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

Extract from act of Congress of February 20, 1907, creating and defining the duties of the Immigration Commission.

That a commission is hereby created, consisting of three Senators, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, and three Members of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and three persons to be appointed by the President of the United States. Said commission shall make full inquiry, examination, and investigation, by subcommittee or otherwise, into the subject of immigration. For the purpose of said inquiry, examination, and investigation said commission is authorized to send for persons and papers, make all necessary travel, either in the United States or any foreign country, and, through the chairman of the commission, or any member thereof, to administer oaths and to examine witnesses and papers respecting all matters pertaining to the subject, and to employ necessary clerical and other assistance. Said commission shall report to Congress the conclusions reached by it, and make such recommendations as in its judgment may seem proper. Such sums of money as may be necessary for the said inquiry, examination, and investigation are hereby appropriated and authorized to be paid out of the "immigrant fund" on the certificate of the chairman of said commission, including all expenses of the commissioners, and a reasonable compensation, to be fixed by the President of the United States, for those members of the commission who are not Members of Congress; \* \* \*


To the Sixty-first Congress:





#### OCCUPATIONS OF THE FIRST AND SECOND GENERATIONS OF IMMI-GRANTS IN THE UNITED STATES.

#### INTRODUCTORY.

From original and unpublished data in possession of the Bureau of the Census this report has been prepared for the Immigration Commission by Dr. Joseph A. Hill, chief statistician, Division of Revision and Results, Bureau of the Census. The purpose of the report is to show the difference between the first and second generations of immigrants as regards the occupations in which they engage. The term "first generation," as here used, is applied to those who are themselves immigrants—that is, were born in foreign countries. The term "second generation" is applied to those who are the native children of immigrants—that is, were born in this country of

parents who were born abroad.

The tables here presented give the number of breadwinners in each generation classified by occupation. The term "breadwinner" is here used to include everyone who is engaged in any kind of remunerative employment. It includes the banker, therefore, as well as the bootblack. The figures are shown separately for each foreign nationality which can be distinguished upon the basis of census returns, the classification by nationality being a classification according to the country in which the parents were born. Thus an Italian, as the term is here used, means a person whose parents were born either both in Italy or one in Italy and the other in the United States. An Italian immigrant is classed as an Italian of the first generation, and it is probable that he, like his parents, was born in Italy, although he may have been born in some other foreign country. An Italian of the second generation means a person born in the United States but whose parents, one or both, were immigrants born in Italy.

Of course this classification, based on the country in which parents were born, is not equivalent to a classification by race. Austria, for instance, includes a number of diverse races. But these can not be distinguished on the basis of census returns. We know that comparatively few of the natives of Russia who migrate to the United States are Russians in the ethnical sense of the word. The great majority of them are racially classed as Hebrews, Poles, and Lithuanians. In other cases, however, the country of birth practically defines the races. This is true of such countries as Ireland, Scotland, France, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden, the inhabitants of each of these countries being mainly homogeneous as regards race. From the classification by country of birth the Census of 1900, however, made two rather important deviations: It separated the Poles—defined as persons who speak Polish and were born in what was formerly Poland—from the other natives of Austria, Germany, and Russia;

and it distinguished between the Canadian French and the Canadian

English in case of persons born in Canada.

The subject of this report is presented first by occupations, or occupation groups, with a view to readily determining the differences between different foreign nationalities as regards their representation in certain typical or important occupations. This forms Part I of this report. In the second part the occupational classification is presented by nationalities, so as to bring together the occupational data relating to each nationality.

The following table shows the number of male breadwinners in the first and second generations of each of the nationalities distinguished

in this classification:

Some of these nationalities are represented by very small numbers in the second generation as compared with the first. This is notably true as regards the Austrians, the Hungarians, the Italians, the Poles, and the Russians. It results from the fact that the immigration of these nationalities is of comparatively recent origin, so that the second generation at present consists principally of children and young persons, few of whom are old enough to take up an occupation.<sup>a</sup>

a A representative of the second generation over 20 years of age in 1900 must have been the child of parents who migrated to this country prior to 1880. That the nationalities mentioned above were present in comparatively small numbers prior to 1880 is indicated by the following tabular statement:

As regards some of these nationalities it might be said indeed that there is no second generation as yet, but only the beginnings of a second generation or a second generation not yet grown up. Nevertheless the figures, meager though they are, afford some indication of the start which the second generation is making. But in drawing comparisons with the first generation the youthfulness of the second generation should be borne in mind, being a factor which tends to give an undue prominence to those occupations in which children

are commonly employed.

As a result of these variations in the relative size of the two generations the racial composition of the first generation of foreign breadwinners differs in a marked degree from that of the second. Thus of the first generation of male breadwinners of foreign origin, 26.1 per cent are Germans and 14.6 per cent are Irish; while in the second generation these percentages are much larger, the percentage of Germans being 36 and that of Irish, 26.3. The first generation is 40.7 per cent Irish and German, the second 62.3 per cent. Therefore the characteristics of the Irish and Germans have more influence upon the second generation, taken as a whole, than upon the first.

On the other hand, the Italians, Poles, and Russians constitute, respectively, 5.7, 3.7, and 3.9 per cent of the first generation, as compared with 0.4, 0.6, and 0.4 of the second generation. In the aggregate these three nationalities represent 13.3 per cent of the

first generation and only 1.4 of the second.

Because of this difference in the racial composition of the two generations it becomes difficult to determine the significance of the difference between the two generations as regards the occupations which they follow unless the comparison is made for each nationality separately. This could not be done upon the basis of any published census figures; therefore it was deemed desirable to go back to the original data in order to make these classifications by nationality. The results of that work are presented in this report.

In the table next submitted the male breadwinners in the first and in the second generations of each nationality are classified by

occupations.

Similar tables have been prepared for male breadwinners of foreign parentage in each of the following States: Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Iowa; also for two cities, Boston and Chicago. All these tables are appended to this report, and together with data derived from the reports of the census form the basis for the text discussion and text tables relative to the occupations followed by the first and second generations of our population of foreign origin.

#### PART I.—STATISTICS BY OCCUPATION GROUPS.

#### MALE BREADWINNERS.

The complete census classification distinguishes 140 different occupations or occupation groups, but the preceding table is a condensation of the detailed classification, presenting figures for the more important or significant occupations, and grouping the other occupations in the residuary or "all other" groups under each of the five main classes

of occupations.

In each of the seventeen foreign nationality classes distinguished in this table the proportionate number employed in agricultural pursuits, professional service, and in trade and transportation is much larger in the second generation than in the first; while the proportion employed in domestic and personal service and manufacturing and mechanical pursuits is, with one or two unimportant exceptions, considerably smaller. This would suggest that there is a general movement away from domestic and personal service and manufacturing and mechanical pursuits into agriculture, the professions, and the class of occupations comprised under trade and transportation.

Some of the main classes, however, embrace a wide diversity of occupations, and for that reason figures for the more important single occupations or occupation groups are perhaps more significant than the totals for the five main classes. Accordingly, in the text which follows, attention is directed to some of the more important occupation groups, the first group considered being that composed of persons returned by the census as "laborers (not specified)." Other occupation groups are discussed in the order here named: Miners; iron and steel workers; textile mill operatives; the building trades; clerical pursuits; salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers; professional pursuits; agriculture.

#### EMPLOYMENT AS GENERAL LABORERS.

In the United States census persons returned as laborers, or day laborers, or general laborers, without specification of the kind of work on which employed were classified under the designation "laborers (not specified)." Probably this indicates, as a rule, employment in unskilled manual labor requiring only ordinary intelligence and commanding comparatively low wages. About one-tenth of the total number of male breadwinners enumerated by the census are in this occupation group.

It should be noted that farm laborers form a distinct occupation group, and that in agricultural communities persons returned simply as laborers were assumed to be farm laborers and were so classified.

The table next submitted, in which the breadwinners are classified by race and nativity, shows, first, what per cent of each class of breadwinners were laborers, and, second, what per cent the laborers in each class of breadwinners were of the total number of laborers. Thus it shows that 8 per cent of the total number of native white male breadwinners of native parentage were laborers, and that 38.2 per cent of the total number of male laborers were native white of native parentage.

Among the foreign-born, or immigrants, the percentage of general laborers (14.4) is much higher than among the native white Americans. But among the native white of foreign parentage the percentage (8.6) is not much larger than it is among the native white of native parentage (8.0), the small difference suggesting that the children of foreigners are not much more disposed or constrained to earn their living by unskilled manual labor than are the children of native Americans.

But this statement does not hold good of all sections and communities. In the large cities, as shown by the table following, the native white whose parents were foreigners by birth are employed as general laborers to a considerably greater extent than the native white whose parents were native Americans; in the smaller cities and country districts there is less difference between these classes in this respect. But everywhere the proportion of laborers is greater among the foreign-born, or immigrants, than among either class of native white; and in general these three classes appear to be more sharply differentiated in the city than in the country.

All those nationalities in which the percentage of general laborers in the first generation is exceptionally high show a marked reduction in the corresponding percentage in the second generation. This is notably true of the Italians, Poles, Irish, and Hungarians. In the first generation of Italians 33.2 per cent of the male breadwinners are laborers, while in the second generation the percentage is only 12.4. Among the Poles the decline is from 29.1 to 15.1; among the Irish from 22.3 to 10.2; and among the Hungarians from 22.4 to 7.0. In the case of the Canadian English, Danes, English and Welsh, and Scotch the percentage remains about the same, or perhaps shows a slight advance in the second generation.

If the reduction in the percentage of general laborers be taken as indicating and measuring an advance in education, intelligence, and economic status, it follows, of course, that the advance has been more marked for the first group of nationalities mentioned above than for the second. This seems not unlikely for the reason that the nationalities in the second group are probably on a higher economic plane and are possessed of a greater degree of education when they first come to this country than the nationalities com-

prised in the other group.

One of the results of the changes just noted is that the different nationalities show a closer approach to a uniform standard in the second generation than in the first. The percentage of laborers in the first generation ranges from 5.7 for the Scotch to 33.2 for the Italians, while in the second generation the range is from 4.7 for the Russians to 15.7 for the Poles.

In general the figures for the States, presented elsewhere (see General Table VI, pp. 710 and 711), are in harmony with those in the

United States.

In the next table the contrast between the first and second generations of male breadwinners as regards the extent to which they are employed as general laborers, is shown by age periods. In each age period the percentage of laborers is higher in the first generation than in the second, but the difference appears to be rather greater above the age of 25 than below that age.

#### EMPLOYMENT AS MINERS AND QUARRYMEN.

Mining is an occupation which employs a large proportion of foreigners or immigrants. In the census of 1900, 44.3 per cent of the total number of males reported as miners and quarrymen were of foreign birth, or immigrants; and 61.2 per cent were of foreign parentage, being either immigrants or the children of immigrants. These figures are for the entire United States. In mining States the percentage of foreigners is much higher. In Pennsylvania 58.7 per cent of the total number of miners and quarrymen are of foreign birth, and 78.9 per cent are of foreign parentage.

The contrast between the foreigner and the native as regards employment in the miner's occupation is shown by the following

table:

Over 5 per cent (5.1) of the white male breadwinners born in foreign countries are employed as miners and quarrymen. For the native white whose parents were born in foreign countries the proportion employed in mining is less than half as large, being 2.3 per cent; for native white whose parents were also natives the corresponding percentage is only 1.5. The following table gives the percentage of miners for four of the principal mining States:

In the State of Pennsylvania over one-fifth (21.4 per cent) of the foreign-born white male breadwinners were miners or quarrymen, as compared with about one-tenth (9.6 per cent) of the native white male breadwinners whose parents were foreign-born. Of the native white breadwinners whose parents were native, the proportion employed in mining was hardly more than one-thirtieth (3.4 per cent). Similar contrasts are shown for the other mining States.

The difference between the first and second generations in the extent to which they are employed as miners is shown by nationalities in the

table next submitted.

The nationalities which contribute most largely to this occupation in proportion to their number are the Hungarians, Austrians, English and Welsh, Italians, Poles, and Scotch. For these and for all other foreign nationalities, almost without exception, the percentage of miners is much smaller in the second generation than in the first. This statement is based upon statistics covering the entire United States. The statistics for Pennsylvania show one or two notable exceptions to the rule.

In Pennsylvania the percentage of miners among the Poles advances from 28.8, in the first generation, to 42.8 in the second; and in the case of the Austrians it remains nearly stationary, being 36.6 in the first and 35.2 in the second. It should be remembered that each of these nationalities represent a comparatively recent immigration, and that, consequently, the second generation is made up mostly of young persons and children—a fact indicated by the small total number of breadwinners in the second generation as compared with the first. Among the Poles in Pennsylvania the number of breadwinners in the second generation is only 2,352 as compared with 34,730 of the first generation; and of Austrian breadwinners there are 1,270 in the second generation as compared with 44,201 in the first. It is probable, therefore, that the small number of breadwinners in the second generation consists, for the most part, of children and young persons; and that the large percentage of miners among them indicates simply that a good many male children in these foreign families are employed in the mines where their parents work. It is not unlikely that as the second generation in these nationalities grows

up there will be a marked decline in the relative prominence of the miner's occupation, resulting from the selection of other occupations on the part of children who do not live in mining communities, or are not connected with mining families, or whose schooling has been prolonged so as to fit them for occupations of a higher grade.

The following table gives the number and the percentage of miners and quarrymen in each generation, by age periods, without distinction of nationality. It is noticeable, and perhaps significant, that at the point which marks the transition from childhood to youth the percentage declines to a more marked degree in the second generation than in the first, as indicated by a comparison between the youngest age period (10 to 15) and the next older (16 to 24).

# EMPLOYMENT AS IRON AND STEEL WORKERS.

In the census classification the iron and steel workers include employees of foundries, furnaces, and rolling mills. The total numbers employed in this occupation are hardly more than one-half as great as the number employed as miners and quarrymen. Nor is the foreign element quite as prominent as it is in mining, 35.9 per cent of the iron and steel workers being of foreign birth, and 63.0 being of foreign parentage.

The 103,214 white male immigrants employed in iron and steel works in 1900 formed 2.1 per cent of the total number of white male immigrants in all occupations. In the second generation of breadwinners, represented by the native white of foreign parentage, the percentage of iron and steel workers is almost as large, being 1.9; but of the native white breadwinners of native parentage only 0.8 per cent were reported in this industry.

The following table presents this comparison for the five States in which the iron and steel workers form more than 2 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in all occupations:

In Ohio the percentage of iron and stèel workers among immigrants (foreign white) is almost twice as large as it is in the second generation (native white foreign parents). In Delaware, on the other hand, there is very little difference between these two classes as regards the extent to which they are engaged in this industry.

As shown by the percentages in the table given below, the Poles and Hungarians, in proportion to their numbers, are employed in iron and steel works to a greater extent than any other nationality distinguished in the census classification, and for each of these nationalities the percentage of iron and steel workers is much smaller in the second generation than in the first. The contrast may be partly due to the youthfulness of the second generation, the occupation here considered being one which affords comparatively few opportunities for the employment of children.<sup>a</sup> Those nationalities, such as the German and Irish, which are represented by an older second generation, include almost or quite as large a percentage of iron and steel workers in the second generation as in the first.

On the whole, the movement away from this occupation on the part of the second generation is not so marked as it is in the case of

the two occupations previously considered, namely, that of general laborers and that of miners and quarrymen. It will be found, in fact, that there are several nationalities (Canadian French, French, Germans, Italians, and Swiss) in which the percentage of iron and steel workers is higher in the second generation than in the first. These, however, are nationalities in which the occupation does not obtain any very marked importance in either generation.

In the State of Ohio the percentage shows a decline in the second generation for every nationality except the French. In Pennsylvania, the State in which the iron and steel industry attains its greatest prominence, the percentage employed in this industry shows a decline in the second generation for every nationality except the French Canadian, of whom there are very few in that State, the Germans,

the Russians, and the Swiss.

#### TEXTILE MILL OPERATIVES.

The number of white male immigrants (male foreign-born white) employed as textile mill operatives at the time of the Twelfth Census was 108,877. This represents 2.2 per cent or about one forty-fifth of the total number of male immigrants employed in all occupations and 40.8 per cent or two-fifths of the total number of textile mill operatives of all classes.

This industry is peculiarly adapted for the employment of young persons and children. But, notwithstanding that, it obtains a proportionately smaller number of recruits from the second generation of male breadwinners than from the first. Of male workers in the second generation (native white of foreign parentage) only 1.5 per cent are in the textile mills, while for the first generation, represented by the foreign-born, the corresponding percentage was, as just noted, 2.2.

That the contrast is in fact more marked in the younger age periods than in the older is indicated by the table given below. Of the male immigrant workers 10 to 15 years of age, 11.7 per cent are employed in textile mills; but of the second generation of workers in this age period, only 4.4 per cent are so employed. This suggests a movement away from the textile mills more marked than is indicated by the comparison of the totals without distinction of age.

This industry is conducted in different sections of the country, under widely divergent conditions, and notably in the North as compared with the South. The totals, therefore, are hardly typical of conditions in any section. In New England three-fifths (61.6 per cent) of the male operatives in textile mills are immigrants, and more than one-fourth are the native children of immigrants; and the industry absorbs more than one-eighth of the foreign-born male breadwinners in that section and more than one-twelfth of the second generation. In the South, on the other hand, there are comparatively few immigrants in the total population, and of these only a small percentage are employed in the textile mills, the operatives being practically all native white of native parentage. The contrast is shown in the table following.

Two sets of percentages are presented in the above table. The first shows what percentage of each class of male breadwinners is employed in the textile mills; the second shows what percentage of the male textile mill operatives is comprised in each of the four classes of male breadwinners. For instance, in New England 12.7 per cent of the foreign-born white male breadwinners are employed in the textile mills, and of the total number of male textile mill operatives 61.6 per cent are foreign-born white. The table brings out the contrast between the North and the South as regards the proportion of textile mill operatives who are of foreign birth. In New England this pro-

portion is 61.6 per cent, while in the South, as represented by the three States of North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia, it is only 0.3 per cent.

The Canadian French are employed in the textile mills to a far greater extent than any other foreign nationality; but the proportion is hardly more than half as great in the second generation as it is in the first, the difference for male breadwinners being that between a percentage of 19.1 in the first generation and 10.9 in the second. Among the English and Welsh male breadwinners the percentage of textile mill operatives declines from 4.5 for the first generation to 1.9 for the second. It is noteworthy that in each of the three Scandinavian nationalities—the Danes, the Norwegians, and the Swedes the percentage of textile mill operatives shows a small increase in the second generation. This is also true of the Hungarians. But in none of these nationalities are the numbers or percentages large enough to be very significant. More worthy of consideration are the figures for the Irish, which indicate that the second generation is employed in textile mills to quite as great an extent as the first.

In Massachusetts, a State in which the textile industries attain great prominence, 6.4 per cent of the male breadwinners in the first generation of Irish are textile mill operatives, and 6.9 per cent of those in the second. (See Table 21.) It will be found that this small increase is the resultant of a comparatively small decline in the percentage employed in the cotton mills and a comparatively large increase in the percentage employed in other textile mills.

The only other nationalities that are represented in Massachusetts by sufficient numbers in each generation to make the comparison significant are the English and Welsh, the Germans, the Scotch, and the Canadian English. Of these nationalities the first two show a marked decline in the percentage of textile mill operatives in the second generation; the Scotch show a slight decline, and the Cana-

dian English an appreciable increase.

## THE BUILDING TRADES.

The group of occupations here designated as building trades comprises carpenters, masons, painters, paper hangers, plasterers, plumbers, roofers and slaters, and mechanics (not otherwise specified). The relative importance of these different pursuits is shown by the total numbers reported for each in the census of 1900.

This occupation group represents for the most part skilled labor, requiring technical training or apprenticeship and commanding in general better wages and more favorable conditions of employment than obtain in textile mills, in iron and steel works, or in mines. The number of men employed in the building trades is more than twice the number employed in mines and quarries, about four times the number employed in iron and steel works, and more than four times the number of male textile mill operatives.

About one-fourth, 25.7 per cent, of the males employed in the building trades are immigrants (foreign-born). It will be remembered that immigrants constituted 44.3 per cent of the miners and quarrymen, 40.9 per cent of the textile mill operatives, and 35.9 per cent of the iron and steel workers. (See Tables 7, 17, and 12.) It is apparent, therefore, that they do not attain the same prominence in the building trades that they do in these other occupation groups. But this is partly because these trades represent a widely diffused class of employments, not being localized or concentrated in any particular sections or communities, but being carried on wherever there are buildings to be constructed, therefore in the country as well as the city and in all sections of the United States. The immigrant population, on the other hand, is largely concentrated in cities, mill towns, and mining regions; and in certain sections of the United States, notably in the South, is practically unrepresented.

The building trades afford employment to 6.3 per cent of the total number of white male immigrants employed in all occupations. (See Table 22.) For the second generation of breadwinners, consisting of the native white of foreign parents, the percentage is almost the same, being 6.1; of the native white male breadwinners whose parents were

also natives, only 4.9 per cent are in the building trades.

Of the total number of males employed in building trades in cities of over 50,000 population, 38.8 per cent, as shown by the table following, are immigrants; outside such cities the corresponding percentage is only 17.6.

On segregating the large cities (of over 50,000 inhabitants) from the smaller cities and country districts, it will be found that the difference between these three classes of breadwinners, as regards the extent to which they are employed in the building trades, practically disappears. In the cities 8.5 per cent of the total number of breadwinners in each class are included in this occupation group; and in the smaller cities and country districts the percentage varies but slightly, being 4.7 for the foreign white, 4.9 for the native children of the foreign white, and 4.4 for the native white of native parentage.

There seems to be no marked movement toward this occupation group on the part of the second generation of foreigners. On the contrary, with most of the nationalities distinguished in the census classification this occupation group has a diminished importance in the second generation. For the Canadian English the percentage of male breadwinners employed in the building trades declines from 10.8 in the first generation to 5.9 in the second; for the Canadian French the decline is from 9.4 to 6.3. The percentage for the Scotch declines from 9.6 to 6.7. Each of the three Scandinavian nationalities—the Danes, the Norwegians, and the Swedes—show a similarly marked decline in the importance of this occupation group in the second generation. On the other hand, the Austrians, the French, the Hungarians, the Irish, and, to a more marked degree, the Italians and Poles, show a tendency to enter these occupations in relatively greater numbers in the second generation.

On the whole, therefore, while this comparison of the occupations of the second generation with those of the first indicates a movement away from unskilled manual labor and from work in factories and mines, it does not indicate that the movement is toward the skilled

trades.

The comparison between the two generations by age periods, but without distinction of nationality, is shown in the following table. In the age period 25 to 34 and also in each age period above 45 the percentage employed in the building trades is appreciably higher in the second generation of male workers than in the first.

# CLERICAL PURSUITS.

In 1900 there were 754,476 male breadwinners whose occupation was returned in the census as that of clerk, copyist, stenographer, typewriter, bookkeeper, or accountant. These occupations represent varying degrees of ability and include a rather wide range of compensations.

They are all alike sedentary pursuits, implying, in most cases, no more general education than may be readily obtained from the public schools, supplemented in the case of bookkeepers and stenographers by some special training. Of the total number in these employments 98,748, or 13.1 per cent, were immigrants. The number and proportion of immigrants in each specified occupation were as follows:

There is a marked difference between the first and second generations of male breadwinners as regards the extent to which they enter this class of occupations. Only 2 per cent of the foreign-born white are clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, etc., as compared with 5.7 per cent of the native white whose parents were foreign-born. (See Table 26.) These occupations, therefore, have more than twice the relative importance in the second generation that they have in the first.

In the larger cities, where the demand for employment in clerical pursuits is greatest, more than one-tenth (10.9 per cent) of the second generation of male breadwinners were reported in these occupations as compared with 3.4 per cent of the first generation.

The table below shows that in the larger cities 15.9 per cent of the total number of male clerks, stenographers, etc., are immigrants (foreign-born white), and 37.6 per cent are the children of immigrants (native white foreign parents). Taken together these two classes comprise 53.5 per cent, or more than one-half of the total number of males employed in these occupations. In the smaller cities and country districts they comprise 30.9 per cent of the total.

Without exception each foreign nationality distinguished in the census classification shows a considerable increase in the percentage of clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, etc., in the second generation of breadwinners. Especially marked is the contrast in this respect between the first and second generations of Austrians, Hungarians, Russians, and Italians. Among the Hungarian immigrants, for instance, only 1 per cent of the male breadwinners are clerks, bookkeepers, and stenographers; but in the second generation this percentage becomes 11.9. For Austrians the corresponding percentages are 1.1 and 8.4, respectively; for Italians, 0.4 and 6.4; for Russians, 2.2 and 11.7. The Canadian English, the English and Welsh, and the Scotch have a higher percentage for the first generation, but not so marked an advance for the second generation. The Canadian French appear to be the nationality in which there is the least inclination toward clerical pursuits on the part of the second generation.

