**A professor's

Of the many millions incarcerated in the Nazi concentration camps, relatively few have survived. One of these survivors, Elie Wiesel, somehow succeeded in blending a consummate literary artistry

in the French language with a passionate sense of humanism and has consequently developed into one of our century's most influential writers and champions of the rights of mankind.

Four decades after the liberation of the emaciated human remnants of Auschwitz and Bergen-Belsen and Buchenwald, one of those remnants -- Elie Wiesel -- stepped forth to accept the 1986 Nobel Peace Prize.

This was not his first award -- but it was one of the most glorious mankind can bestow.

Wiesel qualified incontestably for the Nobel for many reasons. Universally regarded as the conscience of the Holocaust, Elie Wiesel is probably also the most eloquent voice of the Jewish people today.

He has utilized the French language to describe the horrors of what was the most irrational of human happenings. He has chronicled the most barbaric moment in human history.

More than a historian, Wiesel is a witness who has suffered through history. His novels, tales, plays, essays, and lectures attest to the miraculous resilience of the Jewish people. He lovingly resurrects their joyful tales of Hasidism and makes live again the ancient patriarchs of the Judaic Scriptures. Through his texts the menaced values of the Jews have survived the flames and fumes of crematoria and gas ovens, and the calculated strategies of Hitler's genocidal efforts to destroy a whole people.

Above all, Wiesel qualifies for the award because he has been the champion of human dignity, both Jewish and non-Jewish. Tirelessly he has reminded us that human cruelty and mass persecutions have not disappeared with Nazism. He calls upon us to alleviate the plight of all sufferers of tyranny, whether

After working Coast to Coast, Jim Campbell will tell you there's no place like Susquehanna University to call home.

Campbell, a 1963 graduate, returned to the University on December 9 as Director of Alumni Relations. He succeeds Charles (Buss) Carr who accepted the position of Development and Alumni Affairs Director at Mansfield (Pa.) State University after 22 years at Susquehanna.

"There is something special about being on campus -- something is happening here that will have an effect on the future," Campbell says. "For me, there is something extra special when that campus is Susquehanna University."

After spending the past 10 years in sports, Campbell likens his return to Susquehanna to a football coach returning to his alma mater.

"Certainly I'm not confusing myself with Knute Rockne of Notre Dame or Lou Sorrentino of Lebanon Valley, but I can appreciate the feeling they must have had when they returned to work at the college where they had come to learn."

He recalls his student days talking with then-president Dr. Gustave Weber. "He talked about 'nurturing' and 'growing' -- words that conveyed the feeling of shaping. He was so very right -- as he often was," Campbell says. "Susquehanna had much more to do with shaping our character than we realized at the time."

Campbell previously directed the Little League Baseball Museum in Williamsport, Pa. He also has 25 years experience in public relations and communication. From 1977-1982, Campbell was director of communications for the National Football League alumni in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., where he oversaw publication of four alumni periodicals and served as liaison with alumni chapters.

Prior to the NFL position, Campbell was researcher, curator and librarian from 1972-77 for the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. He also has reported news for several Pennsylvania radio stations.

Campbell is a published writer; his articles have

appeared in the sports publications *Pro*, *GameDay*, and *Football Digest*. He also co-authored three editions of the NFL Trivia Book.

After earning a bachelor's degree in economics from Susquehanna, Campbell attended the Duquesne University School of Law and studied journalism at UCLA.

"As I moved around the country, I began to realize even more that Susquehanna was a special place and the time I spent here was a special time. So when Opportunity knocked and invited me to return to Susquehanna, I made sure I answered the door," Campbell says.

they be the Black of South Africa, the Cambodians of Indochina, the Palestinians in south Lebanon refugee camps, or the millions of Soviet Jews who cannot observe Judaism.

Because Wiesel was a victim of cruelty of men against men, he has devoted his life to fight for others whose lives are menaced by similar cruelty.

Born in 1928 on the Transylvanian border between Hungary and Romania, Wiesel enjoyed a loving and idyllic childhood in the bosom of a tightly knit, religious family. The joys of childhood ended

abruptly at the age of 16 when he and the other Jews of his city were deported to the Nazi concentration camps.

There his father died of starvation and dysentery; his mother and youngest sister died in the gas chambers. Ten years after his liberation, Wiesel related in his book, *Night*, the nightmarish account of his suffering: intense cold, beatings, sickness, filth, starvation, torture, panic.

After liberation he was sent to Paris where he learned French and studied literature, philosophy,

and psychology at the Sorbonne. French continues to be his principal language of expression.

After several years as a professional journalist, Wiesel was sent in 1956 to cover the United Nations in New York. He decided to remain in America and became a U.S. citizen soon afterwards.

Thirty years later, we find him a successful writer and philosopher who lives in an attractive, book-laden apartment in midtown Manhattan. A husband and father of two, he enjoys the benefit of his wife Marion who has become his principal translator from French to English.

Having served both Presidents Carter and Reagan as the Chairman of the U.S. Holocaust Commission, Wiesel will long be remembered for the moving plea he made at the White House after receiving the Congressional Medal of Honor. Wiesel begged a stunned and speechless President Reagan not to make his controversial visit to the Bitburg Cemetery of West Germany.

"That is not your place," Wiesel told Reagan, "Your place is with the victims of the S.S."

Wiesel's physical features seem to blend harmoniously with all his pen has produced. He leaves with his haunting presence an indelible mark on all who have seen him or heard him speak. He gives the impression that he has visited and returned from another domain, one that is awesome, and indescribable.

He who has returned from that strange world is a witness, a survivor of a Dante-like world worse than Hades. He carries a sacred message for those who will listen to his story. Wiesel is determined that his story never be forgotten.

The Nobel Peace Prize will surely add even more prestige to that story.

Jack Kolbert, professor of French and chair of Modern Languages, became acquainted with 1986 Nobel Peace Prize recipient Elie Wiesel almost 20 years ago in Albuquerque, N.M.

Kolbert and Wiesel have maintained a close working relationship and friendship. At Wiesel's request, Kolbert has reviewed all of Wiesel's works and is currently writing a book on Wiesel and major figures in U.S. literature through Gale Publishing and Tulane University.

Kolbert joined the Susquehanna faculty as professor of French literature in 1985. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in romance languages from the University of Southern California and a doctorate in French literature from Columbia University. He also studied aesthetics as a Fulbright fellow at the University of Paris. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

In addition to the book on Wiesel, Kolbert is working on a research project on "Francois Mitterand, Man of Literature -- Style and Themes."

O'Connor Named Chair of University Directors

The Susquehanna University Board of Directors has elected a new chair and has appointed two directors.

State College resident Harold C. O'Connor has assumed leadership of the 33-member board. A Pennsylvania State University graduate, O'Connor recently retired as president and chief executive officer of Chemcut Corporation.

O'Connor succeeds alumnus Erle Shobert, of St. Marys, as chair. Shobert led the Susquehanna board from 1978-86; he continues to serve as a director.

University President Joel Cunningham spoke on behalf of the University community in thanking Shobert for his outstanding service and in welcoming O'Connor as the new board chair.

In related news, a Millersville pastor and a Huntingdon businessman were named to the board.

Rev. David R. Fisher, pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Millersville, has been named as the Lutheran Church's Central Pennsylvania Synod representative for a three-year term. He serves on the Board's Student Life Committee.

Lawrence E. Mundis, a financial planning consultant from Huntingdon, will represent the University's Alumni Association for three years. A 1966 Susquehanna graduate, Mundis serves on the Development and Public Relations committee.

Psychology Professor Studies Memory

At what age do we begin to remember events? Does our memory change as we grow older? Or do friends and surroundings influence our memory?

Psychology professor James R. Misanin hopes to answer these questions. He has been awarded a grant by the National Institute of Child, Health and Human Development to learn more about memory. The \$66,143 grant is enabling Misanin to conduct the research in the Susquehanna University psychology laboratories.

"It's important to know when and why you begin to remember things," Misanin says. "Most of us can recall things from when we were three years old, but very little before then. I am trying to find out how we process information and why we respond in different ways at different ages."

Misanin began studying memory in 1959 at Princeton University while pursuing a doctorate at Rutgers in psychology. For nine years, he studied how the memory processes and responds to significant events at different stages of life.

In a presentation to the International Society of Developmental Psychobiology, Misanin said that he and Susquehanna student researchers obtained results which suggest that very young and old laboratory rats recall and respond to information differently than young adults, whose reactions rely more on their surroundings.

Misanin hopes his current research will determine if such differences are related to age or environmental factors such as odor, taste and surroundings.

Fraternity Placed on Probation

In light of a review board's findings, Susquehanna University has placed the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity on probation through May 15, 1988.

President Joel Cunningham appointed the review board in late March to review the fraternity and related circumstances surrounding the death of alumnus Keene White, a Lambda brother who died March 21 after a party at the fraternity house on March 20. The review was conducted by a five-member board comprised of three faculty, a student and an alumnus.

In a memo released to the University community, Cunningham said that the review board's findings indicated that Lambda Chi Alpha violated University policy in arranging and carrying out the party on March 20 and that recent management, action, and attitudes among Lambda members "have not corresponded adequately with the goals and purposes of Susquehanna University as an academic community."

Cunningham has appointed W. Michael Rees, a University instructor in physical education and head football coach, to supervise the fraternity and to work with others to develop a plan for improving the fraternity's management, lifestyle, and relationships with the entire campus. Rees will work closely with University student life staff, national representatives of Lambda Chi Alpha, and selected fraternity alumni in developing and implementing the plan. The fraternity also will be expected to employ a resident counselor to help Rees provide guidance to fraternity members.

Cunningham said that no social events will be held by Lambda Chi Alpha prior to November 1, 1987, and that no consumption of alcohol will be permitted in public areas of the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity house during the entire probationary period.

As part of his responsibility, Rees will be expected to provide thorough evaluations of the fraternity's performance at the end of the 1987 fall and 1988 spring semesters.

Any significant violation of disciplinary regulations by Lambda Chi Alpha during the probationary period will be cause for initiating proceedings leading to

withdrawal of its chapter charter, Cunningham said. "I believe that the actions taken can improve the quality of life for Lambda Chi Alpha and for all members of the University community," Cunningham said.

President Reagan Salutes Students

Officials from President Reagan's Citation Program for Private Sector Initiatives have recognized Susquehanna University students for their outstanding community service through the Susquehanna Neighborhood Project.

Susquehanna is now eligible to be considered for the top 100 awards and citations to be presented by President Reagan at the White House Rose Garden this spring.

University officials estimate that the Neighborhood Project has given more than 73,500 hours of service to the University and the Selinsgrove area since 1976. Students request the privilege of living together on the basis of their common interest in an approved volunteer project of benefit to the University or community. This year almost 200 student participants are helping the area's elderly, scouts, church youth groups, and the mentally handicapped; serving campus and community computer needs; promoting campus arts events; and developing a campus arboretum.

"Student community-service projects help students develop a respect for the world and people around them, and with this respect comes a genuine desire to improve the community in a very personal way," President Joel Cunningham says.

The Citation Program, developed in 1984 by the White House Office of Private Sector Initiatives, annually recognizes organizations making extraordinary contributions to their communities and encourages other businesses and associations to develop similar volunteer programs.

As part of the recognition, Susquehanna was awarded the red, white, and blue C-Flag -- the program's symbol -- as part of the honor.

The flag, embossed with "We Can and We Care," has been flying over the Degenstein Campus Center since its February 20 unveiling on Student Volunteer Day -- a University-wide celebration.

That Championship Year

It should be at least a .500 season, many said, but the 1986 Susquehanna football team would have difficulty winning more than seven games, let alone vie for the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) championship.

However, the combination of bad memories of 1985, an early-season "miraculous" victory over the defending MAC champion, and the tireless dedication of the entire team and coaching staff provided the chemistry necessary to vault the Crusaders to the first 10-0 regular season in the school's history, the MAC title, and all the way to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III quarterfinals.

1985 had not been kind to the Susquehanna grid program. The summer resignation of Bill Moll surprised nearly everyone involved with Susquehanna football and delayed the team's progress for the upcoming campaign. The Crusaders suffered through their first losing season since 1980 after finishing 3-7, including losses in the first six games. For rookie head coach Rocky Rees, the year was certainly a trying one, but one that could not just be forgotten.

"It was significant to the players that we were competitive in many of the games we lost," Rees said. "As I interviewed each team member after the season, I encouraged them to dig in their heels and be part of the 'solution' to the problem that had developed."

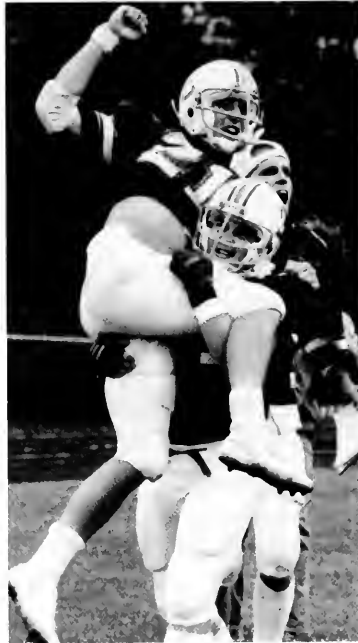
By 1986, Rees was ready to make the changes. Co-captain Dave Kells '87 (Phoenixville, Pa.) was the second-leading tackler in 1985 from his defensive end position, but Coach Rees felt the 6-foot-1, 196-pounder was more suitable for the secondary. "Few other coaches would have moved Dave because of his lack of speed, but he plays with savvy, has a feel for the game and a nose for the ball. Qualities which good defensive backs must possess," Rees said.

The move paid off as Kells finished second again in tackles with 94, and led Susquehanna in interceptions with six and fumble recoveries with five. The Spring-Ford High School graduate also had six pass break-ups, an equal number of sacks, and eight tackles for loss to his credit, and was rewarded for his efforts by being named to the MAC All-Star Team as an honorable mention selection.

Ironically, Kells's end spot was filled by 5-foot-11, 206-pound junior Rich close (Wyomissing, Pa.), who spent 1985 in the secondary. "Rich's biggest strength was his physical style of play, which made him more geared to be on the defensive front," Rees said.

Once again, the second-year coach made the right move as Close increased his number of tackles to 81, after making 71 the previous year. The graduate of Wilson High School was first on the squad with 8-1/2 sacks and 12 tackles for loss, along with breaking up six passes and recovering three fumbles. He was one of six Crusaders named to the conference's All-Star first team.

Susquehanna also entered 1986 without an experienced

quarterback after the graduation of Ken Hughes, who was the brightest spot of 1985 by setting six single-season and single-game passing records.

What was Rees's biggest pre-season headache turned into the biggest success story of the year, as ex-safety Todd Coolidge (Wellsboro, Pa.) surpassed all of Hughes's marks and broke one more.

"I watched Todd in 1985 throwing the ball back to the offense during practice," Rees recalled. "What I saw was a talented athlete with a strong arm." That's all it took for the Crusader coach to consider transferring the team's interception leader for the two previous years from the defensive backfield to the offensive one.

This adjustment brought some rough moments. "Todd really struggled through the pre-season and was very frustrated," Rees said. "He really worked hard, as the entire team did, and the results were outstanding."

Outstanding, indeed, as the 6-foot, 180-pound junior established new Susquehanna season standards for passing yardage with 2,042 (becoming the first Crusader quarterback to surpass 2,000 yards passing in a season), passes attempted with 265, passes completed with 129, touchdown passes with 17, and total offense with 2,086 yards. The Wellsboro High School graduate also had the greatest single game ever by a Crusader signalcaller when he completed 23 of 38 passes for 345 yards and four touchdowns in the thrilling 43-42 Homecoming triumph over Lycoming in the second game of the year.

The season opened in Allentown with a convincing 17-7 win over a Muhlenberg team which finished 7-3 and handed Susquehanna the first of six consecutive losses of 1985 by a 30-7 score. "Beating Muhlenberg gave us some confidence to build on," Rees said.

"Next came the MAC opener in front of a large Amos Alonzo Stagg Field crowd against the 1985 conference champion Warriors of Lycoming. The Williamsport team exploded to a 28-7 halftime advantage behind a brilliant performance by two-time MAC Most Valuable Player Larry Barretta.

The Warrior quarterback sent many Crusader fans heading for the exits when he scored on a short run to give Lycoming a seemingly comfortable 42-22 lead with just more than eight minutes to play. It was at that point that Coolidge proved that he belonged at the helm of the Susquehanna offense.

Just 25 seconds after the Barretta touchdown, Coolidge hooked up with senior split end Rob Sochovka (Taylor, Pa.) for a 36-yard scoring strike. With 4:09 left, it was junior receiver Al Bucci (Claymont, Del.) who received a 20-yard Coolidge touchdown pass, which pulled the Orange and Maroon to within six at 42-36.

As people began to file back into the Stagg Field area from nearby Homecoming celebrations, things still looked bleak as Susquehanna regained possession on its 20-yard line with only 1:13 remaining and with no timeouts. Three completions worth 37 yards and a six-yard scamper by Coolidge left the Crusaders on the Lycoming 37. After

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an incompleteness stopped the clock, Coolidge was forced out of the pocket on the next play and was pulled down at the Lycoming 40 before reaching the sideline.

