ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Chief and Clerk of Fire Department.

NEWMARKET, N. H., Feb. 16, 1900.

TO THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET:

In compliance with the law requiring the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to make an annual report to the town containing a list of all the apparatus used for the extinguishment of fire, the condition of the same and the amount expended for repairs, the following report is respectfully presented.

FORCE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The regular force of the department consists of 49 officers and men, as follows: A chief and three assistant chief engineers, two hose companies of 16 men each, and one hook and ladder company of 12 men, and driver for hose wagon, No. 3. Each company is allowed five substitute members, who are paid by their principals when acting as substitutes, but who respond as call firemen on a second alarm of fire,

when they are paid by the town. By courtesy of Agent A. J. Nichols of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., the hose company of 20 men belonging to the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. will respond to a third fire alarm, making a total force of 69 officers and men available for fire duty, all of whom are subject to monthly out-door drill except in winter. The companies are well officered, are under good discipline, and the service done by them at fires during the past year would be creditable to any fire department.

FIRE APPARATUS.

One hose wagon, capacity 1000 feet hose; 2 play pipes; 2 axes; 1 3-gallon chemical extinguisher. Wagon is arranged to lay one or two lines of hose at once, as may be desired. One double runner hose pung of same capacity of hose wagon. Two Gleason & Bailey hose carts, chain winding reels, each with a capacity of 700 feet of hose; 2000 feet Climax knit rubber-lined hose; 1000 feet Paragon hose; 8 flexible play pipes: 4 solid play pipes; 4 Callahan shut-off nozzles; 2 single hydrant gates; 3 Siamese connections; 21 Taber spanners; 6 hydrant wrenches; 18 hose and ladder straps: 4 firemen's lanterns; 4 torches; 2 fire axes; 2 crowbars; 3 reducers; 18 fire hats; 10 coats; 4 pairs rubber boots.

The apparatus is all in good condition, and ready for service, with the following exceptions: Three lengths of Climax hose leak slightly. The 1000 feet of two-inch Paragon hose is eight years old; three or four lengths leak some, but the remainder is in fair condition.

One Gleason & Bailey steel frame truck No. 2; 1 45-foot East Somerville extension ladder; 1 26-foot, 1 25-foot, 1 24-foot and 1 18-foot single ladders on truck; 1 pull-down hook, chain and rope; 4 hand hooks and poles; 2 crotch poles; 2 fire axes; 2 pick-head sledges; 2 crow-bars; 12 rubber buckets; 4 firemen's lanterns; 1 signal lamp; 1 13-inch gong. Reserve ladders 2 30-foot, 1 25-foot and 3 roof ladders.

WATER SUPPLY.

There are 51 hydrants in the hydrant system, with a water pressure of from 70 pounds at hydrant near the high school building, the highest point in the system, to 92 pounds on Exeter street. The cost to the town for the service is \$2,040.00 for the hydrants and \$500.00 voted by the town to pay the taxes of the Water Works Co., making the total cost to the town \$2,540.00 per year. The water service is first-class and the water works system is one of the very best in New England.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The Stevens electric fire alarm system was installed in 1897. It consists of a tower bell-striker in the tower of the Congregational church; 2 18-inch electric mechanical gongs, one on outside of each fire station; one 6-inch gong, at Kent's livery stable; one 6-inch gong, at the residence of the chief; two private tappers and eleven street fire alarm During the past year the system has been maliciously tampered with and obstructed, and on one occasion the whole system was rendered entirely useless for ringing in a fire Nothing of this kind has happened until during the past year, but so persistent and dangerous to the protection of the town did such criminal interference become that the Attorney-General of this state was consulted. A mass of evidence was collected, which was placed on record and certain measures were taken which put a stop to the nefarious work of wrecking our fire alarm system. How any persons making any claim to decency could have attempted to disable the fire alarm system and then have started an incendiary fire is something that passes comprehension, but the records of the Clerk of the Board of Engineers indicate that way.

EXPENDITURES.

By vote of the town at the last town meeting, the pay of firemen was raised from \$12.00 to \$15.00 per year. The sum of \$1,300.00 was raised for payment of members of the department and all other running expenses, except hydrant ser-Seventy-five dollars has been paid for the new doublerunner hose pung; a heavy express wagon was purchased of J. H. Griffin and has been fitted up in a first-class manner for a hose wagon, the total expense being but a little over \$100.00; some repairs have been made on the apparatus and fire alarm system, and the total expenditures of the department for all purposes, exclusive of hydrant service, has been \$1,273,04, leaving \$26.96 of the appropriation unexpended. When it is considered that the last year of the old hand tubfire department cost the town \$1,205.95, it will be seen that the present first-class fire department, equipped with modern apparatus and one of the best fire alarm systems in the state, has cost (including \$175.00 paid for new apparatus) only \$67.09 more to run during the past year than the old hand tub department cost during its last year of service.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS.

To my associates in the Board of Engineers, and to the officers and members of the fire companies, I hereby express my high appreciation of the prompt and fearless manner in which they have performed their duties during the past year, especially at the Durgin block fire, one of the most dangerous that the department has ever been called upon to handle, where with an oil tank containing hundreds of gallons of kerosene oil, surrounded by a raging fire and in a dense smoke, not a man flinched, but every man did his duty.

FIRE LOSSES AND INSURANCE.

Total number of fire alarms during the past year, 9. Number of false alarms, 1. The total amount of fire loss was \$3,250.39. Amount of insurance paid on account of property damaged or destroyed, \$2,700.39.

FIRE RECORD.

Statement of details of fires and alarms, losses and insurance, as reported to the Clerk of the Board of Engineers by property owners and insurance agents.