## SALESMEN, AGENTS, AND COMMERCIAL TRAVELERS.

The occupations of salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers are believed to be sufficiently similar in character to be combined in a single group for the purpose of the comparisons under consideration, although the broad term agent doubtless includes a good many persons who are not engaged in selling goods or products. The group thus obtained is somewhat larger than the group of clerks, stenographers, and bookkeepers, and comprises a somewhat larger proportion of immigrants. The 125,442 salesmen, etc., who are immigrants represent 16 per cent of the total number of males in these occupations and 2.5 per cent of the total number of male immigrants who are breadwinners.

In the second generation of male breadwinners the percentage of salesmen, etc., increases to 4.8 and is larger than the corresponding percentage for the native white of native parentage. The latter fact appears to be due to the greater concentration of the foreigners and their children in cities or commercial centers. When the comparison is confined to that part of the population which lives in cities of over 50,000 inhabitants, it will be found that the native white of native parentage are employed as salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers to a greater extent than either of the other classes. The difference is measured by percentages given in the next table, which shows that in the larger cities 10.3 per cent of the native male breadwinners of native birth and parentage are employed as salesmen, in comparison with 4 per cent of the immigrants (foreign-born white) and 7.6 per cent of the native children of immigrants (native white foreign-born parents).

In general there is a decided increase in the proportion of salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers in the second generation of each nationality. This is notably the case as regards the Russians, the great majority of whom are doubtless Russian Jews; also as regards the Hungarians, Poles, and Austrians. The tendency is hardly less marked for the Scandinavian nationalities and the Germans. It is, on the whole, less striking for the Canadian French, the English and

Welsh, the Irish, and the Scotch.

This occupation group does not, however, attain the same importance in the second generation as the occupation group representing clerical pursuits, although in the first generation it has greater importance. Or, briefly stated, in the first generation there are more salesmen than clerks, in the second more clerks than salesmen. Consequently, although each of these two occupation groups shows an advance in the second generation as compared with the first, the clerk's occupation shows a much greater advance than the salesman's. Of course in these general statements the terms "clerk" and "salesman" are used in a broad sense to include the allied occupations classed with them in the tabular presentation.

The difference between the two generations as regards employment as salesmen, etc., is shown in the following table by age periods, but without distinction of nationality.

## PROFESSIONAL SERVICE.

Only a small proportion, 3.5 per cent, of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States are employed in professional pursuits or professional service. As would be expected, the proportion is still smaller in the case of immigrants, the percentage being 2.4. In the second generation it increases to 3.6.

Of the total number of white males engaged in professional pursuits, 64.1 per cent are native children of native Americans, 14.2 per cent are immigrants, and 17.7 per cent the children of immigrants.

The table given below shows the number and percentage of immigrants and of native white children of immigrants in each professional pursuit. Thus it indicates that 14.3 per cent of the actors and professional showmen are immigrants, and 26 per cent are the children of immigrants. Noticeably large are the percentages of immigrants among artists and musicians and the percentage of children of immigrants among electricians.

One-fifth, 19.7 per cent, of the white immigrants reported in professional service are clergymen, most of whom probably are preaching to congregations of their fellow countrymen and conducting services in their native language; 11.6 per cent are musicians and teachers of music; and 11.4 per cent are physicians. In the second generation (native white foreign parents) the percentage of clergymen in the professional class declines to 8.9, the percentage of musicians and teachers of music to 6.3, while the percentage of physicians remains practically unchanged. There are proportionately more electricians and lawyers in the second generation than in the first.

Of the various foreign nationalities included in this comparison only one, the French, shows a decline in the percentage of professional men among the breadwinners of the second generation. This results from a diminution in the relative number of clergymen and of teachers. The former is a change common to all foreign nationalities, but the latter is exceptional, and is to be explained probably by the demand for native teachers of the French language, which makes the proportion of teachers in the first generation exceptionally large.

The percentage of professional men in the second generation of Canadian English, English and Welsh, and Scotch is greater than it is for the native white of native parentage. The highest percentage shown for any class is that for the second generation of Scotch. The nationalities in which the percentage shows the greatest advance in the second generation as compared with the first are the Austrian, the

Hungarian, and the Italian.

### AGRICULTURE.

It is sometimes said that the enormous immigration to the United States would not furnish any grounds for apprehension as to its effects upon this nation if the foreigners, instead of congregating in the city and seeking employment in sweatshops and factories, would settle in the country and on the farm.

The census figures indicate that 21.7 per cent, or more than one-fifth of the foreign-born have, in fact, entered agricultural pursuits, and that the percentage in the second generation, as represented by the native white whose parents were foreign-born, increased to 25.9,

or more than one-fourth.

Of the total number of males engaged in agriculture 11.6 per cent are of foreign birth, and 11.3 per cent are the sons of foreign-born (white) parents, so that the two classes taken together, representing respectively the first and second generations of foreign origin, constitute 22.9 per cent of all males engaged in agriculture. Of the white males engaged in agriculture 27.0 per cent, or one-fourth, are either of foreign birth or foreign parentage.

Naturally the proportions vary widely in different nationalities. More than half the Norwegians are engaged in agriculture; more than two-fifths of the Danes; a little less than two-fifths of the Swiss; more than one-third of the Bohemians, and almost one-third of the Swedes. For the Austrians, Hungarians, Italians, Poles, and Russians the proportion is much smaller, being less than one-tenth in each case.

In all nationalities, however, the proportion engaged in agriculture is larger in the second generation of workers than in the first. The difference is least marked in the case of the Germans, for whom the percentage shows hardly any change, advancing from 27.3 to only 28.6. For the Irish also the gain is not very great, the percentage being 13.7 in the first generation and 16.5 in the second. These two nationalities include more than one-half of the total number of breadwinners of foreign parentage, and therefore, to a large extent, determine the percentages shown by aggregates. If from the totals for foreign-born and for native white of foreign parentage we subtract, respectively, the first and the second generations of Germans

and Irish, the remainders will represent approximately the first and second generations of the other foreign races.

The percentage engaged in agricultural pursuits for foreign races, exclusive of the German and Irish, advances from 20.3 in the first generation to 29.8 in the second. The comparison suggests a rather marked trend toward agriculture on the part of the second generation of foreigners not of Irish or German extraction. But the significance of these figures may easily be misconstrued. The agricultural occupation group is made up mainly of two rather distinct classes—the farmer and the farm laborer. These differ widely in economic position and in their relation to the cultivation of the soil. The farmer is interested in agriculture as a business enterprise. He is usually an employer of labor, in command of more or less capital, and probably regards farming as a permanent occupation, from which he expects to obtain a competency, if not a fortune. farm laborer, on the other hand, is a wage-earner, whose interest in agriculture may not extend beyond his hire, and whose connection with the farm is not unlikely to be transient or temporary. Very few farmers are under 25 years of age. But most of the farm laborers are below that age, many of them being hardly more than boys, and not a few being farmers' sons working on the home farm. Many of them, doubtless, will become farmers in later life, but some will adopt other occupations and seek the city.

Now the increased extent to which foreigners of the second generation are employed in agricultural pursuits represents mostly an increase in the proportion of farm laborers. In fact, the percentage of farmers declines slightly in the second generation, as is shown by the table next presented, in which the farmers are segregated from the farm laborers. To a large degree, no doubt, the percentages are influenced by the differences in the age composition of the two generations, or the fact that while the first generation, consisting of immigrants, comprises few children and young persons, the second comprises many such. Indeed, the second generation of those races, whose immigration is of recent origin, consists almost entirely of

children and young persons.

Among the foreign-born white, representing the first generation, the percentage of farmers, as shown by the above table, is 14.6; among the native white of foreign parents, representing the second generation, the percentage of farmers declines to 13.3. The percentage of farm laborers, on the other hand, advances from 5.2 in the first generation to 11.6 in the second.

Since farm labor is preeminently a young man's occupation, while farming is an occupation for middle age and even old age, it may safely be assumed that the decline in the percentage of farmers in the second generation is due to the fact just mentioned, that the second generation comprises relatively more young people and relatively fewer middle aged and old people than the first generation; and, on the other hand, it may also be assumed that the increase in the percentage of farm laborers in the second generation is, at least, partly due to the same cause. To test the truth of these assumptions we may, on the basis of census figures, make the comparison between the two generations by age periods, so as to show how the percentage of farmers or of farm laborers in a given age period in one generation compares with the corresponding percentage for the other generation in the same age period. The result as regards the percentage of farmers is shown by the table following.

In each age period the percentage of farmers is larger in the second generation than in the first. Thus of the male breadwinners between 25 and 34 years in the first generation 8.3 per cent are farmers, but in the same age period of the second generation the percentage of farmers is 14.1. Similarly, in every other age period the percentage of farmers is higher in the second generation than in the first. And yet the totals show a smaller percentage in the second generation than in the first. This may seem like a statistical paradox, but the explanation is not far to seek and has, indeed, already been suggested. In the second generation the younger age periods, in which the percentage of farmers is small, are represented by relatively larger numbers, and therefore have more influence upon the total than in the first generation. Of the total number of male breadwinners in the second generation, 65.6 per cent are under 35 years of age, while in the first generation only 39.4 per cent are under that age. It is evident then that the fact that the second generation has a smaller percentage of farmers than the first is due simply to the fact that the second generation is younger than the first. does not necessarily indicate a movement away from the farm. the contrary, the comparison by age periods might be taken to indicate that the second generation is more inclined to farming than the first, and that the movement is toward the farm and not away from it. But in this connection we must not overlook the probability that the second generation, having a better start in life than their parents, may have acquired farms and become farmers at an earlier This factor would tend to make the percentage larger for the second generation than for the first, especially in the younger age periods. It is not impossible, moreover, that those immigrants who settled on farms or in agricultural communities may have raised larger families than those who settled in cities; and if that is the case, then, in so far as the children of the farmers remained on the farm, that act also would tend to make the percentage of farmers larger in the

second generation of immigrants than in the first. It is not certain. therefore, that the increased percentage of farmers in the second generation, as revealed in the foregoing comparison by age periods, indicates any movement from the city to the country, or from industrial to agricultural pursuits.

As regards the percentage of agricultural laborers, the comparison between the first and second generations, by age periods, is as follows:

In each age period up to 45 the percentage of agricultural laborers is larger in the second generation than in the first. In the two youngest age periods the difference is very marked. Among boys 10 to 15 years, the percentage is 17.4 for the first generation as compared with 35.6 for the second; among young men 16 to 24 years of age, the percentage in the first generation is 13.0 and in the second Between 45 and 54 the percentage of agricultural laborers is the same in both generations. Above 54 the percentages are higher in the first generation than in the second.

Doubtless many of the boys and young men in the second generation reported as agricultural laborers were the sons of farmers in the first generation, and probably many of them were employed on the home farm, for in the census the older children of farmers working on

the home farm were included as agricultural laborers.

It is not possible to analyze the figures for each nationality by age periods so as to determine what the effect of differences in age composition may be as applied to the first and second generations of each nationality. But in considering the total percentages, as presented in the next table, it should be borne in mind that a decrease in the percentage of farmers in the second generation, as compared with the first, may simply be indicative of the comparative youthfulness of the second generation, and that, on the other hand, an increase in the percentage of agricultural laborers is likely to be due in part to the same cause.

There are 8 nationalities in which the percentage of farmers is larger in the second generation than in the first. These are the Austrians, the Canadian English, the Canadian French, the English and Welsh, the French, the Hungarians, the Italians, and the Scotch. The other 9 nationalities, which have a smaller percentage of farmers in the second generation are the Bohemians, the Danes, the Germans, the Irish, the Norwegians, the Poles, the Russians, the Swedes, and the Swiss. But it must not be assumed that this decline in the percentage of farmers necessarily indicates that the second generation has less inclination toward farming than the A comparison by age periods, if it could be made, would doubtless disprove this assumption in case of some of these nationalities if not for all of them. Take for special consideration the case of the Danes, who show a very marked decline in the percentage of farmers in the second generation, that percentage being only 12.9, as compared with a percentage of 30.6 in the first generation. It is safe to say that comparatively few of the Danes of the second generation were over 30 years of age in 1900; for those who were above that age most have been born in the United States prior to 1870, and must therefore have been children of Danish immigrants who came to

this country before that time. But in 1870 the number of Danish immigrants in the United States of all ages and both sexes was only 30,107, as compared with a total of 153,805 in 1900. It is evident, then, that by far the greater part of the second generation of Danes in 1900 consisted of persons who were born since 1870, and were therefore under 30 years of age. It is to be expected that a generation so young as that would show a decrease in the percentage of farmers as compared with the previous and older generation. This decrease is more than offset by an increase in the percentage of farm laborers. Without exception the percentage of agricultural laborers increases in the second generation of every nationality.

Almost invariably it will be found that in the first generation of

Almost invariably it will be found that in the first generation of each foreign nationality the farmers outnumber the agricultural laborers, and not infrequently in the ratio of 2 or 3 to 1; but in the second generation the agricultural laborers more often outnumber the farmers. It may be noted furthermore that the numerical preponderance of agricultural laborers over farmers in the second generation of breadwinners is more pronounced when that generation is small as compared with the first, or, in other words, when the second generation consists principally of children and contains therefore comparatively few breadwinners.

# FEMALE BREADWINNERS.

In the preceding pages a comparison has been made between the first and second generations of foreigners in the United States as regards the occupations followed by the male breadwinners. The difference between the two generations as regards the industrial pursuits adopted by the other sex is at least equally significant and interesting in its relation to the question of the industrial and social advance of the second generation.

The number of female breadwinners in the first generation of foreigners (foreign-born white) in 1900 was 880,415; in the second generation the number was 1,184,046. The distribution of these two generations by nationality is shown by the following table:

### SERVANTS AND WAITRESSES.

Notwithstanding the great increase in the employment of women in commercial and industrial pursuits, domestic service still represents numerically the leading occupation for this sex, as is indicated by the fact that at the census of 1900 the number of women and girls reported as servants far exceeded the number reported in any other occupation and comprised, in fact, nearly one-fourth (24.1 per cent) of the total number reported in all occupations.

Of the immigrant women who were breadwinners, 37.8 per cent, or more than one-third, were servants or waitresses. In the second generation, as represented by the native white women whose parents, one or both, were immigrants, the percentage declines to 21.5 and is not much larger than it is for the native white women whose parents

were also natives (18.2).

In the cities of over 50,000 population the percentage of servants and waitresses declines from 38.7 in the first generation of foreigners to 15.2 in the second; and while the total number of female breadwinners in the second generation is about one-fifth larger than it is in the first, the number of servants is less than half as large. Outside such cities the percentage of servants in the second generation is very much higher, being 28.0, as compared with a percentage of 36.6 for the first generation. Probably this reflects the fact that the opportunities for employment of women in those industrial and commercial pursuits which divert the second generation from domestic service, are greater in the cities than in the country.

As shown by the above table, the proportion of female breadwinners employed as servants and waitresses is notably large among the Scandinavians. Considering the figures for both generations combined, it appears that 56.4 per cent or more than one-half of the Swedish women and girls at work are employed as servants and waitresses; for Norwegians the corresponding percentage is 47, and for the Danes 44. The figures for the Swedes, however, indicate a marked decline in the attractiveness of the servants' occupation for the second generation of female breadwinners, of whom only 44.5 per cent are in this occupation, as compared with 61.5 per cent of those in the first generation. On the other hand, among the Norwegians there is a slight increase in the percentage of servants in the second generation, and among the Danes there is only a slight decrease.

With the exception of the Swedes, there is no class of immigrant working women that includes so large a proportion of servants as the Irish, 54 per cent of the total number being reported in this occupation. But in the second generation of this nationality the proportion shows a very marked decline, becoming only 16 per cent. The Hungarians are the only other nationality in which the contrast, in this respect, between the two generations is equally striking. Besides

the Norwegians, already mentioned, there are two other nationalities which are exceptional in having proportionately more servants in the second generation than in the first: They are the Russians and the Canadian French. Strictly speaking, the Bohemians also come into this class, but, practically, the percentage for the second generation of this nationality is the same as for the first.

### THE NEEDLE TRADES.

The occupation group here designated by the term "needle trades" includes dressmakers, milliners, seamstresses, and tailoresses. Of the 646,610 women and girls reported in these occupations at the census of 1900, 120,570, or 18.7 per cent, were immigrants and 223,247, or 34.5 per cent, were the children of immigrants. The number and proportion of immigrants in each of these four occupations were as follows:

Especially noticeable in the above table is the exceptionally large percentage of foreign-born women among tailoresses. Under this designation are probably classified most of the women working on the manufacture of men's clothing, whether in factories or sweat shops or in custom tailors' shops. More than three-fourths of the tailoresses are either immigrants or the children of immigrants. The number in the second generation is, however, hardly larger than it is in the first, while in the other needle trades the second generation greatly outnumbers the first, the number of dressmakers in the second generation being, in fact, more than twice as great as it is in the first and the number of milliners more than three times as great.

In New York City 71.3 per cent of the women and girls classified as tailoresses are immigrants and 24.7 per cent are the children of immigrants. Taken together these two classes make up 96 per cent of all females reported for that occupation. Of the seamstresses 55.2 per cent are immigrants and 33.6 per cent children of immigrants, making a total of 88.8 per cent. In each of these two occupations the second generation is represented by much smaller numbers than the first; but in the dressmaker's occupation and the milliner's, on the other hand, the second generation outnumbers the first. The difference is probably to be explained by the fact that the latter are skilled trades, better paid and more attractive than the sweatshop occupations of seamstress and tailoress.

The 120,570 female immigrants employed in the needle trades constitute 13.6 per cent or almost one-seventh of the total number employed in all occupations. In the second generation the percentage employed in the needle trades increases to 18.9, a proportion of almost one in five.

Of the foreign-born white female breadwinners, representing the first generation of foreigners, 6.5 per cent were employed as dress-makers; of the native white female breadwinners whose parents were foreign-born, representing the secondg eneration, 10.2 per cent were employed in this occupation. The percentage employed as milliners was 1.1 for the first generation, and 2.6 for the second; the percentage employed as seamstresses was 3.1 and 3.8, respectively; the percentage employed as tailoresses was 3.0 and 2.3, respectively. Thus of the four occupations included under needle trades that of tailoress is the only one which obtains a relatively smaller number of recruits from the second generation than from the first.

As shown by the above table, the Italians and Russians are the only nationalities in which the second generation shows a decrease in the per cent of female breadwinners employed in the needle trades, and in each case the decrease is very marked, the percentage declining from 37.7 to 24.3 in case of the Italians and from 41.2 to 22.9 in case of the Russians. This decrease is most apparent in the occupation of tailoress. The occupation of milliner, on the other hand, attracts an increased percentage of the breadwinners of the second generation in these as well as in all other nationalities. (See Table 58.)

The greatest advance in the relative importance of the needle trades in the second generation as compared with the first is that shown by the Irish. Of the Irish immigrant women who are breadwinners only 7.5 per cent are employed in these occupations, but in the second generation that percentage advances to 17.9, a proportion of approximately 2 out of 11. Most of this increase takes place in the dressmaker's occupation, which attracts 11 per cent of the female breadwinners in the second generation of Irish, as compared with only 4.7 per cent of those in the first generation. Other nationalities in which there is a rather marked movement toward this group of occupations on the part of the second generation as com-

pared with the first are the Germans, the Bohemians, the Canadian

French, and the Swiss.

In the first generation there is no nationality which has as large a percentage of dressmakers as the French, but in the second generation the percentage is slightly larger for the Italians. The percentage of milliners in the first generation is largest among the Russians, while in the second generation the percentage for the Russians is equaled by that for the Hungarians.

### TEXTILE MILL OPERATIVES.

At the census of 1900 the number of foreign-born, or immigrant, women and girls reported as employed in textile mills was 87,962. This represents one-tenth (9.9 per cent) of the total number of foreign-born women and girls employed in all occupations, and three-tenths (31.6 per cent) of the total number of female textile mill operatives of all classes, native and foreign born.

In the second generation of female breadwinners the percentage of textile mill operatives declines to 7.7, a decline which is less marked than that shown in the percentage of servants and waitresses. (See Table 49.) In the first generation of female breadwinners of foreign nativity the number of textile mill operatives is less than one-fourth the number of servants; but in the second generation the textile mill operatives are more than one-third as many as the servants. But there are large sections of the United States in which the option of entering the textile mills is not open to the woman seeking employment. More significance therefore attaches to a comparison restricted to the State of Massachusetts, where the rivalry between the textile mill and domestic service is probably most acute.

As shown by the above tabular statement, in Massachusetts the number of immigrant women and girls who are servants exceed the number in the textile mills by about one-fourth; but in the next generation the textile mill operatives outnumber the servants by more than two to one.

In the entire United States 35.4 per cent of the female textile mill operatives are native white women or girls of native parentage, 32.8

per cent are the native white children of immigrants, and 31.6 per cent are immigrants. (See Table 59.) Thus these three classes are represented in the textile mills by about equal numbers. But this approximate numerical equality holds good only of the country as a whole, and results from wide differences in different sections of the United States. In the South the textile mill operatives are almost all native white of native parentage, while in the North, and particularly in New England, the foreign-born and their children are greatly in the majority.

In New England of the total number of immigrant women and girls who are breadwinners 30.9 per cent are employed in the textile mills. In the next generation, consisting of the native white female breadwinners whose parents were foreign-born, 25.2 per cent are in the textile mills. Of the native white female breadwinners of native parentage, only 7.1 per cent are textile mill operatives. These three classes form, respectively, 53.6 per cent, 35.2 per cent, and 11.2 per cent of the total number of female textile mill operatives.

In the South these classes are represented in the textile mills by very different percentages, as is shown by the figures presented in the preceding table for North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia.

Of the women and girl workers who immigrated from French Canada, almost two-thirds, or 63.7 per cent, are employed in the textile mills But in the second generation the proportion is not much more than one-third, being 35.8 per cent. No other nationality

is represented in the textile mills by percentages that approach these in either generation. The next highest percentage is that for Polish immigrant female workers, of whom 18.8 per cent are textile mill operatives. In the second generation of this nationality the percentage declines to 7.2. In the case of the Scotch the decline is from 12.8 in the first generation to 7.8 in the second; in case of the

English and Welsh from 15.8 to 9.2.

In case of the Irish, on the other hand, the percentage of textile mill operatives is greater in the second generation of female breadwinners than it is in the first. This is true to a less marked degree of the Germans. It will be found that in each of these two instances the percentage employed in the cotton mills is smaller in the second generation than in the first, but that this decrease is more than offset by the increase in the percentage employed in other and less important branches of the textile industries; and, as shown by Table 48, it is generally true that while the percentage employed in the cotton mills almost invariably declines in the second generation of female breadwinners, the percentage employed in other textile mills nearly always increases. For some reason the second generation of mill operatives seem disposed to discriminate against the cotton mill. In the first generation of Canadian French, for instance, the number of female breadwinners (23,073) in the cotton mills is more than three times the number in other textile mills (7,168); but in the second generation the numerical difference between these two classes of textile mill operatives largely disappears, there being 6,258 in cotton, as against 4,942 in other textile mills. The Irish show the same tendency but to a more striking degree, the change in the relative importance of the two classes of mill operatives here distinguished being as follows: In the first generation of Irish, 8,275 women and girls in cotton mills, as against 10,027 in other textile mills; in the second generation, 9,873 in cotton, as against 30,639 in other textile mills.

#### CLERICAL PURSUITS.

While the occupation group consisting of clerks, stenographers, book-keepers, etc., includes comparatively few immigrant women or girls, it attracts large numbers and a greatly increased proportion of the second generation of female workers. Of the 245,613 females reported as employed in these occupations at the last census, only 20,467, or 8.3 per cent of the total, were foreign-born, while 99,708, or 40.6 per cent of the total, were the native white whose parents were foreign-born.

The relative importance of the first and second generations in each of the three occupations included in this group is indicated by the following tabular statement:

The increased percentage of clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, etc., in the second generation of female breadwinners is very noticeable in each nationality or foreign parentage class distinguished in the table given above. It is especially marked in the case of the Austrians, Hungarians, Irish, and Swedes. For the Austrians the percentage advances from 1.7 in the first generation to 11 in the second; for the Hungarians, from 2.1 to 12.5. Exceptionally large percentages are recorded for the second generations of Canadian English and Russians, but as compared with the first generation the contrast is not so marked as it is in some other nationalties, including those just mentioned.

There is no nationality which has so small a percentage of clerks, etc., in the second generation of female breadwinners as the Canadian French. The Poles rank next to them in this respect and then the

Bohemians.

#### SALESWOMEN.

In the year 1900 the census reported 17,967 immigrant women and girls employed as saleswomen, representing 2 per cent of the total number of female immigrants employed in all occupations. In the second generation, consisting of the native white whose parents were immigrants, the number of saleswomen increases to 68,445 and the percentage to 5.8. The occupation has therefore almost three times the relative importance in the second generation that it has in the first.

In every nationality without exception the occupation of saleswoman attracts a larger percentage of the total number of female breadwinners in the second generation than in the first. (See Table 67.) The increase in the percentage for the second generation is perhaps most striking among the Irish. Of the Irish immigrant women at work only 1.2 per cent were reported as saleswomen, but in the next generation the percentage advances to 6.1. An increase almost as great is shown for the Italians, from 1.6 to 6.8.

