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STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2. To elect by ballot one trustee, one for the term of three years as required by Chapter 162 of the Laws of 1915, being an act in relation to trust funds held by cities and towns.
- Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same. That is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration, and town hall; for Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, the fire department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, town maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments, including the payment of notes and bonds; for Payments to Other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and to pay all other necessary charges arising within the town.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to build a new fire station and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to purchase a tractor and snow plow of suitable size and weight and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to employ and appoint police officers between the ages of 25 and 60, thereby repealing any authority pertaining to the appointment of police officers given to the selectmen at any previous town meeting.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to purchase the Talking Lamp now placed on Main Street and appropriate \$250.00 therefor.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to extend the State Road and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Curfew System forbidding children under the age of sixteen to remain away from home after nine P. M. unless accompanied by their parents.

ANOTHER ROOM NEEDED IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

The extra class room in the high school building will need to be fitted up and put into use next fall. There will be approximately fifty pupils in the seventh grade, and thirty-five each in the eighth, ninth and tenth grades. These classes are too large and ought to be divided in most of their studies. Any high school class of more than twenty-five pupils is too large for first-class work. An extra teacher will take care of the additional room and make it possible to divide some of the largest classes.

OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS.

Under your direction considerable progress has been made in the schools of Newmarket during the past few years. We have better buildings, better equipment and better teaching than we ever had before. A high standard of school work and the welfare of the pupils have

been kept in mind. With full appreciation of what you have done, I wish to submit for your consideration the following recommendations for further improvements.

- 1. That a standard play-ground fence be built around the yard at the South Primary School.
- 2. That the lights and windows of the high school auditorium be protected with wire so that the room may be used for basket ball and gymnasium purposes as well as an auditorium.
- 3. That built-in bookcases be provided for the high school.

THE OPPORTUNITY ROOM.

Since last April fifty-two pupils have been registered in the Opportunity Room. Of these eighteen who have been retarded in school work two or more years, have been helped to make up one year; three not promoted in June have been helped to make up the work which caused non-promotion; thirteen who lacked work in Arithmetic and English have been helped enough to enable them to continue in their own grade; seven have needed special help because of sickness, infirmities, bad school habits or lack of systematic school training; eleven are still in the room working for an extra grade this year. Besides the fifty-two who have been regularly registered, more than a dozen others have been given help in one study for several weeks. It has been a genuine opportunity room. Pupils and parents have asked for its help and have been greatly pleased with the progress that has been made. Since forty pupils not promoted in any year require an extra room and teacher, it has more than paid for itself.
