

It is necessary that I should have those documents in as early as possible, - I intend to notice the fishermen in my District, that they cannot continue fishing after the 31<sup>st</sup> instant. - They will have to renew their license and pay for the same in advance. - -

Sir, I have the honor to report for your information, that on Friday last, the 28<sup>th</sup> instant, I brought Mr. James Cantwell, lessee of the fishery, four mile creek township of Niagara, before William Kirby Esq. J. P., "For that he on or about the 13<sup>th</sup> day of July last, did throw overboard a large stone into a fishery situated there, with the intention of obstructing and damaging the same. - - -

Cantwell language, at the time he committed the act, was commented upon in severe terms by the Magt who imposed a fine of \$8, and costs in all \$11.70+. -

It appeared by the evidence that he wished to damage the ground; his expression when he heaved overboard the stone being - It will give the d in - ed be - gg - ro, something to do, to get that up. -

In a case of this sort, a small fine is of little avail. - I would therefore recommend that the Hon: department will in addition seriously reprimand Mr. James Cantwell, for such gross misconduct. - - -

With reference to my report of the 21. ultimo, relating to David Tyson and two others, for fishing for White fish, with gill nets, on the 20<sup>th</sup>. of Nov. last, in Lake Ontario, Township of Clinton. - - -

I have now the honor to report, that David Tyson is a young married man, 20 years old, is a volunteer in No. 6, Company, 19. Battalion, was on active service at Fort Erie, for six months last summer, got up the net & seized, which cost him \$15, beside knitting.

I saw this young man on Saturday last, who, in addition to the above, says, he sold a quantity of wheat he had, to get up the net, he is poor, and unable to pay a fine: - was ignorant of the law, hopes the Hon. department will deal leniently with him, by restoring to him his net, and he will never offend again.

Tyson acknowledges all, which is the best proof of his own innocence! - - -

From the good character which I received of him from his Captain, and many other respectable people, I have no hesitation in recommending strongly this man's case to you for consideration. - - -

Peter Culp and Nelson Culp - the other two persons referred to, in my former report, are also volunteers in the same company and Battalion, I have not seen either of them, but their Captain and others speak well of them. - - -

I would therefore recommend that I be allowed to take from them jointly the expense consequent to the seizure, give back their nets; they having expressed contrition, and a willingness to pay license in future. -

I am obliged to lay the conduct of Mrs. Joan Baldry, and her man, Huntington beach, lessee of fishing station No: 18, before you. - Having divided the fishing stations 18 and 19, equally between her and Jas. Waddell, including therein the different lots of land occupied by each, I leased the same to them for the current year, as it then appeared to their satisfaction. -

Everything went on well until the early part of last October, when Mrs. Joan Baldry summoned up James Waddell, before J. Wesley Hopkins Esq<sup>e</sup> J. P. - for a malicious trespass, in going on to his own lot, a lot of land leased by me to Waddell in connection with his fishing; I done so by Mr. Whitehead's direction (given when he came here) to the beach on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of November 1865. - - -

Mr. Hopkins fined Waddell 2000 costs, Waddell appealed ag<sup>t</sup> his decision. - The case came before the greater sessions on Thursday last, and the appeal was quashed on a frivolous technicality, herewith thus! -

After the case was before J. W. Hopkins Esq<sup>e</sup> J. P., on the 8<sup>th</sup> of October last, Mrs. Joan Baldry, assisted by her man Alex: McPherson, Magnus Bruce, a tailor - Hamilton, and Pat: Grumley, tore up Waddell's root house, and then threw the debris without the lot, and then fenced it up; Waddell has had possession of the lot for several years back, paid taxes thereon, and it was here he was burned out several years ago, as already reported by me. For Mrs. Baldry's &c, high handed conduct she was joined by Mrs. James Cahill, P. M., before whom she was cited by James Waddell and she appealed, but the case being all the past week before the greater sessions was

adjourned on Saturday evening until next Saturay. ---

In submitting the above facts to your consideration, I am compelled to recommend - That after the termination of Mrs. Ioan Balduys license which expires on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of December next, she be not entitled to a renewal of the same - She and her man being thrice convicted for a contravention of the Fisheries Act. ---

And in the present instance she has acted in a most tyranical way ag<sup>t</sup> James Maddell. -

Mrs. Cahill, the Magistrate so highly disapproves of her conduct, and that of her man Alex McPherson in connection with this matter, that he told me, he will commit him to goal for Non-payment of £20, his last fine. ---

At the Railway depot, attended the arrival of the Yains all regulars, no dev. heard from Joe Jardine of one being the previous day at Newkirk - went out 8. A.M. came in at 10 P. M. - Miles 10,- on the ice. — .

I have the honor to report for your information that this morning at the Railway depot here, I seized a splendid buck deer which appeared by the Way bill express Company, to have been sent from Ottawa, by a Mr. Gilmore to David Law Esq<sup>r</sup> Hamilton. - -

I send you the address, perhaps Mr. Gilmore can be proceeded against, or the person who delivered the deer to the express Agent, at Ottawa, as no fine was imposed here, Mr. Law never having the deer in his possession. - -

I have the honor to report for your information, that Railway car loads of deer pass here daily, in bond, from Detroit to New York, locked up, — Eighty passed here today locked up in a box car. —

I have heard of only two bucks been seen on the trains here since the 14<sup>th</sup>, besides that one, I have reported to you about. —

One passed here by express, on the 16<sup>th</sup>, addressed to J. Lambert, Homer, St. Catharines; I will have no difficulty in prosecuting the person to whom it was delivered. — The other one was seen on the platform at Harrisburg station, on the 18<sup>th</sup>, and was taken west by the train. —

To enforce this law, I would require to be passing and re-passing along the Railways the whole of my time, for at least some days to come. — This I am not prepared to do without orders to that effect. — I understand that the venison will in future be packed in boxes and barrels to escape detection. —

At the depot, watching the trains, — received two telegrams — one from Hon: A. Campbell respecting the deer I seized addeeps to D<sup>s</sup> Law Jr<sup>e</sup> and one from W. G. French, Conductor — also attended the Council Chambers — went out at 8. a.m., came in at 8. p.m., — miles

Wednesday 23, January 1867, —

Attended at before the trains arrived at the depot, J. W. Rep. — Mr. Storer and Joe Gates gave me up a deer, he seized on the train at Paris addeeps to Charles Grable Jr<sup>e</sup>, officer of Customs Fort Erie, N. West. — fee due<sup>es</sup> express. — Bought the case before Jas: Cahill Jr<sup>e</sup> who examined me on oath, and instructed me to addeeps a telegram to Mr. Grable which I did then! — Seized deer to your addeeps, do you claim it — answer.

At the depot, saw Mr. Irving the J. W. Railway Solicitor — who had a circular issued to all the Station Masters on the Railway to decline deer, as the Railways as carriers would be accountable, — went out at 8. a.m., came in at 10. p.m., —

Friday 25, Jan'y 1867,

At the depot and before James Cahill Jr<sup>e</sup> J.P. — who confiscated the deer to James Orphaus from addeeps to C. Grable, went out 8. a.m., — came in at 5 P.M. —

12. November 1866,

Sir:

I have the honor to follow up to you my report of the 3<sup>rd</sup>, November, instant, regarding an absurd claim set up by George Lottridge, owner and occupant of Lot No: 29, and part of lot No: 30, Broken front leounces  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the township of Sault Ste. - - -

By the original grant from the Crown to Lieut. Col: John Young, dated 17<sup>th</sup> of May 1802, Copy herewith, the late W<sup>m</sup>. Lottridge exercised whole and sole control over that portion of Burlington beach, from where the post was first planted which marks the south east angle of the tract of land 22. acres deeded to the late Samuel Dynes about the 9<sup>th</sup> of March 1839. -

From this post to the post planted in the ruin of the old Kings Head Inn, or Government House - the distance would be about 70. chains. - - -

Now I have ascertained that by extending or prolonging the line marked by the letter B, in the margin of the copy of the deed or exemplification herewith No: 1 - which the George Lottridge has had done, by Thomas Allan Blythe D. P. Land Surveyor it comes just to the post, the place where this was planted as the first boundary of Sam<sup>uel</sup> Dynes tract of land 22. acres. - - -

John Dynes, the successor of Sam<sup>uel</sup> Dynes, and George Lottridge are brothers-in-law, and it is reported that John Dynes leases the land No: 29, and a portion of No: 28 from George Lottridge, for \$ 8, a year: please refer to the document dated 1<sup>st</sup> inst, enclosed in my report of the 3<sup>rd</sup>, November 1866. -