In each generation the largest percentage of saleswomen is that shown for the Russians, a fact which reflects perhaps the characteristics of the Russian Jew, but the contrast between the first and second generations in this respect is not so striking here as it is in many other nationalities.

The Norwegian women and the Canadian appear to have the least inclination toward this occupation of saleswoman in either the first or the second generation. Doubtless the difference between the different nationalities is influenced by their geographical distribution. Opportunities for employment as saleswoman are mainly confined to urban centers and are most abundant in large cities where the big department stores exist.

#### TEACHERS.

Teaching in the United States is preeminently a profession for women. The number of women reported by the census of 1900 as employed in teaching was 328,049. This is almost three times the number of men employed in this profession (118,748); and more than three times the number of women employed in all other professional service (103,125). It nearly equals the aggregate number of men reported in the three great professions of law (113,693), medicine (124,826), and the ministry (108,537). It greatly exceeds the number of women and girls employed in the textile mills (278,343).

The second generation of female breadwinners comprises a larger proportion of teachers than the first in every nationality with the exception of the French. This exception is probably due to the fact that many women born and educated in France migrate to this country because of the opportunities for teaching the French language. The second generation, born in this country, may not be as well qualified for that line of teaching. The movement toward teaching on the part of the second generation of female breadwinners as compared with the first is perhaps most marked among the Irish and the three Scandinavian nationalities, viz, the Danes, the Norwegians, and the Swedes. But the percentage of teachers is highest in the second generation of Canadian English, and almost as high in the second generation of Scotch. The third highest percentage is that for the second generation of English and Welsh. In fact, the female breadwinners whose parents were Canadian English, English and Welsh, or Scotch immigrants comprise proportionately more teachers than female breadwinners whose parents were native Americans. But this is probably not true in all sections of the country.

# PART II.—STATISTICS BY NATIONALITIES.

In the preceding pages the occupational statistics for the first and second generations of foreigners have been presented by occupation groups, and under each occupation group by nationalities. This was done to bring out the differences between different nationalities and between the first and second generations of the same nationality as regards their tendency to seek employment in a particular class of

occupations.

In the page which follows the statistics are presented first by nationalities and under each nationality by occupation or occupation groups. This arrangement is naturally convenient for students or other persons who may be interested in studying the characteristics of particular nationalities. Tables are presented showing separately but side by side the occupational distribution of each of the two generations of the given nationality. Another series of tables gives in order of rank the ten leading occupations for each generation of that nationality, that is, the ten occupations or occupational groups in which the largest numbers of persons of that nationality find employment. Naturally these are usually occupations which are numerically important in the general population giving employment to large numbers of persons, for an occupation which employs only a relatively small number of persons in the aggregate would hardly include a relatively large number from any one nat onality. It may happen, however, that a small occupational group includes a large number of representatives of a particular foreign nationality in proportion to the total number of persons in that group, thus indicating that this nationality has availed itself of the opportunities for employment afforded by this relatively unimportant occupation to an exceptional degree, having perhaps a special aptitude for the kind of work represented by that group or being especially attracted by it. This fact has significance as illustrating national character-Therefore, in addition to the tables showing the ten leading istics. occupations for each nationality, another series has been prepared showing the ten occupations in which the given nationality attains its greatest prominence as compared with the total number of persons employed in the occupations.

#### AUSTRIANS.

In 1900 the number of male breadwinners in the United States who were immigrants having parents born in Austria was 153,033. The second generation of Austrians, representing the children born in the United States, comprised only 14,587 male breadwinners.

The occupational classification of each generation of male breadwinners of Austrian parentage is given in the following table:

Of the male immigrant breadwinners whose parents were born in Austria, 18.9 per cent are miners and quarrymen. This percentage indicates that in proportion to their number immigrants from Austria are employed in the mines to a greater extent than any other class of immigrants except the Hungarians, for whom the percentage of miners was 30.1. The number of general laborers in the first generation of Austrians is practically the same as the number of miners. In the second general laborers to 7.4, while the percentage of agricultural laborers, which was only 2.3 in the first generation, becomes 18.3. There is an increase also in the percentage of farmers, from 5.2 in the first generation to 7.3 in the second.

The distribution by States of the Austrians engaged in agriculture

is indicated by the following table:

About one-fifth, 22.1 per cent, of the first generation of Austrian farmers in the United States in 1900 were located in the State of Texas; 11.6 per cent were in Wisconsin, 10.7 per cent in Minnesota, and 10.6 in Nebraska. This accounts for more than one-half the total number in the United States. These four States together include about the same proportion—somewhat more than one-half—of the second generation of Austrian farmers.

In no other class of immigrants except the Russians are there proportionately as many tailors as there are among the Austrians. In the first generation of Austrians 12.037, or 7.9 per cent, of the total number of male breadwinners in that generation were returned by the census as tailors. Among the Russians of the first generation the number of tailors was 34,418 and the percentage 18. In New

York State more than one-fourth, 26.9 per cent, of the immigrant male breadwinners of Austrian stock were returned in this occupation. In the second generation of Austrian workers the percentage of tailors declines to 1.9 for the United States and to 4.2 for New York.

Less than 1 per cent of the Austrian male breadwinners of either generation in the United States were employed in the textile mills. In Massachusetts, however, this occupation group includes 20.5 per cent of the comparatively small number of male breadwinners of

foreign birth and Austrian parentage in that State.

The Austrians show little inclination toward the building trades, the percentage of male breadwinners employed in those trades being only 2.5 for the first generation and 3.6 for the second. The percentage increase in the second generation is perhaps of some significance, since for most foreign nationalities the percentage declines. As compared with other building trades, the occupation of painter seems to appeal to the Austrians, the number of painters in the second generation being greater than the number of carpenters and in the first generation three-fourths as great, although in the total population of the United States the number of painters is less than one-half the number of carpenters.

Of the second generation of Austrian male breadwinners, 6 per cent are clerks and copyists and 5 per cent are salesmen. Only two foreign nationalities—the Russians and the Poles—have a larger percentage of clerks in the second generation, and only two—the Russians and the Hungarians—have a larger percentage of salesmen.

In the first generation of Austrians, as already noted, miners and quarrymen constitute the largest occupation group, but hardly exceed in numbers the laborers not specified, who constitute the next largest. The third occupation group for this generation is that of

tailors and the fourth that of farmers.

In the second generation of Austrians the largest occupation group is that of agricultural laborers, and the percentage of agricultural laborers is practically as large as the percentage of miners in the first generation. The second occupation in the second generation is that of general laborer and the third that of farmer. The occupations of clerks and salesmen, ranking nineteenth and twelfth, respectively, in the first generation, become the fourth and fifth in the second generation. The occupation of bookkeeper and accountant, which is thirty-ninth in the first generation, advances to eighth in the second. On the other hand, the huckster's occupation declines from the ninth in the first generation to the fifty-fifth in the second; the occupation of saloonkeeper and bartender declines from tenth to nineteenth. The youthful occupation of messenger and errand and office boy naturally is of much less importance in the first generation than in the second, and its importance in the second generation will doubtless decline as that generation becomes older.

Of the 14,433 charcoal, coke, and lime burners reported at the Twelfth Census, 1,951, or 13.52 per cent, were Austrian immigrants. The four occupations having the next largest percentages of Austrian immigrants represent a radically different class of work, as they are all needle trades, comprising the occupations of seamstress, dressmaker, tailor, and hat and cap maker. The sixth occupational group as regards this percentage is that of miner and quarryman. The Austrians represent a composite nationality consisting of many different races, and it is probable that if the figures could be presented by race it would be found that the Austrians reported as miners and charcoal, coke, or lime burners are of different class by origin and race from those employed in sweat-shop industries or needle trades. The

latter may be to a large extent Austrian Jews. At any rate these two contrasted occupational groups represent a migration to different sections of the United States. The Austrian miners and charcoal, coke, and lime burners are largely concentrated in the State of Pennsylvania, while the great majority of those reported in the needle trades were located in the city of New York.

The corresponding list of occupations in which the second generation is most prominent is of less significance because of the very small number of breadwinners in that generation and their youthfulness. The juvenile occupation of messenger and errand and office boy, employing 272 Austrians of the second generation, leads the list with a percentage of 0.42. The few seamstresses, milliners, and dressmakers are very likely young children assisting their parents in the same occupations. More significance perhaps attaches to the appearance in this list of the stenographer's and typewriter's occupation and of the engraver's.

## BOHEMIANS.

The first generation of Bohemians in the United States in 1900 included 71,389 male breadwinners; in the second generation the number was 32,707.

In the first generation 25.4 per cent, or one-fourth, of the male breadwinners were returned as farmers. Only two other nationalities comprise a larger proportion of farmers in the first generation—the Norwegians, with a percentage of 37, and the Danes, with a percentage of 30.6. In the second generation of Bohemians the percentage of farmers is 15.2; and, as regards this percentage, the Bohemians are in the same class with the Canadian English (14.8), the English and Welsh (16.8), the French (16.4), the Germans (15.5), and the Scotch (15.4). The Norwegians alone have a materially higher percentage of farmers in the second generation (24.1).

The proportion of farm laborers among the Bohemians increases from 6.2 in the first generation to 27.3 in the second. The increase is not more pronounced in this instance than it is for many other foreign nationalities, and, as elsewhere remarked, is largely explained by the fact that the second generation, having been born in this country, comprises relatively more boys and young men than the first generation, consisting of those who came to this country as immigrants.

As shown by the above table, rather more than three-fourths of the Bohemian farmers are located in the five States of Nebraska,

Texas, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa.

In the first generation of Bohemians 14 per cent, or about oneseventh, of the male breadwinners are classified as "laborers (not specified)," or general laborers. This is about a median or average percentage, the largest percentage of laborers in the first generation being that for the Italians (33.2) and the smallest that for the Scotch (5.7). In the second generation of Bohemians the percentage of laborers declines to 8.1, which, again, is about a median proportion for that generation.

A rather large proportion of the Bohemians are employed as "tailors"—6.9 per cent of the male breadwinners in the first generation and 3.7 per cent of those in the second. The corresponding percentage for the Russians are, respectively, 18 and 5.5, and for the Austrians 7.9 and 1.9. No other nationalities have as high percent-

ages in this occupation.

A distinctive feature in the occupational distribution of Bohemian immigrants is the comparatively large percentage (3.2) employed as tobacco and cigar-factory operatives. This exceeds the corresponding percentage reported for any other of the seventeen classes of immigrants for which occupation statistics have been computed, the next highest percentage being that for the Russians (2.1). Of the 2,266 Bohemian male immigrants reported in this occupation, 1,738, or more than three-fourths, were in the State of New York, constituting more than one-fourth, 26.1 per cent, of the total number of Bohemian immigrant male breadwinners in that State. In the second generation of Bohemians the percentage of tobacco and cigar-factory opera-

tives declines to 7.7 in the State of New York and to 1.3 in the United

States. (See General Table IIa, pp. 253 and 273).

The percentage of clerks, copyists, and salesmen among Bohemian male breadwinners advances from 1.6 in the first generation to 5.6 in the second. These figures are for the United States. In the State of New York the percentage is 1.2 in the first generation and advances to 5.8 in the second.

The table below gives the ten leading occupations for each generation of Bohemians. In the first generation the leading occupation is that of farmer; in the second generation that of agricultural laborer. In each generation the four leading occupations are the same, although not appearing in the same order. They include farmers, general laborers, tailors, and agricultural laborers. Four occupations—tobacco and cigar-factory operatives, carpenters, miners, and butchers—appear in the list of the first ten for the first generation but not in that for the second. In the second generation these places are taken by the clerks and copyists, the salesmen, the machinists, and the draymen, hackmen, and teamsters.

The following table presents the list of occupations in which Bohemians attain the greatest relative importance, as compared, that is, with the total number of males employed in the same occupations. In some of these occupations only a few Bohemians are employed, but that is because the occupation itself is small and unimportant. The table, however, shows that Bohemians attain a greater relative importance in these occupations than they do in the total working popu-Thus while the Bohemians of the first generation constitute only 0.3 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States, they constitute 3.06 per cent of the tailors, 2.58 per cent of the tobacco and cigar factory operatives, 1.83 per cent of the trunk and leather-case makers, etc.

The following table presents for comparison the occupational distribution of the Bohemian male breadwinners in 1900 and in 1890. Naturally the changes in the brief interval of ten years are not very striking. There is a decline in the percentage employed in agriculture which, however, may only reflect the relatively greater growth of other occupations in the community at large. Between 1890 and 1900 the percentage of male breadwinners employed in agriculture in the total population of the United States declined from 43.4 to 39.6.

#### ENGLISH CANADIANS.

In 1900 there were 368,946 male breadwinners in the United States whose parents were of English stock born in Canada. Of this number 191,159 were themselves born in Canada or some other foreign country, while 177,787 were born in United States. Thus the second generation of male breadwinners of English Canadian parentage was nearly but not quite as large as the first.

The occupational distribution of each generation is shown by the following table:

Rather more than one-fifth (21.8 per cent) of those male immigrant breadwinners, whose parents were English born in Canada. are engaged in agriculture, either as farmers or farm laborers. In the second generation of English Canadians there is a decided increase in the relative importance of agricultural pursuits, the percentage engaged in agriculture advancing from 21.8 in the first generation to 30.9 in the second. An increase takes place in the percentage of farmers as well as of farm laborers, the former percentage advancing from 12 to 14.8 and the latter from 7.2 to 14.3. As elsewhere remarked the group of farm laborers represents to a large extent a youthful and temporary occupation, resorted to by boys brought up on the farm, and quite likely to be followed in later life by some pursuit unconnected with agriculture. Not so much significance therefore can be attached to the increase in the percentage of farm laborers, but the increase in the percentage of farmers suggests a permanent advance in relative importance of this occupation.

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In 1900 more than one-third (34.3 per cent) of all the farmers in the United States who were immigrants of English-Canadian parentage were located in the State of Michigan. The State with the next largest number was North Dakota, which, however, contained hardly more than one-fourth the number found in Michigan. The next State in order is Maine; then come Minnesota, Wisconsin, and New York, in the order named. All these States are on the Canadian border. In the second generation of English Canadians the farmers are more widely scattered. The largest numbers are found in the State of Michigan, but the percentage in that State is only 24.5, as compared with a percentage of 34.3 for the first generation. The percentage distributed through States other than those named in the preceding table is 35.5 for the second generation, as compared with a percentage of 22 for the first.

While farming is the leading occupation for the English Canadians, the most distinctive feature of their occupational distribution appears to be the relatively large number in the first generation who are engaged in the building trades, and particularly in the carpenter's trade, 10.8 per cent, or more than one-tenth, of the total number of male breadwinners in that generation being reported in the building trades and 7.4 per cent being reported as carpenters. The percentage of carpenters is almost three times as large as it is for the native white Americans of native parentage (2.7), and considerably larger than it is for the French Canadian immigrants (6.1), who rank next to the English Canadians in this respect. The percentage of English Canadians in other building trades than that of carpenter is not excep-

tionally large.

In the second generation of English Canadians the percentage reported as engaged in the building trades is only 5.9, which is less than the percentage for the second generation of several other foreign nationalities and is hardly larger than the percentage for the native white of native parentage. (See Table 22). In other words, while an exceptionally large proportion of the immigrants from English Canada are employed in the building trades, their children, who were born and presumably educated in this country, do not appear to be espe-

cially attracted by that class of occupations.

The prominence of the carpenter's trade among English Canadian immigrants is especially marked in the State of Massachusetts, where the percentage employed in this trade is 13.3, a proportion of more than one-eighth. For the total number of male breadwinners in that State the corresponding percentage is only 3.8, and while the English Canadian immigrants comprise only 5.2 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in that State they comprise 18.6 per cent of the total number of carpenters. In the city of Boston 31.8 per cent, or almost one-third, of all the carpenters are English Canadian immigrants.

The number of general laborers among the English Canadian immigrants was not so great as the number reported in the building trades. The only other nationalities of which this is true are the English and Welsh and the Scotch. Even among the native white born of native parents the number of male breadwinners employed as general laborers exceeds the number employed in the building trades. The percentage of general laborers in the first generation of English Canadian male breadwinners was practically the same as in the second, being 10.1 for the former and 10.3 for the latter, while the percentage in the building trades, as previously stated, declined from 10.8 in the first generation to 5.9 in the second.

In education and general intelligence the English Canadians represent a superior class of immigrants, who are not handicapped by

speaking a foreign language and are accustomed to economic, social, and political conditions similar to those in the United States. In fact, they are foreigners only by birth and nationality and not by language or race or civilization. It is not surprising, therefore, to find that as regards the percentage employed in professional pursuits (4.4), they are in the same class with the native Americans of native parentage (4.4), the English and Welsh immigrants (4.5), and the Scotch (4.5). That the immigrants of French parentage have a still higher percentage (5.2) is, as previously noted in another connection, due to the peculiar fact that so many Frenchmen are employed in this country as teachers of the French language and literature.

The percentage of English Canadians of the first generation

The percentage of English Canadians of the first generation employed in the textile mills is small, being only 1.3, which, however, is larger than the corresponding percentage for several other foreign nationalities. (See Table 20.) In the second generation this percentage declines to 0.9. In the State of Massachusetts the percentage of English Canadians in the textile mills is 2.7 in the first generation

and 3.2 in the second.

The ten leading occupations for each generation of English Canadians are shown in order of rank in the following table:

Farming, as already remarked, constitutes the leading occupation for each generation with a greater relative importance in the second generation than in the first. Laborers (not specified) constitute the second occupational group for the first generation and the third for the second; while the occupation of agricultural laborer, which is fourth in the first generation, becomes second in the next generation. The carpenter's occupation declines from the third rank in the first generation to the eighth in the second, the blacksmith's from the tenth to the twenty-first, while the occupations of salesman and clerk, eighth and ninth, respectively, in the first generation, become fourth and fifth in the second.

Of the lumbermen and raftsmen in the United States 4.71 per cent are English Canadians of the first generation, and 2.45 per cent are English Canadians of the second generation. Thus 7.16 per cent of the total number of males employed in this occupation are of English Canadian parentage. Next in rank as regards the percentage of English Canadians is the occupation of paper and pulp mill operatives.

# FRENCH CANADIANS.

The most distinctive fact indicated by the occupational distribution of the French Canadians is their tendency to seek employment in the textile mills. In the United States in 1900 there were 168,338 immigrant or foreign-born male breadwinners whose parents were by birth French Canadian; and of this number 32,091, or 19.1 per cent, were textile mill operatives. In the second generation, comprising those born in the United States but whose parents, one or both, were born in Canada, the number of male breadwinners was 95,276, of whom 10,291, or 10.8 per cent, were in the textile mills. These percentages are not approached in either the first or the second generation by any other of the principal foreign nationalities represented in our population of foreign origin.<sup>a</sup> It is a significant fact, however, that in the second generation of French Canadians the percentage of textile mill operatives is hardly more than one-half as large as it is in the first.

In Massachusetts, as would be expected, the percentage of textile mill operatives among French Canadians is exceptionally high, 28.6 per cent of the first generation and 23.2 of the second being employed in the textile mills. It may be noted that the decline in the percentage for the second generation is not so marked here as it is in the country as a whole. This suggests that to some extent, those Canadians of the second generation who seek other lines of employment migrate to places where the textile industries are not so predominant as they are in that State. This inference is borne out by the fact that of the first generation of French Canadian male breadwinners 32.9 per cent were resident in Massachusetts, but of the second generation only

21 per cent.

The occupational group which ranks next to that of textile mill operatives among the French Canadians is that of general laborer. In the first generation 15.1 per cent of the male breadwinners were returned as general laborers or "laborers (not specified);" in the second generation the percentage declines appreciably, becoming 13.4. The decline is less pronounced, however, than that in the percentage of textile mill operatives, and, as a result, the latter occupational group in the second generation is outranked by the former. In other words, the number of textile mill operatives in the second generation is exceeded by the number of "laborers (not specified)." In fact, no other nationality except the Poles has a larger percentage of general laborers in the second generation of male workers.

The first generation of French Canadians includes 12,708 males returned as farmers. This represents 7.5 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in that generation. In the second generation the percentage advances to 10.4 and the number of farmers is 9,872. The percentage of agricultural laborers likewise increases, being 3.7

in the first generation and 10.6 in the second. So there would seem to be a distinct movement toward the farm on the part of the second

generation of French Canadians.

Almost one-tenth, 9.4 per cent, of the first generation of the French Canadians are engaged in the building trades, of which the carpenter's trade is the most important numerically. The English Canadians are the only class of immigrants with a higher percentage of male breadwinners employed in these trades. The relative importance of the building-trades group declines in the second generation of French Canadians, only 6.3 of the total number of male breadwinners of that generation being in this group. No nationality, however, has a percentage much higher than this in the second generation.

As compared with other nationalities, the French Canadians show little disposition to seek employment in stores as salesmen or in offices as clerks and copyists. It is true there are relatively more clerks, copyists, and salesmen in the second generation than in the first, but the numbers are comparatively small even in the second generation, as appears from the following comparison for the States of

Massachusetts and New York:

An occupation which attracts a considerable number of French Canadians, particularly in Massachusetts, is that of boot and shoe maker and repairer. As elsewhere explained this includes the shoe-factory operative as well as the customs shoemaker, and it is not possible, on the basis of available census figures, to segregate these two occupations; but probably a large proportion of the French Canadians reported in this occupation group are employed in shoe factories.

The table following gives the ten leading occupational groups for each generation of French Canadians. The first seven are the same in both generations, although not coming in the same order. The occupations of retail merchant ("merchants, except wholesale") and

of saw and planing mill employees, are included in the first ten for the first generation, ranking eighth and tenth respectively; but disappear from the first ten for the second generation, their rank declining to fourteenth and thirteenth, respectively. On the other hand, the occupation of salesman, which ranks twelfth in the first generation, becomes the eighth occupation in the second generation. Similarly the occupation of machinist advances from sixteenth in the first generation to tenth in the second. On the whole, however, the contrast between the first generation and the second as regards the leading occupations is less marked for the French Canadians than for most other foreign nationalities. It is noteworthy also that this is the only one of the seventeen foreign nationalities, here compared, which fails to include "clerks and copyists" in the list of the ten leading occupations for the second generation of male breadwinners.

The first generation of French Canadian male breadwinners, although constituting only 0.7 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States reported by the census of 1900, included 18.9 per cent of the male breadwinners employed as cotton mill operatives; 7.3 per cent of the woolen mill operatives; 6.3 per cent of the hosiery and knitting mill operatives, and 7.9 of the textile mill operatives classified by the census under "other textile mill

operatives."

In the State of Massachusetts 30.1 per cent of the male cotton mill operatives in 1900 were French Canadian immigrants (first generation), and 7.8 per cent were the native children of French Canadian immigrants (second generation), so that 37.9 per cent of all the male cotton mill operatives in that State were French Canadians of either the first or second generations. Of the total number of men and boys employed in textile mills in the United States 15.9 per cent were French Canadians of either the first or second generations. In Massachusetts 29.4 per cent of the total number of male textile mill operatives were French Canadians.

The next table presents the occupational distribution of the French Canadians in 1890 and 1900. The changes between the two censuses are not very striking. There is a decline in the relative importance of agricultural pursuits which may only reflect conditions that are general, the development of agriculture in the community at large not having kept pace with that of commerce and manufacture. Thus in the total of male breadwinners in the United States the percentage engaged in agricultural pursuits declined from

43.4 in 1890 to 39.6 in 1900.

The fact that the percentage of the second generation of French Canadians employed in the textile mills declined from 13.7 in 1890 to 10.9 in 1900, while the percentage of the first generation so employed remained practically unchanged, may be significant as indicating, on the part of the second generation, a growing disinclination toward taking up this class of employment and an increasing preference for other occupations.

The population of Danish parentage enumerated at the census of 1900 included 82,652 male breadwinners in the first generation and 23,097 in the second. The number in the second generation is, therefore, rather more than one-fourth the number in the first.

Of the total number of breadwinners in the first generation of Danes, 30.6 per cent were returned as farmers. In this percentage they rank next to the Norwegians. In some of the Eastern States the percentage of farmers among Danish immigrants, though not large, is larger than it is for the Norwegians. But in Iowa it is 44.3 for the Danes as compared with 49.7 for the Norwegians. The percentage of agricultural laborers in the first generation of Danes is 9.8, which is higher than the corresponding percentage for any other nationalities except the Norwegians (11.5) and the Swiss (10.8).

In the second generation of Danes the percentage of farmers declines to 12.9, while that of farm laborers increases to 34.6, and, as in case of the Norwegians and Swedes, this increase undoubtedly results largely from the fact that the second generation of bread-

winners is younger than the first.

Iowa is the leading farming State for the first generation of Danes. But of the second generation of Danish farmers more were located in Utah than in any other one State, the number in that State constituting 26.5 per cent, or more than one-fourth of the total number. This is an exceptionally large proportion. In fact, Utah appears in the list of ten principal farming States for only one other of seventeen nationality classes distinguished in these comparisons, namely, for the English and Welsh.

