroad to help support families; outside of this no money was saved. Food and drink cost each member of the group \$11 per month and other expenses \$3 per month. None belong to trade unions, but three are members of foreign fraternal and beneficial societies. Before coming to the United States four were sailors and one was a farm laborer. All came to this country in the hope of earning better wages.

HOUSEHOLD No. 11.—SCOTCH.

This household is composed of husband and wife, 41 and 40 years of age, respectively, two sons, aged 10 and 6, and two daughters, 9 and 6 years of age. All of the family were born in Scotland and have been in the United States between five and six years. Each member of the family can speak, read, and write English, and all of the children are attending school in this country. The husband is fully naturalized and expects to make his permanent home in the United States.

The house in which this family resides is a detached frame structure, in fairly good repair, and contains five rooms, two of which are used for sleeping, one each for dining room and kitchen, and one as parlor and living room. The flush toilet is in the house, but there is no bath, the water supply coming from a hydrant in the yard. Neither gas nor electricity is available, kerosene being used for lighting and coal for heating. The interior of the apartment is in good repair, clean and well kept, and the house, which is owned by the head of

the family, is valued at \$1,300, on which there is a debt of \$1,100, \$1,000 of which is on hand to be paid when the mortgage falls due.

The head, who is the sole support of the family, is a blacksmith in the iron and steel industry and worked eleven months out of the past year, one month having been lost on account of sickness. Earnings for the year amounted to \$930, all of which was contributed to the family fund. The head is identified with no trade union, but is affiliated with the Masons, and the wife is a member of the Eastern Star. The head was a blacksmith abroad and came to the United States hoping to improve his condition. The family subscribe to one magazine and one newspaper.

HOUSEHOLD No. 12.—SCOTCH.

This household is made up of husband and wife, aged 56 and 46, respectively, two daughters, aged 21 and 6, and four sons, 20, 16, 14, and 10 years of age. All of the family were born in Scotland. The head of the family and all the children have been in the United States a little over two years, while the wife first came to this country forty-four years ago, and returned to Scotland, where she remained twenty-eight years before again coming to the United States. The head is an alien, but expects to make the United States his permanent home. All of the family speak, read, and write English, and the two younger children are attending school.

The dwelling in which this family resides is a detached frame structure containing five rooms and is owned by the head of the household. It is in good repair and is clean and well kept. Of the five rooms, three are used for sleeping and living purposes, one as a kitchen, and one as a dining room. There is a bath in the house. The water supply comes from a well in the yard, and the toilet, which is dry, is also in the yard. Heat is supplied from grates and light from kerosene lamps.

The father and two sons contribute all their earnings to the family fund and one son, who is now out of work, contributed earnings during the year. The head and sons were all employed in a steel plant during the year preceding the inquiry. The head is a carpenter and worked nine months, earning \$644. The time lost was due to an injury. One son worked as a painter the full year and earned \$702; one worked eight months in the machine shop and earned \$260, the four months lost being due to sickness and injury; and one son worked twelve months as an errand boy in the carpenter shop and earned \$312. All earnings were contributed to the family fund. The house owned is valued at \$1,150, on which there is a debt of \$300, which is being paid in installments of \$25 per month.

The head of the household subscribes to several magazines and newspapers. Neither he nor either of his sons belongs to a trade union or other organization. While abroad the head of the household was a carpenter, the eldest daughter was a music teacher, and one son was a sign writer, the rest of the children being in school. The family was induced to come to the United States by the wife, who had previously resided in this country.

REPRESENTATIVE HOUSEHOLD EXPENDITURES FOR FOOD AND GENERAL LIVING PURPOSES.

Details of expenditures of representative households for food and general living were also secured for the period of one week during the latter part of February or the early part of March, 1909. The data were secured from the store accounts of the households and while they are instructive in their bearings on the cost of living they are chiefly significant in affording an insight into the kind and quantity of food and other articles used. The detailed exhibits follow according to race of head of household.

HOUSEHOLD No. 1.—ENGLISH.

This family is entirely supported by the earnings of the head, who, as boiler repairer, regularly earns \$20 per week, but at the present time is only a common laborer. He has four children, aged 7 months, 3 years, 9 years, and 12 years, respectively. His weekly household expenditures are as follows:

HOUSEHOLD No. 2.—SOUTH ITALIAN.

The household is composed of a man and wife and their three children, 9 years, 7 years, and 2 months old, respectively, and a boarder who pays \$3 per week for his board, lodging, and laundry. The head is an unskilled laborer in the steel industry and earns \$7.50 per week. His wife does not work outside the home. The total weekly family income of \$10.50 covers the following detailed expenditures during the week:

HOUSEHOLD NO. 4.—SOUTH ITALIAN.

The head is a foreman of unskilled laborers in the steel industry and earns \$15 each week. He has three children—10, 14, and 18 years of age, respectively—the oldest of whom is working and contributing \$7 weekly to the family fund. The wife neither works nor keeps boarders or lodgers. The detailed family expenditures for the week are as follows:

HOUSEHOLD No. 5.—SOUTH ITALIAN.

The man is a barber and earns \$12.50 per week. The household, of which he is the sole support, is composed of himself, his wife, and their six children. His wages do not meet his household expenses, and at present he owes about \$40 or \$50. The details of the weekly expenditures of the household are as follows:

CHAPTER VII.

HOUSING AND LIVING CONDITIONS.

General housing and living conditions—Rent in its relation to standard of living—
Boarders and lodgers—Size of apartments occupied—Size of households studied—
Congestion—[Text Tables 687 to 698 and General Tables 394 to 405].

GENERAL HOUSING AND LIVING CONDITIONS.

In describing household conditions the different races may be classified in three general divisions. The first division includes the native whites, English, Welsh, and Scotch. The second, the Poles, Slovaks, South Italians, and negroes, and the third, the Greeks, Bulgarians, and Macedonians. There are material differences in the systems of living practiced by these three classes.

The greater number of native whites employed in the territory immediately adjacent to Birmingham are skilled laborers. The unskilled labor is composed principally of the South Italian and Slav races and the negro.

Household conditions among the Americans are far superior to conditions prevailing among the Slavs and South Italians, and it is, of course, unnecessary to compare this class with the negroes. Modern facilities for comfort and sanitation are in much more extensive use. The home is more spacious and is furnished in comfort if not in a slight degree of luxury.

In the outlying towns of this locality the proportion of Americans employed in bituminous coal mining and unskilled labor is much greater than in the territory immediately adjacent to Birmingham, and many of the mines are operated exclusively by native white and negro labor. In these environments the home of the native white laborer is frequently devoid of the more modern equipment and sanitation, though there is no lack of material comfort. His house usually affords space for a separate dining room and kitchen, and separate living room, in many instances. The front room or parlor, reserved for the entertainment of guests, is an almost invariable feature of the home.

The boarding-boss system, practiced by the South Italian and Slav races, is unknown to the natives. Occasionally a few boarders on the American plan are found.

Approximately 90 per cent of the negroes employed in this locality live in rented houses. Where company houses are not available the negroes usually settle in that section of the town where, because of the absence of improved streets, water, or lighting facilities, or for other reasons, the house rent is reduced to a minimum. This tendency is also characteristic of the South Italian and Slav races.

Two rooms are usually sufficient to shelter the family, one serving as living room and bedroom, and the other as kitchen and dining room combined. This is frequently used as a bedroom also in the larger families. It is not unusual, however, for an entire family of adults to sleep in the same room. Cheap, unvarnished dressers and bedsteads, split-bottomed chairs, and a cooking stove are the principal articles of furniture in these houses. To a casual visitor the interior of the house not infrequently presents a comparatively neat appearance with the floor cleanly swept and the bed clothing neatly arranged, but the general impression is usually one of shiftlessness and improvidence, the fences, steps, and porch being in a dilapidated condition and the yard littered with rubbish. Modern sanitary devices are practically unknown.

With the advent of the Slav and South Italian immigrant with the boarding boss and his group of lodgers, a system of household economy previously unknown to this locality was introduced. As in other industrial communities, the boarding-boss system flourishes here to its greatest extent in the centers of employment most convenient to the large cities. The proportion of boarders or lodgers to each family decreases in number as the distance from the more populous cities increases, which is indicative of the tendency of the unmarried Slav and South Italian immigrants to crowd in the more important centers of population. In this locality the boarding-boss system is practiced principally by the Polish and South Italian races. In the company houses of one of the larger industrial corporations near Birmingham, South Italian families are found with as many as fifteen boarders or lodgers. Among the Poles the number often exceeds eight or ten. There is very little family life in such households. To accommodate as many lodgers as possible, beds are frequently placed in every room in the house, and the kitchen is often used as a dining room, bedroom, and bathroom. Only a few of the most essential articles of a cheap and inferior grade of furniture are used. The bed clothing is soiled and in disorder and the interior of the house presents an untidy and slovenly appearance.

Where the boarders or lodgers are less in number than the members of the immediate family, conditions are somewhat improved. In some of the smaller towns in this section are many Polish, Slovak, and South Italian steel workers and coal miners living in company houses and in houses rented from other sources than the employer. In these homes where none or only a limited number of boarders are kept, the furniture is more substantial and the interior of the home presents a much neater appearance. It is unusual, however, to find in these homes any but the most essential household necessities. There are no separate living rooms or parlors. The kitchen and dining room are usually combined and this room is frequently used as a bedroom also. Modern devices for sanitation, such as the bathroom and flush toilet are conspicuously absent. The boarding-boss system is not practiced by the English, Scotch, and Welsh races in the Birmingham district. Household conditions among these races compare favorably with conditions among the American workmen.