At the time 1802, the government first deeded lots No: 29, 30, 31, and 32 - to Lieut: Col: Young, Burlington Bay, was called the Little Lake, or Head of the Lake Ontario. - - Leaving this altogether out of the question; - the description of the lots 29, 30, 31 and 32

and 32, situated on the south side of the water  
which divide the main land from the long beach,  
should be ample and sufficient proof how absurd  
and unjust for George Lottridge to claim. To the damage  
and injury of the fishermen and in defense of the  
Crown. - - -

By copy of deed herewith (No: 2) given by the  
late Richd Beasley, to W<sup>m</sup> Lottridge, father of George Lot-  
ridge, dated 9<sup>th</sup> of March 1819, which appears not to  
be recorded until the 26, of October 1833, the line  
between lots, lots 30, and 31, was again extended and  
prolonged notwithstanding that it is positively  
stated in said deed that the land or lots 29, 30, 31, and  
32 is situated on the south side of the water which  
divide the main land from the long beach, marked  
in the margin of the two deeds, No: 1 and 2, respectively  
with the letter A. - - -

By ejectment summons dated 14, of September 1864,  
No: 3, herewith, the year before you honoured me  
with the appointment, I hold George Lottridge at-  
tempted a tyranical course towards W<sup>m</sup> Cocking  
one of our fishermen, at the time in possession  
of fishing station No: 8, Burlington Beach, but  
he afterward abandoned the suit. - By the Notice  
attached to Ejectment you will please observe what  
Lottridge then grounds his claim upon, to that portion  
of the beach leased then, and at the present time  
to W<sup>m</sup> Cocking by the Crown. - Lease at the  
former time is sent herewith. - - -

At page 6, in the fifth semi annual Report  
of the Water Commissioners for the City of Hamilton  
herewith, please refer to the Engineers report on  
the filtering basin, the site of which is on Bur-  
lington beach; while at the same time he has

but a few years before sold the same property to Mr.  
Thomas Armstrong for a further sum of \$200. - Thus! and  
I may add, that Mr. Thomas Armstrong, when he  
first commenced fishing on Burlington Beach, bought  
out Joseph Jones, and Thomas Lottidge, who bought  
from Levi French, who bought from Silas Jones,  
with George Lottidge's apprenticeship - Armstrong paid  
\$200, forty of which went to Joseph Jones and Thos.  
Lottidge, (not W<sup>m</sup> Lottidge see No: 37. H. H. H.)  
the balance \$160, to George Lottidge, - and to pre-  
vent the other fishermen enjoying any of the beach  
he took possession of it, gave a longer lease of  
part to John Dryes his brother in law, and retaining the  
balance to this day in his own possession, selling  
some and charging rent for the rest. - Is it not  
too bad? - I hope the fishery branch of the department  
will not suffer this to continue any longer. - - -

Aaron Fletcher paid the late W<sup>m</sup> Lottidge ten dol-  
lars a year \$120, in rents for the privilege of fishing  
and occupying the Crown Lands. And W<sup>m</sup> Pookins, a  
fisherman, actually paid \$50, for the like privilege. - - -

George Lottidge also received \$200, from the late  
Mr. John O. Hall, for gravel to ballast the G. M. Ry. -

W<sup>m</sup> Lottidge, father of George Lottidge died  
about of years ago. - - -

4. In the year 1859, a man named Thomas Lin-  
clay Potts, having settled as a fisherman on Bur-  
lington Beach, built a house there, - Lottidge entered  
a suit against him, and ultimately the house was  
maliciously burned down, as it is now said at  
the instance of Mr. George Lottidge. - - -

The house was known to put Potts, Pebble  
Wilson, and Barclay out of possession. - - -

ice documents herewith No: 4 and 5. - No: 2 of Nos. 5.  
part three points out that George Lothridge then  
claimed the property of the Crown on the beach.

By adverse possession by himself, and those  
through whom he claims for sixty years and up-  
wards, - The Crown I believe can resume pos-  
session of the Crown Lands, whenever it pleases, -

The first deed was dated 17. of May 1802,  
this was from the Crown to John Young of lots 29,  
30, 31, and 32; - The deed to W<sup>m</sup> Lothridge father of  
George Lothridge the present occupant of lot 29,  
and a part of 30, see document, No: 2. of Nos: 1 & 2,  
does not appear to be in existence until 9. of March 1819,  
and this would be only about 47. years. -- Document  
No: 4, is herewith for your perusal. - -

Chillo Bates, built in the first instance the house  
at present occupied by David Fitch, see No: 39. in  
my report of 1<sup>st</sup> instant, forwarded to you in my  
report of the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant. - Lothridge entered a suit  
against Bates, but this suit was compromised by  
Lothridge buying out Bates. - - -

In the Sixth Semi-annual Report of the  
Water Commissioners of the City of Hamilton, and  
page 22, herewith you will find George Lothridge  
was paid £300, for the site of the filtering basin  
and he gave a deed to them for the same.

Mr. Joseph Perry, Thomas Armstrong, Alex: Brown,  
John Gage, Alex: Rolla, Benjamin Gould, Richard  
Gage, John Livingstone, Geo: C. Second, Mrs. Fish, Benj:  
Joice Mrs. Baldry, and others ~~are~~ applicants  
for the Crown Lands on the beach, belonging  
to the Crown, and are prepared and willing to  
pay rent for the same. - - -

I strongly recommend that this desire to obtain the same will receive your immediate attention, and I would respectfully suggest that before a re-distribution of this land shall take place such other measures may be adopted and consummated as will put Mr. Lottridge, and all other persons out of the possession they illegally hold of the known land property at the beach.

It is the manner of tenure held by those parties, George Lottridge &c. &c. which has always heretofore marred the quiet and peace of some of your fishermen, and the authority which I as your overseer should and ought to possess. - The fishermen have always heretofore been a prey to the land sharks, and some of them in turn have preyed on themselves and others. - -

I again, in conclusion, humbly, but respectfully ask you to put a final stop to the same, by carrying out my recommendation contained herein and submitted to you already in my report, of the 3<sup>rd</sup> of November instant. - -

TRANSMITTING VENISON BY RAILWAY PROHIBITED.—Mr. J. W. Kerr, Game and Fishery Inspector, the City Police Magistrate, and Mr. A. E. Irvine, Solicitor of the Great Western Railway, had a conversation yesterday in regard to the transmitting of venison from one place to another on the Railway. They were unanimously of the opinion that if the practice was continued, the Company rendered themselves liable to be prosecuted according the law for having venison in their possession. The agents at the various stations along the line have accordingly been notified not to take any deer in charge. — This step will, we feel confident, materially assist in putting a stop to the violation of the law, which has become very general among sportsmen in almost all parts of the Province.

My vague report of the 18<sup>th</sup> could not lead you to this conjecture or rather conclusion. - - -

I seized the deer on the morning of the 18<sup>th</sup> inst, and immediately after, I reported the matter to James Cahill Esq<sup>r</sup> J. P. — Police Magistrate here — "I made my information on oath of the fact" Mr Cahill sent Detective Harris for Mr David Law, who appeared before his Worship at the Police Court, I was then sworn, the case entered on the Magistrate book, and proved by me. —

Mr David Law, being then present, was called up on to answer to the charge — his reply was, the deer was not found in his possession — he could not, he said, be made responsible — he believed the deer was intended for him, but he said he would not claim it, as it was not worth the expense of getting it skinned, and cut up. — He said he only hoped Mr Kerr, would not get any part of it, as he Mr L understood Kerr got all those things. — The deer was present in Court all this time, with the ad- dees I sent you fastened to a cord around his neck. — I had the deer in my possession until the Mag<sup>r</sup> confiscated it. — Mr James Cahill, the Magistrate informed Mr David Law, what the law was in the case, after which he confiscated the deer, to which Mr Law did not offer any objection. —

and Mr. Cahill gave Capt. Nicolls Chief of Police  
an order for its disposal. -- The express messenger at  
my request, apprised Mr. Law, that I had seized the  
deer before the Magistrate had it, brought before him,  
and so Mr. Law acknowledged himself before the  
Magistrate. ---

On yesterday, I met Mr. Law on James st,  
when he made use of threats towards me, so that before  
I read your letter I anticipated its contents. ---