In general, the occupational distribution for the Danes presents no feature that sharply differentiates them from the two other Scandinavian nationalities. They show the same proclivity for agriculture, the same disinclination to employment in textile mills. The first generation is represented in the building trades by a percentage (7.5)

about as large as that for the Norwegians (7.9) but not so large as that for the Swedes (9.0); for the second generation of Danes the falling off in the percentage in these trades is perhaps not quite as marked as it is for the other two Scandinavian nationalities. Both in the first and the second generations the percentage of male breadwinners reported as employed in professional pursuits is slightly larger for the Danes than for the Norwegians or Swedes, the contrast being more marked in the second generation than in the first.

The three occupations which head the list for each generation are farmers, general laborers, and agricultural laborers. In the first generation the occupation of farmer ranks first, in the second generation that of agricultural laborer. The occupation of carpenter ranks fourth in the first generation and seventh in the second; the occupation of retail merchant declines from fifth to tenth. In the second

generation the fourth occupation is that of clerk and the fifth that of salesman, the former advancing from a rank of sixteenth in the first

generation and the latter from a rank of twelfth.

The list of ten leading occupations for each generation of Danes is similar to the corresponding lists for the Norwegians and the Swedes. The first four occupations for the first generation and the first three occupations for the second are the same in all three Scandinavian nationalities. The list of the ten leading occupations for the first generation of Danes includes blacksmiths, an occupation which is not included in the corresponding list for either the Swedes or the Norwegians.

The occupation in which the Danes attain their greatest relative prominence as compared with the total number of males employed

in the same occupations are given in the following table:

Of the 18,613 male breadwinners reported by the census as butter and cheese makers 347 or 1.86 per cent were Danes. This is a larger percentage of Danes than was reported in any occupation. The alkied occupation of dairymen has the next largest percentage. The number and percentages are small in each case, but it should be noted that the percentage of Danes in the total male working population is only 0.35.

If this list of occupations for the Danes is compared with the corresponding lists for the Norwegians and Swedes it will be seen that there are some points of resemblance. The occupation of "boatmen and sailors" appears in the list for the first generation of each nationality, so does that of "cabinetmakers," and that of "janitors and sextons." In the second generation the occupation of "agricultural

laborers" appears in each of the three lists.

In the list for the first generation of Danes the only two occupations that do not appear in either of the corresponding lists for Norwegians and Swedes are those of glove makers and blacksmiths. In the list for the second generation of Danes there are also two occupations which do not appear in either of the other lists, viz, "dairymen" and "other food preparers."

# ENGLISH AND WELSH.

Census occupation statistics do not distinguish between the English and Welsh, consequently in any analysis of these statistics these

two rather distinct classes have to be treated as one.

The English immigrants in the United States outnumber the Welsh by about 9 to 1. In 1900 there were 843,491 English by birth in the United States as compared with 93,744 Welsh. It is probable, therefore, that the occupational statistics reflect the characteristics of the English rather than of the Welsh in so far as there are marked differences between these two races.

In the first generation of English and Welsh the number of male breadwinners in 1900 was 439,031; in the second generation the number is almost the same, being 442,865. The occupational distribution of each generation is shown by the following table:

Agriculture is the leading occupation for the English and Welsh in the United States and assumes a greater relative importance in the second generation than in the first. In the first generation the percentage of farmers is 13.1 and of farm laborers 3.5; in the second generation the percentage of farmers advances to 16.8 and that of The total percentage engaged in agricultural farm laborers to 8.6. pursuits advances from 18.1 in the first generation to 26.6 in the second. As regards these percentages the English and Welsh belong in the same class with the Canadian English, the French, and the But for none of these nationalities does farming in the first generation have as great prominence as it does for the Scandinavian nationalities, the Germans, and the Swiss.

In the second generation, the Norwegians and the Swiss are the only nationalities reporting a higher percentage of farmers than the

The occupational group which ranks next to that of farming in the first generation of English and Welsh male breadwinners is that of miners and quarrymen. There were 57,710 English and Welsh immigrants reported as farmers at the census of 1900, and 44,918 reported as miners and quarrymen, the latter representing 10.2 per cent of the

total number of male breadwinners in this class of immigrants. In the second generation the percentage drops to 5.7, the occupation becomes fourth in numerical importance (see Table 93), the number of miners and quarrymen (25,099) being exceeded by the number of general laborers (30,499) and of agricultural laborers (38,237), as well

as by the number of farmers (74,225).

The only nationalities having a higher percentage of miners in the first generation of male workers are the Hungarians, with a percentage of 30.0, and the Austrians, with a percentage of 18.9; in the second generation only the Hungarians have a percentage (10.2) higher than that for the English and Welsh. (See Table 2.) It is rather noteworthy that the rank of the miner's occupation is the same in each generation for the English and Welsh as it is for the Scotch, being the second occupation in the first generation and the fourth in the sec-Probably the Welsh are employed in the miner's occupation to a greater extent proportionately than the English. This assumption is consistent with the territorial distribution of the two classes. Of the Welsh immigrants 37.8 per cent are in the mining state of Pennsylvania, and of the English only 13.6 per cent. On the other hand, Michigan and New York, which are the two principal farming States for the two classes combined contain only 8.6 per cent of the Welsh as compared with 21.3 per cent of the English.

The percentage of general laborers among the English and Welsh male breadwinners of either generation is comparatively small, being 6.4 in the first generation and 6.9 in the second, while the corresponding percentage for the native white Americans of native parentage is 8.0. The percentages of general laborers are smaller for the English and Welsh than for any other foreign nationalities except the Scotch

and the second generation of Russians. (See Table 2.)

As regards the percentage of textile mill operatives in the first generation of male breadwinners, the English and Welsh rank next to the French Canadians, although there is a wide gap between the two classes in this respect, the percentage for the former being only 4.2, as compared with a percentage of 19.1 for the latter. (See Table 2.) In the State of Massachusetts the difference is not so great, 24.3 per cent, or almost one-fourth, of all the male breadwinners in the first generation of English and Welsh in that State being employed in the textile mills, while for the French Canadians the corresponding percentage was 28.6; and in new Jersey the percentage is higher for the former (8.4) than for the latter (3.8). This is also the case in Pennsylvania. But there were very few French Canadians in either of these States. The comparison suggests, however, that in the same State or community the tendency to enter the textile mills is about as marked for the English and Welsh immigrants as for the Canadian French, but the latter are concentrated to a greater degree in those sections of the country where the textile industries predominate. Thus in the year 1900, while 32.9 per cent, or nearly one-third, of all the male breadwinners in the first generation of Canadian French were found in the State of Massachusetts, only 7.5 per cent of the corresponding class of English and Welsh had settled in that State. It is probable, therefore, that the large proportion of the textile mill operatives among the Canadian French in the United States is partly due to the accidental circumstance that the textile mills are most

prominent in that section of the United States, which is most readily

accessible to immigrants coming from French Canada.

The percentage of clerks, bookkeepers, and stenographers in the total number of male breadwinners is 3.8 in the first generation of English and Welsh and 5.9 in the second. These are almost the same as the corresponding percentages for the Canadian English, but somewhat higher percentages obtain among the Scotch. No other nationalities have a higher percentage in the first generation, but there are several which, in this respect, outrank the English and Welsh in the second generation. (See Table 2.)

Of salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers the percentage in the first generation of English and Welsh male breadwinners was 3.7, and in the second 5.1. Three nationalities only, the Russian, the Canadian English, and the Scotch, have a higher percentage in the first generation; but there are six which have a higher percentage

than the English and Welsh in the second generation.

The farmer's occupation is first in each generation. occupation, which is second in the first generation, declines to fourth in the second; while the occupation of agricultural laborer, which is fifth in the first generation, advances to second in the second. third occupation in each generation is that of general laborer. The occupation of textile mill operative declines from the fourth rank in the first generation to the twelfth in the second, while that of clerk and copyist advances from the tenth to the fourth. There is an equally marked advance in the rank of salesman—from twelfth in the first generation to seventh in the second.

In the foregoing table pottery appears as the industry in which each generation attains its greatest relative importance. Thus the English and Welsh male breadwinners of the first generation, while constituting only 1.83 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States, include 11.05 per cent of the total number of potters. The second generation, representing 1.83 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners, comprises 6.14 per cent of the potters.

The next five occupations in order of the percentage of English and Welsh immigrants represent various branches of the textile industries. Then comes the group of miners and quarrymen, of

whom 7.89 per cent are either English or Welsh by nativity.

As regards the employment of the second generation of English and Welsh, the engraver's occupation ranks next to the potter's. Two other occupational groups requiring skill and technical training appear in this list which are not in the corresponding list for the first generation, namely, the group of architects, designers, and draftsmen and of electricians. Miners and quarrymen have about the same relative position in the list for the second generation as in that for the first. So do woolen mill operatives and gold and silver workers.

# FRENCH.

Immigration from France has been comparatively small. In 1900 the immigrants of French parentage in the United States included only 51,431 male breadwinners; in the second generation of French the number of male breadwinners was slightly larger, being 55,152. Of the seventeen foreign nationality classes distinguished in the census statistics of occupations, there are only four in which the second generation comprises more male breadwinners than the first, viz, the French, the English and Welsh, the German, and the Irish.

The occupational distribution of each generation of French male breadwinners is shown by the following table:

In the occupational classification of male breadwinners of foreign birth and French parentage, one of the most distinctive features is the exceptional relative importance of professional pursuits and of

the servant's and waiter's occupation.

The percentage engaged in professional pursuits, 5.2, is the highest reported for the male immigrants of any nationality. For the Scotch and the English and Welsh the corresponding percentage is 4.5, and for the Canadian English, 4.4. (See Table 2.) In proportion to their numbers the French who have migrated to this country comprise more architects, designers and draftsmen, more artists, more literary and scientific men, and more teachers than any other class of immigrants that may be distinguished in the census occupational statistics. Their prominence as teachers is especially marked. Of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States, only 0.5 per cent were reported as teachers in the census of 1900; but of the male breadwinners in the first generation of French 1 per cent were teachers. The Russians rank next to the French in this respect, with a percentage of 0.7; then comes the Canadian English, with a percentage of 0.3. Among the native white of native parentage the percentage of teachers in the total number of male breadwinners is 0.5.

The percentage of male servants and waiters in the first generation of French is 6.1. In this respect the French are in a class by themselves, the next highest percentage—that for the Irish—being only 1.7.

In the first generation of French 14.4 per cent of the male breadwinners were reported as farmers and 4.6 per cent as agricultural laborers; in the second generation the percentage of farmers was 16.6 and that of agricultural laborers 9.3. These differences would seem to indicate that farming has a greater attraction for the second generation than for the first. In the first generation there are 6 nationalities which have a higher percentage of farmers than the French, viz, the Norwegians (37.0), the Danes (30.6), the Bohemians (25.3), the Swiss (23.6), the Swedes (20.9), and the Germans (20.7); in the second generation there are only 3 nationalities which outrank the French in this respect, viz, the Norwegians (24.1), the Swiss (22.2), and the English and Welsh (16.8). In the percentage of agricultural laborers, on the other hand, the rank of the French, as compared with other foreign nationalities, declines from the eighth in the first generation to the twelfth in the second. Possibly the advance in rank as regards the percentage of farmers and the decline in rank as regards the percentage of farm laborers may be indicative of that thrift which is supposed to be characteristic of the French people.

Noteworthy is the relative prominence of the State of California in the above list. There are 25 States which have a larger total number of farmers than this State, but only 2 which have more French immigrant farmers. Louisiana also has in this list high rank as compared with its rank as a farming State. In all the above States except California the number of farmers in the second generation of French is greater than in the first. The exception in case of California may indicate a more recent settlement in that State, with the result that the second generation is not yet old enough to comprise as many farmers as the first.

In proportion to their numbers the French of the first generation comprise more gardeners and more stock raisers than the first generation of any other foreign nationality. They comprise also more boarding-house, hotel, and restaurant keepers; more housekeepers and servants and waiters; more bankers; more glass workers; more

engravers; and more bleachery and dye works employees.

The percentage of general laborers in the first generation of male breadwinners of French parentage is 7.8. There are only 3 parentage classes—the Russians, the English and Welsh, and the Scotch which have a smaller percentage in the first generation. In the second generation of French this percentage is practically the same as in the first, being 7.9, which is about an average or typical percentage for that generation. There are 8 nationalities for which the corresponding percentage is lower in that generation—usually only slightly lower—and 8 for which it is higher, and with one exception considerably higher.

The ten leading occupations followed by male breadwinners in each

Farmers constitute the largest occupational group in each generation, and as already noted this group has a greater relative importance for the second generation than for the first, as is indicated by the increased percentage of farmers in the second generation.

laborers or "laborers (not specified)" rank next to farmers in the first generation, but in the second generation are outranked by agricultural laborers. Very striking is the change in the rank of the servant's or waiter's occupation, which from being third in the first generation becomes twentieth in the second. The miner's occupation declines from the fourth rank to the twelfth, and the textile mill operatives from the eighth to the twentieth.

In the second generation, as compared with the first, notable advances in rank and relative importance are shown for clerks, salesmen, steam railroad employees, and draymen, hackmen, and

teamsters.

The occupations specified in the following table are those in which the French attain the greatest relative importance, that is, as compared with the total number of male breadwinners in the same occupations:

The occupation in which the French of the first generation are most prominent is that of silk mill operatives. Of the total number of male silk mill operatives in the United States 1.77 per cent are French immigrants, while in all occupations combined the percentage of French immigrants is only 0.21. That is to say, while the French immigrants form only 0.21 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States, they form 1.77 per cent of the males employed in silk mills.

The next occupation in the above list for the first generation of French is that of glass workers, of whom 1.70 per cent are representa-

tives of that generation.

Of the other occupations in this list some reflect the artistic talents of the French, while others are indicative of their capacity and repu-

tation as waiters and stewards and servants.

For the second generation of French the engraver's occupation has the first rank according to the criterion here considered. The artist's occupation ranks next to this. Then come (male) milliners and then glass workers. But the percentage of French of second generation in any of these occupations is small and differs less from the percentage for all occupations than the percentages in the corresponding list for the first generation. This would suggest that the occupational distribution of the second generation conforms more closely to that of the general population, and that national peculiarities tend to disappear.

#### GERMANS.

In the year 1900, according to the census, there were 1,276,046 male breadwinners in the first generation of Germans in the United States and 1,491,839 in the second. Thus in this nationality the second generation comprises a larger number of breadwinners than the first. This is a natural result of the length of time that has elapsed since the first great wave of German immigration. In recent years the immigration from Germany has fallen off, and in the meantime the children of the earlier immigrants have grown up, so that the second generation now includes more adults than the first.

The occupational distribution of each generation of German breadwinners is shown by the following table:

In the first generation, consisting of immigrants whose parents were born in Germany, 20.7 per cent, or one-fifth, of the male breadwinners were farmers and 5.6 per cent were agricultural laborers. Neither of these percentages is noteworthy as being exceptionally

large or small. Of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States 22.5 per cent were farmers; of the native white male breadwinners, whose parents were also native, 28.3 per cent. The percentage of farmers among the Germans is, however, considerably higher than it is in the first generation of any other foreign nationality except the Norwegians (37.0), the Danes (30.6), the Bohemians (25.4), and the Swiss (23.6). The Germans comprise proportionately twice as many farmers as the Irish, the percentage for the latter being 9.4.

In the second generation of Germans the percentage of farmers declines to 15.5. The decline would seem to indicate a movement away from the farm on the part of the second generation, but some allowance must be made for the age differences between the two The second generation includes a larger proportion of boys and young men. (See discussion of this subject on pp. 64-66.) In Illinois and Ohio the percentage of farmers is practically the same in the second generation of Germans as in the first. In Iowa, on the other hand, the percentage declines in the second generation. the whole, however, agriculture seems to have about the same relative importance in the second generation of Germans as in the first, the decline in the percentage of farmers being offset by an increase in the percentage of farm laborers. Thus the total percentage of Germans engaged in agricultural pursuits, either as farmers or as farm laborers or in some other capacity, is, for the entire United States, 27.3 in the first generation and 28.6 in the second.

The percentage of general laborers in the first generation of male breadwinners of German parentage is 10.2. Of the 17 nationalities for which comparative figures are presented, 8 have a higher percentage of laborers in the first generation, and 8 a lower, the highest percentage being that for the Italians, 33.2, and the lowest that for the Scotch, 5.7.

In the second generation of Germans the percentage of general laborers is 7.5. This, again, is about a median or average percentage for that generation, the percentage being higher for 9 nationalities and

lower for 7.

In the first generation of Germans the percentage of general laborers is somewhat higher than it is among the native white of native parentage (8.0), and in the second generation somewhat lower, and this relationship obtains not only in the United States as a whole, but in each of the individual States for which these per-

centages have been computed.

The number of retail merchants in the first generation of Germans is relatively large, comprising 5.2 per cent of the total number of male Two nationalities only have a larger percentage of retail merchants in the first generation, viz, the Italians, with a percentage of 5.8, and the Russians, with a percentage of 12.9. second generation of Germans the percentage of retail merchants is 4.6, which is again surpassed, though not to a marked degree, by the corresponding percentage for the Italians and Russians, 5.6 and 5.4, respectively. But the relative youthfulness of the second generation of these two nationalities impairs the significance of the comparison, since the merchant's occupation, requiring usually some capital and experience, is not a juvenile employment; and probably when the second generation of Italians and Russians comprises as large a proportion of older people as the second generation of Germans, the percentage of merchants will be much greater than it is at present or was at the time of the Twelfth Census (1900).

The following table gives the 10 leading occupations for each generation of German breadwinners and shows the rank in both generations of any occupation included in the first 10 of either generation:

The occupation of farmer heads the list for both the first and second generations, and the first four occupations are the same in each generation. In the first generation the fifth occupational group is that of carpenter and joiner, and the sixth, that of drayman, hackman, and teamster; but in the second generation the fifth occupation is that of clerk and copyist and the sixth that of salesman, the occupation of carpenter and joiner, and of drayman, hackman, and teamster appearing lower down in this list. The occupation of tailor, which ranks seventh in the first generation, drops to twenty-fourth in the second.

The occupation of saloon keeper is eighth in the ranking of occupations with respect to the employment of German immigrants. It has the same rank for the Swiss, most of whom are probably German by race, and ranks tenth for the Austrians and the Italians, but does not appear in the list of ten leading occupations for the first generation of any other foreign nationality. In the second genera-

tion of Germans the rank of this occupation is thirteenth.

An occupation which acquires exceptional importance in the first generation of Germans is that of baker. The number of German male immigrants reported as bakers at the census of 1900 was 26,372, making this occupation the ninth in a ranking of occupations with respect to numbers. There is no other nationality for which this occupation appears in the list of the first 10, and in the second generation of Germans it drops to the twenty-eighth in numerical importance.

The occupations in which the Germans of either generation are most prominent are shown by the following table:

Of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States in 1900, 5.3 per cent were Germans of the first generation, or, in other words, immigrants of German parentage. Of the brewers and maltsters 59.6 per cent, or practically 3 out of 5, were Germans of the first generation; of the bakers, 35.1 per cent; of the cabinetmakers, 30 per cent; and of the saloon keepers, 20.2. These are the four occupations in which Germans of the first generation are most prominent. The brewer's occupation reappears, though much lower down, in the list of the ten occupations in which the second generation is most prominent, but the saloon keeper's occupation does not reappear in that list. In fact, the second generation of German breadwinners, though larger than the first, is represented in the saloon keeper's occupation by greatly reduced numbers as compared with the first and by a percentage of only 14.2, as compared with a percentage of

20.2 for the first generation. The allied occupation of bartender is not included in either list of occupations given in the above table. But it may be noted in this connection that this occupation shows a slight increase in the representation of the second generation. Of the bartenders 11.5 per cent are Germans of the first generation, while 14.1 per cent are Germans of the second generation. (See Table Va.) But in proportion to their numbers the second generation is not employed in the bartender's occupation to a greater extent than the first, the percentage of bartenders in first and second generations being, in fact, the same, viz., 0.8. (See Table IVa.)

# HUNGARIANS.

Of the 88,440 Hungarian immigrant male breadwinners in this country at the time of the Twelfth Census (1900), 26,550, or 30 per cent, were employed in mines; 19,759, or 22.3 per cent, were returned as general laborers. No other class of immigrants comprised anything like so large a percentage of miners, the class which ranks second in this respect being the Austrians, for whom the percentage of miners in the first generation of male workers is 18.9. A larger percentage of general laborers was reported for the Italians of the first generation (33.2) and the Poles (29.1).

The percentage of iron and steel workers is larger among Hungarian immigrants (5.3) than in any other class here considered except the

Poles, for whom the corresponding percentage is 6.6.

The immigration of Hungarians is of comparatively recent date, and for that reason the second generation at the time of the Twelfth Census included few persons old enough to be workers, the number of male breadwinners in that generation being only 3,880. Of this number 394, or 10.2 per cent, were reported as miners and quarrymen, and 270, or 7 per cent, as general laborers. The percentage of miners is exceptionally large for the second generation, but the percentage of general laborers is less than that reported for the second generation of many other nationalities. In fact, in the second generation of Hungarians there were more clerks and copyists than general laborers, the percentage of clerks being higher than it is in the second generation of any other foreign nationality. It is noteworthy also that for no other foreign nationality except the Russian was the percentage of bookkeepers and accountants and of salesmen reported in the second generation of male breadwinners as large as it was for the Hungarians.

Farming appears to have little attraction for the Hungarians although the percentage of farmers is slightly larger in the second generation (2.3) than it is in the first (1.6), but in either generation the percentage is smaller than it is for any other foreign nationality here considered except the Italians.

Very few Hungarians are employed in the building trades, only 1.6 per cent of the first generation and 1.7 per cent of the second. These are the smallest percentages reported for this group of occupa-

tions in any nationality.

It is an interesting and curious fact that in the second generation of Hungarians the occupation of banker assumes exceptional importance. The total number of bankers and brokers, to be sure, is not large, being only 103. But this represents 2.7 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the second generation, while of the total number of male breadwinners of all classes only 0.3 per cent are bankers and brokers. Nearly all these Hungarians reported in this occupation were in the State of Illinois, which means probably that most of them were in Chicago. In that State the total number of male Hungarian breadwinners of the second generation reported by the census of 1900 was 319, and of this number 93, or 29.1 per cent, were bankers and brokers.

There are comparatively few Hungarians in the textile mills, only 1.1 per cent of the first generation of male breadwinners and 1.4 per cent of the second, most of these being in the State of New Jersey.

In the State of New York 17.2 per cent of the Hungarian male immigrants having occupations were returned as tailors; the percentage declines to 4.6 in the second generation. As elsewhere explained, these may be either custom tailors or sweat-shop workers on men's clothing.

The following table gives the ten leading occupations in each gen-

The miner's occupation is the leading occupation for each generation, but, as previously pointed out, its relative importance is much less for the second generation than for the first. The occupation of second rank is that of general laborer in the first generation and that of clerk in the second. The second generation is evidently more widely distributed by occupations than the first. Over one-half, 52.3 per cent, of the first generation are concentrated in the two leading occupations for that generation, and almost three-fourths, 72.7 per cent, in the ten leading occupations; of the second generation 19 per cent were reported in the two largest occupations and 55.6 per cent in the ten largest.

The rank of clerks advances from seventeenth in the first generation to second in the second; the rank of messengers and errand and office boys from forty-sixth to seventh; of bookkeepers and accountants from thirty-fifth to eighth; of bankers and brokers from sixty-

seventh to ninth.

The Hungarians reported as steam railroad employees may have been mostly laborers employed on construction work. The rank of this occupation group declines from sixth in the first generation to twenty-eighth in the second. There is a still more marked decline in the rank of charcoal, coke, and lime burners.

The following table gives the occupations in which the Hungarians are most prominent relative to the total number of male workers employed in the same occupations:

While the Hungarian male workers of the first generation constituted only 0.37 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States in 1900, they included 9.77 per cent, or almost one-tenth, of the charcoal, coke, and lime burners, and 4.66 per cent of the miners and quarrymen. Four of the ten occupations in which the first generation attains its greatest prominence are connected with the clothing industry. Nearly 3 per cent of the males employed as "seamstresses" are Hungarians of the first generation, 2.56 per cent of the hat and cap makers, 2.28 per cent of the tailors, and 1.83 per cent of the (male) dressmakers. Hungary, like Austria, comprises a mixture of diverse races, and it is probable that the Hungarians reported in the clothing trades may have been of a different race from those reported in the mines. Possibly the former were mostly Jews coming from Hungary.

The number of male workers in the second generation of Hungarians is so small that the corresponding list of occupations for that generation can not be regarded as very significant. Thus the occupation of seamstresses, which heads this list, includes only 11 Hungarians of the second generation, and the numbers represented in some

of the other occupations in the list are still smaller.

### IRISH.

The first generation of Irish in the United States at the census of 1900 comprised 714,222 male breadwinners, the second generation 1,090,103. These numbers represented, respectively, 3 per cent and 4.6 per cent—or taken together 7.6 per cent, or about one thirteenth—of the total number of male breadwinners reported at that census. Among foreign nationalities in this country, in point of number of breadwinners, the Irish are outranked only by the Germans, of whom there were 1,276,096 male breadwinners in the first generation and

1,491,859 in the second.