MARCH 26, 1899. Box 21 was pulled by T. V. Mullen, for a fire in the stable of Gideon McCarthy, at 11.05 P. M., occupied by John Clements as a livery stable. The department responded promptly, and five streams of water were put on the fire, and the water pressure was found good. The fire had gained such headway before being discovered that the stable could not be saved. The flames had spread to the dwelling houses of Joseph Dorr and Annie Ryan, but by diligent work of the firemen it was soon brought under control. The services of Hose Pung, No. 3. were a great help at this fire, laying lines of hose on all sides of the fire, doing more promptly, with but two men, what it takes six to fifteen men to do with the hand reels. Clements' loss, \$400.00; insurance, none. Joseph Dorr. insurance paid on same, \$60.00. Gideon McCarthy's loss, \$1200.00: insurance paid on same, \$1050.00. Annie Ryan, insurance paid on same, \$77.00. The cause of this fire is thought to have been incendiary, as the telephone wires were found crossed and twisted at the battery station after the fire, and it is thought that it was the intention to disable the fire alarm wire instead. Had this happened, the result would have been far more serious, as no alarm could have been given without great delay.

APRIL 3, 1899. A chimney was found to be on fire in the tenement house owned by Mrs. S. E. W. Creighton. The house is situated on the corner of South and Spring streets. The fire was put out by members of the department, without ringing an alarm. Damage \$10.00: insurance paid, \$10.00.

APRIL 19, 1899. At 10.40 A. M., Chief Small pulled the out-of-town call, on a telephone call from Rockingham Junction, which was reported to be a fierce forest fire which endangered the surrounding buildings. A team, with Tiger Hose reel and firemen, was dispatched. On arrival there it was found that the fire was nearly a mile from the R. R. station and there was no danger whatever, and orders were given to return at once.

APRIL 22, 1899. At 2.10 P. M., the out-of-town call sounded, for a fire in a wood lot at Diamond Bridge, owned by Griffin & Durgin. The fire caught from sparks from an engine on the B. and M. R. R., which company agreed to transfer men to fire and pay them for their time at the fire. Assistant Engineer Behan was sent in charge of the crew, who returned at 4.10 P. M.

APRIL 28, 1899. At 11.19 P. M., box 7 was pulled by Fred Keniston for a fire in a shed of tenement house, No. 1, Nichols' Avenue, owned by the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. The response was prompt. But one stream of water was needed to put out the fire. All out at 11.50. Total loss of shed. Value of same, \$75.00; insurance paid on same, \$75.00.

APRIL 29, 1899. At 5.30 P. M., the out-of-town call again sounded, for a forest fire on the lots of Charles Gray and others, in the town of Durham. The Selectmen of that town called for aid and an engineer and crew of men were sent in teams, with the understanding that they should be

paid for their time and expense. At 8.30 the men returned and reported the danger over.

MAY 11, 1899. At 5 o'clock 19. M., box 21 was pulled by Joel Hersom, who was told that smoke was rushing out of a room in the rear of the Montreal House. The response was prompt, but no fire was found, except in the stove, where a fire had been started in an unused chimney, with no draft, which filled the rooms with smoke.

AUGUST 2, 1899. At 5.27 P. M., box 21 sounded for a slight fire in a tenement house at the foot of Central street, owned by Charles H. Haley and occupied by French Canadians, caused by tipping over an oil stove and setting fire to a rug. The fire was put out by M. H. London, with no damage.

November 15, 1899. At 1.35 P. M., box 21 was pulled by Bernard Haines, for a dangerous fire in the grocery store owned by F. H. Durgin. The department made a quick response and found a hot fire raging in the rear of the store near the oil tank. Realizing that every minute's delay meant the destruction of much valuable property and of life, the firemen made the fight of their lives. Five lines of hose were laid and the fire surrounded and confined to the rear of the store and choked out before it got into the oil tank. The all-out signal was sounded at 2.30 and a wet lot of firemen and hose returned to quarters. Fire caused by a customer dropping a lighted match on the floor, which was soaked with oil from the tank. Damage to building, \$525.00; insurance, \$525.00. Damage to contents, \$1,500; insurance, \$978.39.

January 1, 1900. What was intended for box 21 was pushed in from the battery station by Geo. L. Dearborn, for what was thought to be a fire in the bank building on Main street. Smoke was rolling out and over the building from

near the roof. A snow storm was raging at the time and drove the smoke down into the street in dense clouds. The response was prompt, but no fire being found, at 3.50 the two blows sent all hands to quarters. Smoke was caused by burning paper in the furnace at the bank.

DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM,

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box *nearest the fire*, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook as far as it will go, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

Second alarm, 8 blows, for reserve apparatus and call firemen.

- 2 blows after fire alarm indicates fire all out.
- 2-2-2. Out of town fire; companies assemble at stations and await orders.
 - 3-3. Hose 3 call. For chimney fires, etc.
- 3-3-3. Engineers' call; companies report, with apparatus, in front of town hall and await orders.
- 4-4-4. Call to Newmarket Manufacturing Co.'s hose company for assistance.
- U. S. Observatory standard time, by Western Union Telegraph, one blow at 12.30 P. M., daily.

Hook and Ladder Co. and Hose 3 will answer all box calls.

Hose I will answer boxes 12, 21, 32, 34, 45 and 49, with apparatus.

Hose 2 will answer boxes 5, 7, 21, 63, 65 and 82, with apparatus.

It has been the endeavor of the Trustees to procure a larger proportion of standard books than ever before, and thus enhance the value of the library beyond what mere numbers of volumes can give it. The library is well kept, courteous treatment is accorded to all, without distinction, its patrons embrace all classes and conditions in town, and it abundantly vindicates its right to live, and to be generously supported.