The Chief Constable's abstract, <sup>bearing</sup> taken from the  
Magistrate's book, will show you the case was fairly fully  
tried <sup>fairly</sup> and according to law, anything Mr. David Law,  
may have promulgated to the contrary notwithstanding  
me. ---

I merely acted as the signing officer and gave  
my evidence accordingly, that done <sup>confession elicited and</sup> my connection  
with the deer ceased, -- so that all the latter part  
of your letter is entirely inapplicable to me, and we =  
called for <sup>you do me wrong without a cause.</sup> It appears to me you have been mis-  
led, as the acts attributed to me, were adjudicated on  
by James Cahill Esq<sup>r</sup> J. P. -- All I have said above  
can be corroborated by half a dozen, <sup>besides the magistrate</sup> ~~of the Police~~,

If your telegram or letter reached me before the  
deer was disposed of, or even after Mr. Law was ar-  
raigned before the Magistrate, I would <sup>have</sup> ~~cheerfully~~ obeyed  
your orders, but your telegram only reached me on the  
evening of the fourth day, after my connection with  
this deer had altogether ceased. --

As to the law in the case, I did not expose  
the law, the magistrate before whom I bring my case  
do it for me. -- I have <sup>never</sup> yet sat in judgment upon  
any man in a case, I was interested in, and I  
never mean to. -- Mr. Law could have a

weeks <sup>or longer</sup> time allowed him - if he asked the Magistrate for it, - and if he lost the deer it is all his own fault. - - -

The Serrine neither cost me nor the Dept<sup>r</sup> anything. - And I may as well say boldly out that even if it did, I would not take money in the way it is offered by Allan Gilmore ~~Esq~~ I don't do such things. - - -

I hope the foregoing explanation will prove satisfactory.

I believe after the deer was sent to the Industrial School, it was taken to Judge O'Reilly's house, who gave the children in return a quantity of mutton. - On receiving the annexed note from Mr H. M. Stores, I showed it to Mr Cahill the magistrate, and his reply was, if Mr O'Reilly or any of the managers of the Industrial School thought proper to give the children mutton, and take the deer, they could do so, without infringing the law, and so there the matter for the present has ended. - - -

All the Henry M. Storrs, with whom I have consulted on the subject wants, is, that you be pleased to empower him to seize all deer, game &c, &c, in the neighbourhood of Chatham, Baptiste bays and Windles, and prosecute the parties in whose possession the same may be found for breaches of the Act. . . . - And this he will do if empowered without either fee or reward. -

In compliance with your Circular of November last, I have now the honor to enclose my return, showing the products of the different description of fish taken during the past year, in that part of my district, situated on Lake Erie, between Port Rowan, and Fort Erie, on the Niagara River. - -

I have much pleasure in submitting, with the above the quantity and description of material used for capturing the fish therein described. — The intended value of the fish &c, and your will the number of persons engaged in fishing; you will please find herewith. —

I believe the quantities given, are a fair statement of facts and may be relied upon. —

The white fish, fishing, on Lake Erie, is of very short duration; and with the exception of twelve barrels taken at Turkey Point, this last season by Seine fishing, all the rest are gilled fish of first quality. —

The white fish gilling commenced about the 25, of Oct, last, and terminated "according to law" on the 19<sup>th</sup>, day of November. —

So that all the time for catching, "taking rough weather into account," is about twenty days of the entire year altogether: —

The White fish only frequent the reefs of rock, which are situated not more than a mile in any place from shore, at the particular season of the year. —

I believe they come there to spawn.

S

When they arrive, the farmers, who have for years past, been in the habit of catching them, on the old haunts, repair their nets, and catch all they can. —

The farmers do this each evening, weather permitting, in their frail flat bottom boats, and raise the nets in the morning. — Almost in every instance, <sup>early part of season</sup> the fish taken are of the male tribe! — I saw myself, only ten female fish, in a quantity of three hundred. —

Selling fish, by the barrel, is not done by any person in my district. —

As Sixty five <sup>fish</sup>, such as I allude to, in this instance, will at any time fill a barrel full, I have in compliance with your Circular, labelled them all for you, in the return. — — —

Of course you are aware that I had nothing to do with the fisheries on Lake Erie, until after the 1<sup>st</sup> day of July last (1866,) but I do think, that a similar account, in every particular, will be a fair statement to go by, for the year ending 1865. —

I have therefore given such an account as count accordingly. —

I may here mention, that several of the persons who fished last November, have not yet paid for the privilege they enjoyed. —

I have no doubt, that if alive and well, they will do so, by next November, if not before. —

I have therefore to ask your permission that I do not in the mean time, be ordered to prosecute them for fishing without a license.

I have much pleasure in giving you, an

I have the honor to send you, herewith a return, showing the products of the different description of fish caught at the fishing station situated between Queenston Heights, on the Niagara River, and Whitchurch Harbour (on Lake Ontario). —

I have much pleasure in submitting with the above, the tabular statement you require showing the quantity, and description of material in use, men employed in capturing the fish, as described therein, with the intrinsic value of the whole. —

I believe the act is, on the whole pretty correct. —

The fishing at Niagara, during the past year 1865, has been very good, particularly the white fish gill net fishing. —

And for the short period, the white fish gill net was carried on there, it was splendid.

The white fish gill net, as at present appointed by law, is very injurious to the fishermen on Lake Ontario; and I would strongly recommend that an immediate change be made in the act whereby gill net may be continued from the 30<sup>th</sup> day of May, to the 1<sup>st</sup> day of August. — I do not believe it at all injurious to the fish to do this. — It would be a great boon to the fishermen! — While at the same time, I would recommend that the close season for white fish, be extended to the 15<sup>th</sup>, day of December, and a close season be fixed for our lake Salmon Trout!

In making up my return for the department, I have attempted the plan of

classifying the various nets and fish of a like kind, which I hope will meet approval. —

I have also, as you will have perceived, kept my returns on Lake Erie, separate, from those on Lake Ontario. I have done this, with the view to prevent complication and confusion. —

At Burlington beach, owing to the short time allowed for seine White fish, when fish are there, the returns from thence are rather slim, this however, has been remedied, and made up by gill net white fishing, by one or more independent persons there. —

At Toronto Island, the White fish fishing Seining was a complete failure last season, owing to the same cause. — viz; that of strict compliance with the (law) act. —

But the seine fishing at this place, still continues a successfull and profitable business to the lefes. — At Leslieville, Mr John, Moland, done well in trout gill net fishing: — Mr Jos. Hiltig of the Frenchman bay, caught the largest salmon trout, last season in Lake Ontario, several of them weighed upwards of 25 lbs, and scarcely any were under ten pounds. — He is the most law abiding fisherman on the lake. —

It is very hard I can assure you to get some of the fishermen to keep an account of the fish, they catch. — So try and get them to do this ~~it~~ is one of the greatest difficulties I have had of late to encounter. —

It is only by repeatedly hunting after the fishermen  
and by enquiring of their neighbours, that I am  
at all enabled to get at the truth. —

I give herewith, an abstract of the whole  
which compiled, shows at a glance, the sum total,

Altho opposed then, to allowing Seine to be used in taking Suckers, Shad and other rough fish, or even herring gill nets in any part of Burlington bay. — I have after mature consideration come to the conclusion, that to allow me the discretionary power in respect of this, as at the time referred to, "alluded to by you", would prove a great boon to our licensed fishermen, and I will therefore honestly confess to you, that I <sup>now</sup> longer see any serious objections to your now granting what you proposed in your letter to me of the 29<sup>th</sup>, of May 1866. —

No fishermen have been fined, during the winter, for any infraction of the act, and I have not heard of any of them, going out on Sunday. —

I have no hesitation, in admitting, that I now desire in consequence; that they receive a little indulgence. . . . of course, if sanctioned, I am not going to allow Seine to be hauled piecemeal all over the bay, not a bit of it!!! Nor do, I mean to allow the gill nets to be set up and down all over, nothing of the sort. —

I shall confine the fishing altogether within certain limits, and within certain dates, — and I have reason now to think, that the fishermen in this instance might have and get a fair trial.

