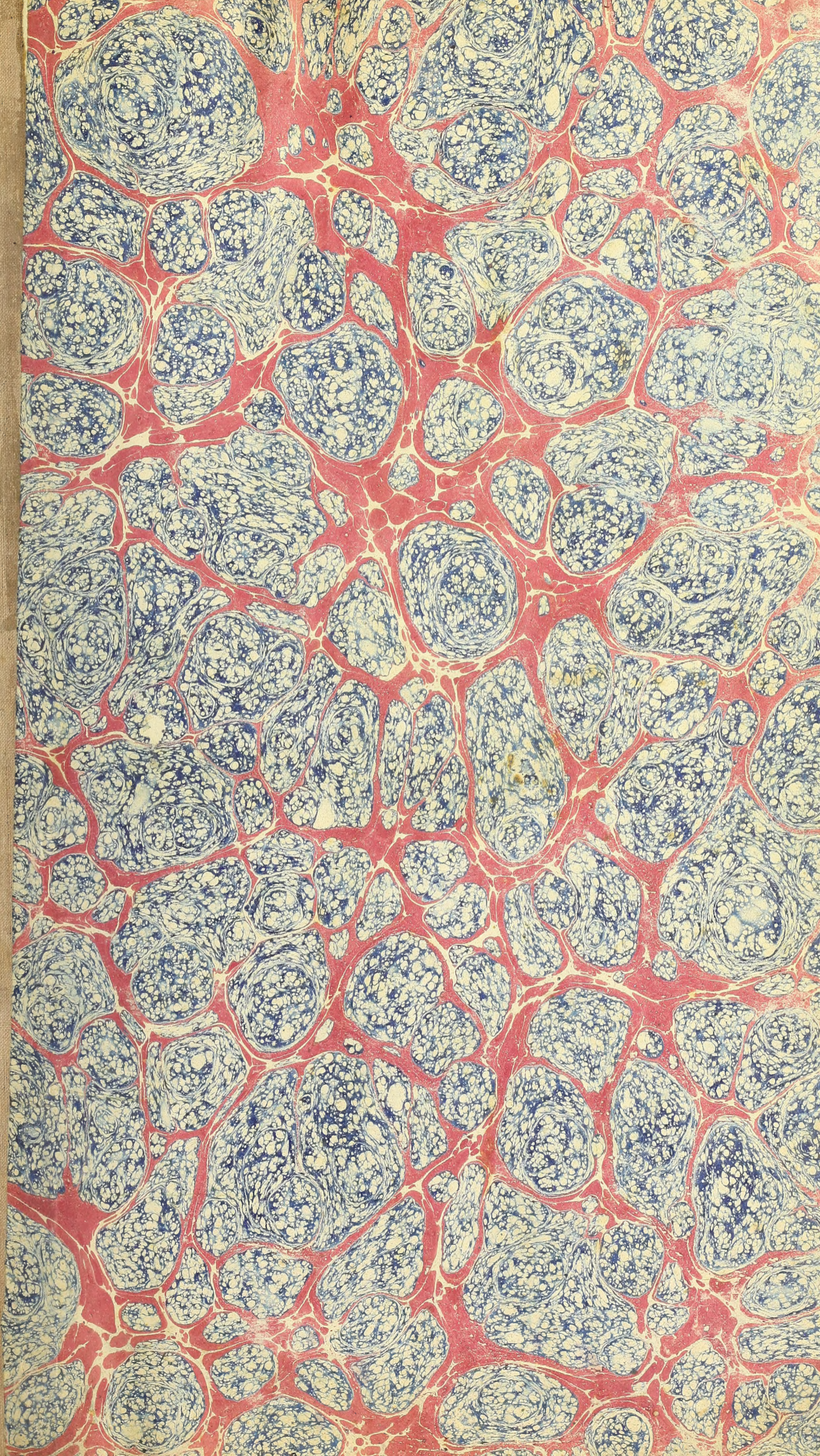

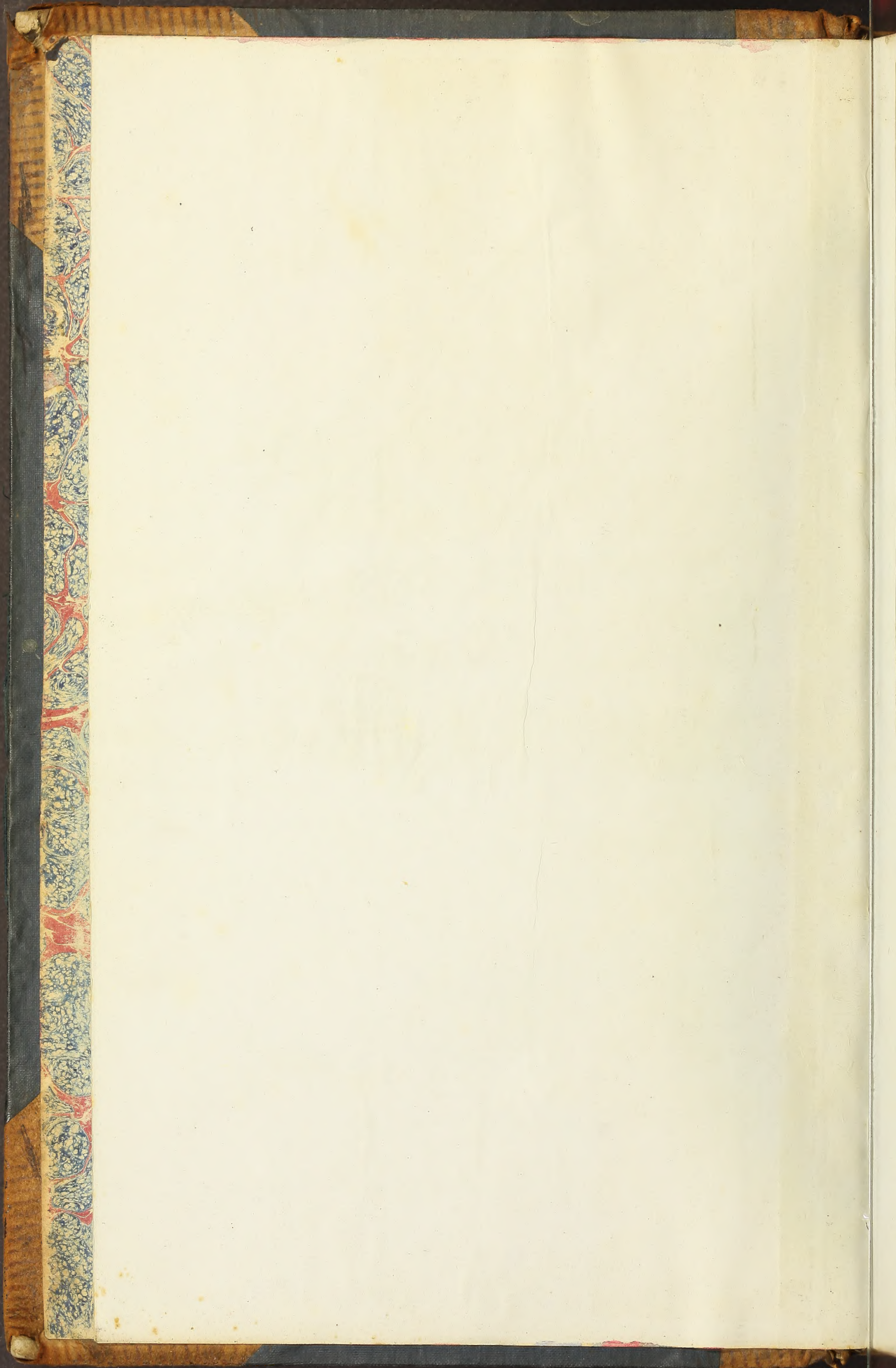

## The Fishery Laws.

### Discussion at the Board of Trade

Mr. Mackenzie, Hamilton, called attention to the necessity of assimilating the fishery laws, rules and regulations of those parts of the United States bordering on the Dominion, with the laws in force on our own inland lakes and rivers. He explained that while Canada paid great attention to the protection and breeding of fish, the United States seemed to be indifferent to this important matter. This was seriously felt by those who lived along the borders of rivers and lakes. It was very aggravating to the Canadian fishermen on the Detroit river to be prevented from fishing during the close season, while across the narrow channel their United States rivals were taking in immense hauls. Our Government found it necessary to relax their vigilance in consequence of the pressure brought to bear on them by local members, or through complaints of our fishermen, and the consequence was the fish were rapidly being killed off. As the trade in fresh water fish was greatly increasing, it was important to take steps to develop the lake fisheries, which were common to both countries. He complimented the Marine and Fisheries Department on the effective manner in which the fish were protected, and regretted that the game laws were not enforced with equal vigilance by the local Governments.

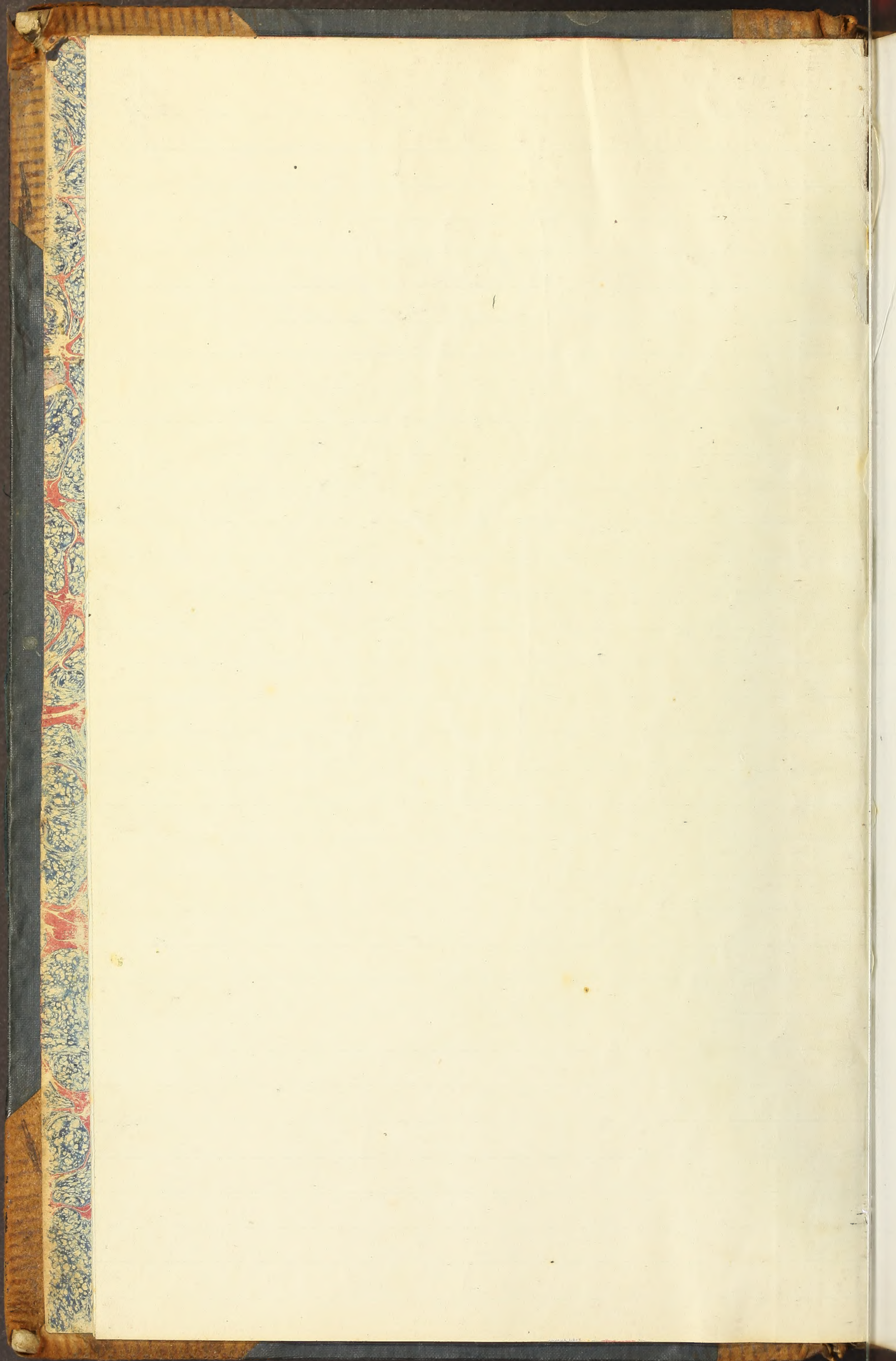
Mr. Hayes (Detroit) said Mr. Wilmot had met Seth Green, the fish breeder of New York, and they were agreed as to the importance of protecting the fisheries. Steps were being taken in that direction now.

Mr. Mackenzie said the difficulty was the fisheries in the United States were controlled by the several States. The annual value of the produce of the Canadian fisheries reaches the considerable sum of \$11,000,000. About \$6,000,000 worth of this valuable produce was last year exported from the country; the remainder is absorbed in domestic trade and local consumption. The business is yearly increasing, and is described by the Government officers as capable of very great extension. Owing to increased railway facilities and improved methods of preserving fish by artificial freezing, or by packing in snow and ice and by transport in refrigerator cars, the demand for fish food in the United States and Canada has been greatly stimulated. The prospect of a still greater demand renders it important to consider the permanence of this natural resource, and to neglect no means by which its prosperous condition may be maintained. The Government have, in addition to protective measures, adopted the artificial system of fish culture which has been so successfully prosecuted in some parts of Europe, and is now extensively pursued in the United States. There are seven or eight public fish hatching establishments now in operation in Canada. These have turned out during the three or four years past the immense quantity of 15,000,000 young fish bred by the artificial process, and there are now in course of hatching at these establishments about 13,000,000 more of different kinds of fish. Such an enormous addition to the chances of fish increase must certainly result in heavy returns from our inland fisheries within a short time, and as many of the districts within which these young fish have been liberated are situated between Canada and the United States, it seems probable that our neighbors will benefit nearly as much as ourselves by the improvement. From all the enquiries made it appears that Canadian fishermen whose pursuits are confined to these border waters have hitherto labored under some disadvantages by being obliged by our laws to quit fishing, in conformity with our fishing laws, during the spawning seasons, whilst their competitors in the neighboring States continue their fishing throughout the seasons, without being subject to any legal restrictions. This is felt by Canadians engaged in the fisheries to be somewhat invidious. Mr. Whitcher, the Canadian Fisheries Commissioner, sets this forth very fully in his reports, and urges the necessity for assimilating the fishing laws on both sides of the boundary line. He apprehends that otherwise Canada may be forced in justice to her own fishermen, to relax or

abandon entirely the wise provisions hitherto adopted to protect and increase the fish frequenting these border-waters, so as to place the fishermen of both countries on an equal footing; such a contingency would be deplored by those disinterested persons who feel the importance of all our fisheries as a source of good supply and a valuable article of commerce. If the breeding of vast quantities of fish in these Government establishments is also likely to be a benefit to the United States citizens, in common almost with our own people, the other grievance will be aggravated. The bare possibility of such a result is cause for regret, because it might have the effect of discouraging such successful efforts as we have been already making to improve our fisheries, both by natural and artificial means. Hence I think it very desirable that the Government should be strengthened in their endeavors to negotiate a fair approximation on the part of the United States. There have been communications on the discussion between the Federal and the Dominion Governments, but what practical advance has been made does not appear. It is probable that the delays of dealing with several States, each having control of fishing rights, and the possible powerlessness of the Federal authority to influence the action of the State Legislatures, will retard the accomplishment of any such purpose as that which seems so very desirable; but there can be no doubt that public opinion on both sides of the line will eventually produce its effect in leading to the assimilation of our fishery laws.

After some further discussion, the resolution was adopted.

I have the honor to send you herewith the copy of another letter, I have just received from Mr J. H. Stallock of Meaford, with reference to the illegal fishing carried on for White fish and Salmon Trout in the waters of the Georgian bay, - during the close season for these fish last November, in contravention of the Fisheries Act. - - -

As this letter presents a new complexion in these several cases, I beg most respectfully to recommend that the cases commenced already before Mr Jos: S. Miller, and myself, be again resumed, and disposed of. - - -

There appears to be one thing certain, and that is, this thing of evading the law by granting permits to fish during close season - buying white fish and Salmon Trout and selling them and delivering them to the buyers during the close season - but only paying for them after close season was ended, is so apparent as a very sharp act, resorted to solely as to evade the law, that I can no longer hesitate to lay these cases again before you, and I recommend that you will be please to order these several cases to be finally disposed of. - - - Mr J. H. Stallock, is the owner of a tug boat, a fisherman - continually during the fishing season, employed by the Meaford fishermen tugging in and out their fishing boats, fish and gill nets to, and from the fishing grounds. - - -

In any case the result will hereafter have a good and beneficial effect. - - -

Referring to these several cases of contraventions of the Fisheries Act, in B. bay - reported herewith. — — —

In order to make a clean sweep, and the cases complete, I was obliged to search, and had searched the houses of Tom X, Ike Blows, Robert McCardle, and John Stenning, and Sam Blows, by the power vested in me and James Cahill Esq. J. P. - under sub section 2, of section 18. of the Fisheries Act. — — —

In Tom X's house, with whom Sam Blows, lives, as son-in-law, 300 yards of pike gill net recently fished up (being wet and ready) and 9 pike were found. — — —

In Ike Blows house, about 50 yards of pike gill net was found - Dan McJugne, examined this net, said it was his, it was stolen from him. - but he positively declined swearing to it. — — —

I found with John Stennings, about 100 yards of gill net, - this has since turned out to be Tom X's. - Then there was about 120 yards of new pike gill net given by Ben Golds - fisherman on B. beach, to Robert McCardle, he Golds in return was to get the fish caught at 12. each, this piece of gill net, I am up to the present time unable to find.

Then I grappled on the night of the 9<sup>th</sup> of May, in B. bay - where this illegal fishing was being carried on, and found about 300 yards of pike gill nets set there myself. —

Thus you have all the particulars. —

## Notice to Mr. Beck's fishermen.

The special orders issued by the Fisheries department, Ottawa, dated 15. March 1876, respecting four inches mesh extension measure being the only and legal size mesh for all white fish seines; - I am now to apprise you, that no other seines of any kind whatever can be fished on any of the white fish fishing grounds in Lake Ontario, on Mr. Beck's beach, until after the white fish run is over, for this year; and only then under a special license, the same as that issued for last season. ---

As it is necessary, that I should examine and inspect all white fish seines, before any licenses are granted for this season: - The fishermen will have to notify me as soon as they overhauled, prepared and fitted up their white fish seines, for the season, so that I may at once inspect them. --- I cannot recommend a license to issue, unless the same are as the law directs they should be; Besides all back rents - --- from the past or previous years, must be first paid up. ---

All persons building on the Fisheries Reserve without leave from the department of Marine, and Fisheries will be prosecuted for trespass. - As the Fisheries Reserves are only intended for licensed fishermen. - The seine hauling grounds in B. bay, on Mr. Beck's, cannot be fished, nor hauled on after the 31<sup>st</sup> day of May. --- Will the fishermen, and all other concerned be pleased to govern themselves accordingly.

Beach, between the old Outlet and the main land, is making preparation for to cut a Canal or entrance from the Brant from B. Bay across the main road, and highway, or public beach into Lake Ontario, so as to make the same navigable for a pleasure steamer, running this season from Hamilton to the Brant House.

I am in receipt of a copy of Circular dated 12. May last, and in reply I beg most respectfully to state, that I believe it is not necessary to apply the provisions contained in this Circular to any part of the Niagara River - nor to any part of my division. - - -

In the Niagara River, say the town of Niagara<sup>22</sup> the angling by Americans is carried on altogether, in front of the American fort and in American water - and even there British subjects who supply the Boats and the Boat Catch more fish, by angling, those which they dispose of to American anglers, who employ them, at remunerative prices, than the Americans do themselves. - - And I assure you, that since my appointment as your Commissary on those frontier waters, no waste nor loss has ever occurred to the fish generally hals, and herring, angled on such occasions. - - During my visit to the department, at Ottawa, 24. day of April 1875, the Commissioner of Fisheries and I fully discussed this matter - when I showed and convinced him - that our licensed fishermen at Niagara, profitably fished their gill nets for herring, white fish, hals, pickled and perch, nearly all the year round - "legal seasons" in American waters, and they are not interred with by the American authorities; Hence, why? I deem it my duty to report to you all this; - - You are pleased to say: "I am desired by the Minister to instruct you that the practice of issuing "Permits" which has been for some time in use should be continued on the following considerations. - - -

1<sup>st</sup>. Angling, solely for pleasure, and recreative permits. - -



In answer to this, I may remark, that I recommended permits to be given last year, free gratis, as was just fixed by the department to American anglers, for to angle on the Canada side the Niagara River at Fort Erie, and I now and still adhere to this, because the profitable advantages, Canada licensed fishermen have always derived and enjoyed by fishing their gill nets in American Waters, (Lake Ontario at Niagara, is to them so remunerative. . . . The licensed fishermen at Fort Erie and Niagara whom I have long cultivated concern in this, least wise the advantages which they at present enjoy should be frittered away from them. . . .

2<sup>d</sup> - Permits for this privilege to be issued to British Subjects free of charge; but a payment of \$1, for each permit granted to a foreigner, is to be exacted on delivery. . . .

