Philadelphia July 27<sup>th</sup> 1827

Dear Doctor

With delight I acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 19<sup>th</sup> inst which lately came to my hands

The parcel of dried plants which you have had the goodness to forward to me arrived some time in March and just in time to accompany mine which had been detained all winter in consequence of the ice suddenly obstructing the navigation of the river at this place

I am glad you have received a collection of plants directly from Dr Steudal and will cheerfully ~~and~~ prepare as many plants of this vicinity as possible to send to him. I have already dried a considerable number and will continue drying until autumn, and besides, I have engaged my friends Dr Burlington and the Rev. L. D. de Schweinitz to assist me by preparing plants of their neighbourhood - Friend Müller in the west also promises to send me some. If you wish to send a parcel to Dr S. very soon I will frankly forward you those which I have prepared, if you should require them to make up your collection.

I have at this time a package of European plants

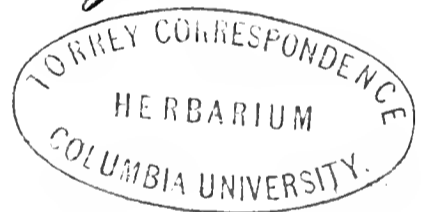
for you which I received in the spring and have been

care I shall direct them in New York

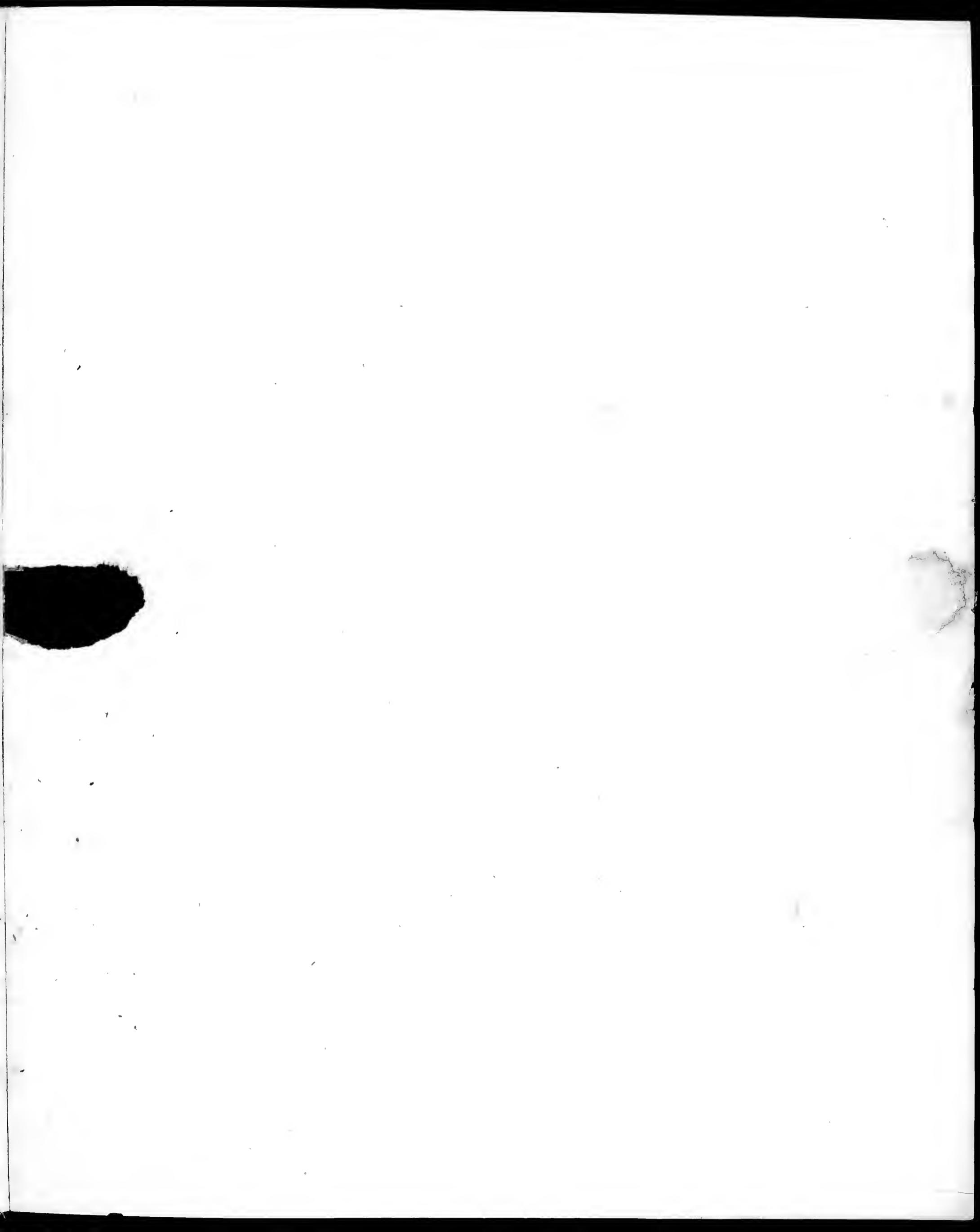
I shall be very glad to accompany you in the
