THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the (L. S.) County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions; including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1937.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

8. Shall the Town of Newmarket, N. H., adopt the provisions of Section 26 of Chapter 378 of the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, relating to bowling alleys being a public nuisance when situated within twenty-five rods of a dwelling house, store, shop, schoolhouse or place of public worship.

9. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$.....; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$.....

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

Old school records have been in demand recently on account of old-age pensions, naturalization, and other legislation calling for statistical information. Through the efforts of Mr. Arthur Bergeron of the Federal Works Progress Administration research, the following registers located at the Town Hall have been listed:

Registers of years previous to 1902 are missing, with the above exceptions. Members of the families of former school officials, finding and restoring any of these registers, would do a great favor to the district. Mr. Bergeron also found extra copies of seven town reports between 1889 and 1914 to fill gaps in the Superintendent's file of School Reports. Mrs. Peter Levesque also furnished three missing reports between 1877 and 1890. Copies of Newmarket Town Reports published in the following years are still wanted and may be left at the High School: 1860 (and previous), 1862-1872, 1875, 1876, 1882, 1883, 1888, 1894-1906, 1911-1913, 1919.

The high school enrollment has increased 26 over last year, while the total enrollment increased 18. The high school staff remains the same as last year, with the addition of Mr. Lewis L. Montrone, teaching junior high subjects. Mr. Kenneth Norris served as cadet teacher during the first half of this year. Cadet teachers are university undergraduates, usually seniors, who have specialized in education and in the subjects they are allowed to teach. They are carefully selected and especially recommended by the head of the Education Department, and are furnished with state credentials similar to those of a regular teacher. They usually begin by observing regular teachers at work, gradually taking over some classes, with the guidance of the regular teacher. They are also a great help in supervising study periods and assisting in other school activities. Newmarket has had the services of some excellent men in this way, at no cost, or only a small fraction of a regular teacher's salary. The arrangement is of mutual benefit. At the beginning of their practice teaching, these teachers have a better professional equipment than the full college graduate of a few years ago, and are only excelled by those who have completed their practice teaching and are ready for permanent positions.

Newmarket High School was cited in the State Secondary Reports of last year for an attendance record of over 97% for eight consecutive years in the senior high and thirteen consecutive years in junior high, also for a low tardiness record of less than 0.5 per pupil for two and for three years respectively, also for excellence in the annual report of work accomplished. State tests given to seniors to test their continued ability in the "fundamentals," showed Newmarket above the state median in both tests (place geography and English forms).

With the cooperation of the Parent-Teacher Association, the School Nurse Miss Margaret Macdonald, the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association and the Exeter Hospital, as well as parents and young people, tests were administered, followed by X-ray examinations when deemed advisable, to discover early conditions needing treatment and so prevent expensive and distressing experiences later. Newmarket was one of the first communities in the nation to be selected for this type of work, which has aroused intense interest among health authorities throughout the country as a proved measure for human welfare and economic saving to the citizens and taxpayers.

In the interests of safety and comfort, the stairway at the Stone School was changed, and a vestibule has been built.

Per-pupil costs remain low, as compared with the average of the state, Newmarket being 10% below the median on high school costs and 29% on elementary costs.

At the last annual meeting of the District, Mr. D. James Brady was elected to fill the vacancy on the School Board.