In reply to this clause, I will be understood as stating to you, that so far as charging \$1, to American subjects, who come across from Buffalo to Fort Erie, angle for, and catch a few little perch, ("fish not recognized by law") on the licensed fishing grounds, in the Niagara River, - for which a rental of \$50, annually is paid; If the licensees, who pay such a handsome rent, and who sell their seine caught fish in the city of Buffalo to Americans or foreigners, if they are so disposed; may they not allow these foreigners, with whom they have daily intercourse, as well as with Canadians, to fish in the Niagara River - in their licensed waters for perch. . . . It does appear to me that this clause was never intended, and should not be applied to the Niagara River, it is however well adapted for inland waters, and out of the way places, where no licenses are issued, where



speckled trout, bass, and mad hatterings are caught by angling, and other (illegal) contrivances, not to be lost, but for the American markets, - because speckled trout so caught, are readily disposed of, at 50¢ per pound, I give you this common sense view of the matter. - - - In places where no license fees, are ever paid, where people camp out, where week days and Sundays are all alike, and where the laws of our country, are never observed, nor respected: In such places license fees for angling to foreigners - should be \$20, instead of \$1. - - -

I speak from the personal knowledge, I acquired, by your deputing me to visit on several occasions, the Georgian Bay Country, where I examined into, and reported contravention of the Fisheries Act, committed previous to such enquiries being made under your personal instructions to me. - - -

It is up in the back inland streams, lakes, and rivulets, which this law so long neglected should be firmly enforced. I feel a pride in finding it is to be so enforced now!

But on the Niagara River things being just as I say, I cannot without careful and due consideration come to the conclusion of changing matter & where every thing is profitable at present to our licensed fishermen vs. foreigners, without having first a personal interview, with Mr. Whitehead, our Commissioner on subject. - - -

These are my views, and I hope they will be reversed by you.

I have the honor to report for your information, that on the 22, instant, whilst visiting the Island fisheries Toronto Island, I was shown your letter of the 20<sup>th</sup> day of June to Messrs David Ward, and Patrick Gray - Toronto Island, licensees of the fisheries there; also your letter addressed to Mr. James Durman - Toronto Island, Toronto, respecting their building houses on the fishery reserve of one chain, made thereon." - I may here state to you candidly, that whoever made such a statement to you, has misrepresented facts, as no house or houses have been erected on the fishery reserve of one chain made thereon, but a very fine substantial house, rough cast, 36 ft long, 28 ft wide, and 20 feet high, containing seven rooms, an entrance to the Island, is just about being completed, "is getting the last touch" at a cost of \$1500, by Mr. Wm. Ward, but this is just 2 chains, and 50 links from the waters edge of Lake Ontario, on the west side of the Island, - so that you will please perceive, no offence, nor no violation, so far as the fishery reserve is concerned, has been committed; Wm. Ward, is son to Mr. David Ward, and carries on his fishing, - Mr. Ward, is also a brave and courageous man, please refer to my letter to you of the 10<sup>th</sup> of

Mr. James Durman, has put up a small house, about the same distance from the waters edge as Mr. Wards house is, so that just as the fishery are concerned, no offence, is not an offence, committed on the fishery reserve of one chain made thereon.



and may be fairly set down as the representation made to you. . . .

Mr. James Bureau, is not a fisherman on any part of Toronto Island - but he is a licensed fisherman, east of the gap, in Lake Ontario, in front of Abbots Bay, and being a son of the Light House Keeper - on Toronto Island - he claims the consideration of the Fisheries Department. . . .

With respect to Mr. Patrick Gray, - erecting a house on the fishing reserve of one chain made thereon this is also, "a myth". . . . There is however, a small house, the property of Mr. Patrick Gray, 20 ft. by 10 ft. This house formerly stood on the Light House reserve stood there for 40 years, and was used while there, as a dwelling house and for storing nets, and fish in, of the fishermen. . . . The L. House Keeper - ordered his house off, his light house reserve, and Mr. Patrick Gray, had this house removed from there last fall, and brought down, to where it now stands, and repaired it, and it is now on the City leased property, with only 10 ft. 4 inches of the west end in consequence of high water, being now on the fishing reserve, where by right, it ought and should be the balance of the house being on lot No. 22, as set forth on the plan and survey made by Charles Munwin, deputy provincial land surveyor - of which Mr. Patrick Gray - holds a 21 years lease, dated 21<sup>st</sup> day of May 1870, - at \$50. per year, payable half yearly on the 1<sup>st</sup> days of January, and July - and on which the said lease, specifies Houses can and may be built thereon, I am quoting from this lease for your information. - I also saw the last receipt to Mr. Gray, for \$50, dated 12. October 1875. - I solicit your interference and protection for Messrs David Hland, and Patrick Gray, in future from



petty annoyance by the Corporation of Toronto,  
 From the edge of the Lake (water) on the west side  
 to this house - fish shanty, it is about 55 ft, and if  
 the water was low, as in former years, it would  
 be altogether on the City property, held under  
 lease by Mr Gray - and from the plank foot  
 walk, to the east end of the house referred to,  
 it is 22' feet, 6 inches; so that in any instance  
 Mr N. Gray's - is a case, that some official of  
 the Corporation, has been attempting to grapple  
 at, without any just cause in the premises  
 whatever. . . . And as for Mr David Ward, I  
 can't find that he has been guilty of anything.  
 For he has done nothing; you will find him  
 still in his old <sup>fishery</sup> shanty, sober, civil and obliging,

 Solicitor, Geo. Dixon, Boulton, and Andrew McLeod,  
 then Chamberlaine of the City, and the Seal of

 at present City Chamberlaine; so that you will  
 please further observe how futile the attempt  
 must be as made to you and against Mr N.  
 David Ward, and Patrick Gray. . . .

That portion of the Island, lot No: 82, Mr  
 N. Gray - has a 2 years lease of, he allowed  
 the Corporation of Toronto to build a plank walk,  
 of 4 ft wide <sup>over</sup> for public accommodation to the  
 Citizens. . . . Whilst the Corporation is in the  
 yearly receipt of \$50 for it, and another lot, . . .  
 so that it is not anything out of place  
 for me to say; Mr Gray, is entitled to much  
 consideration at the hands of the Toronto  
 Corporation, for his liberality. . . .



Independent of all this, I might add - so is Mr D<sup>r</sup> Ward, and both from their very long residence as fishermen on Toronto Island, the former being 28 years, and the latter 38 years. - - -

I think fishermen so long in possession, should have a priority claim, - even as against of you the Corporation of Toronto. - - - The same as the No. 10. Bch. fishermen, now enjoy, of their respective holdings there, as against the City of Hamilton, - and even still, and I hope it is not too late, should your long possession, be placed independent of the Corporation of Toronto. - - -

On Friday morning last, at 10. a.m. I went with Mess<sup>rs</sup> D. Ward, Pat Gray, W<sup>m</sup> Ward and James Duncan to see the Hon. John Beverley Robinson, Solicitor for the City of Toronto, W<sup>m</sup> Ward and James Duncan were advised to petition the Mayor and Corporation; so as if possible to right themselves in their attempt at House building. - - -

Mess<sup>rs</sup> David Ward, and Pat Gray, the sole licensees of the Toronto Island fishery, have not so far as my humble judgment serves, ever done any thing whatever to draw the attention of the Mayor and Corporation of Toronto upon them, as regards the fishing reserves of one claim made thereon. - - - The City property of the Island leased by Mr Gray, and which in many instances is leased to others, may it present be put down, within the fishing reserve altogether, in consequence of the very high state of the water the season on Toronto Island. - - -

I have to apologise as I deem it my duty to give you this full particular with this respect.

There was no intention on Mr Egan's part, when sending this bog a float, to damage or injure the fishing grounds on B. Beach, it has however been done, and complained of, What shall I do in this case, with due respect,

I am in receipt of yours of the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant, wishing to know if you have power to allow persons to spear in the Grand River, and other Rivers under your Superintendence. . . .

In reply, I have to inform you, that you have no power within yourself, to do anything of the kind; neither have I; please read sub section 8. of Section 13, the last line, on page 9. . . .

I only allow persons to spear in B. bay, at certain seasons, when permitted to do so, under licenses by the plimster, but this never happens, nor occurs in summer season of the year, so I would advise you as an old friend, not to allow Mr. Tonger - nor any body else to spear fish, in any of the Rivers under your Superintendence; all licenses are issued by the department of Marine and Fisheries, and neither you nor I can issue any license at all. I always (myself) take precious good care never to do so. . . .

So be you be guided by me, and tell those people you will do nothing of the kind, and if you catch them spearing you will fine them.

I have the honor to receive your letter of the 17<sup>th</sup> instant, regarding the taking of sand, and gravel off B. Beck fishery Reserve, for building purposes, &c, and in reply I beg most respectfully to report in compliance with the wishes of the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the Minister.

That the sand and gravel is drawn daily therefrom, by double and single waggon loads, and teams, for building purposes, and for walks and yards &c. The damage done to the fishery Reserve, by the taking of gravel, is very trifling, and insignificant; it is generally scooped up out off the surface, and the next blow or storm off the Lake brings in an accumulation of it again. - But it is in the taking of sand off the Fishery Reserve, that damage is very frequently done by making deep holes, very injurious and sometimes dangerous to the beamed fishermen, who occupy the beamed hauling grounds; - and it is of this some of the fishermen who are interested with, have frequently verbally complained to me about it. -

You will please bear in mind "if you so will it" that I have not the slightest objection myself to the sand and gravel being daily taken away by teams. The owners of whom sell it for \$1.50, and \$2, per load, provided it be taken under and according to some certain restrictions laid down by the Fisheries department, and not be taken as it is frequently has been in a very reckless manner; It is not out of place for me, I hope to recommend to you that some fixed rules be laid down for the government and guidance of persons taking the sand and gravel off the fishery Reserve on B. Beck, more especially



as the space now which it is now taken is limited in extent, and as some of the persons taking it, when taking it, when remonstrated with by the fishermen are not always very courteous to the fishermen in their language. --

There is no limit to the quantity of sand and gravel taken from Mc. Bee, it continues all the year round, and year after year, but now that the City of Hamilton, have got by Lease, a great portion of Mc. Bee, for Brig purposes, and got an extensive filtering basin in connection with their water works - from the site of which a large quantity of sand was heretofore taken &c. "except the fishery reserve" I do think certain restrictions as regards the fishery reserve should be at once brought into operation &c. by the fisheries department not to stop persons taking the sand and gravel, but that they shall take it according to some wise and fixed rule laid down for their guidance and which will at once convince (them) the public that our fishermen's rights are to some extent carefully guarded and recognized in the premises. -- And show the licensed fishermen there, that you have still some consideration for them personally in this matter. --

I give you herewith, the names of persons, I saw taking sand and gravel myself; personally, I have no feelings myself one way nor the other, as I look upon the sand and gravel of Mc. Bee as a great public benefit to the Community at large. --

I may say in conclusion that I talked with Amelius Irving, and A. S. Wood Esq. the City of Hamilton, M. P., - and we came to the conclusion that no person should be prevented taking the sand and gravel but it ought in future to be taken without doing injury or damage to the fishermen, or the "fishery reserve" premises they occupy under licenses, from the department of

The enterprise of propagating fish in Ontario, is engaging the attention, in addition to the others previously mentioned, of Mr G. A. Lacey, of Hopedale. The *Guolph Advertiser* learns that he has established a series of fish ponds at Hopedale, about a mile from Hillsburgh, township of Erin, county of Wellington. He has about 15,000 trout spawn in the hatching troughs of his establishment, and about 3,000 young trout ready to turn out into the larger ponds which already contain about eight hundred large trout. Mr Lacey is about to considerably enlarge his premises, with the view of propagating the spawn of white fish and salmon trout.

I have the honor to report for your information, that on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of June last past, Mr Benjamin Clark and Richard Johnson of Ballfleck learned fishermen under date of the 7<sup>th</sup> of May 1876. having previously commenced to build a house for fishing purposes on the open beach in front of Stoney Creek Pond, and within one chain of high water mark, or as it is laid down in the old survey - "Jones Pond"; of the late Augustus Jones, Deputy Provincial Land Surveyor.

Charles Gray, track foreman on the G. W. Railway, who owns lot 23, the land in front of the pond, and now referred to, and at one time a portion of Lake Ontario, Robert Gray, track-man, under him - his brother Henry Allen, trackman, - Richard Swadell, James Swadell and Isaac Swadell - sons of a farmer living adjacent - maliciously and wilfully pulled down and damaged and injured the same to the extent of \$20, which was proved to, by several witnesses.

Mr Wm. Wagner Esq. J. R. of Ballfleck, who knows the place for 40 years past, proved it was never occupied by any person, but fishermen; Mr Henry Allen of Stoney Creek an old gentleman, 52 years of age proved that he lived on, and owned the farm of Charles Gray, 60 years ago, but never owned nor claimed the sandy beach, formed since then, between the pond and Lake Ontario; one Hamilton Lee, who occupied and owned lot 23, for some years, has since sold to Charles Donaldson, who sold to Charles Gray; proved that he never owned the beach now referred to.

The defendants named above were each fined \$1, and costs, and \$20, for damages done to the house, and these convictions subsequently appears published in the Dundas Mercury, a public paper of the 29<sup>th</sup> of June last and have never been appealed against. - Subsequent to these



depositions being given by James Cahill Esq<sup>r</sup> J<sup>r</sup> Police Magistrate - Hamilton, - at the instance of Mr. John Brown - Attorney for Mr. Charles Gray & T. T. & --- Mr. Cahill reopened the case, and heard other evidence in behalf of Charles Gray - as regarded Title, a matter I believe Mr. Cahill had no power to go into at all, and in doing this, the Complainants Benjamin Blinck, and Richard Johnson, did not give their consent, and were not present, nor notified of such proceedings.

In consequence of the evidence given at the last enquiry - Mr. Cahill, has declined to give a distress warrant for the fines and costs, and the \$20, for willful and malicious damage done to the house, and so the cases now stand at this present moment...

Since these trials have taken place, Chas. Gray, has erected a post and board fence, where no fence has ever been before, across the said beach, as per plan herewith, between the pond, and the Lake, but leaving the Road allowance travelled, and all the rest of the beach open for public travel, and in fact, this is the first attempt ever made by any person to lay claim to this beach property that in reality belongs to, and was never out of the possession of the Crown, and the Fisheries department. --

The pond, and Lake Ontario at an early day, at this place, were one and the same, and Jones Field notes, show measurements made only to the pond - just as they are, <sup>still</sup> during freshets, that happen at this present day.. I send you a tracing of the property, including the beach, pond,



Lake, &c., and I strongly recommended that you will be pleased to appoint, and instruct Frank MacKellan Esq<sup>r</sup> of Hamilton of the firm of MacKellan, Gibson, and Rice, Barristers to act in the matter before Judge Simons here in behalf of the petitioners Benjamin Clark, and Richard Johnson - licensed fishermen, and so prevent, and put a final stop in future to such -icious and heidful injury and damage being done or again perpetrated in similar cases of this kind. -

My Silas Hopkins, who owns the open beach, west of this disputed beach, has kindly consented to let Benjamin Clark - rebuild the house on her property for a very small consideration, I saw ~~her~~ it this morning yesterday. -

As I informed you recently, I wish to engage your services to protect the parent salmon, and other fish in the Rouge R. during the spawning time, this fall, and for which I will engage in behalf of the Fisheries department to pay you \$20.-- and half of such fines as may be imposed (and paid) through your personal exertions. . . . I want you as gendarme to do your duty for me like an honorable man, and don't shut your eyes on any man you find illegally fishing in the Rouge, the ponds, or within 200 yards of the mouth of the Rouge, in Lake Ontario; from this time henceforth. . . .

Take down, and send me the names of all persons trolling, and spearing with light sacks - fishing gill nets, or trap nets, or any other apparatus therein, and let me have them immediately - giving residence, day and date and the kind of fishing so carried on, use every means to catch these illegal fishermen. . . .

I have been privately told that the Millers near Toronto, who have a stone boat, occasionally, in the mouth of the Rouge, fishes a gill net in the Rouge and ponds - Watch them, and when they set it next time - lift it - dry and keep it for me. - Hugh Helen has a salmon gill net, for letting at the forks of the Big and Little Rouge - the first time he sets this net, you must catch him privately, and when he goes away, take the net up, dry and keep for me, and press case. . . . In reply, I have the honor to report, and refer you to my reports of the 13<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> of November 1875. regarding the action then taken by me in being a barrel of fish I found on a freight train, of the G. W. Railway - "freight trains don't carry Express fish" - and for this act, my conduct was then approved of by the Fisheries Dept. Ottawa. - -

Subsequent to this, in consequence of the charges raised by the said A. Clarke, who lives at Collingwood, and not at Galt, and is a person who was fined the previous year, for a contravention of the Fisheries Act, committed during close season, for Salmon Trout, and White fish. - -

Mr. John Williams - fish dealer, who purchased this confiscated barrel of fish, was afterwards persecuted to such an extent, because forsooth, it was imagined that he gave me the information about these fish and he had ultimately to fly with his family from Galt, and I myself have contributed towards his law expenses from my own private purse of \$12 70¢ please refer to my letter of 27, March last. - -

The American Express Company, having declined to take fish from the Canada Express Company, and Wickes Express Coy - or carry White fish, or Salmon Trout, to their destination during close season, last year (November)



Several barrels were left to perish in Toronto, as no person would nor could legally handle them, without infringing the Regulation; and so it was I presume that this barrel of fish now referred to, was sent forward as freight from Guelph to Galt.

I saw the bill of lading myself, on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of November 1875, It was shown to me by the Station Master at Galt, when I was investigating, and making enquiries about this Contravention of the Fisheries Act; I believe the amount for freight then was \$3<sup>30</sup>/<sub>100</sub> and I understood then, the fish were brought by the G. V. Ry to Guelph, - from thence to Galt by G. W. Ry freight Train - and as freight; so that as far as my little knowledge serves me in this case, the Canadian Express Company, cannot now make a demand for this \$3<sup>30</sup>/<sub>100</sub> the barrel of fish referred to, if brought as Express matter by this Company from Toronto to Guelph, by the G. V. Ry - transhipped there to the G. W. Ry, as freight from Guelph to Galt - while the Express Company, should have delivered the fish by Express at Galt, as the fish were marked by the G. V. Ry - there; why this was not adhered to, by the Canada Express Company, I am aware was to evade if possible the Fisheries Regulation in the case, that was just then being strictly enforced in my division by the other Express Companies. . . .

It is quite correct that I sold the fish for \$75, and equally so, that by your imperative order to me, I ultimately sent you a two dollar bill of the Canadian Bank of Commerce No. 255976 dated Toronto May 1<sup>st</sup> 1871. the proceeds of the sale of fish now referred to in Mr. C. Rays letter. . . .

Please refer to my letter to you of



the 31<sup>st</sup> of March last. . . .

I was not aware until now that the Canadian Express Company carried white fish and Salmon Trout last year during close season. . . .

I may in conclusion add that American, and Vicker's Express Company afforded me every assistance last year, during close time, while I regret to say, as I found out since, that H. R. Coy, and the G. S. Ry, did the reverse by carrying the fish as freight. . . .

P.M., when he was fined five dollars and costs, for allowing lime to pass into Dundas Creek. I have the honor to report for your information, that on the 26<sup>th</sup> instant, in the Town of Dundas, in the North Riding of Wentworth, I examined, and inspected a small running Spring Creek, passing through, into, and afterwards from Mr Charles Lawrey's Sheep Skin Tannery and passing over private property, until it runs into, and empties itself into the waters of the Dundas Creek, a stream frequented by hals, pike, &c, fish named in the Fisheries Act.

The principle ingredients used for Tanning Sheep Skin is lime... The Vats in which the sheep skins are steeped, is apart from this small rivulet; But the Vat of lime water, in which the sheep skins are washed is always allowed to pass into the small running stream already referred to, carrying with it, a deposit of lime sediment, which pollutes the waters of this stream which afterwards enters the F. J. Canal, and Burlington Bay...

Chief Constable, Thomas MacDonough, of the Town of Dundas, and I, found lime in quantities at the bottom and sides of this Creek, at the same time the water in the creek, below this Tannery, was discoloured from the effects of the lime...

I had Mr Charles Lawrey - the proprietor, up before James Cahill Esq. Police Magistrate, Hamilton, this day, at 4. p. m., when after a prolonged enquiry he was fined ten dollars, and costs, for allowing lime to pass into the Creek... Before & Commence proceedings, Complaint was made to me against Mr Charles Lawrey's Tannery. Five men and two boys are daily employed therein, all of which is respectfully submitted.

Dear Sir -

I was in Duncville some few days since, and I am told that there are to be seen from 15 to 20 Jack lamps, - in the Upper River every night, and that the fishing is totally destroyed from man spearing, I enquired into the matter, and found such to be the case; I as a lover of sport, take an interest in the preservation of the fine fish so abundant in the Grand River, where I spend some time every fall and feel sure you are not aware of the slaughter that is taking place there; Mr Sheriff Woodruff suggested my writing you on the subject, and if I might be permitted to make a suggestion, it is that a man knowing the River should be sworn in as a special constable, to make a trip up the River, and take the names of the offenders, and punish them as the law directs; when there I spoke to a man willing to undertake it in this way; I merely mention this as in my opinion the easiest method of bringing these poachers to time, you, however, will be better able to judge the feasibility of the idea than I can, they are a cunning lot of dogs, and require to be trapped, I shall be glad to hear of a cessation of this unsportsman like mode of taking muskonge, and other fish. - - -

The Manchester Courier records a complete destruction of salmon and trout in the upper waters of the river Lune, owing to the contents of a barrel of creosote, used for dipping railway sleepers, having found its way into the river. The bed of the river was literally paved with salmon and trout. One person affirms that there are 500 salmon lying dead in a distance of ten miles below Tebay, and that trout by the bushel might be gathered out of the stream. In addition to this, it is feared that all the food is killed, and so for years the river will be barren as a fishing ground. The Lancaster Conservators are instituting an inquiry into the subject.