Until very recently, I was not aware that our  
fishermen, on Penlington beach, were so extremely poor

The writer a young gentleman, a Boniste at the village of Wellington Square, has been misled by Letters from Baldry. — The real fact are as follows: — On the 16. of November 1844, Mr James Maddell, first occupied the lot reported to, as a tavern stand, this was before Mrs Joan Baldry, as Mrs Joan Williamson made her first appearance on Burlington beach. —

In the year 1847, James Maddell built a root house on this lot. — On the night of the 11 $\frac{1}{2}$  of Sep: 1854, his dwelling house situated on this lot was maliciously set fire to, by the late Charles Corey, resident on the said beach, and burned to the ground. — After this, Maddell, still kept possession of the lot, and he used and occupied the root house until the month of October last, when it was demolished by Mrs Joan Baldry. — Those facts I find are borne out in evidence by Miss W<sup>m</sup> Hopkins, Fred<sup>k</sup>, and Lachanah Corey, Robert Hall, John Goddard, and Wesley Lee. —

In June last year, I issued the annual license at the beach, to James Maddell, and Mrs Baldry, on the 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ . day of June, and altho' Mrs Baldry was well aware of this fact, still it was not until the month of October, following;

that she by misrepresentation succeeded in having  
Maddell fined for an alleged trespass on the same  
lot, his own property. - Maddell appealed at <sup>to</sup>  
the conviction, and the consequence was that  
through the influence of Mr Charles A. Sodler,  
Barrett's, the case was staved off from day to  
day, until the last day of the quarter session held  
in December last, and then at Mr Sodler's in-  
stance, adjourned until the March quarter session  
to be heard the first day of that Court. - Mad-  
dell had to pay Mess Frank Mackean and

last, also. --

This small sum, altho trifling in itself,  
is sufficient admission on Mrs Joan Baldry's  
part, to establish the title still existing in  
James Maddell, even suppose you throw  
my annual license aside altogether.



In my report of the 3<sup>rd</sup> of November last, at No: 6. — I placed James Waddell as the occupant of the lot. —

I advised Mrs. John Baldy, when she brought the case before Squire Hopkins, to leave the matter to the department to settle, but no! — She must have the lot, and she went so far as to promise me money, if I would consent, and give it to her. —

With all the foregoing facts before my eyes, I do not even now feel disposed in giving Mrs. Baldy the small lot of a square of acre of land, to the prejudice of James Waddell, unless she pays him amply the expenses she unnecessarily put him to. — or! as I have myself informed her. — unless the department orders me to do so. —

My letter of December last copy herewith, will show you my views then, and the impression on my mind is still unchanged. —

In my letter to you of the 25<sup>th</sup> instant I avoided everything that might prejudice those persons in your estimation. —

In the postscript of Mr. Simcoe Key letter he says — "The most of the land the 1/2 is on the Canal reserve. —





You will please find your license for the year 1864, herewith. - I cannot from memory say, where the west boundary of Mr. Grobb's is placed. His lease however, will show it, and beyond it east you must not go; If your net is too long for your ground you can let it <sup>and</sup> out on either or both wings, but you must all contention with your neighbouring fishermen, and I would strongly recommend you to keep your tongue quiet. -- I was informed you offered Mr. Sheas #30, if he would prevent his <sup>belonging</sup> to the other fishermen from coming through his place, and I was told you <sup>were</sup> continually threatening to stone the fishing ground again, and that because George Richardson declined to swear for you, contrary to truth, you would not employ him any more. This if true, is all wrong, - I understand you say very often bad things of me; I cannot help this!. I am obliged to carry out all instructions I receive from time to time, and I am sworne to do it. - The fisheries at Niagara were divided by me, as I was instructed to do, from Head quarters; And after I divided and laid them off, the department approved of the way I did it - I do this on my own act. If all the white fish in Lake Ontario, were on Grobb's ground, and on yours, you cannot go there without their consent. I cannot move Grobb further on to John Campbell's ground, than what his lease calls for. The limits of each ground having been approved of, so shall they remain as established. - It is really

I sent a box of White and herring last year to Mr W. F. Whitcher, I paid Pat Hart a fisherman for them, the fish never came to hand, they perished before they arrived at Ottawa, they were sent as a specimen, to demonstrate the claps taken at Niagara fishing, and for no other purpose.

I did send another small box of fish "Seisco" last January, to Mr Whitcher, Ottawa, I bought them from John Graffe, and paid for them also, in doing this, I was not aware that I was offending any person, and my letter herewith, written at the time will explain the object I had in view. — This small box of Seisco like the former, were never received at Ottawa. —

As regards the charge alluded to, by this special Correspondent, made by him on the 28<sup>th</sup> of September last, against James Bantrell; in the commencement of his letter of 22<sup>nd</sup> April 1867. — I protest to you that he done nothing of the sort; he is at fault about the date, only three jule monthly lost in his reckoning. —

Between Duffies Creek and Leslieville east of Toronto, there are twelve persons at present engaged fishing; I have sent you part of the rent, of a part of those twelve persons, the balance I shall send you shortly when I get it. - -

At Etobicoke, Port Credit, and Bronte there are three men fishing at present. Their rent will be forthcoming very shortly. - The water surrounding the Island at Toronto, has raised four feet since the 19<sup>th</sup> of April last. - -

I had the plan of the island with me on last Thursday, when in Toronto, and I called at Munro's office to get him to place the <sup>(I)</sup> on the same, but could not find him; - I will attend to this matter immediately), a

Sir. I find this evening, that I cannot get away on tomorrow morning, as I expected I would, when I wrote you on the 18<sup>th</sup> instant. -- The Vice Chancellor, is sitting here at present, and I am summoned before him to give evidence, so cannot get away, until I am first examined. --

I have simply to say with regard to the fisheries at Toronto; reserve one chain all around the island, and from the mouth of big don, reserve one chain on the outside of the marsh, down to the City limits joining the township of Scarborough. --

The fishermen at Leslieville, which is within the City limits of Toronto, require to have at all times, free access to the water and water edge, and this chain will give them a free use of the beach, I cannot recommend a monopoly not even to the Corporation of the City of Toronto.

All the fishermen, at the island of Toronto, at present live on the reserves, so please, be so good as to keep them; and I am sure, they are entitled to your consideration. -- I heard in Toronto on Thursday last, that Mr. John Bell, Alderman there, had gone to ~~Toronto~~<sup>Ottawa</sup>, not only to get possession of the island, but also of the fisheries. -- I hope this will not be granted, let the City have the island save and except the reserve for the fisheries and light House. --

At this present time I am aware that the fishermen are well taxed by the City of Toronto, see for instance Mr. Gray's tax for year 1866, per bill he would be of 16.20/- and this too, before the City had a legal right in the premises.—

This year I find Mr. Gray is assessed £900 and this too, with house, situated on the fishing Reserve.

And Mr. David Ward, another of the fishermen advised me on Thursday last, that he was assessed for a like sum. Mr. Gray's slip is herewith.—

I hope Mr. Whitcher will see that our fisheries rights are protected at the Toronto island, not only now, but for all time to come, and dont give the Corporation of Toronto, any right nor control over the fisheries, nor over the bay, nor over the marsh there; as regards the fisheries, "Corporations have no souls".—

My report written you on a former occasion is so full, as to the requirement applied for by me, on behalf of the fishermen, that I deem it unnecessary to say any more on that score.—

I have simply to add that I told the fishermen on the island, that a reserve of one chain all round the island was fixed by an order in Council.

I hope you will not make me look small in their estimation by again changing it, to anything less.

I will mark off the station on the Map as soon as I possibly can, but I can assure you, that this map is no more like the Toronto island at this present time than the Parliament building at Toronto are like those at Ottawa. —

Doctor Green, the Mayor at Whitley, and myself had a conversation on this subject yesterday; the doctor is a very warm supporter of the fishing Act, but he told me, that if I brought up a farmer before him, for fishing nets, and catching fish for his own use, he would pause, and apply to the department for instructions before fining him. The doctor says, this order in Council dated 26, day of April, herewith, overide and sets aside clause four, at page four of the Act, I want your opinion of the law at once on this subject.

D. and Mayor of Whitby, I had John Pilkington of Port Whitby, arraigned for fishing 139 yards of net in Whitby Harbour, for the purpose of catching fish, "for trade and commerce" - He was fined, five dollars and costs, and his nets and boat confiscated. ---

John Pilkington, lives outside of my district, but the fishing was done within my jurisdiction. As he is a poor man, and gets his living by (always) fishing "without a license", I recommended that the net and boat, be restored to him, and the fine and costs, be allowed to remain uncollected as a guarantee for future good behavior. —

He is now willing to pay a small license of five dollars a year, conform with the laws in future, and such being the case may I give him back the net, and boat, and a license for the current year, at the small rate I propose.