With less than 10 seconds, the composed Susquehanna quarterback hurried the offense to the line one last time and found Sochovka at the 20. The determined split end avoided three would-be tacklers while tip-toeing down the sideline for the game-tying score as time ran out.

After a wild celebration on the field, senior placekicker Randy Pozsar (New City, N.Y.) drilled the extra point through the goalpost, giving Susquehanna the dramatic 43-42 come-from-behind win, in what Rees describes as "the most emotional game of the year and one which helped our team believe in themselves."

The next victory came the following Saturday in the mud at Delaware Valley by a 7-0 count. While the Susquehanna offense, which rolled up an incredible 598 yards against Lycoming, was limited to a nine-yard TD pass from Coolidge to Bucci on the first drive of the second half, the Crusader defense redeemed itself after allowing 42 points a week earlier. The Orange and Maroon registered its first shutout of the year and limited the Aggies to just 68 yards total offense.

It was back home for the fourth game as Wilkes came to Selinsgrove with a 2-1 record and hopes of making a serious challenge for the MAC crown. The Crusaders sent the Colonels off Stag Field bewildered and disappointed after pinning a 24-3 defeat on them.

"It gave everyone more reason to believe, because we had good efforts on both sides of the ball," Rees said. Susquehanna gained 398 yards while surrendering just 184 yards, including only 78 in the second half.

Off to their best start in 22 years, the Crusaders traveled to Widener and left the Pioneers shaking their heads with a 21-point third-quarter explosion that propelled Rees's squad to a 28-13 victory. After battling to a 7-7 halftime tie, Susquehanna took the lead for good when senior halfback Kevin Weber (Dumont, N.J.) broke several tackles on a 48-yard touchdown run, his third TD jaunt of over 45 yards. On the next two possessions, Coolidge lofted perfect passes of 20 yards to Sochovka and 16 yards to Bucci for scores and the Crusaders were halfway to an undefeated regular season.

The two-game road trip continued at Moravian and the defense was once again at its best in a 17-0 whitewash of the Greyhounds. While the offense sputtered due to four turnovers, the defenders reduced the sting of the mistakes by limiting Moravian to just 123 total yards. Coolidge directed Susquehanna 66 yards in eight plays, tossing a 15-yard scoring strike to junior halfback John Lotti (Old Bridge, N.J.) with only 17 seconds remaining to give his club a 14-0 advantage at the intermission.

Parents Weekend took on a special aura as the gridders moved into the homestretch of their MAC title race. The Orange and Maroon scored twice in its first three offensive plays on bombs of 62 and 68 yards from Coolidge to Sochovka en route to a 61-6 rout over Lebanon Valley.

"As the season progressed, the team's attitude changed from 'we won't lose' to 'we can't lose,'" Rees emphasized. "The players knew they would find ways to win."

In no other contest was Susquehanna's ability to discover alternate methods to victory more evident than in game eight at Upsala. The Crusader special teams recovered a pair of fumbles, one which led to the first touchdown and the second which was returned for a score in the 25-0 blanking of the Vikings.

Kells pounced on the pigskin after an Upsala player hobbled a first-quarter punt, setting up a two-yard



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touchdown run by sophomore halfback Joe Witt (Shamokin, Pa.). Early in the second quarter, the Crusaders applied heavy pressure on Upsala punter Tom Thorne, who fumbled the long snap. Freshman Bryan Brust (Rockaway, N.J.) grabbed the ball in mid-air and returned it 23 yards for a touchdown and a 14-0 Crusader lead. Susquehanna breezed from that point to set up a potential MAC title-clinching game against Juniata the following week.

It was a classic confrontation. Susquehanna was ranked ninth in Division III, Juniata was 20th. A victory by the Orange and Maroon would sew up the Crusaders' second MAC championship in the last four years and almost guarantee Rees's outfit its first-ever appearance in the NCAA playoffs.

After a scoreless first quarter, Coolidge capped a methodical 12-play, 84-yard march with his first touchdown of the season on a one-yard sneak for the first points of the afternoon. Another long drive, this one covering 80 yards in less than two minutes, was completed with a 21-yard TD aerial from the junior phenom to his classmate Bucci with just 30 seconds showing on the second quarter clock and gave Susquehanna a 14-0 halftime margin.

Crusader fans began to celebrate when Sochovka ramblled into the end zone with a 28-yard pass from Coolidge midway through the third quarter to make it 21-0. However, the crowd was quieted when Juniata's Dan Crossey broke loose for a 48-yard scoring run only 36 seconds after the Sochovka TD.

Tension increased dramatically when Indian quarterback Mike Culver danced his way through the Crusader

defense for a 34-yard touchdown with just under eight minutes to play. However, the defense stiffened and the other team captain, senior offensive guard Tom Shoemaker (Collingdale, Pa.), sealed the dramatic victory when he recovered a fumbled punt with just 1:30 to play.

For Rees, the 21-14 win was more satisfying than the early-season surprise over Lycoming. "This victory really put us on another level," he said. "Not only were we the MAC champion, but we won the title going undefeated."

The Crusaders were their own worse enemy offensively in the regular-season finale against Albright, but the defense racked up its fourth shutout to complete the first 10-0 campaign in Susquehanna's storied 88-year football history.

The Lions were caged on offense, gaining just 135 yards on the day, including a negative two yards on the ground. Meanwhile, Susquehanna committed five turnovers, but used one-yard touchdown dives by Witt and sophomore fullback Cosmo Iacavazzi (Belle Mead, N.J.) for the 26-0 triumph.

The day after the completion of the magical regular season brought Rees and his Crusaders good and bad news. The Orange and Maroon received its first bid to the 16-team NCAA Division III playoffs but were forced to face the Presidents of Washington & Jefferson College at Washington, Pa.

November 22 arrived with sunny skies and 50-degree temperatures. The Susquehanna defense, however, failed to show up for the first half as it spotted the host club a 20-7 halftime advantage. However, the combination of a renewed defensive effort and more fourth-quarter heroics enabled the MAC champs to blow by the Presidents 28-20 and into the quarterfinals.

After the Crusaders knotted the score at seven on a Coolidge-to-Sochovka 15-yard touchdown pass early in the second stanza, W&J running back A.J. Pagano waltzed through a maze of Orange and Maroon with the ensuing kickoff for an 85-yard score. The junior speedster tacked on a 27-yard touchdown scamper late in the half to propel the 8-1 Presidents to their comfortable lead at the break.

It was still 20-7 entering the final 15 minutes, but Iacavazzi plowed into the end zone from a yard out on the third play of the final quarter to bring Susquehanna to within six. W&J turned back the Crusaders the next two times they had the ball and were driving toward a potential victory-clinching score, when quarterback Rich Riotto's fumble was cradled by senior defensive tackle Steve Curran (Minersville, Pa.) at the SU 30.

Iacavazzi and Witt combined to gain 26 yards on three rushes after the turnover, when Rees and his staff pulled out another weapon out of their extensive offensive arsenal. What appeared to be a harmless pitchout to Weber to the right on a second-and-seven play turned into a 44-yard touchdown bomb off a perfectly-executed halfback option pass to a wide-open Coolidge streaking down the left sideline. Pozsar calmly converted another pressure-packed extra point and the visitors led for the first time, 21-20 with 6:29 left.

With the momentum firmly on SU's side, the spirited Crusader defense dug in to protect the slim advantage. On the third play after the kickoff, the aggressive unit stripped Pagano of the ball with junior middle guard Damian Caracciolo (Altoona, Pa.) pouncing on it at the President 31-yard line.

It took just four snaps for the big-play SU offense to score a crucial insurance touchdown and salt away

another thrilling, come-from-behind win. An acrobatic 31-yard reception by Witt set up Coolidge's second TD pass of the encounter, an 11-yarder to a leaping Buccini in the far left corner of the end zone. Another successful conversion by Pozsar made it 28-20, but 3:51 remained in the battle.

W&J proved it was a playoff-caliber team by bolting all the way to the Crusader 16 with a first-and-10 with more than two minutes still to play. SU stood tall and finally forced four consecutive incompletions to insure its berth in the quarterfinals and raise its perfect record to 11-0.

The Crusaders' opponent in the round of eight was Salisbury State College, after a 34-20 win over Emory and Henry College in the first round. The Sea Gulls came to Selingsgrove for the November 29 contest also with an 11-0 mark.

Football was at its best in the first half as the two Division III powerhouses combined for 31 points and 457 yards, with the Crusaders using a 27-yard field goal by Pozsar with just two seconds remaining in the second quarter to grab a 17-14 halftime advantage. Coolidge completed 13 of 19 attempts for 180 yards before the intermission, including a nine-yard touchdown toss to Buccini, which put SU up 14-7.

The team from Maryland received the second-half kickoff and proceeded to the Crusader six, before settling for a 24-yard field goal by Bill Maurer to knot the score at 17. Susquehanna offense picked up where it left off on its initial drive of the third quarter, driving to a first-and-goal at the Sea Gull nine.

A trio of running plays gained eight yards, but Coolidge's fourth-down pass to the rear of the end zone intended for senior tight end Andy Ford (Wilmington, Del.) was batted away and with it went the Crusaders' momentum for the remainder of the game.

Salisbury State failed to gain a first down after its impressive goal-line stand, and a short punt by Maurer put SU back in business at the Sea Gull 25-yard line. Just three plays later, a Coolidge aerial was picked off by cornerback Rob Snyder, the first of four interceptions the Salisbury secondary would grasp in the second half.

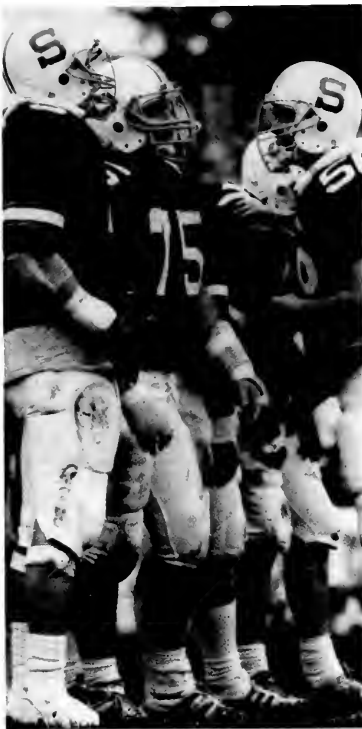
The explosive Sea Gull offense took advantage of the turnover, putting together a lightning-quick six-play, 90-yard drive for the go-ahead score. A 16-yard pass from quarterback Kevin White to running back Mike Coppa and a 19-yard gallop by fullback Frank Oliver set the stage for Coppa's 47-yard touchdown reception off a short pass from White which made it 24-17 with 1:08 left in the third period.

SU used six plays to move to the Sea Gull 28 when safety John Baugher hauled in an interception in the Salisbury end zone. Just four snaps of the ball later, Coppa struck again, this time speeding 52 yards for his third touchdown of the afternoon (he scored on a 45-yard run in the first half). Maurer's extra-point closed out the scoring at the 11:43 mark of the final quarter.

Coppa carried the ball 19 times for 129 yards and hauled in three receptions for 75 yards. White was outstanding, completing 15 of 20 passes for 237 yards and two touchdowns. Buccini was the game's leading receiver, with eight catches for 133 yards.

Salisbury State outlasted Ithaca 44-40 in the Division III semifinals, but fell 31-3 in the championship game, the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl, to Augustana College of Rock Island, Ill. It was Augustana's fourth straight Division III title.

The number of post-season accolades accorded to SU was another indication of its excellent season. Along

with Close, Caracciolo, Shoemaker, Sochovka, junior center Pete Stoma (Lyndhurst, N.J.), and Weber were named the MAC All-Star first team. Joining Kells as honorable mention picks was a quartet of juniors: fullback Kevin Gormley (Ramsey, N.J.); linebacker Trevor Henry (Huntingdon, Pa.); defensive tackle Brian Quiggle (Towanda, Pa.); and cornerback Clayton Smith (Norristown, Pa.).

Shoemaker, an Academy Park High School graduate, was recognized nationally by the *Football News* as a Division III honorable mention offensive lineman. He and Barretta (second-team quarterback) were the only MAC players selected by the publication.

Rees also earned two richly-deserved honors for directing the biggest single-season turnaround (eight more wins than the previous year) in Division III history. The MAC head coaches voted him the conference's Coach of the Year and the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) picked him as the Kodak College Division II Coach of the Year for Region II, which covers 15 states from Pennsylvania to Florida.

Coolidge was chosen as the Crusaders' Most Valuable

Player, with Sochovka and Henry receiving the Best Offensive Player and Best Defensive Player Awards, respectively. Senior quarterback Rich Maley (Philadelphia) was tabbed as SU's Unsung Hero while the Best Offensive Scout award went to sophomore signalcaller Bryan Griffie (Dillsburg, Pa.). Freshman linebacker Tim Smith (Bethlehem, Pa.) was honored as the Best Defensive Scout Player.

No school has won back-to-back MAC football titles since the reorganization of the conference from two divisions into one nine-team league in 1983 and a 10-team group with the addition of Lebanon Valley in 1985. Based on the success of 1986 and the large number of returning starters, next year's Crusader club should make a serious run at repeating as conference champion.

“The outlook is certainly optimistic,” Rees said. “The players have a taste of what it takes to win, but we definitely will not sneak up on anyone.”

The coach's biggest worry heading into his third season is the offensive line, where four of the five starters are graduating, with only Stoma returning. Buccini is back to anchor the receiving corps, but Sochovka will be missed.

A graduate of Riverside High School, Sochovka concluded his outstanding Crusader career as the school's all-time reception yardage leader with 1,518 yards. He also broke the season mark for receiving yardage in 1986 with 634 yards and his 78 career catches leaves him third in that category.

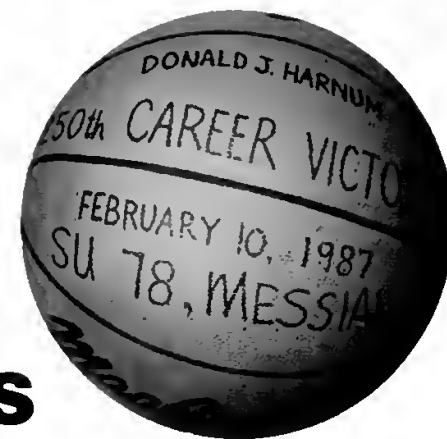
“Beyond his statistics, Rob's success story is that he is such a team player,” Rees emphasized. “It is a real indication of his ability that he broke those records while splitting playing time (the SU split ends bring in the offensive calls to the quarterback).”

Another offensive key will be keeping Gormley healthy for an entire season. The hard-charging running back, a graduate of Ramsey High School, topped SU in rushing last season with 616 yards, but he did not see action in the final two regular-season games or the pair of playoff contests due to an infected right knee. The 6-foot, 200-pound Gormley, who is the 13th leading rusher in school history with 1,216 yards, missed three games in 1985 with a series of injuries.

Of course, having Coolidge back in the fold gives Crusader followers even more reason to hope. “Todd came up with some spectacular efforts,” Rees understated about his signalcaller, who finished 19th in Division III in total offense. “He made the move to what is considered the toughest position to play and his performance was exceptional.”

Defensively, SU returns eight starters to the unit which wound up fourth in Division III total defense (only 182.2 yards allowed per game) and eighth in scoring defense (8.5 points per game). Once replacements are found for Kells, Curran, and linebacker Kevin Sinnott (Northvale, N.J.), who moved from fullback for his senior season, opposing offenses should find the traveling tough through the Orange and Maroon.

A conference title, a school record for wins in a season, and a spot in the Division III national quarterfinals all made 1986 a special year for SU football. “The season proved we can play with anybody, left us feeling like we belong among the divisional powers, and gave us good impressions about our players,” the Crusader coach said. “We made some big leaps for the entire program.”



Harnum notches 250th coaching victory

Susquehanna University men's basketball coach Donald J. Harnum won the 250th game of his career February 10, when the Crusaders posted a 78-67 victory at Messiah College.

The University honored Harnum for reaching the milestone before the February 14 home game versus Lycoming College.

Harnum completed his 18th season as a collegiate head coach with an overall record of 252-200. In his 13 years at the Susquehanna helm, he has 183 wins and 143 losses.

The Crusader mentor, also the athletic director and assistant professor of physical education, began his head coaching career at Susquehanna in 1969. He guided the Crusaders for two seasons before moving to the University of Delaware, where he had served previously as an assistant coach. In five seasons with the Blue Hens, Harnum compiled a 69-57 mark.

A native of Brewer, Maine, Harnum returned to Susquehanna in 1976 and was named athletic director in 1979. His teams have made six appearances in the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC)-Northern Division playoffs and two showings in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III national tournament.

The 1985-86 campaign was the most successful of his coaching career. The Crusaders set a school record for most wins in a season as they went 22-8 and captured the first MAC-Northern Division title in Susquehanna's history. The Orange and Maroon cagers, who were captained by coach Harnum's son, Don P. Harnum, advanced to the quarterfinals of the Division III playoffs before losing to eventual champion Potsdam State (N.Y.) College.

Harnum was rewarded for his team's fine season by being selected the MAC-North Coach of the Year and the Kodak Middle Atlantic District Coach of the Year for Division III.

The Susquehanna coach earned a bachelor of science degree from the University of Maine and a master of education degree from Delaware.

