Mammoth Dewberry or Russian Blackberry.

The plants are perfectly hardy and healthy, and remarkably productive. The flowers are very large and showy. The fruit, which ripens with the Mammoth Cluster Raspberry, is often one and a half inches long, by one inch in diameter, soft, sweet and luscious throughout, without any hard center or core.

As the Dewberry roots only from the tips, and does not sprout like blackberries, this will be much more desirable for garden culture, and the training habit of the plant will render winter protection easily accomplished in cold climate where that protection may be necessary.

Russian Apricot.

Among the fruits whose cultivation is sadly neglected, we find the Apricot; and why, is more than we can tell, for it is among the oldest and most delicious fruits. It is hardy as the plum and has fewer enemies. It is much hardier than the peach and does not suffer from the attacks of the borer, and it ripens earlier than either. The tree is an ornament to the lawn or garden. The hardiest of the Apricots is the Russian or Prunus Siberica. It was brought to the United States about 1875 by the Russian Mennonites and was extensively planted by them in their Kansas and Nebraska settlements. Last year the trees were densely loaded with fruit which sold for three dollars a bushel. Fruit medium size and of the best quality. Some of the pits contain a sweet kernel as fine for eating as the almond. Although some of the trees had a severe test of 35 degrees below zero, we have yet to see the first tree that is not perfectly healthy, vigorous and symmetrical, and it will, we hope, be largely planted, for it is a valuable tree.

New Plums.

BOTAN—JAPANESE—The best in leaf and growth of any of the Japanese plums; color, bluish red, with a white bloom, exceedingly sweet, rich, juicy and delicious. Ripens August 1st. Hardy where wild Goose will stand.

OGAN—JAPANESE—Tree hardy; fruit very large, heart-shaped; color, reddish yellow; meaty and excellent. August 1st.

PRUNUS SIMONII—APRICOT PLUM—This new plum, a native of northern China, is believed to be the most valuable new fruit introduced for many years, being hardy as far north as Central Iowa and Nebraska, and in protected situations even further. It will ripen about the first of July in this latitude and shows no defects from attacks of the curculio. It is very firm and meaty, and equal in flavor to any of the Blue Plums. It will carry any desired distance. Tree very thrifty, upright, an early and abundant bearer, stands drought well and succeeds well in the southern states.

POTTAWAITAMIE—A plum of the Chickasaw family, but quite distinct from any other variety. Perfectly hardy and an immense early annual bearer. Four year old trees are said to have borne a crop of two bushels to the tree. Fruit is yellow overspread with a bright pink and prominent white dots; flesh beautiful golden yellow, luscious, good. Ripens in July. The sting of the curculio does not seem to effect the fruit, as every plum ripens evenly and perfectly. It is a good early plum, and cannot be surpassed for canning.

Acme Apricot.
