## Asparagus

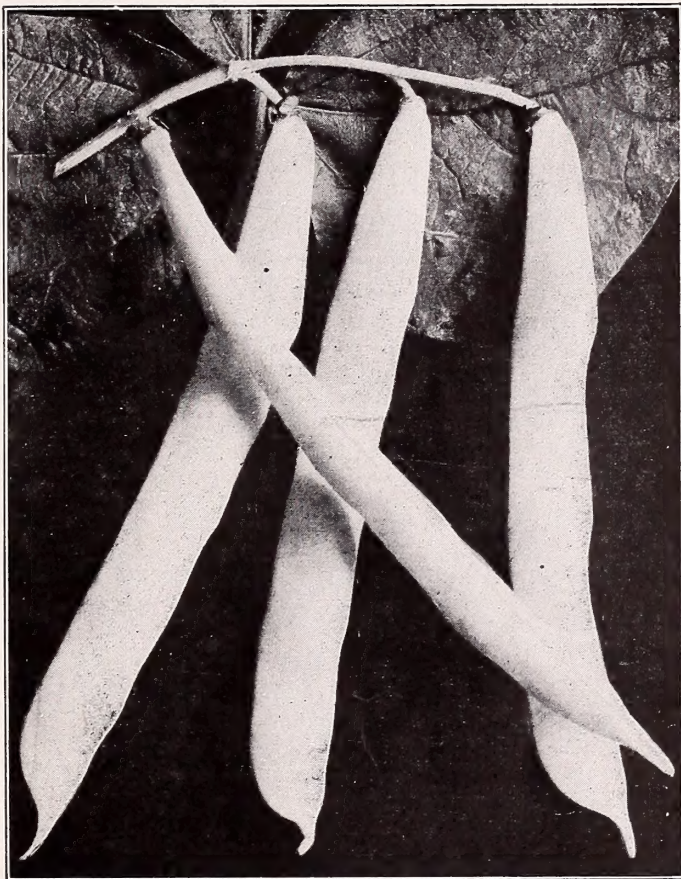
**CULTURE**—Sow seed thinly in drills one foot apart early in the spring or fall after soaking seed in warm water for an hour. Use a rich, well worked light soil and when well up, thin plants to one inch apart and cultivate often until the plants are a year old.

Transplant or set out the roots in permanent bed, using the richest soil you have, thoroughly prepared and worked very deep. Set roots 4 inches deep and 18 inches apart in rows 4 to 6 feet apart. Cultivate frequently until plants meet in the rows. Use a plenty of stable manure or other fertilizer on bed before and after setting out roots, mixing well into soil.

**PALMETTO**—A very early maturing and prolific variety, producing an abundance of very large, deep green shoots of the best quality. Seed—Oz., 15c; ¼ lb., 30c; lb., \$1.00.