BEWARE OF ILLEGAL FISHING.—For some time past large numbers of men and boys have congregated—on Sundays more particularly—at Ashbridge Bay and the Queen's Wharf for the purpose of catching and spearing fish at openings made for that purpose in the ice. Information of the matter having been laid with Mr. Kerr, of Hamilton, Inspector of Fisheries, that gentleman came up here on Saturday to see into the matter. Having fully satisfied himself that things were as reported, Mr. Kerr proceeded down to the Queen's Wharf about 12:30 yesterday afternoon, accompanied by two of the city detectives, for the purpose of making arrests, and seizure of fishing gear if possible. On the parties approaching the wharf they discovered about fifty men plying their illegal and self-constituted vocation. Observing one of the men with a well-filled basket, one of the detectives went forward to take possession of it, together with several articles of fishing gear, in name of the law. The detective at the same time asked a boy beside the basket his name, but the other party, who, it is said, is his father, told him not to reply to the detective, but leave him to him. The man, whose name is James Phillips, then assumed a threatening attitude towards the officer, and at last grasped him by the beard. Seeing his companion thus roughly handled the other detective interfered, and Phillips was arrested on a charge of obstructing the police in the discharge of their duty. There was likely to have been a general row at one time, as Phillips called his companions to help him. This was happily avoided, however; and the detectives were allowed to remove their prisoner and the spoil without being further molested. The above action on the part of the Inspector of Fisheries will convince these parties and others of what the majority of them probably did not know—that it is unlawful to catch fish in the manner stated, and that the offence is aggravated by its being perpetrated on Sunday.

I have the honor to report you your information, that Mr Charles Duffy, of Collingwood - fisherman, and fish dealer, brought into the City of Toronto, on Thursday the 2<sup>d</sup> instant, in a large box on 4 wheels, by the G. R. Railway; 420 Salmon Trout, and White fish fresh, and sold them to Mr Michael Doyle, Mr Walsh, Mrs Leonard, Messrs McNeill and Barney, and which were publicly exhibited afterwards for sale, and sold and bought from the 2<sup>d</sup> until the 4<sup>th</sup> of November instant, during close season, in the public markets - Toronto. - - -

And I also learned from reliable authority, that on the 6<sup>th</sup> instant, Mr Charles Duffy's crew, fished up (in G. R. Bay.) and brought into Collingwood 3,000 White fish, and Salmon Trout, - - In my arrival in Toronto, this afternoon from my inspection of the River Saugeen, &c. &c. I learned these particulars; I also heard that Certificates were sent to Toronto, that these 420, White fish, and Salmon Trout, were legally caught. - - Now while I raise no objection, to these White fish, and Salmon Trout being legally caught, I consider your Circular dated Ottawa, 18<sup>th</sup> September 1876, - has been departed from by Mr James Patton, and the fish dealers of Toronto, as named above; so far, as I the Local Fishery Overseer of Toronto, is concerned - thus: "The Minister thinks it advisable to adopt some plan by which the good faith of the parties can be proven, to such an extent as to satisfy any fishery officer, into whose district they may be consigned or forwarded, that the fish are not subject to seizure, although they may be liable to detention." -

If I rightly understand this quotation, from your Circular, I am the person to whom the Certificate alluded to, should have been sent, but as this was not done, either then, nor since, I believe I am justified in drawing your attention now thereto! so that no person can say, this has all happened through my carelessness. -



Your Circular, Continues: "A simple and practical way, to do this seems to be for each Fishery officer, on receiving from the fisherman, the trader, or consignee, satisfactory assurances that certain fish in question were actually taken in legal season, and by lawful means, with sufficient references to ensure identity, to grant a certificate to such effect, which certificate could be duplicated and enclosed, to the resident Fishery Officer, - at or near the place of destination." - -

As this has been omitted, so far as I am individually concerned; I consider it my duty to bring this matter at once under your personal notice, more especially, as fishermen of Toronto, who saw the fish there, herein referred to, were amazed and somewhat annoyed at seeing these Wh: fish and Salmon Trout exposed for sale, bought and sold during the close season, and implying the belief, that there is something very loose in the matter. - - Altho' Mr. Michael Doyle, the Chief informed me that Mr. James Patton, has sent him the Certificate, I have not seen it, nor the duplicate, what shall I do in this matter. -

I have the honor to receive your letter of the 8<sup>th</sup> instant, relating to the subject of a petition, which Mr. Davis, M.P., has notified to the Department, and on which you are pleased to say: "I am to request you to make remarks, as concise as possible, on each of the seven paragraphs as shall appear to you calculated to assist the Minister in arriving at a satisfactory conclusion in the premises?" -

1<sup>st</sup> "That whereas the waters of B. bay, and Dundas Marsh, have been, and are resorted to by large numbers of various kinds of valuable fish, for spawning purposes."

In answer to this, I can have no hesitation whatever, in reporting that Herring, hals, (of the various kinds) pike, pickerel, white fish, and Salmon Trout, blackinggs and all the various kinds of fishes of a less valuable description, including Eels, are at all seasons in B. bay, and frequent the waters of B. bay, and Dundas Marsh, in great quantities at all times, as set forth in No: 1, of the Petition, for the purposes, amongst other things of spawning, and increasing their species, &c. &c. &c. - - -

2<sup>nd</sup> "And whereas the said fish, have of late years so decreased in numbers by reason of the constant use of gill nets, and the drawing of seines, both during the spawning season, and other times, that the fishing in said waters is almost destroyed?" -

In answer to No: 2, - of the petition; I have the honor to report, that you have been pleased to grant pike gill net licenses, (a limited number,) to the fishermen residents of B. beach, in fish in that part of B. bay, east, and south of a line run direct from the end of the rail fence, which is between the runs of Grant's Shanty - respectively on the bank of the Bay in the township of Barton, and Martin's wharf on B. beach, which is in the Township of Saltfleet: - And these



licenses, <sup>have</sup> invariably terminated on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of May,  
 in each year, - very gill nets found in any other part  
 of the Bay, have always been seized and confiscated by  
 me - as all my previous reports from time to time will  
 have advised you of. . . . Messrs. Birley & Co. of the  
 Ocean House - Hotel - B. Beach, have a spring li-  
 cense - seine hauling license, in B. Bay, in front of House,  
 but they fish there only occasionally, up to this above  
 date; and Daniel <sup>Ben Giddis</sup> McJuryne and Thomas Joyce, have  
 also licenses, within certain limits on the Beach, for seine  
 hauling for suckers, mullets, herring, pike and perch, not  
 within  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile of the canal, but these licenses ter-  
 minate about the 24<sup>th</sup> of May, in each year, - and  
 then there is Messrs. John Bates, Wm. Bates, Elliott Harris,  
 Wm. Gage, Simon Peter Stipe, and Wm. Lottbridge, residents on  
 the Bay - in Barton, and Saltfleet, farmers, to whom  
 pike gill net licenses, have been granted on the  
 same terms, as to the gill net fishermen on B. Beach  
 (proper) and this is all, and the only legal fishing  
 permitted by your licensed (g. net,) authority in B. Bay,  
 and it is an assumption for the petitioners to say;  
 that this small limited fishing can decrease the fish,  
 to the extent referred to, in p. 12, of the petition; how-  
 ever, I have no objection that the big farmers, whose names  
 I have herein submitted, should be debarred by you,  
 from fishing pike gill nets by license in future, leav-  
 ing this privilege to the B. Beach fishermen alone,  
 whose legitimate business in life it is to catch fish  
 as a means of living, and support for themselves  
 and families, besides supplying fish to the market  
 of Hamilton, with its greatly increased popula-  
 tion. . . .

I am not aware of, and there is not any other  
 net fishing of any kind being carried on at any  
 time in the Bay, by your authority, but what



herin have now laid open before you . . . .

3<sup>rd</sup>. And your petitioners submit, that great injury is being done not only to the said neighbourhood but to the whole of this Province, by the destruction of the fish which resort to the said waters to spawn? . . .

In reply to No: 3, of the petition; I have the honor to report, that any fish caught by the limited licensed fisherman during the limited time prescribed in their Licenses are never destroyed now, but are sold; and the proceeds is always used for maintaining the licensed fishermen, their wives and families - the fishermen are many of them, now <sup>very</sup> economical in their habits, and they cannot, and do not for obvious reasons afford to waste the fish in any kind, nor the proceeds of the sale of the fish, in a wasteful manner. -

4<sup>th</sup>. And your petitioners pray that hereafter the fishing inspectors, may be instructed strictly to prevent the use of nets of any, and every kind whatsoever, by any person whomsoever, in and about the waters of the said B. bay, and Dundas Marsh? . . . .

In reply to No: 4, I have the honor to report, that I feel grieved at finding the petitioners in moments of thoughtlessness, urging, <sup>on</sup> your honor to inflict an injury, limited to individuals - fishermen, whose avocation in life, is to fish for a subsistence, and in a small portion of B. bay, under licenses from the fisheries department, for which they annually pay, while these petitioners, who spear fish, are to have in future the entire run of (the bay), Dundas Marsh, and B. bay, at their disposal, and during Herring spawning time. . . . I may however venture to say; that if the department, came to the conclusion that Herring were not in the future to be speared during spawning time in B. bay. - The fishermen of B. beach, even poor as they be, would be quite ready, and willing to abandon gill net fishing



in that privileged part of B. Bay, during the limited spring fishing they now enjoy. -- Confining the spearing to pike, bass, and herring thro the Ice, from 1<sup>st</sup> of January, to 31<sup>st</sup> of March in each year. -- I say this on behalf of the B. Beach, fishermen advisedly. --

No: 5, "And Whereas your petitioners are aware that licenses have already heretofore been issued to certain persons to use gill nets, and seines in the <sup>said</sup> waters to the great detriment of the fisheries of this Province as aforesaid."

In reply to No: 5, I have the honor to report that this has been already reported on, as heretofore by me, as granted under your authority, and no damage has accrued therefrom as to the fish in B. Bay, but on the contrary good results have followed the indulgence you have granted. --

No: 6, "Wherefore your petitioners further pray, that no license to use the said nets be issued and that hereafter no fish shall be taken in any gill net or seine in Lake Ontario, within half a mile of the entrance of the B. Bay Canal?" --

In reply to No: 6, -- I have the honor to report, that I deem it as great presumption indeed in the petitioners dictating to you a course of proceeding not only opposed to the law, and the privileges and powers with which you are invested by the Fisheries Act; but to ask you to inflict an injury on poor fishermen, so that the petitioners might mutually quarrel and squabble themselves, and each other in spearing herring. This is inhuman and as such goes beyond my comprehension. I will not, and I cannot recommend you to grant No: 6, of the petition, nor to inflict an injury upon men, who are and have been so long catering for the public in Catching Herring.



and other fishes under license paid for, and granted by you, nor can I commend the latter part of No. 6, - of the petition for your consideration because it appears to me the petitioners seem in complete ignorance of what they ask - and don't say why it is, they ask for it. - - -

No. 7. And whereas the Herring, being a migratory fish and only frequenting Canadian waters during the spawning season; and the pike being a voracious <sup>and prolific</sup> fish and not liable to decrease as rapidly as they, your petitioners pray that hereafter there shall be no close season reserved for pike and herrings, and that the said fish may be killed and taken by spearing, and angling only, at any time without restriction? -

In reply to No. 7, of the petition I have the honor to report that I am compelled to say; in consequence of the very limited knowledge the petitioners have about the Herrings, &c. &c. that in order to carry out the request of these petitioners; and satisfy them, a thing which cannot be done, it would be necessary to repeal the fishing act, rules and regulations in council. The petitioners seem apparently ignorant the places where Herring at all times are to be found. - - If you adhered to their demands, how are the markets of the great cities on Lake Ontario Hamilton, and Toronto, &c. &c. &c. for instance to be supplied with this great staple food herring, caught at all seasons of the year. - - -

This No. 7, clause of the petition displays selfishness, and ignorance to an enormous extent on the part of the petitioners unparalleled beyond my comprehension. - - -

Those petitioners it appears are mostly farmers living as I understand at remote distances from Dundas, & C. Bay, they are usually in board houses, grain, hay, and fruit base machinery



threshing machines, cows, oxen, sheep, hogs, and domestic fowls, while the licensed fishermen of B. Bel<sup>but</sup> have no other means of support, by fishing for a scanty subsistence often. . . . The language of the petition is so contrary to facts and truth, from its commencement to the end, that I feel quite puzzled why they should again ask for the privilege of spearing, when they are already the bear of exercising under special licenses

In your letter - You are pleased to state to me thus! "You have already suggested the issue of licenses to spear bass, and pike from 1st of January to 31st of March".

In reply to this, I beg most respectfully to explain that allow this privilege during the period proposed, and recommended to you, by me, under special licenses, ought and should be sufficient for all reasonable people, but allow spearing and angling all the year round, indiscriminately, without any regard for the wants of others, displays selfishness, and thoughtlessness, for their fellow fishermen, on the part of the petitioners to an unpardonable extent, which I cannot recommend for your consideration to be granted. . . .

And as regards the pike and hals, they are always in splendid condition, and in season during the time I proposed, and recommended they should be speared, and caught with gill net but after the 10th of May, pike are not marketable fish, and hals being in their season, within five days afterwards, they require close attention on my part to protect them. . . .



Of course I have no objection to offer against angling during legal seasons, altho I may say, that during the great heat of summer, pike in other bays & pools are not very palatable and many are thrown away by anglers to perish, -

I have however known an instance this season, of a man named Whit MacDonald, catching in Dundas Marsh, and No. bay 940 pike by angling, weighing from as high as 16 pounds weight, which he sold for 4¢ per pound all round. -

You are pleased to say, "These petitioners seem to want angling and spearing for pike and sharrings to be free at all times" - "But it must be presumed they contemplate doing so under licenses which not be confined to any specified period?" -

In reply to this part of your letter, I have the honor to report that the petitioners themselves it seems to me do not know what they do want, they have been reporting abroad, that they would have the Dundas Marsh, and No. bay, altogether to themselves, "Licenses free" - but to this, to use a legal phrase, I must demur. -

I have above given you my humble views on the petition, and have withheld nothing from you in doing so, however. I may here state that whatever decision you arrive at, like an obedient servant of the department, I am, and in duty bound ready and willing, and will obey, and carry out to the best of my abilities. - With due respect

To S. - None of the petitioners have applied to me yet, for licenses to spear herring in No. bay and No. bay. - Yrs J. W. Kerr &c.



Note. 00, they petition against being free to be caught at all times by spearing and angling for these fish, have been caught by the licensed gill net fishermen, and marketed, usually at the end of our severe long Canadian winters, long before the choice fish, can be caught, and brought to market and I have witnessed delight pictured in the countenance of those fishermen, their wives and children, when in early spring, a bountiful providence blessed them with a plentiful supply of pike, just at the breaking up of the ice, - and when the proceeds of their sale of these fish was greatly needed by each family, and when the public demanded by those persons, who never spear nor angle nor net! is fish, fish, fish!.

I cannot recommend to you to curtail the privilege you were pleased already to grant to the N. beach fishermen, - so far as N. bay, in part is concerned, under licenses issued by you from the fisheries department. 00

I have received your letter of the 4<sup>th</sup> inst, offering me thus: "There are three points of importance requiring your attention, connected with the Congou River, on which the Department desires you to make some further inquiries?"

1<sup>st</sup> "Salmon fry being taken in the various places in the River by Mr. Mitchell, it is necessary to ascertain if any of the young fish remained or grown in the stream, or if they have migrated down on the lake, and returned, and in what proportion, also, if the River is suitable to the reproduction of Salmon, and if it is worth experimenting further on stocking it with adult or young Salmon?"

In reply I have the honor to report that I proceeded to the mouth of the River by railway the distance being about 15 1/2 miles, and placed myself at once in communication with Mr. Mitchell - Mr. Kings and other Mr. Mitchell's fishermen there, who reported on the land in the Pool, and which was afterwards carried into the Great Lake - that several Salmon were seen in the Congou but however between the river and the lake the fish were in a lake, and weighed it was about about a pound each. - On the 5<sup>th</sup> inst I proceeded from the mouth to the River, and from information communicated to me I called on Mr. J. Mitchell of the Mill - Proprietor of the Woolen Factory there who is a thorough sportsman, and who until recently owned the Mill, and the Congou News-paper. - This gentleman takes a lively interest in the protection of fish & game, and he fishes and shoots, and has done so for many years past, and he stated to me that he advertised in the paper last year, about 20 fish, that were seen in the Congou near his Woolen Factory in the lake just above the eddy position, and that he had seen in the River, at the lower Falls that he had seen about like trout but it was not trout, that he supposed to be Salmon -



He said, a good many of the same kind of fish were seen this year, some persons supposed them to be shad, but as they were exceedingly lively, he and other supposed them to be a younger branch of the salmon. — Mr. Murdoch, continued, they were shaped like shad, light silvery colour, purple on the back, passing to silver white colour on the belly of the fish, and they were the most active fish in the water, he ever beheld, this was in the month of May last, when he last saw them. — Mr. Murdoch said, such kind of fish, have never been seen in the Saugan River before, and he knows it personally for 20 years. — He stated a man supposed to be Joseph Stimpson, who lives about the Boundary bridge, he heard caught a fish in the Saugan River, that he supposed to be a salmon. —

Mr. Murdoch, of Paisley, his son corroborates the father's statement and he also stated there were two large fish, about 5 or 6, pounds weight each, and they were heading up the River, he observed about one dozen of them altogether; they came up stream like a drove of buckles, or as buckles do, in the spring each year; and the other fish of them, (the drove) were about 3 pounds each; it was the latter part of September last, when he observed this dozen of strange fish. —

Mr. John Johnston - Hotel Keeper, - Paisley corroborates the above so far as report goes. —

Maurice Laws - attends to the bank of the Saugan, and Bruce Railway, at Paisley Station, stated that he was fishing last summer in the Saugan River at Paisley, when Samuel Blumming, who was with him, fishing also, caught a handsome shaped fish, between 4. and 6, inches long, it was dark on the back, and light silver colour



on the lake - states that he knows what a Salmon fish is, saw plenty of large Salmon in the old country and has no doubt on his mind but the fish he saw Flamingo Lake, was a young Salmon.

Mr. G. G. Stewart - that Mr. George Stewart an old Salmon dealer, who has been in British Columbia and has been told by him about the fish Flamingo Lake said it was undoubtedly a young Salmon.

Mr. W. D. Stewart, James Stewart Stewart, lives on lot 10:52, on the St. Lawrence river that he has been told that Salmon was caught in the St. Lawrence last spring, at Walkerton. -- Altho I made repeated inquiries about Salmon, between Southampton, New Brunswick, and the St. Lawrence, all day on the 10th instant, I may say that the foregoing is in itself the entire information I was able to obtain. -- My own impression however, is that those Salmon, or above described fish were some of the Salmon run from the South branch of the St. Lawrence River, near the Railway Bridge at Forest by the General Wharf, a few years ago, and that having passed down into the main branch of the St. Lawrence, and perhaps into Lake Sturgeon, they were running up stream at Missis in the month of September last, when last seen on the rapids, before they disappeared in the eddy, by the Alexander Wharf, of Missis. -- If this should be your opinion - then my research has not been in vain. --

I consider the St. Lawrence the best country for Salmon raising, and the plotted at South Branch of the St. Lawrence, supposed to be very good country by the old settlers, as the source of the river is the same which empties in Lake Sturgeon at Forest. It is in every respect well adapted, and well adapted to the reproduction of Salmon, and I quite am sure it is well adapted.



condid opinion that it is well worth experimenting further on stocking it, with a large quantity of adult salmon, as well as with a numerous quantity of the young fish of that species. . . .

The ~~branch~~ or south branch of the Sauguee runs through Dayton, after which it joins the south Sauguee, another branch, and then enters the plain branch, between the villages of Stammers and Wallerton, say west of the village of Stammers, up the river, and which is 7 miles from Wallerton. . . .

Kemp creek, also coming from the south enters the plain branch of the Sauguee at Mr John Yensons, saw mill, - Allen Park, N. office - on lot No. 38, 1<sup>st</sup> Conception, - St. D. Road, in township of Bentinck. . . . These waters, like the upper waters of the River Credit, abound with speckled trout, but require to be protected. . . .

As regards the Mackay Sauguee, it is a very fine stream for speckled trout, they are in such abundance that I think that American salmon are usually found and catch them by the Mackay fall. . . . This branch coming from the north enters the plain stream of the Sauguee, at Dalglishes mill which is on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Conception of Bentinck. . . .