The Greek, Bulgarian, and Macedonian immigrants in this locality are largely unmarried men; of those who are married practically the entire number have left their wives in Europe. These races, as well

as many of the unmarried South Italian immigrants, have adopted a method of living usually designated as the rooming group system. In the company houses of one of the large steel manufacturing corporations near Birmingham, several hundred of these laborers live in groups, varying in number from two to fifteen individuals. The smaller groups occupy only one room, while the larger frequently rent an entire house, four or five men occupying each room. Where a group is composed of as many as five individuals the most intelligent of the number is usually chosen "boss," who acts as disbursing agent and pays the bills for house rent, light, and fuel, the other members contributing equally to these expenses. Various methods are followed in buying and preparing the food. A member of the group who possesses superior culinary ability will sometimes act as cook for the entire number, his pro rata amount of the grocery bill being paid by the other members as compensation for his services in this capacity. In other groups a common fund is maintained for groceries and each member acts as cook for a certain period. Where a group is composed of only a few members it is frequently the practice of each individual to buy and prepare his own food. Many of the Bulgarians patronize restaurants conducted by members of their race.

Some semblance of order and neatness is maintained in many of the houses occupied by these laborers, but some of the larger groups live in more squalid surroundings than are seen among the Slav and South Italian boarding groups. The furniture is confined to a few benches or chairs and bedsteads and the personal belongings of each individual. These consist of a few cooking vessels and pieces of bed clothing. The latter is sometimes used constantly by both night and day shifts of laborers.

The section dealt with in this report, including the city of Birmingham, Jefferson County, and various counties in northern Alabama, represents industrial activity in various forms, but all related or tributary in a general way to the iron and steel industry, the chief factor in the prosperity which has thus far attended this region. Bituminous coal mining, while an independent industry, is closely interwoven with iron and steel, in the first place through the ownership by these companies of many important coal mines and, second, through their consumption of the product of mines in which they are not financially interested. In discussing housing conditions, it is possible to treat of employees of many of the different industrial enterprises in the same report, as the same general conditions obtain throughout the entire district.

In comparing housing conditions of the different races employed in this locality, a general division is easily made into skilled and unskilled laborers; the skilled laborers are composed principally of the native whites with a very small proportion of Scotch, English, and Welsh, while among the unskilled laborers is found a wide diversity of races, the principal types being South Italians, Poles, Slovaks, Greeks, Bulgarians, and Macedonians. The English, Welsh, Irish, Scotch, and French races are represented in small numbers about equally divided between the skilled and unskilled labor.

Housing conditions among the high-priced or skilled laborers, which class as previously stated is composed principally of the native whites, show a marked improvement over conditions among the immigrant

racess; the contrast is especially noticeable between the natives and the South Italian, Greek, and Slav races.

The ordinary type of "company house" does not satisfy the requirements of the skilled American workmen. Many of these are more comfortably housed either in their own dwellings or in privately owned houses, fairly well equipped with modern devices for comfort and sanitation, while in other cases the company provides for them a better type of house. In Bessemer, for example, skilled employees in the rolling mills occupy two-story houses of far better type and construction than the average company house.

Approximately 90 per cent of the whole number of employees of all races live in rented houses. Where company houses are not available, these laborers usually congregate by races in the outskirts of the town most convenient to the place of employment and occupy houses which can be obtained for the lowest rent. In one community there is a small colony of Slovaks employed in bituminous coal mining who have purchased homes and are living in small three and four room frame cottages, but property owners among these races are as a general rule very infrequent. The type of company house most frequently seen in the locality adjacent to Birmingham is a one-story frame building containing from two to four rooms, the four-room houses being frequently divided into two apartments. The buildings are usually provided with a small veranda in front, are weatherboarded and finished with dressed lumber, and sometimes whitewashed. They are usually devoid of any modern conveniences, such as bath or flush toilet, and in consequence of being built in close proximity to the steel, iron, or coke yard in which the laborers are employed are without a yard or garden plot. A fairly accurate impression of housing conditions among the unskilled laborers employed by the most important industrial corporations of Birmingham may be obtained from a description of the houses provided for employees at the steel plant at Ensley, Ala. Ensley is situated a few miles from the city of Birmingham proper, but within the corporate limits by virtue of a recent legislative enactment. The conditions and races represented here are fairly typical of conditions throughout the territory adjacent to Birmingham.

The company quarters here are located on a slight elevation in the outskirts of Ensley, adjoining the yards of the steel plant which separates the quarters from the principal business and residence district of the town. The races represented are South Italian, Polish, Greek, Roumanian, Bulgarian, Macedonian, and Negro. A public road separates the quarters of the negro and immigrant races. Occupancy of company houses is not a condition precedent to employment, but in selecting a home the immigrant is usually governed by three considerations, viz, house rental, presence of fellow countrymen, and proximity to place of employment. The first of these usually exerts the greatest influence and has resulted in approximately 75 per cent of the immigrants occupying the company houses, which are customarily rented to them at a lower rate than houses obtained from other sources.

The houses occupied are of the familiar type, painted, weatherboarded, frame structures of one story, divided into two apartments of two rooms each, finished with dressed lumber, and provided in front

with small porches. Provision for heat for each apartment is made by a chimney erected in the center of the building. Water is obtained from hydrants outside the house, one for every three houses. Water-closets built of rough lumber are placed in the rear of the buildings, one closet being provided for every twelve houses. These closets, which are flushed by running water, are divided by partitions into twelve stalls or sections. A public bath for the use of the employees is also maintained. A monthly rental of \$10.50 for each house, or \$5.25 for an apartment, is charged.

Among the Polish and South Italian races where the boarding-boss system prevails, one family frequently rents an entire house and sometimes two houses, the extra space being used in housing lodgers, who vary in numbers from ten to fifteen to a family. The Bulgarians, Roumanians, Greeks, and Macedonians are practically all single men and live in groups, varying from two to twelve individuals, each group occupying one or two rooms usually, but sometimes an entire house, the members sharing equally in the house rent. In the company quarters occupied by the negroes, the houses are smaller and less substantial in construction. Many are finished on the exterior with rough lumber, to which a coat of whitewash is applied. Only dry closets are provided and there is no public bath as in the immigrant section.

In the outlying coal and iron-ore mining towns there is a greater diversity in the types of shelter provided for employees—the buildings varying from substantial four and six room houses to nondescript clapboard shacks and cottages—designed to satisfy the requirements of transient and migratory class of laborers who value their wages more than the comforts of a modern home involving increased rent. The American devotes more attention to material comfort than does the immigrant and usually provides himself with a comfortable home. Even where the same type of building used by the immigrant is occupied, it presents a more attractive appearance than the house occupied by the South Italian or Slav laborer in the same grade of employment.

RENT IN ITS RELATION TO STANDARD OF LIVING.

The rent payments of the households studied in the Birmingham district, as in the case of other localities, have an important bearing upon the cost of living, but owing to the crowding within the immigrant households in order to reduce the rent payment per capita, these payments are chiefly significant in the index which they afford as to standards of living and general living conditions. The first table submitted in this connection shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, average rent paid each month per apartment, per room, and per person.

In the foregoing table the native-born households report a lower average rent payment each month per apartment and per room, but a higher payment per person, than do the foreign-born, indicating, owing to the higher rent payment per person, less crowding in the native than in the foreign-born households. The most significant fact disclosed by the table is the more favorable showing made by the native negro than the native white, the average rent paid by the former per room and per person being higher than that paid by the latter. Among the households whose heads were foreign-born, the worst showing is made by the Bulgarians, the average rent payment per month per person being only 60 cents. The showing of the Macedonian households is not much better, their rent payment per month per person being only 78 cents. The highest average rent per month per person is paid by the French households, followed by the Polish, North Italian, Scotch, South Italian, Greek, and Slovak households in the order mentioned.

The range in monthly rent payments per apartment is exhibited by the table following, which shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households paying each specified rent per month per apartment.

In the above table a bare majority of the 525 households studied pay less than \$5, although only 6.3 per cent as much as \$7.50. The majority of the foreign-born pay \$5 or over, but only 7.6 per cent pay \$7.50 or over. Of the individual races studied, the majority of the native-born negroes, South Italians, and Slovaks, and large proportions of the Bulgarians and French, pay less than \$5. Only 9.4 per cent of the Bulgarians pay less than \$5, but on the other hand, only 6.2 per cent pay as much as \$7.50. All the Bulgarians pay less than \$7.50 and all the Slovaks and native-born negroes less than \$10.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households paying each specified rent per month per room.

Only a fraction of 1 per cent of the households in this locality for which information was secured pay under \$1, 44.2 per cent pay under \$2, 90.1 per cent pay under \$3, and 98.5 per cent pay a rental under \$4 each month per room. The proportion of households paying under \$2, under \$3, and under \$4, respectively, is larger for the native-born negroes of native father than for the foreign-born. Among the foreign-born households the Greeks have the smallest proportion and the French the largest proportion of households paying under \$2 each month per room.