Both these nationalities are now represented by larger numbers of breadwinners in the second generation than in the first. But while the second generation of German male breadwinners is only 17 per cent larger than the first, the second generation of Irish is 52.6 per cent larger. This difference arises from the fact that immigration from Ireland in recent years has fallen off more than that from Germany. The first generation of each nationality has declined in numbers, while the second generation has been growing up to maturity and including therefore an increasing number of breadwinners.

The occupational distribution of each generation of Irish is shown by the following table:

Among the Irish immigrants, as among the Italians, the most important occupational group for male breadwinners is that of general laborer. But the proportion employed in this grade of labor is much smaller, the percentage of "laborers (not specified)" among the Irish being 22.3 as compared with a percentage of 33.2 among Italians. In the second generation of Irish the percentage of general laborers becomes only 10.2, which is not so very much lower than it is in the second generation of Italians (12.4). Among the native white male breadwinners of native parentage the percentage of general laborers is 8.0, being somewhat smaller than it is for the second generation of Irish. In this connection the comparison for two States in which both the Irish and Italians are present in large numbers is of interest:

Less than one-tenth, 9.4 per cent, of the Irish male immigrant breadwinners are farmers. This is a comparatively small percentage, although larger than that for some other classes of immigrants (Austrians, French Canadians, Hungarians, Italians, Poles, Russians).

It is notable that in Iowa, a State where there are no large cities and where 33.3 per cent of the total male working population are farmers, the percentage of farmers among the Irish is 44.7, not much lower than it is for the Germans (47.7), and the Norwegians (49.7). But in New York State the percentage of farmers among the Irish is 5.5, as compared with a percentage of 8.9 for the total male breadwinners; in Massachusetts, where the farmer's occupation absorbs only 3.3 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners, the percentage for the Irish is still smaller, being 1.9. In Illinois the percentage of farmers is 17.1 for the former as compared with 11.3 for the latter. The figures suggest that in those sections of the agricultural west which include no large cities, the Irish engage in farming to at least as great an extent as most other classes of population. But their concentration in the Eastern States, where farming is a relatively unimportant pursuit, and their preference for city life makes the percentage of farmers in the total number of Irish in the United States comparatively small.

The percentage of farmers in the second generation of Irish, 8.8, is smaller than in the first, 9.4; but the percentage of farm laborers is notably larger, being 7.0 in the second generation as compared with 3.2 in the first. The total percentage engaged in agricultural pursuits advances from 13.6 in the first generation to 16.5 in the second, the increase in the percentage of farm laborers more than offsetting the

decline in the percentage of farmers.

In the first generation of Irish 5.9 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners are employed in building trades. The percentage is much smaller than it is among immigrants of English, Scandinavian, Scotch, or Canadian origin. But in the second generation of Irish the percentage increases to 6.9, and is not exceeded by the corresponding percentage in any other nationality, although equaled in the second generation of Italians. It is noticeable that the building trade which apparently appeals most strongly to the second generation of Irish is that of plumber, the increase in the relative importance of the total for the building-trade group resulting mainly from an increase in this occupation. In the total population the number of plumbers (97,758) is less than one-sixth the number of carpenters (602,196), the latter representing numerically the most important building trade. But in the second generation of Irish the number of carpenters (19,745) is slightly exceeded by the number of plumbers (20,234).

The occupation of drayman, hackman, or teamster is one which appeals to the Irish of each generation, 4.3 per cent of the first generation of Irish male workers being classified in this occupation group, and 4.6 per cent of the second. The only nationality which has as high a percentage in the first generation is the Canadian English; in the second generation the percentage is slightly higher (4.8) among

the Italians.

Only about 2 per cent of the total number of Irish male breadwinners of either generation are employed in the textile mills; but in the State of Massachusetts the percentage of textile-mill operatives comprises 6.4 of the first generation of Irish and 6.9 per cent of the second. In that State the second generation of Irish appear to prefer the boot and shoe factory to the textile mill, the percentage reported as boot and shoe makers and repairers increasing from 3.4 in the first generation to 7.6 in the second. Of course some of these—how many the census figures do not show—are custom shoe makers and repairers and not factory operatives.

An occupation which is of more than usual importance for the Irish, and in which they attain exceptional importance in some communities, is that of watchman, policeman, and fireman. To be sure the percentage of watchmen, etc., in the total number of Irish immigrant male breadwinners is only 2.3; but that is much larger than the cor-

responding percentage for any other class of immigrants.

The 10 leading occupations for each generation of Irish are given in the table below, which also indicates the difference between the two generations as regards the rank of each occupation.

General laborers form the largest occupational group in each generation, and farmers the second largest. The first eight occupations in the first generation reappear in the list of the first ten in the second generation, but usually with some change in rank. The occupations of clerks and copyists and of salesmen emerge from the residual class of "all other occupations," in the first generation, and appear in the list of the first ten in the second generation with the rank of fourth and eighth, respectively, as contrasting with a rank of sixteenth and twentieth in the first generation.

The next table shows the occupations in which the Irish are most prominent, the occupations being ranked, not with respect to the actual number of Irish employed, but with respect to the percentage of Irish in the total number of males employed in the same

occupations.

The percentage of Irish immigrants is largest among rubber-factory operatives, a relatively small occupational group representing an industry largely concentrated in the States of Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and New York-States in which the Irish

are especially numerous.

All other occupations.....

Reference has already been made to the fact that large numbers of Irish, particularly the second generation, have taken up the plumber's occupation. As shown by the above table, this is the occupation in which the second generation attains its greatest relative prominence, 20.7 per cent, or one-fifth, of all the plumbers and gas and steam fitters in the United States being Irish of that generation. Including also the representatives of the first generation, the total percentage of Irish in this occupation becomes 26.1 In other words, more than one-fourth of the plumbers in the United States are Irish of either the first or second generation. In Massachusetts, where 21.1 per cent

of the total number of male breadwinners are Irish by parentage, 38 per cent of the plumbers are of that stock, the contrast being produced by the large numbers of Irish of the second generation who have taken up that occupation. In New York State the total male working population is 17.3 per cent Irish, while the plumbers are 34.1 per cent Irish. In New York City 38.2 per cent of the plumbers are Irish as compared with 21.1 per cent of the total male working population. A similar contrast is apparent in the occupational figures for Boston:

## ITALIANS.

The Italian immigrant population in 1900 comprised 276,355 male breadwinners; in the second generation of Italians the number of male breadwinners was only 16,975, this small number, of course, indicating the youthfulness of the second generation and comparative recency of Italian immigration.

Almost exactly one-third—33.2 per cent—of the Italian immigrant workers were reported as general laborers or "laborers (not specified)." This is the highest percentage of general laborers for any class of immigrants, the next highest being that for the Poles (29.1).

In the second generation of Italians the proportion of general laborers falls off to 12.4 per cent, or to about one-eighth. Probably most of the Italians returned as steam railroad employees were manual laborers, working with pick and shovel. They constituted 6.3 per cent of the total number of Italian male immigrant workers, which again represents a larger percentage than was reported in this occupation group for any other nationality. In the second generation this percentage declines to 1.3.

The percentage of agricultural laborers, though not large in either generation of Italians, is notably larger in the second generation (6.7 per cent) than in the first (3.6). For no nationality class was a smaller percentage of farmers reported than for the Italians; but here again the percentage is larger in the second generation (2.2)

than in the first (1.6).

The building trades represent another group of occupations having greater relative importance for the second generation of Italian breadwinners than for the first, the percentage of male breadwinners employed in these occupations being 6.9 in the second generation as compared with 3.7 in the first. The former is the highest percentage in this occupation group reported for the second generation of any of the 17 foreign nationalities included in this comparison. The building trade which seems to appeal most strongly to the second

generation of Italians is that of carpenter and joiner.

Over 9 per cent (9.2) of the Italian immigrant male workers are employed in mines and quarries. In the second generation the percentage declines to 3.1. In the State of Pennsylvania the percentage for the first generation is 20.5 and for the second 9.9; in Illinois the two percentages are 21.4 and 11.0 respectively. The importance of the Italian people in this occupation is indicated by the fact that in 1900 Italians of either the first or second generation constituted 4.5 per cent of the total number of miners and quarrymen in the United States; 7.6 per cent of the total in Illinois; and 12.7 per cent of the total in Pennsylvania.

An occupation which attracts a somewhat large percentage of the second generation of Italian breadwinners is that of drayman, hackman, and teamster. Of the total number of male breadwinners in the second generation 4.8 per cent were reported in this occupation group. Of the first generation only 1 per cent were attracted by this occupation. The percentage for the second generation is the highest shown for any nationality, the Irish ranking next with a percentage

of 4.6 in the second generation.

Two other occupations which appear to possess an exceptional attraction for the second generation of Italians are those of saloon-keeper and bartender. Of the male breadwinners in the second generation 3.3 per cent were returned as employed in these occupations. This may not seem to be a very large percentage, but it is noticeably larger than in the first generation (1.3) and larger than for any other foreign nationality, either in the first or the second generation. In the State of Illinois 3.2 per cent of the male breadwinners in the first generation of Italians are employed in these occupations, and 6.4 per cent of those in the second generation.

Of the first generation of male Italian breadwinners 3.4 per cent were reported by the census as boot and shoe makers and repairers.

No other nationality, except the Canadian French, has so large a percentage in this occupation. In the second generation, however, the percentage in case of the Italians declines to 1.4, while that for Canadian French increases to 3.6. The census figures do not make it possible to distinguish how many of the boot and shoe makers and repairers are shoe-factory operatives and how many are engaged in custom shopwork and repairing. But probably most of the Italians reported in this occupation group are in the latter class.

Another occupation in which the Italians are especially prominent is that of barbers and hairdressers. Nearly one-tenth (9.7 per cent) of all the male barbers and hairdressers reported at the Twelfth Census (1900) were Italians of either the first or second generation. In those communities where Italians have settled in considerable

numbers the proportion is naturally much higher.

In New York City more than one-third of the boot and shoe makers and repairers and more than one-half of the barbers are Italians.

The table which follows presents the comparison here considered for the ten cities in which the male breadwinners of Italian parentage were most numerous:

This table shows first the percentage which the male Italians in the given occupation form of the total number of male Italian breadwinners, and, secondly, the percentage which they form of the total number of males in the same occupation. For instance, in the city of Philadelphia the 300 male Italians reported as boot and shoe makers and repairers represent 2.9 of the total number (10,204) of male Italian breadwinners and 5.8 of the total number (5,171) of males reported in that occupation. The table makes it evident that

there is a wide variation between different cities as regards the extent to which the Italians have taken up the two occupations here considered. For instance, in Chicago as contrasted with New York the number of Italians reported as boot and shoe makers and repairers and as barbers and hairdressers is small both in proportion to the total number of Italian male breadwinners and in proportion to the total number of males in these occupations.

The occupation of barber appears to have less attraction for the second generation of Italians than for the first as is indicated by the

following figures:

Another occupation in which Italians attain an equal degree of prominence is that of huckster and peddler, nearly one-tenth of whom (9.5 per cent) are either Italian immigrants or the children of Italian immigrants.

Of the two tables which follow the first gives the 10 occupation groups in which there are the largest numbers of Italians, and the second the 10 in which the Italians are most prominent as compared with the total number of males in the same occupation group. Naturally the two lists are quite distinct. A small and numerically unimportant occupation group will hardly appear on the first list, where the groups are ranked according to the actual number of Italians employed. But in the second table, where the selection is determined solely by the percentage which the Italians form of the total number of males in the same occupation, small occupations may be included.

In the first table the rank of the specified occupation as regards number employed is given for each generation in order to show the change in the relative importance of the occupation in the second generation, as compared with the first. For instance, miners and quarrymen form the second largest occupational group in the first generation of Italians and the ninth in the second generation; again, the rank of steam railroad employees, as an occupational group, declines from third in the first generation of Italians to twenty-first in the second.

Very notable is the advance in the rank of clerks and copyists from twenty-fourth in the first generation to fourth in the second; and of salesmen from twenty-first in the first generation to sixth in the second.

Table 114 brings out the fact, already noted, that the leading occupation for either generation of Italians is that of general laborer; but, as shown by the second table, the occupational group in which they attain the greatest relative importance as compared with the size of the group consists of a number of miscellaneous occupations thrown together in the census classification under the general head of "other domestic and personal service." Doubtless the prominence of the Italians in this group is explained by the fact that it includes bootblacks.

As shown by Table 115, the Italian immigrants, though contributing only 1.15 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners, comprise 14.04 per cent of the males employed in "other domestic and personal service;" 9.31 per cent of the barbers; 9.04 per cent of the hucksters and peddlers; 7.28 per cent of the marble and stone cutters; and 6.82 per cent of the confectioners. These, in other words, are occupations in which the Italian immigrants are exceptionally prominent as compared with their importance in the total male working population. The occupations in which the second generation of Italians attain their greatest relative importance are shown in the lower half of the same table, and include paper-box makers, confectioners, musicians and teachers of music, etc.

At the census of 1900 more than one-third (37 per cent) of the Norwegian male immigrants in the United States reported as having an occupation were farmers. This is the largest proportion of farmers shown for any class of immigrants that can be distinguished on the basis of census figures, the next highest percentage being that for immigrants from Denmark (30.6), and the next that for immigrants

from Bohemia (25.4).

In the second generation of Norwegians the percentage of farmers is smaller, being only 24.1, but the percentage of farm or agricultural laborers is larger, being 38.0 as compared with 11.5 in the first genera-This undoubtedly reflects the fact that the second generation contains a much larger proportion of boys and young men, many of whom are probably employed as laborers or helpers on the home The result is that either as farm laborers or farmers or in some other capacity 63 per cent of the second generation of male breadwinners are engaged in agricultural pursuits as compared with 49.8 per cent of the first generation. If most of the youthful farm laborers remain on the farm becoming farmers, as they grow up the percentage of farmers will become greater in the second generation than it was in the first. Perhaps the most that can be said regarding the present available figures is that they suggest no movement away from the farm on the part of the rising generation of Norwegians but The percentage of farmers in the second genrather the contrary. eration is larger than it is in the second generation of any other foreign nationality.

The State with the next largest number of Norwegian farmers of the first generation was North Dakota, but in the case of the second generation Iowa. Of the second generation 15.2 per cent were located in Iowa,

as compared with only 9.5 per cent of the first generation.

There are comparatively few Norwegians in the States east of Ohio, and it is noticeable that here only a small percentage of the first generation are either farmers or farm laborers, and that a comparatively large percentage are engaged in the building trades, particularly in that of carpentering. (See General Table VI.) Thus the 6,347 male breadwinners of the first generation of Norwegians in the State of New York included only 27 farmers and only 51 farm laborers; while 1,753, representing 27.6 per cent, or more than one-fourth of the total number, were engaged in the building trades, 1,420 being carpenters. Even in Illinois the percentage engaged in the building trades (14.3) practically equals the percentage employed in agriculture (14.4). In Iowa, on the other hand, 65.4 per cent of the first generation of Norwegian male breadwinners were reported in agricultural pursuits and only 7.1 per cent in the building trades.

The percentage in the building trades declines in the second genera-

tion while the percentage of clerks and salesmen increases.

The Norwegians are not attracted to the textile mills. most part they have settled in a section of the country where the textile industry is not represented or not greatly developed. But even in States where the textile industry is prominent they show little disposition to become textile mill operatives. In Massachusetts, of the 1,631 male breadwinners enumerated at the census of 1900 as foreign born and Norwegian by parentage, only 26, or 1.6 per cent, were textile mill operatives; the second generation of Norwegians was represented in that State by only 178 male breadwinners, none of whom were employed in the textile mills. Of the 1,751 foreign-born male breadwinners of Austrian parentage in the same State, a number hardly larger than that just given for the Norwegians, 354, or 20.2 per cent, were textile mill operatives; and of the 475 male breadwinners in the first generation of Bohemians, 180, or 37.9 per cent, were in this occu-The contrast doubtless represents a difference in pation group. national characteristics and proclivities.

The percentage of general laborers or laborers (not specified) is not large among the Norwegians as compared with other nationalities, and, as is usually the case, it undergoes a decline in the second genera-

tion.

The percentage of Norwegians employed in professional pursuits shows an appreciable increase in the second generation, more marked in the East apparently than it is in the country at large.

Farmers and agricultural laborers form the two leading occupations in each generation, but with a transposition of rank. The rank of the occupational group, "laborers (not specified)," remains the same in the second generation as in the first, although the percentage of male breadwinners included in this group declines from 9.5 in the first generation to 7.2 in the second.

The percentage of carpenters, which is 5.2 in the first generation, falls off to 1.4 in the second generation, and the change is accompanied by a decline in the rank of the occupation. Both the rank and the percentage of retail merchants advances in the second generation.

Of the total number of Norwegian male breadwinners of the first generation in the United States 4,023, or 2.4 per cent, were classified by the census as boatmen and sailors, a larger number than were reported for any other class of immigrants. In the State of New York the number of Norwegian boatmen and sailors, 1,062, constituted 16.8 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the first generation. Very striking is the change in the rank of boatmen and sailors, which from being the sixth occupation in the first becomes the thirty-third in the second. Apparently the Norwegian's disposition to follow the seas does not survive the first generation transplanted to this country. The occupations of clerks and salesmen, on the other hand, ranking twelfth and seventeenth, respectively, in the first generation, advances to the fifth and sixth rank in the second generation.

When we come to consider those occupations in which the Norwegians are most prominent, as compared with the total number of males employed in the same occupation, we find that for the first generation the occupation of boatmen and sailors heads the list. Thus while the Norwegian male breadwinners of the first generation form only 0.71 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States, they include 5.04 per cent of the boatmen and sailors. The allied occupation of fishermen and oystermen is next on the list, the percentage of Norwegian immigrants in this occupation being 2.32.

The second generation attains its greatest prominence in the occupation of butter and cheese making, although the number of Norwegians of the second generation employed in this occupation is That, however, represents 1.16 per cent of the total number of butter and cheese makers. The occupation ranking next in this respect is numerically of much greater importance, being that of agricultural laborers, of whom 0.86 per cent are Norwegians of the second generation.

That the second generation of Norwegian male breadwinners attains greater prominence in the teachers' occupation than in most other occupations is a noteworthy fact, this occupation being one that does not appear in the corresponding table for any other nationality.

#### POLES.

The first generation of Poles in the United States in 1900 included 183,055 male breadwinners. The immigration of Poles to this country in considerable numbers is comparatively recent, so that the second generation consists mostly of children and comprises only 25,975 male breadwinners.

The occupational distribution of each generation of Poles is given

in the following table:

The 183,055 male breadwinners of foreign birth and Polish parentage enumerated at the census of 1900 included 53,232 general laborers, or "laborers (not specified)," a percentage of 29.1. This approaches the percentage of laborers among Italian immigrants (33.2), and considerably exceeds the percentage for any other of the 17 foreign nationalities distinguished in the census statistics, the next highest percentage being that for the Hungarian immigrants (22.3) and the Irish (22.3). In the second generation of Poles the percentage of laborers falls off to 15.7, which, however, is higher than the corresponding percentage for the second generation of Italians (12.4) or of any other foreign nationality.

The percentage of miners and quarrymen among Polish immigrants (7.7) is not exceptionally high, being surpassed by the corresponding percentages for the Hungarians (30.0), the Austrians (18.9),

the English and Welsh (10.2), and the Italians (9.2).

But there are proportionately more iron and steel workers among the Poles than in any other of the 17 foreign nationality classes distinguished in the census statistics of occupations. In the first generation of Poles 6.6 per cent of the male breadwinners are employed in iron and steel works, and in the second generation 4 per cent. For the Hungarians the corresponding percentages are 5.3 and 1.4, respectively; for Austrians, 3.8 and 1.3; for the Irish, 2.8 and 2.5. (See Table 2.)

There were 10,480 Poles of the first generation reported as farmers in the census of 1900. This number represented 5.7 per cent, or more than one-twentieth, of the total number of male breadwinners in that generation. In the second generation the percentage of farmers is almost as large, being 5.3, although the absolute number was only 1,389. The percentage of agricultural laborers increases from 4.3 in

the first generation of Poles to 18.2 in the second.

Almost one-third (30.3 per cent) of the 10,480 Polish farmers of the first generation reported by the census of 1900 were located in the State of Wisconsin; 18.9 per cent of the total number were in Minnesota; and 14.2 per cent in Michigan. These three adjoining States comprise 63.4 per cent, or almost two-thirds of the total. The agricultural laborers in the first generation of Poles show a very different distribution by States. Only 19.2 per cent of the total number were located in the three States just mentioned, while 25.6 per cent were found in the eastern State of New York, which contained only 2.7 per cent of the Polish farmers. Again, of the agricultural laborers in that generation, 44.3 per cent were in "all other States;" but of the farmers only 9.3 per cent were in these States. In the second generation the territorial distribution both of the farmers and of the agricultural laborers corresponds in a general way to that of the first generation of farmers.

The occupation of tailor, under which are classified workers on men's clothing, employs 4.7 per cent of the first generation of Poles in the United States, but only 1.8 per cent of the second generation. In the State of New York 14.1 per cent, or about one-seventh, of the Polish male workers of the first generation were returned by the census as tailors, and 6.4 per cent of those of the second generation. Three nationalities only in that State comprise a larger percentage of tailors in the first generation: Russians (28.3), Austrians (26.9), and Hungarians (17.1). In the second generation, in the same State, the only percentage of tailors higher than that reported for the Poles (6.4) was for the Russians (11.2).

The occupational group consisting of general laborers or laborers (not specified) occupies the first rank in the first generation; but in the second generation the number of general laborers is less than the number of agricultural laborers, the rank of the latter having advanced from sixth in the first generation to first in the second. In the second generation the number of farmers exceeds the number of miners and of iron and steel workers, while in the first generation the farmers are outnumbered by each of the other two occupations. The rank of tailors declines from fifth in the first generation to tenth in the second; that of textile mill operatives from eighth to twenty-first. On the other hand, the rank of salesmen advances from seventeenth to sixth; that of clerks from twenty-eighth to seventh; and that of carpenters from twelfth to eighth.

Of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States only 0.76 per cent are Poles of the first generation; but of the leather curriers and tanners 6.43 per cent are Poles of the first generation; of the charcoal, coke, and lime burners 6.39 per cent; of the wireworkers 5.92 per cent; of the tailors 5.34 per cent.

The second generation of Poles comprises only 0.11 per cent of the total number of breadwinners in the United States, and hardly more than 1 per cent of the males employed in any occupation, the largest

percentage (1.21) being that for paper-box makers.

## RUSSIANS.

The comparative recentness of immigration from Russia and the consequent youthfulness of the second generation is indicated by the comparative small number of male breadwinners in that generation, the number being only 14,598 as compared with 191,599 in the first generation.

The occupational distribution of each generation of male breadwinners of Russian parentage is shown by the following table:

The distinctive features of the occupational classification of those male breadwinners in the United States whose parents were born in Russia doubtless reflect the characteristics of the Russian Jew. In the year 1900, of the 191,599 male breadwinners who were Russians by parentage and foreigners by birth, 34,418, or 18 per cent, were returned as tailors, and 24,792, or 12.9 per cent, as retail merchants, these being the two most important occupations for that class of breadwinners. In no other foreign nationality do these two occupations attain equal importance, the next highest percentage of tailors being that for Austrian immigrants, 7.9, and the next highest percentage of retail merchants being that for Italian immigrants, 5.8. In the total population of the United States only 0.5 per cent of the male breadwinners are tailors and only 2.6 per cent are retail merchants.

In the second generation of male breadwinners of Russian parentage the percentage of tailors declines to 5.5 and that of retail merchants to 5.4, the former becoming the fourth occupational group in

numerical importance, and the latter the fifth.

The disposition of the Russian immigrants to engage in retail trade is further indicated by the comparatively large number returned by the census as hucksters and peddlers, constituting 6.4 of the total number of male breadwinners of the first generation. For the Italians, who rank next to the Russians in the tendency toward this

occupation, the percentage was only 2.4.

In the second generation of Russians by far the most important occupation is that of agricultural laborers, almost one-fourth, or 24.2 per cent, of the male breadwinners being classified under this head. Of farmers there were 6.6 per cent in the first generation of Russian male breadwinners and 4.7 per cent in the second. That the great increase in the relative importance of agricultural laborers in the second generation as compared with the first is not accompanied by any increase in the percentage of farmers, may be explained by the probability that the second generation of breadwinners consists mostly of young men and boys. Farming is an occupation requiring usually some capital and experience and not taken up until later life. Many of the agricultural laborers, on the other hand, are children and perhaps are employed by their parents on the home farm.

The distribution by States of the Russians engaged in agriculture is shown by the table next submitted, in which the selection and order of the States specified are determined by the number of Rus-

sians of the first generation reported as farmers.

