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
MAINE GROWN SEED POTATOES.

We give some details of our construction which combines every essential feature in all other elevator diggers, and these are supplemented by other vital features.

1st. Our elevator bottom is a huge fork hinged at lower end and agitated its whole length, and will run clean in the most adverse conditions.

2nd. This huge fork is supplemented by a rear fork which has more efficiency for separating than some elevators have in their whole mechanism. It is supported centrally, and agitated by a crank axle at its head, which gives a combined horizontal and vertical motion. The speed and vertical motion are adjustable, and being supported centrally it takes very little power to run it.



3rd. The single wheel truck is ten inches wide and runs the vines and weeds down from the machine. favorable for entering the elevator, and it sustains more uniform depth than a two wheel truck, where fields are washed. Before we had our digger home from the station and set up ready for work one of our farmers came to us and wanted us to dig his potatoes which we did more to accommodate than anything else as we were too busy with our own work to go out digging for other people and while digging his potatoes people passing by would stop and come into the field and were so well pleased with the work it did that they wanted us to dig their potatoes, which we refused to do at first, but requests came so fast and urgent that we finally set the digger at work digging for others at four dollars per acre and soon had our digger paid for and today the machine stands in our barn practically as good as new and has paid for itself more than twice over in one season. Netting a big percentage on our money, and what it has done for us we see no reason why it will not do for others.

If you have a piece of early potatoes that you wish to rush to market it is a great help. Often a few days' delay makes a great difference in price.