I spoke to Mr Harris about this improper act of his, which he admitted, but pleaded the large size of the fish as the only excuse, one of them alone being seventeen pounds weight and several of them eight & ten pounds weight each, and none of them under five pounds weight. - I was present on Thursday night when three hauls were made by Mrs. Harris, he only caught two white fish; I think fort Erie fishing can be made more valuable hereafter than heretofore. -

I found Beijin<sup>n</sup> Foulds, James McCadle, Jerry Bates and Lee<sup>1</sup> Long, at eleven o'clock last night, hauling, but not having a sufficient<sup>2</sup> for them, I stopped seining the net until this afternoon when I obtained two Constables and a Conveyance, the Constable having been armed with the authority from the P. Magistrate, Lee<sup>1</sup> Long and myself, being pointed out the net : the Constable then seized them, and took them away for prosecution to this place: - Beijin<sup>n</sup> Foulds, appealed ag<sup>t</sup> the Magistrate's conviction.

Sir, I have just received your instructions to report upon Mr. McLownay's letter, who complains of poisonous refuse being thrown into the Ld River at Galt, with my connivance and consent. - This is not exactly correct, when I visited Galt last year, I met Mr. Cowan, and having spoken to him about the Oliver Soap factory situated on the bank of the river, I proceeded thence to examine the premises, Cowan only accompanied me part of the way, he did not wish that Mr. Oliver should see him in my company or presence. - I subsequently served Mr. Oliver with a notice to abate the nuisance which he did.

I have never seen Mr. Cowan since the 9<sup>th</sup> of June last year, nor has the slightest complaint been made to me personally since. -

By a letter, dated 29, of May 1866, from the department, I visited Galt, and my letter of the 9<sup>th</sup>, June 1866, will explain to you, at a glance what action I then took in this matter. —

Whatever the measure was providing to my appointment, I knew not, beyond what then came under my personal observation, and which I reported at the time, but this I do know now, and I am happy to report a marked improvement has taken place in every mill, and manufactory there since. — — On the 16, of April last, when in Ottawa, Mr. Whiteside, the head of the Fishery in our dominion, drew my attention to a letter he received from Mr. Miller of Galt, and instructed me to see Mr. Miller on the subject of this letter, when my other duties would allow me to do so. — Until Friday the 24 June, I was not able to see Mr. Miller on that day. I did see him at Galt, and he only referred to a vague report abroad, put in circulation by Mr. Cowan, that Messrs Howell and Thompson threw their dye stuff into the river, this I ascertained subsequently was not the case. — and that the ashes of the soap factory killed all the fish on the west side of the river, on which Mr. Cowan himself lives, a few miles below Galt, — an absurd notion of his, as Mr. Miller terms it, — fish at Galt, were never more numerous than they are this year. —

Now as regards Mr Sam Oliver, the  
Soap factor, when I left home here on  
the 24 June last, I made up my mind  
to prosecute him, on my arrival there,  
I found the Soap factory burnt to the  
ground, his loss great, what could I do,  
I had to sympathise with Mr Sam<sup>l</sup>  
Oliver, in his hours of trial, and I am  
satisfied when Mr Oliver rebuilds  
again he will remember the cir-  
cumstances better than if a fine of  
£20, and the costs were imposed. -

I have as you instructed me, copied into  
and now beg to report upon the order No 57, contained in  
the annexed paper issued by, and posted up in the  
town of Niagara, by Charles M. Pyne, Captain 42. Inf.  
Infantry, United States Army, commanding post, Niagara Fort,  
New York state. —

On Thursday last, the 18<sup>th</sup>, of July, I proceeded to  
Niagara, and immediately waited upon Captain Pyne,  
who informed me, that our fishermen, had set their gill  
nets, on what is termed the leap bed, situated in the  
mouth of the Niagara River, on the American side, and  
that he could stand this no longer, and so issued the  
order referred to; that he does so, from himself alone,  
had no orders from the Adjutant General of the United  
States Army. — Acted so, because, the fishermen were des-  
troying the hook and line fishing by setting their nets in  
the leap bed. Had been reported to do so, by the  
members of a fishing club, at Buffalo. —

Captain Pyne, stated to me, that his General  
Government, United States, claimed three miles out in  
Lake Ontario from their fort. — It was immediately  
under the American fort, not more than twenty yards  
from (land) the shore, where one of the net complain-  
of was set out. —

The General Govt, of the United States, Capt.  
Pyne told me, has no fishing law, while the State  
of New York, has! However, the State law of New  
York has no control over what ~~s~~ he is pleased  
to call and term the General Government Military  
reserve. — This is something of the nature of our  
Ordinance lands. —

What the American law is, as regards  
this case, I am not aware, — but consider it very

wrong for James Cantwell, who is the only fisherman, I could trace the matter home to, to his not being set by him on the leap bed. - And many persons told me, that Cantwell, done so, from motives of revenge towards the other fishermen. - This Jas: Cantwell's the same man, who has been reported to you, as using disloyal language towards our government, some time ago. - A reprimand in any case from you will effectively serve him & all other fishermen

from the nature and position of the United States fort, as compared with our dominion (here) at the mouth of the Niagara river; I do think Capt Pyne's statement, cannot be altogether correct, for three miles which he says! his general government claims would bring the United States territory up to the 4 mile on our dominion side. —

While I disapprove of the fishermen setting their gill nets across the mouth of the Niagara river. — on the American side, and in American waters, still I would like very much, if the limits and boundaries of the United States were more accurately defined. — Is true, that our fishermen have as Mr. George Monifox, the member for Niagara been fishing for years in American waters, this has been more frequently boasted about, by the fishermen themselves, for a purpose, than it has really happened to be the case, I am persuaded that only for the cause assigned, no order, of the nature referred to, would ever be issued by Captain Pyne.

I dont consider myself, that Captain is justified in posting copies of his orders, which he did, in the town of Niagara. - What right he has to claim three miles out in Lake Ontario within half or even a quarter of a mile of our dominion is what I desire to know. - -

Captain Payne, in addition to what his master, is an intelligent, and gentlemanly man, has never interfered with our fishermen before, nor would not now, only the case was so glaring. -

He informed me, no matter where men came from (angles) they could fish on the military slip but he would not allow net, nor fishing on Sundays. -

It was reported in Niagara, that Captain Payne, gave order to his soldiers to fire on the fishermen, if they set their nets on the bank bed again. I found no foundation for any such report.

I hope when Mr. Whitcher reviews this whole case, that he will come out with a stern re-~~port~~ letter, and order, to our frontier fishermen at Niagara. - - With such an individual as Mr. James Cantwell, acting in the way, he has our Govt, and that of the United States, might, if not checked, very soon, become embroiled in trouble. -

I have never allowed our fisherman to set their gill nets in, or across the mouth of the Niagara River, or on either side of the water. - If our fishermen were to do this I would most undoubtedly have taken them up, prosecuted, and committed, and confiscated their nets for a Contumacy of the fishing act, in that particular place.

It is with a desire to protect the wild duck &c, &c, that he now applies for this license, a reedy. -

Mr. Whelage wants to have by this license, an exclusive privilege granted to him, and to have the same for a time of years, when he means to go to some expense in purchasing wild rice, and sowing the same. - Is there anything in the Act whereby a right of this sort, can be given to meet the emergency this case demands. -

A remedy is wanted which the existing game law, I fear does not cover. -

Can I give Mr. Waage a license under the fishery act, to cover what he requires. -

I have now further to state, that on  
the evening of the 20<sup>th</sup> of November last, I ar-  
rived from Port Union, "Byland Creek" and  
Toronto, where I had been attending to my busi-  
ness, when Mr. John A. Davis, "Express Messenger",  
informed me that he had on that day, delivered  
to Mr. P. D. Bates, at his stall, fish dealers, 3  
barrels of white fish; — I asked him where they  
were received, he replied, on the evening of the  
19<sup>th</sup>, and were only delivered, that day, the 20<sup>th</sup>,  
of November, at 12 o'clock, noon; — My reply was,  
I did not think myself justified in making  
a seizure, as tho' I find I reported the matter sub-  
sequently to you, on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of November last,  
those fish it appears came from Collingwood.

Now with regard to the barrel of white fish  
in question, which I seized at the Railway station  
here, at 1/2 past 12 o'clock, p.m., on the 20<sup>th</sup> of  
November last, it was shipped at Windsor, on  
the same day, at 11, o'clock, A.M., where those  
fish were caught I know not! All I then  
knew about the matter was that Mr. P. D. Bates  
to whom those fish were addressed, had

written previously to the shipper at Windsor, not to  
send him any white fish after the 19<sup>th</sup> of November  
until after the 1<sup>st</sup> of December, that he Bates  
would not receive them, because contrary to law.

