TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the (L. S.) county of Rockingham in said State. qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

To raise such sums of money as may be neces-2.sarv to defrav town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. That is to say: to raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries. town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property including the police department; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes. including the decoration of soldiers' graves, for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprise, for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county

taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

3. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August 1st, 1945.

5. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

6. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as and raise and appropriate and set aside for said purpose the sum of \$; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$296.34.

7. To see if the town will vote to move the four poplar trees on Elm Street. These trees have proven to be a nuisance to the Sewer Drainage and they plug up the Elm Street sewers. The cost of removing these trees will be only what labor the Highway Department could charge. (Petition)

8. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$1500 to resurface and tar the extension of Beech Street to Main Street. (Petition)

9. To se if the town will vote to do away with the printing of The Cemetery Trust Fund report in the yearly town report; and that only the financial report is to be printed, and the newly created trust funds of the year shall be printed.

10. To see if the town of Newmarket will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee consisting of one member from the Board of Selectmen, one member representing the Catholic Church, one member representing the Community Church, two members representing the service veterans, two members representing the property tax payers, two members representing the industries, one member of the Fire Department and one member of the School Board. Additional members may be appointed by the afore mentioned committee, but the membership of the committee shall not exceed fifteen, and to see if the town of Newmarket will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500 to cover the cost of professional services and any administrative expenses of the committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to make a study of the possibility of erecting a memorial building, which will serve the business, social, and recreational needs of the community.

This committee's work shall consist of recommendations for a proposed site, type, and plan of building, estimates cost, services to be rendered, and its administration and supervision. This committee will report back to the next regular town meeting a result of its study, unless the present war terminates at an earlier date. In this event, the Selectmen shall be instructed at the call of the committee to hold a special town meeting to take action on this report. (Petition)

11. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

12. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the bridge known as the Moone-Light Bridge on the Lee Road. That is,to say, to see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to repair said bridge or raise the sum of \$3500.00, to be matched by a like sum by the State Highway Dept. and build a permanent cement bridge.

13. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

NEWMARKET HIGH SCHOOL

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

February 1, 1945.

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is my privilege to submit my third annual report as Superintendent of your schools. The report includes a brief discussion of our objectives, a report of teachers employed, some of the more important physical changes and improvements in the buildings, a brief discussion of the pupils' achievements, the report of the Headmaster of the High School, a music and health report.

Education in America continues despite the war which has caused a tremendous shortage of teachers and the curtailment of school supplies and equipment. Many people are sponsoring extravagant ideas as to what the postwar world and postwar education will be like. Although there will undoubtedly be some changes in organization of school units, curricula and methods of instruction, the fundamental principles of "Educating Youth for Citizenship" will remain the same. We continue to hold as our general objectives the well known Cardinal Principles of Education, namely: Health, Command of Fundamental Processes, Worthy Home Membership, Vocation, Citizenship, Worthy Use of Leisure Time and Ethical Character.

Our conception of TRAINING FOR CITIZENSHIP will necessarily be broadened in that "Youths and adults are now faced with the requirement that they must be WORLD citizens, their education must include an understanding of all people everywhere, and they must become expert in the ability to get along with others who possess different philosophies of life. When the economy and society change direction or enlarge in scope, education, too, must change and enlarge for otherwise youth will be trained in the historical rather than modern ways of life.

We need an enlargement of the scope of education for youth to enable boys and girls to meet the demands of this new dynamic air age in which the whole world has become smaller than were the thirteen American colonies when public education first began." *

PARTICIPATION IN THE WAR EFFORT

During the three years since Pearl Harbor. American boys and girls have saved more than \$1,170,000,000 through purchase of war stamps and bonds. The children of Newmarket have, through their own efforts and those of their parents and teachers certainly done their part. Through the continuation of this good work, children have an opportunity to develop strong habits of thrift, civic responsibility and knowledge of war finance. They have also helped to further the war effort by collection of waste paper and milkweed pods. The latter project, sponsored by the government this past fall has been for the purpose of accumulating milkweed floss to replace "kapok"-a material used in life belts and aviators' suits and which is no longer available because it came from what is now "enemy held territory."

TEACHERS

The employment and retention of qualified teachers

*Air-Age Education Committee—American Association of School Administrators, November 1944. is one of the major problems now involved in the further maintenance of our objectives. Of the nations' 900,000 teachers, over one-third are new to their jobs. In this supervisory union of forty-three regular teachers, it has been necessary to employ fifty-three in the past two years. The chief reason for their leaving our area has been to secure more remunerative positions elsewhere.

In the elementary schools we were fortunate to retain the same faculty members as we had last year, namely:

Grade 1—Mrs. Lillian Witherell of Plymouth Normal and University of Vermont Summer School.