The table next submitted shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the percentage of households paying each specified rent per month per person.

Of the total number of households included in the preceding table, 38.9 per cent pay a rental under \$1, 82.5 per cent under \$2, 97.3 per cent under \$3, and 99.4 per cent under \$4 each month per person. The proportion of households paying under each specified sum per person is larger in the case of the foreign-born households than in the case of the households of the native-born negroes. Of the foreign-born, the Bulgarians, Greeks, South Italians, and Slovaks have a larger proportion of households paying under \$1 and under \$2 per month, respectively, than have the French. In general, the rent payments per month per person among the immigrant households indicate crowded conditions and unsatisfactory living arrangement as compared with those of the native-born.

BOARDERS AND LODGERS.

The extent to which boarders and lodgers are found in the households of the iron and steel workers is set forth in the following table. It shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the number and percentage of households keeping boarders or lodgers.

In the table above it is seen that a much greater tendency toward the keeping of boarders or lodgers is shown by the households whose heads were foreign-born than by those whose heads were of native birth, 9.5 per cent of the former, as contrasted with only 3.8 per cent of the latter, having boarders or lodgers. None of the native whites born of native father in the eleven households shown have boarders or lodgers. Among the households whose heads were foreign-born, the largest proportion of boarders or lodgers is exhibited by the French, followed closely by the Slovaks and Bulgarians.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the average number of boarders or lodgers per household. The averages are based (1) on the total number of households and (2) on the number having boarders or lodgers.

In the foregoing table the average number of boarders or lodgers, based on the total number of households keeping boarders or lodgers, is too small for computation, except in the case of the total foreign-born who show an average of 316 boarders or lodgers for each 100 households. The native negro households have an average of 9 boarders or lodgers for each 100 households, based on the total number of households studied, as contrasted with an average of 30 for each 100 foreign-born households. The highest average number of boarders or lodgers per household, based on the total number of households, is shown by the North Italians, closely followed by the Poles and Bulgarians.

The salient fact disclosed by the foregoing table is that slightly more than 50 per cent of the households studied in the Birmingham district occupy apartments of two rooms. The proportion of households that occupy four-room apartments is 20.9 per cent, as compared with 15.5 per cent who occupy three-room apartments, 4.2 per cent who occupy apartments of one room only, 4.4 per cent who occupy five-room apartments, and 1.4 per cent who occupy six-room apartments. Less than 1 per cent occupy apartments with seven rooms or more. The native-born negroes show, when compared with the foreign-born, a large proportion of households that live in apartments of two and four rooms. Of all of the races studied the Greeks show the largest proportion who live in one-room apartments. The South Italians are second and next to the French and Slovaks, the Bulgarians and Scotch, showing no households in apartments of one room. Of the Greek households studied, 81.3 per cent occupy two-room apartments, followed by the Bulgarians, who have 80.8 per cent. None of the Scotch households studied occupy two-room apartments, while for each of the other races in this classification the proportion is in excess of 20 per cent, the French, with 22.7 per cent, having the smallest proportion.

Only 6.3 per cent of the Greek households studied occupy three-room apartments. This is the smallest proportion shown in this group and is interesting when compared with that of the Slovaks, or 35 per cent, which is the highest proportion. Among the French and Scotch the increased proportions living in the apartments of a larger number of rooms are noticeable. Of the French, 43.2 per cent, and 39 per cent of the Scotch households studied occupy four-room apartments. These races and the Slovaks are the only races which show more than 10 per cent of their households in four-room apartments. The Scotch exhibit the highest percentage of households occupying five-room apartments, and the French are second. The

Greeks show none, and each of the other races less than 10 per cent in this group. Only three races have any households that occupy six-room apartments. These are the South Italian, Scotch, and Slovak, and the Scotch alone of all other races have a proportion of their households in apartments of seven or more rooms.

The table immediately preceding shows that of the 661 households studied 52.7 per cent have less than 5 persons per household; 16 per cent report 2, 18.5 per cent 3, 17.9 per cent 4, and only 0.3 per cent 1. Of those having over 4 persons per household, 15.1 per cent have 5, 10.3 per cent 6, 9.4 per cent 7, and 3.8, 3.6, and 5.1 per cent have 8, 9, and 10 or more persons per household, respectively. With the exception of those households having 1, 2, and 3 persons, the households the heads of which were foreign-born show a slightly larger proportion having each of the other specified number of persons than is shown in the total for all households.

Among those households the heads of which were foreign-born none have only one person. As contrasted with the French and South Italian, the proportions of the other households having 2 persons are very low. Of those having three persons, the South Italian households show a slightly larger proportion than the French and a considerably larger proportion than the Slovak, Greek, Bulgarian, and Scotch households, the last named reporting the smallest proportion, or 7.3 per cent. The French, with 31.8 per cent having 4 persons per household, show a considerably larger proportion than the South Italian or Slovak, and a much larger proportion than the

Scotch, Greek, or Bulgarian households. Both the Bulgarian and French having 5 and 6 persons per household show smaller proportions than are shown by households the heads of which are of any other race.

As regards those households having 7 and 8 persons, the Greeks with 28.1 per cent in the former and the Slovaks with 11.7 per cent in the latter show the largest proportions. The South Italians, with 2.6 per cent having 9 persons and 2.2 per cent having 10 or more persons, again show the smallest proportions, while the Bulgarians, with 18.5 and 29.6 per cent, respectively, show a much larger proportion in each instance than is shown by any other race. The French households alone, it will be noted, report no proportion having more than 7 persons per household. With 17.1 per cent of households consisting of 10 or more persons the Scotch show a proportion lower than the 29.6 per cent shown by the Bulgarians, but considerably above the proportions shown by households the heads of which were of any other race.

CONGESTION.

A further insight into the degree of congestion within the households studied and its effect upon living arrangements is afforded by the series of tables next submitted. The first table presented shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the average number of persons in the households studied per apartment, per room, and per sleeping room:

The preceding table shows a higher degree of congestion in the foreign-born than in the native-born households, the former having a higher average number of persons per apartment, per room, and per sleeping room. For each 100 apartments the native-born show 355 persons as compared with 517 for the foreign-born, and 128

persons for each 100 rooms as compared with 188 for the foreign-born. In sleeping rooms, the native-born households have an average of 221 persons for each 100, while the foreign-born have 297 persons. The greatest degree of congestion is exhibited by the Bulgarian and Macedonian households, in the number of persons per apartment, per room, and per sleeping room. The Greeks and South Italians closely approach the degree of congestion of the Bulgarians and Macedonians in all rooms and in sleeping rooms only. The French households have the smallest average number of persons per room and per sleeping room. The native negro shows a smaller average number of persons per apartment and per sleeping room than is shown for the native white, but a higher average per room.

The range in the number of persons per room is shown, by general nativity and race of head of household, in the table next presented:

This table, covering 660 households reporting complete data, shows an average of 1.76 persons per room. Of the foreign-born there are 1.88 persons per room as against 1.28 persons per room among the native-born. The average number of persons per room is slightly higher with the negro native-born of native father, than with the native-born white of native father, although neither averages 2 persons per room. Among the foreign-born races the Macedonians and Bulgarians, each with more than 3 persons per room, display the highest averages, while both Greeks and South Italians average more than 2 persons per room. All other races have over 1 person per room, but the averages of the French and English are lower than the others. Of the households having 1 or more persons per room, the Bulgarians and Greeks are first, with 100 per cent each, and all other races, excepting the French, show more than 90 per cent so housed.

The Greeks and Bulgarians also show the greatest percentage of households with 2 or more persons per room, while the French show

only 6.8 per cent. Over 50 per cent of the South Italians are thus reported, while the Slovaks and Scotch come below that figure. It will be observed that the French and Scotch, both representatives of the older immigration, show lower averages than the other races throughout. Only two races, Greek and Bulgarian, have over 50 per cent of households with 3 or more persons per room. The South Italian has over 20 per cent and the Slovak comes a little below that mark, while the French and Scotch report a trifle over 2 per cent each. In the column showing the households with 4 or more persons per room, the Bulgarian still leads with 38.5 per cent, the Greek coming next, with 12.5 per cent, while the remaining races show a very slight percentage or, in the case of the French and Scotch, none at all.

The foregoing table shows the average number of persons per sleeping room to be 2.81. Of these households, 564 have 2 or more persons per sleeping room and a majority show 3 or more, while only 28, or 4.2 per cent, report as many as 6. The households whose heads were foreign-born report a much larger average number of persons in each sleeping room than do the native-born of native father.

The percentage of households having 2 or more persons per sleeping room is seen to be the highest, or 100 per cent, among the foreign-born Bulgarians, followed by the Greeks, South Italians and Slovaks. Of those having 6 or more persons per sleeping room the percentage is comparatively high among the South Italians and Slovaks, while the Bulgarians, Scotch, and French have no households with this number per sleeping room.

The effect upon living arrangements by the congestion within the households is shown in the table next presented. It shows, by general nativity and race of head of household, the number and per cent of households regularly sleeping in all except each specified number of rooms.

