TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket, in the (L. S.) County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to Other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1938.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II roads known as Epping and Ash Swamp Roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$291.63 or will (will not) accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$

8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to purchase the present town dump.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the proper care and sanitation of the Town dump.

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for a Sesquicentennial celebration.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purchase of a town grader. (Balance due over rental.)

12. To see if the town will vote to accept Boardman Avenue. (Petition)

13. To see if the town will vote to accept the following streets, Elder, Forest, Grape and Cedar. (Petition)

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for graveling and tarring a piece of Lamprey Street beginning at No. Main Street, running straight ahead and joining New Durham Point Road, a stretch of about 600 feet, along which six houses are located. (Petition)

15. To see if the town will vote to allow pari mutuel betting on harness horse racing in Newmarket, as set forth in the laws of the state of New Hampshire. (Petition)

16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a certain sum of money as partial payment on temporary loans.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the responsibility of appointing Trustees for John Webster Hall Library, as outlined by a vote taken by the Directors of the Newmarket Manufacturing Company on December 23rd, 1936.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to construct a new sidewalk to begin at the Sisters' Home and to extend to the entrance of the High School building. (Petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the issuance and distribution of printed matter publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association.

A remarkable feature of the above tabulation is that it shows an increase of 19 pupils over last year, while the total enrollment has declined 21.

School costs are low in Newmarket, as compared with the average of the state, as shown in the following table:

The per pupil cost of teachers' salaries is 26% less in Newmarket than in the state as a whole.

As soon as the financial condition of the town permits,

the restoration of teachers' salaries to their normal point should be resumed. Teachers' salaries are planned to begin at a low point, considering the time and expense of preparation and the qualifications demanded. It is only fair that moderate and regular increases should be made, up to the conservative maximum that has been adopted in Newmarket. Such increases for next year would call for about \$500, had they been included in the estimate. The amount would be less in succeeding years, as more teachers arrived at the limit.

At the last annual meeting of the District, Mr. John L. Jordan was elected to the School Board. New teachers this year include Miss Irene M. Doherty (a four-year graduate of Framingham Normal School) and Mr. Norman E. Demers (a graduate of Plymouth Normal School), replacing Mr. Montrone, who is on leave of absence to attend the University of New Hampshire. Soon after my last report was written, Mr. Channing Folsom, a former teacher, superintendent of schools, and State Commissioner of Education, and recently a venerable and beloved resident of this town, was called by death. He was for several years Moderator of the District and presided at the school meetings until advancing age made this impossible.

The report of the school Nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, shows that 600 pupils were examined at the annual examination, with an average of several additional examinations daily for special needs. The following conditions were apparent, and reported to the homes: 10% underweight, 65; defective vision, 12; deformity, 6; defective teeth, 324; diseased tonsils, 42; defective breathing, 35. Many of these conditions were remedied by attention to diet and regimen or treatment by family physicians, clinics, or specialists. Most children, of course, are found to be making normal progress in growth and general physical condition. Recent tests with the Audiometer measured partial or total loss of hearing in a number of cases. Some of these individuals would doubtless profit by instruction in special schools, but an effort is made by our regular teachers to give such pupils special at-

tion in the classroom. The local Red Cross has been most generous in providing means for the Dental Clinic, glasses, and other cases of special need, in cooperation with the School Nurse.

Over 25,000 correspondence courses are offered on every conceivable subject for adults unable to profit by resident instruction. Many of these courses are very valuable; but unfortunately some are not so reliable. Persons thinking of taking up such work would do well to communicate with the Superintendent of Schools or the National Home Study Council, Washington, D.C.

This year our schools are joining in the observance of the 150th anniversary of the Constitution of the United States of America, which was ratified by New Hampshire as the deciding state June 21, 1788. Our government "of the people, by the people, and for the people" is the theme of special study in the eighth grade and in the senior year of high school. The aim of the schools is to guide to better citizenship in the family, school, and community now, as well as to prepare the future voter for intelligent consideration of public issues.