I can remember Bob Pritchard, our line coach, in conversation with me the day after our team of 1940 finished 7-0-1. He burst out, "Get out, get out, get out. This year, Miami and Penn State were the only large universities to accomplish that, and they played for the national championship.

125th Anniversary Campaign Successful Conclusion

Susquehanna's 125th Anniversary Campaign, a fundraising drive initiated in 1980, has reached its goal of raising more than \$10 million in new support for the University's endowment and academic programs by June 30, 1986. In Phase I of the campaign (1980-83), commitments totaling \$5,002,000 were received; and during Phase II (1983-1986) an additional \$5,638,000 was raised, bringing total commitments to \$10,640,000.

Goals of the campaign included: 1) increasing annual giving to the University through the Susquehanna University Fund, 2) meeting a \$200,000 challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and a \$100,000 challenge grant from Lutheran Brotherhood, a fraternal benefits society, 3) increasing the University's endowment, 4) addressing immediate physical plant needs, especially the restoration of Seibert Hall, and 5) support for academic programs.

Since 1980, annual giving to Susquehanna has more than doubled, growing from \$304,000 in 1979-80 to \$640,000 in 1985-85; the University has successfully met its challenges by raising \$600,000 in matching funds to support programs in the humanities through the NEH challenge, and by raising \$200,000 in endowment to match the Lutheran Brotherhood challenge; the University's second oldest building on campus, Seibert Hall, has been beautifully restored, in keeping with its Greek revival architecture; and Susquehanna has updated its academic calendar, its degree programs, and has implemented a new core curriculum that has attracted national attention.

The University expresses its deep appreciation to all whose generosity and service made these accomplishments possible.

I want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who worked so hard to make the 1985-86 Susquehanna University Fund campaign the best ever. Last year, alumni, parents, and friends contributed more than \$640,444, representing a 40% increase over 1984-85 totals.

Although totals are important, I was pleased most by the number of people who elected to support Susquehanna for the first time -- more than 665 alumni and friends. I also was pleased to learn that more than 34% of Susquehanna's alumni supported the University in 1985-86, a figure well above national averages. And, I would like to recognize the efforts of the Class of 1936 who mounted Susquehanna's first 50th Reunion Gift Campaign. The Class successfully raised more than \$30,000 for a permanently endowed scholarship.

As you review this report and read about the many exciting things happening on campus today, I hope you share my appreciation for what the SUF has meant and continues to mean to Susquehanna. Many of the improvements we've made in recent years can be directly attributed to the significant increases we've seen in the SUF.

To everyone who gave of their time, interest, and financial support last year, I offer my sincere thanks

Message from the President

Dear Friends of Susquehanna University,

From its earliest days, Susquehanna University has benefited from the loyalty of a great many people who have cared deeply about the University. This Report of Donors reflects the continuation of that loyalty in the many gifts that alumni, friends, faculty, staff, and students made to Susquehanna in 1985-86. The significant increases reflected in this report, both in the number of contributors and in the amounts given, have been important factors in Susquehanna's noteworthy progress this year. This support has enabled Susquehanna to provide students with the means to achieve their potential for learning, leadership, and service to others.

We continue to take pride in the national recognition of Susquehanna in the most recent *U.S. News & World Report* poll of college presidents. Based on criteria including strength of curriculum, quality of teaching, the relationship between students and faculty, and the atmosphere for teaching and learning, Susquehanna was the only Pennsylvania institution to be ranked among the top 10 smaller comprehensive institutions in the East.

Such recognition contributed to our enrollment of 503 freshmen in the Fall of 1986, the largest freshman class in the history of the University. In fact, the increased percentage of students who accepted our offer of admission resulted in some uncomfortable overcrowding on campus.

Several major changes took place in the academic program in 1986. The University completed the implementation of a new semester calendar, revised and updated degree programs, and a rigorous general studies requirement for all students. The new Core curriculum is designed to give each student a broad liberal education with emphasis on values, humankind's rich heritage, science, the humanities, the social sciences, and the fine arts. All Susquehanna students must now study a foreign language and achieve basic skills in writing, mathematics, library research, and computer literacy. A major grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities is helping in the implementation of the new curriculum.

During 1986 we completed a three-year project supported by the Pew Memorial Trust to integrate micro-computer use throughout our curriculum. An integrated telecommunications system was installed, providing voice and data transmission capability to all campus facilities, including individual dormitory rooms.

Significant progress also has been made in strengthening the financial base to the University. Since 1981, total giving to the University has more than doubled, from \$1.12 million in 1981 to \$2.35 million in 1986. And in the same time, endowment has more than tripled, moving from \$2.64 million in 1981 to \$8.81 million in 1986.

The University successfully met two challenge grants, raising \$600,000 to match a \$200,000 challenge from the National Endowment for the Humanities and \$200,000 to match a \$100,000 challenge from Lutheran Brotherhood.

With prudent financial management, the University continued to operate within a budget, and we made continuing visible improvements in the physical plant.

The faculty has continued its strong record of dedicated teaching, and gained added regional and national recognition for significant scholarship and professional achievement.

The future brings Susquehanna new challenges. The demographic changes of the next six years will heighten competition among fine colleges and universities. In the planning study which was completed in the spring of 1986, the Board of Directors affirmed the University's commitment to the strategy of pursuing high quality above all else.

As we begin our 130th year, Susquehanna strives for a vision which includes a program of international studies integrated with many disciplines; the effective teaching of critical thinking and writing across the curriculum; a Sigmund Weis School known widely as an outstanding undergraduate school of business; widespread computer use and applications in teaching; a well regarded School of Fine Arts and Communications including a music program which extends Susquehanna's tradition of outstanding performance and preparation; strong programs in the School of Arts and Sciences including the life sciences, preprofessional programs, computer sciences, English and foreign languages, a vital and widely recognized Honors Program, University Press, and Career Development and Placement Program; a

modern library which serves students and faculty with new technologies and increased connections to the curriculum of the University; and a continuing strong program of intercollegiate athletics.

To realize this vision, Susquehanna's endowment and the Susquehanna University Fund must continue to grow. We must continue to improve faculty salaries and provide enhanced financial aid to students. And, while we take pride in the beauty of the present campus, we must begin to plan for new additions, including a new fine arts building, new science facilities, and significant library, classroom, and residence hall renovations.

The progress of Susquehanna has resulted in great measure from the generosity of those who are recognized in this report; its future is based on the strength so many have made possible. The University is indebted to you, and all of us who love Susquehanna are deeply grateful.

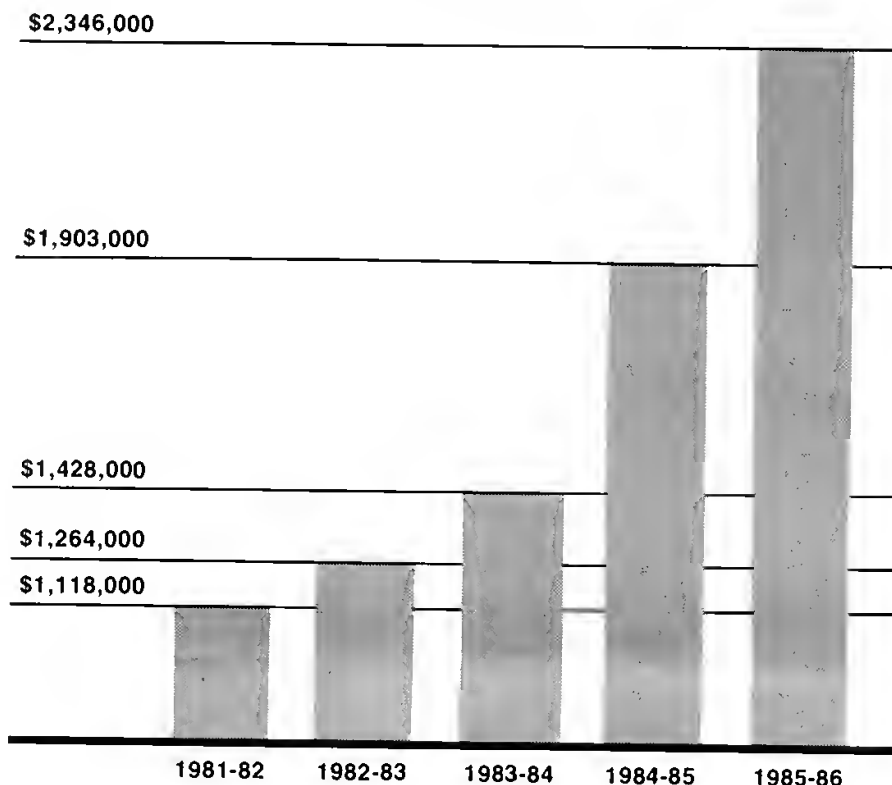


A Strong Financial Base

Total Giving to Susquehanna 1981-1986

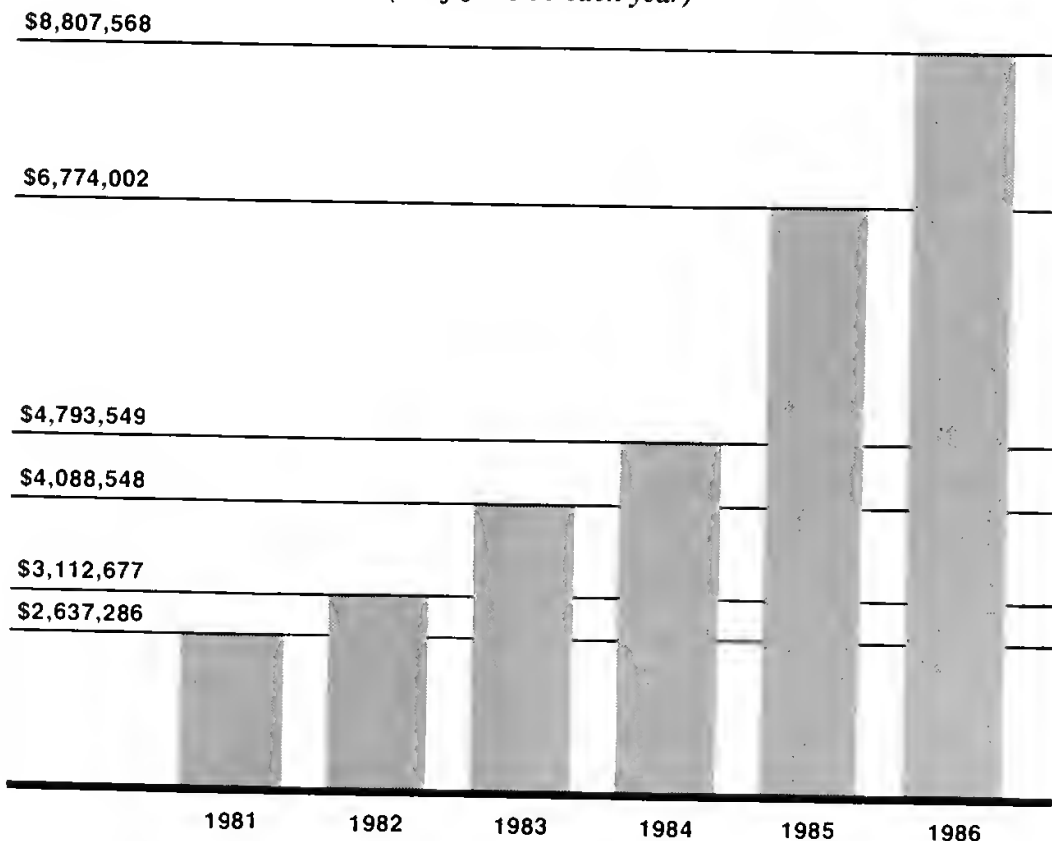
(as of June 30 each year)

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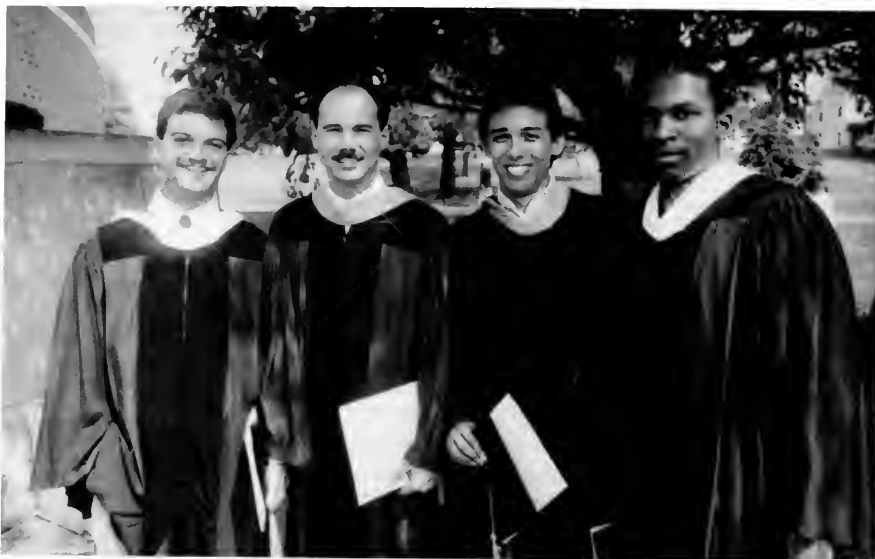

Acting on unusually positive results of a feasibility study, the Susquehanna University Board of Directors has launched a two-year capital campaign for endowment and campus needs. The campaign theme is "Window of Opportunity: The Campaign for Susquehanna."

The University has identified a preliminary list of funding priorities totaling \$20 million. However, the board has deferred setting a campaign goal until board members and other key potential contributors have been contacted. The list is to be finalized by early 1988.

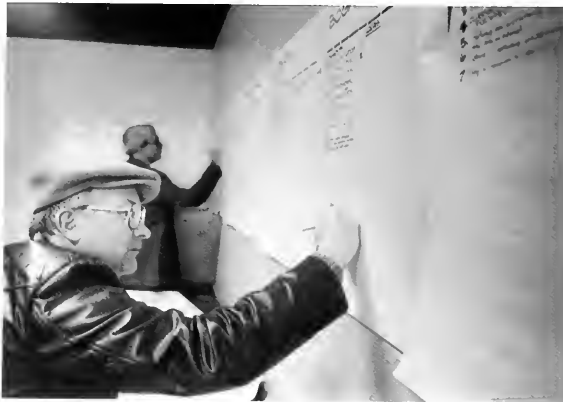
The campaign is expected to extend through the spring of 1989 according to a timeline which allows for participation by all Susquehanna University constituencies.

"In this increasingly competitive world, our 'list of needs' must be met if we are to meet the challenge of providing the highest quality of education in order to recruit and retain the most able of students," said Board Chair Harold O'Connor. "Our investment is in developing 'excellence of mind' of our young people. They are our future. There cannot be a more important task."

Susquehanna already has begun enlisting campaign leadership from its Board of Directors so that Board and other advance gift solicitations could begin this summer.

Robert F. Weis, vice president and treasurer of Weis Markets Incorporated, will serve as Steering Committee Chair.

serve as Honorary Campaign Chairs. They are Helen Decker Blough, wife of the late Roger M. Blough '25, and Charles Degenstein, retired Weis Markets Executive. Mrs. Blough will be continuing the legacy set forth by her husband who was honorary chair for "A Signpost for the Seventies" campaign.

Larry Isaacs '43, retired executive vice president for Federated Department Stores, Incorporated, will serve as National Campaign Chair.

O'Connor, retired president of Chemcut Corporation/Subsidiary of Schering AG, West Berlin, will lead Board Solicitation.

Sam Ross '54, president-elect of Pennsylvania Blue Shield, will serve as Major Gifts Chair.

Doug Arthur '49, retired vice president and regional manager for Nationwide Insurance Company, will be Planned Gifts Chair.

Susquehanna, its administration and board of directors, and a capital campaign to meet identified needs.

Ralph Wolfe, senior vice president for Marts and Lundy, said in his 24 years with the firm he has never seen a survey produce such uniformly positive results.

Endowment for scholarships, faculty development and library needs received overwhelming support while building renovations of residence halls, instructional facilities and the library were perceived as the most important physical plant projects.

Alumni and friends of Susquehanna will be kept informed of campaign progress through a newsletter which is to begin publication this fall.

The Susquehanna University Fund, the annual campaign which supports student financial aid, faculty recruitment, programs and facilities, will continue as a separate fund raising effort throughout the campaign.

"Annual giving to Susquehanna will continue to be a vital source to help the University bridge the gap between tuition revenue and the actual cost of a Susquehanna education," Cunningham said. "Because the identified needs are over and above the ongoing operation of Susquehanna, the SUF remains irreplaceable in maintaining the financial health of the University. We hope that our friends will respond when they are solicited for the campaign in addition to their annual gift."

Architects Assess Campus Needs

After thoroughly examining the campus, architects say that Susquehanna University has a strong foundation for planning facilities which will meet the educational needs of the next decade.

A team of architects from Spillman Farmer Architects of Bethlehem, PA recently completed a three-month facilities study of the Susquehanna campus. Susquehanna commissioned the study in early 1987 to get an overview of facilities in order to develop plans for enhancing the campus.

"The facilities study is a conceptual development plan to help the University develop obtainable goals for campus renewal and to meet educational needs and objectives," said Bob Spillman, project leader.