Almost one-half, 48.6 per cent, of the first generation of Russian farmers in 1900 were located in the Dakotas—25.7 per cent in North Dakota and 22.9 per cent in South Dakota. One-fifth, or 20.5 per cent, were in Kansas. These three States then account for 69.5 per cent of the total number in the United States. Of the second generation of Russian farmers only 5.7 per cent were in North Dakota, but 31.3 per cent were in South Dakota and 30.1 per cent in Kansas. The contrast between the two generations in respect to the percentage of farmers found in these States indicates probably that the migration of Russians to North Dakota was more recent than that to the other two States. This inference is confirmed by the census statistics showing the total number of Russians by birth in these States in 1890 as compared with 1900:

It is evident that most of the Russian immigrants found in North Dakota at the census of 1900 had come there since 1890, there being comparatively few in that State at the earlier census. As a natural consequence the second generation in that State was not old enough in 1900 to include many adults. This accounts for the small number of farmers of the second generation in that State as compared with

the States of South Dakota and Kansas, where the immigration of

Russians was evidently of earlier origin.

The percentage of general laborers or "laborers (not specified)" among Russian immigrants is notably small, being only 7.3. A smaller percentage was reported for the English and Welsh (6.5) and for the Scotch (5.7), but for no other of the 17 foreign nationalities for which statistics are available.

Only a small proportion of the Russians are found in the textile mills. Even in Massachusetts, where the textile mills employ 7.9 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners and 13.1 per cent of the total number of immigrant male breadwinners (white), only 2.6 per cent of 12,155 immigrant male breadwinners of Russian parentage were returned by the census as textile mill operatives. For two foreign nationalities only, the Swedes and the Norwegians, was the percentage of textile mill operatives smaller in that State. (See General Table VI.)

As already remarked, tailors constitute the leading occupation group in the first generation and agricultural laborers in the second. In the second generation the rank of tailors declines to fourth, salesmen forming the second occupational group and clerks and copyists the third, while in the first generation these two last-named occupations rank eighth and thirteenth, respectively.

The relative prominence of Russian immigrants in the needle trades is strikingly shown by the table below. Nearly one-third, 32.35 per cent, of the male breadwinners classified by the census as "seamstresses" were Russians of the first generation and approxi-

mately one-fifth of the tailors and (male) dressmakers.

The second generation is represented by comparatively small numbers and percentages, the 14,598 male breadwinners in that generation constituting only 0.06 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners. The list of occupations in which the second generation is most prominent is, however, similar to the corresponding list for the first generation, eight of the ten occupations included in the list for the first generation reappearing in the corresponding list for the second generation. Naturally there are differences in the order of these occupations. Seamstresses, however, head the list for the second generation, as they do for the first. The two occupations included in the list for the first generation but not in that for the second are dressmakers and tobacco and cigar factory operatives. The two occupations included in the list for the second but not in that for the first are messengers and errand and office boys and salesmen.

In their occupational distribution the Scotch, as might be antici-Thus it appears that pated, closely resemble the English and Welsh. 13.2 per cent of the English and Welsh male immigrants (first generation) were farmers, as compared with 12.8 per cent of the Scotch, and that 3.5 per cent of the former and 3.4 per cent of the latter were farm laborers. Such differences are immaterial. It is noticeable, however, that in the first generation, representing immigrants, the Scotch, as compared with the English and Welsh, comprise an appreciably smaller percentage of miners, general laborers, and textile mill operatives, and a larger percentage of carpenters and In the State of Massachusetts the percentage of textile mill operatives is 11 among the Scotch immigrants and 24.8 among the English; and the percentage of carpenters is 6.4 among the former and 2.9 among the latter. (See General Table VI.) In Pennsylvania, on the other hand, the percentage of textile mill operatives in the two nationalities differs but little, being 5.2 for the Scotch and 5.7 for the English and Welsh, and the percentage of miners, 24.4 and 26.2,

respectively, also presents no marked contrast. There is no other class of immigrants in which the percentage of general laborers is as small as it is among the Scotch, and none in which the percentage

of machinists is as large.

The percentage of clerks, bookkeepers, and stenographers in the first generation of Scotch (4.2) is higher than in the same generation of any other foreign nationality. But in the second generation the percentage for the Scotch (6.2) is less than the corresponding percentage for the second generation of Austrians (8.4), Hungarians (11.9), Irish (6.5), Italians (6.4), and Russians (11.7). (See Table 2.)

In the percentage of salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers in the first generation of male workers the Scotch rank third, the percentage (4.0) being less than it is for the Russians (4.7) and the

Canadian English (4.4).

In the first generation the percentage engaged in professional service is the same for the Scotch (4.5) as it is for the English and Welsh, and is larger than it is for any other foreign nationality except the French (5.2). But in the second generation the percentage for the Scotch advances to 5.7 and that for the English and Welsh to only 4.9. In fact neither the native white of native parentage nor the second generation of any other foreign nationality comprises as large a percentage of professional men as the second generation of Scotch. This is true not only for the entire country, but for each of the seven States for which the figures have been compiled, with the exception of Massachusetts.

But while in a comparison by States the percentage engaged in professional pursuits is usually higher in the second generation of Scotch than among the native white of native parentage, the percentage for the former is quite frequently surpassed by the percentage for the second generation of other nationalities. (See General Table VI.) For example, in Illinois, where 5.9 per cent of the male breadwinners in the second generation of Scotch were reported as engaged in professional pursuits, the corresponding percentages for the second generation of Danes, of Italians, and of Hungarians were, respectively, 7.5, 6.4, and 6.

Noteworthy is the relatively large percentage of manufacturers and officials among Scotch immigrants. To be sure, the percentage is only 2.6 in the first generation and 2 in the second, but this is an occupational group which includes only 1 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States and only 1.1 per cent of the native white male breadwinners whose parents were also native. The English and Welsh rank next to the Scotch in this respect, with a percentage of 2.2 in the first generation and 1.8 in the second.

A comparison of the above table for the Scotch with the corresponding table for the English and Welsh (see p. 143) emphasizes the resemblance between these two classes as regards occupational distribution. The list of ten leading occupations is the same for each with only one exception. The occupation of manufacturers and officials, which

appears in the list for the first generation of Scotch does not appear in the corresponding list for the English, its place being taken by iron Moreover, there are no differences in the order and steel workers. of the first three occupations in the first generation and of the first six in the second generation. Scotch immigrants constitute only 0.5 per cent of the total male working population; but they constitute 5.44 per cent of the marble and stone cutters, and 3.34 per cent of the bleachery and dye-work operatives. These are the two occupational groups in which Scotchmen of the first generation are relatively most numerous.

Five of the ten occupations in which the first generation is most prominent are connected with the manufacture of cloth. corresponding list for the second generation of Scotch includes only one occupation of this class, that of carpet-factory operatives, which comes at the foot of the list. At the head of the list come plumbers and gas and steam fitters. Of these 1.29 per cent are Scotchmen of the second generation. It may be said that a majority of the ten occupations in which the second generation attains its greatest relative importance presuppose a good degree of skill and intelligence and special education or technical training. It is rather surprising, however, to find the occupation of miners and quarrymen appearing in this list when it does not appear in the corresponding list for the first generation. But this fact should not be interpreted as indicating that the second generation is more inclined to this occupation than Reference to the table on page 25 indicates that that is not Of the 129,901 male breadwinners in the first generation the case. 9,740 were reported as miners and quarrymen, or 7.5 per cent; of the 111,195 male breadwinners in the second generation, 6,198 were reported as miners and quarrymen, or 5.6 per cent...

#### SWEDES.

In the United States in 1900 there were 297,307 male breadwinners in the first generation of Swedes and 67,407 in the second. Thus the second generation of Swedes comprises less than one-fourth as many male breadwinners as in the first, while the second generation of Norwegian male breadwinners is about one-half as large as the first. The difference reflects the fact that immigration from Sweden is more recent than that from Norway.

The Swedes show less inclination toward agriculture than the Norwegians. In the first generation of Swedes only 20.9 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners are farmers, while the corresponding percentage for the Norwegians is, as previously noted, 37. It might be said that this is because a much larger proportion of the Swedish immigrants have settled in the East, which is a manufacturing and commercial section of the country rather than agricultural. But their territorial distribution is doubtless affected and largely determined by their occupational preferences. In Iowa, which is preeminently an agricultural State, the percentage of farmers among Swedish immigrants is 34.9, while among Norwegians it is 49.

The Swedes, like the Norwegians, include a greatly increased percentage of agricultural laborers in the second generation and a diminished percentage of farmers. But the increase in the former percentage exceeds the decrease in the latter with the result that the

total percentage engaged in agricultural pursuits advances from 30.2 in the first generation to 43.1 in the second; for Norwegians the corresponding percentage is 49.8 in the first generation and 63.0 in the second.

For the Swedes, as for the Norwegians, Minnesota is the most important farming State, although they are not concentrated in that State in as great a degree. Of the first generation of Swedish farmers 32.4 per cent were in Minnesota and of the second generation 24 per cent, while the corresponding percentages for the Norwegians were 37.7 and 39.9, respectively. The list of ten leading States as determined by the number of farmers of the first generation is the same for both nationalities, but there is considerable variation in the order in which these States rank. The two Dakotas, which, in case of the Norwegians, come near the head of the list and comprise 22.1 per cent of the total number of farmers, come near the foot of the list in case of the Swedes and comprise only 7.6 per cent of the total. In general the Swedish farmers appear to be more widely distributed than the Norwegian.

Of the first generation of Swedish male breadwinners, 4.2 per cent were reported as miners and quarrymen. This is not a large percentage as compared with some other nationalities, but it is considerably higher than the corresponding percentage for Norwegians, which is only 1.3. In Iowa 6 per cent of the Swedish, and only 0.4 per cent of the Norwegian, male immigrants at work were reported as miners and quarrymen. In Pennsylvania the percentage of miners for the Swedes was 18.2 and for the few Norwegians in the State, 11.6.

(See General Table VI.)

In proportion to their number the Swedes of the first generation are engaged in the building trades to a greater extent than the Norwegians or any other foreign nationality, with the exception of the Canadian English, the Canadian French, and the Scotch. As usual, however, the comparison does not show the same result in all parts of the country. In the eastern States of New Jersey and Pennsylvania the Norwegians are engaged in these trades to a greater extent in proportion to their small numbers than the Swedes or any other foreign nationality. In Massachusetts, too, the percentage in the building trades (14.6) is larger for the Norwegians than for the Swedes (11.0), but the largest percentage is that for Canadian English (18.8). The relative importance of the building trades declines in the second generation of Swedes, as it does in case of the Norwegians.

The Swedes, like the Norwegians, show little inclination to seek employment in the textile mills. Even in Massachusetts, where the Swedes are present in rather large numbers, only 1.5 per cent of the first generation of male breadwinners of that nationality were reported as textile mill operatives, this being the smallest percentage shown for any class of immigrants in that State, with the exception of the

Norwegians.

As compared with other foreign nationalities, a rather large proportion of Swedes were returned by the census as machinists, a percentage of 2.5 for the first generation, giving them a rank next to the

English and Scotch in this respect.

The percentage of the first generation of workers reported in professional service is smaller for the Swedes (1.5) than it is for Norwegians (1.8), but not so small as it is for the Italians (1.4), the Bohemians (1.4), the Canadian French (1.2), and the Hungarians (1.1). In the second generation of Swedes the percentage increases to 2.4 and is larger than the corresponding percentage for the Norwegians (2.2). There are other nationalities which show a more marked advance. In the small second generation of Hungarian breadwinners the percentage reported in professional service reaches 4.7; for Italians it becomes 3.5.

The tendency of the second generation to seek employment as clerks, bookkeepers, stenographers, and salesmen appears to be more

marked among the Swedes than among the Norwegians.

In the first generation of Swedes the leading occupation is that of farmer; in the second that of farm or agricultural laborer. In the first generation there are about three times as many farmers as farm laborers; in the second generation about three times as many farm laborers as farmers. This contrast doubtless arises from the fact that the second generation comprises proportionately more boys and young men than the first and fewer men of middle or advanced age. Many of the farm laborers returned by the census were farmers' children employed on the home farm.

In the first generation of Swedes the general laborers or "laborers (not specified)" outnumber the agricultural laborers. But in the second generation the general laborers are outnumbered by the agricultural laborers in a ratio of about three to one. The percentage of general laborers in the total number of male breadwinners declines

from 12.8 in the first generation to 9.5 in the second.

Still more marked is the decline in the relative importance of the carpenter's occupation. From the fourth rank in the first generation it becomes eleventh in the second, the percentage declining from 5.4 to 1.9.

The occupation of miner in the second generation declines in importance, but does not drop out of the list of ten leading occupations.

The following table gives the occupations in which the Swedes attain their greatest prominence:

Of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States, 1.24 per cent are Swedish immigrants, or Swedes of the first generation. This generation of Swedes includes, however, 7.98 per cent of the wireworkers in the United States, 6.92 per cent of the cabinet-makers, and 4.70 per cent of the boatmen and sailors. These are the three occupations in which the first generation is most conspicuous. The three occupations which have the corresponding

relation in the second generation are those of messenger and errand and office boy, stenographer and typewriter, and engraver. The second generation, however, comprises only a small percentage of the total numbers of breadwinners in these occupations, the largest percentage, that for the messengers and errand and office boys, being only 1.09, or hardly more than 1 per cent.

#### SWISS.

The following table gives the occupational distribution of the male breadwinners in 1900 whose parents were born in Switzerland. There were 60,391 male breadwinners in the first generation of Swiss, and rather more than half that number, or 34,751, in the second generation; the former representing the Swiss immigrants, the latter the children of Swiss immigrants.

The occupation of farmer includes 23.6 per cent of the male breadwinners in the first generation of Swiss parentage, and 22.2 of those in the second generation. Only three foreign parentage classes include a larger percentage of farmers in the first generation, viz, the Norwegians (37.0), the Danes (30.6), and the Bohemians (25.4); and in the second generation the Norwegians alone have a higher

percentage of farmers (24.1) than the Swiss.

In the first generation of Swiss 10.8 per cent of the male breadwinners were agricultural laborers; in the second generation 18.6 per cent. The total number of Swiss engaged in agricultural pursuits either as farmers or as agricultural laborers or in some other capacity comprises 37.8 per cent of the first generation of male breadwinners and 42 per cent of the second. Only two nationalities, the Norwegians and the Danes, have higher percentages in agriculture in each generation. Two others, the Bohemians and the Swedes, have in the second generation practically the same percentage as the Swiss, but a lower percentage in the first generation.

The number of Swiss reported as farmers was greatest in the State of Ohio, California ranking next in this respect. In fact there were only two States, New York and Ohio, that contained, at the time of the Twelfth Census, a larger number of natives of Switzerland than California. It may be noted, however, that there are comparatively few Swiss farmers of the second generation in that State, probably because the migration of the Swiss to that section was so recent that the second generation comprises, as yet, comparatively few adults. In Ohio, on the other hand, there are as many farmers in the second generation of Swiss as in the first.

An agricultural occupation of minor importance but attaining greater relative importance among the Swiss than in any other foreign nationality, is that of dairyman. The percentage of dairymen in the first generation of Swiss male breadwinners is 1.6. For no other nationality is the corresponding percentage greater than 0.2. (See General Table IVa, p. 649.) In fact almost one-tenth of the dairymen enumerated at the Twelfth Census were Swiss immigrants. Most of the Swiss dairymen were in the State of California, the number in that State being 740 as compared with a total of 965 in the

United States.

Another minor occupation closely allied to that of dairying and having also exceptional importance for the Swiss is that of butter and cheese making. This occupation is one which employs less than 0.1 per cent of the total number of male breadwinners in the United States; but employs 1.8 per cent of the first generation of Swiss male breadwinners. About one-half (517) of the Swiss butter and cheese makers were enumerated in the State of Wisconsin.

In the first generation of Swiss the percentage of general laborers or "laborers (not specified)" is 8.7, which is hardly more than the per-

centage of general laborers among the native white male breadwinners of native parentage (8.0). In the second generation the percentage is slightly smaller, being 7.3. Only 4 of the 17 foreign nationality classes distinguished in the census occupational statistics have a smaller percentage of general laborers in the first generation, viz, the French (7.8), the Russians (7.3), the English and Welsh (6.4), and the Scotch (5.7).

The first four occupations are the same in each generation and rank in the same order. The farmers head the list followed by the agricultural laborers, the laborers (not specified), and the retail merchants.

The fifth occupation for the first generation of Swiss is that of "servants and waiters." The French are the only other foreign nationality for which this occupation appears among the ten leading occupations for males of the first generation. In the second generation

of males this occupation becomes relatively unimportant, declining, in case of the Swiss, to twenty-eighth in rank. On the other hand, the occupation of clerk and copyist advances from the twenty-second in the first generation of Swiss to the fifth in the second, and the occupation of salesman from the twenty-fifth to the seventh. Carpenters and machinists appear in the list of the first ten in each generation, although with a lower rank in the second generation than in the first.

The characteristics of the Swiss people are reflected in the fact that the list for each generation includes the occupations of dairyman, butter and cheese makers, and clock and watch maker and repairer. Thus, while the Swiss male breadwinners of the first generation constitute only 0.25 per cent of all male breadwinners, they include 9.62 per cent of the dairymen, 5.92 per cent of the butter and cheese makers, and 2.04 per cent of the clock and watch makers.

Another occupation in which the Swiss immigrants are relatively numerous is that of silk mill operatives. The occupations of brewers and maltsters, and of bakers, which appear in this list for the first generation, appear also in the corresponding list for the Germans (see p. 156), and the coincidence is probably indicative of the fact that the

Swiss population comprises a large German element.

## GENERAL EXPLANATION OF TABLES.

Table Ia.—Male breadwinners in the first and second generations of the white population of foreign parentage: Detailed classification by occupations and nationalities, 1900.—This table shows, for example, that there were 153,033 male breadwinners in the United States in 1900 who were born abroad and whose parents were born in Austria. Of this number, 12,314 were engaged in agricultural pursuits, 3,487 being agricultural laborers, 21 dairymen, and 8,016 farmers, planters, and overseers.

In the second generation of Austrians, comprising persons who were born in the United States but whose parents were born in Austria, there were 14,587 male breadwinners, and of this number 3,812 were engaged in agricultural pursuits, 2,667 being agricultural laborers, 1 a dairyman, and 1,071 farmers, planters, and overseers, etc.

Table Ib.—Female breadwinners in the first and second generations of the white population of foreign parentage: Detailed classification by occupations and nationalities, 1900.—This table presents the same kind of classification for female breadwinners as is presented for male

breadwinners in Table Ia.

Table IIa.—Male breadwinners in the first and second generations of the white population of foreign parentage: Summary classification by occupations with per cent distribution presented for selected States, and under each State by nationalities, 1900.—This table shows, for example, that of 153,033 male breadwinners who were born abroad and whose parents were born in Austria, 12,314, or 8 per cent, were engaged in agricultural pursuits, 3,487, or 2.3 per cent, being agricultural laborers, 8,016, or 5.2 per cent, farmers, planters, and overseers, and 811, or 0.5 per cent, engaged in other agricultural pursuits.

Of the 14,587 male breadwinners in the second generation of Austrians, consisting of those who were born in the United States but whose parents were born in Austria, 3,812, or 26.1 per cent, were engaged in agricultural pursuits, 2,667, or 18.3 per cent, were agricultural laborers, 1,071, or 7.3 per cent, farmers, planters, and overseers, and 74, or 0.5 per cent, engaged in other agricultural

pursuits.

This tabulation is presented for the United States, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Iowa, and all

other States.

Table IIb.—Female breadwinners in the first and second generations of the white population of foreign parentage: Summary classification by occupations with per cent distribution, presented for selected States, and under each State by nationalities, 1900.—This table presents the same classification for female breadwinners as is presented for male breadwinners in Table IIa.

Table IIIa.—Male breadwinners in the first and second generations of the white population of foreign parentage: Summary classification by

occupations with per cent distribution presented by nationalities, and under each nationality by selected States, 1900.—This table presents the same facts and same classification as are given in Table IIa, except that the facts are presented first by nationalities, and under each nationality by selected States. The former presentation facilitates comparison between different nationalities in the same State, while the table presented here makes it easy to compare the facts for the same nationality in different States.

nationalities and States.

Table IVa.—Male breadwinners in the first and second generations of the white population of foreign parentage: Distribution by occupations in detail on a percentage basis, by nationalities, 1900.—This table presents percentages only, the actual numbers on which these percentages are based being given in Table Ia. The percentages are the same as those presented in Table IIa, but are here given for the detailed occupational classification, which includes many occupations not separately shown in the other table. For instance, of the Austrian male breadwinners in the first generation, representing immigrants whose parents were born in Austria, 8 per cent were engaged in agricultural pursuits, 2.3 per cent being agricultural laborers, 5.2 per cent being farmers, planters, and overseers, 0.1 per cent gardeners, florists, nurserymen, etc.; 0.2 per cent lumbermen and raftsmen; 0.1 per cent stock raisers, herders, and drovers, and 0.1 per cent being wood choppers. Of the list of percentages just given, the first three appear in Table IIa, but the others do not appear separately in that table, being consolidated in the residuary class for agricultural pursuits under "All others in this class."

breadwinners in Table IVa.

Table Va.—Distribution on a percentage basis by nationality of the total number of male breadwinners in each occupation, 1900.—This table shows what percentage the male breadwinners in the first and second generations of each foreign parentage class form of the total number of male breadwinners in each occupation. For example, of the 3,793,555 male breadwinners reported as agricultural laborers, 0.1 per cent were Austrians of the first generation—that is, immigrants whose parents were born in Austria—and 0.1 per cent were Austrians of the second generation, representing persons born in this country but whose parents were born in Austria; 0.1 per cent were Bohemians of the first generation and 0.2 per cent were Bohemians of the first generation and 0.7 per cent were English Canadians of the second generation, etc.

Table Vb.—Distribution on a percentage basis by nationality of the total number of female breadwinners in each occupation, 1900.—This

table gives for the female breadwinners percentages corresponding to

those given for male breadwinners in Table Va.

Table VI.—Percentage of the total number of male breadwinners of native white parentage, and male breadwinners of each foreign nationality employed in certain selected occupations, presented by States, 1900.—This table shows that 22.4 per cent of the male breadwinners in the United States were farmers (including planters and overseers); that of the native white male breadwinners whose parents were also native of the United States, 28.3 per cent were farmers; that of the white male breadwinners of foreign parentage and foreign birth, representing the immigrants, 14.6 per cent were farmers; of the second generation, representing the native children of immigrants, 13.3 per cent. Of the first generation of Norwegians 37 per cent were farmers, of the second generation 24.1 per cent; of the first generation of Danes 30.6 per cent were farmers, of the second generation 12.9 per cent.

In the State of Massachusetts 3.3 per cent of the male breadwinners were farmers; 6.9 per cent of the native white male breadwinners of native parentage, 1.5 per cent of the first generation of foreigners, and 1.1 per cent of the second generation; 1.7 per cent of the first generation of Norwegians, and 1.1 per cent of the second generation; 4.3 per cent of the first generation of Danes, and 1.4 per cent of the second, etc.

Under each occupation the nationalities are arranged in the order of rank as determined by the percentage of the first generation employed in the specified occupations. Thus Norwegians head the list for farmers, Danes coming second, and Bohemians third.

In the table for the building trades, on the other hand, the English Canadians head the list, with a percentage of 10.8 in the first generation, the Scotch coming second with a percentage of 9.6, and the

French Canadians third with a percentage of 9.4.

The classes covered by this table are the following: Farmers, planters, and overseers, agricultural laborers, laborers (not specified), persons in building trades, carpenters, clerks and copyists, textile mill operatives, salesmen, agents, and commercial travelers, tailors, and persons in professional service.



## FECUNDITY OF IMMIGRANT WOMEN.

## INTRODUCTORY.

In any comprehensive study of immigration the relative fecundity of different foreign races in the United States becomes an important subject of inquiry, especially in comparison with the fertility of the native American stock represented by the native white whose parents

also were native American.

Valuable data relative to this subject were collected by the Twelfth Census (1900) in answer to questions on the population schedule asking of every married, widowed, and divorced woman how many children she had borne and how many of these were still living. the data thus collected were never tabulated and published. The magnitude of the task as applied to the entire United States led to the postponement of the undertaking, pending the completion of other lines of inquiry. These other inquiries were considered to have precedence in census work on account of their primary importance and because they had regularly formed a part of prior census reports.

Recognizing the great value of information relative to the fecundity of foreign races in the United States, the Immigration Commission obtained permission to use the original data which the census had This action was taken not with any idea of making a comprehensive tabulation covering the entire United States, or doing the work which the census had not found the opportunity to do, but with the intention simply of selecting and studying certain limited but more or less typical sections or areas. It was believed that with comparatively small labor and expense results could be obtained which would present statistically a very interesting and significant comparison as regards fecundity between the immigrants, the nativeborn children of immigrants representing the second generation of foreign stock, and the native Americans born of native American parents.

