Thanking our friends and patrons for their liberal support in the past and soliciting their further favors, we are pleased to be able to announce that our stock is larger, and better assorted than ever before; and will be graded up to our usual very high standard. We will not be undersold by any firm offering equally as good stock as ours, but hope that we shall not be asked to make our prices even with those having but inferior stock to offer.

We invite all intending to buy grape vines, to **correspond with us** and send for samples, which we will send at hundred rates by express, or by mail if three cents is added for every one year vine and five cents for every two year vine, to cover postage. All orders intrusted to us will receive such **Prompt and Liberal Treatment** as to merit further favors. We ask that you give us a trial, and we will show you that we can make it an object for you to deal with us.

Our vines are guaranteed to be healthy, pure, true to name and of quality represented. Should any mixtures occur we will cheerfully return the money paid for them or else replace them with such as are true, as the buyer may elect, but are not liable for damages other than herein named.

All packing is done in the best manner with moss, and as lightly as is consistent with entire safety, for which no charge is made, except for packing trees.

Our grape vines and part of the small fruits will be stored during the winter in cellars especially built for the purpose, and can be safely shipped by mail or express any time, and by freight whenever the weather permits.

Claims for errors, if any, must be made within five days of receipt of goods.

Free delivery to Freight, Express or Post-office, after which our control and responsibility ceases.

Unless instructed to the contrary we reserve the right to fill orders for one year vines, with vines two years old of same size and price.

Being located within three miles of Dunkirk, which is the junction of numerous railroads, we have **unusual facilities for direct shipping** to all parts of the country. Shipping directions should accompany all orders. When none are given we exercise our best judgment but assume no responsibility.

Our residence, with office and cellar, is located on Berry street, within one-half mile of terminus of street railway connecting this place with Dunkirk, where we shall be pleased to see all of the trade visiting Fredonia.

Digging and packing commences the first week in October.

TERMS CASH.—\$5 worth or more sent C. O. D., if desired, provided one-quarter of the amount accompanies the order. Bankable notes for 30 or 60 days, will be accepted from purchasers furnishing satisfactory bank references. From parties ordering vines this Fall for Spring trade (not to be shipped before Nov. 1st) we will accept note at bank, without interest payable May 15th, if references are satisfactory. Remit by express, postal order, check or draft on New York, but always at the expense of the purchaser, except amount be twenty dollars or more. **Box, Packing and Cartage to Forwarding Office Free, on all but trees.**
