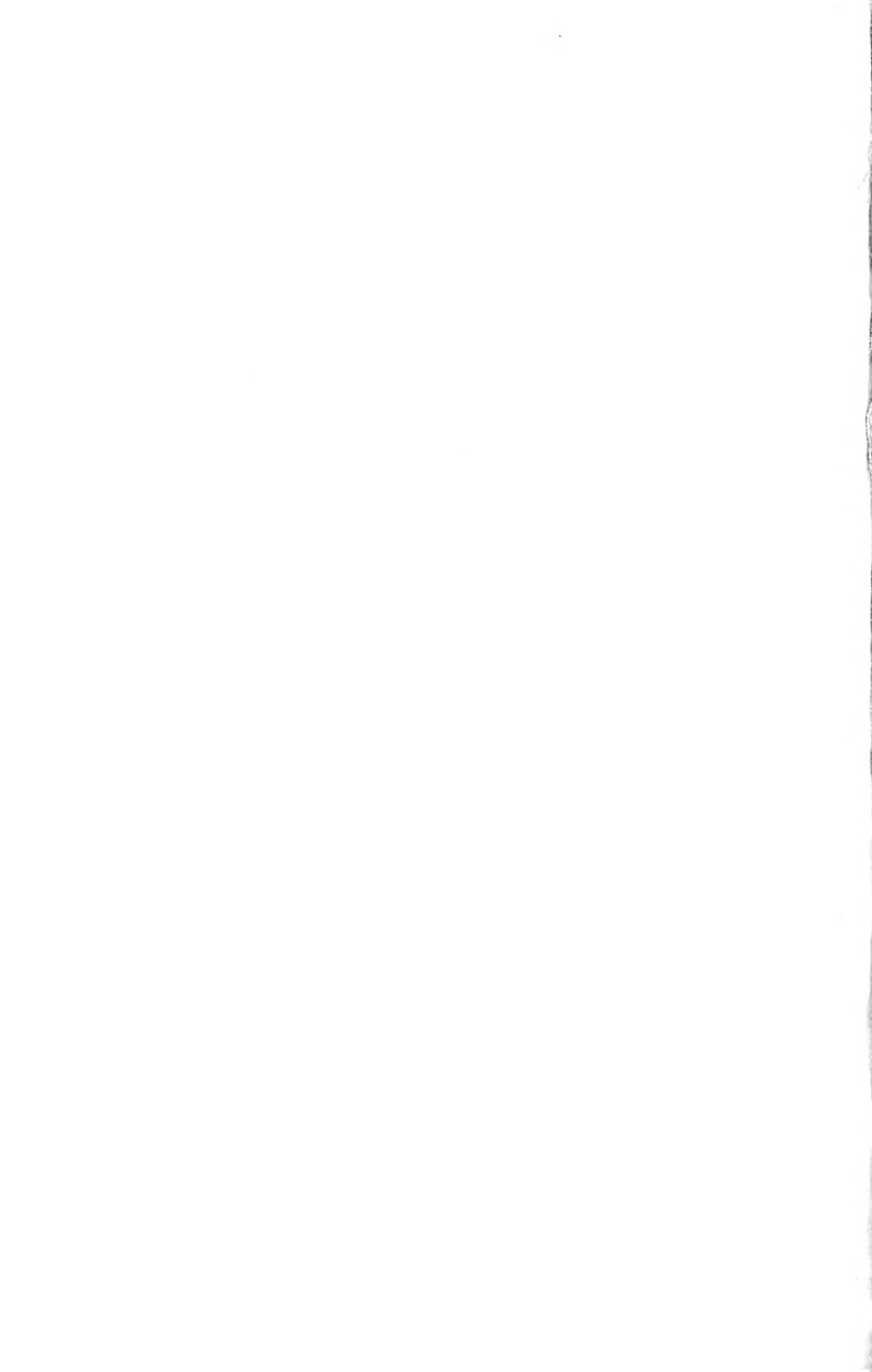

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket
qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To elect by ballot for the term of three years one trustee of the town's trust funds.

Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same. That is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration, and town hall; for Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments, including the payment of notes and bonds; for Payments to Other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and to pay all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to build a new fire engine house, and raise and appropriate the money therefor.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, including the auto tax money, to continue the state road from Four Corners to the Epping Road.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to extend the state road from the corner of Exeter Street and Bay Road near the residence of George M. Mathes, to the Newfields line, and raise and appropriate the money therefor.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND
CITIZENS OF NEWMARKET:

The schools have been doing their usual work, and the teachers as a whole are satisfactory. Some changes have been made in the teaching staff, but, as far as possible, the best teachers have been retained. The new teachers were selected with care, and all came with strong recommendations from the schools where they were trained.