I may here say. - "I never disputed your au-  
thority, nor the power extending the time for catching  
white fish, vested in the Government, and as af-  
feets the River Detroit actually extended to the

tension of time at Detroit river, I then knew no-

Fish being perishable, it being moderately warm at the time for a few days here - "several fish were destroyed by the heat" — And this barrel of W. fish, on being opened, and examined, coming fairly, as James Cahill Esq<sup>r</sup>. J. P., Police Magistrate, stated at the time, within the meaning of the Act, took my information at the Express Messengers, Mr. Celard, in whose possession I found the fish, and then confiscated them to the State, and ordered them to be sold, and they were sold immediately, which was about 1. o'clock p.m. on the 21<sup>st</sup> day of November to John Davis Fish Dealer, for their full value. —

Babey, as I was informed, a copy of which I send you. -

I had McDonald accompany me to see Mr L'aurason Esq<sup>r</sup> J. P. police magistrate who on hearing the pros and cons, adjudged "that Mr McDonald gave sufficient excuse to exonerate him from the penalty of the law."

It appears by McDonald's statement that this deer, was sent him to sell, about the middle of December last, by a Mr Brown of Sardinia. — He was not aware that the act regarding deer, expired until the 1<sup>st</sup> of February, and he produced the copy of a

proposed act, introduced by some years past,

which never passed the House. -

Keeper another saddle of venison, the same  
being a violation of the game law. — —

While securing one of these to take  
it before the Mayor Mr Davis. — The In= =  
dian Josias, denied the other took it into his  
sleigh, and drove away with it, together  
with wild turkeys, and other game. —

Mr Dawson, gave the Mayor, the  
necessary excuse, where I abandoned  
the prosecution ag<sup>t</sup> him. —

Now as regards the Indian Josias,  
I mentioned the circumstances to Mr Robert  
McKenzie, Superintendent of Indian affairs, who  
agreed with me that it would be a very  
good lesson for the Indians to prosecute  
Josias. I await your orders on this sub-

In your letter of the 4, January next, you say:-  
"Be particular in seeing how the fishing at the Indian Reserve is carried on; - find out any complaint or abuses that exist, and make any suggestions which may seem to you advisable for the protection and regulation of those fisheries". -

I have the honor to report for your information, on this matter as follows: The fishing here, is carried on by means of small seine, or drif nets, either by the Indians, or in mixed groups of Indians and Frenchmen, and by Americans permitted by Indians to fish on this Reserve. -

The fish taken in Spring is pickerel, and the fish taken in the fall of the year is herring. -

The pickerel in all cases are sold fresh to agents at Port Huron, who ship <sup>them</sup> by steamer to Detroit and Cleveland. - The Indians sometimes dispose of small quantities fresh, to the store keepers in trade. -

The Herring taken by the Indians &c &c &c, on the Reserve in the fall are sold part fresh about the neighbourhood, while the greatest part are salted down and packed in half barrels and then disposed of principally to the storekeepers, who furnish them with salt, empty barrels for packing the fish, &c, material for their nets, and with provisions for their maintenance and support. Each fishing station in this reserve has a shanty and net reel erected about the place, where the net and fish are hauled in, on the bank of the River. -

S

The price obtained for each  $\frac{1}{2}$  barrel of  
berries is about \$4.50. I understood however, that  
it is the store-keepers and not the Indians, who  
reap the benefits, <sup>thefts</sup> in those sales. —

I ascertained that some of the Indians disposed  
of their right of fishing on their stations in the  
Reserve. — For instance to John Robinson an  
American, from the other side of St. Blas River,  
to Joseph Savoy, and John Tommee, resident  
Frenchman. —

I believe, and I heard, that no person  
got on the fishing at the Indian Reserve without  
the consent of the Indians. — —

The return of fish taken on the fisheries,  
Indian Reserve; men employed, numbers of  
nets used, and boat engaged thereat, you  
will please find herewith.

I give you this return, separate by itself,  
that you may fairly judge this whole matter  
yourself. —

I may further state that I saw Mr.  
Bobt. McKenzie, Subt. of Indian Affairs at Ber-  
rien, on enquiry, he informed me the Indians  
had no complaints to make, nor had he any  
to make in their behalf, so far as regards the  
fishing in the river St. Blas, in front of  
the Indian Reserve. —

I may further add, that I ascertained  
that no leases have ever been issued, nor  
taken out by Indians nor any other person  
from Bania to Pabys Point.

I have therefore to suggest, for the better  
carrying out of the fishing act, and regulations,

that no person be allowed or permitted to fish in the  
St. Clair River, between Sarnia, and Babys point, un-  
less they are licensed to do so. --

For instance, the Indians, cannot fish according  
to ~~sue~~ except a special clause in the act, unless they have  
a lease to do so. -- See Schedule No 8. of Section  
No: 14, & thus! -- "Provided the Commissioners of  
" Crown lands may appropriate and lease certain  
" waters, in which certain Indians shall be al-  
" lowed to <sup>Catch</sup> fish for their own use as food in and  
" at whatever manner and time are specified  
" in the lease".

And again, according to the orders in Council,  
dated, Ottawa, 26, of April 1804, "Fishing by  
means of nets, for the purpose of trade, and com-  
merce, except under leases or licenses from the  
department &c. &c., is prohibited in the waters  
of Upper Canada?"

In conformity with the law, so plainly laid  
down, I have no alternate left me, nor hesitation  
in recommending that the same be put in full  
force and effect, between Sarnia and Babys  
point for the year 1864.

Mess 14 Holland Sagamore, and Lord of Pt Huron were names given me, as the only three known to my self and there were others fished there. -

I have to report, that the several lessees of the fisheries from Point Edward, and up toward Kettle point St. Clair River and Lake Huron, complained to me that they are not dealt fair with; for that while they, "the lessees", pay rent. The Indians, are allowed to fish; Americans are also allowed to come into our water and fish; Frenchmen are allowed to fish; Fishermen are allowed to fish, beside ten or twelve persons are allowed to fish at the mouth of the Rivière aux Sables Brewster's Mills &c. &c., who pay no license and who undersell them in the fish market of the Strait and Cleveland, —

At their request, I bring this matter under your notice; I may also mention that from inquiry made by me, I find that for 25 miles down the river St. Clair, from Sarnia to Babys point, no license is paid altho there is 15 or 20 different fishing stations, where fish are caught in abundance, for trade and commerce. My fish return from this locality will prove to you the correctness of what I say: —

I was offered \$400, a year for the fishery in front of the Indian Reserve, a distance of 4 miles along the St. Clair River, from Sarnia to Goderich,

There is only one man a Mr Geo R. Taylor, who paid rent between Kettle Point and Goderich. Mr L.R. Jones, Capt. Dufferin, may give info on this head.



In conclusion I beg most respectfully to recommend that the attached order in Council, be enforced and carried into effect at those places I have referred to. - This will allay the discontent, at present existing in the minds of those licensed fishermen. -

The fact as I know them, I respectfully submit for your consideration. -

In reply to that part of your letter, 4. January, directing me to enquire, "What fishery are carried on "at or about Stag Island H. H., and under what authority?" -

I have the honor to report for your information that I found on enquiring that Mr Charles Courtney (a fisherman) fished there last fall, he lives at present at Commiss, he had authority given him by Mr. S. R. Grid, Atty, and Mayor of Samia.

I did not see the man himself, but was speaking to his landlord; where he resides, who informed me, that he rented the fishery from Mr Grid; and intends to fish there again next spring for pickerel. -

I saw Mr Grid afterward, in his office at Samia, who informed me, that Stag island belongs to Mrs McLean, a widow lady, for whom it is held, as agent, and he claims exclusive right

to the fisheries. I asked to see the original patent from the Crown, but Mr. Gurn told me he had never seen it himself; several persons with whom I conversed told me the Govt. owned the fisheries, —

At Eagle Island, Crown property no person fishes. — At Walpole Island, opposite Baby point, Indian Reserve, Americans fished last fall, and without any authority; there today, and away tomorrow. — I did not go, across the river to the point where they fished. I saw the place distinctly from Baby's point. Mr. James Menton, Post Master, at Baby's point, gave me this latter information.

I have the honor to report to you in  
formation, that on visiting point Edward &c. &c.  
the other day, I found that fishing for pickerel  
commences there about the 15<sup>th</sup> day of April, and  
terminate about the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June in each  
year: This is (about 26 days) contrary to your  
orders in Council, which states "bass, pike and  
pickerel shall not be taken between the 5<sup>th</sup> of  
May, and the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June, except by angling."