Spillman and two architects walked the campus, inspected facilities, studied the University strategic plan, and met with faculty, staff, students, and administrators to get a sense of uses and needs.

In his preliminary report to the University, Spillman praised the University for the effectiveness of its external maintenance program and cited the beauty of the campus as a special strength. The architects also found that the 191-acre campus supports Susquehanna's concept of a small university within the context of a basic liberal arts curriculum. While there are three separate schools, Spillman wrote, it is apparent that the campus promotes interaction between students and faculty of the various disciplines.

The layout of the campus can be compared to an axis with the Blough Learning Center on one end and the Degenstein Campus Center on the opposite end. Between the two lie general classroom

buildings which serve most disciplines. Faculty offices interspersed in the buildings have resulted in "positive and casual faculty-student relationships," Spillman said.

"This facilities plan encourages continuing this relationship and stresses the refurbishing of general classroom space," Spillman stated. "The fact that the exteriors of most buildings are in very good condition means that dollars spent on renovations will specifically enhance the academic program."

Preservation of open campus space also will inspire future design, architects said. Other recommended changes will improve the physical beauty of the campus, the safety of Susquehanna students, and traffic and parking for students, faculty, and visitors.

From their research, architects identified six major needs:

- To refurbish four of the University's seven residence halls.
- To renovate the Blough Learning Center.
- To renovate Bogar and Steele halls.
- To renovate and develop science facilities.
- To construct a new fine arts facility.
- To renovate Selingsgrove Hall as a historic landmark.

Plans and cost estimates are now being prepared for each area.

SUF Hits Record

It has been another outstanding year for the Susquehanna University Fund. On June 30, as the 1986-87 campaign came to a close, National Committee on Annual Giving Chairperson Samuel D. Ross '54, reported an all-time record total of \$833,664. This represents an increase of \$108,664 over the \$725,000 goal and \$193,664 more than last year's results. A record breaking 35 percent of Susquehanna's alumni body made contributions totaling \$342,013 to help make the campaign a success.

New Geology Majors

Susquehanna University has announced the development of two academic programs to deal with today's environmental issues. Through revision of its geoscience major and the design of a new environmental science major, the programs will better prepare students for future professions. The plan will be implemented within the next two years.

The two courses of study will be aimed at developing the skills and competencies required by potential employers. The programs will also offer students in other disciplines such as chemistry, biology and physics the opportunity to apply their studies to environmental problems and expand their career choices.

"Our new majors will prepare students for a variety of professions in resource development and conservation, pollution control, and environmental health and safety," said Dr. Robert Goodspeed, head of the department of geological and environmental science. "We geared the programs for what will be happening in the 1990s and beyond."

Geoscience is the study of the physical and chemical components and processes which make up the earth. Its aim is the understanding of how the earth responds to the sources of available energy and how human activities affect and, in turn, are affected by geologic processes. It encompasses such issues as the exploration for mineral, energy and water resources; planning for effective land use; and reclamation of regions damaged by human use.

Environmental science students study the natural processes which together form the earth system of air,

land, energy and life. They explore how humans affect and are affected by the environment. Issues such as pollution, land use and natural hazards are also included.

Students Make a Splash

With determination, hard work, and patience, the Susquehanna Crew Club has brought the sport to the University in style, entering novice level competition after only two weeks on the water. The group has been granted official club status by the Student Government Association for the 1987-88 year, and 40 active members have hit the water rowing.

The University was represented in the Bucknell Invitational race on the Susquehanna River this spring by two eight-man boats and one eight-woman boat. Sixteen members have also been taught to skull (row with two oars) by Coach Gerald Reisinger. Reisinger's credentials include serving as trainer for the 1986 Olympic women's crew team.

Under Reisinger's direction, the Susquehanna Crew Club members will continue to row and condition this summer under a strict weightlifting and running program. The students will return two weeks before fall semester begins for additional training.

"Susquehanna is gifted with really enthusiastic students," Reisinger said. "I've never met a more spirited and dedicated group. Susquehanna should be very proud of them for doing this on their own initiative."

Because founding members of the group are primarily freshmen and sophomores, expectations are high for the coming year. Coach Reisinger believes the club has a good foundation. The club hopes to race in Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. as well as make a trip to South Carolina and Florida over the 1988 spring break to compete with southern schools.

Sports

Big MAC Attack

The Susquehanna spring sports season featured a pair of school records for the baseball team and a men's tennis championship. In addition, the men's track squad went undefeated for the eighth consecutive year and the fastest Crusader runner won another national title.

Baseball

On the baseball diamond, the Crusaders finished 18-14, a Susquehanna high for wins in a season. The 205 runs scored by the team is also a Susquehanna seasonal record. The Crusaders just missed winning their third consecutive Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC)-Northwest League title. Susquehanna dropped a dramatic 11-10 decision to Elizabethtown in a one-game playoff after the teams tied for the league lead with 9-3 records.

Earning the squad's Most Valuable Player award was leftfielder and co-captain Tom Smith '87 of Altoona, PA, who hit .352 with six doubles, two home runs and 20 runs batted in. Centerfielder Jeff Cole '88 of Seymour, CT was selected to the MAC-Northern Division All-Star first team for the second straight season. Cole was second among the Crusaders with a .366 batting average, 30 hits, 23 runs scored, and seven doubles. He also tied for the team lead in triples with two.

Scott Krzykowski '88 of New City, NY was Susquehanna's top pitcher, as he led the staff with 12 appearances, five complete games and five wins. The righthander lost just one game and posted the lowest earned run average among the Crusader hurlers at 1.53 over 47 innings. He struck out 33 batters while allowing just 10 walks.

Men's Tennis

The men's tennis team captured its fourth straight MAC-Northwest League title and went on to claim the first Northern Division crown in school history with a 5-1 victory over Drew University in the championship match. Head coach Gary Fincke has directed his teams to a 45-19 record over the past five years, including this season's 10-5 mark.

Leading Susquehanna in singles play were team captain Pat Sterrett '87 of Baltimore, MD and Paul Sultan '88 of Flanders, NJ. Most Valuable Player Sterrett achieved a 12-3 record at second singles. Sultan posted an identical record in the fourth, fifth and sixth spots.

Sterrett was a member of the team's best doubles pair, winning eight of 11 matches in the first slot with Chris Biddle '90 of Flourtown, PA.

Women's Tennis

The Susquehanna women's tennis team won four of its last five matches to conclude its fifth consecutive winning season and 11th in the last 12 years with a 7-5 record. Captain Marge Guckes '87 of West Chester, PA earned Most Valuable Player honors for her impressive 11-1 singles mark.



Ruth Jones of Baltimore, MD, was selected as the *Outstanding Senior Female Athlete*, an award sponsored by the Association for Women Students. Jones was a three-time winner of the *Outstanding Field Athlete* honor for the Crusader women's track squad and earned the *Most Improved Swimmer* designation for the 1984-85 season.



Tom Shoemaker was the 1987 recipient of the *Blair Heaton Memorial Award*. The honor is named for the 1942 Susquehanna graduate who starred in football and track and later coached the Crusaders in both sports before his death in 1960 at the age of 41.

Shoemaker, a Collingdale, PA, resident, was a three-year letter-winner in football. The offensive guard was a 1986 co-captain and was selected to the *Middle Atlantic Conference All-Star* first team and the *Football News Division III All-American Team* as an honorable mention pick.

Softball

The Crusader softballers had trouble holding down the opposition as they struggled through a 7-20 season. Kim Kapes '90 of Tresckow, PA was the team's offensive

leader with 23 hits, 16 runs batted in, and a .359 batting average. She earned a spot on the MAC-North All-Star Team.

Women's Track

A small but devoted group of women's track athletes hustled their way to a 4-2 finish. Jim Taylor, who has coached the men's team throughout its eight-year winning streak, also assumed the women's head coaching position this year. He was down to eight healthy athletes after losing captain Denaee Schoner '87 of Dallas, PA, who sprained a knee in the season-opening Susquehanna University Invitational and missed the remainder of the campaign.

Candy Lain '88 of Sussex, NJ was named the team's Outstanding Runner. She placed third at the MAC affair in the 400-meter hurdles and fourth in the 100-meter hurdles. Robena Reaid '87 of Chambersburg, PA was a track team member for the first time and responded with a fifth-place finish in the MAC 400-meter dash.

Men's Track

'Selling' Susquehanna is Easy for Sam

SINCE THE EARLY 1950's, SAM ROSS HAS BEEN championing Susquehanna University to anyone who would listen.

"When I came to Susquehanna, I had no specific career path in mind. I just wanted to go some place where I could learn about a lot of things that interested me. I also wanted to be a part of a community," Ross said.

"What I found at this small, liberal arts, church-related university were faculty members who wanted to teach, who cared about students as individuals, and were willing to give me the personal attention I needed. I can't think of another institution of higher learning where I could have spent four happier or more productive years."

Ross earned his B.A. in 1954. He served in student government, the inter-fraternity senate, as president of Theta Chi, vice president of his junior class, and he lettered in varsity baseball and football, captaining both sports in his senior year.

"Amos Alonzo Stagg, Jr. was our football coach and a real gentleman," Ross said. "His father, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Sr., was perhaps the most famous coach in America during the first half of this century. As I recall, he had just retired from the College of the Pacific and decided to give his son a hand at Susquehanna. It was an honor--and an educational experience--to play for this great father and son team. They taught their players about football and about life."

In 1973 Sam Ross was first elected to the University's Board of Directors as an alumni representative. He continues to serve on the Board today and is a member of its Executive Committee. He is Chairman of the Development and Public Relations Committee and is a member of the Planning and Priorities Committee. He also chaired the 1986/1987 Annual SUF Campaign.

Telling the Susquehanna University story to potential contributors--foundations and corporations--is important and relatively easy, according to Sam Ross. "I want our Susquehanna traditions to continue and I want them to be relevant in today's environment. That takes money. One of my jobs is to try to connect the University and leaders of the private sector, and convince them that Susquehanna is unique and worthy of their interests and support."

Ross uses his contacts to help raise funds for Susquehanna. Soon, his position should be even more advantageous. He has just recently been named executive vice president and president-elect of the state's largest health care insurer, Pennsylvania Blue Shield.

HEADING THE NATION'S BIGGEST BLUE SHIELD will require much of his time. The Harrisburg-located company insures 6 million Pennsylvanians, provides Medicare services for citizens of Pennsylvania, Delaware and the Metropolitan Area of Washington, D.C. and had 1986 revenues of more than \$3 billion. Blue Shield employs 3,800 people.

"I have been extremely fortunate," Ross says. "And much of that good fortune can be traced back to the University. I want Susquehanna to continue to be available to young people who need a small, church-related university that provides a liberal education

and a sense of belonging, caring and accomplishment. That's what I found and what I hope to help pass on to future Susquehanna students."

John H. Updike, Pulitzer prize-winning writer and Pennsylvania native, Doctor of Letters;

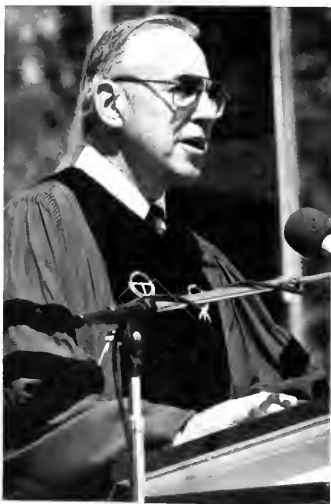
A. Donald Main, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Sunbury, Doctor of Divinity;

Capt. James A. Lovell Jr.

Lovell, the Apollo 8 navigator of the first voyage to the moon and the first person to visit the Moon twice, served as Commencement speaker.

Lovell joined the space program in 1962 after serving as a naval aviator and test pilot and executing commands in the Gemini mission program, including the historic Gemini 7 flight, which saw the first rendezvous of two manned spacecraft.

At the close of the Gemini program, Lovell became navigator for the Apollo 8 mission, during which he and his crew became the first humans to leave the earth's gravitational force. Lovell held the record for time in

space with 715 hours and 5 minutes; a record which has only been surpassed by the Skylab missions.

In 1973 Lovell left the space program to enter private enterprise. He is currently executive vice president for the Centel Corporation where he oversees human resources, corporate communications, investor and government relations and technical planning. He is also president of Centel Communications.

A native of Cleveland, Lovell is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, the U.S. Naval Academy, the University of Southern California, and the Harvard Business School's advanced management program.

Updike, a native of Shillington, "is Pennsylvania's most prestigious living writer," according to *Apprise* magazine. Although he has spent most of his adult life outside Pennsylvania, Updike has remained loyal to his home state and friends like F. (Rudy) Gelnett '37 who taught Updike at Shillington High School.

Updike is a 1954 summa cum laude graduate of Harvard College. He now lives in Massachusetts.

Main, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Sunbury since 1979, has been at the forefront of activity in the Central Pennsylvania Synod. He is currently chairman of the synod's executive board and dean of the Sunbury district.

Main was recently named bishop of the Upper Susquehanna Synod for the newly formed ELCA.

A native of Frederick, MD, Main is a graduate of Gettysburg College and Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg. Prior to Zion Lutheran Church, he served as intern at Messiah Lutheran Church in Decatur, GA from 1967-68 and pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church in Altoona, PA from 1969-79.

Commencement address:

James A. Lovell Jr.,

Former astronaut and corporate executive

Graduation day is always a happy time, filled with mixed emotions. It's a time to reflect on what we have learned and to feel a sense of accomplishment. A time to say goodbye for now to friends we've made, and to vow to keep in touch and see that our paths cross again. A time to briefly rejoin our families, even to sleep late for a day or two, while we think about the future and putting our newly acquired knowledge to work.

I'm sure that you have found, as I have observed, that the end of one experience is always the beginning of another...for education is much like success. It is in reality a journey, not just a destination.

You'll begin your experience in a very exciting and challenging period of world history. Modern technology is revolutionizing the world. In fact, the imbalance between the rapid rate of scientific discovery on one hand and the slow social maturing of our society on the other is creating an unstable world. Our nation has entered a period of time in which survival requires rapid adjustment, difficult and new decisions, and great risk. It is a period that cries for effective leadership. In short, the world is full of opportunities for those who want to better it, and I hope those of you here today will take up that challenge.

Modern technology gives us the capacity for envisioning the future. But it is our sense of principle and morality that will be critical to shaping that future. The unique combination of liberal arts education and career preparation taught here at Susquehanna University are the disciplines that develop the ability to think critically and independently on the basis of informed and balanced judgment.

It is with great pride, therefore, that I congratulate you young graduates. I have the greatest confidence that you are capable of meeting the challenges of this and

the 21st Century.

When I say challenge, I mean some of the problems that face us—for example, the population explosion. Two-thirds of the people on earth are poor, hungry and undernourished because we cannot keep up with the expanding population. Yet it is estimated that by the year 2000, there will be more than 1½ times as many people on this tiny planet, just 13 years away. Although the United States itself is approaching zero population growth, calling the population explosion a problem of the underdeveloped nations is like saying to a shipmate, "Your end of the boat is sinking."

I mention the population rise because it creates all sorts of corollary crises to challenge your talents. In the last 30 years, the world has consumed more of its nonrenewable resources than since man came into being. None of us realized how serious this could be until the gas pump went dry in the middle 1970s. And although there is now a temporary oil glut, creating new sources of energy and developing methods to conserve those we have today, could be a challenge for many of you.

Hand in hand with the population also comes, of course, pollution. It is not a surprise, therefore, that overwhelming pollution is not a figment of a few isolated environmentalists, but a real potential catastrophe. For example, the oceans are literally in danger of dying. Pollutants washed into seas by rainwater have drastically diminished marine life in the last 20 years. And look at the recent concern over acid rain and its effect on vegetation.

Improving the quality of life here on earth is one of the principal concerns of today's society. To achieve this improvement will require all the management, education, political and scientific technical skills this country can muster. It is not enough just to follow what

men before you have done. You must seek new frontiers if you are to solve these challenges of today. The first step is to put to work the education you have acquired here. In too many instances, an educational institution has become like the lamppost on which the drunk leans for support, having no interest in its light.

So it is with many people that consider their academic achievements just another pin in the calendar of life.

But an education is not enough. You must mix in a little foresight. Now what do I mean by foresight? I can best explain it by quoting a most unlikely source, a friend of my son's when he was young. Perhaps you know him: Dr. Seuss. And although he writes for children, this paragraph has meaning for all and it goes something like this:

"Said Conrad Cornelius o'Donnell o'Dell, my very young friend who is learning to spell: 'The A is for Ape. And the B is for Bear. The C is for Camel. The H is for Hare. Through to Z, for Z is for Zebra. I know them all well,' said Conrad Cornelius o'Donnell o'Dell. 'From beginning to end. From the start to the close. Because Z is as far as the alphabet goes.' Then he almost fell flat on his face on the floor, when I picked up the chalk and drew one letter more! In the places I go there are things that I see that I never could spell if I stopped with a Z."

Most of the world has resisted looking beyond Z to the bitter end. Every major advancement of civilization has met with extreme resistance. I think society's outlook on change is aptly described by Arthur Clark, a distinguished British physicist and science fiction author. He said there are three phases of a good idea. Phase One: That's stupid, impossible; don't waste your time. Phase Two: It's possible, but not worth doing. And Phase Three: I always said it was a good idea.

