OCEAN EXPOSURE.

Our Nurseries, Greenhouses and Office are at Rumson, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from SEABRIGHT, and $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from RED BANK. Parties wishing to visit our Establishment should go to Seabright, via New Jersey Southern Railroad, (Pier 8, N. R. foot of Rector St., N. Y., foot of Market St., Philadelphia,) or to Red Bank, via New York and Long Branch Division of Central Railroad of New Jersey, (foot of Liberty St. N. R., N. Y.). Stages that pass our office, meet all the trains at Seabright.

INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS.

The publication of this LIST abrogates previous quotations. It is intended for DEALERS, NURSERYMEN, FLORISTS AND PLANTERS IN QUANTITY.

ORDERS.

These should be written distinctly and separate from the rest of the letter, being particular always to mention height and size, as given in this list, and whether dwarf or standard trees are wanted. They should *never* be mixed up in the body of the letter, and *as brief as possible to be explicit*. The name and address should be given in full and very distinctly—particularly the name—with every order or letter. Countermands to orders are always optional with us, and no countermand is final without our written consent.

SHIPPING.

Owing to our proximity to New York City our shipping facilities are great, enabling us to ship goods to all distant points at low rates. This is especially the case to all points accessible by vessel. All goods delivered to Wharf or Depot free of charge. Purchasers will confer a favor by giving *plain and explicit* instructions for MARKING AND SHIPPING PACKAGES; naming the route by which they are to be sent. When the same is left to us we forward to the best of our judgment, but when the goods are delivered to the forwarders our control ceases, and therefore our responsibility. Should any loss or delay occur, claim on the forwarders only should be made, and at once.

TIME OF PACKING.

In the Autumn we usually commence packing about the 1st of October: in the Spring from the 1st to 10th of March. Grape Vines, Currants, Raspberries, Seedlings, etc., we store in cellars, and can generally ship at any time, except in extremely cold weather.

CONDITIONS OF SALE.

TERMS—Five per cent. off for cash with order or before shipment of goods, on all orders amounting to \$25.00. Less than \$25.00 invariably net cash. Bills due thirty days after date of invoice, from which time they are subject to interest. Orders from unknown parties will be sent C. O. D. It is desired that a remittance accompany all C. O. D. orders.

PACKING—All packing is done with the utmost care, for which a charge is made, merely to cover cost of material and time. All articles in Greenhouse Department packed free of charge.

RATES—The prices affixed are for the quantities specified; following the custom of furnishing 5 at 10 rates, 50 at 100 rates and 500 at 1000 rates. An exception, however, is made with dealers packing with us, whose orders amount to \$250.00 and upwards. These are supplied with all articles at the *lowest rates named*.

VARIETIES—The selection of varieties we reserve, but adhere to the wishes of purchasers as closely as the position of our stock will admit. When substitution cannot be made it must be so stated in the order.

CLAIMS—All claims must be made within fifteen days after receipt of goods, when they will be promptly and cheerfully examined. Those who are dilatory in making claims may expect the same discouragement that they give.

Although ripening under decidedly unfavorable circumstances it showed no signs of rotting on the tree. The few specimens that were allowed to mature were fine flavored, but somewhat inclined to cling at the pit. This may not be the case, however, with older trees. In regard to this peach Chas. Downing says—"It is very handsome, the flavor rich and good, flesh thick and firm. Will carry well long distances." While A. M. Purdy gives it as his opinion that it is the greatest acquisition in the peach line ever introduced.

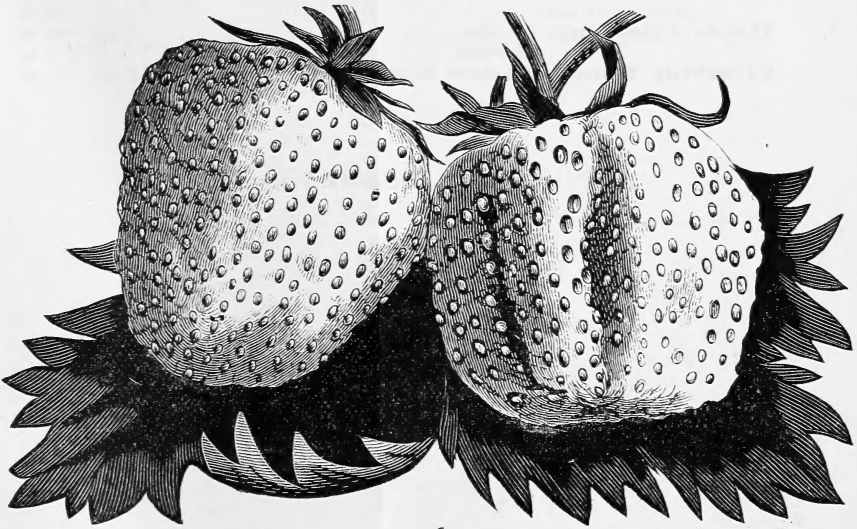
