- ORDERS for 2¹/₄-inch pot roses must be for not less than three plants of any one variety at the dozen rate, and not less than 25 of any one variety at the hundred rate; three or more 4-inch at the dozen rate, and ten or more at the hundred rate. For two plants of a variety add 25%, and for one plant of a variety add 50% to the per dozen prices.
- TERMS—Cash (money order, draft or registered letter) with order will entitle purchaser to extra count in Roses of our selection equivalent to a 5 per cent. discount, or a discount of 3 per cent, may be deducted from remittauce. C. O. D. orders must be accompanied with one-third of the aucount iu eash. Accounts opened only with known or favorably rated correspondents or those furnishing amply satisfactory references.
- PACKING--Always free, usually in light boxes, ventilated in warm weather, well lined in cold weather and securely strapped. From one to two-thirds (and for very distant points all) soil removed and roots carefully wrapped in damp moss and paper.
- SHIPPING—Invariably by the best known route, speed, safety and economy considered, or ono designated by purchaser. The start may be temporarily delayed by reason of exceptionally severe weather.
- EXPRESS shipment is alone recommended as ensuring prompt and sufe delivery. At the special plant rates, which are 25 per cent, below regular merebandise rates, charges will uever be excessive. Prepayment secures no advantage in amount of charges; but, if preferred, for the most distant points, add one-fifth to remittance.
- FREIGHT shipment will be made only upon explicit instructions and entirely at risk of purchaser. We assume no responsibility except to deliver properly packed and in good order to depot, bill and route correctly and follow w.tl. tracer.
- COMPLAINTS will not be recognized unless lodged with us promptly after receipt of goods.

Mistress Franklin Dennison—(McGredy, 1915.) (H. T.) Porcelnin-white, veiled in primree-yellow, deepening to ochre at base of petals which recurve to a point. Blooms of grand size and models of perfection in form, extraordinarily fres and and very fragrant. Highly esteemed as a garden Rose.

Mistress F. F. Thompson-(Totty, 1915.) (H. T.) A lovely shade of shell-pink with a deep glowing heart of bright pink

Mossila or Yellow Soupert-(Lambert, 1895.) (H. Pol.) Chroms-yellow center, shading to creamy-white on the edges of the petals; a very free bloomer and a fine, hardy bedder.

M. van Geldsrn-(Lambert, 1914.) (H. T.) Yellow-rose to

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silvery ealmon-rose; growth like "Chrlsty;" profitable forcing, eutting and hedding Rose.

Mousseline—(Robert & Moreau, 1881.) (M.) Pure white, heavily moesed.

My Maryland-(J. Cook, 1909.) (H. T.) Salmon-pink of a eoft and pleasing ehade, with long steme and long peinted buds, very full in bloom and exquicitly fragrant. A eplendid new forcing Rose, easy to manage and free to grow. Many good judgee pronounce it the euccessor to Bridesmaid or Killarney.

National Emblem--(McGredy, 1915.) (H. T.) Dark crimson, overlaid with a velvety finish, shading to vermilion toward edges; very long and pointed buds; petals of lvory-like substance; flowers full and perfect, produced with marvelous frcedom and constancy; foliage mildew-proof.

Nerissa-(W. Paul, 1912.) (H. T.) Creamy-yellow shaded with white, center of flower tinted peach; enormosuly large, full and of magnificent change; vigorous and floriferous. Award of Merit, Royal Hort. Society of England, but werthy of a gold medal ac an exhibition and garden Rose.

New Century—(Van Fleet, 1901.) (H. R.) Beautiful roeypink in elusters of large, full and double flowers.

Pillar of Gold or E. Veyrat Hermanos—(Bernaix, 1895.) (C. T.) Appleot-yellow with roflex petals flushed with copperypink and shades of old gold; fragrant; very largo and double to the center, forming a perfect sheet of color throughout this blooming season.