Grade 2-Miss Ellen Deem of Keene Teachers College.

Grade 3—Miss Jennie Young, Summer School at University of New Hampshire, Vermont, Plymouth and Keene.

Grade 4—Miss Irene Morin of Keene Teachers College.

Grade 5—Miss Eva Sanborn, Summer School at Gorham, Maine Normal, Plymouth and Keene, N. H.

Grade 6—Miss Mary Louise Lanoix of Keene Teachers College.

In the high school, Headmaster McCaffrey has continued his excellent work of former years, and with the exception of Miss Martha Lefebvre, commercial teacher, is working with an entirely new faculty. New teachers at the high school for the year 1944-45 are: Mr. Victor Smith of Durham and a graduate of the University of New Hampshire succeeded Mr. William Malone as teacher of Mathematics, Physics and Manual Training. Mr. Malone has resigned and accepted a position as Headmaster of the High School at Caanan Vermont. Miss Catherine Clark of Merrimac, Massachusetts, and a graduate of Colby College in Waterville, Maine replaced Miss Beatrice Mercurio who resigned. Miss Clark teaches English, History and Biology.

Miss Dorothy Droney of Milford, Massachusetts and Massachusetts State College replaced Miss Martha Riddle. Miss Droney teaches English, Latin and first year Spanish, the latter of which was added to the curriculum this year for the first time. Spanish will undoubtedly become a popular foreign language as we have more in common with our South American neighbors who will become less distant from us with increased improvements and use of aviation facilities.

Miss Helen Higgins of Edgertown Massachusetts, and Regis College succeeded Miss Elizabeth Saunders who resigned after thirty-four years of faithful service in Newmarket. Miss Higgins had had some previous experience in New Hampshire and Rhode Island and teaches social studies.

Miss Catherine Stulb of Portsmouth and Plymouth Teachers' College replaced Mr. Thomas Cummings as a teacher of social studies. Miss Stulb is also the coach of the Girls' Athletics.

In the Home Economics department, Miss Yvette Harrington of South Sudbury, Massachusetts, and Framingham Teachers' College succeeded Miss Harriett Thompson who resigned to be married. Miss Harrington has had considerable experience in hospital dietetics in New Rochelle New York, Arlington Massachusetts and Somerville, Massachusetts before coming to Newmarket.

To increase the time allotment for music and to lighten the load of the high school teachers, Miss Ethel Lovley of Dorchester, Massachusetts, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music was engaged to succeed Miss Martha Walker. Miss Lovley's time is divided between supervising music in the elementary schools, teaching orchestra, glee club and general music at the high school and teaching seventh and eighth grade English at the high school. Miss Walker had served diligently in Newmarket and surrounding towns for a period of forty-four years.

We have been fortunate to have available two substitute teachers as well qualified as Mrs. Mildred Rooney and Mrs. Leona P. Foster.

Newmarket is also fortunate to be able to secure the services of a man as well qualified as is Mr. Walter Foster to coach the high school basketball team. In addition to receiving valuable physical training, the boys on the squad are showing successful results in competition with teams representing schools with considerably larger enrollments than Newmarket.

To conform with requests from leaders in industry and agriculture for help from high school aged pupils and to eliminate the necessity of pupils making the decision to go to school OR work, the high school is on a one session day starting at 8:15 a. m. and closing at 1:20 p. m. This allows pupils to go to school AND work, providing time for several hours of work after school.

The rearrangement of the high school laboratory tables and sinks has been practically completed since my last report and hopes are still high of installing gas in the science laboratory and in the home economics room. This last mentioned item is now a matter of waiting for labor and materials. New lights have been purchased for the Stone School and buildings continue to be in good general repair. New modern text books have been purchased to replace obsolete and worn books as finances would permit. We have continued the purchase of new reading books and health is being stressed as much as possible by classroom work and outdoor play. Arithmetic and reading have been weak subjects during the past years as shown by standardized achievement tests; extra time is being allowed for bringing the children's knowledge of these subjects up to standard.

The following pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the school year 1943-1944. The children and their parents deserve commendation for these records showing such faithful attendance.

In behalf of the School District, I wish to express appreciation to the Newmarket Parent-teacher Association for the helpful work which that organization has done during the past year.

A more detailed account of High School activities will be found in the report of the Headmaster which follows this report.