As shown by this table, the average number of rooms per household is 2.74, and the average number of sleeping rooms for each household is 1.72. The percentage of households using all rooms except one to sleep in is very large, while 22.4 per cent use all rooms and only 17.4 per cent reserve two rooms for living purposes. The foreign-born show an average of 2.74 rooms per household, while the native-born negroes of native father report 2.67, and the native-born whites of native father a much higher average of 3.91 rooms per household. The foreign-born exhibit a very high percentage of households sleeping in all rooms, while the native-born negroes of native father show a low proportion.

A comparison of the different races of foreign birth shows the Scotch and English households to have a rather high average number of rooms per household, while the Greeks report the lowest average. The foreign-born Scotch, English, and North Italians, and the native-born whites of native father, exhibit larger average numbers of sleeping rooms per household than do the other races, while the South Italians exhibit the lowest. The percentage of households using all rooms for sleeping is very large among the Greeks and Bulgarians. A large proportion of households of Slovaks, South Italians, and French and native-born negroes have only one room in addition to sleeping rooms. A very small percentage of the Scotch households sleep in all rooms, and they present the largest percentage sleeping in all except two rooms.

CHAPTER VIII.

SALIENT CHARACTERISTICS.

Literacy—Conjugal condition—Visits abroad—Age classification of employees and members of their households—Criminality—[Text Tables 699 to 710 and General Tables 406 to 415].

LITERACY.

The immigrant iron and steel workers in the Birmingham district exhibit characteristics which are significant from the standpoint of industrial progress and efficiency, and which are also important in considering the general bearing of immigration upon American life and institutions. One of the facts of interest in connection with the population of recent immigrants is the high degree of illiteracy which prevails. The following table shows, by general nativity and race, the per cent of male iron and steel workers who are able to read and the per cent who are able to both read and write:

Of the 5,424 male employees in this locality included in the preceding table, 80 per cent read and 78.8 per cent read and write. The native-born whites show 98.6 per cent of their number who read, as compared with 98.2 per cent of the native-born of foreign father.

74.5 per cent of the foreign-born, and 67.4 per cent of the native-born negroes. Each nativity group, except the native-born of foreign father, has a smaller proportion able both to read and write than to read. The Bulgarian, Scotch, and Swedish employees are the only foreign races showing that the entire number with ability to read also have ability to write.

The above table brings out the degrees of literacy prevailing among 2,287 individuals in the households studied who are 10 years of age or over. Of this number 65 per cent can read and 63.7 per cent can read and write, the proportions for males being considerably higher than those for females. Foreign-born persons fall below these averages for the total and for both sexes, while the native-born of foreign father, the second generation of immigrants, rise notably above the average, and also show a greater degree of literacy among the females than among the males. Among the foreign-born, the Scotch, Bulgarians, and French exhibit the highest percentages both of the entirely literate and those partially so. The lowest in the scale are the South Italians, their percentages forming a striking contrast to those of the North Italians. The figures on the whole indicate that a considerable degree of illiteracy prevails in this locality.

The relation between literacy and period of residence is set forth in the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race of individual, the per cent of foreign-born persons 10 years of age or over who read and the per cent who read and write:

The persons reporting show that ability to read and write is most general among those who have been in the United States ten years or over. However, the proportion who are literate among those who have been here from five to nine years is smaller than the proportion among those who have been here under five years. Among the specified races there is apparently little connection between length of residence and ability to read and write. For example, the largest proportion of French who are literate are in the under-five groups, but the largest proportion of the South Italians who are literate are those who have been in the United States ten years or over. The largest proportion of North Italians who are literate are in the five to nine year groups. The North Italians are exceptional in that a relatively small proportion of their number are able to read and write among those who have been in the United States ten years or over, and that a relatively high proportion of those in the other periods of residence are so able.

The greater adaptability and progress manifested by the younger as compared with the older immigrants is exhibited in the table next presented, which shows, by age at time of coming to the United States and race of individual, the per cent of foreign-born persons 10 years to age or over who read, and the per cent who read and write.

Of the persons represented in the above table who came to the United States when under 14 years of age, 73.7 per cent can read and 73.2 per cent can both read and write at the present time, while of those who came here when 14 or over, 59.6 per cent can read and 58.6 per cent can both read and write. The percentage of individuals who came to the United States under 14 years of age who are able to read, as well as the percentage who are able to both read and write, is largest among the Scotch, French, and Slovak, in the order mentioned, and smallest among the South Italians. The proportion of individuals who came to this country when 14 or over who can read ranges from 98.2 per cent for the Scotch, 89.3 per cent for the Bulgarians, and 83.1 per cent for the French, to 62.3 per cent for the Poles, and only 34 per cent for the South Italians. The proportion of individuals who can both read and write is, for each race, the same as, or but slightly smaller than, the proportion who can read. It will be noted that the proportion of literates is generally much higher in the case of the persons who came to the United States when under 14 years of age than in the case of those who came here when 14 or over. The races of old immigration from Great Britain and northern Europe, so far as represented, have a higher percentage of literates than have the races of recent immigration.

The preceding table comprises a total of 5,047 males who are 20 years of age or over. Of this number 60.6 per cent are married, 34.7 per cent single, and 4.6 per cent widowed. The native-born whites show a larger proportion married than do the native-born of foreign father, who in turn show a larger proportion than do the native-born negroes; the foreign-born shows the smallest proportion married. The native-born negroes show the largest proportion widowed and the total foreign-born show the smallest. Of the several foreign races the Greek and Swedish are the only ones showing a larger proportion single than married.

The above table reports 1,804 males and females 20 years of age or over in the households studied, of whom 22.6 per cent are single and 2.4 per cent are widowed. A considerably greater percentage of native-born negroes of native father are married than is the case with either the total native-born of foreign father or the total foreign-born. Of the foreign-born races the Greeks show the largest proportion of single persons and the smallest proportion of married, while the Slovaks show just the reverse. The Slovaks also have more in a widowed condition than has any other race.

Out of 817 persons between 20 and 29 years of age, 43.7 per cent are single, 55.7 per cent married, and less than 1 per cent widowed. Here the negroes show a greater percentage married than do either the native-born of foreign father or the foreign-born. Among those of foreign birth the Slovaks have the lowest number of single persons and the highest number of married, while with the Greeks the opposite is the rule. Of the persons between 30 and 44 years of age 91.6 per cent are married and 1.4 per cent are widowed. The Slovaks have none single, 93.4 per cent being married and 6.6 per cent widowed; the latter figure is higher than that of any other race. Among those married the French occupy first place, while the Macedonians, Bulgarians, South Italians, and Slovaks follow closely in the order named, each with more than 90 per cent married. In the group of those 45 years of age or over less than 1 per cent are single, and 9.9 per cent are widowed. Only one foreign-born race, the Bulgarian, reports any single persons in this age group. The Slovaks, with over 18 per cent widowed, show the highest figure in that respect.

Throughout this table the females show a greater percentage married than do the males. Of 224 females between 20 and 29 years of age, 8.5 per cent are single and 1.3 per cent widowed.

Although a large proportion of the iron and steel workers of foreign birth are married, it should be noted that a large proportion have left their wives and families in their native countries. The following table shows, by race of husband, the per cent of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States and per cent who report wife abroad:

Of the 586 husbands for whom information was secured, 52 per cent report their wives in the United States and 48 per cent report their wives abroad. Among the races specifically mentioned, it will be noted from the above table that a smaller proportion of each report their wives in the United States than report them abroad. A very much larger proportion of the South Italians than of the Greeks or Bulgarians report their wives in the United States. Of the Bulgarians furnishing information 97.6 per cent have their wives abroad, in contrast with 52.8 per cent of the South Italians.

Of the 248 South Italians in the Birmingham district for whom information was obtained 52.8 per cent report their wives abroad. It will be seen from the preceding table that a very small proportion of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years and ten years or over, as compared with those who have been in the United States under five years, report their wives abroad.

VISITS ABROAD.

The fact that such large proportions of southern and eastern European immigrants are single men or married men whose wives are abroad discourages permanent settlement in this country, and enables the immigrant employees to move readily from place to place according to fluctuations in the demand for labor. Considerable proportions also make visits of different periods of duration to their native countries. This fact may be seen from the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race of individual, the visits abroad made by foreign-born male employees:

Of a total of 981 persons included in the above table the total proportion reporting one or more visits abroad is 8.5 per cent. Of those resident in the United States ten years or more, the proportion reporting visits abroad is 29.3 per cent. A very small percentage report visits abroad among those residing in the United States under five years, while among those five to nine years in the country the proportion is 18.5 per cent. The total percentage is greater among the South Italians than among the Greeks, and the South Italians also lead among those residing in the United States under five years. Of those here five to nine years, and ten years or over, the South Italians report 7.7 per cent and 13.3 per cent, respectively, as having made visits abroad.

From the data presented in the preceding table it appears that a much larger proportion of all males than of all females are included in the higher age groups. Only 35.2 per cent of the males for whom information was secured are under 20 years of age, as against 53.7 per cent of the females. Of the females a larger proportion of individuals in foreign-born households than of individuals in the households of the negroes native-born of native father are included in the lower age groups, while the reverse is true in the higher age groups. The proportion of males under 6 and from 20 to 29 years of age is larger in the foreign-born households than in the households of the negroes native-born of native father. In all the other age groups specified the proportion of males in the households of the negroes native-born of native father is larger than the proportion in the households of foreign-born heads. Among the foreign-born a larger proportion of males in Greek and Bulgarian households than of males in the households of any other race are from 20 to 29 years of age. The proportion of females under 20 years of age is larger in Slovak, Scotch, and South Italian households than in the households of any other race.

