The prices quoted in this list on all **Dutch Bulbs**, Bermuda Lilies, Roman Hyacinths are for advance orders which must reach me not later than the 25th of June. To make these very low prices, which are in many instances lower than **American wholes le prices**. I must have my orders in advance, as I cannot take any risk of having stock remaining unsold on my hands. The bulbs will be delivered at the proper season, and need not be paid for until delivery Orders of \$25 and upwards will be packed in separate cases in Europe and shipped direct to Eastern customers by my agent in New York City, thus saving all extra charges for re-packing and transportation.

TERMS OF PAYMENT.

My terms of payment are invariably cash on delivery, which does not mean that I ship C. O. D., as I will not do so under any circumstances. I deliver the goods and mail bills at the same time, and expect payment within a few days. People unknown to me will please send references with their order. Those who wish to send cash in advance with their orders will be allowed a discount of 5 per cent. from the prices quoted in this list.

EARLY ORDERS

The earlier orders are given me the better I can have them filled. Some of my customers are now giving me orders to be delivered next spring. I sail for Europe on the 2d of July, and will personally select the stock for all import orders received by June 25th.

CLUB ORDERS.

No smaller quantities will be supplied than those quoted in this list, but it is suggested where these quantities are too large that two or three friends or neighbors could combine their orders to advantage and save transportation charges.

SPECIAL IMPORT ORDERS

Special orders will be taken to import from Europe anything desired in trees, shrubs or plants. For this service I charge a commission of 25 per cent., but as I buy everything from the growers at lowest wholesale prices, customers can depend on getting the stock for less money than it can be obtained in any other way. My knowledge of nursery stock and my experience in importing will save my customers from any mistakes in bringing over stock not suited to our climate or stock that can be bought to better advantage on this side.

PLEASE NOTICE

The date of delivery and the limit of time for receiving orders for the different classes of stock. Many orders were sent to me this spring too late to be filled.








Plan No. 4. Collection D. 120 Choice Named Hyacinths for \$6.50.


Plan No. 3. Collection C. 75 Choice Named Hyacinths for \$4.25.







CROCUS.

The Crocus is the first flower to bloom in the spring, and it is no unusual sight to see the ground covered with snow and the Crocus in bloom at the same time. It is a mass of beautiful white bloom, from late summer until heavy frosts. Light frosts do not injure the flowers at all. Every garden should contain a group of it, and on large places it should be planted by the hundred.