Mr. Vincent Gatto, as Principal, has succeeded in improving the discipline and general good order of the High School. He has had excellent help and co-operation from the assistant teachers. Mr. William E. Boland, as submaster, is a strong support, and has won the respect of the pupils under his charge. It was found necessary to have an extra teacher in the High School and Miss Mary McCooley is assisting in the Latin and French classes. Miss Gabrielle Lanouette has charge of the Domestic Arts and French.

REPAIRS.

As the new boiler was installed in the Primary school, it was found that the old chimney was not adequate. A new chimney was built, and this heating plant is now in excellent condition, and the building is properly heated. The desks at the new High School have been refinished, and are much more satisfactory to work on. New shades were installed in the Primary schools, also new shades were put into the new High School where the water had defaced the old ones. The roof of the new High School has been repaired and is guaranteed not to leak for five years. The heating plant at the new High School has never been satisfactory, as the chimney did not give a good draft. It was decided to install a blower in order to reinforce the draft. Since the blower was installed, the heating plant gives satisfaction. In order to comply with the State Law, it was necessary to put safety locks on the Primary school house and the old High School house. The expense was much greater than we were led to expect. One side of the Primary school house will need to be shingled very soon. The wood work and metal exposed to the weather on the new High School house needs painting. During heavy rains the water runs through the walls into the High School rooms. The Domestic Arts rooms are frequently flooded, and the room becomes unfit to use. Something must be done to prevent this flooding of these rooms.

Twelve pupils graduated from the High School, and of the twelve, four have entered college or some higher institution of learning.

The Agent of the State Board of Education advises that the Domestic Arts course be extended and that work in home economics be offered during the four years of the Senior High School. If this suggestion is adopted it will necessitate additional teaching force and equipment. One of the most perplexing problems of education arises from 1st, the increasing demand for greater educational opportunities. 2nd, Better schools and teachers and at the same time, 3rd, that there shall be economy in the expenditure of public funds. We can all see where there is need of more educational opportunity. In Newmarket each year there are forty or more boys and girls who complete the 8th grade of work, or become sixteen years of age, and drop out of school to engage in some kind of work. Most of them obtain work in the Newmarket Mills, and their education, so far as books are concerned, ceases. In a short time these boys and girls find they have entered a blind alley, so far as advancement is concerned. They cannot hope to rise far in the work and they are of limited value to the corporation that owns the mills. If a continuation school could be established where these people could be taught the things necessary for them to know, they might become more valuable to the corporation that employs them, and thus more valuable to themselves and the community. These are some of the questions I am asking you to consider for your schools.

HEALTH.

While there has been much sickness in the other communities, Newmarket has been remarkably free from serious illness. Is this not, to some extent, due to the good work of our school nurse, Miss Ina Marden? As she makes her home in Newmarket, we get a larger part

of her services. Every morning her office is thronged with pupils from all of the schools in town, and they receive her unstinted attention. I am giving a brief outline of some of the things Miss Marden has done during the school year. She urges the importance of vaccination upon the attention of the parents. The children should be vaccinated during the summer vacation in order that they may legally enter school at the opening in September. During October and November, 67 children were vaccinated. To look after this work requires considerable of the time of the school nurse, when her services are much needed in other directions. There is danger of injury to the child while the arm is sore, and I urge all parents having unvaccinated children to have the work done during the summer vacation. The State Law makes it imperative that all children be vaccinated in order to attend school.

The nurse has made twenty-six visits to the homes in Newmarket, to render aid in cases demanding the attention of a trained nurse, and to consult and advise with parents in regard to needed attention to their children.

Milk is being served in the Primary school. But this service should be extended to all of the schools. Milk is the cheapest, and most necessary food that can be purchased. We hope that another year we may be able to make arrangement to have milk from tested cows served in half-pint bottles to all of the schools.

Hot luncheon is another of the activities which is urged in order to serve the children who come from a distance, and who now have to eat a cold lunch.

The nurse finds many of the children who need work done on their teeth. Some of the children come from homes where there is not the money to pay for this work, or where the parents do not understand the importance of a healthy mouth. There are a number of cases where children need glasses to correct defects in vision, also

where diseased tonsils and adenoids need to be removed. These are a few of the things the nurse finds in her work. The need for funds is imperative, but where are the funds to remedy these defects? Here is worthy work for the Red Cross or the Parent Teacher Association.