Of the male employees who were native whites born of native father, for whom information was secured in this locality, one-tenth of 1 per cent are under 14 years of age; of all employees reporting 7.8 per cent are from 14 to 19, 22.9 per cent are from 20 to 24, 22.7 per cent are from 25 to 29, 13.9 per cent are from 30 to 34, 17 per

cent are from 35 to 44, 12.1 per cent are from 45 to 54, and 3.6 per cent are 55 or over. The proportion of males from 20 to 34 years of age is largest for the foreign-born, slightly larger for the native-born of native father white than for the native-born of native father negro, and smallest for the native-born of foreign father. The proportion of males 35 years of age and over is largest for the native-born of foreign father, the same for the foreign-born as for the negroes native-born of native father, and smallest for the whites native-born of native father. Among the foreign-born, the Swedes, North Italians, and Greeks, in the order named, have the largest, and the English and Scotch the smallest, proportion of individuals from 20 to 24; the Greeks, Swedes, and Scotch have the largest and the English and South Italians the smallest proportion of individuals from 25 to 29; and the Bulgarians, Scotch, and Greeks have the largest and the North Italians, Swedes, and English the smallest proportion of individuals from 30 to 34. The proportion of individuals from 35 to 44 is largest for the English; that of individuals from 45 to 54 is largest for the Scotch; and that of individuals 55 or over is largest for the English.

CRIMINALITY.

No records of criminality by races were obtainable in this locality. Various local magistrates, however, were asked for expressions of their opinion regarding comparative criminality by races. Owing to the fact that there were so few immigrants in comparison with native races, they were unable to give anything like an estimate of the numerical proportion of crimes as distributed among the races. The only criminal cases before them from among immigrants were those involving Italians, and to a very small extent Greeks. The Italians, it was believed, were in the criminal courts quite frequently in proportion to their numbers. Cutting, shooting, and other forms of affrays constituted the majority of their offenses. In only rare cases did Slovaks appear in the courts. There seems to be an unanimous opinion that the Italian was the most troublesome in proportion to the number of that race in the district.

CHAPTER IX.

GENERAL PROGRESS AND ASSIMILATION.

OWNERSHIP OF HOMES.

The above table shows that 23.6 per cent of all families studied in this locality own their homes. In this respect there is a very marked contrast between the native-born and the foreign-born families. Only 2.3 per cent of the former, as compared with 30.3 per cent of the latter, are reported as owning homes. It will be noted, however, that almost the entire number of native-born of native father are negroes. Of the foreign-born, the Scotch report the largest proportion, and the South Italians the smallest, of families owning homes, the Scotch reporting 59.5 per cent, as compared with 19.6 per cent of the South Italians. In the case of the majority of foreign-born races, the numbers involved are so small that the percentages have not been computed. From this table, however, it will be seen that a larger proportion of families of the older immigration from northern Europe and Great Britain than of the more recent immigrant races from southern and eastern Europe own homes.

STATUS OF CHILDREN IN THE HOUSEHOLDS STUDIED.

The table next presented shows, by general nativity and race of father and by birthplace of child, the number and percentage of children 6 and under 16 years of age at home, at school, and at work.

With the exception of the children born abroad of South Italian father, each race shows that over 50 per cent of the children, both native and foreign-born, are at school. With the exception of the children born abroad of Slovak fathers, and the children born in the United States of Scotch fathers, each race shows a larger proportion of children at home than at work, whether born in the United States or born abroad.

CITIZENSHIP.

The table next submitted shows, by race, the present political condition of foreign-born male employees in the Birmingham district who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming to this country.

Of the 162 male employees reporting complete data in the above table, 35.8 per cent are fully naturalized and 10.5 per cent have first naturalization papers only, leaving 53.7 per cent who have taken no steps toward becoming citizens of the United States.

Of the total number of foreign-born males in the households studied who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or older at time of arrival in this country,

only 17 per cent are fully naturalized, and 7.7 per cent have taken the preliminary step toward citizenship by securing first papers. None of the Bulgarians, English, Germans, Greeks, Macedonians, Poles, and Slovaks are citizens, and of these races only one Bulgarian, one Englishman, and six Slovaks have first papers. On the other hand, 38.5 per cent of the French and 9.7 per cent of the South Italians have acquired full citizenship, and 11.5 per cent of the former and 2.9 per cent of the latter have secured first papers.

ABILITY TO SPEAK ENGLISH.

Of a total of 1,888 persons reporting complete data in the above table, 32.9 per cent speak English. The females report a slightly larger proportion than the males as regards the foreign-born, while the males show a slightly larger proportion than the females as regards the native-born of foreign father. Considering the several foreign-born races, it will be seen that the Slovak, followed by the North Italian, shows the largest, and the Bulgarian, followed by the Greek, the smallest proportion of males who speak English. The Slovak has the largest and the South Italian the smallest proportion of females who speak English.

Of the 955 foreign-born male employees in this locality included in the above table, 34.8 per cent speak English. Among the foreign-born races the representatives of which speak English, the Swedes alone report 100 per cent. As regards the others, North Italians report a slightly larger proportion than the South Italians, Greeks, or Bulgarians, the last named reporting only 16.1 per cent.

The relative tendency of the younger as compared with the older immigrants to acquire the use of the English language is considered in the following table, which shows, by age at time of coming to the United States and race of individual, the per cent of foreign-born persons 6 years of age or over who speak English.

It appears from the data presented in the preceding table that of the foreign-born persons for whom information was secured, 67.3 per cent who came to the United States when under 14 years of age can now speak English, as compared with only 17.1 per cent of those who came here when 14 or over. Of the foreign-born who came to this country when under 14, the Slovaks, North Italians, and French, in the order mentioned, have the largest proportions of individuals who can speak English. The proportion of individuals able to speak English, who came here when 14 or over, is largest for the French, North Italians, and Slovaks, in the order mentioned, and smallest for the Greeks and Bulgarians. It will be noted that a very much larger proportion of persons who came to the United States when under 14 than of those who came here when 14 or over can speak English at present, this relation being true of the several races, so far as the percentages have been computed.

Advancement in the use of the English language by non-English-speaking races after designated periods of residence in this country is indicated by the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race of individual, the per cent of foreign-born persons 6 years of age or over who speak English.

From the totals of the preceding table it is seen that a larger proportion of those who have been in the United States ten years or over than of those with a period of residence of from five to nine years, and a larger proportion of those with a period of residence of from five to nine than of under five years, speak English. This is true also of each race except the North Italian and Polish, these races showing larger proportions with ability to speak English among those who have been in the United States from five to nine years than among those with a period of residence of ten years or over.

The above table shows that of 955 foreign-born male employees for whom information was obtained, 34.8 per cent speak English. Of those under 14 at time of arrival, 83.3 per cent now speak English, as compared with 33.2 per cent of those 14 years of age or over at time of arrival. Of the South Italians, 50 per cent of those who were under 14 at time of coming now speak English, as compared with 24.5 per cent of those who were 14 years of age or over; while the Greeks, none of whom were under 14 years of age at time of coming, report a slightly smaller proportion of those who were 14 years of age or over at time of arrival and who now speak English than do the South Italians.

The proportion of the foreign-born males who speak English increases rapidly with years in the United States. Of those in this country under five years, 22.7 per cent speak English, while the per cents reported by those here five to nine years and ten years or more are 64 and 82.1, respectively. The proportion of Greeks and South Italians who speak English is relatively small at every period of residence for which data are given. It should be noted also that a smaller proportion of South Italians who have been here ten years or over speak English than of those who have been in this country from five to nine years.

SCHOOLS.

Immigrant children in all parts of the Birmingham district attend the native white schools, with the exception of the Brookside Slovak settlement, where that race maintains a parochial school. This school is Greek Catholic in denomination, is operated nine months in the year and five days in the week, and is maintained by members of that denomination among the Slovaks. Its course of study conforms practically in every detail to that of the public school curriculum, with the addition of a certain period of time devoted to religious instruction. As stated in other sections of this report, the native public schools are maintained partly by the state and local governments and partly by employees through the companies. This, of course, does not apply to the larger towns and to the city, but only to the isolated communities surrounding mining plants. School facilities are thus afforded partly at the expense of the employee, whether he patronizes the schools or not. The result is that immigrant children are sent to school with a considerable degree of regularity, in that no additional cost, or less cost, is involved.

CHURCHES.

With the exception of the Jewish synagogues among the Russian and other Hebrews in Birmingham proper, there are only two immigrant churches in the district. One of these is an Italian Roman Catholic church at Ensley, and the other is a Greek Catholic church among the Slovaks at Brookside. No work is done among the immigrants by the religious organizations of the natives, nor do the immigrants attend native churches to any extent, with the exception of the Scotch, English, Irish, and Welsh, who usually join their own denomination after settling in any locality.