The story is full of examples where this is so. Listen to



the comments made by famous people who could not see beyond Z. In 1899, Charles Duell, the director of the U.S. Patent Office said, "Everything that can be invented, has been invented." Not long after, in 1905, President Grover Cleveland uttered this gross misconception: "Sensible and responsible women do not want the vote." Scientist and Nobel Prize winner in physics, Robert Millikan should have known better when he stated that, in 1923, "There is no likelihood that man can ever tap the power of the atom." These quotes came from a recent TRW company ad called, "The Future Isn't What It Used To Be."

In my own field, as late as 1953, Kenneth Gatland wrote in the British Interplanetary Society Journal: "Whereas it would be possible for a pilotless rocket to escape from the earth and reach the moon, the same cannot be said of a man-carrying spaceship. The power requirements are so great that nothing short of applied form of atomic energy will ever be used."

And thank goodness he was wrong. Fortunately, there were those in days gone by who refused to live in the A to Z world. They wanted to see what was beyond Z. Imagine the world we would live in if men such as Socrates, Columbus, Ericson, Magellan, Einstein, Pasteur, Sagan and countless others had decided not to expand their horizons. In the space program, we try to use foresight to think beyond Z. Twenty-six years ago the first American ventured into space, but there were those, in spite of Mr. Gatland, who dreamed of going to the moon.

These dreams have come true and have yielded to man not just something to talk about but benefits both economical and spiritual which are beyond value. I have seen what foresight or thinking beyond Z has accomplished in the science of space. But each of you,

in your own particular field, can also think beyond Z. You can dream and create and make your contribution to the future of mankind in this world.

It will not always be clear that a plan or knowledge and foresight will produce immediate results. There is a shortsighted tendency in all of us to cancel our long-range goal if we cannot see immediate returns.

But we must commit ourselves to long-range goals if we are to succeed. It is up to us to build a better America and a better world. You'll be amazed at what you can do.

My mother could hardly believe that I circled the moon in 1968. But today, my 21-year-old son doesn't think it's any big deal because, after all, we've been doing it as long as he can remember. Your children and mine will stand on a higher hill because of the mountains we have climbed. And the whole world benefits from their ready acceptance of it. If they could take our accomplishment as commonplace, then think of the new horizons they can see beyond. From their vantage point, their education and imagination will carry them to places which we won't believe possible.

Every generation has the obligation to free men's minds for a look at new worlds, to look out from a higher plateau than the last generation. Our vision is limited, not by what our eye can see, but what our mind can imagine if we would only go beyond Z.

On a personal point of view, I can remember quite vividly the doubting Thomases among the medical profession as Frank Borman and I prepared for our very first flight. It was Gemini 7, a two-week flight in 1965 to determine the effects on man after 14 days in a zero gravity environment. Most of the doctors we talked to, including those assigned to NASA, doubted we could last two weeks and felt we were foolish even to train for

such a mission. You know the results. Not only did we survive, but we came back in fairly good shape. Now man has lasted for over eight months in space.

A moment ago, I said it was up to all of us to build a better world, and I really meant that. When I circled the moon and looked back at the Earth, my outlook on life and my viewpoint of Earth changed. By holding up my thumb at arm's length, I could completely block out our planet, and I suddenly realized how insignificant we are.

My impression of the Earth was one of an incredibly beautiful blue and white ball, much like a Christmas tree ornament, hung in an absolutely black sky. You could see the blue of the water, the white of the clouds. You don't see Selinsgrove, you don't see Chicago, or even New York. You don't see boundaries or people, no whites or blacks, French, Greeks, Christians or Jews. The Earth was completely uninhabited. And yet you know on that Spaceship Earth, there live 3½ billion astronauts, all seeking the same things from life.

When viewed in total, the Earth is a spaceship, just like Apollo, with a closed ecological system. We are all the crew of the Spaceship Earth, and just like Apollo, the crew must learn to live and work together. We must learn to manage the resources of this closed system with new imagination. The future is up to you.

Just look beyond Z and try to remember occasionally the words said to Conrad Cornelius o'Donnell o'Dell, who almost fell flat on his face on the floor when his friend picked up the chalk and drew one letter more: "In the places I go, there are things that I see, that I never could spell if I stopped with a Z."

The 1986-87 Report of Donors reflects the commitment of alumni, friends, faculty, staff, and students to move Susquehanna

University closer toward that vision.

For the first time in University history, total giving to the University topped the \$3 million mark. Total giving for 1986-87 increased 38 percent to \$3,244,743, compared to \$2,346,418 in 1985-86.

"The remarkable loyalty shown by our alumni and friends is helping Susquehanna to insure its future as an institution of high quality for many years to come," President Cunningham said.

Outstanding increases were noted in the Susquehanna University Fund, an annual fund which helps the University provide student financial aid, attract innovative teachers and scholars, and offer strong programs and facilities.

Contributions to the SUF for 1986-87

increased 29 percent in one year, totaling \$827,845 and exceeding its goal of \$725,000. Contributions to the SUF in 1985-86 totaled \$640,445. More than 36 percent of Susquehanna's 10,200 alumni contributed to the SUF, exceeding the national average of 22.6 percent.

Susquehanna's successful development effort represents five years of exceptional growth. Total giving in 1981-82 totaled \$1,118,000 compared to \$3,244,743 for 1986-87.

This progress was made possible with the time and support of our volunteer leaders who encouraged others to invest in the advancement of Susquehanna.

The 1986-87 leadership included: Samuel D. Ross '54, National Committee on Annual Giving; E. Raymond Shaheen '37, 50th Reunion Gift Committee; Fred W. 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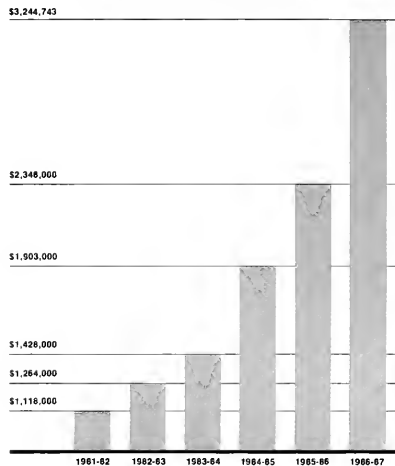

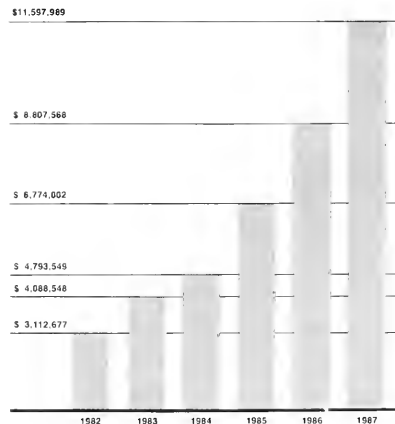
Total Giving to Susquehanna

Giving to the University reached another all-time record of more than \$3.2 million; endowment rose by more than 30 percent to more than \$11.5 million.

Your support is enabling Susquehanna to provide a quality education that emphasizes values and prepares young men and women for leadership and service in this country and world.

I am pleased to report some of the major accomplishments:

➤ Susquehanna was the only U.S. college or university to be recognized by President Reagan for outstanding community service through his program

for Private Sector Initiatives. Susquehanna received a presidential citation for the contributions made by our students in service to the community through our Project House System.

➤ In late spring, Susquehanna was represented at the first National Conference on Undergraduate Research when three students were selected to present papers.

➤ Alumni and friends everywhere saw Susquehanna's name in the sports news as the 1986 football squad drew national attention by reaching the quarterfinals of the Division III championship playoffs of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The football team also enjoyed its first 10-0 regular season in its 88-year history.

➤ Student Mike Spangler brought laurels back to campus as he won the 400-meter race during the national Division III track championships, his third title in as many years as a Susquehanna runner.

➤ Faculty and administrators also achieved special success during 1986-87. Dr. Ronald Dotterer, associate professor of English and Honors Program director, was chosen as an American Council on Education fellow. Dr. Jeanne Neff, vice president for academic affairs, was named to lead the American Conference on Academic Deans. Dr. William A. Ward, visiting professor of management, was named an international officer and senior member of the International Council for Small Business. Carol J. Harrison, assistant professor of mathematical sciences, was selected for the Fulbright Exchange Program as a visiting scholar in Liberia. A Susquehanna University Press publication written by French professor Dr. Jack Kolbert was named as one of the Best Academic Books for 1986 by Choice magazine.

➤ Those faculty honored in 1986-87 include: Dr. Susan Bowers, assistant professor of English, who was awarded the Lindback Award for Distinguished Teaching; and Cyril Stretansky, assistant professor of music, who served as the John C. Horn Lecturer for scholarly endeavor and service to Susquehanna.


To support our planning efforts, Susquehanna has been awarded a highly competitive grant from the Consortium for the Advancement of Private Higher Education (CAPHE). Of the 300 institutions eligible for the grant, Susquehanna was among the 150 invited to apply and the 28 recipients. In the opinion of CAPHE, the recipients are "important to a geographical region, reflect diverse missions, are educationally and financially sound, and have strong leadership."

To ensure our continued success and accomplishment, the University Board of Directors has initiated plans for a major capital campaign. This decision was reached after extensive study of University needs by architects, faculty, administrators, and development consultants. The campaign, which will be conducted over the next two years, seeks to improve instructional and residential facilities for students as well as to build endowment, especially for scholarships and faculty development.

Susquehanna achieved a great deal in 1986-87, and we are optimistic and enthusiastic about the challenges and opportunities for the future.

Thank you again for your support. We are deeply grateful.

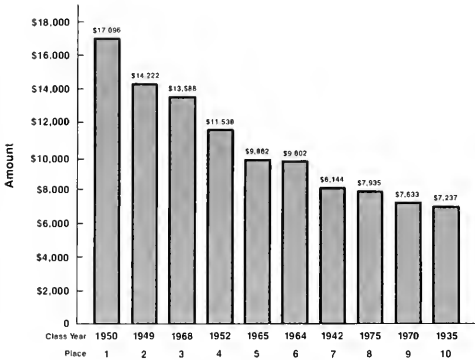

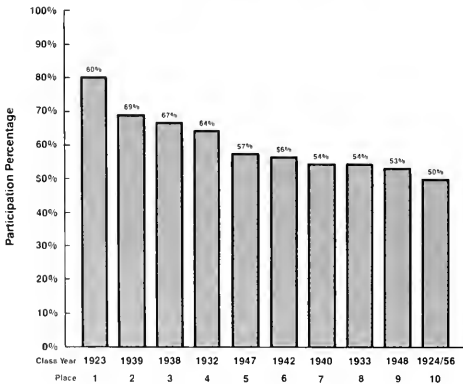

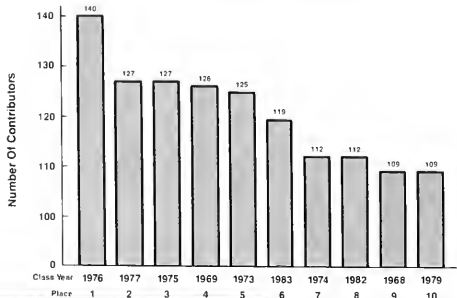
Top Ten Classes By Total Contribution To The SUF



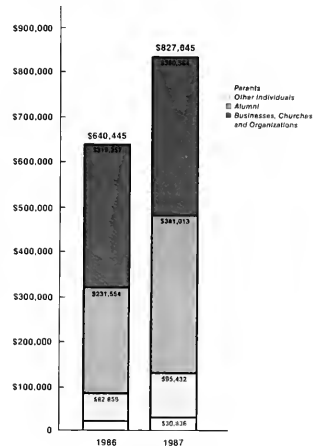
Top Ten Classes By Percentage Of Class Contributing To The SUF



Top Ten Classes By Number Of Contributors To The SUF

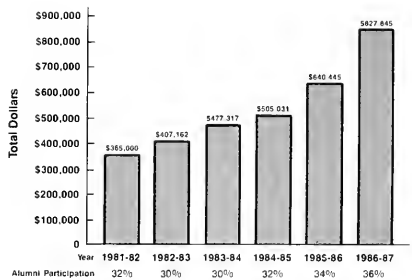


Who Contributes To The Susquehanna University Fund

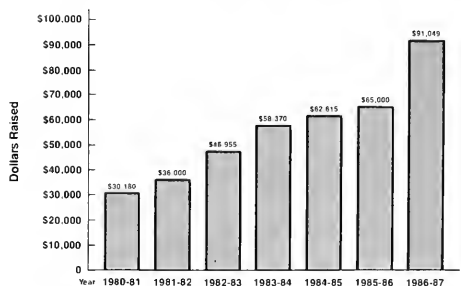

Dear SUF Supporters:

I've been a supporter of the Susquehanna University Fund for more years than I'd like to admit. But it has only been within the past few that I've come to truly appreciate what unrestricted gifts can mean.

If you've been back to campus recently, you probably understand what I'm talking about. The campus has never looked better. Admissions are approaching an all-time high. And the University's financial condition has never been stronger.

These accomplishments have been made possible in large part because of *you*—alumni, parents, and friends who are making a difference in Susquehanna's future, through your support of the Susquehanna University Fund.

Because of you, I am able to report yet another record-breaking year. As of June 30, 1987, the SUF exceeded its 1986-87 goal of \$725,000, by reaching a record total of \$827,845. This represents a 29% increase over 1985-86 totals of \$640,445. More importantly, alumni participation reached an all-time high of 36%, representing an increase of 290 new alumni donors.

and raised a total of \$91,049; and members of the Class of 1987, who under Jim Faust's leadership secured more than \$7,000 in gifts and pledges from classmates.

I also would like to recognize the efforts of the Class of 1937 who, under the leadership of Ray Shaheen, mounted Susquehanna's second 50th Reunion Gift Campaign, raising more than \$20,000 to permanently endow a scholarship.

But most importantly, I want to thank everyone whose name appears in the list that follows for responding positively to one of these volunteers.

Susquehanna has come a long way from the University I remember back in 1954... and I am especially proud of the progress we've made in the past five years. If Susquehanna is to continue this progress, it will require even more of what we are already doing... giving Susquehanna our best, both in terms of financial support, and energy and time.

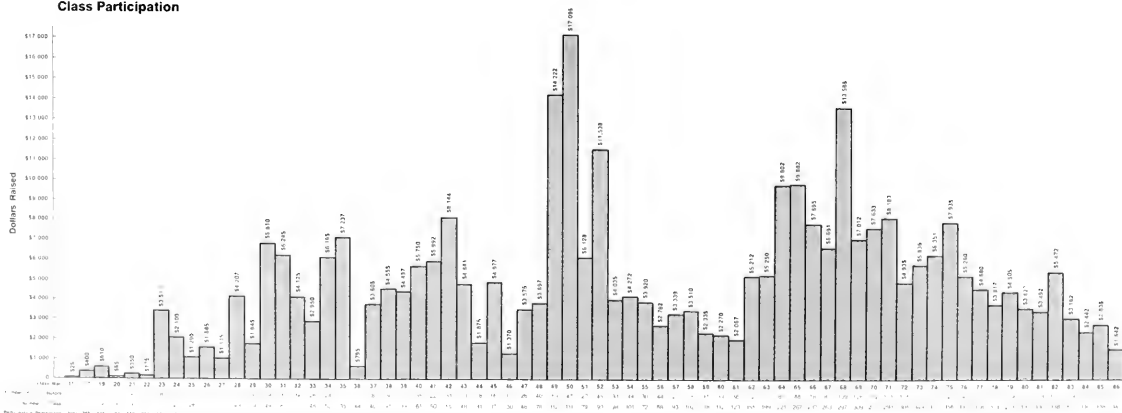

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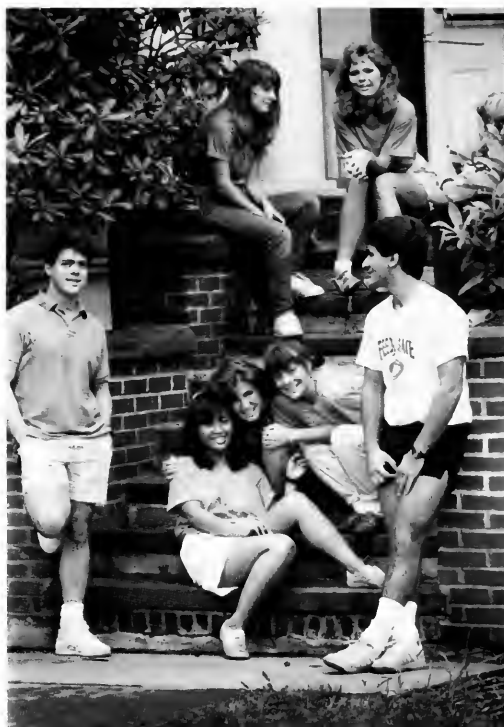

Parents Can Help Children Enjoy School

When it comes to preparing children for entering school, parents have plenty of homework to do.

Susquehanna professors say that children are more likely to excel if parents have prepared their children for learning and dealing with others.

"This is one of the first times when the child becomes more independent, when parents have to let go," says Dr. Barbara A. Lewis, associate professor of psychology and education. "Your child will never be totally yours again."

Parents often worry about if their children will cry or if they will fit in. "Instead they should be talking about this first day of a new experience," Lewis says.