SUGGESTED CHANGES IN PHYSICAL PLANTS

Since a recent survey and conference with a representative of the State Department of Education the decision has been made that "it would probably not be financially and educationally economical to renovate the old high school building for school purposes." It would appear that in thinking of a long time program in Newmarket, an auditorium-gymnasium might be added to the present high school building allowing space in the present high school auditorium, (which is now too small for basketball and large community gatherings for two classrooms which could house the fifth and sixth grades. This would allow for abandonment of the Stone School house which is now poorly located with very little satisfactory space for outdoor play. Although the building is in general good condition, it is not well insulated; toilet facilities are not adequate and the natural lighting is not good. It would be advantageous if the fifth and sixth grade children could be under the same administration as the high school and be a part of a larger unit. The additional operating expense of a larger high school building would probably be no greater than that of the Stone School. A new gymnasium, connected to the high school building, would also allow for a more expanded physical education program for all pupils during the regular school day. This would be in keeping with the present school tendencies—caused by the lack of physical fitness of so many of our nation's potential fighting men of today.

"Organized athletics are of value, but they provide physical training for only a comparatively small number. Our young people cannot do their best work in school nor can they grow up physically fit to take on the responsibilities of life unless they are provided with some organized physical training." (From The Report of the New Hampshire Council on Postwar Planning and Rehabilitation, Dec. 1944).

Another alternative might be a new elementary school house—one that would house the first six grades, provide an auditorium and be located where there is room for an ample playground.

There should also be available at the high school, facilities for more mechanic arts or other vocational work.

American wage and living standards are the highest in the world. It is of vital concern to the future of the town and state that our program of vocational education be broadened to make possible the preparation of more of our youth for occupational effectiveness. The great majority of our high school graduates do not continue their formal education beyond high school. Those who leave that institution without marketable skills find difficulty in normal times in getting other than blind alley jobs with little opportunity for advancement without further training.

In home economics education throughout the country, more than 1,000,000 girls are now being assisted in making valuable home front contributions to the war effort. Many high school girls take over a large part of the work of their homes while mothers are engaged in war production work.

We must not lose sight of the fact that our schools are essential to the well being of our country. The children of today will have much to say about what kind of world we live in tomorrow. They are the hope not only of America but of the world as well.

A brief report of the two vocational courses now offered in the Newmarket high school presents briefly a few of the activities which are not a part of the usual daily routine.

COMMERCIAL

"At present there are seventy-five pupils in the high school taking the Commercial Course. We are equipped with a mimeograph machine, an adding machine, and many typewriters. Because of the limited number of office machines, it was thought that it would be very helpful in enlarging the students knowledge if they visited a modern business office.

During the year the Office Practice class, consisting of seniors, visited the John Hancock Insurance Co. office in Boston. Among the machines which the students saw was the ediphone which handles 90 per cent of the company's correspondence—the ediphone is being used to a large extent in modern offices today and it would be worthwhile to have a machine in this school in order to follow the up-to-date trend. Other machines seen by the students were the following: the International Business Machines, the addressograph, the photostat, and machines similar to that used for V-Mail.

The Dover Court House was also visited by the seniors and that was for the main purpose of getting a better understanding of legal procedures, as well as practice in what is required of a court reporter or stenographer.

Commercial students from Newmarket High School have participated in International Contests in Bookkeeping, Shorthand, and Typewriting. Newmarket has gained recognition with many students winning cash awards for exceptional work submitted while others were awarded certificates for their achievement.

The Commercial Department aids the school and the community greatly by mimeographing programs, business forms, etc. As the years go on, more office machines should be introduced in the department in order that it might be able to continue what is expected of it."

HOME ECONOMICS

The Home Economics department has determined to aid students needs. As a result, a Home Economics Club was formed and the girls in the junior and senior classes sponsored a very successful Hallowe'en party for the school. A combined shopping trip and an evening's entertainment in Boston have been planned for March, as well as another school party on St. Patrick's day. The dancing classes were another means by which the girls were afforded pleasure and more poise and self-assurance.

The student's problems at home are discussed, analyzed, and from a series of possibilities acquainting the students with real community problems, is enriching their program as well as their individual minds. A desire to make known to them the possible resources and ways to use them is important. A series of nutritional educational films has stimulated an interest in adequate daily necessities for each student and her family. Preventive measures have included efforts to reduce consumption of less nutritive foods and to bring improvements in food selection. Each one has become more social and community minded as evidence of her attendance and cooperation in the Club.

The students have acquired a knowledge of how to meet successfully their clothing, food and home problems. The Family course has attempted to give them an opportunity to learn how to use their time, money, and energy to make life rich and satisfying. They have had help in achieving poise and self-confidence and in acquiring skill in human relationship.

War has intensified the interests of all of us in the health field. When peace comes there will be an even greater need for a thorough, well-integrated health and home economy program in the high school to equip the young people for making the richest possible contribution to American life.

The lunchroom has given the Freshman and Sophmores the advantage of learning to use recipes and food preparation procedures. They have been bookkeepers and cashiers, serving-girls and food orderers. They know the need for refrigeration and gas stoves and the inadequate arrangement of the laboratory for efficient handling of food. The limited time is an important factor in the adequate luncheon. We have hoped to bring satisfaction and a stamina pickup by serving nutritious sandwiches and milk as well as soup and cookies.