Pink Amsrican Beauty-(See Mre. Charles Russoll.)

Pink Baby Rambisr-(See Maman Levavasseur, Mrs. Cutbush, Orleans and Phyllis.)

Pink Druschki-(See Heinrich Munch.)

Pink Rambier or Euphrosyne—(Schmidt, 1895.) (C. P.) A vigorous elimber, producing large trunses of delightfully fragrant flowers of deep pink.

Pink Soupert-(Dingee, 1806.) (H. Pol.) Rose-pink in color; otherwise same as Clothilde Soupert; always in hloom.

Prairie Queen-(Fcast, 1843.) (S.) Bright rosy-red; large, compact, globular flowers in clusters. A standard favorite.

President Taft-(McCuilough, 1908.) (H. T.) Shell-pink of a shining, intenss and distinctive color; of heautiful, globular form, perfect in stem and handsome, glossy foliage. A splendid new forcer for summer and autumn. Of Cineinnati origin, not to be confused with Princs de Bulgarie, Antoine Rivoire, Mrs. Taft or Leuchtfeuer.

Prima Donna-(See Mme. P. Euler.)

Primerose—(Soupert & Notting, 1913.) (II. T.) McIonycilow during spring and summer, dcoper in autumn with apricot shadings; large, double and of perfect form; fragrant and floriferous.

Prince Camilie de Rohan or La Roalere—(E. Verdier, 1861.) (H. P.) Universally known as "The Black Rose," owing to its very deep, velvety erimson color, passing to intense marcon, and shaded black; large, handsome and fragrant blooms.

Prince de Suigarie-(Pernst-Ducher, 1901.) (H. T.) Slivery-flesh, very delicately shaded to golden-salmon center; iarge, full and cup-formed; one of the showlest of the light

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colored fancy forcere. Our stock is the genuine, not to be confused with Antoine Rivoire, President Taft or Mre. Taft.

Scarlet-erimson of a moet brilliant huo; long pointed bude and heautifully striking flowere on tall, erect etcme; handsome dark follage; a rapid grower and constant producer. One of the most successful new forcing Rosos of recent years, a ecedling from Lady Battereea, for-

Robert Duncan-(A. Dickson, 1897.) (H. P.) Bright rosycrimson, with largo ehell-shaped petals and perfectly formed flowers. A favorite Irleh hybrid of vigorous growth and abundant bloom,

Robin Hood-(Hill, 1912.) (H. T.) Glorious roey-scarlet

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color at once soft, hright and lasting; bloom full and of beautiful form. Heavily caned and profuse in foliage; a ready grower and free producer.

Roger Lambelin—(Schwartz, 1890.) (H. P.) A striking oddity; dark, glowing crimson with a contrasting white band on irregular edges of petals shaped similarly to a double Petunia. Hardy, vigorous and fragrant.

Russel's Cottage-(America, 1900.) (Mtf.) Dark red; very double and full; a strong grower and profuse bloomer.

Souvenir de J. Passinge--(Chambard, 1913.) (H. T.) Coppery-salmon in the elongated bud, opening copper-yellow with roey-carmine and deep yellow shadings; large, full, well-formed and swect-scented flowers, freely and continuously produced. Growth upright and strong, emooth wooded and beautifully leared. Sliver Medal and First-class Certificate, Lyons.

Souvanir ds la Malmalson-(Beluze, 1843.) (B.) Lovely fiesh-pink, elegantly shaded with rosy-peach; perfectly full, douhle, and very large flowers of fine symmetrical form; fragrant, free and vigorous for out-of-door cultivation.

Souveni ds Pierre Notling-(Soupert & Notling, 1902.) (T.) A seedling of Marechal Niel and Maman Cochet. Color shadings difficult to describe, combining creamy-white, faint orangeyellow and light peach, with edges of petals hordered in car-

Swestheart-(Walsh, 1901.) (H. W.) Buds of bright pink, shading to a soft white in the full blooms; very double and fragrant; a hardy climber or trailer.