I explained this to Mr. Sam' Hinchcock, one  
of the defects there, he imagined, he was acting ac-  
cording to law, and he produced the privi-  
lege of the Act, pointing out to me the authority  
under which he and not only he but all the  
fishermen from point Edward to Wolfcock  
Island were fishing by. —

I send it to you herewith, having cut it out  
of the book. —

Now it does appear to me, that the close season,  
is the only and great spring pickerel fishing time,  
at this place, and all the fishermen have enjoyed  
the privilege, without let or hindrance, ever since  
the present fisheries act, was passed, neither before  
nor any person else has up to my knowledge there  
been hunted to the fishermen, "that to catch  
pickerel, between the 5<sup>th</sup> of May, and 1<sup>st</sup>  
of June except with hook and line was ille-  
gal." —

I do think however, that to enforce the  
law as the close season, "as it now exists", on  
one side of the St. Clair river would be  
to break up the pickerel fishing altogether. —

This take of pickled extends from Point Edward, and opposite side of the St. Clair River, down as far as Walpole Island. — These fish are sold fresh in the Detroit and Cleveland market. My return of fish caught will in its proper place give you all particulars. —

I consider all the old wharfs not in use should be all removed, and no more new ones be constructed without the sanction of the department. - Several persons from Sarnia to Baby's point, claim title to the water in the river, because their land comes to the water's edge or did do so heretofore. - I may here mention that for nearly  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the way, the public high road, as I found it runs along the bank of the river. -

I strongly recommend that every facility be afforded by the department to protect the fishery in St. Clair River from all unnecessary obstruction of the kind herewith described.

I may here, be permitted to report for your information, that two years ago, in <sup>the</sup> ~~a~~ hauling ground situated in front of Mr. Macdonald of Lomira, near Babys point. - Mr. George Clarke from Detroit, rented the hauling ground for the spring pickerel fishing, for one hundred dollars a year from Mr. Macdonald. - Blacks average take per year, up to that time was about 3000, per year. - The reason for this falling off in the take for the last two years; is to be attributed to the fact, that Mr. James Montrose Esq. cleared a fishing ground in front of lot E, in the 5<sup>th</sup> Concession of Lomira, further down the river, and nearer to Babys point, than Macdonalds fishing end by which the take was cut off from Macdonalds.

The Re-Dress, who came from near Sudbury, last Spring; and fished there, paid Montrose \$25, for the privilege they enjoyed. -

I would have no difficulty in leasing all those fisheries, if empowered to do so, by you.

Pickled and Boarred Fish.

Sir,

In your letter of the 31<sup>st</sup>, utto, you say -  
"I should like to have your opinion on the desirable  
means of making any close time for pickled".

In reply, I have the honor to report for your information, that I altogether agree with the opinion expressed by the department, based as I find it is upon practical and personal experience. --

There should be no close time for pickled, haf,  
pike, mullet, sucker, sturgeon, cat fish, nor any of  
the coarse kinds of fish. -- Certain places might  
be set apart; for instance; similar to the Burlington  
Bay, and Dundas Marsh; where nets of no kind  
shall be used; except as regulated by law, or  
the department. --

I think Mr. Whiteside will remember that he and  
I discussed the question at some length, on the 16.  
and 17<sup>th</sup>, of April last, at Ottawa. --

The conclusion we then arrived at, was that  
there ought to be no close time. - How frequently  
have I stood by, at Niagara, between the 15<sup>th</sup>  
of May, and the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June when spleen-  
died pickled, hauled in by the Seine were re-  
turned again to their native element, "because  
in close season", while our neighbors at the same  
time, on the other side of the river Niagara, were  
catching them whenever they pleased. --

Except in small numbers, Niagara, is the only  
place in my district, on Lake Ontario, where pick-  
led are caught in quantities. --

G

At fort Erie, they are sometimes caught in numbers, at Turkey Head Long point, they are large and sometimes numerous. In all the rivers running into our lake; pickerel and all the others weigh kinds of fish, allowed except prevented by the mill dams, from ascending the streams. -

But it is only at this particular season of the year springtime, where the waters are high, and discoloured, that they are to be found there. --

I would not by any means have subsections 5, 6, and 7, of section No. 14, effaced from the Fishery Act. -

My motto is, let every person who catches fish in a net, pay in his quota to the department as license fee. - Then see licensed fishermen will have no cause of complaint, persons fishing under the pretense ("for their own use," which in one instance, I know was sanctioned by the department, at Walpole, Lake Erie,

I feel gratified indeed to the department for asking my opinion upon the subject, and the more recent knowledge I acquired at Laramie, respecting the habits of the pickerel, convince me, that it is not necessary that we should have any longer a close season for pickerel, - And as regards pike bap mullet, sucker &c. &c. ad infinitum, what are they!!! - The places to take them, can be always regulated by the department; and the use of nets be granted for taking them

or otherwise, at the discretion of the department. —

In my report of the 18<sup>th</sup> of January last I said  
(and I then referred to Pt Edward and the St. Rive")

"I do not think, that to allow pickerel to be  
"caught in future, as they have done the rest,  
"long years, since the present fishing acts, become  
"law, will in any manner lessen the species of  
"fish". —

I intended to imply, by this paragraph that  
we should have no close season from Pt Edward  
to Boabys point - and I now add, from Whithby  
to Long point - In fact none in the Province  
of Ontario, but what can be regulated by a  
license. —

I have therefore much pleasure in re=  
commending that the present close season for  
pike, bass and pickerel be abolished. —

respecting the Indian ("Josias") and the two saddles of venison,  
seized by me at Samia, on the 15<sup>th</sup>. of January last, for a  
contravention of the game act. - In reply I beg most  
respectfully to report all particulars then omitted now more  
fully: I did complain to Major Davis on the spot, but I  
mentioned that before proceeding against him, I would re-  
port to you; hence my letter of the 1<sup>st</sup> of January last  
asking for instructions. --

On the day referred to, I was walking up the prin-  
cipal street of Samia, when I observed a splendid Saddle  
of venison on a stand, as if exhibited for sale; on  
the side walk in front of Mr. James Kelly's store. - I  
seized this saddle, went into the store of Mr. James Kelly,  
asked him if the venison outside was for sale, his reply was,  
that it was sold, and he produced one another saddle, he  
had a few minutes before obtained from the Indian "Josias"  
for a dollar, the Indian owed him. - I gave the saddle  
I found inside the store over to Mr. Kelly telling him who  
I was, and that I held him responsible for it until I  
saw the Major, Mr. Davis, and reported the matter. -

Mr. Kelly had agreed to do this, and Mr. Samuel  
Hitchcock and I were together outside of Kelly's door  
when Josias passed into the store, and I did speak to him,  
about his breaking the game act, his reply was that he  
would break my nose for me; - Mr. Whitcomb who-  
spired to him who I was, and gave him advice, as I  
subsequently heard. - A moment afterward, the Indian  
("Josias") took the saddle of venison from the store and  
drove off as I have already stated to you, in my  
report of the 1<sup>st</sup>. January last. --

In my taking the saddle of venison I found in the street to the Mayor's office I met James Dawson Esq<sup>r</sup> J.P. a Magistrate, and Reeve of Lombard thee and he exclaimed by admitting out in words openly, that he had bought a saddle of venison that morning from the Indian Josses, not thinking for a moment, as you say, addressing me, and as he expressed himself, that the law terminated last night. -- The saddle of venison then in my possession afterwards was admitted to be big and the same, he had bought same morning from the Indian Josses. -- As the Mayor Mr. Dawson had not then yet arrived at his office, I left the venison there, until he would arrive I having other business to attend to in the mean time. --

I got thro with my other business, and in the afternoon was returning from St. Edmund, when I met the Mayor; And went into his office, and reported all the particulars herein related. --

The Mayor on hearing those particulars and it being only a fine horse after the act, did come into effect did not think it necessary to impose a fine altho' mind you, Mr. Dawson, had nothing in excuse beyond what I shall here relate to palliate his crime, and was willing to pay a fine, if the Mayor thought fit to impose one. --

"Mr. Dawson's excuse was that he acted altogether thoughtlessly in the matter, at the same time alluded to a desire, expressed by his wife, then ailing, for some venison?"