In every community, however, regardless of its isolation, churches are either afforded by the companies, except, of course, in the city of Birmingham, and Bessemer, Ensley, and Pratt City, where the churches are supported by their own members. The affording of church services to the employees is discussed in greater detail in another section of this report.

IMMIGRANTS IN BUSINESS AND STREET TRADES.

The fact that there are very few immigrant settlements in the Birmingham district which have existed for any considerable length of time is the chief reason for the smallness of the extent to which immigrants have engaged in business.

An exception to this statement must be made in the case of Greeks, Russian Hebrews, and Italians. In the city of Birmingham and the surrounding towns, notably Ensley and Bessemer, the Greeks have almost an absolute monopoly of the restaurants, fruit stands, and peanut, candy, and popcorn carts, and similar trades. In Birmingham alone, as stated elsewhere in these notes, there are about 800 Greeks. Very few of these engage in occupations in the coal, iron, or steel industries, and these few only when forced by circumstances. On the other hand, almost every prominent corner of the city streets is marked by a small fruit stand, and between fifteen and twenty small restaurants are operated, in addition to the numerous candy carts. The Russian Hebrews are engaged almost altogether in operating clothing stores, some of the largest establishments being owned by individuals of the first generation of this race. Italians, chiefly from the north of Italy, operate small groceries, shoe-repair shops, and the like.

In the foreign settlements near the steel plants and in the collieries immigrants do not exhibit much business tendency, for the reason that they depend largely for customers upon negroes, who patronize chiefly the company commissaries. In the largest foreign settlement at Ensley there are the following establishments, by races:

Greeks: Three restaurants, 8 fruit stands, 1 grocery. Italians: One wholesale grocery (formerly an Italian saloon), 1 barber shop, 1 meat shop, 8 groceries, 1 restaurant, 1 newspaper (weekly), 1 shoe-repair shop. Bulgarians: One restaurant.

At Brookside, where there is the largest Slovak settlement in the district, or in fact in Alabama, there are 3 Slovak groceries and 1 Slovak soft-drink establishment. At Bessemer there is a very small settlement of Italians, and 2 groceries are operated, but are patronized largely by negroes. The same is true, as has been stated, of all of the other towns in the district, i. e., the tendency on the part of Italians to operate small grocery stores for negro patronage, and on the part of Greeks to operate fruit stands, restaurants, etc.

No immigrants are engaged in the professions, if we except an occasional Scotch, Welsh, or English minister, doctor, or civil engineer. With the exception of these, and of the Russian Hebrews and a few of the well-established Greeks, the immigrants have not entered into the business life of the localities in the district to an appreciable extent. They are not identified with natives in any way in aims, methods, or in association.

It is interesting to note, as throwing light on the nature of association of immigrants with natives, that while Italian stores and shops are patronized largely by negroes, the Greek restaurants, and to a less extent their stands, are patronized altogether by native whites. This is noticeable not only in the industrial towns, but also in Birmingham proper.

GENERAL EXPLANATION OF TABLES.

Persons of native birth have been divided into two general groups and further subdivided under each of the two, as follows:

1. *Native-born of native father.*

Persons under this group are classified as White, Negro, Indian, Chinese, Hindu, Japanese, and Korean.

2. *Native-born of foreign father.*

Persons under this group are classified according to race of father in all tables where the data were secured for households, and according to country of birth of father in all tables where the data were secured for employees. Where classification is by race of father the classification used for several years by the United States Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization is followed.

Persons of foreign birth are classified according to race (or people). The classification of the United States Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization is followed.

In the study of households information is presented—

1. By general nativity and race of the "individual" in all tables which show facts which are personal in their nature, such as English speaking, occupation, or conjugal condition.

2. By general nativity and race of "head of family" in tables concerned with family matters—for example, family income.

3. By general nativity and race of "head of household" in all tables dealing with living conditions, among which are tables showing the composition of the household and the number of persons per room and per sleeping room. The distinction which has been made throughout this study between "family" and "household" is dependent upon the use of the term "apartment."

An "apartment" is a room or rooms within which all the usual daily processes of living, namely, cooking, eating, and sleeping, are carried on by the occupants. According to this definition an apartment may be, for example, a whole house; or it may be a single room of what was originally intended as an apartment; or it may be a corner of a wareroom or the back of a storeroom partitioned off and set aside for household uses. Two or more groups of occupants with distinctly separate money interests frequently rent a number of rooms jointly, occupying certain rooms separately but sharing one or more, usually the kitchen, or kitchen and living room. Under these conditions neither the rooms used by the one group of occupants nor those used by the other can be considered an apartment, since the room used in common must in such case be considered a room in each apartment and thus be counted twice. Where these conditions have been encountered the entire number of rooms has been considered one apartment.

The "household" includes all persons living within an apartment without regard to the relationships which exist among them. The

household may consist of one or more families with or without boarders or lodgers; or it may consist of a group of persons living together, no family included; or it may consist of various combinations of families, "groups," and boarders or lodgers.

The term "family" as used throughout these tables refers in general to the immediate family composed of husband, wife, and children. Groups of persons among whom none of these relations exist are not considered families. Households in which complicated relationships exist have been resolved into the component immediate families. Remnants of families maintaining a home are considered families when either husband or wife is present.

The general tables show results of two practically independent studies, as follows:

STUDY OF HOUSEHOLDS.

All tables headed "Study of households" are based on information from the schedule which was filled out for certain selected households in each of the several communities. Names and addresses were secured of employees in a given industry who were heads of households; and for each such household a schedule was filled out by an agent of this commission who visited the apartment and secured detailed information, so far as possible, for every occupant, as well as data in regard to family and household organization and status at the time of the visit.

STUDY OF EMPLOYEES.

The general tables headed "Study of employees" present data from the schedule relating only to the individual employee. This schedule was filled out by the employee himself or by some one, detailed by the employer to the task, to whom the employee furnished data. The general tables of this series, therefore, concern only the history and present status of the employee, while the other series, as has been stated, presents data not only for certain of the employees but also for members of their households. All data included under the "Study of employees" are tabulated by sex and by the general nativity and race of the individual. For the native-born of foreign father the classification is by country of birth of father and not by race of father.

DESCRIPTION OF TABLES.

Total number of households and persons studied, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households? Tables 1, 64, 114, 164, 214, 262, 325, and 375.—These tables enumerate the households studied of each race, the aggregate of the members of the households of each race, and the persons, male and female, for whom detailed information was secured. All members of households appear in these tables under the general nativity and race of head of household.

Number of persons for whom detailed information was secured, by sex and general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 2, 65, 115, 165, 215, 263, 326, and 376.—These tables are a second enumeration of the persons, male and female, who are included

in the detailed study of members of households. In this enumeration each individual appears under his own general nativity and race.

Total number of male employees for whom information was secured, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 3, 51, 66, 116, 166, 216, 264, 312, 362, and 377.—These tables enumerate the employees for whom data were secured for the "Study of employees." The enumeration is by general nativity and race of employee.

Number of foreign-born male employees in the United States each specified number of years, by race: Study of employees. Tables 4, 52, 67, 117, 167, 217, 265, 313, 363, and 378.—All foreign-born employees who report the number of years since their first arrival in the United States are here classified as in the United States under one year, one year, two years, three years, four years, five to nine years, ten to fourteen years, fifteen to nineteen years, or twenty years or over.

Number of foreign-born persons in the United States each specified number of years, by sex and race of individual. Study of households. Tables 5, 68, 118, 168, 218, 266, 327, and 379.—These tables, which are concerned with members of households, are similar to Tables 4, 52, 67, 117, 167, 217, 265, 313, 363, and 378, relating to employees.

Occupation before coming to the United States of foreign-born males who were 16 years of age or over at time of coming, by race of individual: Study of households. Tables 6, 69, 119, 169, 219, 267, 328, and 380.—Males who were 16 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States are here classified according to whether before coming to the United States they worked for profit, for wages, or without wages, and are further classified according to the kind of employment pursued. Payments in kind as well as in money are here considered wages. Persons who worked without wages were usually at work with fathers or other near relatives.

Occupation before coming to the United States of foreign-born females who were 16 years of age or over at time of coming, by race of individual: Study of households. Tables 7, 70, 120, 170, 220, 268, 329, and 381.—These tables are similar to Tables 6, 69, 119, 169, 219, 267, 328, and 380, relating to males.

Occupation of foreign-born male employees before coming to the United States, by race: Study of employees. Tables 8, 53, 71, 121, 171, 269, 314, 364, and 382.—In these tables are shown the number of foreign-born male employees who just prior to coming to the United States, were in the same industry in which they were employed at the time of the investigation, in farming or farm labor, in general labor, etc. Persons who report their occupation as "none," "at home," or "at school" are excluded from these tables.

Number of males 16 years of age or over in each specified industry, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 9, 72, 122, 172, 221, 270, 330, and 383.—These tables show the number of male members of households 16 years of age or over who are at home and at school, and classify those who have had employment within the year ending with the taking of the schedule according to the industry in which they have been employed. The main headings used in these tables follow the classification of the United States Census with the following modifications: General labor is here separated from domestic and personal service; fishing, mining, and

quarrying are separated from manufacturing and mechanical pursuits; trade and transportation are distinct from each other. The headings as here used are:

1. Agricultural pursuits.
2. Domestic and personal service.
3. Manufacturing and mechanical pursuits.
4. Mining (including quarrying).
5. General labor.
6. Professional service.
7. Trade.
8. Transportation.
9. At home.
10. At school.

