

Hadn't we entered the University 201 strong in September, bringing homor students, outstanding athletes, actors, songbirds, etc., from states as far north as Massachusetts, as far south as Florida, and as far west as Arkansas' Since we were to excel all others bring the state of the

With Walter Moore as our president and Professor Houser Miller as our faculty adviser, in this fashion we began anspiciously constructing our road to success. Immediately after our period of orientation, we found ourselves represented in the University Choral Society, the Hayes-Ficming Volunteer Society, the Y. W. C. A., the Y. M. C. following official positions: William Raines (later elected president of the student body), president of the local branch of the N. A. A. C. P.; Mildred Moore, president body), president of the Lorent Tibbs, president of Student Credit Union; Frank Matthewson, acting president of Y. M. C. A.; Ophelia Durham, president of Le Cercle Français; Johnny Christian, president of the Varsity Club.

For the first time in the history of the Alpha Omicron Honor Society, four juniors were accepted into membership. These were: Vina Phillips, Marguerite Carson, Mildred Moore, and Vincent Tibbs, who was the first Shaw letter man to fulfill the organization's requirements in three years. Hollis Creecy, one of our three-letter men, was the first in recent years to earn the undisputed right to a first place medal in C. I. A. A. track. The Y. M. C. A. selected a member of our class, Vincent Tibbs, as representative to the Youth Christian Conference in Oxford, Ohio; the Y. W. C. A. chose two members of our class, Marguerite Rogers and Beulah Williams, as representatives to the annual King's Mountain Conference. With Willie Freeman, Marguerite Carson, Mildred Moore, Marion Brame, playing on first team, our women's basketball squad won the long cherished championship.

Grainger Browning and Vincent Tibbs travelled extensively representing Tau Sigma Rho Debating Society. Our Junior-Senior Prom was our last tribute to the class whose place we were to glorify the following year.

Realizing that our sojourn at Shaw had been an unusual one, considering our steady decreasing number and the complexity of surviving the administration of two presidents, three deans of women, and two deans of men, we cherished our achievements of the past and sought to make this our last year, our banner year. Professor J. Francis Price, who has been adviser to nine classes during his eight years at the University, saw fit to lend us his highly esteemed service. No Shaw man had received such rating in the past ten years. One of the major problems facing us on the eve of graduation is that of adjusting ourselves to the kind of world in which we must live and work. For four years we have been living in an atmosphere which has been conducive to our aspirations. We have lived in an atmosphere of helpfulness and of love. We have been reminded that we were in the process of becoming, and that our success in the world would depend upon the manner in which we reacted to the learning process. The wisdom which has been accumulated over a period of years by our esteemed faculty has been transmitted to us. We have been stimulated, encouraged, and enlightened in this social group that we have delighted to call the Shaw Family. We are now ready to go out into the world, and let us hope, attain success.

But alas, what a chaotic world we face as we leave the college walls. It is not exactly what I would call a Utopia. It is a world that was not made by students, yet, we must find or make our way in it. We need scarcely go out of the bounds of Shaw University to discover that we are leaving the protected life of students in the most crucial period of our industrial history. It is not necessary to go out of the State of North Carolina to see unusual conditions of poverty and suffering. For example, we need only to look at the uncertain tenancy of the numerous farmers and agricultural workers in the State; or the plight of the wage earner who works hard to

find that his labor has earned for him a bare subsistence.

Not only do we face economic instability in our State, but we, as Negroes, are always living within the shadow of race prejudice. It is my belief, and I believe the conviction of most intelligent observers, that race prejudice, instead of being based on innate instinct, is an acquired social attitude. Therefore, until the masses of people are educated out of this negative social attitude, there can be no complete cooperative contact between the two races. We will most certainly face grave racial injustice in the world into which we go.

To illustrate the type of discrimination which we must face, may I use an example from the profession into which most of us will go-teaching. According to the findinds of Dr. Nelson H. Harris of our faculty, the North Carolina salary for a white teacher who has had no teaching experience is equal to the maximum salary for

Negro teachers.

Shifting our view from North Carolina to focus on the country as a whole, we see widespread unsettlement and insecurity. For ten years now, we have been laboring under the effects of a depression for which we were in every way completely unprepared. What was much worse, as a result of post-war prosperity, we had come to believe that we could never again have hard times. And then in 1929, even before the October crash, the wheels of industry began to slow down. Unemployment became, after 1929, the most serious problem this country had to solve.

The provision of food and shelter for these millions of unemployed has placed a tremendous burden on our government. Since 1932, when Federal aid was first given, the national government has made exceedingly large appropriations annually for relief measures. In spite of governmental procedures, and the apparent upward trend in business since 1936, there are still more than nine million people out of work in this country. And of the people at work, one out of every four or five is working

only part time.

We are beginning to realize that however prosperous we may become, unemployment will be with us for a long time; that it is part of the present system of production, and not to be cured while that system is in effect-though it may, of course be temporarily suspended in case of another war. We must resign ourselves to permanent unemployment for millions until we make fundamental changes in our economic and social system. This means, of course, that we must develop a government program to care for the men and women who cannot find jobs in industry, and it is doubtful that even such a program can take care of all of the unemployed.

To further complicate the national scene, the election of 1940 looms ominously in the background. The period preceding an election is one of uncertainty; no one knows what to expect, and so everyone waits. The result will be an even greater increase in unemployment during the next year and a half. Business enterprises, not knowing the policies of the incoming administration will refuse to invest large sums;

I shall neither attempt to define nor trace the development of Fascism, for we can all see that it has become a sore on the body politic. Whatever reaction, to the can see what confusion of world powers has been brought about its interpretation, we can see what confusion of world powers has been brought about by Fascist manipulations. We have seen the march of Fascism on the world change the shape of the map, and that process of change is still going on. Italy began the march and was soon joined by Germany.

Mussolini's first conquest was in Ethiopia. Hitler, in order not to be outdone, then marched into Austria, and just last fall into Czechoslovakia. A few weeks ago, Mussolini took over Albania; and Hitler has his eyes on Poland and the small nations

The minority races of the world have become increasingly restless as a result of their treatment at the hands of these factions. Jews, Indians, Chinese, Ethiopians, and American Negroes are all facing oppression by majority groups. In their greed and American regions have saved no interests and spared no feelings. With confusion among world powers becoming greater each day, it seems inevitable that war fusion among world pould Fascism win a world war, the darkness of the Dark Ages

nealizing that this is the kind of world into which we go to live and work, it seems fitting to consider ways of doing and ways of thinking in this world. First of all, we must have high ideals. The educated few in our race must shoulder a double responsibility. We must strive for the best for ourselves and at the same time raise the standards of living and provide increased opportunities for the uneducated masses of our people. of hying and provide a superior morality, otherwise we can not protest against practices

As college graduates, we will be expected to uphold the values received in college. We face a world which is decidedly different from our campus world, but we are expected to keep in sight those principles which we have adopted as standards by expected to keep in signs coverned. We face the world alone, and we will be forced which our lives are to be governed. We take that worth atone, and we will be forced to fall back on our inner recourses. As students, we ask also avoid becoming prey to despair, distillusion, or defeatism. If it has taken millions of years to develop mankind, must we fret if it takes us a few years to rise above the rank and file of mankind? Must we quit if we don't get there quickly? I realize that in this skeptical age of higher criticism it is not considered erudite or modern to quote the Bible. cal age of infance. However, we find a piece of very sound advice in Galatians, chapter six, verse nine— "We shall reap if we faint not." In a world such as the one we shall face tomorrow, our success will depend upon how well we can "stick-to-it."


