## How and When to Plant

Bulbs for lall manting may be set out during September, October and November, or montil the ground is frozen.


In the aceompanying diagram are given the approximate depth and distance apart that the bulbs should be planted.
Trees and Shrubs $A$ very prominent fenTrees, shrubs and Small liruits, is having themphanted during the Sutumn. The best time for planting Evergreens is September, that being the month when they are dormant, and satisfactory results olstained. Most of the varieties of Decikluons Trees may be moved or tramplanted during October and November, after a hard frost and when the foliage has nearly all fallen. l'ruit trees and hard-wooded Ginall liruits may be treated in the same manner as the deciduons trees, excepting the l'each, which should only be transplanted in the Spring months.

## Outdoor Culture

Prepare the beds or borters where they are to be planted with well-rotted manure, having it well duge over to a depth of at least 12 inches, being well assured that the soil is well dramed to awoid any decay of the bullos. Plant the bulbs at least 5 inchers derp and 6 apart. As soon as the ground begins to freeze cower the beds with a litter of leaves, straw or pine boughs to a thickness of 6 or $\$$ inchers. This covering shoukd be removed as eaty as possible after all danger from severe colf wather is past.

## Culture in Pots

When potting Hyacinths for growing intoors a medium light, well-enriched soil is best suited, placing some broken crock in the botton for drainage. Set the buths about $1 / 2$ inch below surface of soil, giving them it thorough watering, and puit them away in a dark, eold place, so that they will not freeze; water them as often as newl be to avoid drying. They should be atlowed to remain for at least 12 weeks, or until the pot is woll filled with roots, when they may be removed to a warmer location, but still kept dark until a growth of 4 to 5 inches is mate, then bring to the light grathally until allowed to flower.

When a repetition of hoom is required, bring out one or more pots every week or ten dias from plate where allowed to root.

## Culture in Glasses

To grow Hyacinths in glasses of water the trpe illustrated should be used. The largest size bulbs should be selected, as they produce better results, are more rigid in the glasses and will support the topheary bloom. When the bulb is plaeed in the top of the glass, fill up with water so that the bottom of the bulb is about $1 / 1$ inch below level of water. Change the water every three or four days. A litile broken chareoal put in the water will help to kerep it fresh and sweed. The same gencrat directions apply for growing in water ats noter in "Gulture in Pots." We recemmand the Whatbition size butbs for growing in glasses.

Pinch off all sead pods after flowering, in order to get good buds for next season. In the Fall, mulch the beds a foot or more with leaves, and if these ean be left to decay, it is advisable to do so.