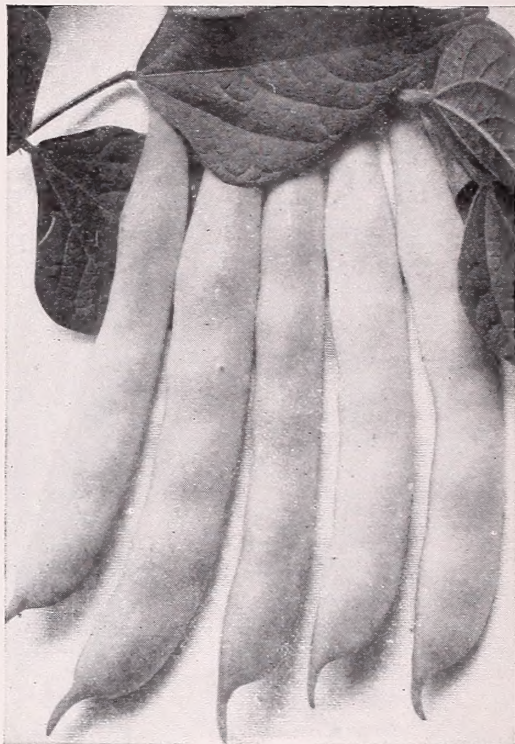

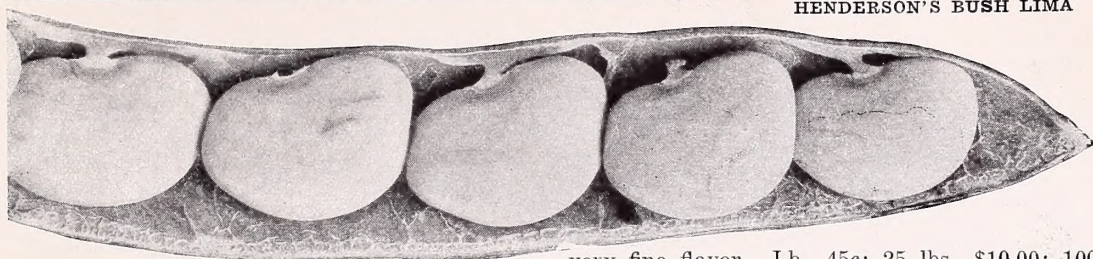

## BEETS--Table Variety

The best results are obtained on a deep, rich, sandy loam. If wanted very early, sow such sorts as Crosby's Egyptian and Detroit Dark Red in hotbeds and transplant, cutting off the outer leaves. For general crop sow in freshly prepared soil as soon as the ground will permit, in rows eighteen inches apart, covering about an inch deep and pressing the soil firmly over the seed. When the plants are well established thin four to six inches apart in the row.

For winter use the turnip varieties may be sown in June or July so as to mature late in the season. The roots are stored in a cellar and covered with sand to prevent wilting, or they may be kept outdoors in pits such as are used for apples and potatoes.

**EXTRA EARLY EGYPTIAN**—The earliest beet. Flat root, on ground. Flesh, dark purplish red, zoned a lighter shade. Oz., 10c; ¼ lb., 25c; lb., 75c.