Lewis suggests that parents talk positively but honestly to their children about going to school. "Children should know that they are going to school for a certain span of time, but that Mom will be back to get them," she recommends. Rather than spending time in the classroom, Lewis says it's better for parents to leave. Otherwise, Lewis says, a child is more likely to cling and cry when the parent leaves.

Giving children more opportunities for socializing before kindergarten will help them better relate with others, Lewis says.

The same goes for learning.

Both Lewis and Dr. Mark Dewalt, assistant professor of education, said children will be more likely to enjoy learning if parents show their excitement for learning.

Throughout the school year, Dewalt says it's important for parents to help their young students develop healthy work and play habits. He recommends:

- Children entering first grade should have 10 to 11 hours of rest to be alert in the classroom.
- Limit TV to an hour per day. "If you talk to teachers today, many will tell you that children are tired in school because they stay up late and watch television."
- Parents should become acquainted with the school principal, teacher, and secretary prior to the first day.

Dewalt said parents should ask the teacher when papers will be sent home, test days, and homework expectations. The principal will tell you how to handle problems when they arise, and the school secretary handles routine but important items such as sick calls, lunch money, and changes of address.

- Parents should make a special place for children to study. Children will then know "this is where I work, this is where my school things go," Dewalt says. "It gets children in the habit of studying."

When students fail to have such a place, Dewalt says they often forget their homework assignments until they are ready for school the next day.

- Parents should encourage children to do well in order to learn instead of good grades. "We do a good job of encouraging our children in sports, we should do the same in school," he says.
- Children should have time after school to exercise or to play. Dewalt recommends a break immediately after school so that children have a break before homework.



Japanese Learn About America 'Pennsylvania Style'

More than 25 Japanese college students came to Susquehanna this summer to learn about America—living in an American home, being part of an American family, speaking American English, and learning to appreciate our style of life and food—in Pennsylvania style.

The delegation of students attends Senshu University near Tokyo. Their itinerary also included viewing a farm auction, cheering for the Philadelphia Phillies, shopping at a supermarket and mall, celebrating Thanksgiving dinner, visiting the State Capitol, touring a medical center as well as Hershey Park.

Women's Auxiliary Celebrates 65 Years

1987 marks the 65th anniversary of the Women's Auxiliary of Susquehanna University, a celebration of loyalty and generosity to University.

University history indicates that, "with a mind and a will to work," the Ladies Auxiliary of Susquehanna came into being in 1922, developing "not only the comradeship of group activity but bringing a variety of high capabilities to the great purpose" of beautifying the campus. The idea of an auxiliary was introduced by Mrs. E. Edwin Sheldon, who was elected its first president.

Although it is today known as the Women's Auxiliary, the group maintains the same loyalty as its charter members.

Today the group numbers more than 2,000, including more than 1,000 members recruited through the Keywomen representatives. These 53 women recruit in church congregations within a 100-mile radius of Selinsgrove.

Women's Auxiliary contributions to the University have amounted to more than \$275,000 since the group's existence. Together they have supported endowments, scholarships, the study of theatre and music, including a major gift toward the purchase of the Horn Meditation Chapel organ.

Project Houses Win President Reagan's Praise

The Susquehanna University Project House System, a student volunteer project which has given more than 75,000 hours of service to the community, has been awarded a citation from President Reagan's Program for Private Sector Initiatives for outstanding community outreach. Susquehanna was the only higher education institution among the 100 recipients chosen from 1,000 nominees.

Earlier this year, Susquehanna had been notified it was being considered for the award.

The Project House System has served the University and the Selinsgrove area since 1976. Students request the privilege of living together on the basis of their common interest in an approved volunteer project of benefit to the University or community. This fall, more than 200 of Susquehanna's 1,400 students will be helping the area's elderly, scouts, church youth groups and the mentally handicapped; serving campus and community computer needs; promoting campus arts events; and developing a campus arboretum. Each student contributes at least two hours of service per week and maintains a personal journal on the experience.

The Project House System is relatively young compared to the history of volunteerism at Susquehanna. The University traces the spirit of community service back to 1859, when students built a wooden walkway from town to campus, with planks contributed by area residents. The spirit is still going strong, President Joel Cunningham said.

"We want Susquehanna to be a place where students and faculty are engaged in mutual research, discussion and exploration of ideas and the world around them," Cunningham said. "Student community service projects help students develop a respect for the world and people around them, and with this respect comes a genuine desire to improve the community in a very personal way."

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A Global View



When Lynda Butler graduates from Susquehanna this year, she knows that eventually her career could take her outside the United States.

Even if she stays in the U.S., chances are she will be dealing with international businesses. Throughout her career she will compete in

a job market with counterparts from foreign countries.

Today, more than ever, Susquehanna is focusing its efforts on preparing students like Lynda to deal effectively in a global society.

Susquehanna joins the ranks of educators and government officials who see the need to incorporate internationalism in its mission.

In 1986, the Southern Governors Association published a landmark report, *Cornerstone of Competition*, declaring that each day, the U.S. pays a political and economic price for its inability to understand and communicate with its global neighbors. Wesley Posvar, president of the University of Pittsburgh, wrote on the eve of his institution's bicentennial that "we enter our third century knowing that no university can claim to serve American students, American science, and American policy if it fails to incorporate internationalism at the core of its mission."

Susquehanna's strategic plan calls for developing a strong and comprehensive international program across the university's three schools and providing more international experiences for students and faculty.

Susquehanna has offered various international opportunities for many years. For more than 20 years, the Susquehanna at Oxford program has offered study abroad programs for students throughout the United States. Other programs offer study in Austria, Denmark, England, France, Germany, Great Britain, Japan, Latin America, Liberia, Mexico, Spain and Switzerland.

The curriculum offers a major in European Studies, a major and a minor in International Studies and a minor in International Diplomacy and Trade through the departments of History, Modern Languages, and Political Science. The Sigmund Weis School of Business and the Department of Modern Languages also recently launched a minor in International Business and Foreign Languages. And the Department of History continues to offer a course in Human Geography.

The core curriculum, implemented in 1985, requires all students to master a foreign language and to complete an area of concentration on Perspectives on the World.

Faculty bring international perspectives to the classroom through scholarship, travel and other professional experiences. Carol Harrison, assistant professor of mathematics, is spending a semester in Liberia as part of the Fulbright Exchange Program. Faculty such as management/mathematics professor Wallace Growney and assistant sociology professor N.J.C. Vasantkumar have conducted research in Japan. Natives of Belgium, Czechoslovakia, India,

Iran, Ireland, Japan, and Nigeria have joined the faculty in recent years.

Outside the classroom, there are other opportunities. The Project House System has offered an International House for both international and native students since its earliest days. Lunchtime language tables of faculty and students meet regularly. Conferences and special lectures addressing international issues and education are frequently held on campus. For the past two years, Susquehanna has welcomed Japanese students for extended visits.

Magazine Cites Susquehanna Among the Nation's Best

A recent *U.S. News and World Report* poll lists Susquehanna University among the top 10 percent of smaller comprehensive colleges in the United States.

Results of the national news magazine's survey of college presidents were reported in its October 26 issue featuring America's Best Colleges.

This is the second consecutive survey by *U.S. News and World Report* that has mentioned Susquehanna. In 1985, Susquehanna was named among the top smaller comprehensive colleges in the East.

Presidents of 170 comprehensive institutions were asked to consider strength of curriculum, quality of teaching, and the relationships between faculty and students.

Comprehensive colleges enroll between 1,500 and 2,500 students, offer a wide variety of liberal arts and professional courses, and award more than half their bachelor's degrees in two or more career-related fields, such as business.

The magazine reported that "...so strong is the philosophic hold of the liberal arts that even in this category, the colleges selected as the best by presidents completing the *U.S. News* poll were ones that emphasized the liberal arts and stressed moral values."

Respondents listed Susquehanna with Berea College of Kentucky, Gustavus Adolphus College of Minnesota, Whittier College of California, Augustana College of Illinois, Hood College of Maryland, William Jewell College of Missouri, Saint Mary's College of Indiana, College of St. Catherine of Minnesota, Millikin University of Illinois, Otterbein



College of Ohio, Illinois Wesleyan, Alfred University of New York, Whitworth College of Washington, Guilford College of North Carolina, Luther College of Iowa, and Mercer University of Georgia.

The language of friends

The cover story of this *Alumnus* features Susquehanna's increased commitment to international education.

Most people on campus will tell you that our commitment is vital if students are to succeed in their future professions. But they'll also tell you it is one that offers immeasurable rewards. Global understanding hits close to home.

Rarely a day passes that I'm not reminded of Miyuki, one of 26 Senshu University students who spent six weeks last summer studying English at Susquehanna. An important part of the visit is their time spent in homes of University faculty, staff and friends.

You might say that I was a reluctant volunteer to serve as a host. "Only if you're in a pinch," I told coordinator Jack Kolbert.

My attitude changed shortly after Miyuki bounded in my doorway. It's hard to say who learned more or laughed more.

I can still remember the store clerk's face when Miyuki bought 20 pairs of Reebok basketball socks (for her teammates) and proceeded to sign her traveler's check in Japanese.

During those 10 days, I saw my homeland through the eyes of a bright and beautiful Japanese woman who longs to live in America. She pointed out the beautiful sunsets that she can never see over the skyscrapers of Tokyo. On our long walks down Market Street to the Isle of Que, she called my attention to the friendly townspeople. She admired the beauty of agriculture and the Susquehanna. Her desire to gain command of the English language has since sparked a renewed interest in brushing up on my second language of Spanish or even taking up Japanese.

What all Miyuki learned, I'm not sure. As the days passed, she gained confidence speaking English. She became a popular person among the Selinsgrove Hall crowd. She enjoyed ordering from a

restaurant menu, learning folk dances, celebrating a special Thanksgiving dinner, watching the Phillies play ball, and even learning to make enchiladas.

Miyuki's presence has shaped my impression of Japan's hard working society. I think she helped me better understand why Lynda Butler and other students talk so excitedly about the new frontiers they've found.

Understanding our global neighbors is just the beginning to realizing opportunities at home.

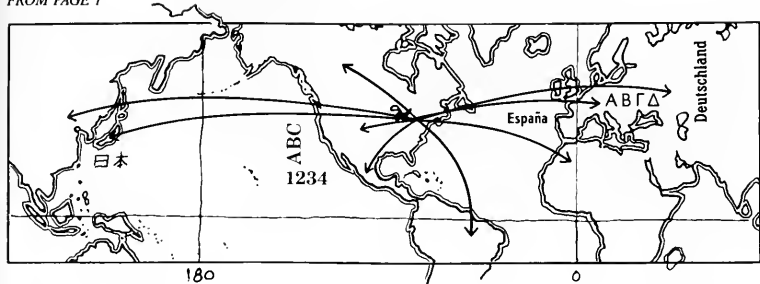

LLynda Butler (daughter of Les '62) is typical of the growing number of Susquehanna students who are seeking international opportunities to broaden their educations and, eventually, their careers.

An accounting major and German minor, she served a six-month internship last year in Heidelberg, Germany with international conglomerate Borg-Warner.

Borg-Warner handed Lynda some tall challenges as an intern. Although many employees spoke English, they were instructed to communicate to Lynda in German. Every two weeks she was transferred to a new department to learn new business procedures. By the time her internship ended, she worked in the purchasing, sales, computer processing, marketing and personnel departments.

"It took about a month before I felt really comfortable with the German (language)," she recalls.

"Education for an accounting major has to be more than debits and credits."

After office hours, Lynda says she found that her liberal arts courses helped her make friends.

"Europe, especially Germany, loves classical music, so my Introduction to Music class really helped. So did European history. . . . Education for an accounting major has to be more than debits and credits."

After graduation, Lynda is hoping to secure a position with a Big Eight accounting firm. Each of her six interviews to date has made Lynda realize that an international focus will set her apart in the crowded job market.

"The international experience really stands out on the resume," Butler says. "Each employer has asked right away about Germany. Employers see it as an asset. With more and more mergers happening, they're not just dealing with the United States anymore."

To help students make the most of the opportunities, Susquehanna introduces them to the idea of studying abroad early freshman year.

"When freshmen arrive for orientation, we tell them 'this is something you should be thinking about right away!'" says Jeanne Neff, vice president for academic affairs.

In the past five years, more than 160 students have studied in foreign countries.

Susquehanna's efforts to increase global understanding attracted modern languages Professor Jack Kolbert to Susquehanna in 1985.

Kolbert, former president of Monterey Language Institute, says the climate for broadening Susquehanna's international focus is right. Faculty and administrators' commitment to global understanding and the growing student interest are both assets.

"We've had an explosion of enrollment in the languages," Kolbert says. To meet student demand, instruction in Japanese and Italian were added to the curriculum this year; French, German, and Spanish are also taught. Since 1985, Kolbert says the modern languages faculty has nearly doubled.

"Japanese was chosen mainly because of the University's exchange agreement with Senshu University and the potential for cultural exchanges that the agreement offers," Kolbert says. "Japan also was a good choice because of our strong business school

and also because Japan is one of the great trading partners of the free world."

Instruction in Italian was prompted by requests from many of Susquehanna's students of Italian extract who wanted to learn the language of their ancestors.

"Italian, with French and German, are the three most important languages. It's a crossroads language that allows us to reach out and support instruction in the Fine Arts and History," Kolbert says.

Enrollments in both languages reached a maximum capacity for the first semester they were offered. Jeanne Neff, vice president for academic affairs, said that enrollment in next semester's intermediate level courses is expected to exceed preliminary estimates. More than half of those who enrolled in elementary courses will continue their studies.

"We're saying to students that to be successful in business, managers have to understand the international marketplace," says Carl Bellas, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business.

"It's nothing you have to force in the curriculum if you're aware of what's going on. We have to teach business from an international perspective," he says. "That's a statement of just how important we think it is."

Crusaders Dominate All-Stars

Susquehanna University dominated the 1987 Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) Football All-Star Squad with eight players named to the honorary first team.

Leading the list of Crusaders were All-American candidates Al Buccì '88, split end, Claymont, Del., Todd Coolidge '88, quarterback, Wellsboro, and Pete Stoma '88, center, Lyndhurst, N.J.

Also earning a spot on the first team were defensive lineman Damian Caracciolo '88 of Altoona, defensive end Rich Close '88 of Wyomissing, offensive lineman John Hopkins '89 of Wellsboro, fullback Cosmo Iacavazzi '89 of Belle Mead, N.J., and defensive back Clayton Smith '88 of Norristown.

Buccì set every receiving record at Susquehanna this past season. His 57 receptions for 893 yards and 13 touchdowns set single season records. Buccì also holds the record for scoring in a single season with 82 points to go with his career records for receptions (121) and reception yardage (1,944 yards).

"Al was a dominant force in the league as a receiver over the last several seasons," Crusader head coach Rocky Rees said. "He was extremely effective at finding the open area so we could get the ball to him."

A tri-captain, Coolidge holds every single season and career passing record at Susquehanna, compiling a 17-2 record as a starter. In just seven games this season, Coolidge completed 107 of 209 passes for 1,693 yards and 18 touchdowns. Coolidge missed the final three contests of the season after suffering a fractured right ankle against Widener University.

"We thought Todd was the finest quarterback in the last two seasons," Rees said. "However, the most important thing was that he lost only one game in the league."

Stoma was the unanimous choice at center for the second consecutive year. Stoma was the anchor of the Crusader offensive line and a tri-captain of this year's team.

"He's the best offensive lineman over the past two years in the league. He has all the physical ability and is also a very smart player on the field," Rees said.

Another second-year member of the All-Star team, Caracciolo was second on the Crusaders with 74 tackles from his nose position. He also registered five quarterback sacks and six tackles for losses of 23 yards, recovered a fumble, broke up a pass, and blocked a punt.

"Damian had command of the opposing offensive line, causing people to double-team him. He was outstanding the last two years."

Close was also selected to the team for the second year

after recording a team record of 85 tackles and eight sacks from his outside linebacker position. Close, a tri-captain, also broke up two passes, made nine tackles for loss and recovered a fumble.

"He was a great leader on and off the field and played the game as physically as anyone could play it," Rees said of Close.

In his first year as a starter, Hopkins teamed with Stoma to give the Orange and Maroon a solid offensive line. A back up nose tackle a year ago, Hopkins switched to the offensive line during the pre-season.

Rees said that Hopkins has an intensive attitude toward offensive football. "He played a very visible part in our offense as the pulling guard leading the sweep."

Iacavazzi topped Susquehanna's rushing attack with 602 yards on 108 carries and three touchdowns, including a 52-yard run against Upsala College. Iacavazzi also caught 14 passes for 153 yards and a touchdown from his fullback spot.

Rees praised Iacavazzi's progress as a runner and his "ability to make the big play."

Smith was second on the 1987 squad with four interceptions for his cornerback position. The senior also recorded 47 tackles (including four losses of seven yards), broke up five passes and recovered a fumble.

"Clayton had great ability to play man-to-man defense and still was able to support the corner against the run," Rees said.

In addition to the first team, two Crusaders received honorable mention status.

Defensive back Tim Fitzgerald '88 of Dunellen, N.J. had a team-high five interceptions for the season, including one he returned 49 yards for a touchdown

against Moravian College. His 141 return yards for interceptions ranks him third on Susquehanna's single season record list. He also made 54 tackles, broke three passes, recovered two fumbles, and made one tackle for loss.