To timulate thought on an important problem which must be solved in the future, I wish to quote from a recent National Education Association publication pertaining to Compulsory Military Training:

"Seldom have the American people faced an issue in national policy which was freightened with greater possibilities for good or ill than one which confronts them today. That issue is whether at the close of this war we should inaugurate a program of compulsory military training, introduce some form of indirect training for military duty such as camping of a year of national service, or merely continue in their postwar period, with no ESSENTIAL CHANGE, the usual program of limited military training.

The issue is not only crucial but important. Already it has reached the halls of Congress, and is being discussed by many government officials and military leaders—including President Roosevelt and General Marshall. It is the theme of magazine articles, editorials and sermons. It is becoming a frequent topic of general conversation. This is as it should be in a democracy. The people should set themselves with steadfast purpose to weigh the evidence and to choose intelligently the path we are to follow."*

In conclusion, I again wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, parents, pupils and other citziens for their continued cooperation in the accomplishment of our work.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

January 15, 1945.

The fourth year of the war has continued to show its influence on our schools. Several pupils have dropped out to accept full time employment in industry and the usual influx of our boys into the armed forces has further reduced our enrollment. Attendance has dropped off due in part to epidemics and unusual problems at home which would not be likely to arise in a normal year. However, statistics released by the State Board of Education show that this is a state trend and that our local record compares very favorably with other schools.

Changes in the curriculum this year included the introduction of Spanish which is designed to emphasize the culture of Latin America and to expand the offerings in foreign languages.

This is in keeping with the public school trends. The addition of the course World Problems which covers a large field of vital topics such as finance, housing, citizenship, the peace, labor, health, and propaganda provides for the seniors an excellent opportunity to familiarize themselves with the current happenings of the day. A fusion course in Economics and Consumer Education has met with popularity and stresses the part of the consumer in his everyday dealings in the market. Civics has been moved up to grade 9 and is placing a new emphasis on vocations. Georgaphy has been offered in grade 8 and in view of the war this seems extremely timely. The extension of the music program has fulfilled a need and shows promise of better things to come. Interest in the orchestra is growing and indications are that in the future we will be

having a growing unit which will be a distinct asset to the school.

Our first invitation to present a radio program was extended to us by Station WHEB on Thanksgiving this proved to be a large success and it is hoped that more opportunities will be available for such expression in the future.

Many schools have been forced to discontinue the publication of their school yearbooks due to war conditions. We are pleased that under the direction of Miss Martha Lefebvre that we not only are continuing to issue our year book but that it is expanding and is one of the better contributions of our schools.

In keeping with the times, Athletics have been continued as basketball showed a more enthusiastic reception than for several years. Schedules include contests for the Junior Varsity as well as the regular teams. Equipment was purchased so that our teams were second to none in appearance in this section. The organization of a "cheering team" with neat, attractive outfits has put new enthusiasm into our athletic program and has been a factor in improving school morale.

Dancing classes including the older types were held for the students. The cooperation of the Parent-Teacher Association was very helpful in making this program a success. It is a commendable activity which has made instruction possible for over 75 per cent of the school.

A study of the proposed school programs for the post-war period is under way with the intention of being ready to recommend changes to keep up with the times. The war no doubt will not only make new demands in the present but will require a revitalizing of our educational system to increase its effectiveness in the future.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

January 15, 1945.

Mr. J. A. Osgood, Superintendent of Schools.

Dear Sir:

It gives me much pleasure to submit to you my first annual report concerning the work of the music department of the Newmarket Public Schools.

The pupils, as a whole, are very much interested in the study of vocal music and they have made marked improvement since the beginning of the school year.

New books have been placed in the high school, the second, third and sixth grades.

The object of school music is to instill in the pupil an enjoyment and love for the best in music. To attain this objective the study of rudiments, note reading, rhythm and good tone quality are being stressed in the singing of beautiful songs.

Only a beginning has been made in the instrumental work of the music department. In the high school there is an orchestra of ten interested and enthusiastic boys and girls who are making excellent progress. There are not enough children studying instruments. I hope that parents will encourage their children to study some instrument, this coming year. The high school should eventually own at least a drum set, horns, a trombone and a bass viol. These instruments would be lent to talented and interested pupils.

As more children will in the future, listen more than they will perform, there will be introduced in all of the schools, a course of listening lessons and music appreciation. We look forward to having a library of records for this very important subject.

In closing I wish to thank you, the members of the school committee, the principals and teachers for the hearty cooperation which they have given me.

May we continue to work together in order to realize the slogan of the National Music Educators' Conference.