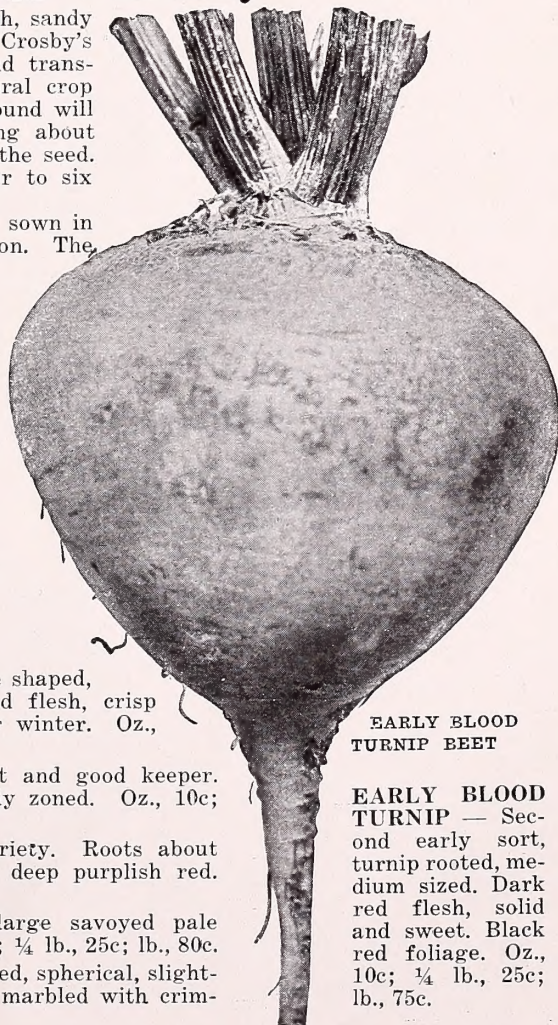

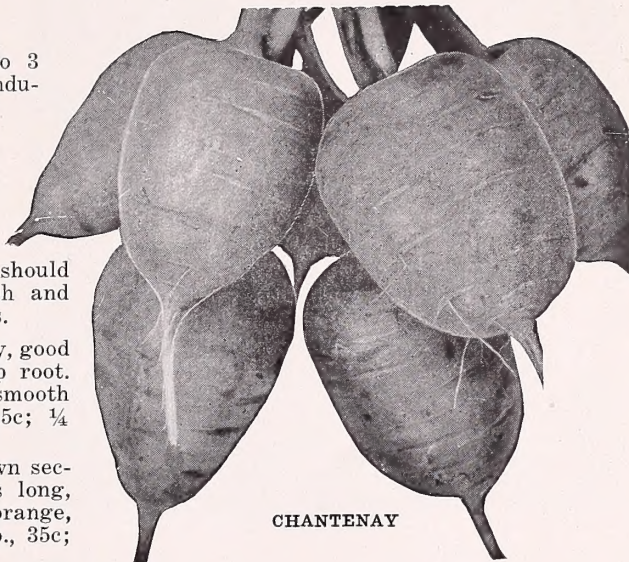
## CARROTS

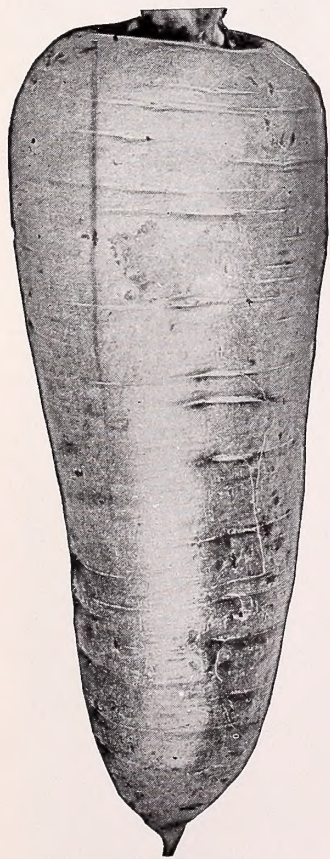

## CHICORY

**LARGE-ROOTED LONG SMOOTH (Magdeburg)**—Sow Chicory seed as early in the spring as the ground can be worked, in drills half an inch deep and fifteen inches apart, and in mellow soil. The after-culture is the same as for Carrots. In the autumn the plants will be ready for blanching, when it is used as a salad. The dried roots are used as a substitute for and adulterant of coffee. **WITLOOF CHICORY or FRENCH ENDIVE**—A delicious vegetable, very easily grown. The tender white stalks which are used for eating are grown from roots which can be raised from seed sown early in June, in drills. In November the roots are dug and the tops cut off, leaving about one and a half inches of the leaf stalks. These roots are then planted out of doors for use the following spring, or they can be forced in boxes inside. In either case the roots are set in sand or soil in upright positions with tops about six inches below the surface. For indoor growing the boxes can be set in the cellar or other cool place. 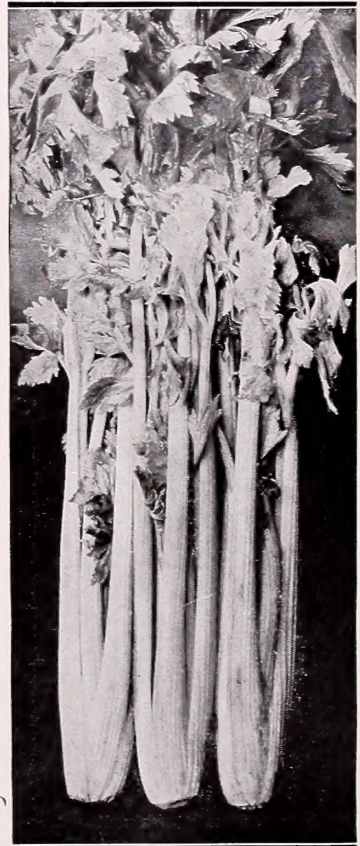