Tausendschoen or Thousand Beautles-(Schmidt, 1907.) (C. P.) Varying shades from a delicately flushed white to a deep pink or rosy-carmine, in bright clusters of blossoms almost covering the handsome pale-green foliage. A vigorous, hardy climber with few thorns, of German origin.

Tipperary—(McGredy, 1916.) (H. T.) Clear yellow of "Melody" tono; siendor and pointed huds opening to a fuil rosette with satiny surface; long, stiff stems in profusion, ench tipped with a flower admirably adapted for corsage and funcy table decorntion. An irish seedling of Mrs. Aaron Ward,

Tiptop-(Seo Bnby Doil.)

Totole Golos--(Pernst-Ducher, 1015.) (H. T.) Fiesh white, shnded to a chrome-yollow centor; long bud on stout stem; lnrgo, full, globular flower; dnrk green follago; creet hranching inbit. An excellent garden and oxhibition Rose.

Trier-(Lamhert, 1904.) (C. P.) Creamy-white, semi-double, free and continuous, producing in largo elusters.

Ulrich Brunnor, or Hardy American Beauty-(Levet, 1881.) (II. P.) Brilliant cherry-red flowers of immenso sizo and bold globular form. Seedling of Paul Neyron, strong and disease rosisting.

Universal Favorite-(Mandn, 1899.) (П W.) Beautifui rosy-pink, resembling "Bridcsmnid;" largo and double; a rapid cilmber or trailer of free branching and blooming habit.

Vellehenblau, Vlolet Blue or Bine Rambler-(Schmidt, 1909.)

IFEDINE SPRINGEIE-DEROSES

(C. P.) A sport from Crimson Rambler aud as vigorous a climber; produces immense panieles of blooms, opening reddishlllae, changing to amethyst and steel-blue. A German novelty of recent introduction, the nearest approach to a bluo Rose.

Vick's Caprice-(Vlek, 1889.) (H. P.) A variegated hardy Rose; large, fragrant and attractive flowers of eatiny-pluk, distinctly striped and shaded with white and bright earmino; slightly eup-chaped, but full and deep; blooms at frequent intervale during the entire season; healthy and vigorous.

Vlolet Blue-(See Vellehenblau.)

Virginia R. Coxe-(See Gruss an Teplitz.)

Viridifiora-(Rambridge & Harrison, 1856.) (C.) The only green Rose extant, deep nea-green blooms, enme in color as tho follage.

W. E. Lipplatt-(A. Diekson, 1907.) (H. P.) Brilliant velvety earmine, shaded maroon; very strongly perfumed, largo, full and well-formed flowers with high centor, freely produced on erect steme of well-branched growth. Introduced as a Hybrid Tea, but our growers class it a Hybrid Porpetuni by roason of its habit of growth and fragrance.

Weilesley- (A. Montgomery, 1905.) (H. T.) Bright, elenr salmon-rose, reverso of petals ellvery-rose; retaius the form of Liberty and the fulinese of Bridesmaid, its parents; tall, etiff canes; vigoroue, healthy and free.

White American Beauty-(Seo Frnu Karl Druschki.)

White Banksia-(Keer, 1807.) (Bks.) Small, double, pure white flowere in elustere, with violot fragrance. A vigorous grower.

White Baby Rambier-(See Catherino Zeimet, Joanno d'Arc or Zella Bourgeole.)

White Bougere-(America, 1900.) (T.) Puro lvory-whilto, with nover a tint or shado whatever; free floworing, inrgo, full and double : a favorito in the South especially.

White Dorothy Perkins-(Cant, 1908.) (H. W.) A puro white sport from Dorothy Perkine, with which it is identical in foliago and habit. A valuable addition to the hardy elimbor einss.