"Mother of how many children and number of these children living." This question applies only to women, and its object is to get the number of children each woman has had, and whether the children are or are not living on the census day. Stillborn

children are not to be counted.

a The questions were "Mother of how many children?" and "Number of these children living?" The instructions to the enumerator regarding the answers to the questions were as follows:

Enter in column 11 (Mother of how many children) the figure showing the number of children born to this woman, as 1, 2, 3, 6, 10, etc. If she has had none, write "0." Enter in column 12 (Number of these children living) the figure showing the number of these children living on the census day. Whether the children are living in your district or clsewhere makes no difference. If the woman has had no children, or if they are all dead, write "0."

The results of this undertaking are presented in the report herewith submitted. The sections of the United States selected for study were as follows: The State of Rhode Island, the city of Cleveland and 48 largely rural counties in the State of Ohio, and the city of Minneapolis and 21 largely rural counties in the State of Minnesota. Rhode Island was chosen as being a compact eastern State, with a population largely urban and manufacturing in character, nearly four-fifths of the total population being incities of at least 10,000 in habitants. Ohio and Minnesota are middle-western types, Cleveland and Minneapolis presenting urban and manufacturing conditions, and the selected counties in each State rural and agricultural conditions.

The data tabulated for the purpose of this inquiry relate to the number of children borne by married women; that is, women living in the married state at the time the census was taken. \ idowed and divorced women were not included, mainly because the number of years that they had been married could not be ascertained from census returns. This, of course, is an essential factor in determining the fertility of marriages. The knowledge that one woman has borne two children and another three justifies no inference regarding their comparative fecundity until we know how long each has been married. In the case of married women this information was available, the census schedule stating the number of years married, or duration of present marriage, up to the time that the census was taken; in the case of widowed and divorced women the number of years married was not stated.

At the same time it was considered inadvisable to include all classes

of married women.

#### CLASSES OF MARRIED WOMEN OMITTED.

Women married less than one year were omitted because a large proportion of them—more than three-fourths of the total number—had not been married long enough to have borne children. Leaving out of consideration the possibility of prenuptial conception, the inquiry has no signficance for a woman just married. It seemed best, therefore, to consider only those who had been married long enough

to have had at least one child.

Women over 45 years of age were omitted. In analyzing and discussing the results it seemed best to consider only those women who were under 45 years of age and whose entire married life, therefore, would fall within the childbearing period. Whether any significant results can be obtained from the data for women over 45 is doubtful. Only a portion of their married life falls within the childbearing period. Moreover, unless the present marriage is one of long duration, extending back, say, to the time when the woman was under 30, the probability of a prior marriage introduces an element of uncertainty which renders accurate interpretation of the data difficult.

Every woman was omitted whose parents were born in different countries. The reason for this omission arises from the fact that the main object of the inquiry was to arrive at a comparison as regards fecundity between different nationalities or races, such as the Irish, the Germans, the Scandinavians, and the native Americans. The classification by nationality was based upon the country in which

the parents were born. A woman was classified as Irish if both of her parents were born in Ireland, as Italian if both parents were born in Italy, as American if both parents were born in the United States. Cases where the parents were born in different countries, as father in Italy and mother in Ireland, or father in Germany and mother in the United States, would of necessity be classified either with respect to the birthplace of one parent only or with respect to the parentage combination, as Italian-Irish, or German-American. The latter method is, of course, the more scientific, and it might seem at first thought that it would yield interesting results in reference to the effect upon fecundity of the mixing of races. In a tabulation covering the entire United States or a large number of States such a classification might be of some significance; but in a population no larger than that of Thode Island, or the selected areas of Ohio and Minnesota, the number of cases under each of the many combinations of parentage would be too small to a ord any basis for generalizations. It has been thought best, therefore, to omit the cases of mixed parentage altogether and confine the comparison to classes representing what might be termed "pure stock," so far as could be determined by the nativity of the parents.

#### PRIOR MARRIAGES.

The number of children reported in the census schedule comprises the total number borne by the woman to whom the return It includes therefore the children born of prior as well as of present marriages. The number of years married, however, represents the duration of the present or existing marriage only. The children that may have been born of a prior marriage can not be distinguished, and are therefore credited to the present marriage, except in cases where the number is too large to have been born during the present marriage. Such cases have been eliminated. For instance, if six children were reported for a woman married two years, it is practically certain that some of these children must have been born during a former marriage or else out of wedlock. It being impossible to ascertain the actual facts, these cases have been left out of the tabulation altogether. There remain, of course, a considerable number of cases in which children born of a prior marriage may have been credited to the present marriage and retained in the tabulation, because the fact of a former marriage was not made apparent either by a disproportion between the number of children and the duration of the present marriage or by any other evidence. The inclusion of these children of a prior marriage introduces an element of uncertainty or of error, the effect of which is to exaggerate in some degree the fecundity of present marriages by crediting them with the children of prior marriages. How serious this element of error is depends, of course, upon the relative frequency of second marriages. The statistics following, derived from the returns of marriages in the State of Massachusetts for the year 1906, throw light upon this question.

It is obvious that the probability of a prior marriage depends upon the age at which the present marriage was contracted. Of the total number of women in Massachusetts who married in 1906, 8.8 per cent had been married before. But of those who were under 25 years of age only 1.1 per cent had been married before, and of those under 30 years of age only 2.9 per cent. Such small percentages as these would not invalidate in any appreciable degree the value of the statistics for women under 30 years of age. For those who were married above the age of 30, however, the percentage of prior marriages becomes too large to be disregarded. But even so, provided the percentage did not vary widely in the different classes, it would not affect their relative position or rank as regards fecundity. In other words, it might be assumed that it is an element of error affecting all classes to about the same degree. However that may be, the fact that the census returns give the age and number of years married makes it possible in analyzing the results of our tabulation to eliminate the women whose present marriage took place late in life, or after they had reached an age where the probability of a prior marriage is too great to be ignored. For instance, by considering only women under 45 years of age who had been married at least 15 years, comparisons would be restricted to marriages that took place below the age of 30, so that the percentage of prior marriages would, according to the Massachusetts figures above cited, be only 2.9, or a proportion of 1 in 34.

## CLASSES OF MARRIED WOMEN INCLUDED.

The total number of married women in the State of Rhode Island at the census of 1900 was 79,800. The number for whom the data in regard to children were tabulated for the present study was 45,445, the difference between the two figures representing, of course, the classes omitted for the reasons previously stated. The following tabulation classifies these 45,445 married women by color, nationality, and place of residence:

For some nationalities the number included in the second generation is so small as to afford no adequate basis for statistical analysis. This is notably true of the second generation of Italians and of Swedes and, of course, results from the fact that the immigration of these nationalities is of recent origin. Comparatively few of the children born in this country, therefore, had reached maturity at the time of the Twelfth Census. The Irish are the only nationality in Rhode Island in which the number of married women in the second generation is more than two-thirds as large as it is in the first. In the case

of the Germans it is one-half as large.

The facts regarding number of children, as has been pointed out, must be considered in connection with the duration of the marriage. Theoretically, perhaps, the most satisfactory comparison would be that between women married the same number of years, a result which could be secured by classifying them with respect to the exact number of years married, as married 1 year, 2 years, 3 years, 4 years, and so This classification could be made; but the resulting numbers would be so small that percentages or averages based thereon would have no significance. In other words, our total is not large enough to warrant such detailed treatment, and it becomes necessary to substitute a classification by periods of years. It is doubtful, moreover, whether the detailed presentation would possess any great advantage over the more summary treatment, even when dealing with large numbers.

A study was made first of the data for those women under 45 years of age who had been married from 10 to 20 years. The lower limit of 10 years was adopted with a view to limiting the comparison to women who had been married long enough to have borne at least three or four children, and also with a view to excluding women who married after the age of 35, and for whom therefore a prior marriage was rather probable. The upper limit of 20 years was selected somewhat arbitrarily, but with the idea of not having the limits any further apart than was necessary to include enough women to make the figures significant. In more general terms the women considered may be defined as married women of childbearing age who are in the second decade of their married life.

### PROPORTION BEARING NO CHILDREN.

The following table shows the proportion of the group of Rhode Island married women under consideration that have borne no children:

The table requires little comment or explanation. The proportion of the native white women of native parentage who had borne no children is relatively large, being 17.5 per cent, or more than 1 woman in 6. The proportion of white women of foreign parentage who had borne no children is but 8 per cent, or less than 1 woman in 12. The smallest percentages are those for the French Canadian and Italian women, of whom only 1 in 20, or about 5 per cent, have had no children. The largest percentage is that for native negro women, of whom 22.5 per cent have had no children.

The table brings out the fact that among married white women of foreign parentage the proportion bearing no children is greater in the second generation than in the first, being 10.5 per cent in the second and 7.2 per cent in the first generation. For every foreign nationality shown except the French Canadian, the percentage in the second generation is also greater than in the first. In no instance, however, is the percentage, even in the second generation, as high as it is for the native white of native parentage (17.5 per cent).

With a view to ascertaining whether the conditions of city life had any perceptible effect upon fecundity, a separate tabulation of data was made for women under 45, married 10 to 20 years, living in Rhode Island cities of over 10,000 population. The results as regards the proportion of women who had borne no children were as follows:

For all the classes comprised in the foregoing tabulation the proportion bearing no children is 11.7 per cent in cities of over 10,000 population, as compared with 10 per cent in the remainder of the State. This difference would unquestionably be greater than it is were it not for the fact that the foreign element has more influence upon the urban total than upon the rural. Over two-thirds of the women living in cities, and only a little more than one-half of those living in the rest of the State, were of foreign parentage. Confining the comparison to the native white of native parentage the contrast between city and country becomes very marked, 19.4 per cent of the women of this class living in cities being childless, as compared with only 13.8 per cent of those living in the rest of the State. For the white of foreign parentage the contrast is somewhat less striking, but still very noticeable, the percentage being 8.4 in cities as against 6.5 in the rest of the State. In fact, the percentage bearing no children is higher in cities than in the country, or "remainder of State," for every class distinguished in the table except the Irish, the Swedes, and the residuary class, "Other foreign." The comparison for the two last named may be dismissed as not significant, because the percentages, especially those for the remainder of the State, are based on small numbers; but in the case of the Irish the numbers considered are large enough to make the exception shown for this class noteworthy.

#### CLASSIFICATION BY NUMBER OF CHILDREN.

A classification of the married women here considered with respect to the number of children they have borne is given in the table following.

Of the 6,133 American women (native white of native parentage) included in the Rhode Island tabulation, 3,598, or 58.7 per cent, have had not more than 2 children. This includes those who have had no children as well as those who have had only 1 or 2 children. Only 557, or 9.2 per cent, of the total have had more than 5 children.

Of the white women of foreign parentage, 35.4 per cent have had more than 5 children and only 26.9 per cent have not exceeded 2 children. In the case of the French Canadians the percentage having more than 5 children was 54.2, or more than half the total number;

the percentage having not more than 2 children was 16.4.

A comparison of the first generation of women of foreign parentage with the second generation shows that the percentage bearing not more than 2 children was greater in the second generation than in the first, while the percentage bearing more than 5 children was greater in the first generation than in the second. The percentage bearing from 3 to 5 children was nearly identical for the two generations. For each foreign nationality, too, where the figures were large enough to be significant, the percentage bearing not more than 2 children was greater in the second generation than in the first, while the percentage bearing more than 5 children was greater in the first generation than in the second. The percentage bearing 3 to 5 children was greater in the first generation in the majority of cases.

The next table classifies the married women under consideration by city and country, with respect to the number of children borne.

The table presents the percentages only.

The foregoing table indicates the percentage of married women bearing not more than 2 children (i. e., no children, 1 child, or 2), the percentage bearing 3 to 5 children, and the percentage bearing over 5 children. In the cities of at least 10,000 population, containing more than four-fifths of the white women of foreign parentage here considered, the percentage of native white women of native parentage bearing not more than 2 children was 60.7, while the corresponding percentage for white women of foreign parentage was but 27.2. The percentage bearing 3 children or over was 39.3 for the one class and 72.8 for the other. In other words, the native women were concentrated in the group bearing 1 or 2 children or none at all, the women of foreign parentage in the groups bearing 3 or more children. The same condition is true in the remainder of the State, but the difference between the percentage of native women bearing a given number of children and the corresponding percentage for women of foreign parentage was in each case less than in the cities; that is, both in the country and the cities the women of foreign parentage were concentrated in the large-family groups and the native women in the small-family groups, but the contrast between the two classes in this regard was not so striking in the country as in the city.

## AVERAGE NUMBER OF CHILDREN.

The next table gives the average number of children per married woman borne by each class of married women here considered.

The small average number of children (2.5) borne by the native white women of native parentage in Rhode Island is in notable contrast with the number borne by the white women of foreign parentage (4.5). The French Canadian women of the first generation had the largest average number of children (5.9), and the Italian women of the first generation the next largest (5). The average for the second generation of Scotch and of English was about the same as for the native American women.

In the cities the average number of children borne by the native white women of native parentage was 2.4, and by the white women of foreign parentage 4.4. The average was smaller in the city than in the country for all classes considered in the table, except the Irish and Italians.

It is noticeable that the average number of children borne by the second generation was invariably smaller than the average for the first generation, leaving out of consideration those cases (Italians and Swedes) where the second generation was represented by numbers too small to be significant. In this connection, however, one should take account of the probability that the second generation consisted of younger women, who had not been married so long as the first generation. In so far as this is the case, it would make the average number of children per woman smaller for the women of the second generation, even though their natural fecundity was as great as that of the first generation. That this factor probably has some effect, although on the whole not a very marked effect, is indicated by the following table, which gives, with other data, the average number of years married per woman:

Among the French Canadian women included in the foregoing tabulation the average length of time married was one year less for the second generation than for the first; in the case of the English Canadian and the Scotch the difference was a little less than one year. The English, Germans, and Irish show little difference between the two generations in this respect, which would indicate that the second generation was not more youthful than the first, a condition inherently probable in view of the fact that the immigration of these nationalities is not of recent date.

### NUMBER OF YEARS MARRIED PER CHILD BORNE.

The effect of differences as regards the duration of marriage may be eliminated by computing the aggregate number of years of married life represented by each class of women and then finding the average number of years married per child borne.<sup>a</sup> The results of

a Since the returns as to duration of marriage are given in even years, the fractions of a year or months being ignored, they are to that extent inexact. If, as a rule, the answers referred to the last, rather than the nearest anniversary of the date of marriage, the approximation would be an understatement of the full period of married life. Probably this is the case, the instructions to the enumerators, although not

this computation are presented in the foregoing table. married women tabulated for Rhode Island had been married in the aggregate 278,327 years and had given birth to an aggregate of 73,575 These totals have been introduced in the table mainly for the sake of supplying the basis and indicating the significance of the derived averages. The average number of years married is the quotient obtained by dividing the total number of married women (column 1) into the total number of years married (column 2); the average number of years married per child borne is the quotient obtained by dividing the total number of children borne (column 4) into the total number of years married (column 2). For example, the 6,133 native American women (native white of native parentage) had been married in the aggregate 89,055 years and had borne in the aggregate 15,110 children. This represents an average of almost 6 (5.9) years of married life to each child borne. At the other extreme are the French Canadians of the first generation, who gave birth to one child in every 2.5 years of married life. It follows that the French Canadian immigrants are bearing children two and one-third times as fast as the native American women. The additional fact that they begin bearing children earlier in life, because they marry when younger, widens still further the gap between the two classes as regards the natural rate of increase. In the rate of childbearing the Italian women closely approach, but do not quite equal, the French Canadian.

In general, the relative rank and position of the different nationality classes as regards fecundity is substantially the same in this comparison as in the others previously made. A longer term of married life per child borne is shown for the second generation than for the first in all cases where the numbers are large enough to be significant.

The table just considered is limited to women married more than 10 and less than 20 years. This limitation, it will be remembered, was adopted with a view to making comparisons regarding the average number of children, and regarding the proportion of married women bearing no children, or bearing a specified number of children. When, however, the average number of years married per child borne is under consideration, the comparison may well be extended to include women married less than 10 and more than 20 years, especially as the earlier years of married life are probably more productive of children than the later, even when the later years do not extend beyond the childbearing period.

The table which follows is an extension of the two foregoing tables to cover all women under 45 years of age who had been married at least one year. The average number of children borne, the average number of years married, and the rate of childbearing, are shown for the whole period of married life, from a year after marriage up to the

date of the census.

explicit, indicating the expectation that the answers would refer to the last anniversary of the marriage. Assuming that they all referred to the last anniversary, a closer approach to accuracy in computing the total number of years married would be obtained by adding one-half year for each married woman. This would not increase the number of years married per child borne by more than one or two tenths of a year. It has not been thought worth while to make any such correction in view of the uncertainty whether the answers do, as a rule, refer to the last anniversary, and in view also of the probability that the inaccuracy affects all classes to about the same degree, so that it does not appreciably vitiate the value of the figures for comparative purposes.

The average number of children borne per native white American woman was 2 and the average per woman of foreign parentage 3.4. The average is greater in the first generation of women of foreign parentage than in the second, a difference only partly accounted for by the slightly greater average length of time married in case of the first generation. For each foreign nationality, also, the average is greater in the first generation than in the second.

The average number of years married was 10.9 for the native white American women and 10.6 for the white women of foreign parentage. For the Germans the average is the same in both generations. For every other nationality the average is longer in the first than in the second generation. This may be explained, in general, on the ground that the women of the second generation are probably younger, on the average, than those of the first generation. This hypothesis is strengthened by the fact that the widest differences occur within the foreign nationalities of most recent immigration. Thus the Italians, in the case of whom the widest difference occurs, are probably the most recent immigration group included in the table, while the Germans and Irish, at the other extreme, are among the earliest. It is also probable that the second generation women do not marry so early in life as did their mothers of the first generation.

The number of years married per child borne is shown to be considerably smaller for the women of foreign than of native stock. The native white women had been married 5.6 years for every child borne, the white women of foreign parentage 3.1 years. Both these figures are slightly lower than the corresponding figures for married women under 45 who had been married 10 to 20 years, which is perhaps to be expected, as the first ten years is likely to be the most productive period of married life. The rate of childbearing on the part of women of foreign parentage is nearly twice as great as that of native American women. The highest rate is shown by the French Canadian women (2.6 years of married life per child borne), which is more than twice as fast as the rate for native American white women. The average term of married life per child borne is shorter in the first generation of each foreign nationality than in the second, except where the numbers are too small to be significant.

The table next submitted presents the childbearing rate of the classes of Rhode Island women here considered, divided into three groups according to age, the first group including women 15 to 24 years of age, the second 25 to 34 years, and the third 35 to 44 years.

Naturally the older groups have, as shown by this table, been married a longer period than the younger groups, and naturally also the older married women have on the average borne more children than the younger. The youngest group of married women (those between 15 and 24 years of age) have on the average been married 3.4 years. The next older group (25 to 34) have been married on the average 7.9 years, and the oldest group (35 to 44) 15.1 years. The average number of children borne increases from 1.3 per woman for the youngest group to 3.2 for the next older group and to 4.1 for the oldest. The rate of childbearing, however, regularly declines. the youngest group it is one child every 2.6 years on the average, for the next group one every 3.2 years, and for the oldest group one This reflects in part the fact that the earlier years of every 4.1 years. married life are more productive of children than the later years, even within the childbearing period; also, in part, the fact that the lower the age of a woman at marriage, the more productive her married life is likely to be. Clearly the younger groups of married women in the table must have been of a lower average age at marriage than the older groups. The higher rate of childbearing shown for them follows as a natural consequence.

In each age group the women of foreign parentage showed a larger average of children and a faster rate of childbearing than the native white women of native parentage, although the average term of married life varied little between the two classes of women. It is to be noted, however, that the decline in the childbearing rate in the older groups as compared with the younger is much more marked for the women of native parentage than for those of foreign parentage. Thus, for native white women of native parentage the number of years married per child borne was in the oldest age group more than double that in the youngest group, while for white women of foreign parentage it was but 40 per cent greater. Not only did the women of foreign stock show a faster rate of childbearing in the three age groups than the native white women, but the difference between the two classes in this respect was greater the older the age group. the youngest group the childbearing rate was one and one-fourth times as fast for women of foreign as of native stock, in the next oldest group one and three-fifths times as fast, and in the oldest group twice as fast. Similarly, the women of the first generation of foreign stock showed a faster rate of childbearing than the second generation in all three age groups, and the difference between the two generations in this respect was greater in the oldest age group than in the youngest.



## PART II.—OHIO.

### CLASSES OF MARRIED WOMEN OMITTED.

As in the case of Rhode Island, the tabulations for Ohio omitted the following classes of married women: Women over 45 years of age, who would be for the most part beyond the childbearing period; women married less than one year, the great majority of whom had not been married long enough to have children; women whose parents were born in different countries, and whose nationality was therefore of a mixed type; also women the fact of whose prior marriage was clear from indirect evidence in the census schedule. A detailed discussion of the reasons for these omissions may be found in the section devoted to Rhode Island. In addition, there have been omitted from the Ohio tabulations women the nationality of whose husbands was not ascertainable and women who belonged to the less numerous foreign nationalities residing in the State.

### CLASSES INCLUDED.

The city of Cleveland had in 1900 a population of 381,768. The foreign-born population numbered 124,631, or 32.6 per cent of the total. The total number of married women under 45 years of age was 54,722. The number for whom the data in regard to children have been tabulated was 43,624, the difference between these two figures representing the omitted classes under 45 years of age.

The 48 counties selected in Ohio included all the counties in the northern half of the State with the exception of five (Cuyahoga, Lucas, Mahoning, Stark, and Summit), which were omitted because their population is largely urban. These 48 counties had in 1900 a population of 1,578,404, of whom 117,265, or 7.4 per cent, were foreignborn. As over 70 per cent of the population of these counties is rural—that is, resident in country districts or in places of less than 2,500 population—they may be termed rural counties, presenting, therefore, an excellent basis for comparison with the city of Cleveland. In the 48 counties the number of married women for whom childbearing data were tabulated was 42,760.

In this table, as in all the tabulations for Ohio, a more extended classification by nationality is made than in Rhode Island. The Ohio tables distinguish the following nationalities not separately classified in the Rhode Island tabulations: Austrian, Bohemian, Finnish, French, Hungarian, Polish, Russian, Swiss, and Welsh. The entry "Other foreign" is made up of French Canadians, Danes, and Norwegians, the number of whom residing in Cleveland and the selected counties was too small to make separate tabulation worth while.

The white women of foreign parentage shown in the foregoing table are subdivided in the next table into two groups as regards birth-place, those born in the United States and those born in foreign countries. The latter are designated throughout as the first generation, the former as the second generation. As in the case of Rhode Island, the term "nationality" is here used with reference to the birth-place of both parents. That is, "Irish" means "both parents born in Ireland;" "German" means "both parents born in Germany," and so on.

The number included in the second generation of some of the nationalities distinguished in the foregoing table is very small. This is especially the case with the second generation of Austrians, Hungarians, Italians, Poles, Russians, and Swedes, many of whom, belonging to a comparatively recent class of immigrants, had not resided in the United States long enough to have native-born children of childbearing age. For nationalities belonging to an earlier immigration group, the number included in the second generation is comparatively much larger. In Cleveland there were nearly as many Irish, German, and Welsh married women of the second generation as of the first.

While in the city of Cleveland but 33.1 per cent of the married women of foreign parentage under consideration belonged to the second generation, in the selected rural counties of Ohio 62.8 per cent were of the second generation. This is partly accounted for by the fact that nationalities of an early type of immigration made up a considerable proportion of the total foreign nationalities in the selected counties. For example, the English, Germans, Irish, Scotch, and Welsh comprised 85.1 per cent of the total in the selected counties, and but 64.5 per cent in Cleveland. These five nationalities being of an earlier class of immigration than the others, it is natural that the second generation of such nationalities should be compara-The figures show this to be the case, for in Cleveland 44.7 per cent of the women of the five nationalities named belonged to the second generation, compared with 12.1 per cent for the remaining nationalities in the table; in the selected counties the percentage of the five nationalities belonging to the second generation was 69.3 and of the remaining nationalities but 26.

The series of tables first presented for Cleveland and the rural Ohio counties deals with women under 45 years of age married from 10 to 19 years. This group was chosen as comprising women who were married comparatively early in life, that is, before the age of 35, but who at the same time had been married long enough to make their childbearing record significant. In securing the proportion of women bearing no children, it is especially deemed proper to include only women whose married life has continued as long as 10 years.

## PROPORTION BEARING NO CHILDREN.

The next table shows the proportion of women under 45 years of age married 10 to 19 years who have borne no children, the figures for Cleveland and the 48 largely rural counties being presented separately.

Of the native white women of native parentage shown in the foregoing table as residing in Cleveland the proportion that had borne no children was 15.2 per cent, and of the white women of foreign parentage it was 6.3 per cent, a much smaller proportion. In the 48 largely rural counties the difference between these two classes is not very great, 5.7 per cent of the native white women having borne no children as compared with 5.1 per cent of the white women of foreign parentage.

For nearly all classes the percentage of married women bearing no children was somewhat larger in the city of Cleveland than in the rural counties. In the case of native white women the percentage

for Cleveland was nearly three times as great.