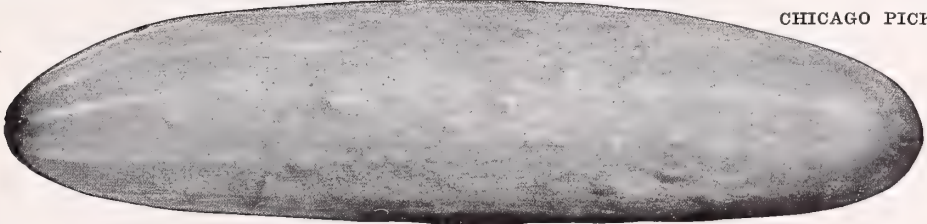

# CUCUMBERS

In field culture, plow furrows four feet apart and similar ones at right angles to the first. At each intersection drop a shovelful or more of well-rotted manure which should be well mixed with the soil. Many growers omit every sixth or eighth row, thus forming paths for the distribution of manure and gathering the fruit.

In order to obtain the largest yield of cucumbers, the soil should be well enriched with well-rotted manure, but an abundance of good fruit can be raised on any rich garden soil. Plant the seed not over an inch deep in hills four to six feet apart each way, dropping fifteen to twenty seeds in a hill. After the plants begin to crowd and danger from the striped beetle is pretty well over, thin to three plants to the hill. Give frequent but shallow cultivation until the plants make runners so long that this is impracticable.

# ONIONS

**Culture**—Onion seed should be sown as early in the spring as possible to get the ground in shape, even though the weather is cold. Thorough preparation of the soil is one of the most essential points in successful Onion-growing. Onions delight in a rich, deep, sandy loam, but excellent yields can be obtained from heavier soils properly fertilized. Sow the seed in drills 12 to 14 inches apart and about  $\frac{1}{4}$  to  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch deep. After they are well started, or about 3 to 4 inches high, thin out to stand 2 to 4 inches apart, keeping them well hoed and free from weeds at all times.

Onion seed may be sown as soon as the ground can be prepared. If extra large onions are desired in northern latitudes, seed may be sown in hot-beds or indoor boxes. It is best to transplant them into paper pots and allow their roots to become well established before setting them in the garden. By this method such varieties as Prizetaker can be grown to extraordinary size. Amateurs can thus produce in their own gardens in the short northern season, bulbs much larger than the so-called Spanish onions grown in the South and of the same mild flavor. It should be attempted only where the soil is favorable and irrigation possible. If onion seeds are sown in the open at the same time onion sets are put in the ground, the home garden may enjoy young onions from seed in mid-summer, thinning out the rows for this purpose. If it is desired to mature onions for winter use and storage, one of the standard globe varieties should be chosen as they are the best keepers.