Running back Joe Witt of Shamokin finished second in rushing among the Crusaders with 356 yards, and scored five rushing touchdowns. He managed the longest Crusader run this season when he raced 81 yards for a touchdown against Juniata College. His 17 receptions for 279 yards and a touchdown ranked him second on the squad in receiving and he averaged more than 20 yards per return on kickoffs.

Susquehanna University finished the 1987 football season with an 8-2 record and a 7-2 mark in the Middle Atlantic Conference. The Crusaders tied Widener University for the conference championship, becoming the first team to repeat as champion in the league's five-year existence. Susquehanna has won three MAC football championships to date.

Hall of Fame

Former Susquehanna University student athletes **Howard Baker '79** of Landisville, **Jeffrey Breed '71** of Lewisburg, **Louis Santangelo '50** of Hershey, and **Janeen Kruse Wadzita '79** of San Diego, Calif., have been inducted into the university's Sports Hall of Fame.

The four honorees were recognized during halftime ceremonies of the 1987 Homecoming football game on October 10. This induction brings the membership of the 20-year-old Sports Hall of Fame to 89.

Baker earned seven varsity letters in soccer and baseball at Susquehanna. He led the Crusaders' soccer defense, winning the team's Best Defensive Player Award three times and the Rookie of the Year Award as a freshman. Baker, a two-year co-captain, was named to the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC)-Northern Division All-Star second team twice and was a two-time honorable mention selection to the Division III All-New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware Team of the National Soccer Coaches Association.

Now general manager of the Four Seasons Sports Complex in Landisville, Baker earned a tryout with the Seattle Sounders of the now-defunct North American Soccer League. He also lettered three years with the Susquehanna baseball team.

Breed graduated from Susquehanna in 1971 after playing soccer and track for four years. Upon graduation, Breed held track records for the 440-yard intermediate hurdles, and was a member of the best 440-yard and mile relay teams in University history. He won the MAC intermediate hurdles title in 1971 and was a member of Susquehanna's MAC championship team in 1970. He also was right wing on the Susquehanna soccer squad.

Breed is president of Breed Financial Services in Lewisburg. In 1981, he entered the Hall of Fame with Fidelity Union Life Insurance for his business achievements.

Santangelo lettered four years in football under coaches Amos Alonzo Stagg, Sr. and Amos Alonzo Stagg, Jr., and three years in baseball as an outfielder. Santangelo was an honorable mention Little All-American football player in 1950 and was Susquehanna's Player of the Week for five of the eight games played that year.

The Northumberland native seldom left the field during a Susquehanna football game. He was a lineman and

split end on offense, a linebacker on defense, and the team's kicker. Santangelo was captain of the football team during his senior year.

Santangelo is a real estate broker for Jack Gaughen Realtor and manages the firm's Hershey office. He formerly directed public relations for Hershey Foods.

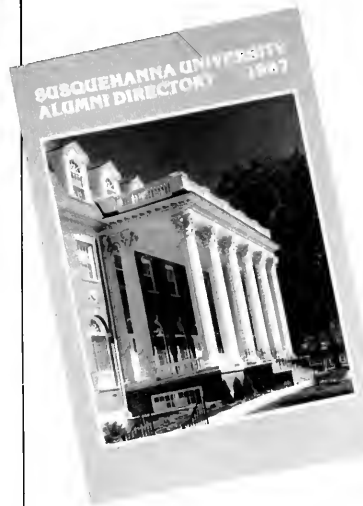

Hospitals Honor Susquehanna-Geisinger Program

The Hospital Association of Pennsylvania has presented the 1987 Achievement Award for Employee Satisfaction/ Education to Susquehanna University and the Geisinger Clinic of Danville for its Physician Management Education Program.

The program helps physicians acquire the business and management skills necessary to provide leadership for large group practices and medical centers in an increasingly complex environment of changing health management regulations and shifting economics. The program is modeled on the traditional Master of Business Administration degree design, but is tailored to the needs of physicians as middle managers.

More than 50 physicians have already completed the year-long course at Geisinger, and, with the guidance of Susquehanna and Geisinger, it is being taught to physicians at hospitals in Harrisburg and Erie.

PMEP has received national attention in management and in *Forbes*, the business news magazine.

Contest coordinator Evelyn O'Hara said PMEPE was selected from more than 200 entries. "The achievement award recognizes innovation," O'Hara said. "This program points the way for teaching physicians how to cope with the changing competitive environment in health care."

PMEP class sessions are scheduled one weekend every month. Physicians attend lectures and seminars on financial and human resources, operations management, health care economics, organizational theory and behavior, management accounting, budgeting, marketing and other subjects. Courses are taught by faculty from the Sigmund Weis School of Business and other well-regarded faculty throughout the United States.

Carl J. Bellas, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business, developed the program with Robert Porter, coordinator of physician management education at Geisinger.

Grants Awarded for Scholarships, Community Service

Susquehanna University has been awarded more than \$100,000 in grants to expand opportunities for student volunteer community service and to increase the number of need-based scholarships.

The New York-based Sordna Foundation has awarded \$50,000 to Susquehanna for scholarship aid.

The Reidler Foundation, based in Hazleton, Pa., has awarded \$50,000 to the John and Verna Reidler Endowment at Susquehanna. The endowment is used annually to support scholarships for students from the Hazleton area as well as the counties of Luzerne, Schuylkill, and Northumberland.

The U.S. Department of Education has awarded Susquehanna \$23,749 from the Fund for Improvement of Post Secondary Education (FIPSE) to expand student volunteer community service.

The grant will enable Susquehanna to expand its Project House System and to establish a Community Service Employment Program, allowing students to fulfill their work-study assistance obligations off campus in public service employment. Susquehanna was the only Pennsylvania college or university to receive the two-year grant for community service.

Student Dies in Campus Fall

Juliet A. Gibson, '89, of Chatham, N.J., died November 14 of injuries received in a fall on the Susquehanna campus.

Ms. Gibson was travelling on foot with three friends to the University Campus Center, when she fell down a set of steps outside the building, striking her head.

Ms. Gibson, an English major, was active in many campus organizations. She was a staff writer and features editor for *The Crusader*. For two years, she edited the *Focus* literary magazine. She also was a member of the Student Judiciary Board, a member of the Arts Alive and Big Sister projects, and a little sister for the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity.

1909 Graduate Remembers SU



The 1909 Lanthorn staff used Tennyson's phrase to describe senior John William Thompson "as the fruit of loyal nature and of noble mind."

His friends were right.

After graduating from Susquehanna, Thompson attended Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia and later practiced eye, ear, nose and throat medicine in Pueblo, Colorado. He later retired and made his home in San Mateo, California.

Upon his death in late January 1987, Susquehanna was notified that the university was included in the estate of Dr. Thompson. Preliminary estimates show that the Thompson estate will be in excess of \$750,000. The bequest is believed to be the largest in Susquehanna history.

Thompson was a native of Selinsgrove. His wife, Mary, died in 1978. Among those mentioned in the estate are several nieces and nephews in addition to Susquehanna and the Jefferson Medical College Alumni Fund.

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A GLIMPSE AT 2000

THE YEAR 2000 still seems to be in the all-too-distant future for many.

But in many ways, the turn of the century has arrived for Susquehanna University. Professors face the challenge of preparing students who will be entering the professional world as the century begins. A sampling of faculty has provided a glimpse at 2000.

In the eyes of an environmental scientist, tomorrow's challenges are predicated on attitudes and lifestyles of today's "throwaway society."

"If we fail to plan and act in responsible ways, nature will do it for us," says geology professor Robert M. Goodspeed. "We are contaminating the environment to a degree that, if we don't act, we won't recover. . . We'll wallow in our waste."

Plain and simple, Goodspeed says people are the problem. More people are demanding more.

"Even though the growth rate of the U.S. is decreasing, the world population is growing by leaps and bounds," he says. "As part of the world system, we need to be part of the solution."

Preserving precious natural resources is a problem which affects everyone, Goodspeed says. It will take the work of economists, sociologists, psychologists, ethicists, scientists, and technologists to bring about change.

This year, Susquehanna revised the curriculum for the geoscience major and designed an environmental science major to meet future needs. "We recognized the need to train people in these fields to help to solve these problems," Goodspeed says.

Geoscience encompasses the exploration of mineral, energy, and water resources; planning for effective land use; and reclamation of regions damaged by human use. Environmental science students study the natural processes which form the earth system of air, land, energy, and life.

FROM A POLITICAL scientist's point of view, Americans can expect to be debating many of the same issues. However, assistant professor Bruce Evans says not to expect a woman or minority to be elected president.

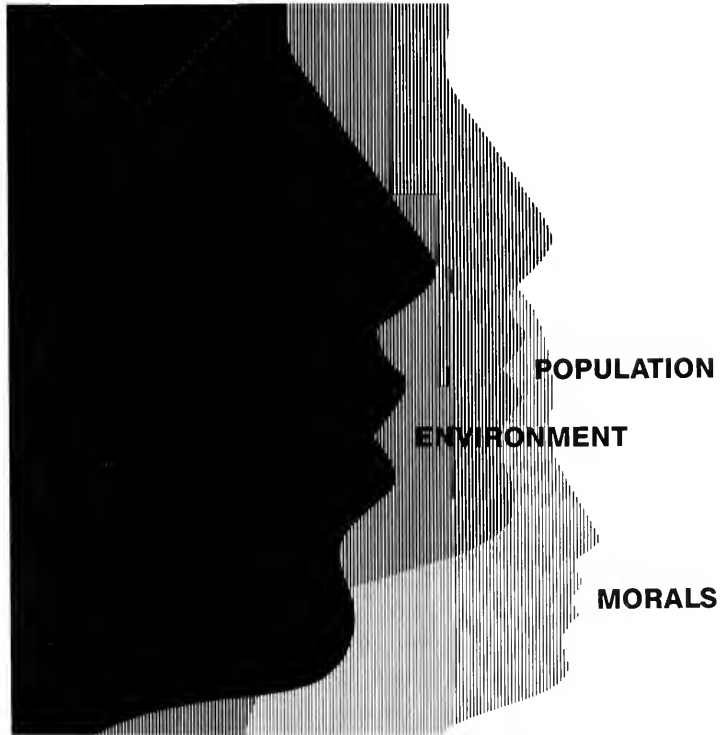
"The idea of a balanced budget may come about. If it does, the President will have a hard time leading the country," Evans says.

Issues such as abortion rights are likely to be a hot topic, but Evans says public sentiment may change. Little will change the continuing conflict between the President and Congress.

Evans, who teaches American National Government, says that while the presidential election process will stay the same, the political influence of the traditional industrial labor unions will continue to crumble. Fewer voters will align themselves with one party. Other influences will come into play.

"We may see a new kind of union," Evans says. "There may be more professional types of organizations such as NEA (National Education Association) and AFSCME (Association of Federal, State, County and Municipal Employees)."

Portrait in Courage

One fall afternoon, 11-year-old Andrea Light was playing a friendly game of football with family and friends.

At one point in the game, Andrea was tackled. "At first, I thought I had a broken rib. We went to the doctor. There was swelling in the rib, but they weren't really sure what was wrong."

That was the beginning of a two-year nightmare for Andrea. A nightmare that included pain from disease, pain from treatment and emotional pain.

Andrea, now 19 and a sophomore at Susquehanna, has survived that nightmare and has received the American Cancer Society's Courage Award.

Andrea represents all of Pennsylvania's courageous cancer survivors in receiving the award. Each of the American Cancer Society's 57 U.S. divisions have named a Courage Award winner.

While Andrea's story is unique, her battle with cancer represents the fight waged by cancer patients throughout the Keystone state. Andrea would be the first to say that anyone who has suffered through chemotherapy and radiation, the loss of hair, the physical pain of the disease and the emotional trauma of a life-threatening situation, is indeed deserving of the award she received.

After that football game, Andrea's family physician sent her to a local hospital where she underwent testing, and was then transferred to the Hershey Medical Center.

"I was scared and I was in pain," Andrea recalls. The diagnosis was Burkett's lymphoma. Twice she underwent exploratory surgery.

Doses of chemotherapy were not working. Radiation therapy finally began to break down the cancer. For months after the discovery of the disease, Andrea was in and out of the hospital for checkups, treatments and tests.

Finally, the disease went into remission. At that point, the doctors treating Andrea decided to try what was then considered a radical procedure. In case Andrea's cancer returned, they harvested some of her own bone marrow and stored it.

The disease did return. At one point Andrea was

told she had a choice of living three months in the best comfort that modern medicine could offer, or undergoing a bone marrow transplant that at the time had been tried only twice previously on Burkett's patients.

Andrea and her family decided to fight. It wasn't easy.

At Baltimore's Johns Hopkins University Hospital, Andrea spent six weeks going through agonizing treatment. She had a Hickman, a tube for medication that goes directly to the heart. Intravenous tubes were everywhere. She suffered through spinals.

For four days she went through massive radiation and chemotherapy. Then came the bone marrow

transplant. The marrow was injected into her body by way of the Hickman. "I could feel it going through my body," she recalls.

Through it all, Andrea was fed intravenously for six weeks.

As she endured those weeks at Johns Hopkins in 1981, Andrea improved. The doctors let her go home for Christmas. She had to wear a mask and be careful, but it was wonderful just to be home.

Throughout the entire ordeal, Andrea managed to maintain her studies. She missed much of seventh grade and all of eighth grade, yet went back to school and graduated with her class.

When she did return to school, the adjustment was difficult.

"Other kids didn't know how to react. It was tough," Andrea says.

That didn't stop Andrea. She worked hard and did well in school. So well that she became vice president of the honor society at Lebanon (PA) High School. She also edited the yearbook.

"Andrea taught me and everyone around her never to give up, never to take yourself too seriously, and that you're not judged on one thing in life," says Jerome Chepulis, her high school guidance counselor.

One of the bright spots in Andrea's life has been Camp Can-Do, the American Cancer Society Pennsylvania division camp for children with cancer. She first attended in the summer of 1983 as a camper, but has returned each year since as a counselor.

Andrea's cancer experience has led her to choosing a major in psychology and sociology for a career as

a child life specialist, to help counsel children with serious illnesses and diseases.

"I've been through it all—the pain, the tubes, everything. I don't think you can really relate to it unless you've gone through it," Andrea says.

At camp, Andrea often can be found in a remote area listening or talking to children. They see her as a ray of hope.

College has been good for Andrea, too. Her professors describe her as a motivated student. Andrea is also active in campus life.

"When you see someone with that kind of courage, it really makes you want to work with them," says Barbara Lewis, associate professor of psychology and education.

Cheerleading adviser Patricia Rees agrees. "Andrea's experience is definitely something she has used to her good. She is always very determined yet very humble and realistic. She has a real sense of peace about her."

RELIGION PROFESSOR John Cooper predicts a return to more conservative morals and lifestyle.

"We will turn away from those things seen as acceptable options today," Cooper says, citing abortion, promiscuity and drugs as examples.

Yet, Cooper foresees more apocalyptic speculation among Christians and cults.

INCREASING NUMBERS of minority students and the inability of U.S. students to compete with foreign counterparts are two challenges that American educators still will face.

Mark Dewalt, assistant professor of education, says role models for minority students will be greatly needed in the classroom.

Dewalt's concern is shared by others. Earlier this year, university President Joel Cunningham was among a select group of educators called on by Democratic presidential contender Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee to discuss educational needs and issues for the 21st Century.

Cunningham called for increasing the nation's international literacy as well as strengthening the humanities, social sciences and the sciences, and expanding information and technology for stronger library support systems.

COMPETITION WILL REMAIN keen in technology and the world marketplace, according to Wallace Growney.

Americans will probably see continued experimentation with biochips, a research venture that Growney says the Japanese have been "taking very seriously" since 1985. Like the bionic woman, Growney says biochips would give life to hunks of metal. For example, if a computer breaks down, a biochip may make self-regeneration possible.

Growney warns middle managers that advancements in Artificial Intelligence could mean fewer jobs.

"A lot of what's being done by middle managers could be eliminated."

Rule-based systems of AI could be as common as word processing today, Growney says. For example, diagnostic or evaluation methods used to process loan applications could easily be handled by such systems.

The availability of voice recognition and synthesis also will increase. Growney says the availability of such equipment may make it possible for an executive to dictate material and receive a transcribed document — without the help of a secretary.

Education beware. "If companies can figure out how to educate people more efficiently, it will be interesting. Japan is already proving to us that education helps a country compete."

Growney sees information availability through technology taking a "quantum leap." That will bring both benefits and challenges, Growney says.

Homeowners should expect to find computers everywhere — as part of the home entertainment system and the power system. For education, it will prompt discussion and the need to merge services of the library and the computing center.

"The appetite will be so great that it will drive

\$11 Million Provides Momentum University Announces \$22 Million Campaign

Susquehanna University has launched "Window of Opportunity: The Campaign for Susquehanna," a five-year, \$22 million capital fund campaign to support a new level of academic excellence and quality.

About 600 alumni and friends joined the Susquehanna community on Saturday, March 26 to kick off the campaign and to celebrate an era of achievement and momentum. "Tonight we are formally launching a project which will have a strong, positive impact upon this University which means so much to all of us — a project which will assure that Susquehanna will remain an institution of the highest quality," said Robert F. Weis, campaign steering committee chair and vice president-treasurer of Weis Markets, Inc.