As regards the sharks and rapids, on the main branch of the Sauguee River, I may say, for your information that from Mr John Dimeys dam, which is just above the Road leading from Southampton to Green Pond say 2 miles from the mouth of the River where it enters into Lake St. Lawrence along under the Indian village and the country cannot be hurt, about 5 or 6 miles River in Canada. With reference to No. 2, in your letter of instruction to me of the 4<sup>th</sup> instant, in regard to the Sauguen River; thus: "If as a Great stream, it is desirable to preserve it by setting a part any portion for the artificial or natural propagation of Salmon and Trout?" —

In reply, I have the honor to report, that I can have no hesitation whatever in recommending that the River Sauguen with all its head water branches, together with a branch which enters the main branch above Walkerton, "Called Otter Creek", be and shall be set apart, for the natural and artificial propagation of Salmon, and speckled trout. — I recommend all, because as Mr. White the Commissioner is aware, that Salmon (and speckled trout) in spawning season, if not obstructed by mill dams or high perpendicular water falls, incline to these fish, invariably go up stream, as far as it is possible for them to go, to deposit their spawn, this done, they descend the stream again: And the upper branches, and minor parts of all Salmon streams, are I am aware always well stocked, and celebrated for speckled trout. —

Of course before you would do this, you might if you considered it advisable have me or somebody else go up there again so as to obtain for you more accurate extensive information, of these upper branches of the Sauguen River, which would have to be carefully traversed, and each repeatedly, in order to put you minutely in possession of all that you require to know. — I may here state that many respectable persons with whom I conversed of these, would be delighted if the streams were free of saw dust, &c. &c. &c.



and the angling for speckled trout was finally stopped by Regulation in Council, "even; if only for the period of three years" when they assured me speckled trout, would be then as numerous in the Saugeen River, and its tributaries, as ever they were. ---

As the following assertion made to me, is so encouraging, I cannot do otherwise than lay it before you, as coming from anglers and gentlemen, who assert, that they can remember only a few years ago, the time in Durham, and <sup>the</sup> ~~the~~ <sup>Hotel</sup> ~~Hotel~~, when at every meal, the Hotel furnished and had delicious speckled trout on the table.

I therefore beg most respectfully to recommend, that you will be pleased to adopt such Regulation, as will hereafter afford due protection, and preservation, to the Saugeen River, and its tributaries, and so have these delicious speckled trout, and the streams they inhabit, once more, and within three years, made what they were only a few years ago; and I may add that although many persons will then rejoice to see it, no man more than I will myself. ---

They report on saw mills, mill rubbish and fish-ways - you will please find herewith. ---

at 8. A. M., came 1. A. M. miles 110.



4, December 1876.

I have the honor to report, that on the night of Friday, the 24<sup>th</sup> of November last, in N. bay, I gaffled up a Herring gill net: say about 75 yards, it was set near the end of <sup>old</sup> Myles wharf and had about 100 herring and two fish alive and gilled in it at the time about 100 herring, and two pike alive and gilled in it at the time, this was about 9 o'clock, p. m. - about 11 o'clock p. m. same night, I found Lou x of Hamilton, an old offender, and Wm Bruce Wapew of N. Beach, in a boat the property of Brofs, at the same place I had previously found, and gaffled up the Herring gill net, pike and herring above referred to.

In Brofs's boat was a gaffle net with weed on it, and a wash tub for putting the fish and net in I presume. - - I had a lamp in my possession at the time, otherwise I could not distinguish them, and all this under Section 18: 2, of Section 18, of the Fisheries Act. - - -

I had the houses and premises of these (two) men afterwards searched, and took the boat the property of Lou x into custody, and about 300 yards of Herring gill net, and 200 yards of pike gill net from Wm Bruce Wapew, neither of these men having a license to fish. - -

The cases against them is adjourned until Saturday next, the 9<sup>th</sup> instant, at 10 o'clock a. m. - and as the gill net I found set in the Bay, is supposed to be a stolen net, I would like very much if its meets your approval to have some efficient members of the bar, here appointed by the Hon: Minister of Justice because this illegal H. gill net fishing in N. bay, has to be stopped and put down with a firm hand, and I believe by



this net will be traced into the possession  
of Thomas Croft. -

FISH DECREASING. - There can be no doubt whatever that the black bass is leaving us gradually but surely. The cause is plain. The dam at Caledonia is too high for the fish to jump, and no slides are placed there for them to ascend. On the other hand Paris dam is constructed so that the bass can, with sufficient depth of water, pass up the river, and we find this season larger numbers of this game fish are being taken in the upper reaches than here in Paris. We are thus in the position which, if some steps be not taken will before long leave us entirely minus the bass fishing. Do our local fisherman consider the question of sufficient importance to do anything towards making representations to the Minister of Fisheries about it?

I am to enquire whether this is not an advance of the usual rate which was supposed to be  $\$1$ . for the season. . . .

In reply, I have the honor to report that it is in advance  $\$2$ , beyond the usual rate of  $\$1$ , "which I consider too small," heretofore charged; but old spearing fishermen, will have no objection to pay it, provided starting spearing, from the 10<sup>th</sup> day of November, in each year is included in this  $\$3$ , - amount, for all the season. . . .

And this amount is not too high for the season, when it is taken into account, that some boys a good speares, in clear water through the ice in B. bay, has frequently speared as high as four dollars, worth of pike and hals, (average) per day, for several days. -- Besides to fix it, at this rate will keep off boys, who are always an injury, and a nuisance to all good fishermen. . . .

In connection with this I strongly recommend that you will be pleased henceforth to abolish all pike spearing in Dundas Marsh, and B. bay during Spring in each year. . . .

The foregoing being alone the fixed and established spearing season in Dundas Marsh, and B. bay, Annually. -



I may mention here for your information, that out of the fifty one persons who paid \$1. for herring spearing last November and the early part of this month, not more than (20) I expect will be successful, and pike spearing through the ice. ---

Quite a number of persons who were before the river, and always upon the ice, and pike will I am sure apply. ---

It goes many herring are always speared in deep water, through the ice, during each season.

I have the honor to report for your information, that on Monday night last, the 27<sup>th</sup> of Nov<sup>r</sup> about 9 o'clock, p.m. - I captured a row boat, with your bars, and a paddle the property of William Malsie, on W. bay, beside Stalley's boat house, in the city of Hamilton. - - -

The particulars are as follows; I was on the Bay in company with my son Charles John Kerr, and another person, when we observed the said boat, with three persons in it, who! on observing us, ran away. - - On my examining the boat, I found your herring, recently caught in a sterring gill net, under steam seat, and a quantity of scales of sterring therrin. - - Also a sterring spear, whilst on the beach beside a log, close to the boat, I found a three hook grapple with about eleven yards of rope net, and recently used attached thereto besides two fresh sterring; and a little further from these, and where one of the persons, I observed in the boat jumped a post, and board fence, I found 24 sterring, more! - and about ten yards of sterring gill net, all of which, I took instantly into my possession. - - -

While on my way to Mat: Thompson's boat house, towing Malsie's boat thereto, W<sup>m</sup> Malsie, and John Gray - roused up, and in a domineering manner, demanded his boat, which I refused to give up, being as I said caught in the act of a contravention of the fishing Act, telling him the pains and penalties of the law, if he laid hands on it. - - -

At Thompson's boat house, a crowd of about one dozen of Malsie's friends assembled, but no attempt was made to



by him to regain or take the boat from me. - It was put in Thompsons boat house. -

I heard that night and since that Isaac Blows, "an old offender" Hector Mafie, a brother of William Mafie, and John Gray - were the persons who used the boat in the illegal herring gill net fishing referred to. -

On Thursday last, I brought this boat and case before James Cahill Esq. J.P. - Wm Mafie being present, this, and on the evidence (more) of the facts set forth herein - the boat, the oars, paddle, the spear, grapple, the herring, and gill net, were confiscated to Her Majesty - the Queen. -

With regard to Mafie, Isaac Blow, who owns the grapple, John Gray and Hector Mafie - the supposed violators of the fisheries Act, in this boat, and gill net fishing case, it was to engage counsel examine each of them separately for this offence that I telegraphed you, on Tuesday last, besides having the aid of said Solicitor in the case against Thomas Croft, and Wm Prince Wapew, the particulars of which you will please find in my report which accompanies this.

With reference to your letter of instructions to me, dated the 4<sup>th</sup> instant, regarding the Saugeen River; Thus;  
 3<sup>rd</sup> "What mill dams exist thereon, and their state, as to fishways, and if any injury is done, and where by saw dust, or mill rubbish. . . .

In reply, I beg most respectfully to report, what I saw, during my enquiries, and that came under my personal observation, and also what was communicated to me by reliable persons, most deeply interested in keeping out saw dust, and mill rubbish, the bane and destruction of the choice fish in the Saugeen River, and its tributaries. . . .

On the 8<sup>th</sup> instant, I saw, and inspected Mr. John Winney's mill dam, situated above the Bridge on the Main Road leading from Southampton to Owen Sound; say! about two miles from the mouth of the River, at Southampton. . . .

This dam is about 130 yards wide from pier to pier, and was built this year. There is no fishway in this dam, and being about 10 or 12 ft. high, with an apron about 18 feet, no fish can ascend it in its present position, straight as it is across from bank to bank, fish cannot get over the dam. . . .

At each side of the River, at the end of the dam there is a substantial abutment or pier, made of square timbers, and which is filled in, with stone; these abutments are higher than the dam. . . . There is a flour mill, a woollen factory, and saw mill, below this dam, on the west side of the River, the saw mill however, is not in operation. The banks of the Saugeen River here ranges as high as 120 ft. . . . This dam cost Mr. John Winney \$4,000, for constructing it. It should have 3 fishways in it. . . .



Mr John Macfarlane of Dunblane, has a saw mill on Snake Creek, in the township of ~~Wendell~~ <sup>Wendell</sup> the Robert, was sawing when I visited the mill, and the saw dust from the mill was floating on the water, down stream. -- The water from this creek empties into the Saugan River, about 6 miles below Macfarlane's mill; Macfarlane's saw mill is so constructed that he can readily keep out the saw dust. --

At the junction of Snake Creek, with the Saugan River, Mr. Wendell, has a steam flour mill. -- Above Macfarlane's, on Snake Creek, Mr. George Fields, has a saw mill, on the 12<sup>th</sup> township of Wendell, and the saw dust from it, comes down Snake Creek, floating on, and in to the waters of the Saugan River, <sup>at Wendell,</sup> --

There is no dam on the Saugan River, between Donneys dam, and Walkerton. --

At Paisley, Messrs. Sinclair, and Blackburn own a <sup>large</sup> saw mill, and shingle factory, on the bank of the Saugan River; beside the mill several tons of saw dust, mill rubbish, and shingle raff was seen by me on the bank, and in the waters of the River, where it was wheeled out, and left, so that a good freshet ~~will~~ at any time carry it all down to this saw mill, at the head of a small island, large sidings, and saw dust is heaped up, in the waters of the Saugan, and against a boom placed there: --

While the bottom of the River, is filled up, with a large supply of <sup>illegal,</sup> such objectionable mill rubbish. --

It was near the lower end of this boom, where the rapid and eddy is, that Mr. J. Murdoch and his son, pointed out to me as the place, they, and a great many other people observed the fish ~~to~~ to be Salmon, as already reported to you, by me. --

Mud Creek enters the Saugan River at Paisley, and at the mouth of it, there is a dam



and saw mill, and Shingle Factory, owned by  
 Mr. Duncan Fisher, - the saw dust was floating down  
 the Saugeen River, as seen by me when I was there, and  
 came from Mr. Fisher's saw mill. There is no fish-  
 way on this dam. --- Messrs Mackay and Young,  
 of Paisley, have Messrs Sinclair and Blackburn  
 Steam Saw Mill, leased for five years. ---

Mr. Blackburn, who came up to me on the  
 main street in Paisley, told me his wish, was,  
 that Mackay and Young, of Paisley, should  
 keep out the saw dust, and mill rubbish, &c. &c,  
 from the Saugeen River. --- Willow Creek, also  
 joins the Saugeen River here, - and it has speckled  
 trout, in it still; And at the boundary of the village  
 on lot No. 18, Con. B. Edwards, there is a pure, heavy,  
 clear stream of water - a feeder to the Saugeen River,  
 with plenty of speckled trout, in the upper waters of  
 it, to this day, above Beardman's Mill, so I was told.

At Walkerton, I next visited Messrs J. Hoyons  
 and Mr. Saw Mill, - the saw dust, &c, is all taken  
 from the saw mill by machinery - runners that carry  
 it up into a hopper, under which a cart is placed,  
 and by pulling a string the cart is filled instantly  
 and taken away. --- Every precaution is used  
 and at this saw mill, which is very extensive:  
 to keep the saw dust, and mill rubbish, out of the  
 Saugeen River; - and <sup>which</sup> is so very creditable on  
 the part of those proprietors, that it affords me  
 great pleasure to report so, in their favour, as most  
 praiseworthy. ---

In the dam above Hoyons saw mill, plainly  
 back, and door, &c, factory - there is what was in-  
 tended for a fishway. - It is only about four feet  
 wide, has 6 inside pieces properly placed within  
 two square planks, one on each side, and these are



about 20 feet long, but no fish have got up this, because the lower end is out of the water; and the upper end was stopped by a board placed in front, so as to raise the water in the main stream and turn it into the mill race. -- This dam should have two efficient fish-ways in it, to be kept at all times in working order, during spring and fall. -- The dam is about 100 yards wide and the water is available running over it, except where boards are placed across  $\frac{1}{2}$  the dam, to turn the water into the mill race. -- The Miss <sup>3</sup>/<sub>III</sub> Boston's Complained and told me that the <sup>III</sup> bleeding - "On the Otter Creek" - says about 3 miles above Walkerton - allows all his saw-dust, Fe, Fe. to flow into the creek, thence into the Saugeen River from his saw mill - house about 300. Waggons loads have come down from Falls Mill on the main branch of the Saugeen River, and from Cledding's mill, - on the Otter Creek, recently since the freshets in September last, and mixed up so bad with these logs in the mill pond that it was after great difficulty, and much manual labour, they got the saw dust and mill rubbish away from the logs. - Besides the saw dust, and mill rubbish, including slabs, edgings Fe, coming down stream continually damaging and polluting the water; farmers throw in brush, and thereby damage the fish in the River Saugeen, to a much greater extent than I can here in my limited report describe it to you.

I called on Mr. R. B. Clement, a farmer, he lives on lot 52, on the Saugeen River, he had a Bar: over the River, by which to cross from one side of the River to the other - back to, and from his farm; slabs, sidings, mill rubbish, and saw dust came down the River, since September last, and took down one bent and pier of his bridge and swept it away, and I found when I was there that from this Bar: up the River, for upwards of 120 yards, that the River Saugeen, at this place with



high banks, on each side of it, was completely jammed up, with slabs, shavings, saw dust, and mill rubbish, of all kinds and about 300 yards further up, a like quantity of this mill rubbish was jamming up the River. . . . This injurious stuff to fishes, and annoyance to the public came principally from Stone Mill, owned at present by the Merchants Bank, Walkerton, but leased to Messrs. James Brocklebank and John Laumont, the present occupants, as tenants. . . .

I next visited the mill, and was informed by the owner of Stone Mill that he <sup>saw</sup> saw as bad as the River is here about the mill: . . . Sawmill going on and saw dust was pouring into the River, and nothing and no body to prevent it, shavings, slabs, and mill rubbish being up in the River and floating away down the River, and adding to the two blocked up places, not already referred to above. John Laumont one of the Messrs. told me, he had a Bridge in front of the mill on the River, but that the late freshet swept it away. I am furnished nothing but a heavy gate will stop it. . . .

This mill is now called Maple Hill Mill. The dam above the mill over the Saugeen River, is about 60 yards wide, and is 7 feet high, above the apron and the apron, from the dam, down stream, is 18 feet long and the full width across, and it has no gate way. The dam is under contract for repairing at present and Mr. Laumont told me arrangements were entered into to put in a new (better) a large and substantial fish way, of the best, most modern approved plan is absolutely required to be placed in this dam without any delay. . . . The saw dust here in as far down as Mr. R. B. Clements farm, was very abundant. . . .







which comes down from the next, and the other mills on the River Sauguen, and other streams, (branches) above Stauver:-- And then again, at the third Bridge, mill rubbish is heaped up in the River, which evidently came down also, from the upper saw mills; there is no fish-way on the dam, above the Adams mill.

Mr. Wm. Stocktel owns a saw mill, on Jones, creek,  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles above Stauver village. Saw dust, slabs, sidings, edgings, and mill rubbish, enters the Sauguen River, from this mill in abundance. . . .

Mr. John Genson's saw mill at Allan Park P. office, in the Township of Kentuck, - lots Nos 37, and 38, Con: 1<sup>st</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> Div Road, allows all his saw dust slabs, edgings, and sidings to fall into the Sauguen River, he was having done so when I was there, I saw it myself. . . . The saw mill is on Kemp Creek, just where it joins the main Sauguen River, at the end of the lumber yard. . . . There is a dam above the mill, it is 8' ft high, with an 18' ft apron, but no fish way. . . . Above Mr. Genson's saw mill, but on the main branch, there was another saw mill, but the dam was carried away about 3 weeks previously. . . . It was owned by Mr. George Eric. It is about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles up the stream, on lot No: 41, in the 4<sup>th</sup> Div Road. . . .

Then the Rocky Sauguen, enters the Big Sauguen at Daglish's mill - on the 3<sup>rd</sup> concession Kentuck. . . .

About 3 miles, north west from Durham, on the Rocky Sauguen, Mr. John Crawford has a saw mill and the saw dust, and mill rubbish falls into the stream, which afterwards flows into the main Sauguen River, as in the previous sentences but forth. . . . On the Rocky Sauguen above



Mr John Leavelle, miller - Mr J. Stagnard, and  
 below, have a saw mill, and they allow the saw  
 dust to enter the stream.

In Durham village we have the Big Saugan,  
 Mr Blackburne owns two saw mills there but at  
 present there is only one then running. - I have much  
 pleasure however, in reporting for your information  
 that the greatest care has been taken by him and his em-  
 ployees to keep every particle of saw dust and mill  
 rubbish out of the creek, in which they have most  
 satisfactorily succeeded. - From Durham to the town  
 of Walkerton is 7 miles by road; by the Main Road  
 I should suppose it to be 20 miles.

From Durham to Mt Forrest, is 17 miles, I  
 passed over, the Kemp Creek, the Little Saugan, and the  
 Beatty Saugan, in going there; The Mainland or  
 South Branch of the Saugan is a lively stream at  
 Mount Forrest, south of the town. - Kemp Creek  
 is near Durham - The Little Saugan is between Kemp  
 Creek and Orchard Mills; at which place is Beatty's  
 Saugan. - Mr James Dodds lives on 2<sup>d</sup> Division of  
 lot No 16, in the 1<sup>st</sup> concession of Egremont, County of  
 Grey. - He has a saw mill on the creek, at  
 Orchard Mills; I found no saw dust in the creek,  
 at Mr Dodds mill. -

Above Mr Dodds Mill on the Beatty Saugan,  
 at Holstein village - Mr Petri, owns a saw mill, -  
 and below Mr Dodds mill - about 1 1/2 miles - Mr  
 Godfrey, owns a saw mill, - a man named Ker-  
 by from Mt Forrest rents it, - the saw dust, is allowed  
 to enter the waters of this branch, from these two mills.

The Beatty Saugan rises in the township of Egremont,  
 from two sources, ~~at~~ Wells or Springs, and unite  
 into one stream, before it arrives at Beatty's farm,  
 from whom it derives its name. - The Beatty



Saugeen, The Little Saugeen, and the Maithand, or South Branch of the Saugeen, all join and unite about Mestert in the Township of Hormauby, about 5 miles below Ayrton. - After uniting the South enters the main branch, near the Village of Stannover, as already set forth in this report. - - -

I visited Mr. David Yeomans saw-mill at Mt. Forrest, but the saw dust is not permitted to enter the Maithand or South Branch, and this was the only saw mill that I visited on this branch of the Saugeen River, having to return home, and issue licenses for spearing herring in Dundas Marsh, and N. bay. - -

Mrs. John Martin & Son, have a saw mill on this stream, and a fishway in his dam, and does not allow the saw dust to enter the stream. - - -

Mr. John Reid, next down stream, has a saw mill - he does not permit the saw dust, to enter the stream. - - Mr. John Dickson, has a saw mill, and keeps out the saw dust. - -

Then comes Mr. Thomas Robertson saw mill, at Ayrton. - And below this is Mr. Winklers Mill. - - Then there is a saw mill, on a small creek, 3<sup>rd</sup> conception of Hormauby, owned by Mr. Colin Blythe, all of these smaller creeks unite, join the main branch as already stated. \*See above\* \*Come on here\* -

On Mud Creek, besides Duncan Fishers saw mill, at Paisley, Thomas Pinkerton of Pinkerton - Charles Michal, of Michals siding, Wm. G. and Bruce Railway. - 1/4 miles, above Pinkerton village, and Wm. Ellis, above that, his post office is, Dunkeld - all these saw mill owners allow



the saw dust to fall into the ~~mouth~~ of Mud Creek, which enters the Saugeen River, at Paisley, as already reported to you above. . . .

The foregoing contains a true and elaborate account of the Saugeen River, and its branches, as called for by your instructions to me, under the head No: 3. -

In conclusion, I have no hesitation in recommending that prompt measures should be at once taken by the department - Ottawa, to keep out the saw dust, and mill rubbish, from the Saugeen River, and its valuable feeders, and branches, and if necessary impose some fines, so as to enforce the law in this behalf. . . .

I also recommend that fishways of the best, and latest model, approved of by the department, under the supervision of an efficient fishery officer, be constructed in all the dams of the main branch of the Saugeen River, and its valuable tributaries; say; between Southampton, and Durham - Maple Hill, and Mt. Forrest, - Walkerton and Midway, "on the Otter Creek" - Paisley, and Dunkeld - "Mud Creek" - and from Haglish's Mill, - to the source of the Rocky Saugeen, which is about 3 miles north east from the village of Durham, or on any portion, or part of these valuable streams, with extensive saw mills, and mill dams, erected thereon, now in operation, that the department in its wisdom, and better judgement, may now deem advisable to meet the requirements of the public, and for the public good. . . .

When this being in operation towards completion, I strongly recommend the stocking of the Saugeen River, &c. as per my reports in reply to Nos: 1. and 2. - of your letter to me, of the 4<sup>th</sup> instant, already made to you, and then protection, prompt



and complete - should follow. -- all this, there is great necessity for, - in order that full protection as under the requirements of the Fisheries Act, may be carried into effect accordingly. --

I have to apologise for making such a lengthy report under the head of No: 3 - and with due respect,

In answer to your letter, "Is it true that the ponds on Toronto Island, are netted constantly, and many small fish killed?"