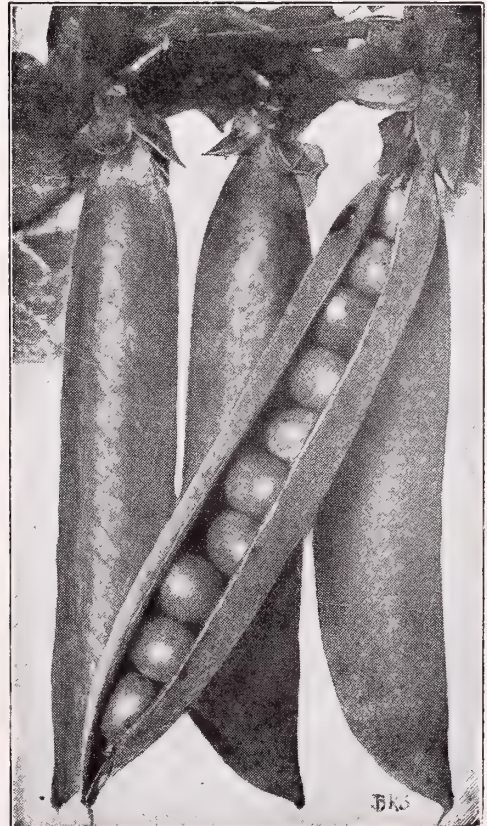

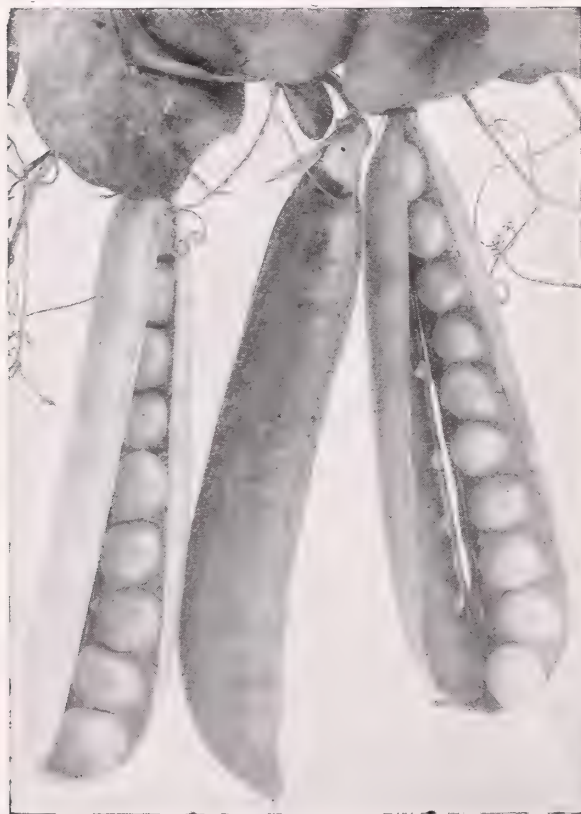
### FIELD SORTS

Peas are a cool-weather crop. They should be sown when the ground is ready to work, without delay. The smooth seeded sorts will stand cold and freezing weather without rotting in the ground, but they are not so tender or sweet on the table as the wrinkled kinds, which are more risky in the wet soil but still worth taking a chance to get early. Dwarf peas are best suited for the garden where space is scarce. They are early and bear well. It is important to have rich soil, somewhat light and to give plenty of water if a full crop is to be produced. It will put to use a balanced commercial fertilizer in the row when the seeds are sown. Do not crowd the seed. It is better to sow in single rows, with two inches between each seed, or in double rows, the rows six inches apart, and seeds two inches apart. Closer sowing will produce no greater crop. Peas must be cultivated faithfully and when the first crop is finished, they should be pulled up for they will bear no more.

## PEPPERS

Peppers should be started in a hotbed or cold-frame and transplanted about the end of May into a sunny corner of the garden, in rows about two feet apart, with the plants about the same distance between them in the rows. Can also be sown in open ground in a prepared bed when all danger from frost has passed and the weather has become settled and the soil warm. When the little plants are about three inches in height, transplant as above into the rows where they are to remain. Some rich fertilizer stirred into the soil when the plants are about 6 inches high will be found very beneficial to the crop. The peppers intended for mangoes should not be grown near the hot varieties as they will partake of their fiery nature. One ounce of seed will produce about 1,000 plants.

## Parsnips

Parsnips remain in the ground all winter, without protection, and can be dug for use as required until they begin to run to seed in the spring. 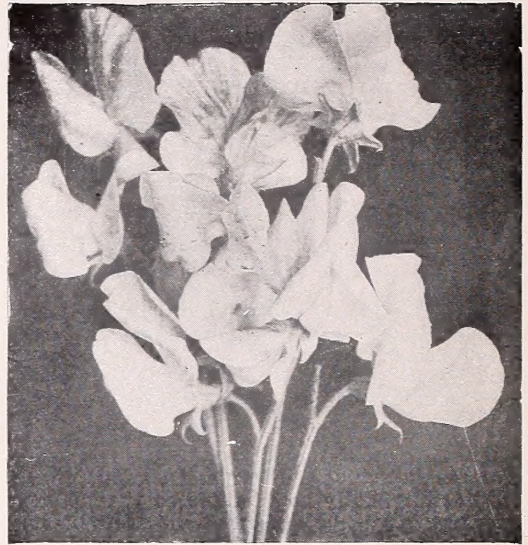

When the plants are about 5 inches high it is desirable to furnish some support for the vines to run upon, preferably a wire netting firmly supported by stakes to prevent sagging, but strings or brush are often used with satisfactory results.
