

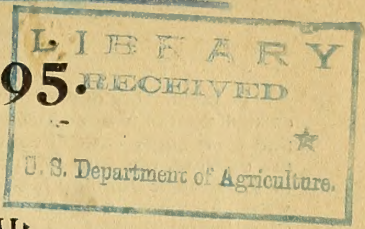

Remit by draft on New York, Chicago, St. Louis, or Cincinnati; or money order or currency by express, charges prepaid.

Do not send personal checks.

Please Remember

That when we have delivered stock to railroad, express, or transportation company, in good order as directed, our responsibility ceases, and we cannot assume the responsibility of delay in handling.

That we are always glad to correct mistakes if reported promptly, but no claims allowed unless reported within ten days after receipt of goods.

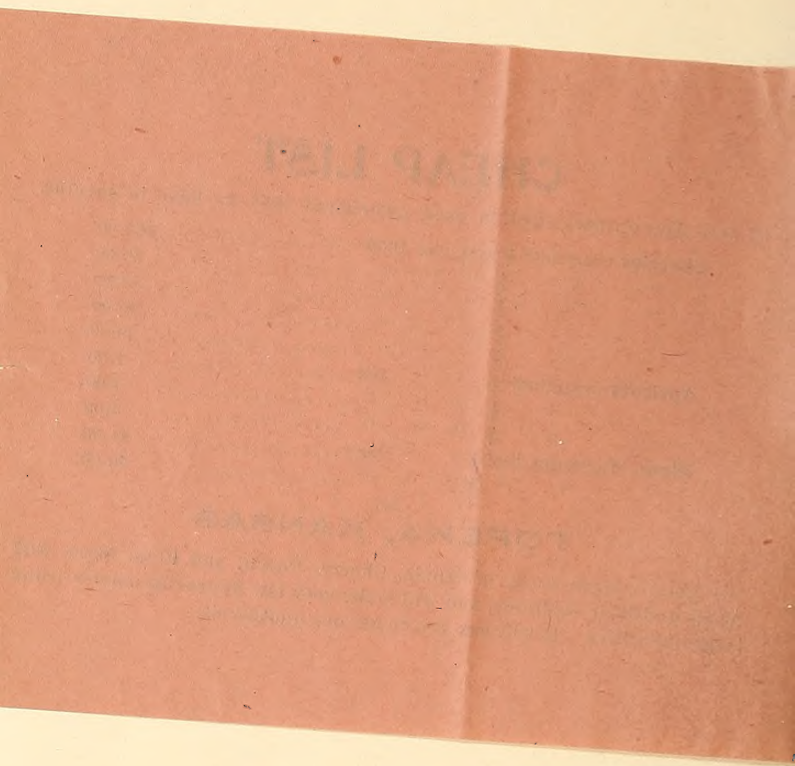

THE SIMPSON PLUM.

The young trees carry the same characteristics as the old tree. The fruit is large, a beautiful golden color, and very firm and sweet—sweeter than any plum we ever ate. It is an entirely free-stone. The original tree was found growing wild in the woods near Alexis, this state. The leaf and the wood have the appearance of the European class, but in vigor, hardiness, and bearing, it follows the Chickasaw type.

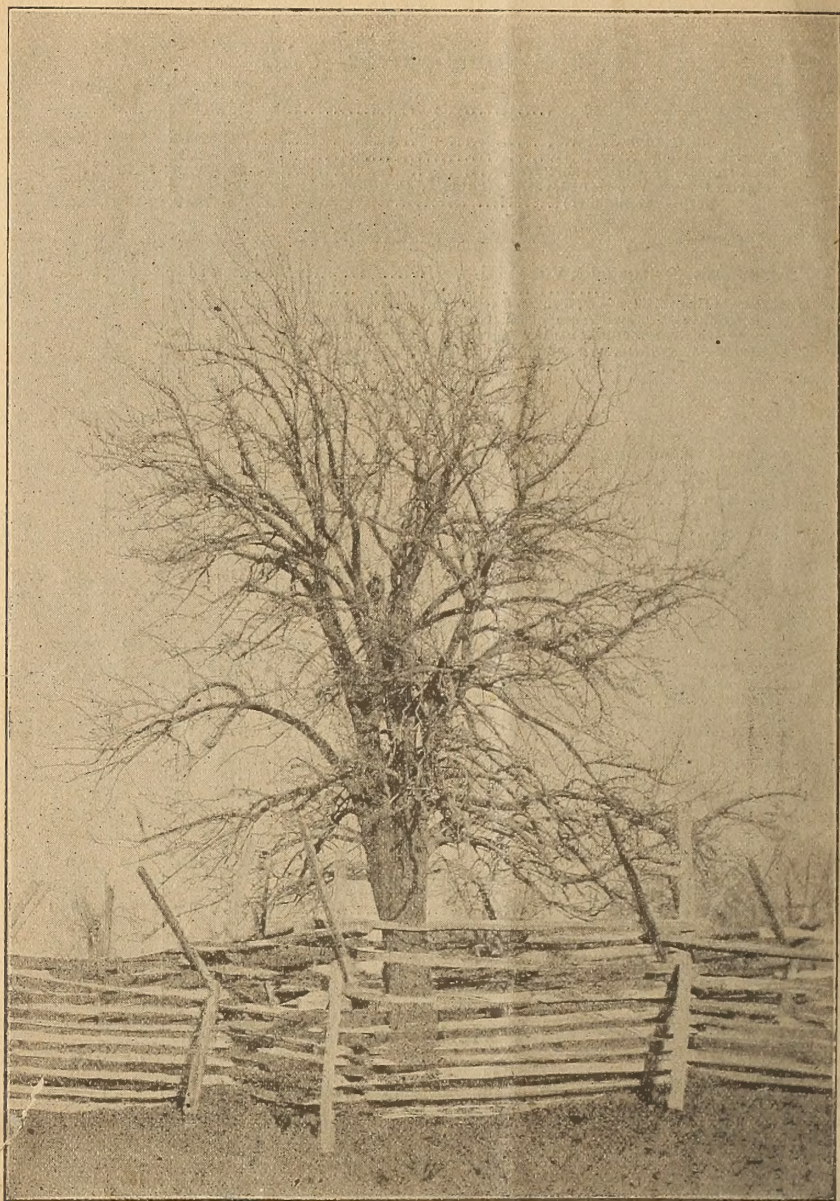

LINCOLN.

The above is an exact copy of a photograph taken for us of the famous Lincoln Pear Tree, January 1, 1895. The seed of this tree was planted in the spring of 1837, making the tree 58 years old. One foot from the ground it measures 6 feet 4 inches in circumference. The tree bears annually from 40 to 60 bushels of fruit. We were the first to propagate the Lincoln pear commercially, and planted trees in our own experimental grounds which have since come into bearing. We have watched these and many other young trees, and each year has strengthened our faith in the Lincoln. The trees are extremely hardy, free from blight or disease, heavy bearers, fruit medium to large, with a rich aromatic flavor. If your Lincoln trees bear our seal you may be sure you have the genuine Lincoln Pear.