In reply, I have the honor to inform you that there is no truth whatever in such a report, and whoever the person is, who made such false report to you, should be taken up, and be made an example of, for slandering the Licensed fishermen of Toronto Island.

The Gun Club - a sportsman's society Toronto - drew my attention to this same matter about three years ago, and in order to test the truth of the assertion, and satisfy myself thereon, I went on the Island then, and examined it, from one end to the other, and I have done so each year since during net fishing; and I did not find a particle of truth in the assertion.

No net fishing of any kind has been carried on in the ponds or bays of Toronto Island, except at the head, which is next the Cut, since last May. - In Black House bay, and Mackenzie point, suckers, and pike are hauled for, every spring, but there is no small fish killed.

The whole bay, ponds, and inlets, have always been thrown open for amusement to the citizens of Toronto, and for angling purposes by the licensed fishermen there.

I may here state, that during the month of June, in each year, since I first discovered and reported the matter to you, large quantities of the so-called shad: "Herring I believe they are" - die, by millions, and are to be seen dead lying on the Lake shore of Ontario, but this is not



caused by the fishermen of Toronto Island, nor any other locality on the Lake, but it is the result of some other unknown cause, to be still discovered...

Whoever, the individual is, who sent you this false statement, I may here say, in answer, that it is malicious, and has no foundation in fact. - You may rely upon what I say: - And with due respect. -

I have the honor to receive your letter of the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. calling on me - "to explain, supply particulars, and state if you secured and kept in spirits, any specimens to send here." - For - "The News" papers state that amongst a large quantity of scisces and young shad taken in a single haul of the seine at Pt. Beach, a young salmon was caught." - "Also explain how it is that these shad fry are thus illegally killed."

In reply, I have the honor in the quiet place to send you the article itself, by which you will at once find there was no seine haul made. Thus: -

This article was first put in the "News" paper here of last Saturday by Mr. Harris - Manager, at the instance of Ben: Goulds, a fisherman on Pt. Beach; - The particulars are as follows; On Friday the 2<sup>nd</sup> of February instant Ben: Goulds, and Dan McFoyne, fishermen, residents on Pt. Beach (jointly together) fished up their scisco gill nets in Lake Ontario, at a distance of about 14 miles from Pt. Beach about midway from Menona and Grimsby, and about 8 miles out in the lake from the nearest land. -

In fishing up Dan: McFoyne observed amongst the scisces and Herring - a small salmon about 6 inches long, and about 1/4 of a pound weight, the belly out of it, gilled in the net - it was dead, otherwise it would have been liberated. -

The joint take in these scisco gill net - on that occasion, was 5,500 scisces, 2000, Gasperaux, and this small salmon. - Gasperaux is an inferior Salt Water Herring. - It was first discovered in L. Ontario, Toronto Island - and reported upon by me, to you, on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of June 1873. - and more frequently to you many times since by me. -



These fishes are now found in millions in Lake Ontario, and in No. bay, - all the year round, and the fishermen consider themselves well paid - if they can get 40 cents, per 100, for them. - I sent a sample to Mr. White - the Commissioner of Fisheries. Ottawa, about 3 years ago. ---

I beg to explain, that I am not aware of the fish being illegally killed in Lake Ontario, nor in any part of my division, - and without having any wish to detract from the great abilities of Mr. Seth Green, who has the News-papers wide reputation, for populating Lake Ontario - if News-papers are to be relied upon, with this self same inferior herring, gaspereaux, or young shad: I must candidly say, and fearlessly say, at that, that there is no credit due to Mr. Seth Green, as yet, according to my certain knowledge, so far as shad in Lake Ontario is concerned, and I believe I do know the fish resources of all kinds in my own division in Lake Ontario to perfection. ---

I heard it said, that the Gaspereaux are a species of the Sterring fish, known in a bay of that name, about Newfoundland, and from which these fishes derive their name. ---

I may further explain - that no seine hauling of any kind is, nor can at present be carried on, at No. beach, in Lake Ontario; the ice is heaped up several feet high, resting on the bottom of Lake, and extends from the shore outwards about 200 yards, and over which the fishermen are obliged to cut a Road way, to run out, and launch their boats, and mind you only the weather happens to be just now mild, they could not set out nor fish up, their scissos gill net in Lake Ontario; I may also explain for your information that No. bay is also well supplied with these gaspereaux, and on which the Pike prey



extensively. --

I may here tell you something that happened in the N. Canal - during the summer of 1875. --

"A raft was being taken from N. bay, to Lake Ontario, thro' the canal, when towing on a shoal of these fish suddenly in the canal, 340, of them jumped up out of the water on to the raft, and were secured by the Raftsmen. --

SOME TWO YEARS ago Mr. Seth Green placed a number of recently hatched shad in Lake Ontario for the purpose of trying whether these salt water denizens would live and thrive in fresh water at such a distance from the sea. A great many young shad have been cast up dead along the shores of the lake, but a gentleman who gives his experiences on a fishing tour seems to cast doubt on the belief that nearly all of Mr. Seth Green's fish had died off. He says:— "A fishing excursion to Olcott, eighteen miles easterly from the mouth of the Niagara River, on the shore of the lake, led me to considerable rowing in Olcott harbour and in the lake beyond. The attention of our whole party was almost diverted from the pursuit of bass, herring, and perch by the sight of a host of little fish skimming and skipping about the surface of the water in an erratic fashion. We observed them wherever we went, and in such numbers that they were easily taken with a small landing-net. In size they averaged from four to five inches in length, and some were larger. I examined them carefully, and was well satisfied, as were those with me, that they were young shad. They all had the shape of the shad, and the unmistakable dark hue on the back, beautifully shaded off to silver on the sides. Now, what cause brought such multitudes of these young shad to the surface? It is to be especially noted that there were none floating dead or powerless on the water, nor were any found on the shore; all of them seemed to be in full possession of their powers, but impelled from some unknown cause to dart hither and thither on the surface."

#### ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO LEVY TRIBUTE.

Alderman Waddell and Mr. Carpenter having failed in securing all the avenues to the city, and thereby levying tribute on all who enter or depart, have got up another scheme to effect the same end. Under the peculiar Act which enables them to assume and make toll leviable, without the consent of the rate-payers or travellers, they have notified the Council of the township of Barton that they are about to take possession of a piece of road leading into the city by the way of the Albion Mills, and running along the brow of the mountains. Mr. Kerr, the Fishery Inspector, is the ostensible operator of this little game. But the Council of Barton, are, I am informed, aroused. And the object of all these speculators to levy tribute will certainly be defeated by a meeting of the Council called together by the Reeve, Mr. Loury.

The London Free Press says:—"In the case of W. D. McGleghon, of this city, v. J. J. Mason, of Hamilton, in the \$20,000 libel suit, judgment has been entered, we are informed, against the defendant. This case arose out of an article published in the Craftsman some time ago by the defendant in regard to the establishment of the Grand Lodge of Free Masons of Ontario."



Annual Report for year 1876. -

Hamilton, 23, January 1876.

Sir, - I have the honor to report that my active duties commenced this year, as early as the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January 1876, when by your Orders, I proceeded to Collingwood, and Meaford, on the Georgian Bay, and with the aid and assistance of Mr. C. McFayden, Marriate, Owen Sound, - appointed by you - Mr. James Patton, and Geo. S. Miller - Local fishery Overseers of these Divisions, I fined several of the licensed fishermen there, for contraventions of the fisheries Act, committed by them during close season. - Not however, enforcing the law in any of the cases, altho inflicting fines, leaving all the cases to the Merciful consideration of the Hon. the Minister - to whose better Judgement, and final decision, I sent copies of all the proceedings. -

As regards my own Division proper - Bay, Burlington Bay, for instance, I was obliged during the month of May last, to seize, and confiscate about 1500 yards of Pike gill nets, - found set in prohibited portions of B. bay, set there by a party of unlicensed fishermen, who were fined for committing the offences. - It has since come to my knowledge, that these gill nets were furnished to these persons by Mr. Ben. Goulds, a licensed fisherman, on B. beach, who purchased from them, the pike illegally caught on that occasion. - -

After the convictions took place, my boat, a paddle, and two pair of Oars were stolen, and except the paddle, which I traced to Thomas Croft, - and now in my possession - one of the convicted persons, herein alluded to, I have never since had any clue to the whereabouts of the boat, and Oars. - - -

You will please observe by my returns, that the take and Catch of white fish and Salmon Trout has been small, as compared with previous years, why, it is so, you will please observe, I attribute the

With reference to my letter of the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. explaining particulars regarding a shews = paper report of young shad being caught in Lake Ontario, N. Y. & I have now the honor of sending you a small box, by Express, containing about 50, or 60, of the so called shad. -- I will venture to say, that on making a close examination of these fish no man will be able to say they are shad; although by flavour smell, and taste, they appear to be a salt water fish, apparently of the Sterring tribe.

On examining those fish I now send, I don't think you will find any roe or spawn in them, which is a convincing proof, that they are not shad. -- They are the same kind of fish, I reported on to you, on the 10<sup>th</sup> of June 1873. -

A man who came up here last summer, from Lower Canada, and who saw some of those fish, called them Gaspereaux. - - -

I will thank you to let me know their name, so that I may publish it to the community. - - With due respect,

The schooner "The Fish Hawk" left for the coast of Labrador on the 10th inst. The vessel has been unfortunate, and during her voyage some 500 nets were lost valued at a value of \$3000. The schooner, on Saturday with 1,000 packages of fish, and loaded some supplies for the coast.

AN INTERESTING QUESTION. - Last week we noted the fact that Mr. Lawry and Mr. Mason, tanners, of Dundas, had been fined \$10 and costs by the Police Magistrate of Hamilton, on complaint of Mr. Kerr, Fishery Inspector, for allowing the refuse from their tanneries to be emptied into the creek, and now we learn that the Cotton Works Co. have been summoned to answer to a similar charge, the question being meanwhile referred to the Minister of Fisheries at Ottawa. With regard to this subject, we can only say that the complaint is a most frivolous one, and we trust the head of the Fishery Department will view it in this light. That there are some little cat fish and suckers in the creek we will not deny, but that they could possibly be injured by any of the dyes or other refuse which is allowed to go into the creek from the Cotton Mills and Tanneries is simply ridiculous, as long before the fish are reached the injurious properties of the refuse must be completely destroyed. This is the view which any man of common sense would take of the subject, and it is simply nothing more nor less than a species of petty persecution which has dictated the action we have spoken of. If our manufacturing establishments are to be thus annoyed by those who have a little brief authority the sooner the Government gets rid of such over-anxious servants the better will it be for the public interests.

I have the honor to report for your information that on Tuesday night last the 24<sup>th</sup> day of February last on the Niagara River, south of a place called the "Lawrence" in the township of Niagara at 9 p. m. I found James Fitzgerald James Robbins and Winfield Scott residents of Lewiston, United States, fishing and catching fish, with a seine, it being in Canadian water, and without a license from the department. I arrested them and captured the seine, two fishing screws, four bars, and some herring, pickled and pickers. They attempted to get away, by showing off their seine boat got loosened but being called upon to surrender, they done so at once; and they offered no resistance. - - -

I then and there, by the glorious light of the moon, - tried the prisoners, whom I fined two dollars each, and I confiscated the seine, the boats, oars, ropes, and fish to Her Majesty our Queen. The fish I sold for \$1<sup>50</sup>/<sub>100</sub>. - The prisoners having paid the fines, I liberated them. - The seine &c. I brought down to the Town of Niagara, to be detained in safe keeping, awaiting your Will or pleasure. - In conclusion I may add, that James Sheppard, of Lewiston, who acted as my constable, done his duty most efficiently, also James Longhurst, and Harry Sheppard - licensed fishermen, who accompanied me on this duty, as also did "Old Man" a Coloured man. -

There are five seines taken between



Lewiston, and Youngstown, on the American side of the Niagara River, - and being too much crowded over there, they have been in the habit of stopping over, and hauling on the Canadian side of the River Niagara, in our waters. - -

You were pleased to give to George Wagner of Youngstown U.S., on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of October last, the enclosed license, which he would never left receive. - -

What I now beg most respectfully to recommend in this present case, is, that you will be pleased to cancel this license, which is now enclosed - and that you will be also please to give a license for this current year, to James Fitzgerald, of Lewiston, U.S., for the same limits, by doing this! - I would further respectfully recommend, - that you will be pleased to restore the forfeitures, when James Fitzgerald, becoming a licensed fisherman, has promised to conform strictly to our laws, in every particular, "and keep off all trespassers." - -

In conclusion I have the honor to refer you to my letters of the 12, of July, and the 4<sup>th</sup> of October last, in behalf of license granted to George Wagner, and I hope the recommendation therein contained, may now have full force and effect, for <sup>Mr</sup> James Fitzgerald - Lewiston, U.S. -

Two American fishermen from Lewiston, N. Y., were arrested at Queenstown, Ont., for fishing in Ontario waters. And now the question arises, How is it that the zealous Ontario fishermen are able to protect their side of the Niagara river from the American depredator, while the great fisheries are unprotected?

#### VIOLATING THE FISHERY LAWS.

The Inspector of Fisheries for this district, Mr. J. W. Kerr, having been informed that a number of Americans were in the habit of crossing over the Niagara River to a place called the "Tanteries," between the town of Niagara and Queenston, on the Canadian side, where they fished without a license, proceeded thither at once. While lying concealed one night last week on the bank of the river, at the place mentioned, he observed two boats crossing the river, with a seine, under the direction of three men. As they reached the Canadian shore Inspector Kerr, with his assistant, at once pounced upon them. The men were captured, and their boats and fishing net, with some fish, were seized, and confiscated. The men, whose names were James Fitzgerald, James Robbins, and Winifred Scott, all Americans, were fined \$2 each.

Bay, - last spring by unlicensed fishermen in contravention of the Fisheries Act. - by unlicensed persons, some of whom I had fined for committing said offences.

The nets such of them as are sound will answer, "if repaired" for catching trout fish in Lake Ontario, - while the leads and corks of the bad nets, being still good are fit to be used in moun-tain, - few are nets, I cannot recommend any of those gill net being restored to the Owners - because after they were convicted, I believe they stole and sunk my boat, in M. Bay. - The proceeds of sale, I will remit to the Fisheries department.

With reference to your letter of the 4<sup>th</sup> instant instructing me how to fix the size of the mesh of pike gill nets at 42 inches extension measure. I have the honor to report that I thank you for your kind advice and I will carry out your instructions accordingly. - And at the same time I will permit any old nets on hand under this size to be fished out. -

Now as regards that part of N. bay, already set apart by you for pike gill net fishing only, viz. between Grant and Starvey's farm - in the Township of Barton, and Martin's wharf on N. beach in township of Salfleet - from the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March, until the 10<sup>th</sup> day of May in each year. - I have the honor to recommend that Starveys Inlet, Lotbridges Inlet, Gages and Japrows inlets, Secords Inlet, Jones Inlet, Harris Inlet, and bay back pond - wherein the farmers were in the habit of fishing pike gill nets heretofore - need be also in future exempt from pike gill net fishing therein. - As the great breeding places for pike and bass of the various kinds in these southern parts of the Bay, - and in giving out licenses to the resident fishermen this season on N. beach - to whom I consider this indulgence alone may in future be granted. - I hope I may be also empowered to put a clause therein to this effect. -

As N. bay is still completely frozen up, and pike gill net fishing cannot be commenced therein yet, for some time to come, - I beg most respectfully to recommend that licenses to fish for, and catch pike in the open waters, outside only of that part, east and south in N. bay, of a line drawn from, and between the farms of Grant and Starvey - on the bay, in the township of Barton, and to Martin's wharf on N. beach, in the Township of Salfleet, be issued by you, omitting independent farmers, in future, <sup>as you suggest</sup> from the special privilege of pike gill net fishing - making the



spearing of fish however available to them through the ice in future during every winter. -- In conclusion I have the honor to recommend that thirteen Boat Licenses, for pike gill net fishermen, residents on B. Bay, may be now issued to me (blank) to be filled up, for the undersigned at a rate not exceeding 75¢ per, according to the quantity in yards of gill net - to be fished; thus! -

Kerr - with me - Miles about 26. \$47.50. - Colles 84. - Heard from Mr Andrew Gage and his father Mr Wm Gage - that gill nets were fished in Big Creek, during the mild weather in February. - Also that Wm Lottridge, Jr had told him the Bates, Steife and he would pike gill net in the Inlets this Spring in spite of Kent.

Saturday, 17, March 1877. -

In consequence of S. B. Steife making threats against me this morning when I served him with the Notice - that his pike gill net license, would not be renewed this year. - that the public were wondering - if we had a government office, over B. bay - that Bill Gage was putting apple trees at the point, which would impede navigation - If I did not have them removed I would be reported to the Government. - Told Steife, I had nothing to do with navigation - he then said - it would injure and impede the fishing I replied there would be no fishing allowed in the Inlets - I believed any more - I would not interfere with the point nor his quarrel with Mr Gage, it was not the first time that Mr Gage placed apple tree in the waters of the bay and bay inlets - to stop illegal fishing, - and keep the banks from washing away. - I went down to Gage inlet and saw the 8 old apple tree trunks - placed on the ice - in a



row. the outside one is not ten yards from the shore - Mr. W. Gage informed me, that some times persons came there at night, and hauled in a line, in contravention of the fisheries act, and it was to prevent clandestine hauling there, that he placed the old apple trees, in row, I must confess, I coincide in his views: - They neither do navigation nor the fisheries any harm - and for my part, I approve of the act, done under such circumstances; - went out at 1. p. m. came in at 5. p. m. - went up the bay on the ice, and on to the depot, and the Sleight. - Miles 12, 1/2 and sleigh, - 2.00.

In reply I beg most respectfully to send you a copy of the license you have granted to the Game and Fish Club. Thus! "Part of Lake Ontario at Port Dalhousie, and including the waters of twelve, fifteen and sixteen mile creeks; to extend 200 yards from west pier, and 200 yards in frontage of Holland Canal or 12 mile creek;" "On condition that no nets of any kind be used within such limits." "The Club moreover binding itself to guard and protect the above named waters at its own private cost."

Now according to this description - the fishing ground I recommended to be licensed to Peter Bath, would be outside of the 200 yards, from the west side of the west pier. - Peter Bath - lives on the beach; and the outer end of the west pier, from the beach, is, I should think about 600 yards from his dwelling. - A buoy might be anchored 200 yds west from the end of the pier to keep him off the bounds of the Fish and Game Club license ground.

I am well aware that Mr. James Miller - Marquette, an Active Member, of the St. Catharines Game and Fish Club does not desire that Peter Bath, should get a license to fish there. But as between man, and man, I cannot, and will not object against Peter Bath, on that account.

I wish to keep free and independent of both, and so raise the catch of fish, to a favourable standard. - I give you the case precisely as it is, and its entirely now, for you to decide. - Peter Bath, has been unfortunate, and served some time in the Central

In reply I have the honor to report, that there is no likelihood of a grocery or any other kind of a house being erected there. - The facts are these; Messrs. Bartindale and Smith, residents on B. Beach, talked of building such a house as is now alluded to. - Stoll on hearing of it, built the temporary fence now complained of, to prevent Bartindale, and Smith, building there. The place is claimed by Stoll, who has been in whose possession it has been for 35 years. -

The lot, "taking in the Reserve," is four chains, and eleven links long, the fence is placed one chain and twenty nine links from the water edge of the Bay; on the north west end, and there is no end fence here. - On the south east end the front fence is one chain and seventy links from the water edge of B. bay; so that you will please observe that there is nothing to complain of as regards the fishery reserve proper. - The object for which the fence was constructed, "merely posts with a board nailed to their upper end" being accomplished, all will be taken away again immediately, and stop trifling complaints.

Birchy, owner of the Ocean House there, which is on the Canal Reserve, has removed his stable, and is now having it rebuilt again on the fishing Reserve No. bay which he only holds under an annual license for fishing purposes from the Department. - This stable is 24 ft 5 inches long - and 24 ft 10 inches wide. The back of the stable only stands 14 ft from the water edge of the Bay. - There is a diving shed just commenced to be built, south of the stable, this is 51 ft long, 17 ft 2 inches wide, and the back of this shed is only 21 ft from the water edge.

Now according to the rule laid down by you this is contrary to fishing usages more especially as I may tell you, that I had not the slightest intimation of the erection of these buildings, until I went down there myself today. - Then again, Mr. Birchy's man - who has pruned and cut off a quantity of willows branches, has placed these branches for several yards long, in the water along No. beach, in his annual licensed fishing ground, - so that seine hauling could not be carried on there at present, thus damaging and injuring the fishing ground, see Section 14. -

Where all this has been done, and is now being carried on, is without the Canal Master, - Captain Campbell the Light House - Keeper - made the measurements of the buildings with me to-day. - I have notified Mr. Birchy, that I have laid these matters before you, for consideration. - With much respect,

Your decision, I am sure will be most thankfully received by the Niagara fishermen. —

You are pleased to say; "Your report of the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. recommends the above to the favorable consideration of the department;" "Does this mean that you want to be allowed to fish during the whole close time for pickeral and bass?" —

In reply I certainly say, No! The fishermen don't mean to retain any pickeral they may haul in — they must liberate them again, unless it should appear, that they have already spawned out, which I believe will be early this season, during close time set apart for pickeral. — As for bass, I don't suppose, 20 bass, are caught by the gowr haul being during close season at Niagara, and they are all liberated.