The term "Domestic and personal service" includes besides domestic servants certain classes of persons not professional who serve the general public, such as policemen, city firemen, and employees at places of amusement.

Number of females 16 years of age or over in each specified industry, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 10, 73, 123, 173, 222, 271, 331, and 384.—These tables are similar to Tables 9, 72, 122, 172, 221, 270, 330, and 383, relating to males.

Number of male employees 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per week, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 11, 54, 74, 124, 174, 223, 272, 315, 365, and 385.—Employees are here classified according to the amount of their earnings. In some industries earnings are reported by the week, and in others by the day. Where employment is on the time basis the data are for "rate of pay;" where employment is on the piece basis the data are for "earnings."

Number of male employees 14 and under 18 years of age earning each specified amount per week, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 12, 55, 75, 125, 175, 224, 273, 316, 366, and 386.—These tables are similar to Tables 11, 54, 74, 124, 174, 223, 272, 315, 365, and 385, relating to earnings of males 18 years of age or over. In practically all industries the number of employees under 14 was too small for tabulation.

Number of male heads of families earning each specified amount per year, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 13, 76, 126, 176, 225, 274, 332, and 387.—These tables form a part of the study of family incomes. The information relative to income was secured for the year ending at the time of the agent's visit.

In the "selection of families" for the compilation of data concerning family income, the following classes were omitted:

- (1) Families established less than one year.
- (2) Families living two or more per household under complicated financial arrangements, so that exact income from boarders or other sources within the household are uncertain.
- (3) Families with earnings or contributions representing entire earnings of members who are profit earners or whose net earnings are for any other reason uncertain. That part of the income in this study represented by earnings is net.

Practically all of the heads of families included in these tables are also heads of households. They are here classified according to the amount of their earnings for the year.

Yearly earnings (approximate) of males 18 years of age or over, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 14, 77, 127, 177, 226, 275, 333, and 388.—Male wage-earners are here classified according to the amount of their earnings for the year ending at the time of the agent's visit. Persons who receive board and lodging in addition to a money wage and persons who receive tips or other perquisites over and above a stipulated wage are not included in these tables.

Amount of family income per year, by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 15, 78, 128, 178, 227, 276, 334, and 389.—The families included in these tables are the same as in Tables 13, 76, 126, 176, 225, 274, 332, and 387. These families are here classified according to the amount of total income for the year from all sources. Tables 17, 80, 130, 180, 229, 278, 336, and 391 show the sources of this income. Income from "boarders or lodgers" and in some cases from "other sources" is gross.

Yearly earnings (approximate) of females 18 years of age or over, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 16, 79, 129, 179, 228, 277, 335, and 390.—These tables are similar to Tables 14, 77, 127, 177, 226, 275, 333, and 388, which relate to earnings of males.

Number of families having an income within the year from husband, wife, children, boarders or lodgers, and other sources, by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 17, 80, 130, 180, 229, 278, 336, and 391.—The families included in these tables are the same as in Tables 13, 76, 126, 176, 225, 274, 332, and 387. The number of families with income from earnings of husband, the number with income from earnings of wife, etc., are shown here. The terms "husband" and "wife" include the widowed, divorced, and deserted. The principal items under "Other sources" are (1) receipts from investments, which, in the great majority of cases, are in the form of rentals, and (2) contributions of friends or relatives, who pay either more or less than the rates of boarders or lodgers. Attention is called to the fact that the family may have had income from some source, for example, from boarders or lodgers, within the year, but not at the time the schedule was taken.

Source of family income in detail, by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 18, 81, 131, 181, 230, 279, 337, and 392.—The families included in these tables are the same as in Tables 13, 76, 126, 176, 225, 274, 332, and 387. They are classified here according to the source or combination of sources upon which the family has been wholly dependent for income within the year ending with the taking of the schedule. The four items which make up all incomes except those entered in the last column of these tables are earnings of husband, earnings of wife, contributions of children, and payments of boarders or lodgers. It will be noted that all families deriving their entire income from husband, wife, and children have a net income and that all incomes including the payments of boarders or lodgers are gross; also that all families having any part of their income from money invested appear in the last column of these tables.

Months worked during the past year by persons 16 years of age or over employed away from home, by sex and by general nativity and race of

individual: Study of households. Tables 19, 82, 132, 182, 231, 280, 338, and 393.—Members of households of working age who have been employed outside of the home within the year ending with the taking of the schedule are here classified according to whether they have worked under three months, three and under four months, four and under five months, etc. For the purposes of these tables, all cases of part-time employment have been reduced to a full-time basis; for example, an employee who has worked seven months on half time is counted as having worked three and one-half months. The data are shown for males and females separately.

Number and class of households, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 20, 83, 133, 183, 232, 281, 339, and 394.—All households are here divided into "family households," or households where a family is present, and "group households," or households composed of a group of persons, no family included. Family households are further classified as being with or without boarders or lodgers. Family households with neither boarders nor lodgers are subdivided into those consisting of a single family and those consisting of two or more families living in the same apartment and sharing one or more rooms. Family households with boarders or lodgers are subdivided into those who keep boarders and those who keep only lodgers. Households keeping both boarders and lodgers are here entered as households with boarders. "Boarders" are persons to whom both food and lodging are furnished.

Number of households paying each specified rent per month per apartment, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 21, 84, 134, 184, 233, 282, 340, and 395.—In these tables appear only the renting households which report the rent paid for the unfurnished rooms which they use for living purposes. The following classes are thus excluded from these tables:

1. Households which rent apartment furnished.
2. Households which pay an undivided sum for apartment and place of business.
3. Resident landlords who pay an undivided sum for the apartment they occupy and other apartments which they sublet.
4. Households which pay "ground rent."

Number of households paying each specified rent per month per room, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 22, 85, 135, 185, 234, 283, 341, and 396.—The households included in these tables are the same as in Tables 21, 84, 134, 184, 233, 282, 340, and 395.

Number of households paying each specified rent per month per person, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 23, 86, 136, 186, 235, 284, 342, and 397.—The households included in these tables are the same as in Tables 21, 84, 134, 184, 233, 282, 340, and 395.

Number of households keeping boarders and lodgers and number of boarders and lodgers, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 24, 87, 137, 187, 236, 285, 343, and 398.—These tables show the number of households keeping boarders and the number keeping only lodgers; they also show the total number of boarders and of lodgers. "Boarders" both sleep and eat with the household. Households which keep lodgers in addition to

boarders are classified with the households keeping boarders. Among certain races it is customary to include one of the following accommodations with the nominal price of lodging: (1) Coffee or soup is served once a day; (2) the lodger is allowed the privilege of cooking his food on the kitchen stove; (3) the housewife buys the lodger's food, having the price charged in his account book, and prepares the food for him. Persons with such financial arrangements consider themselves lodgers and have been classified as such in these tables.

Number of persons per household in apartments of each specified size, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 25, 88, 138, 188, 237, 286, 344, and 399.—Households are here classified according to the number of rooms which they occupy and are further classified according to the number of persons of which they are composed. Rooms used exclusively for business purposes, although connected with the apartment, are not counted in the number of rooms per apartment. As before stated, only such persons as sleep in the apartment are considered members of the household.

Number of households occupying apartments of each specified number of rooms, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 26, 89, 139, 189, 238, 287, 345, and 400.—These tables summarize a part of the data of Tables 25, 88, 138, 188, 237, 286, 344, and 399. Households are classified here according to the number of rooms they occupy.

Number of households and number of persons in apartments of each specified number of rooms, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 27, 90, 140, 190, 239, 288, 346, and 401.—These tables summarize part of the data in Tables 25, 88, 138, 188, 237, 286, 344, and 399. They give the total number of households and the total number of persons in apartments of each specified size.

Number of households of each specified number of persons, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 28, 91, 141, 191, 240, 289, 347, and 402.—These tables summarize part of the data in Tables 25, 88, 138, 188, 237, 286, 344, and 399. Households are here classified according to the number of persons in the household.

Persons per room, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 29, 92, 142, 192, 241, 290, 348, and 403.—These tables show the number of households which average less than one person per room, one and less than two persons per room, two and less than three persons per room, etc. They also show the average number of persons per household and per room for all households studied.

Persons per sleeping room, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 30, 93, 143, 193, 242, 291, 349, and 404.—These tables present the data relative to persons per sleeping room. Only rooms which are regularly used for sleeping purposes are here considered sleeping rooms. The tables are similar to Tables 29, 92, 142, 192, 241, 290, 348, and 403.

Number of households regularly sleeping in all except each specified number of rooms, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 31, 94, 144, 194, 243, 292, 350, and 405.—

These tables classify households according to the number of rooms left for living purposes, after the number of sleeping rooms has been deducted.

Literacy of male employees, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 32, 56, 95, 145, 195, 244, 293, 317, and 406.—These tables show the number of employees who read some language and the number who both read and write some language.

Literacy of persons 10 years of age or over, by sex and general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 33, 96, 146, 196, 245, 294, 351, and 407.—These tables, which are concerned with members of households, are similar to Tables 32, 56, 95, 145, 195, 244, 293, 317, and 406, relating to employees.

