





CULTURE.—Mushrooms may be grown in any place where the conditions of temperature and moisture are favorable. The most essential factor, perhaps, is that of temperature. The proper temperature ranges from 53 degrees to 60 degrees F., with the best from 55 to 58 degrees F. It is unsafe to attempt to grow mushrooms at a temperature much less than 50 degrees or greater than 63 degrees F. Any severe changes of temperature retard growth or else act injuriously. Fresh manure should be obtained and this should include the litter used for bedding the animals. It is a great mistake to use manure free from straw, Again stable manure which has been well trampled is nearly always well preserved, and is frequently much richer than any other kind.

After the beds are prepared the temperature should be and usually will be, too high for spawning. After a sudden rise the temperature should gradually fall during the course of a week or more to ahout 70 degrees or 75 degrees F. At this temperature spawning may take place, but under absolutely no circumstances should a bed be spawned at a temperature greater than 80 degrees F. The bricks are broken into pieces about two inches square, or into from ten to twelve pieces per brick. These pieces are inserted from one to two inches below the surface, about ten inches to one foot apart, and the bed is then compressed into final shape. Under the most favorable circumstances it is unnecessary and undesirable to water the beds for several weeks after spawning. If they dry out rapidly and some water is necessary, it should be given as a surface spraying, for water in quantity applied to young spawn will almost invariably cause the latter to damp off.

Sow about four pounds of seed per acre, in drills a foot apart, and a quarter of an inch deep. If a seed-drill is used, it should be provided with a good roller to press the earth firmly upon the seed, particularly if the soil is very dry. Sow as early as possible. A few days' delay often makes a marked difference in the crop. Unless the plants stand very thick together, they need not be thinned out much, if any, as Onlons will crowd each other and find room to grow. Never allow the weeds to get ahead of the young plants. The weeds must receive early attention. Use a scuffle or wheel-hoe between the rows and pull out the weeds not reached by the hoe. When the tops are all down, and the Onions well formed, they may be pulled, and left on the ground for a fortnight or longer to dry (unless the weather be unfavorable), turning them occasionally with a wooden rake.





Any good soil will suit Rhubarb; but to obtain heavy crops, good soil well manured is indispensable. A piece of root with a single bud, or eye, is enough for each hill. Cultivate during Summer, but do not pull any stalks the first year. Late in Autumn cover each plant with a good shovelful of manure, and plough a furrow against each side of the rows; this protection will assist the earliness of the crop. In early Spring level the ground, working in the manure with a fork. Plants can be obtained from seed, which may be sown in a hotbed in March, and the plants set out about the middle of May. It takes longer, however, to obtain a crop from seedling plants than from roots. than from roots.



ALFALFA (Medicago sativa). Alfalfa is the mainstay of the eattle farmer, particularly of the dairyman. It is grown successfully in almost every section of the United States and Canada. Alfalfa requires a deep, fertile, well-drained soil, rich in lime and free from weeds. The lack of any one of these may be the cause of failure, especially in the Southern or Eastern States. Well-rotted barnyard mannre is a snitable fertilizer. Do not use fresh manure as it produces too many weeds. The young plants of Alfalfa are very tender and if weeds are plentiful they will kill out the Alfalfa. In sowing Alfalfa special care should be taken in preparing the soil. Land should be ploughed deep, harrowed and brushed and allowed to settle for some time before sowing. In the South and East Alfalfa succeeds best if planted in late Summer, and should be sown as far in advance of what promises to be the most trying time for seedlings. CULTURE.—The tubers may be started in February or March. The soil should be light, containing plenty of leaf mould and sand. In planting, care should be taken to set the crown of the tuber, which is usually somewhat depressed, upward. The tubers should be covered half an inch with light soil and watered sparingly until they start, after which more water may be given. The temperature should be 60 to 70 degrees. The started plants, when intended for beddling purposes, may be transferred to the beds in the open ground early in June, by which time they should be in bloom. The plants should be set ten or twelve inches apart.

When mass effect is desired, bulbs should be planted from six to eight inches apart and four inches deep; this applies to planting in beds, borders and among shrubbery. Including in our catalogue a complete list of Dahlias, it may be helpful to mention a few general hints and ideas for the Purchase, Planting, Care, Digging of the Tubers, and the delivery of Dahlias. If these directions are followed in general, we do not hesitate to say that everyone should have reasonably satisfactory results, which will be pleasing to the grower as well as to ourselves.

The Dahlia deserves a place in every garden, much more so than they did twenty years ago; with the new varieties added each season and the extraordinary array of colors which they possess, the time must come when every lover of flowers will always have a few, if not large tracts, of these beautiful Summer and Fall flowers, which thrive all over the United States, and are grown with such little care, for the wealth of bloom which they produce.



The Ideal Pot-Root

Size of the Bulbs. The size of the tuber does not in any way designate the size or quality of the flower. Some of the largest tubers only produce the more common colors; the older varieties are represented often in this way.

Medium and small-sized bulbs more often produce the finest and highest colored flowers, and in many cases the best and most effective plants.

The only requisite of a Dahlia bulb is, be sure that it will produce one, two or three eyes, whether large or small, and with proper cultivation success is generally assured.

Note.—Many of our bulbs are pot grown, and should flowers be desired early—pot-grown roots started in March and grown along indoors or in frames will flower earlier than those made from cuttings.

Exhibitors should consider this point before purchasing.