It is always very late in the season, after seine hauling is over, when bass spawn at Niagara. — White bass, I may state are very numerous, but there might be no objection made to the catching of them. I state these facts, but at the same time leave the matter, entirely for your decision.

I have the honor to receive your Telegraph dated 11<sup>th</sup> instant, thus: "Represented that pike gill nets are set across mouth of Lottbridges inlet, ascertain facts, and report by letter."

In reply, I beg most respectfully to report, that W. H. Corey, - fisherman of B. beach, who has received a pike gill net license, but being poor, has not paid for it yet, to fish in B. bay. - Upon the recommendation of Messrs. Union P. Stipe and John Bats two of the men licensed last year; He came from the Beach, and commenced fishing in front of Lottbridges inlet, in B. beach, which is just beside Mr. Stipes residence on B. Bay. - This so displeased Mr. Lottbridge - son to the proprietor of the farm Mr. Thomas Lottbridge, who is an old, and very worthy man, in which the inlet is situated, because he was not allowed to fish there himself that Mr. Corey, from threats made by Mr. Lottbridge, was forced to fish according to law.

I found the following notice for the guidance of the fishermen there! -



Notice to Mr. Boyd Fisherman, -

Fishermen must not set their gill nets across the mouth of any of the inlets that are named in their licenses, because the Fisheries Act is opposed to it.

I may here state, for your information, that this inlet, now referred to, is about 200 yards wide at the mouth; Outside the mouth on each side of the open water, fronting on the bay, there is a marsh, which is about 15 or 20 yards wide from the open water to the bank of the inlet, on each side, with a depth of from one to two feet of water, wherein the pike play or spawn, but no part of the net, was set in these marshes then the net comprised of, for 15 yards had no web nothing but the lead, and to be lewis, so that about 65 yards or upwards of the water in front of the inlet, on the east, and the west side was free for the passage of the fish. -

This is all spite work, on the part of Wm Lottbridge, because prevented from catching pike with gill nets in his own inlet, for which he says - he pays taxes, as he states, but which I believe is doubtful, besides Wm Lottbridge claims ownership in the waters of Bo bay - for 150 yards further outwards, than where Bo had the gill net set. - In my rounds on Bo bay on Tuesday last, I drew the attention of Bo's son, to this gill net, and ordered him to remove it, and run it right out in to the Bay, and not in front of the inlet, but he not complying with the order, I went there myself,



on yesterday, and finding it had been closed by the ice towards the mouth of the inlet, I took part of the net up altogether. - And today I ordered J. H. Corey, to remove the remainder altogether from there, and I fined him \$1. and 50¢ costs. - There was no objection on the part of Corey - to do wrong, hence why the fine is so trifling, -

I may have state, ever since I served Wm Lott-  
bridge with the following notice -  
I have been abused, threatened, and misrepresented all round the Community, continually, I have a back to bear it all. -

Copy of Notice follows here  
See back to page 220. -

Here is how, I find my diary reads for Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> April 1876 - last year, - There up Lottbridge's inlet, found three gill nets running from one side to the other, of said inlet, saw Simon N. Stipe, gave order to leave  $\frac{1}{3}$  of the inlet open in future, and I even done more, I placed these gill nets on that occasion, in that proper position myself,

These three gill nets were Wm Lottbridge's.

And in my diary for Tuesday, the 11<sup>th</sup> April 1876, was in the same inlet, saw Stipe and Wm Lottbridge, gave them advice about not setting their pike gill nets across the entire inlet, as it was against the law. -

Wm Lottbridge having read in the Hamilton News, that pike gill nets were to be in future  $4\frac{1}{2}$  inches extension measure, cut a piece out of Corey's old pike gill net, - and he lost temper because I would not fine Corey for fishing out his old gill net; I read and explained to him your letter of the 7<sup>th</sup> of March last on that subject. -



I may mention to you, that on Saturday last, George Bluid, saw a gill net set across, Peper's inlet, and I have since learned, that this gill net, belonged to Wm Lobbidge - the other person, but he had a boat in Peper's inlet, at the time, and no other boat could get there, because of the ice in the Bay.

I may mention to you that he has said that he is determined to catch, and gill pike, when he was referred to your order. —

It is said that the Government will issue no licenses this spring for spearing fish in the Bay. The reason is that during the winter season the licenses were so numerous and so long in duration that a very large quantity of fish was caught. The Department feels that as it permitted persons at a time when there was little employment to catch the fish they could, that it is now justified in refusing to continue the liberty. Besides, it is thought that such a course will be in the interest of the anglers and trowlers who claim that that sport has been seriously injured.

ILLEGAL SPEARING.—The spearing of pike at the present time is, we are assured, entirely an illegal act, leaving the offender subject to a fine of twenty dollars. Spearing of any kind has no existence except under special licenses (see sub-section 8 of section 13 of the Fishery Act). The proper time for spearing herring commences in November and ends in December, and for pike and bass, commencing 1st January and ending 31st March in each year. Those persons who have imagined that they are at liberty to spear pike at the opening of Spring should not be undeceived.

I have the honor to receive your letter of 27<sup>th</sup> ultimo, calling on me to explain why I visited the 12 mile creek, and captured nets, and fish, on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of April last (as) this department was under the impression, that the St. Catharines Fish and Game Club, were bound by their license to protect the waters of their own creek.

In reply, I beg most respectfully to explain that as I crossed the waste gate Bridge on the 12 mile Creek, at Port Dalhousie, on Friday 20. April, I found Frank Dickson (a boy) fishing a dip net, he caught a pickerel, during the few moments I stood there, and I ordered him to liberate the fish, which he did. - It was close season for pickerel at the time. - I believe it was my duty to do this, even taking it for granted, that the St. Catharines Fish and Game Club were bound by their license to protect the waters of the 12 mile Creek, of which the waste gate formed a very insignificant part. - The mere statement in the license without the signature of the President, and Secretary thereto, is of no value, and of no effect and just as I found it to be, as referred to.

When I signed the license, I was under the impression that all nets were being then pulled there. I beg to explain, that I acted strictly in compliance with sub section 4, of Section 16, and Section 18, and sub section 2 of Section No: 1, of the Fisheries Act.

The persons who owned these nets that I seized, not having a license drawn from the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries,



to fish there, as per regulation...  
dated Ottawa, Monday, April 12, 1875.

I would not have gone to Fort Hallhouse at all, on the occasion referred to, only you sent me copy of Mr Wrights letter, applying for a fishery there, and which in the margin of the language stated that a Mr Kerkle fished there, and which I relied upon as being a true statement.

About 70 Railway Car-loads, are being taken therefrom daily. - It is taken from that portion of the Beach, designated as part of the Brant property, and always enjoyed as a fishing privilege. - I don't think any serious injury will result from the material being taken for the purposes for which it is intended. - -

I have the honor to receive from you, copy of letter, written by Mr. Joseph Jackson, Barrister - Toronto, to James Metcalf Esq. M. P. - relative to certain saw mill owners - resident in the Township of Vaughan - and situated 16 miles from the City of Toronto - which having been laid before you, you were pleased to refer to me for report thereon. -

In reply - I beg most respectfully to report for your information - that I visited the saw mills, complained of by the fish and game club of Toronto for allowing saw dust, and mill rubbish to enter the waters of the Don, a stream frequented by the fishes named in the Fisheries Act, the same being illegal, and in contravention of the Fisheries Act. -

I found at the Village of Patterson, a Steam-let founded by Peter Patterson Esq. M. P. P., containing a population of 200 people, on the west branch of the Don, situated in the Township of Vaughan - 2 miles north from Richmond Hill Station of the N. W. Railway. - A short distance west of Mr. Patterson's farming implement establishment; this branch of the Don rises, and there is a few speckled trout, in the stream at present, from the fact, that Mr. Patterson had some caught away in other streams, and brought them and had them placed in his pond, and some escaping therefrom, they got into, and went down stream such is common report. -

1st Saw mill, -

I visited the saw mill of Mr. John Jones, he rents the saw mill from Mr. Coase & Co., of York and saw mill owners, it is situated on lot No. 16, in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Township of Vaughan



and he pays \$400, annual rent for it. Mr Jones saws about 600,000 ft. h. m. - lumber per year, has water for doing so, all the year round, has never seen any trout in the stream, but a small stream having speckled trout in it, enters the West branch, about 2 miles below his mill. - -

This saw mill is so constructed, that to make a change, is almost impossible, except at very great expense, so as to conform with the law. - The saw dust enters the stream, beneath the mill, slabs and sidings are kept out of the water. - - -

There is no possibility, whatever of remedying the saw dust mill site, and mill rubbish on a basis about 2 or 3 acres of land, in extent.

The mill pond contains about 3 acres, and the dam is about 40 ft. high, - Mr Thomas Cook, one of the owners of this saw mill, was present at my inspection. - Mr Pattersons pond into which he put the speckled Trout, is above this saw mill, and Mr Cook has a first mill between Patterson Village, - and this saw mill, and all are on the same stream.

### 2<sup>d</sup>. Saw Mill. -

I next made my inspection of the saw mill which is near the head of the North Branch, and occupied by Mr David Skislip, who has about 100 saw logs, on hand. - This stream, does not appear to me at least, to have speckled trout in it at present. - -

If it became necessary to prevent the saw dust from going into this small stream, it could be done at this mill, without much trouble or expense. - As the opposite side of the mill, from where the logs are rolled into this mill, is so low, that the saw dust could be wheeled out. - I dont think however, from present appearances, that it is necessary in the



of the fishing to stop the saw dust from going into this small stream, as sawing will be at an end up there in about 4 years. - There is a pond above the mill. - The mill is on lot No. 50, and is in the rear of the 1<sup>st</sup> Concepcion Vaughan. - This stream is the north branch of the Don - and it rises in the bush about  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile above this pond. - No sawing has been done here since last year. - - -

### 3<sup>rd</sup> Saw Mill. - - -

Mr David Boyle - lives on lot No. 45, 1<sup>st</sup> Concepcion Vaughan, - the mill is in a gorge, with a high bank on the west side, and the mill rubbish is all over the flat, on the east side of the mill, - the saw dust runs into the stream, owing to the construction of the mill, but sidings, slabs, and mill rubbish are all kept out, - The Road leading from Patterson, to the Village of Richmond Hill, passing by, forms the mill dam. - The mill is 50 ft long, by 25 ft wide. the mill pond contains about 5 acres. - The stream below the mill is very insignificant, scarcely any water, only when the mill is running. - Skelton's <sup>saw</sup> mill is up this stream, above Boyle's saw mill, both saw mills are on what is called in the locality, the North Branch of the Don; - Mr Boyle saws about 500,000 ft<sup>3</sup> of lumber, annually, and has to draw the logs a long distance, which is expensive. - Mr B says, that in about 5 years from this, all the saw mills will be closed on the Don - as there will be no logs to cut after that date. - - -

### 4<sup>th</sup> Saw Mill.

Mrs Jane Wright (a Widow) owns lot Nos 33, and 34. 1<sup>st</sup> Concepcion Vaughan, the West Branch or Cook's stream, and Boyle's



Stamps stream unite at Wright's mill, and run  
stream before reaching Mr. Wright's mill. There are a  
few speckled trout in the mill pond, which are supposed  
to have escaped from Patterson's pond. The saw dust  
all enters the United Creek from Wright's mill, I saw it  
myself. The mill is 54 ft long, by 30 ft wide. ---

After uniting, this creek runs on, and crosses under  
Yonge street, at Thornhill - and so meanders on toward  
and into the Toronto Bay. ---

At Stags hollow, Yonge street, which is about  
six miles from Toronto, there is another branch of the  
Don, called James Creek, rising from various springs  
and this unites with the Thornhill branch, before reach-  
ing Baylors - Paper Mills - at Goddardau which is  
about six miles down stream, below Stags hollow. ---

The saw mills, and just mills of former years, are  
now annually becoming less in number, and in a  
few more years, saw mills in a great many places  
upon the branches of the Don <sup>will</sup> be numbered with  
the past. ---

This is the first time, that a prosecution has  
been entered into against the saw mill owners of the  
Don - Altho' for years past saw mills by large num-  
bers predominated thereon; and history tells us it  
was once a tolerable trout stream, but the erection of  
machinery more particularly saw mills has nearly  
exterminated the fish. ---

Although always most desirous to protect the  
fishes under the fisheries act, and as by law established  
I now deem it advisable, to meet the wishes of the  
mill owners and a large proportion of the public of  
the community, <sup>by recommending</sup> that the River Don and its branches  
be exempt from the provisions of Sub section 2  
of Section 14. of the fisheries act, so far as  
as the saw dust, and mill rubbish is



concerned, for a term of five years only, -  
 I strongly recommend to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the Minister  
 that he will be pleased to exercise the power in=  
 vested in him - so far as the Don and its branches  
 herein specified and alluded to are concerned,  
 in this behalf. - I do this because my own  
 firm opinion is, that the enforcement of the  
 law after the strict enquiry as regards fishes  
 being therein, that I have made is not requi=  
 site, <sup>at present nor just yet</sup> for the public interest, and hope the Mem=  
 ists will be pleased to issue a Proclamation  
 to this effect.

I have the honor to receive copy of letter from Francis Rose, Fort Erie - to you who complains that his fishing license at Port Erie River, has been cancelled by Overseer Kerr, and by your order referred to me for report. - - -

In reply, I have the honor to report that Mr. Francis Rose, had no license proper, to fish, and he never had a license to fish in the St. Lawrence River, at Fort Erie, - altho' he admits he caught off 104 worth, of fish, he could not pay a license you this amount. - - -

It will be necessary for me to go back 3 years, and tell you, that Charles A. Harris, of Fort Erie the original licensee of the fisheries in the St. Lawrence River then got into difficulties, by being burned out - when it was supposed he was on his death bed - he recovered to find himself in extreme poverty, with a large family, and was compelled to move over to the city of Buffalo, before doing so, he disposed of his fishing rig, the only thing he was left, to George Stutton, and upon my recommendation George Stutton, then became the licensee of the fishing grounds now referred to. - - -

George Stutton - ~~was some unknown man~~ was taken out, but before he done so, he assigned his license to a store keeper - in Fort Erie, Mr. Paul's, - who paid out the term of the license Stutton held. - - -

George Stutton at the commencement of last year, came back again to Fort Erie, applied for a renewal of the license, and having paid \$50 - dollars he received the license for last season. - Stutton again left, and went off to the Western States, but before he done so, he assigned his license of the fisheries over to Mr. Charles Treble, Customs House Officer and to W. Hall, Hotel Keeper - Fort Erie, who it appeared advanced to him \$50, - the fishing fee.

They employed Francis Rose to fish in



the grounds, last year, and a sorry mess he made of it. . . .

During the latter part of last season, Mr. Chas. Treble - Customs Officer, applied to get entire control in his own name of the fisheries now referred to. I brought the matter under the personal observation of Mr. W. G. Whitcher, the Commissioner, who agreed with me, and he repudiated the application of a Customs Officer, for this fishery, as licenses for fishing were only issued to bona fide fishermen; - and Mr. Whitcher's decision I communicated to Mr. Charles Treble very soon afterwards. . . .

On the 13. of December last, I was at Fort Erie, getting up my annual Returns, and I found George Stutton back there again, and that the fishing net, Seine, boat, fishing shanty, Reels, &c. had been all carried away at night, by the sudden rising of the water in the River, and that all were lost. . . .

I had a conversation then, with Stutton, Rose, Hall, and Treble; Hall who is father-in-law of to Rose - told me he approved of Mr. Whitcher's decision - Treble was not altogether satisfied, and so it was agreed that Stutton and Rose, could have that part of the fisheries at Ft. Erie, this season: Say: - "All south of the Gilmour Road, up the River, as far as the old dock, say a distance of about one mile, for \$30, dollars, - which was to be paid so soon as the fishing commenced. . . . The money, \$30, not being forthcoming, as promised, on the 12. of March last. -

I wrote Mr. Frank Rose, thus: Copy  
My dear Sir,

Will you be pleased to let me have your license fee \$30, dollars,



on receipt, for the fisheries at Fort Erie, in the Niagara  
River, - for this current season, and as at present occu-  
pied by you, and I will send it to Ottawa, and get up  
your license for you, with my kind regards to your  
self. - - -

To this letter, I never received a reply - Mr Rose  
paid no attention to this communication at all. - -

On the 19<sup>th</sup> day of April, I again visited Fort Erie,  
and found Messrs Rose, and Stutton, at the fishing shanty,  
there asked for my license fee, - no money! - no fish,  
the ice did not come down the River! - Consequently  
no fish until it come. I insisted on having my  
rent forthwith, as I see you have been fishing; Rose  
replied, he had only caught \$80, worth of fish,  
I said \$50. of that was yours, and you should  
have paid me \$30, for the fisheries department,  
as was agreed upon. - -

Rose said then he would go, and hunt  
up Treble, and endeavour to get the money  
from him. - He did bring Treble to me, but  
Treble would not advance money for Rose;  
and Stutton, told me in plain terms, he had only  
a hand share in the concern. - - -

I waited for a week longer, to the 26<sup>th</sup> of  
April, and no money coming to hand from  
Frank Rose - I wrote him the letter to which  
he now calls your attention. - - I gave him  
ample time to pay in his license fee, and get a li-  
cense from the department, but instead of doing  
so, altho' he caught fish, sufficient for the  
purpose, he abused the confidence I had re-  
posed in him, he killed the fishery - told me lies,  
and told Stutton, who informed me, on the 17<sup>th</sup>  
of April, that Rose never intended to pay me  
more than \$15, and so if I did not <sup>take</sup> \$15.



he would pay nothing. ---

This was the position in which I found myself, in regard to Francis Rose, when Mr. J. J. Harris, son to the original licensee came to me, same evening, his father having previously made written application for the grounds. — When I told him if Rose did not pay within a week, I would recommend the fisheries to be licensed to J. J. and Chester A. Harris — who are now back in Y. B. C. and in possession of the original fisheries under a license, and the \$30, paid to <sup>me</sup> by them, has been sent to you. —

Now as regards any loss, Mr. Rose may have sustained by the action I was compelled to take, there is none whatever. "For according to his own account, you are in a position to judge that he has gained" — Mr. Charles Noble writes me on 30, April last, "It leaves me with net, half of the fish shanty, and half of the boat, on my hands — Worthless" —

Mr. John Everett, who licensed you me on the 19<sup>th</sup> of December last, paid — as agreed upon — and I sent you his \$40, on 6<sup>th</sup> January last, — I since received from you his license and delivered it. —

There was no end to the trouble, as you will perceive by this report, I have had with the fisheries during the past three years. —

On the 7<sup>th</sup> May — after you granted a license of these fishing grounds to J. J. and Chester A. Harris — Mr. Charles Noble — for the first time in behalf of Rose wrote me — "the matter could be made right." —



It was then too late . . .

I Consider Chester A. Harris, and Son, as  
against every other applicant entitled to these fisher-  
ies . . . I disguise nothing, and hope my report  
will be found satisfactory . . .

I have the honor to report for your information, that I proceeded to that part of my division in Lake Erie, lying east of the Grand River, down to Port Colborne, and about 3 miles east of the mouth of the Grand River, at Gull Island, and I found that a fishing company under the firm of Messrs. Werritt, Babcock, and Post, dealers of all kinds of fish - Port Maitland, Ont., had commenced fishing there, three pound nets each pound 60 fms long, with 30 ft<sup>3</sup> pot. - and were selling fish all over the Country without a license.

The pay is \$40, license fee - for each pound, - Babcock, and Post, are Native Americans from Rainville - Ohio, - George Werritt, is a Native of Seneca County of Norfolk, - a merchant, and son of a merchant there, - I demanded the license from Mr. John B. Post, - who is the manager, and resides at Port Maitland, he said he believed Mr. Werritt, had got it at Seneca, I then asked him, how much they paid for it; Mr. Post, told me they had not paid for it yet, that the authority to fish these pounds, came from the department through Mr. Henry Lane, Fishery Overseer - of the 3<sup>rd</sup> River - Seneca; I told Mr. Post, you never done business that way, and that I was the Overseer, to whom they should apply for a license. - I then wrote him the following note "marked B," and handed it to him (Mr. Post,) telling him as I have therein written him, that I was bona fide, the only Fishery Overseer of that part of Lake Erie, where he had his pounds set, and where sanctioned



by the department, the license fee fixed, must be paid through me: - - - and what he said he was prepared to do; I now therefore await your orders in this case. - - -

I confess to you this case is of such an extraordinary nature, that I am puzzled to find how it was possible, for such an infringement of my prerogative happening, without my hearing you the Department and as has been always the case heretofore - When applications were made for licenses by any person or persons to fish in my division: - - - And hence it is now that I rely upon the honor and integrity of the Commissioner - and his staff, at Ottawa - towards me on all such occasions, that it strikes me forcibly that Mr. Law, has been doing all this on his own hook. - - -

You will perceive that he has so managed or mismanaged, this pound net affair at Gull Island, that I was almost caught napping. - - -

When in connection with this pound net fishing in Lake Erie, Mr. Post informed me, and I try to report to you without prejudice, that there are two pounds being fished at St. Troike, and two more pounds are being fished west of Port Dover, - Lake Erie under license from Mr. Bingham; - And to day, coming home on the Train, I met an Agent of Mr. P. W. Innes' gross of license, one of the Proprietors - who informed me 2 pounds are being fished  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile east of Port Ryerse - and 2 more pounds are being fished  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile east of Port Dover. - - -

Two more pounds are being fished  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile east of Port Ryerse, near St. Troike



In all 9 pounds besides those (3) being fished at Full Island, as reported above. -

I merely mention these matters, because I find the Market is now glutted with fish from the several pounds being fished.

