Twelve year ago the class of 148 walked through the doors of various school buildings for the first time and optimistically demanded an education. Of the 38 First Graders who started nere in 1936, only 6-Mark Herring, Hubert Head, Forrest Price, Ina Kuth Bartlett, Morgan Price, and Atheleen Williams have completed their entire 12 years of training in the seven Springs School.

Ned Shivar, who started with the class left in the Fifth Grade to return in the Twellth Grade. Kermit Wade joined the class during its second year, while Marvin Coker, Sam Price, and Bobbie J. Southerland came in during its fourth year. Allen Gurley was welcomed into the told at the beginning of the Fifth Grade only to leave the same year and return again in the Seventh Grade. Joseph Outlaw and Chester Smith joined the class in the Sixth Grade, while Mollie Lane and Edward Sullivan transferred to the class in the Seventh Grade.

When we entered school as freshmen in 1944, we were a group of enthusiastic, eager, and ambitious students with never a doubt but that lif'e would run smoothly for us. our newest member, Marie Phillips, made us 34 strong. Mr. Gentry gave us Mr. E. F. Munford for our home room teacher, who was a great help during the year.

Soon examininations were over and we receive our passport (report cards) for the Sophomore Class.

At the beginning of our second year in high school Mr. Moise was our new principal. Many of our members did not come back. Some got married, others moved away, some went to work. The number returning were 28. Miss Cathryn Creasman, our home room teacher, helped us in many ways to have an enjoyable and successful year. Mr. Moise gave us many pleasant moments in Glee Work and Music Appreciation.

In September 1946, we returned as upper classmen 20 Juniors. Ably guided and assisted by Mrs. Gertrude Scott, our sponsor, and our new principal Mr. J. O. Waters, a deep sense of responsibility developed in each member or we felt the need of big things to be done. Our officers this year were: Pres-Mark Herring, Vice-Pres.-Ina Ruth Bartlett, Secretary-Marie Phillips, Treasurer-Chester Smith.

Important events during the years were our class parties, our play "For Pete's Sake" and the Junior - Senior Banquet. We had an out standing baseball team this year under the guidance of Mr. J. O. Waters and Mr. Ray Sisk. The stars of the team were Mark Herring, Chester Smith, Marvin Coker, Joseph Outlaw, Kermit Wade, and of our class.

September 1947, we entered school as seniors. Many changes had taken place since that Sept. three jears ago. Our class had now been reduced to 18 Members. The class officers were: Pres. Allen Gurley, Vice Pres. Mark Herring, Sec. Louise L. Sanderson, Tres. Kermit Wade. We at once began to make plans for the year. The organization of a Statif to publish an annual was our first big job. We were not so positive aboutits success, but we went to work with a zest that was bound to get us what we wanted. We began our subscription and advertising campaignes. Allen Gurley was elected Editor-in-Chief of the annual, which we named, THE SESPRISCHOAN, Ina Ruth Bartlett as the efficient Eusiness Manager was an invaluable help to the editor in making the publication a success.

All of the boys of the class worked nard to sell advertisoments to help finance the costs or publication and when they had sold over $\$ 300.00$ they tiought they nad done a fair job. We thought so, too. The annual was published and 125 coples sold.

We had our first social in the autumn, an enjoyable dance at Mr. Willie Griffin's Barn, with the Juniors as joint hosts and hostesses.

Ned Shivar joined us in January to make the 19 th members of our class. Excitement! Our rings came in October.

Two of our members were married before Christmas-..-Sam Price to Margie Dixon; Louise Lane to Dute Sanderson-.--and we were so grateful that they did not leave us but continued to come to school with our group.

Our play this year was "Just Ducky" with twelve members of our class in the cast.

Mr. Waters, our principal again this year, and Mrs. Scott, our sponsor, kept us busy on something all of the year. with the rush of graduation and plans for commencement it was hard to realize that, our days at Seven Springs High School were over. Our class had been loyal and stuck together in everything and it was hard to think that for the rirst time in 12 years we would disband and go our separate ways. This is what we had to face and so we graduated on May 31, 1948.