These comparisons indicate in a striking way the effect which city life and environment have had in reducing the fecundity of the native American people. In the rural counties the childless married women of native American stock are hardly more numerous proportionately than those of foreign parentage; but in the city of Cleveland the contrast between the two classes in this respect is very marked, as is indicated by the percentages cited above, and this contrast arises largely from the decline in the fecundity of women of American stock under city influences. Upon the fecundity of women of foreign parentage city life has also had some effect, but the effect is much less marked.

The percentage of married women who had borne no children was larger in the second generation of women of foreign parentage than in the first. This was also true of all the individual nationalities, except the English Canadians in Cleveland and in the rural counties

and the Swiss and Welsh in the rural counties.

The smallest percentages of childlessness in Cleveland were shown by the Polish women (2.4 per cent) and by the Bohemian and Russian women (2.6 per cent); the largest by the French women (23.5 per cent). In the rural counties both the smallest and largest percentages are lower, the smallest percentage being 1.9 per cent for the Swedish women and the largest 6.5 per cent for English Canadian and English women.

Of the 3,104 native white women of native parentage in Cleveland here considered, 1,853, or 59.7 per cent, have had not more than 2 children, that is, have had only 1 or 2 children or none at all. The number bearing more than 5 children was 194, or only 6.3 per cent. For the 14,230 white women of foreign parentage the corresponding percentages are 25.3 and 31.4.

Of the 2,808 native white women of native parentage in the rural counties of Ohio, 1,038, or 37 per cent, have had not more than 2 children, while 471, or 16.8 per cent, have had more than 5. For the 16,235 white women of foreign parentage 27.4 and 27.6 are the

corresponding percentages.

A comparison of the first generation of women of foreign parentage with the second generation gives similar results both in Cleveland and the rural counties. The percentage bearing not more than 2 children is larger in the second generation than in the first, the percentage bearing more than 5 children is larger in the first generation than in the second, while the percentage bearing from 3 to 5 children is nearly the same for both generations.

Large families—of more than 5 children—are found to be more common in country than city with the native American mothers, but less common with the mothers of foreign parentage. In Cleveland the proportion of native white mothers possessing large families was but 6.3 per cent; in the rural counties 16.8 per cent. The proportion

of mothers of foreign parentage having large families was 31.4 per cent in Cleveland, while in the rural counties it was 27.6 per cent, or somewhat less.

When the comparison is made by nationality it will be found, however, that of the 16 foreign nationalities represented in the foregoing tables, only 5—the Hungarians, the Irish, the Italians, the Poles, and the Russians—appear to have larger families in the city than in the country. In the case of but one nationality in Cleveland (the Polish) was the proportion of mothers having large families higher than 50 per cent. In the rural counties the proportion did not equal 50 per cent for any nationality.

Each table lists the total number of married women tabulated, the total and average number of children borne, the total and average number of years married, and the average number of years married per child borne. For the purposes of discussing and comparing the data relating to the city of Cleveland on the one hand and the rural Ohio counties on the other, the averages of the two tables have been brought together in the table following. In this table there appear the average number of years married, the average number of children borne, and the average number of years married per child borne, both for Cleveland and the rural counties, in parallel columns.

In Cleveland the average number of children (2.4) borne by the native white women of native parentage is only slightly greater than half the average (4.3) borne by the white women of foreign parentage. In the selected rural counties the average number (3.4) borne by the native white women is three-fourths as large as the average (4.5) borne by the women of foreign parentage. The average for the native white women of native parentage is larger in the rural counties than in Cleveland. This is also true of the average for the women of foreign parentage, but not in so marked a degree. In fact, there are some foreign nationalities which appear to have larger families in the city than in the country. But the difference is not very marked and may be due to factors which are more or less accidental and have no casual relation to urban or rural influences.

In every foreign nationality represented in the foregoing table except the English Canadians, the average number of children is smaller in the second generation than in the first. In Ohio, as in Rhode Island, the smaller average indicated for the second generation is only in slight degree explicable by the probability that the women of the second generation are on the average younger than those of the first generation, and have been married a less number of years. As a matter of fact, it will be noted that in the rural Ohio counties the average number of years married was slightly greater

for the women of the second generation than of the first, although in Cleveland the reverse is true. This being the case, it is clear that the smaller average number of children borne by the second generation can be but partially accounted for by the shorter duration of married

life or the youth of the women of the second generation.

All the foreign nationalities in Cleveland, except the French and the Swiss, show a longer average term of married life for the first than for the second generation. In the case of the French, the average for the second generation is 1.4 years greater than for the first generation. In the rural counties larger averages for the second than for the first generation are shown by the Austrians, English Canadians, Scotch, and Swiss. As the Austrians of the second generation number but 10, no great significance should be given to figures derived from so small a number, and in the case of the other four nationalities the difference between the two generations is very slight.

The last two columns in the foregoing table indicate the average number of years of married life to each child borne. This average eliminates distinctions arising from the different average duration of married life of different classes or nationalities and furnishes a fair basis for a comparative study of fecundity. The smaller this average the more prolific is a class as regards childbearing. In Cleveland, the average was 5.9 years for the native white women of native parentage, 3.2 years for the white women of foreign parentage, and 5 years for the native negro women. These figures may be said to represent the rate of childbearing. Thus for the women of American stock the rate is one child every 5.9 years of married life; for the women of foreign parentage one child every 3.2 years; and for the negro women, one every 5 years.

For the first generation of women of foreign parentage the average number of years married per child borne was 3 years and for the second generation 4.1 years, indicating a fecundity on the part of the first generation over a third greater than on the part of the second. With the exception of the English Canadian and "Other foreign" women, the average was smaller in the first generation of every for-

eign nationality than in the second.

The smallest average—that is, the fastest rate of childbearing—is shown by the Polish women of the first generation, who give birth to children at the rate of one every 2.3 years. This rate is more than two and a half times as fast as that shown by the native American women.

In the rural counties the average for native white American women was 4.1 years, for white women of foreign parentage 3.5 years, for the first generation 3.1 years, and for the second generation 3.7 years. Here again the average was smaller for the first generation of each nationality than for the second, except in the case of the English Canadian women. The smallest average (2.5 years) was shown by the Polish women of the first generation.

For native white women of native parentage the average number of years married per child borne was considerably greater in Cleveland than in the rural counties, while for the women of foreign parentage it was slightly greater in the rural counties than in Cleveland. In other words, while the native white American women were much less prolific in the city than in the country, the women of foreign stock were somewhat more prolific in the city.

The latter fact is doubtless partly due to the fact that the more prolific foreign nationalities have settled in Cleveland in greater proportions than in the rural counties. For example, the nationalities whose average number of children per married woman was 4.5 or over comprised nearly 30 per cent of the women of foreign parentage in Cleveland, but only a little over 10 per cent in the rural counties.

The tables thus far presented have been limited to women married from 10 to 19 years. The following tables extend the data to include women married from 1 to 19 years. They present figures for the average number of children borne, the average number of years married, and the average number of years married to each child borne. The tables distinguish Cleveland and 48 rural Ohio counties.

A comparison of Table 21 with Table 18 shows that by including women who have been married from 1 to 9 with those who have been married 10 to 19 years the average number of years married per child borne is slightly increased, which indicates that more children are borne in the first decade of married life than in the second. Thus the average rate of childbearing for women married 1 to 19 years was one child every 3.3 years, both in Cleveland and in the rural counties, but for women married 10 to 19 years it was one child every 3.5 years in Cleveland and one every 3.6 years in the rural counties. In general the relationship between the different classes and nationalities as regards fecundity is the same whether the comparison is based upon the longer period of married life or the shorter.

## PART III.—MINNESOTA.

## CLASSES OF MARRIED WOMEN INCLUDED.

The tabulations for Minnesota deal with the city of Minneapolis and 21 largely rural Minnesota counties. Minneapolis had in 1900 a population of 202,718, of whom 61,021, or 30.1 per cent, were foreignborn. The proportion of foreign-born population was thus almost the same as in Cleveland (32.6 per cent). The total number of married women in Minneapolis was 37,726. The total number under 45 years of age was 28,956, for 21,615 of whom the data in regard to children have been tabulated. The difference between the two figures comprises the omitted classes, which are the same as those for Ohio—women married less than one year, women whose parents were born in different countries, women the fact of whose prior marriage was ascertainable, women the nationality of whose husbands was unknown, and women belonging to the less numerous nationalities residing in the State.

Eighteen of the 21 counties selected in Minnesota are situated in the southern third of the State. Three (Clay, Becker, and Carlton) are in the central tier of counties. In the case of 7 of the 21 counties, results were tabulated for women both of native and foreign stock. These counties are Blue Earth, Brown, Freeborn, Mower, Olmsted, Steele, and Winona. In the remaining 14 counties, results were tabulated only for women of foreign stock; that is, native white women of foreign parentage and foreign-born white women. These counties are Becker, Carlton, Clay, Cottonwood, Dakota, Jackson, Le Sueur, Lincoln, Nicollet, Renville, Rice, Scott, Sibley, and Watonwan.

The 21 selected counties had in 1900 a population of 399,733, of whom 104,479, or 26.1 per cent, were foreign-born. The selected counties in Ohio had but 7.4 per cent of foreign-born population, a proportion only one-third as great as in Minnesota. The Minnesota counties contained in 1900 no cities of 25,000 or more inhabitants and but two that exceeded 10,000, while nearly 80 per cent of the population resided in places of less than 2,500 or in country districts. In the Ohio counties 70 per cent of the population was rural. Thus the selected counties in Minnesota were even more rural in nature than in Ohio. Tabulations in regard to childbearing were made for 32,354 married women in the 21 counties.

The married women in Minneapolis and the 21 rural Minnesota counties for whom childbearing data have been tabulated are classified in the following tables by color, parentage, and nationality. The Minnesota tables separately specify three nationalities (French Canadian, Danish, and Norwegian) combined in the Ohio tables under the heading "Other foreign," while three nationalities separately specified in the Ohio tables (French, Hungarian, and Italian) are here combined under "Other foreign." The proportion of Scandinavians in Minnesota is noticeable, making up 48.8 per cent of the total white women of foreign parentage in Minneapolis and 30.7 per

cent in the 21 rural counties.

#### PROPORTION BEARING NO CHILDREN.

It will be seen that the proportion of the second generation is considerably larger in the rural counties than in the city of Minneapolis. Of the Minneapolis women of foreign parentage here considered, 33.5 per cent belonged to the second generation, as compared with 47.7 per cent in the rural counties. As in the case of Ohio, this was due to the larger proportion of the earlier immigration groups found in the rural counties. Thus in the rural counties the English, German, Irish, Scotch, and Welsh women, belonging to early immigration classes, comprised 53.9 per cent, or more than one-half of all the women of the first generation here presented, while in Minneapolis they formed but 36 per cent, or about a third, of the total first generation.

As in the case of the Ohio tabulations, the first series of tables presented for the city of Minneapolis and the 21 largely rural Minnesota counties relates to women under 45 years of age, married 10 to 19 years. The following table indicates the proportion of such women who have borne no children, both for Minneapolis and the selected counties of Minnesota:

In Minneapolis out of 2,469 native white women of native parentage who had been married between 10 and 19 years, 314 had had no children. This is a proportion of 12.7 per cent, or about 1 in 8. For the corresponding class of white women of foreign parentage the percentage having no children was 6.9, or a ratio of about 1 in 14. In the rural counties of Minnesota 5.1 per cent of the native white women of native parentage had borne no children, as compared with 2.7 per cent of the white women of foreign parentage. Both in

Minneapolis and the rural counties the proportion of childlessness was about twice as great for the women of native parentage as for

the women of foreign parentage.

For all the classes distinguished in the table, except the first generation of Irish, the proportion of women bearing no children was higher in the city than in the rural counties. For the native white women the proportion was more than twice as great in the city; for the women of foreign parentage two and a half times as great. This would indicate that the conditions of city life affect to a marked degree the fecundity of our foreign as well as our native stock. As regards the foreign stock, however, it may be noted that the figures compiled for Rhode Island and Ohio would not point to the same conclusion (see pp. 744 and 762).

The smallest proportion of childlessness in Minneapolis was shown by the Bohemian women (2.2 per cent), and the largest proportion among women of foreign parentage was shown by the English (12.5 per cent). In the rural counties the smallest proportion was shown by the Polish women (1.5 per cent) and the largest by the English

women (6.5 per cent).

## CHILDLESSNESS AMONG NEGRO WOMEN.

It is noticeable that in Minneapolis the proportion of negro women bearing no children is exceptionally large, being 19.1 per cent, or almost one-fifth. It might be said that the total number of negro women (47) included in the tabulation is not large enough to make it certain that the percentage is really typical. Yet practically the same percentage (19.6) is shown for the negro women in the city of Cleveland, which is based upon a total of 235 (see p. 763), while in the cities of Rhode Island, where the number of women included in the tabulation was 299, the percentage having no children was 23.1 (see p. 744). The close similarity of the results for the three States creates a strong presumption that in fact a high percentage of childessness prevails among married negro women in northern cities.

In most nationalities the difference between the first and second generations as regards the proportion of large families is greater in the city than in the country. Consequently the contrast between city and country as regards this proportion is greater in the second generation than in the first—all of which points to the conclusion that urban conditions have more influence upon the second generation in reducing the size of families than have rural conditions. In the country there is some reduction in the fecundity of the second generation as compared with the first, but it is not so marked as it is in the city.

Of the 2,469 native white women of native parentage in Minneapolis here considered, 1,411, or 57.1 per cent, had borne not more than 2 children, if any at all. The number bearing more than 5 children was 146, or 5.9 per cent of the total. For the 6,600 women of foreign

parentage the corresponding percentages are 29.9 and 23.3.

Of the 1,439 native white women of native parentage in the rural counties, 545, or 37.9 per cent, had borne not more than 2 children, while 214, or 14.9 per cent, had borne more than 5. The corresponding percentages for the 11,942 women of foreign parentage are 14.5

and 43.8.

While in Ohio large families—of more than 5 children—were found to be more common in country than city with the native American mothers, but less common with mothers of foreign parentage, in Minnesota they are more common in the country for all classes distinguished in the table. Large families had been borne by 5.9 per cent of the native white mothers in Minneapolis and by 14.9 per cent of those in the rural counties. Of the mothers of foreign parentage, 23.3 per cent in the city and 43.8 per cent in the country had large For practically all the individual foreign nationalities, too, the percentage of mothers having large families was larger in country The Bohemian mothers in the city numbered but 45, a number too small to make the percentages very significant. case of two nationalities in Minneapolis—Bohemian (first generation) and Polish—the proportion of mothers having large families was greater than 50 per cent. In the rural counties the proportion was as high as 50 per cent in the case of the Polish, Russian, Austrian, French Canadian, Norwegian (first generation), German (first generation), Finnish, and "Other foreign" nationalities.

Comparing first generation with second, it will be found that in Minneapolis the percentage bearing not more than 2 children is greater in the second generation than in the first, and the percentage bearing more than 5 children greater in the first generation than in the second, while the percentage bearing 3 to 5 children is nearly identical in the two generations. In the rural counties the percentage bearing from 3 to 5 children is considerably greater in the second generation, while the percentage bearing more than 5 is greater in the first generation

by a wide margin.

In Minneapolis the average number of children (2.4) borne by the native white American women is but two-thirds the average (3.8) borne by the white women of foreign parentage. In the rural counties the average is 3.4 for the native American women, being again only two-thirds as large as the average (5.2) for the women of foreign parentage. Thus the average is larger in the rural counties, both for the native American and the foreign women.

The average is smaller in the second generation than in the first for all the nationalities in the table except the Scotch and Irish in the rural counties. For the Scotch the average is identical in the

two generations.

In comparing the average number of children borne in Ohio and Minnesota it appears that the average borne by native white women

of native parentage (2.4) is identical in Cleveland and Minneapolis, while the average for the women of foreign parentage is higher in Cleveland (4.3) than in Minneapolis (3.8). Similarly, the average for native white women of native parentage (3.4) is identical in the rural counties of Ohio and Minnesota, but the average for women of foreign parentage is lower in the Ohio counties (4.5) than in the Minnesota counties (5.2).

The average length of time married for the women of Minneapolis here considered was 14 years for the native white American women and 13.8 years for the white women of foreign parentage. In the Minnesota rural counties the averages were 14 years and 14.1 years, respectively. For the first and second generations of foreign women in Minneapolis the average was exactly the same—13.8 years. For the first generation in the rural counties the average was 14.2 years,

and for the second 13.8 years.

The average number of years married to each child borne was, in Minneapolis, 5.7 years for the native white women of native parentage and 3.6 years for the women of foreign parentage. For the first generation of foreign parentage the average was 3.4 years, and for the second generation 4 years. With the sole exception of the Welsh, the average was lower in the first generation of each foreign nationality than in the second. In the rural counties the average for native white women was 4.2 years, and for women of foreign parentage 2.7 years. For the first generation the average was 2.6 years, and for the second 2.9 years. The average was lower for the first generation of each nationality than for the second generation, except in the case of the English Canadians, Irish, Scotch, and "Other foreign." For the English Canadians and Scotch the average was the same in both generations.

Both in Minneapolis and the rural counties, then, the childbearing rate was one and a half times as fast for women of foreign as of native stock, and slightly faster for women of the first than of the second

generation

Comparing city and country, it will be noted that the average number of years married per child borne was greater in Minneapolis than in the rural counties, both for native white American women and for women of foreign parentage. In other words, the rate of

childbearing was higher in the rural counties.

A comparison of Ohio and Minnesota in regard to average years married per child borne will show that while the average for native white women of native parentage is almost identical for Cleveland and Minneapolis and for the selected rural counties of the two States, the averages for women of foreign parentage differ considerably. The average in Cleveland was 3.2 years, and in Minneapolis 3.6 years; while in the rural counties of Ohio it was 3.5 years, and in those of Minnesota 2.7 years. In other words, the rate of childbearing among the women of foreign parentage was higher in Ohio than in Minnesota under city conditions, but lower under rural conditions.

The next two tables extend the figures of the foregoing tables to include women under 45 years of age married 1 to 19 years.

The average number of years married per child borne was 5.2 for the native white women of native parentage in Minneapolis who had been married from 1 to 19 years, and 3.4 for the white women of foreign parentage. As was the case in Cleveland, the childbearing rate was higher for women married 1 to 19 years than for women married 10 to 19 years. The rate of childbearing was one and one-half times as fast for women of foreign as of native stock. For the first generation the average was 3.2 years and for the second generation 3.8 years. The smallest average (2.5 years) was shown by the Polish women of the first generation, the highest (5.1 years) by the Welsh women of the first generation.

In the rural counties the average was 3.7 years for the native white women, 2.6 years for the women of foreign parentage, 2.5 years for the first generation, and 2.7 years for the second. These rates are all slightly higher than the corresponding childbearing rates for women married 10 to 19 years. Here again the childbearing rate is one and one-half times as fast for women of foreign as of native stock. The lowest average (2 years) was shown by the Polish women of the first generation, the highest (3.9 years) by the English women of the

second generation.

Comparing city and country, the average both for native white women of native parentage and for white women of foreign parentage is found to be greater in city than country. It follows that the child-bearing rate was considerably higher in the rural counties than in the city of Minneapolis. The same fact was noted as true in the case of the women married 10 to 19 years. It seems safe to say, therefore, that city conditions in Minnesota have affected fecundity not only among the women of native stock but among those of foreign stock as well.



# PART IV.—COMPARATIVE SUMMARY—RHODE ISLAND, OHIO, AND MINNESOTA.

#### CLASSES OF MARRIED WOMEN INCLUDED.

To facilitate a comparative study of fecundity in the different sections of the United States here considered, a series of combined tables has been prepared, covering the percentages and averages already presented for the State of Rhode Island, for the city of Cleveland and 48 rural counties in Ohio, and for the city of Minneapolis and 21 rural counties in Minnesota. All the tabulations deal with women under 45 years of age, married 10 to 19 years (in Rhode Island, 10 to 20 years).

## PROPORTION BEARING NO CHILDREN.

The following table shows for the total area tabulated the proportion of women under 45 years of age married 10 to 19 years who have borne no children:

A comparison of the percentages in this table brings out the follow-

ing relationships:

1. The percentage of women bearing no children is much higher among the native white of native parentage than among the white of foreign parentage in all areas considered except rural Ohio, and is somewhat higher there.

2. The percentage bearing no children is higher in the second generation of the white of foreign parentage than in the first. The contrast is not so marked in rural Minnesota as in the other areas.

3. The first column presents comparisons between the first and the second generation of each of 15 nationalities of foreign origin. In 8 nationalities the percentage of childless women is higher in the second

generation than in the first.

4. There are 24 such comparisons presented by the figures for the areas of Rhode Island, Cleveland, and Minneapolis, and in all but six instances the percentage is higher in the second generation than in the first. In five of these exceptions—the English Canadian in Cleveland and the French Canadian, the English, the Norwegian, and the Scotch in Minneapolis—the percentage is higher in the first generation. The remaining exception comprises the French Canadian in Rhode Island, for whom the percentage of childlessness is the same in first and second generations. The figures for rural Ohio and Minnesota present 20 comparisons between the first and second generations of foreign nationalities, and in 13 of these the percentage of women bearing no children is higher in the first generation than in the second. This result would seem to indicate that under rural conditions the second generation is about as likely to have children as the first.

In general, the result of these comparisons indicates that the proportion of childless married women is not infrequently smaller in the second generation of a foreign nationality than in the first. But it does not of course follow that the fecundity of the second generation is, even in such cases, greater than that of the first, since that depends upon the prolificacy of the women who bear children; and the difference in the proportion bearing no children may be offset by the counteracting difference in the prolificacy of those who do bear children. It may be assumed that the second generation as compared with the first represents an advance in prosperity and well-being and it is not unlikely that it may be more willing to have some family and yet be more averse to a large family. The average number of children might accordingly be less in the second generation, even though there were relatively fewer women bearing no children.

#### CLASSIFICATION BY NUMBER OF CHILDREN.

The differences in the average number of children are presented in the next table, and it will be found on inspecting the figures that there are only two instances in which the average is larger for the second generation than for the first, one instance being that of the Irish in rural Minnesota, for whom the average number of children was 4.9 in the second generation as compared with 4.7 in the first, and the other that of the Canadian English in rural Ohio, for whom the average was 3.7 in the second generation as against 3.1 in the first. There are also two instances in which the average number of children is the same for each generation, viz, Canadian English in Cleveland and Scotch in rural Minnesota. In all other cases the native women whose parents were immigrants have, on the average, borne fewer children than the women who were themselves immigrants.

It is noteworthy that among women of American stock (native white of native parentage) the average number of children in Cleveland and Minneapolis is exactly the same (2.4), and hardly differs from the average in Rhode Island (2.5), and that the average in these areas is lower by 1, or nearly 1, than it is in rural Ohio and rural Minnesota (3.4). In other words, in rural districts of Ohio and Minnesota the women of native American parentage who were in the second decade of their married life had had on the average one more child than the same class of women in the cities of Cleveland and Minneapolis, or in the State of Rhode Island, which is largely urban.

As regards the several classes of women of foreign stock, the difference between an urban and a rural environment is not usually so

marked, nor is it always uniform. As a rule, however, the average number of children in each parentage class is highest in rural Minnesota and is lowest either in one of the two cities here considered or else in Rhode Island. It will be recalled that the counties selected in Minnesota contained a somewhat larger proportion of rural population (80 per cent) than did the selected counties of Ohio (70 per cent). There are some exceptions to the rule mentioned. For the first generation of English Canadians the average number of children is as great in Rhode Island as it is in rural Minnesota. For the first generation of Bohemians it is as great in Minneapolis as it is in rural Minnesota. The figures for the first generation of Irish indicate that environment has little effect upon their fecundity. On the other hand, the first generations of English, German, and Scotch, like the native American stock, appear to have fewer children in cities than in the country.

Table 37 covers each of the various areas tabulated, showing the average number of years married per child borne for each parentage and nativity class. It may best be discussed in connection with the next table, which is a complete presentation of the data for the areas tabulated, giving also, among other things, the average number of years married per child borne. This brings out in a different way the same facts indicated by previous tables, viz, that fecundity is much greater among the women of foreign parentage than among the native American women of native parentage, and that it is usually greater in the first generation of foreign stock than in the second, and that it is, on the whole, greater in rural districts than in cities. The native white married women of native parentage had borne in the aggregate one child every 5.3 years, while the women of foreign parentage had borne one every 3.2 years. The first generation of the white of foreign parentage, representing the immigrant women, had one child every 3 years, and the second generation one every 3.6 years. For each class of foreign parentage the number of years married per child borne is less in the first generation than in the second, with very few exceptions.

Comparing the different classes of foreign parentage, we find that the fecundity is greatest in the first generation of Polish women, who had on the average one child every 2.3 years; also that the fecundity is least in the second generation of English women, who had, on the

average, one child every 5 years.

lated and for all combined.

The last (Table 41) is made up from Tables 9, 18, 19, 29, and 30. It gives the total number of children borne, the total number of years married, and the average number of years married per child borne, for each of the different areas tabulated and for all the areas combined.