In conclusion I beg to report, I ~~merely mention matters regarding the Bingham's~~ ~~division~~, that nothing but the warm interest that I feel, and have always felt, in the past and the future well being, and prosperity of the fisheries, laws, regulations and orders in Council, for the due observance of the same, induces me to write, and lay these matters before you.

In consequence of the great scarcity and high price of speckled trout, the finest pan fish known to epicures, it is in contemplation by a number of gentlemen to form a joint stock company to purchase and build a pond and breeding establishment as near as practicable to the city of Hamilton. Not only will the enterprise afford amusement to those who are fond of piscatorial sport, but will make a profitable return to those who invest. The *Spectator* has the following paragraph from an American exchange showing how profitable such an enterprise may be: "The trout breeding business is becoming very extensive and profitable on the south side of Long Island. Mention was recently made of the preparations of ex-Congressman Roosevelt, Lorillard and other well-known New Yorkers for going into the business on an extensive scale. There is talk of other similar enterprises soon to be started. Mr. Bishop, of Fire Place, two years ago conceived the idea of having a trout pond. He dug out a swamp, built a hatching house, and formed two artificial ponds. These he stocked with a few trout, which have increased to nearly twenty thousand, valued at about  $\$10,000$ . The entire capital invested by him does not exceed  $\$1,500$ , and his net receipts will be at least  $\$3,000$  per annum. Mr. A. J. Hines, of Palace Brook, near Patchugne, hatched fifty thousand trout this spring. He owns three ponds and one hundred yards of canals. Mr. Nathaniel Miller, of Fire Place, has erected a hatching house and dug out several small ponds, and now owns about fifteen thousand trout—all obtained by artificial hatching. Messrs. Dayton & Gregory, of Canaan, own a small pond and half an acre of land ditched out. They devote their whole time to the business, which at present nets them  $\$3,000$  a year."

In reply to your letter of the 8<sup>th</sup> June, I have to report that when I applied to you on the 14<sup>th</sup> of May last, for permission to engage the services of Mr Wellington Steele of Erin Village, to assist me in keeping out saw dust and mill rubbish from branches of the River Credit, situated in the Townships of Erin and Caledon, and to protect the speckled trout from being fished for, on Sundays and during spawning season, not having alluded to Mr Jas. G. Wilcox in the connection in any manner whatever, nor to the construction of the fishways in dams on River Credit, it cannot be construed to mean that I wished to slight him and altho you act as a man, I do not wish to say one word against him.

The plain object, I had in recommending Mr Steele, as the welfare and prosperity of the speckled trout fisheries on the increase in the upper water, and branches of the River Credit, on the west branch of which in Erin Village, Mr Steele resides, with the waters of his fish ponds emptying into the same.

In connection with the fishways to be constructed I made no allusion in my report to you of either Mr Steele nor Mr Wilcox, intending as I did, as I do, to go round myself whenever I get from you the wooden models, notices and the necessary instructions and tell the Mill Owners, what is required of them by the department, and advise and instruct them how to carry out your orders. - When I visited Mr Wilcox, or any other person you may appoint could afterwards see they were kept in an efficient condition. - By railway from Hamilton, I can reach the upper branches of the Credit in 3 hours, whereas if I was to start from Port Credit, it would take me an entire day.



A few words more about Mr. Wellington Stone. He has been actively engaged for the last six years breeding, raising and peopling the west branch of the River with speckled trout, and has by his perseverance been successful, far beyond his own and my expectations.

You have been pleased during the time so engaged to permit him to catch the parent fish in the fall, so as to obtain from them the spawn &c, for his hatching house, and I may add, I <sup>have and</sup> feel every confidence in his ability, and I beg to state, and I do really believe that Mr. Stone, has never abused the privilege that you have granted to him, and from my own personal knowledge, he has let out annually, thousands of speckled trout fry, into the west branch of the Credit, and has been using his best efforts to breed, and to people the Creek with speckled trout, and to act in a praiseworthy manner, in behalf of the fisheries, and for the good of the Community at large in this respect. When I was in Erin Village and its vicinity, on the 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> of May last, he had about 5,000, speckled trout on hand carrying from a 1/4 of a pound, up to 3 1/2 pounds, the largest fish would be then about 4 years old, rising 5 years old.

You will please thus perceive, what my object was in recommending a man of Mr. Stone's, known ability to fill a subordinate office on the upper branches of the River Credit, at one time the pride and glory of Upper Canada as a salmon stream.

Mr. Stone is appointed to fill the place of Mr. Wm. Higgins, which was vacated by him on the upper branches of the River Credit, about 3 years ago. He has from this place taken to the westward in Muskoka; a great many speckled trout, thousands - I may say he caught and killed some close to the main branch, particularly just at the upper branches of the River Credit.



which is a very rough Country not suitable for Mr Wilcox no matter how willing he may be to act, in the discharge of his duties, he could never actively move around there.

I shall endeavour to use my best endeavours to bring back, ("altho' at present depleted") to that prosperous Salmon position again, and next October, I will please God, catch some of these law breakers, and with due respect,

3. Mr Robert Barber - of Streetsville, I served him personally, and I conversed with him, and his brother William, they told me they would do whatever is required. . . .
4. Mr James Gooderham, Streetsville, I served the miller Fred<sup>l</sup> Stanwick, on the premises, who will have the notice given to Mr J - d - h - m . . .
5. Mr G. K. Meattie - Streetsville, I served the miller on the premises, who gave me his name as Rob<sup>t</sup> Bonnard. . . .

I may mention for your information, that I am instructed by the Hon<sup>ble</sup> The Minister to avail myself at all times of your services; in this, and all matters connected with the fish, and protection of fishes, &c on, and in the River Credit. -

Mr Turner, will go heartily in to the construction of his fishway which will be an encouragement to Mess<sup>rs</sup> Hall, and his Tenant Decefs, - You will please see these (3) Springfield people at once




and urge them to begin immediately. . . .

Also see the Acts <sup>3</sup> Members, Beattie, and Mr Webb, as soon as possible, they live at Streetville, and urge them on with the construction of their respective fishways, - Mr Webb, will act for Mr Gooderham; - Gooderham's dam at Streetville, requires a thorough overhauling, and repairing, so that when you there, you will take the model with you, and give each of the mill owners, or occupants of the mills, the dimensions of the fishways, and parts thereof, as required by law, to be built by them, when you get the model from Mr Turner, you can keep it, in your own possession. . . .

You will find the scale thereon, marked a  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch to one foot. . . . The length of the model is 8 inches, say, 32  $\frac{1}{4}$  long; within the fishway, the space in the model is  $\frac{1}{4}$  inches; say 5 feet wide. - And the sides to the model is  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch, or 1 foot on the base width.

The entrance space is only  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch, one foot, however, as the lower end is supposed to be on the bottom of the River, and be under water at all times, this is immaterial. ;

Then as to the four cross pieces placed securely inside in the model thus . You will have to judge for yourself, as to the size, and dimensions and stability. Then as to back water pier, placed at the head of each fishway, you will have to see that it is substantially built of good, strong, and durable material, and that it is placed at its proper distance from the head of the fishway proper, as per model, so that the fishes of all kinds will have every water advantage after they get through at the top, to go into, and up stream at once. . . .

The work must be well done and in a substantial workmanlike manner, good sound material shall be the order of the day.



When they are finished, it will be part of your duty, to see that these fishways are always kept in an efficient and proper state of repair at all times, affording an easy passage always to the fishes in ascending the stream.

As soon as I serve all the notices, I will again write you, in the mean time, please occasionally write me, how the work progresses; when any of the mill dam owners, have got out the material, let me know and I will come down at once, and fix the place in the dam best adapted for each fishway.

In reply, I beg to state that the fishermen are, as such, working for a living, the former portion are well off: George Hutton, is very poor, and fishes for a Steam share. . . .

4<sup>th</sup> Whether it would be desirable for purposes of protection, and in order to afford better inducements, to sportsmen, to close that (portion) part of Niagara River against all fishing, and allow only angling therein. . . .

In reply to No. 4, I beg most respectfully to report, that I do not consider <sup>nor</sup> advisable, ~~yet~~ desirable for the purposes of protection, and in order to afford better inducements to sportsmen, to close that part of Niagara River you refer to, as against all net fishing, and allow only angling therein, because from the facts, that for the four seasons, I fished, during legal seasons in the Niagara River, on the Canadian side of the River, - within the bounds you have referred to there are about 20 seines and other nets fished in American waters of the River, on the American side of the River, during all seasons, and without any restrictions not regard to close seasons, and which our fishermen do observe. . . . These waters being "both fish abundantly?" and is a great breeding place, and nursery - for Lake Erie: - Besides set hooks, and long lines, are numerously fished, each year, during the winter and spring by Germans, French, Irish, Americans and other nationalities, residents of the city of Buffalo, and Black Rock, who are fishing for the Buffalo market, for pike, pickerel, and sturgeon, and destroy the young fish by millions as bait, to catch them. . . . These men fish to make a living by supplying the inhabitants of the large city of Buffalo. To set the River apart for 3 years, would be advisable, and stop all kinds of fishing therein during that period but until an arrangement is made with the American Government, to



such an effect, who, it is to be hoped, would coincide with your views, and carry them into effect, and operation on their part, I can see no earthly use in attempting what you propose, as it would otherwise be so damaging to our fishermen, and their prospects in life. ---

I may here state, that I highly approve of your proposition, provided it would be carried out to the benefit of all persons concerned. ---

You will please perceive, what an extensive portion of the Niagara River, there is, as referred to by you, already within the Canadian boundary, and where no angling nor fishing of any kind is now being carried on either by fishermen or sportsmen.

\* In answer to my letter of 29, June 1874, Bank cheque No. 84. - I sent you the sum of \$22.50 of fines imposed, to which the prosecutor was entitled, and I understood Charles Beble Esq. J. P. It is a well known fact, that during the months of July and August, blue back herring are invariably filled with worms, more particularly those caught in shoal Lake Erie water. --

I believe it would be a splendid thing if six or eight of the bollingwood boats, with three 15, or 20, gill nets each, of 600 yards long each, were to come down, to Lake Ontario, and fish. - I submit the matter for your personal Consideration. . . .

In my division of Lake Ontario, there is ample room for this number of boats, and for about fifty miles of White fish, and Salmon Trout gill nets. . . .

I presume you are already aware, that a Fish Company, has been formed this year at bollingwood, under the name of Leckie & Coy, - Canada Fish Company, with a general office open at Toronto, for despatching White fish and Trout, all over Canada, and the United States. . . .

Mr Andrew Robt. fisherman - bollingwood, assists in the management at Toronto, and from him I recently heard that 24 Boats were employed, for the first time, <sup>as far up as Killarney.</sup> at this season of the year, on the north shore of the Georgian bay - fishing for this company, and selling their large numbers of fish to them at very small prices. . . . There is too much fishing, and it is unprofitable to the fishermen, except by their catching vast quantities of fish. . . . In reply to this rebuff, I beg to state that I may have made a mistake - by entering seven visits to Niagara, however, it appears by my diary from which I copied - that I paid only four visits to Niagara during the period you refer to; One of them, was at the instance of the dept<sup>y</sup> to give back a Seine, and two boats, I had previously seized from Jas: Fitzgerald, an American citizen, who had committed a trespass in Dominion Waters, and at the same time desired to him a license from the dept<sup>y</sup> to fish in the waters he had previously trespassed in, as <sup>then</sup> reported to you. . . . .

The other three visits to Niagara, were made during close season for pickeral, and close season for bass. Special purpose referred to me by the dept<sup>y</sup> Mr Wrights - application for a fishery, &c. &c, see my reports of 23<sup>rd</sup> of April, 5<sup>th</sup> of May, and 17. of May last, in reply to which, you have already approved of my proceedings, although you now condemn me, - through as I am led to believe a mistake in counting the visits. - You may, or I may, have counted in my (return) trips from Niagara to Hamilton. . . . .

L. Englehart - the Proprietor of the Silver Star, Oil Refinery Works, situated at the head of Sherman's Inlet - B. Bay - in the township of Barton, east of the City of Hamilton. - -

For allowing Coal Oil, and Acids, and other deleterious substances to pass from your Oil Refinery, and to enter the waters of B. Bay, a place frequented by fish, in contravention of the Fisheries Act. - -

To this Complaint, Mr. Maurice Frank, the Agent here - pleaded guilty, when a fine of \$20, and \$3.50, the Magistrate and Constables Costs were imposed and since paid. -

The particulars were fully set forth in my report to you of the 13<sup>th</sup> of April last, to which you will please refer; - The Complaint being previously laid, the case was laid over, the Magistrate and I, however! on consultation, thought it more advisable to impose the fine "As pike and bass, caught in B. Bay - were impregnated with Coal Oil, and thereby rendered unfit for food. - -"

This offence happened before the New Tanks were built and set in their places, for the reception of the Oil Acids &c, and it was when the agent placed a quantity of the refuse in a Poyen well, from which a portion of it escaped during the early thaw into the waters of

The points referred to, in Lake Erie, in the letter of Mr Ross, - are situated east and west of the Grand River, - in the County of Monroe, - and has been occupied by Mr Stuy Ross, since my first appointment until such interference has taken place and according to my own idea of matters are within my division, - hence I hope



you will be pleased to grant a special license to Mr. Henry Kofs to fish a powered net, in any place, within the given points, but not within  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile of the mouth of the Grand River, on either side, the same to be subject to set rules and regulations of the department, and the Fisheries Act; please send the same to me for to countersign, and deliver, I will pay the amount of license, which will be satisfactory, and meet your approval.

Mr. Henry Kofs, who is an intelligent, fisherman, submits his mind of the way he has been treated by Messrs. Law and Bingham, who enjoy no control over him in Lake Erie, whatever, his letter is now sent you and with due respect,

A report was made to me, however! I may say; not by any person living in Niagara, - that gill nets less than 5" inches extension measure was fished for white fish in Canadian waters, by Niagara fishermen, last May, which is contrary to law. ---

I also heard that Seine hauling fishermen, and Herring gill net fishermen, caught pickeral in close season. - The Fisheries dept. do expect that the Niagara fishermen will henceforth duly observe the law. ---

One of the Boltons hands thus: "For polluting the waters of the Niagara River, at Niagara, the same being frequented by the several fishes named in the act" - by throwing the offal of fish, sturgeon, &c. on to Mess<sup>rs</sup> Thomas Elliotts, and Thomas Moores, seine haul-  
ing fishing ground, which is in the Niagara River, and town of Niagara, on the 4<sup>th</sup> day of June last, and on subsequent days, during the said month of June last, in contravention of the Fisheries Act."

After an adjourned hearing to the 2<sup>d</sup> instant, from the 1<sup>st</sup> instant, I was enabled to prove the case ag<sup>st</sup> John Bolton, the owner of the boat, from which the offal, &c. was thrown into the River, as per section 14, and sub section 2, of section of the Fisheries Act. . . .

John Thompson, pleaded guilty. . . John Bolton, was fined \$5, and \$4.85 of costs, - or 20 days in Jail. - And John Thompson, was fined \$1, and \$4.85 of costs, or 15 days in Jail. . . . Both fines, and costs were instantly paid. . . Notice to the Niagara Fishermen.

The Niagara Fisherman, will take notice, that logs, wood, and stones, every thing, except Reels, Boats or Boat Houses, and Fish Houses, must be instantly removed from and off the beach, in front of the fisheries at Niagara, At present comprising alleys Elliotts, and Morris, fishing ground, between the Southern Bank, and the one mile pond, in the Town of Niagara. &c. &c. ---

The offals of fish, must in future be instantly buried, at least two feet under ground, or, <sup>be</sup> removed to the country, for manure, or disposed of, according to law. And dead fish, or offals, which may float in, or to the beach, of any of the licensed seine hauling grounds, at Niagara, must be instantly buried as herein set forth. &c, by the licensed fisherman. ---

The greatest interest must in future be taken, and strictly observed by every fisherman in Niagara, in this matter, which is simply looking every man after his own welfare and personal interest &c. ---

It will never do any more for to say; I put the fish guts in American Waters. --- The fishing laws must henceforth, for all time to come, be strictly observed; or the full penalty will be put in force, for to secure the due observance of the Statute. ---

And we must also observe the rights of our American Neighbours, and never infringe on them, in any manner, by polluting their waters. ---

I am in receipt of your letter of the 8<sup>th</sup> instant, notifying me of your appointment as Fishery Overseer, on that part of the River Credit, from Horval, north to Orangeville; and that you have been directed by the Department, to apply to me for such information as you may require from time to time, in the discharge of your duties. ---

I may here mention that I received from the Hon<sup>ble</sup> The Minister, Ottawa, the copy of letter sent you by the Dept<sup>y</sup> dated 20<sup>th</sup> of July last. ---

In reply to your letter of the 8<sup>th</sup> instant, I feel much pleasure in giving you now the information you ask for; In the first place it is your bounden duty to prevent saw dust, and mill rubbish, from being drifted, thrown or passed into any stream frequented by speckled trout, or any of the fishes named in the Fisheries Act; see Sub section 2. of section 14. of the Fisheries Act; You must prevent speckled trout, being caught during close season; and prevent persons fishing on Sunday; in fact, you are to enforce the Fisheries Act, in its entirety. ---

As a matter of course, your division, will include Shaws Lakes, and all the other small lakes, mill ponds, and all Trout Creeks, and branches, feeders, forming the northern branch of the River Credit, from the Forks to Orangeville.

As you are already aware, there are numerous saw mills - Sawneries, and Woollen, and other factories, including paper mills to engross your attention. ---

It was not considered necessary, I presume, by the Dept<sup>y</sup> at Ottawa, to refer to those saw mills, &c, north of Churches Mill - at the Cataract, in their letter to you, of the 20<sup>th</sup> of July last which you have received, as you, and I, can arrange about them. ---

But with reference to the list of mill owners which you have received, I may here state for your information, that it was deemed advisable upon



my recommendation, to have fishways constructed in the dams, on the main branch of the River Credit, say from Springfield, to the Forks; and to be constructed by the Mill Owners, &c. whose names you have been already furnished with. ---

I now beg to apprise you that I have received Official Notices sent me by the department on the following Mill Owners and occupants whose names I herewith send you together with the names of the place, where each mill is situated. ---

I give you herewith, a Model of a Fishway, and it will form a part of your duty to visit the Mill Owners, above named, taking the Model with you, and urge them on, to construct and complete their respective fishways, as soon as possible. ---

- please refer to section 12. of the Fisheries Act, and to sub sections, 2. 3. 4. and 5. of section 12. of the Fisheries Act, for your guidance in fishways. ---

But while strongly urging the Mill owners and proprietors to carry out the law, in the construction of these fishways, do not enforce the law, without special direction from me to you, to do so. ---



Bring the Act, with you, and read the section, and sub sections for the mill owners, when you make your visit.

You will find the scale on the model, marked  $\frac{1}{4}$ " of inch, to one foot. The length of model is 8" inches, say 32' feet long; - Within the model, fishway, the space is  $\frac{1}{4}$ " inches, say 5' feet wide. - And the sides of the model, is  $\frac{1}{4}$ " of an inch, or 1' foot on the face width. - - -

The entrance space, at the bottom, is only  $\frac{1}{4}$ " of an inch, one foot, however! as the lower end is always supposed to be in the water, and resting on the bottom of the River, this is immaterial. - - -

Then as to the four cross pieces placed securely inside the model, thus and thus, you will have to judge for yourself, as to the size and dimensions, so as to give stability to the structure. - - -

Then as to the Break Water pier, placed at the head of each fishway, You will have to see that it is substantially built, of good, strong, and durable material, and that it is placed in its proper position, and <sup>the</sup> regular distance from the head of the fishway, as per model, so that the fishes of all kinds, will always have clear water privilege, <sup>in</sup> either going up stream, or descending the stream, as the case may be. - - -

The work must be well done, and in a substantial workmanlike manner, - of good and sound material, shall be strictly adhered to. - - -

You must not hold out any hope of any portion of the cost of construction being paid or allowed by the Minister; Read sub section 3, of section 12, of the Fisheries Act.

When the fishways are finished, it will be your duty to see that they are always kept in an efficient and proper state of repair at all



times, thus affording an easy passage always to the fishes, in ascending or descending the stream. ---

I have the honor to report, that on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of August last, in consequence of receiving a postal card, from <sup>my</sup> <sup>honorable</sup>, Thomas G. Doney, of Dundas; thus! "There is a matter here, that requires your immediate attention, in connection with the Fisheries." -- I went there, and I found, that on the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> of August, Mr. J. L. Stanford, Manager of the Dundas Gas Works - had placed down from the Gasometer Tank, to a small Creek running into Mordaus Creek, which runs into the St. Jovard's Canal and B. Bay, a two inch iron pipe, in diameter, through which by the aid of a Steam Pump; several thousand gallons of the poisonous and deleterious water, containing ammonia, and other deadly substances, was pumped into the waters of the same, which is frequented by several of the kinds of fishes named in the Act, as is alleged being in contravention of the Fisheries Act.