Buying of the Bulbs. The buying of the bulbs is a very important part in the results that are anticipated, when planting time comes upon us. The first thought should be where to purchase, and we may say that we feel that we can meet the demands of the most critical. Our collection is now the finest in America. The varieties are strictly up-to-date, and the quality of our stock is not surpassed in this country or abroad. Our supply of new and recent introductions, especially those for 1915, is limited, and we advise the purchasing of these at once, while such varieties are procurable.

Soil and Fertilizers. The soil best suited for the Dahlia is a medium light, loamy, and well drained; it should be ploughed or dug over in the Fall and stable manure added at that time to allow decomposition during the Winter, then another thorough working over in the Spring, allowing it to mellow before planting is begun.

Fertilizers should not be added until the plants have made a good growth, or rather better to be used about the time the first buds appear, which will enable the plant to better perfect its bloom.

The Dahlia is not as particular as most of our Summer flowers, and will succeed under a great many adverse conditions. There are, however, ecrtain locations where Dahlias seem to outdo themselves.

An open, sunny location seems to favor them at all times. Care should always be taken to protect them from heavy winds, as their tops are generally heavy and brittle, and have a tendency to snap off, if not protected by a windbreak or

heavy stakes, to which they should be firmly tied.

We also note that Dahlias are particularly adapted for seashore use, and not only do well, but thrive, for the reason

of the moisture and heavy dews which collect during the nights.

Dahlias should not be planted in low places unless well drained, for should they unfortunately receive a number of days' steady rains the tendency is that the tubers may decay and naturally cause the loss of the plants. Having suffered a severe loss on this account some time ago, we think it advisable to warn others that they may avoid these unforcescen happenings.

Time of Planting.

The time for planting good deal, according to the locality, whether sheltered or open, early or lateness of the season, and the time when the general crop is desired.

In New England the tubers may be set out as early as May 1st in some sections and from then until the middle of June or first of July.

Some of our best blooms have been grown from tubers planted out about June 20, obtaining the choicest flow-

ers during the latter part of September.

Dahlias should be planted from 2½ to 3 feet apart and covered to a depth of four inches.

Division of the Tubers. The division of the tubers must not be fore planting time. Care must be observed in the dissection of these, whereby a small piece of the crown or old stalk must be left with each tuber, to enable the eyes to sprout, as most of the eyes are on this crown, and very rarely on the tubers themselves. See illustration.



Care of the Plants. Should the tubers be planted early, care must be taken after they appear above ground that some of our late frosts, which sometimes come during the latter part of May, do not nip the tender shoot which is just showing itself above ground; this may be easily taken care of by spreading newspapers over them loosely, with a stone or handful of dirt on each corner to keep the papers from blowing off during the night. Care should also be taken at this time for the prevention of cut-worms in destroying the young shoots, and we recommend the use of Aphol, Cut-Worm Food or Tobacco Dust as the best preventive for this pest.

As soon as the plants attain a height of eight or ten inches, stakes should be used at once to prevent the brittle stalks As soon as the plants attain a neight of eight of ten inches, stakes should be used at once to prevent the brittle stakes from getting broken; good, heavy stakes are the best to use, and about five fect in length above ground; extra stakes may be added should too many branches be allowed to grow.

While the plants are about a foot high an occasional spraying of Nico-Fume Liquid, Nicoticide, Tobakine, or any first-class solution of Nikoteen, will kill and keep away the Aphis or Green Fly, which so often infests Dahlius.

To obtain the largest and most perfect flowers only the best and largest buds must be allowed to mature, the others

taken off, enabling the full strength to develop these into exhibition blooms.

It is probably useless to mention that weeds should at all times be kept out, and the hoeing up of the hills adds greatly, should the bulbs have any tendency to push themselves toward the surface, or should we unfortunately have a long spell of dry weather.

Exhibition Flowers. To produce the lines flowers for exhibition purposes, not over five branches should be allowed to remain on each plant, and when the flower buds appear there, only one bud should be allowed to come to maturity, enabling each branch to produce one excep-tionally fine, perfect flower. The flowers for quality must not be allowed to receive drenching rains when near full bloom, and should in some way be protected from such. It is always advisable to cut the flowers that are to be exhibited, as late as possible the night before using, placing them in water, and keeping them as cool as possible over night, thereby enabling them to withstand handling, packing and transportation. This feature is quite important.

Digging the Bulbs. Dahlia bulbs to be in the best condition for Winter storing should not be taken out of the ground until after the tops have been killed by frost, which will allow all the strength of the stalks to recede back into the bulbs and swell them, preparatory to storing for their dormant season.

After digging, spread the clumps out to dry, then pack them in dry soil or sand, and keep in a cool place, but do not allow them to freeze.

These ought to be looked at every few weeks after the middle of January, and if they have any appearance of drying or shriveling, those affected may be taken out and kept in a slightly moist place, or moistcned in some way until time for planting.

The latter can be artificially met by using evergreen boughs as a Winter covering. The best soil for Rhododendrons consists of sods, well rotted manure, sand and a large amount of leafmold, well mixed for retaining moisture to protect from Summer droughts. Heavy mulching or covering of beds in Summer is an excellent preventive, and in dry weather the beds must be thoroughly soaked. Pinch off all seed pods after flowering, in order to get good buds for next season. In the Fall, mulch the beds a foot or more with leaves, and if these can be left to decay, it is advisable to do so.

Rhododendron maximum (Great Bay). July, This is the noblest of all our native shrubs, and is absolutely hardy from Vermont to Georgia. It has the most beautiful foliage of any kind of Rhododendron, it being about twice as large as that of other sorts, and very thick and smooth. Forms a round, broad bush from 6 to 15 feet tall. 