An impression, is abroad, that Indians can fish, and shoot, with impunity, that the game, nor fishing acts don't affect them in such cases the excuse given me, by Mr James Kelly at Sarnia. - An excuse to palliate his offence. - -

Under misdirection from Mr Whitcher, I am empowered to act as in this case at all times even out of my own District, as Sarnia was. -

I never shut my eyes on anything contrary to law in the discharge of my duty. - But as this is a case of two deer saddle of venison in which an Indian Gosse, by name Jules Co-spicuously and having the care of another deer below my eyes and to which my attention was again only recently before drawn, I considered it my duty as I have been invited (by Mr Whitcher) to ask for instruction, which I have done in the latter part of my letter of the 14<sup>th</sup>, January last. -

The applicants, are responsible men, own property on the marsh, are old trappers, have trapped here for years past, and now when they find other trappers coming from a far distance, who kill off the kitties, have applied to me to rent the marsh for a term of years.

In making this application, I am only influenced by one motive, that of having our mink and muskrat preserved for a beneficial purpose. — Lately mink skins sell for  $\$4$  each, muskrat  $3\frac{1}{2}$  of a piece. — They occupy a place of trade, in the business community of our Dominion. — — —

Like our game, are being killed off, and if not nurtured and preserved, will be all exterminated in a few years. — — — Forsyth, and Morrison intend to do this, they will trap none for a couple of years, they will let the animal increase. — — —

If you sanction this application, I will arrange the matter to your satisfaction, and for the benefit of the department, and the community at large.

At present the marsh to lease would not be worth much, to use a common phrase, it is nearly trapped out, but in a couple of years, the lessee could afford to pay 50 or 60 dollars a year, for this privileged lease; (after two years.)



The Rejoining Canal, from Burlington Height to Dundas runs through this marsh; and the Canal together with the Dundas river, and a few shallow ponds of water interspersed therethrough is all the Water (open) worth alluding to, it is a sedgy, ~~and~~ <sup>and</sup> grassy, floating bog marsh. —

Mr Whitcher will know something about it; In early winter after shooting down it is good. —

In taking up my annual return of fish caught for the year past, at Niagara, I found the gill net fishermen there, stood on their dignity, and would not give me any return of the fish they caught in American waters. - They have their nets, boat &c. on our grounds, they land their fish, and sell them in our domain, and refused to give me a return of them, after assured by me, that the fish would be returned as the case really was!. - Something might be introduced into the new bill to meet cases of this description. - Mr Pat Hand, an old fisherman has repeatedly assured me, the white fish, were always caught in Canadian waters. -

Now, I have been thinking over this matter for some time, and I really believe, that in future gill net fishermen at Niagara (even in American waters) should not be allowed to commence fishing at Niagara, until seine fishing terminate there. -

My belief is, that gill net fishing for white fish damaged the seine fishing there last season. -

The seine fishermen complained to this effect; four of them pay me thirty dollars each, per year; and they deserve, as well as deserve some attention on my part. -

I am come to this conclusion from my own personal observation as well. - For instance except in one particular place, white fish hug the shore at night, while they are out in deep water in day time. - This one particular place is the

Thomas Elliott fishery, a projecting point in  
deep water, and where the white fish are caught  
in the day time .--

I shall at all events under your sanction,  
and ap[proval], only allow a limited number  
to fish white fish gill net this season at  
Niagara; none only but those who are re-  
sident there; and I do indeed believe that  
not one of them, not even those who reside  
at Niagara, should be allowed to white fish  
gill nets until the fishing terminates. --

Please accept the foregoing as my view  
at the same time every thing is submitted  
for your decision.

The simple fact, of the case was this; and you will find my diary corroborate this fact; from the 11<sup>th</sup> to 14 of November last, I was at Lake Erie, travelled 240 miles, and done my business. — where my authority was set at open defiance, by some of the Fisherman, I was threatened, and ~~abusive~~ language heaped on to me by ~~wretched~~, thoughtless persons, fishermen there. — I made up my mind there, and so I told them, that I would return again, when least expected, and put the law in force against them. —

From the 14, to the 24, of November, I was constantly employed, see my diary, and ~~having~~ being determined to put the law in force agt<sup>s</sup> all delinquent, I started to Lake Erie again on the morning of the 24<sup>th</sup> of November, and it was only about 9 o'clock am on that morning, after being out the whole day and night before previous, that I went to the ~~line~~ of ~~line~~ <sup>"</sup> Erie, and got one hundred copies of the different ~~journ~~, alluded to, taking with me as many copies of such as I required! — —

This was the first occasion during my service  
as an Officer, that I went to the expense and  
outlay of getting forms of the descriptions referred  
to. — The nature of the duty, and the offenses, re-  
quired promptness and energy on my part, and I  
find I travelled 158 miles in four days, and had 15  
persons summoned up for Contravention of the Act  
and I used the forms remarked upon, and have  
abundance of them on hand, to last me for a long  
time to come. —

I am very sorry, I did not apply to the  
Department, even ready to assist me, instead of  
getting them printed here, but as I never had oc-  
casion to use forms of the description before, I  
hope under all the circumstances of this case  
I am not so much to blame.

I have the honor to report for your information that on visiting Port Erie, fishery on yesterday, I found several persons with landing nets, catching the small fry of fishes, in the Niagara river, to use as bait on set lines to catch pickerel. - You made reference to fish of this description, in your letter of the 16<sup>th</sup> of December last, and to this I replied on the 1<sup>st</sup> of January last; You replied again to my letter on the 16<sup>th</sup> of January. - - -

I now find by personal observation on the spot, that large quantities of the fry of fishes. - are taken daily, at this season of the year, in the manner, I have just described, half a dozen of them are placed on each hook, so diminutive are they. - A number of persons are engaged at present time, in the description of line and hook fishing. I saw a water pail full of the small fry bait, in the possession of Mr. Chetles & Harris, our licensed fishermen at Port Erie. Mr. Harris calls them minnows, but I differ with him; they are most undoubtedly, the small fry of large fish. - The river at Port Erie, is literally swarming alive with them, and they are dipped out with the landing nets. - -

Last summer I made complaint against the night line, and set hook fishing carried on in Lake Erie, above Port Erie, and at long, went because the licensed fishermen complained of those persons spoiling their markets. - - -

Catching fish with set lines and hooks, a thing heretofore, was extensively practised before gill fishing became the order of the day. --

When this fishing is carried on, near Fort Erie the water is too rapid for nets. The Americans set their long night lines on our side also. And it was only in the early part of this week, that three of them, while so engaged were drowned, and their bodies have not yet been found. --

This description of fishing is extensively or to some extent, carried on at Port Union, Niagara, Fort Erie and Long Point. --

There is no provision made in the Act to control it. . . . All the persons fishing at Fort Erie, are unlicensed fishermen except Mr Charles A. Harris. --

Mr Charles Hebble, the Reeve of Fort Erie a short time since, fined an American, seven dollars and costs; for catching the fry bait on our side of the Niagara. --

I have the honor to receive your letter of the 21<sup>st</sup> inst. about a petition, numerously signed in behalf of Mrs Joan Baldry, of Burlington Beach. - Only your letter concludes with the following sentence: "This matter is referred to you for report"; - I would deny the supposed allegation, and then, through you call upon the petitioners to prove their statements; and if I did, what a mess they would be all in!! . -

The petition, I was informed by the <sup>For the</sup> H. B. Bull, was got up in the City of Hamilton, nine miles from Mrs Joan Baldry's residence; and by Magnus Bruce, a tailor. . . . Mr Bruce, by mis-statement, and false representation, induced every one he could prevail upon, "the unware", to sign this petition. . . . One ~~wise~~ motive, he had in view, was self. . . . Yours! - It appears, that about five years ago, Mrs Joan Baldry, was taken ill, and on the point of death, as she supposed, made her will, leaving Magnus Bruce (of 1600) she had then; in the Bank, & beside the public house, furnished; and now referred to. - Mr Bruce is no relative of Mrs Joan Baldry, merely a visitor occasionally on Sundays. -

After I was first appointed, overseer of the Bruce, made overtures to me, if I would take James Waddell away; and this break lot of land, referred to, from him Waddell and leave them to Mrs Joan Baldry; of course I spurned his improper overture! - - -

But setting all they aside, I will now present to you the facts, as they are. —

It is a fact, that Mrs. Joan Baldry, has paid all the rents due for land on the beach. nephew, and Richard Cooch, a friend of hers,  
fined for fishing on a Sunday, with her net, and on  
her fishing ground, and with her connivance. --

And her man Alley, McPherson, I had him