I made a careful examination of this matter, when I ascertained, that not only fish, in large numbers, but some ducks, was killed from the effects of this deadly poison; -- The pipe laid down was about 120 yards long, and was raised over the street, to where the water discharged from it, near the Creek into which it ran rapidly, the grass for about four yards square was burned black. -- I was obliged to subpoena ten Witnesses, to prove this case, which came up before James Cahill Esq<sup>r</sup> J. P. Police Magistrate at Hamilton, on the 30<sup>th</sup> of August last and then adjourned until this day. --

In the mean time I had Mr. Thomas Littlehales, the intelligent Manager of the Hamilton Gas Works, to accompany me to



Dundas, on Saturday last, examine the gas premises there, and had the benefit of his able testimony to-day; Mr J. L. Stanford, the Manager from Dundas, and the defendant in this case was put forward by his Counsel, Mr Browning, and examined in his own behalf, but he admitted <sup>in his evidence</sup> the poisonous nature of the water pumped from the Gas Tank, into the water of Mordans Creek; - I had to pay witness fees, five dollars, - and I employed Mr A. R. Waddell, Esq here to prosecute the case, and examine and examine the Witnesses, hence my success in a measure of obtaining a fine of Twenty dollars, and Costs against J. L. Stanford, or 20 days in Jail; -

My attention was also drawn to this matter, by Mr Henry Binkley, deputy of Reeve of Newcastle. -

In consequence of a resolution passed by the Mayor, and Town Council of Dundas; for to petition the Hon<sup>ble</sup> The Ministers, to exempt Mordans Cr<sup>k</sup> from the provisions of the Act; The Magistrate gives the defendant one month to do so, during which nothing will be further done to enforce the fine and Costs. -

suitable close season for White fish and Salmon  
Trout, - my reasons for doing so. - - -

In reply, I beg most respectfully to report, that  
I consider the old law from the 19<sup>th</sup> of November  
to the 1<sup>st</sup> of December in each year, the best law  
that was ever in existence provided it is strictly  
observed for the protection of White fish, during  
spawning season. - - - The Trout close season  
might be made a week earlier. - - -

But as it necessary to place white fish, and  
Salmon Trout close season together. - - I would re-  
commence that it be placed from the 10<sup>th</sup> of  
November to the 30<sup>th</sup> of November, this year, both  
days inclusive. - - -

The full of the moon this year, in Nov-  
ember, will be on Tuesday the 20<sup>th</sup> of November,  
when the great rush in the spawning, always  
regulated by the full moon, for the spawning  
of these fish will take place. - - -

The present law from the 1<sup>st</sup> to the 10<sup>th</sup>  
of November, is the best ever made for the fisher-  
men; they laugh and enjoy it very much. - -  
It is no protection whatever for White fish. - -

I have the honor to receive your letter of the 11<sup>th</sup> instant, with copies of enclosures from the Mayor, and Municipal Council, of the Town of Dundas, and other influential parties, praying that Mordans Creek, Dundas, be exempted from the operation of the Fisheries Act; in so far as relates to placing into the water substances alleged to be injurious to fish, - with your instructions to me to report thereon. -

In doing so, I will be as brief and explicit, as possible; and in reply I beg to report, that on the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> of August last, Mr J. L. Stanford, Manager of the Dundas Gas Light Company and staff, pumped out from the Gas Tank there about                      gallons of Gas Water  $H_2$ , into Mordans Creek; and from the long period of time, four years that elapsed before this Tank was cleaned out, its contents was still the more poisonous. - - - The result was, that great quantities of dead fish were soon after found in the Hazardous Canal, an N. bay, into which this Creek empties itself. - - -

On the 16<sup>th</sup> of August, I received information, that this deadly poisonous stuff, composed of Ammonia  $H_2$ , had killed the fish in great numbers, and I also had a Telegram from the Chief of Police, Dundas, requesting my immediate attendance up in Dundas, in connection with the Fisheries. - - -

I went there on the 17<sup>th</sup> of August, as already reported to you, by me, and I found that the report about this Dundas Gas Light Company was strictly true as reported to me. - - - Gas pipes 2 inches in diameter for a distance of about 120. yards were laid down on the streets connecting with the Gas Tank, and for 2 days and nights, a steam pump was continually employed in pumping this poisonous matter into Mordans Creek, thereby killing fish in great



numbers, all the way down the canal from Dundas to B. bay, which is about 2 miles long. -- This abound with bass various kinds, pike, sunfish, and eels at all times, and Sterring's during November, each year, and Sterring Jay, up to a certain stage all the time. --

This Ammonia altho a great fertilizer if used in moderation, destroys vegetable and animal life when pumped out as in this case immoderately, and indiscriminately. -- The grass was burned up, tame ducks were killed, and fish were killed in great quantities from its effects so many and in numbers, as to attract public attention, and these dead fish were not only to be seen in Dundas marsh, and the Desjardins canal - but they were seen floating in the waters of B. bay. ---

Mr Latchaw, councillor - chairman of Streets in Dundas, gave permission to lay down the pipes on the streets, but he gave no permission to pump this poisonous <sup>matter</sup> into the waters of Mordens Creek. ---

The petitioners, Besides Messrs Browning, Main, and McMahons letters while praying and entreating that all these poisonous matters be allowed to go scot & free, into Mordens Creek. --

That is sulphuric acid, Copras, Creosote, dye stuffs, and other deleterious substances, from the bottom, and Woolen factory, - Ammonia, &c, from the Gas Works, Lime from Carmenters, glue Works; - and sulphuric acid, lime Chlorate of lime dye stuffs &c from the Paper Mill - be exempt from the provision of sub Section 2 of Section 14. of the Statute act except so far as relates to saw dust, and mill rubbish "less injurious substances" - and a thing which is not to be found within the limits of the Town of Dundas - on Mordens Creek. ---

When Mr Browning was arguing his case



For Mr. J. L. Stanford, he asserted, that Messrs<sup>rs</sup> Laurie and Mason of Dundas, Tanners, who were fined last year, were now exempt from sub section 2, of Section 14, of the Fisheries Act. -- I put him however right in this matter. -- Your letter to me of the 11<sup>th</sup> of October last on the subject reads thus! That if they shall do their utmost in future to prevent any further injury, the fines imposed will not be levied, and no other proceedings against them, will take place under the Authority of this Department? --

Now while Mr. Lawry, has complied with the law, thus far, and done his utmost, Messrs<sup>rs</sup> Mason & Co. have been doing the reverse, under Mr. Beques advice, and on the 10<sup>th</sup> of this month, they allowed large quantities of lime to flow from their Tannery in Dundas into Gladders Creek, which not only whitened the running water, but also the bottom of the Creek itself, and in one place the lime was 8 inches deep, when I examined the Small Creek, at this Tannery, on the 11<sup>th</sup> instant. --

And now, I may tell you, that Mr. James S. Remondet can sell his lime, to any farmer, -- for manure and get rid of it in this way, or he can put it out on some vacant lot, near his own place on the Commons, instead of running it, into the Creek. --

Mr. John Fisher, of the Paper Mills - can establish some better means, whereby evaporation would take place - thereby destroying the deadly properties of these deleterious substances he uses in making paper, - after boiling straw in lime water, and converting straw and rags into pulp. --

And now with regard to the Cotton Factory dye stuff, &c, it is just as easy, for Mr. S. B. Lewis, the Manager, to destroy the deleterious effects



of the dye stuffs, acids, creosote, &c. &c., as it is not to do it, — and he has the means within his grasp, to do this at once, by damming the small stream below the dye House, into which it now runs, and therein evaporate it. . . .

With respect to the Gas Works, I presume a similar offence may not happen again for 20 years, but a large pit should have been dug in some of the vacant lots adjacent to the Gas Works, in the just place, and before so much harm was done, where the water should have been pumped into, from the Gas Tank, — and be left there to evaporate, and had this been done, no death, nor destruction to fishes, or ducks, or vegetation, would have happened. . . .

Altho' I am to all intents and purposes the Prosecutor, I am not the Original Complainant, and so far as I am individually concerned — the portion of the fine to which I am entitled as prosecutor may be disposed of by the Stor; the Minister, just as he may think fit, I am only interested in these cases, so far as the future protection of the fish is concerned, and never in a pecuniary way; — still, I wish to say; That for the greater part of 2 days, every effort was made by Mr Browning Sol<sup>r</sup> for the Gas Works — to frustrate the Fisheries Act. — Witness fees had to be paid by me, to the employees of the Gas Works, also liable to prosecution, before they were allowed by him to give evidence, and Constables fees are still due in the present, and Mr Lawry, and Masons Cases of last year. . . .

And I had to employ Mr R. R. Waddell, Sol<sup>r</sup> in behalf of the prosecution. . . .

It is alleged in Mr Brownings letter that no fishing business is carried on in



Dundas, and no part of the population subsist by fishing."

"True! I admit this, but it must be still borne in mind, that these poisonous substances have been indiscriminately run into Mordens Creek, which enters the Desjardins Canal, Dundas Marsh, and B. Bay - the latter within 2 miles from where these offences complained of, proved and admitted have been committed, with running water flowing all the time from Dundas to B. Bay. - - - And so long, as Dundas Marsh, the Desjardins Canal, with Mordens Creek are connected, and are abounding with fish for the good of the public and people at large, I had no other alternative, but to act in these cases, and I done so in a becoming manner, and as I have done, on consulting with Mr. Cahill, the Police Magistrate here. - - -

There is the spearing licensed fishermen, James and many Dundas people, and around Dundas Marsh, and the gill net fishermen and anglers nevertheless, and the great Hamilton and surrounding country. - People the public, whose interests in these fisheries, I will not ignore in this report, and which must be respected and guarded by me. - - -

"These Dundas people, the defendants, have no real grievances to complain of. I have treated them in every respect with kindness, and they have never yet paid one of cent for the offences they have been committing. - - The public would have taken hold of the cases, if I had not done so. - -

I cannot separate Mordens Creek, from Desjardins Canal, Dundas Marsh and B. Bay. - I cannot give Inglehart & Co. - Hamilton - for allowing Coal Oil, &c. to pass into Sherburne Creek which enters into B. Bay, and destroys the fish



fish - and allow all these Dundas people, who have done the same thing to a greater extent, with more deadly and poisonous substances to escape. - Knowing as I do, that they can prevent it, if they try. - -

please refer to your letter to the Mayor of Dundas, R. M. Rechner Esq<sup>r</sup>, dated 13. April 1874. - in connection with Dundas Marsh and fisheries. - - -

I finally with above facts submit this matter for your own decision, having no friends at all to bring under your special notice, but endeavouring to do my duty as between man and man and the public at large, fairly and above board. -

## BURLINGTON BAY FISHERY.

### Meeting of Interested Parties.

In pursuance of an extensively circulated handbill calling "a meeting of all parties resident in the vicinity of Burlington Bay and adjacent waters interested in the preservation of the said fishery," such gathering took place yesterday afternoon at the hall connected with Mr. Anderson's Fox and Hounds Temperance House, Burlington Heights. The attendance was large and respectable.

Thomas Bain, Esq., M. P., Dr. McMahon, M. P. P., and some thirty or forty others were present.

The meeting unanimously chose Mr. Chipman Cummins chairman, and Mr. David Bickell consented to perform the duties of secretary.

The CHAIRMAN made a few introductory remarks with respect to the object of the meeting, which he said was known to all present, therefore he would not detain them but at once proceed to business. He called upon the Secretary to read the minutes of previous meeting held in Dundas, at which a resolution was passed to the effect "That no gill nets or seines should be used in Burlington Bay."

Dr. McMAHON, M. P. P. was then called upon to address the meeting. He said that he was not a member of the Dominion Parliament, where the Fishery regulations were framed, but he had given this matter of the way in which they were administered on Burlington Bay and adjacent waters a little consideration, and failed to see that justice had been done to those residing on the north side of the Bay, all of whom had been deprived from taking fish, while those on the southeast were extended the privilege. The subject had been brought to his attention by Mr. Wm. Hopkins, and he (the speaker) had put him in the way of having returns brought down through Mr. Bain, M. P., in the Dominion House. These had been printed. In his opinion, those having such grievances should lay them before the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and have them redressed. Mr. Bain, he was pleased to say, would be in the Hall in a few minutes, and then they could obtain more information on the matter than he (the Doctor) could possibly give them. He regretted the absence of Mr. Kerr, and proceeded to remark that it certainly was an unfortunate circumstance that a person holding the position he held as Inspector of Fisheries should occupy the Deputy-Reeve's chair in any municipality contiguous to where his duty in the former capacity called him. Mr. Kerr held a municipal position in Barton township, and this circumstance gave an opportunity to those residing elsewhere to suspect that favoritism might be shown with regard to fishing privileges. He thought that resolutions should be drawn up and forwarded to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, properly setting forth what they complain of, and the redress sought for. The doctor's remarks were applauded.

Mr. BAIN, M. P., having arrived, next spoke. He confessed that he was not a fisherman; the only time he had ever attempted it was in company with two others one Queen's birthday some time ago, and between them they managed to land three fish—these were not more than two inches in length. (Laughter.) He thought the matter deserved consideration on the part of the authorities. When he was asking for the return of correspondence to be brought down in the House (which since had been published in the TIMES), he was not aware of the difficulties which residents on the north side were suffering under, otherwise he would have asked for a return of the answers to the Department as well. They wanted fair play, and although he had nothing to charge the present Fishery overseer with, still he thought that the Department never intended some of the regulations to be construed as they had been in this quarter. At present the Bay was practically a preserve for those on the south-east side, who were allowed to sweep out the fish with nets and seines, while those on the north shore were deprived of all such rights, and the sport of angling was destroyed. He would use all his influence to have the proper authorities place those on this side the Bay and Dundas Marsh on the same footing as residents on the other shore. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. Wm. HOPKINS pointed out some of the difficulties which they had to contend with, so long as nets were allowed to be used in the Bay, just so long would they on the north side have to be content with an occasional catfish, dogfish or mullet. Mr. H. condemned the action of the overseer in no unmeasured terms.

Mr. SIMON STIPE, of Barton, defended Mr. Kerr, and remarked that the business way to go about a redress of their grievances was to apply to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Mr. BAIN asked how it [was] that gill-net fishing had been allowed by the Department on the south side and not on the north, or any other place in the Bay, or adjacent waters? He (Mr. B.) did not know Mr. Kerr in this matter at all, but wanted to see justice done.

Mr. STIPE replied that he believed the Hon. Commissioner of Marine and Fisheries would defend the Fishery Inspector in his action.

Mr. JOHN BLAINE said that he had asked Mr. Kerr the reason those on the south were granted the privileges they enjoyed, and he (Mr. Kerr) told him that it was because those in the south were a poor lot of people who had nets, and when these were worn out there would be an end of it.

It was then moved Mr. CLINE, seconded by Mr. L. MILLS, That this meeting is of opinion that no nets or seines should be drawn inside of Burlington Bay or Dundas Marsh, nor within one-quarter of a mile of the entrance to the Burlington Canal, and that the Chairman be authorized to memorialize the Government to have the Fishing regulations so amended.

The mover and seconder spoke to the resolution, the latter referring to the inconsistency of the Fishery Overseer in his action towards the people. One time Mr. Kerr gave them leave to destroy the pike, other times he refused to let them take one.

After some further conversation, the resolution was adopted.

It was then moved by Mr. WILLIAM HOPKINS, seconded by Mr. JOHN BLAINE, that a memorial be prepared and forwarded to the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries (through Thomas Bain, Esq., M. P.) setting forth the injustice of the present fishery laws and enactments so far as the Burlington Bay and adjacent waters are concerned, and that the same may be amended so as to render justice to all parties. That this meeting nominate the following gentlemen to compose said Committee: Messrs. William Hopkins, Dr. McMahon, Henry Binkley, David Bickell and Joseph Cline.

It was arranged that this Committee will meet at Bamberger's Half-way House some evening shortly. Carried.

The meeting then shortly after six o'clock, dispersed, after votes of thanks to the members of Parliament, the Chairman and the Secretary.

## THE BAY FISHERIES.

The case as put by the complainants last night at the meeting anent the fishery regulations in the Bay, seem reasonable enough in the absence of any defence whatever. The parties who consider themselves aggrieved reside on the north shore of the Bay, and complain that they are deprived of the privileges of taking fish, while those living on the south side are permitted to catch whatever their nets may bring forth. If the question is looked at merely from a sectional standpoint, it does seem that the former are being unjustly treated. The Inspector, we believe, has a defence to offer, viz.: that those to whom permission is granted are fishermen who follow their calling as a means of livelihood, while those along the north shore, being well to do farmers, are in nowise dependent upon the products of the Bay. We may be doing the Inspector an injustice in putting this forward, as it may not be his complete case, but we think that officer might have attended the meeting to which he was invited, and given explanations that might have modified the feeling. The Department at Ottawa, as a matter of necessity, must guide its conduct chiefly upon the advice of the local officer here. He may have excellent grounds for advising a course contrary to the general opinion of the people, for the Bay has to some degree been set apart as a preserve, but it certainly would not be derogatory from his dignity and duty were he to tell the interested public what those grounds are. If it is the wish of the Department that the present condition of the piscatorial wealth of the Bay should be improved, we are sure no one would more readily observe the necessary regulations than the good people about its shores, but the impression is that it is full of fish and that those who want to catch them should be permitted to do so, unless good reasons to the contrary can be shown. The objections raised last evening to Mr. Kerr's being a member of the Barton Council were scarcely pertinent to the question before the meeting, but that official will observe the suspicion to which he is made amenable, groundless as it doubtless is.



## BURLINGTON BAY FISHERY.

A large and influential meeting of parties interested in the preservation of the above fishery was held at the Heights on Thursday afternoon last, at which Mr. Shipman Cummins presided as Chairman and Mr. David Bickell acted as Secretary. Speeches were delivered by Dr. McMahon, M. P. P., Thomas Bain, Esq., M. P., and Messrs. Hopkins, Stype, Blaine and others, but as the meeting seems to have been but a repetition of that which was held in Dundas some weeks ago, and which was reported in these columns, the grievances of the parties concerned being fully explained, it is unnecessary for us to give any lengthy report of this second meeting. We append the resolutions which were adopted:

Moved by Mr. Cline, seconded by Mr. L. Mills, and resolved, That this meeting is of opinion that no nets or seines should be drawn inside of Burlington Bay or Dundas Marsh, nor within one-quarter of a mile of the entrance to the Burlington Canal, and that the Chairman be authorized to memorialize the Government to have the Fishing regulations so amended.

Moved by Mr. William Hopkins, seconded by Mr. John Blaine, and resolved, That a memorial be prepared and forwarded to the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries (through Thomas Bain, Esq., M. P.,) setting forth the injustice of the present fishery laws and enactments so far as the Burlington Bay and adjacent waters are concerned, and that the same may be amended so as to render justice to all parties. That this meeting nominate the following gentlemen to compose a committee to prepare said memorial: Messrs. William Hopkins, Dr. McMahon, Henry Binkley, David Bickell and Joseph Cline.

It is worthy of remark as being rather singular that Mr. Kerr, the Inspector of Fisheries, who had been formally invited to attend this meeting, failed to put in an appearance.

The committee named will meet this (Thursday) evening, at Bamberger's Half-way-House to prepare the memorial referred to in the second resolution.

## HAMILTON.

### Enforcement of the Fishery Laws—Scientific Evidence as to Poisoning of Fish—Proposed Trout Pond—A Disputed Boat Race—County Board Examinations.

From Our Own Correspondent.]

HAMILTON, July 17.—I have before mentioned that Mr. Parsons, owner of oil works here, and Mr. Atkinson, owner of the Cark pork factory, were lately fined \$50 each, on complaint of Mr. T. W. Kerr, Overseer of Fisheries, to the effect that fish in the bay were poisoned by refuse matter from the factories. In the pork factory case notice of appeal was given, so, I suppose, we will soon have it tried over again. A complaint was also preferred against Mr. Williams, of fish being poisoned by petroleum distillery refuse, and the Magistrate, considering the charge proven, fined Mr. Williams, but only in the amount of \$10, in view of the fact that he had taken precautions for the future. Mr. Kerr, it appears, had determined to fortify his case with good scientific evidence, and for that purpose took about a gallon of the stuff that was running from the petroleum distillery spout into the waters of the inlet near at hand, and gave it to Dr. Mackintosh to be tested. Dr. Mackintosh reports that the liquid given him had petroleum floating on the top, underneath which was water having a decidedly acid reaction. His second report, embracing the results of experiments on fish, is as follows:—

"The series of experiments referred to in the following report consisted of eight distinct tests as to the effects of different liquids and chemicals on living fish.

"The kind of fish used was the stone minnow, allowed by all anglers to be the hardiest variety of small fish.

"No. 1. Fish placed in pure water were alive and healthy looking after six hours.

"No. 2. Fish placed in the same quantity of water with about one hundred and fiftieth part of commercial sulphuric acid, got sickly immediately—in five minutes dead and bleached looking.

"No. 3. Fish placed in the same quantity of water and about one five hundredth part of sulphuric acid—dead in fifteen minutes and slightly bleached.

"No. 4. Fish placed in same quantity of water with about one thousandth part of sulphuric acid—dead in forty-five minutes, not perceptibly bleached.

"No. 5. Fish placed in water referred to in first report as having been taken from Sherman's Inlet and filtered, fish almost dead in two hours, and being placed in clear water did not survive, but died in a few minutes.

"No. 6. Fish placed in the washings of refuse of coal oil, referred to in first report; fish very sickly in an hour; in four hours still alive; when placed in clean water turned belly upward and floated, but revived and was brisk in twenty minutes.

"No. 7. Fish placed in clean water with a film of refuse like the crude oil found in the inlet fish lively for half an hour; sickly soon after, and dead in two hours.

"No. 8. Fish placed in the same quantity of water with a film of crude oil without chemicals—lively for nearly an hour; afterwards kept to the surface of the water; dead in two hours.

"The fish mentioned in No. 6 experiment cleaned with hot and cold water, and boiled along with other fish—two waters and salt, for ten minutes—smelt of coal oil very distinct, taste of coal oil very disagreeably felt in all the fish, but more so in those which had been killed by the water from the inlet. Temperature of the air in room 62° Fahr.

From the above it would appear as settled that petroleum and its products make very unhealthy "food for fishes."