Literacy of foreign-born persons 10 years of age or over, by sex, years in the United States, and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 34, 97, 147, 197, 246, 295, 352, and 408.—These tables classify foreign-born persons, male and female, according to the number of years since their first arrival in the United States. The classes are: Under five years, five to nine years, and ten years or over. These tables show under each of the three groups the number of persons who can read some language and the number who can both read and write some language.

Literacy of foreign-born persons 10 years of age or over, by sex, age at time of coming to the United States, and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 35, 98, 148, 198, 247, 296, 353, and 409.—These tables classify foreign-born persons, male and female, according to whether they were under 14 years of age or 14 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States, and show the number in each group who can read some language and the number who can both read and write some language.

Conjugal condition of male employees, by age groups and general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 36, 57, 99, 149, 199, 248, 297, 318, 368, and 410.—For the purposes of these tables employees of each sex are divided into four age groups—16 to 19 years, 20 to 29 years, 30 to 44 years, and 45 years or over—and are further classified according to whether they are single, married, or widowed. With the widowed are included the relatively few persons who are divorced or deserted.

Conjugal condition, by sex, age groups, and general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 37, 100, 150, 200, 249, 298, 354, and 411.—These tables, which are concerned with members of households 16 years of age or over, are similar to Tables 36, 99, 149, 199, 248, 297, 318, 368, and 410, relating to males.

Location of wives of foreign-born employees, by race of husband: Study of employees. Tables 38, 58, 101, 151, 201, 250, 299, 319, and 412.—These tables show the number of foreign-born married employees who report wife in the United States and the number who report wife abroad. The tabulation is by the race of the employee.

Visits abroad made by foreign-born male employees, by years in the United States and race: Study of employees. Tables 39, 59, 102, 152, 202, 300, 320, 370, and 413.—Male employees are here classified according to the number of years since their first arrival in the United States. The classes are: Under five years, five to nine years, and ten years or over. Under each group employees are classified

according to whether they have made no visit or one, two, or three or more visits abroad.

Number of persons within each age group, by sex and general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 40, 103, 153, 203, 251, 301, 355, and 414.—These tables give for all households studied the number of persons of each sex who report their ages as under 6 years, 6 to 13 years, 14 and 15 years, 16 to 19 years, 20 to 29 years, 30 to 44 years, and 45 years or over. The tabulation is by race of head of household.

Number of male employees of each age or within each age group, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 41, 60, 104, 154, 204, 252, 302, 321, 371, and 415.—Male employees are here classified according to age, by years if between 14 and 19 years of age and by year groups if 20 years of age or over.

Number of families owning home, renting, boarding, etc., by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 42, 105, 155, 205, 253, 303, 356, and 416.—These tables show for all families studied the number owning their homes, the number renting homes, the number boarding, and the number lodging. The few dependent families are included in the miscellaneous class "In other conditions."

General occupation of persons under 16 years of age, by sex and age groups, and by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 43, 106, 156, 206, 254, 304, 357, and 417.—These tables show for males, females, and totals the number of children under 6 years of age, 6 to 13 years of age, and 13 and 14 years of age, and further show for each age group the number of children at home, at school, and at work. The few children with employment outside of school hours are tabulated here as at school, and the few children found working through the day and attending night school are here entered as at work.

Present political condition of foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming, by race and length of residence: Study of employees. Tables 44, 61, 107, 157, 207, 255, 305, 322, and 418.—These tables include only foreign-born employees who were 21 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States and who have been in the United States long enough to acquire citizenship. These persons are classified as in the United States five to nine years and ten years or over and are further classified under each year group as aliens, citizens, and persons with only their first papers.

Present political condition of foreign-born males who have been in the United States 5 years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming, by race of individual and length of residence: Study of households. Tables 45, 108, 158, 208, 256, 306, 358, and 419.—These tables, which are concerned with members of households, are similar to Tables 44, 61, 107, 157, 207, 255, 305, and 322, relating to employees.

Ability to speak English of persons 6 years of age or over, by sex and general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 46, 109, 159, 209, 257, 307, 359, and 420.—These tables show for all non-English-speaking races the number of members of households,

male and female, who can carry on a conversation in the English language.

Ability to speak English of foreign-born persons 6 years of age or over, by sex, age at time of coming to the United States, and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 47, 110, 160, 210, 258, 308, 360, and 421.—These tables classify foreign-born persons, male and female, of non-English-speaking races according to whether they were under 14 years of age or 14 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States, and show the number in each of the two groups who are able to speak English.

Ability to speak English of foreign-born persons 6 years of age or over, by sex, years in the United States, and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 48, 111, 161, 211, 259, 309, 361, and 422.—These tables classify foreign-born persons, male and female, of non-English-speaking races according to the number of years since their first arrival in the United States. The classes are: Under five years, five to nine years, and ten years or over. Under each group the number able to speak English is shown.

Ability to speak English of foreign-born male employees, by age at time of coming to the United States and race: Study of employees. Tables 49, 62, 112, 162, 212, 260, 310, 323, 373, and 423.—These tables are similar to Tables 47, 110, 160, 210, 258, 308, 360, and 421, relating to members of households.

Ability to speak English of foreign-born male employees, by years in the United States and race: Study of employees. Tables 50, 63, 113, 163, 213, 261, 311, 324, 374, and 424.—These tables are similar to Tables 48, 111, 161, 211, 259, 309, 361, and 422, relating to members of households.

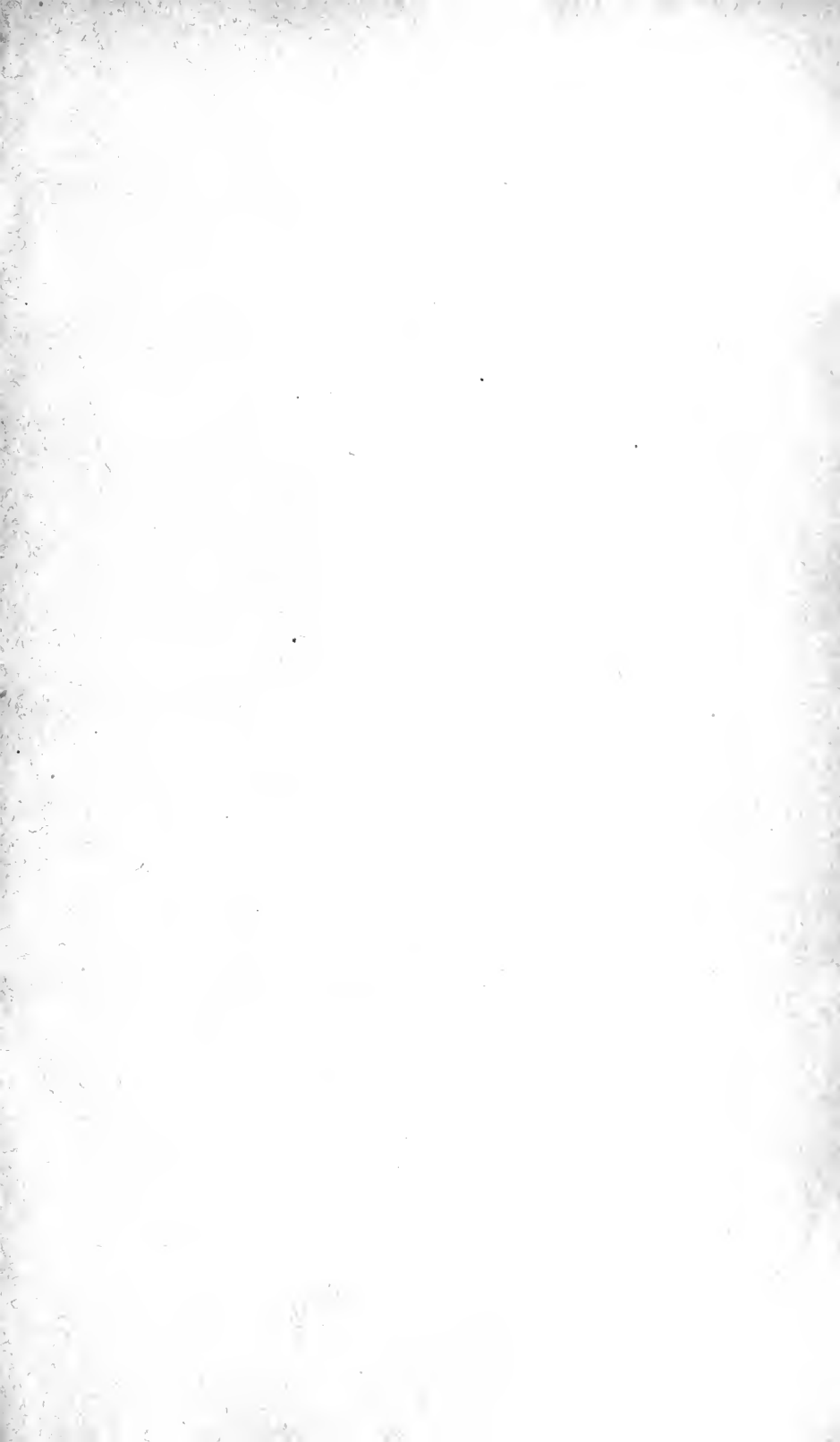