White Golden Gate—(See Ivory.) White Hermosa—(See Marle Lambert.) White Killarney—(Waban, 1909.) (H. T.) A pure white eport from the pink parent, the newest thing in a foreing Rose, admittedly a strong competitor of The Bride. Our clock is of the true Waban strain.

White La France or Augustino Guinoisseau-(Guinoisseau, (H. T.) Large and finely formed bude and bloome 1899.) having broad pctale of silvery-white with very delleate pink shadings. A fragrant, free and continuous bloomer.

White Maman Cochet-(Cook, 1897.) (T.) Very large and beautifully formed in bud and bloom; puro waxy-white under Very large and glass, taking on a faint pink flush out of doors which enhances its beauty. Vigorous and produces abundantly for cutting.

White Rambier or Thelia-(Lambert, 1896.) (C. P.) Grows vigorously in clusters of pure white flowers.

White Shawyer-(Totty, 1915.) (H. T.) A pure white eport from "Mrs. George Shawyer," which growere gladly welcome; elearer and with more petals than "White Kiliarney," which it may displace. An all-year quick-growing and free blooming Rose of vigoreus habit.

Wichmoes or Baby Moss-(Barbler. 1911.) (C. M.) Day-break pink, cemi-double flowers of medium elze in clustere, darker on reverse of petals. Bud heavily mossed in bright darker on reverse of petals. Bud heavily mossed in bright green, with the peculiar aromatic odor of the Moss Rose fem-ily, yet retaining the ecandent habit of the Wiehuraiana, mak-ing growths of five to eight feet in length, with fine resistant foliage. Wiehuraiana × Salet. Wiehuraiana or Memorial Rose—(Dr. Wichura of Japan, 1860.) (W.) Fure chining white with bright goiden center; einglo lerge blossoms profuse in July; gloesy dark green leaves. William Allen Richardson—(Ducher, 1878.) (N.) Deep orange-yellow, with center of coppery-yellow, faintly tinted with rose heautifully colored and formed

with rose, beautifully colored and formed. William R. Smith, Charles Dingee, Jeanette Heller or Malden's Blueb-(Shellum, 1908.) (T.) Creamy-white with shadinge of pink; a eeeding from Maman Coehet and Kaiserin Augusta Vietoria; beautiful in form and colore; glossy foliage; long, etim eteme; vigorous in growth; a auperb eummer bedder and hardy with light protection.

Willowmere-(Pernet-Ducher, 1913.) (H. T.) Long, ear-mined coral-red bud, opening to large, handsome, cupped flower of rich ehrimp ehaded ycllow in the center and toning to earbind pink toward edges of petals; a vigorous grower of erect branching habit, long, etout flower etalks, few thorns and light green foliage. Progeny of an unnamed eeedling and Lyon Rose, which it resembles, but excels in growth and

hardiness. Yellow Banksla-(Damper, 1823.) (Bke.) Small, double, eulphur-yeilow flowere in elusters, with vlolet fragrance. A vigoroue grower.

Yeliow Kaiserin-(See Perlo von Godesberg.)

Yellow Mademolselle Ceelle Brunner-(See George Eiger.)

Yellow Maman Cochet-(Seo Madame Derepas-Matrat, or Lady Plymouth.)

Yeilow Rambier or Agiala-(Schmidt, 1895.) (C. P.) A hardy climber. Double golden-yellow flowere in large clustere. Yellow Soupert-(Seo Moceila.)

Yvonne Vachorot-(Souport & Notting, 1096.) (H. T.) Porceicin-white, euffueed virginal rose; long, pointed bude on upright, etiff etems opening to large, double well formed flow-cre of lateling quality. Gold Mcdei, Leige.

Zella Bourgeols- (Welter, 1912.) (P.) Gilstoning enow-white emeil flowers evenly diepoeed on full trusees; of round, compact habit, ideal for pot culture; forme a eheet of white for bodding purpoee; perpetual during eummer. Newest of the White Baby Raaiblore.

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
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