Actor and corporate spokesman Cliff Robertson was the keynote speaker. "Your willingness to be a part of this important occasion speaks more eloquently, perhaps, than anything you or I could say as to what it means to be a part of Susquehanna," Robertson said. "When we commit ourselves to others — to strong values — to great institutions, we come to know the joy of being involved in something larger than ourselves."

In announcing the goal, national campaign chair Lawrence M. Isaacs '43 said that more than \$11 million has been raised to date.

"Susquehanna's achievements have given us a sense of confidence and direction. We believe that a focus on enhanced quality is our best response to the opportunities and challenges which lie ahead," President Joel Cunningham said. "Our highest priority for the next five years will be to recruit and retain a student body with increasingly strong academic credentials, and to provide them with the first-rate academic programs and facilities they will require."

Endowment Needs: \$9 Million

An additional \$9 million in endowment, the base of the University's security, is sought to guarantee ongoing support for student aid, faculty development, library holdings, instructional equipment, campus upkeep and beautification, special programs, and unrestricted endowment for financial flexibility.

the cost down," Growney says. Consumers also will see the "shrinking of computers," much like what happened to calculators. Before long, Growney predicts most will own a computer no larger than a lap-top size.

TECHNOLOGY'S ADVANCEMENTS also will touch music. Associate professor of music Susan Hegberg points to a *New York Times* news article which suggests that the traditional, "acoustic" piano will go the way of the harpsichord in 50 years. The electronic keyboards will take the piano's place.

Just the same, there will be plenty of opportunities for aspiring musicians. "The most fertile opportunities will be in commercial music, studio recording, arranging and business practices," Hegberg says.

Even education may be calling for more music teachers as the increasing number of baby boomers' children will be entering school, she predicts.

According to the National Association of Schools

of Music, the profile of music students is changing. Less than 10 percent of all music majors have had piano lessons prior to college. Hegberg says more students have developed a knack for composing or performing, and in many cases, have made good money by learning on their own.

Statement on the University and Alcohol

Although alcohol consumption is widely accepted in American life, concern is growing about the consequences of alcohol abuse and the illegal use of alcohol. Nationwide, colleges and universities are among the institutions responding to increasing pressures of law, liability, and common practice. The purpose of this statement is to keep members of the University and the larger community informed about the University's position with regard to these issues.

1. Susquehanna's overriding goal is to achieve excellence as a selective, residential, undergraduate university. We aim to meet this goal through being an academic community whose members know and care for one another. We seek to guide students as they develop their own personal value systems and to hold high standards for social actions as well as for intellectual performance.

2. With few exceptions Susquehanna's students are young adults who exercise nearly all the legal rights and responsibilities of citizens, including the right to vote, enter into binding contracts, and defend their country in time of war. Those who are at least 21 years old have the right to use beverage alcohol. Susquehanna's students are the University's partners in the educational process; we owe them respect, communication, and involvement in the establishment of policies which define their relationship to the University. At the same time, it is ultimately the responsibility of the administration and faculty to establish and enforce policies necessary to achieve the University's mission and to preserve the University for future generations.

3. While Susquehanna does not prohibit the legal use of beverage alcohol, the University is firm in its opposition to alcohol abuse. We aim to be supportive and helpful to those who experience problems related to alcohol, while protecting others from the negative effects of alcohol abuse and its destructive influence on the individual and community.

We believe that we have a special responsibility to provide aggressive programs of education and counseling for those unfamiliar with beverage alcohol as well as for those who are experiencing problems related to its use. Thus, our methods for dealing with alcohol abuse include proactive programs of education and counseling; they also include the development and implementation of disciplinary measures for those who do not abide by established policies.

4. The University does not condone violation of the law with respect to underage drinking. Although we do not serve in place of outside law enforcement agencies in this regard, we will cooperate fully with appropriate officers and agencies. In addition, we will continue to develop and implement internal systems for disciplining those who are observed in underage drinking on campus or who contribute to underage drinking.

We feel it appropriate to note that there is clear evidence that residential colleges like Susquehanna do not "create" underage drinkers. Nationwide surveys of college freshmen reveal that the majority of these young men and women consumed alcohol

before entering college.

5. The present system in which fraternities are the only student groups allowed to serve alcohol at a social event sets them apart and contributes to negative perceptions about Greek life; consequently, we will explore alternatives for students who may legally drink to do so in a responsibly controlled environ-

ment other than a fraternity house or private room.

6. The University expects that its administrators and faculty will be models of responsible host behavior where alcohol is concerned. All employees are expected to observe University policies on alcohol.

7. While the University has no legal responsibility for the private actions of students or staff which occur beyond the campus, it seeks to be a good neighbor in its community. To that end, the University will share with local landlords and governments its understanding of the most appropriate ways of controlling the disruptive effects of alcohol abuse, and will support the enactment and enforcement of provisions to deal responsibly with this issue.

In summary, Susquehanna will allow the consumption of alcohol on its campus when this is done within the law, and with controls to protect against the undesirable consequences of alcohol abuse.

A recent visit by a nationally recognized expert on alcohol and college campuses has reaffirmed our belief that Susquehanna has dealt and continues to deal with this issue responsibly and well. Dr. Thomas Goodale praised Susquehanna as an institution to which others could look as a model of a caring and concerned community. Our unwavering commitment to high quality, rigorous education, informed by a clear emphasis on values, will assure that Susquehanna remains an institution in which we may all take pride.

Changes in the Law Pennsylvania

✓ Since July 1 last year, the Liquor Control Board has turned over enforcement of Pennsylvania liquor laws to the State Police.

✓ The Pennsylvania House of Representatives recently passed a bill that would suspend underage drinkers' drivers' licenses for 90 days.

✓ The Pennsylvania House of Representatives' Select Committee to investigate alcohol abuse in Pennsylvania institutions of higher education is conducting a series of hearings to learn about campus problems. The committee, chaired by Representative Nicholas Colafella (D-Beaver), is expected to make recommendations at the conclusion of the hearings.

✓ A recent court case, *Fassett vs. Delta Kappa Epsilon*, heard by the U.S. Third Circuit Court of Appeals, broadened the scope of liability in cases that a party guest has too much to drink and subsequently causes an accident. The court ruled that not only was the person who served the liquor liable, but that anyone who supported that act could be considered an accomplice.

National

✓ A 1986 amendment to Title IV of the Education Act requires that in order for a college or university to qualify for any Federal assistance, including guaranteed loans for students, it must certify that it has a drug abuse prevention program available on campus. Enforcement of the regulation is likely to become stricter.

✓ Congress this year added \$200 million, or 65 times more, to the Department of Education budget for drug and alcohol education and prevention programs. Most of the money is going to elementary and secondary school programs.

A National Expert's View

Take an Active Role in Campus Alcohol Use

A nationally recognized expert on alcohol use among college students said that Susquehanna University is dealing responsibly with the issue.

Dr. Thomas G. Goodale, vice chancellor for student affairs at the University of Denver (Colo.) and president-elect of the National Student Personnel Administrators Association, applauded University efforts and urged members of the campus community to take an active role in determining the role of alcohol on campus.

Goodale's recent visit is one of many steps taken by Susquehanna this year to evaluate its system for effectively dealing with alcohol use and the consequences of abuse.

"Recent tragedies here and elsewhere have reminded us forcefully of the responsibilities we have to demonstrate concern and care for each other," says President Joel Cunningham.

Under the leadership of Vice President Jeanne Neff and Dean of Students Dorothy Anderson, a working group is carefully re-evaluating Susquehanna's systems for dealing with alcohol, in light of Pennsylvania law, changing legal liability, and civic practice with respect to alcohol on campuses.

Goodale's visit set the agenda for the working group. The group is exploring ways to communicate the University's position on alcohol, to maintain strong enforcement of alcohol policies, to develop student ownership in University goals, to expand University sponsored activities that reflect academic standards and goals, and to provide ways that faculty can assume leadership roles in student life.

During the visit, Goodale met with members of fraternities, sororities, student activities, student government, a group promoting responsible alcohol use, and the faculty.

"The issue that I came here to talk about is no different than in 1636 when Harvard began to experience some of the same things that are going on in academe today," Goodale said. "We continue to have the problem because this nation, for whatever reason, has not reached consensus about the issue of alcohol."

Goodale said that of the 13 million college students attending more than 3,000 of America's colleges and universities, as many as 90 percent have chosen to drink beverage alcohol as high school students.

As they continue to drink in college, Goodale estimated that 15 percent of that number will experience alcohol-related problems during their college years.

"This is a microcosm of what is going on in society," Goodale said.

He cited statistics which show that 10 million Americans are addicted in some way to beverage alcohol abuse and another 36 million are affected, resulting in lost productivity, child abuse, malnutrition, and related medical problems.

Goodale edited *Alcohol and the College Student*, a collection of research findings published in 1986. He has more than 25 years of experience in working with college students in student life programs at Iowa State University, Michigan State University, the University of Denver, and the University of Florida. This summer, he will serve as a drug and alcohol monitor for the 24th Olympiad.

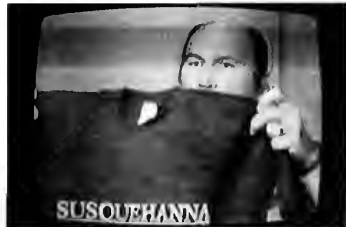
In addition to the working group, Susquehanna has received a grant from the Aid Association to Lutherans that has provided for hiring a part-time drug and alcohol consultant, designing and offering a course for students tagged by disciplinary action as high-risk abusers, and working with student volunteers who will serve as peer educators on the risks of alcohol abuse.

Susquehanna has hired Kenneth J. Kopf as a drug and alcohol consultant. A 1970 graduate of Bucknell University, Kopf brings Susquehanna 17 years of professional experience in public and private substance abuse counseling, as well as developing and evaluating training programs. Prior to Susquehanna he served as a residential supervisor for the Salvation Army Clitheroe Center, a comprehensive alcohol and drug treatment facility in Anchorage, Alaska.

In February, Kopf joined Vice President Neff, Dean Anderson and Counseling Director Alan Kreisler in presenting a workshop on campus alcohol use to members of the Board of Directors.

Showing Off Susquehanna

Susquehanna University made a brief splash on national television in February, thanks to NBC-TV's fun-loving weathercaster Willard Scott. Students wrote to Scott, asking him to recognize the Project House System's 12th anniversary. Less than a week later, Scott appeared on the *Today* show with the sweatshirt that accompanied the request.

Czap Electrifies Lady Crusader Faithful

Anyone who has attended a Susquehanna women's basketball game in the past four years will probably recall the sight of Number 22 slashing through the opponent's defense, making pinpoint passes, swishing a field goal from long-range, or hitting a twisting layup from a near impossible position.

That number has been worn by Williamsport senior Kay Czap, who has terrorized opponents and won the hearts of SU fans since coming to the Crusader program from Loyalsock Township High School.

In her four years, Czap has helped the Lady Crusaders to a 62-29 record, which included three trips to the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) playoffs, one MAC championship and two trips to the NCAA Division III Regionals. Last season was Czap's best individual season as she was selected to the MAC-Northwest Division All-Star team and finished 49th in Division III scoring averaging 18.0 ppg, ranking her sixth in Susquehanna history for season scoring average.

Although she was slowed by a knee injury this year in her final season, Czap still etched her name into the Lady Crusader career record books as she became the fourth player in Susquehanna women's basketball history to score over 1,000 points when she garnered 15 against York in the season finale to finish with 1,004.

She finished her career with 1,004 points, placing her fourth in career scoring behind the likes of Deb Yeasted (2,075), Sandy Bartle (1,113) and Ruth Athley (1,057). She also touts the fourth best average per season (11.5 ppg) and set the record for free throw percentage in a single game when she was 15 for 15 against King's (11-24-86).

She's proud of her accomplishments, but life at Susquehanna has been more than just basketball.

"I think I've gotten everything out of college that I had hoped for, both athletically and academically," says the 5-5 Elementary Education major, who's completed her student teaching at Lewisburg Middle School and is on schedule to graduate in May.

"It's the first school I looked at and I liked it so much, I didn't look anywhere else. I'm glad I didn't."



So is rookie head coach Mark Hribar. "She's done it all and I've seen her in extreme pain. I admire her for everything she's been able to do with the brace," says Hribar. "I took her with me when I tried to recruit players in the Williamsport area because she's the kind of person

you want to come to Susquehanna." Czap believes it's that "kind of person" who has helped to make her athletic experience at Susquehanna so enjoyable.

"I think the biggest thing is we've always had a team that's gotten along," she says. "We've always been good friends and we've always stuck together whether we're winning or losing."

For the most part, it's been winning for Czap both on and off the court. With her playing days now over, she looks forward to becoming a school teacher and possibly joining the coaching ranks someday.

If she's as successful out of college, the winning may just be beginning.

Chris Labrecque Wins 167-Pound Title at MAC Championships

Senior co-captain Chris Labrecque knew it was going to take a superior effort to win the 167-pound title at the Middle Atlantic Conference Championships.

As it turned out, Labrecque's bout with Delaware Valley's Randy Worrell in the finals resembled a scene right out of the motion picture "Rocky," one that earned him seven stitches above his right eye, a 3-3, 2-1 OT victory and the tournament's "Outstanding Wrestler" award.

"It was like a street fight for me. I was never behind in the match, but he was a real tough kid with a real hard head as my eye can prove," recalls Labrecque, of Holmdel, N.J.

"I really never thought about the score or anything

else. I just thought about getting him and I kept pushing myself and it just went my way."

In order to get to Worrell, a returning All-American and last year's MAC OW and champ at 167, Labrecque had to go through Dave Durst of Ursinus in the semifinals. Durst had defeated Labrecque earlier in the finals of the Lebanon Valley Tournament earlier in the season, but Labrecque prevailed at MAC's 2-2, 4-2 in OT to get to the championships. He also kept a personal record of never losing to the same wrestler twice.

"Chris had the confidence at the tournament," says 22nd-year Crusader coach Charlie Kunes. "I said once he got past Durst, he would beat Worrell, even though it

was going to be tough. One thing about Chris, he never backs away from a challenge."

With the win, Labrecque took a 23-2 record on to the NCAA Division III National Championships at Wheaton College (Ill.). Once again, Labrecque's positive attitude carried him into the event.

"My goal all along has not been MAC champion. My goal has been All-American, although I know MAC champion has to come first," says the senior Political Science major. "Right now, all I want to do is get to the national finals and win."

Perna Accomplishes Goal in One-Year Mission

WHEN DAN PERNA accepted the position as one-year head coach of the Susquehanna men's basketball team this season, he also accepted a one-year personal mission.

For Perna, it was "mission accomplished" as his team took the floor at the University of Scranton for a battle with the top-ranked Royals in a Middle Atlantic Conference Northern Division playoff game.

"I just wanted to coach this team into the playoffs so that next year they'll believe in themselves enough that they can win the whole MAC," he recalls.

PERNA WAS SELECTED for the position after 15-year head coach Don Harnum took a sabbatical this season to pursue his doctorate at Penn State. Although he had been an assistant coach with the Crusader program for five years and a successful high school head coach, choosing to become a collegiate head coach posed some different problems for Perna, who's also a full-time sales representative. His decision to coach still came easily.

"First, it was the opportunity to be a head coach on a collegiate level and I didn't know if I could do that because of my other business," he says. "My dad (John '53) also went to school here and he died last April. This whole season has involved a lot of thoughts of him."

A native of the State College area and a graduate of Shippensburg State College, Perna was a head coach on the high school level at Big Spring, Jefferson-Morgan and Middleburg high schools. Even though those positions also required a great deal of his time, the demands on the collegiate level have required even more of a commitment from him and his family.

"I've made a sacrifice that's not really a sacrifice. I've had zero social life for the past five months," says Perna, who lives in Selinsgrove with his wife, Jayme, and their one son.

"It's been like working two full-time jobs and the social end is what had to be cut out. I wouldn't have been able to do it at all if it weren't for my secretary at the office and the understanding at home."

UNDERSTANDING HAS ALSO been a big reason for Perna's success on the court. Although the team only finished 10-14 overall, its 9-7 mark in the MAC-Northwest Division was good enough for second place. With a starting lineup that often included four sophomores and a junior, there were many peaks and valleys along the way to the playoffs.

Ultimately, Perna's understanding towards his players during the season came down to a primary philosophy.

"This is their (the players') team and they determine the outcome. I don't see anything wrong with that.

"When they (the players) knew I was going to be head coach this year, they could have easily decided to have an easy year and wait for Don to come back next year, but they didn't."

Even though Harnum has been busy with his studies, he has stopped by occasionally to check the squad's progress. Perna gives him credit for not coaching in the crowd.

"One night, he walked into practice early in the season and I felt some pressure. But then I began to think, 'Why should I worry?' After all, I've stayed within our system and I've got to be my own person," he says. "I actually give Don a lot of credit because he's let this be my team."

AS OF NOW, Perna plans to be beside Harnum when he returns as head coach next year. After being head coach for a year, Perna knows the adjustment back to assistant might take some time.

"It's probably going to be difficult for me to function as an assistant coach again and I know that, but guys don't get hired as head coaches elsewhere with a 10-14 record unless you really know someone," he says.

"In a way, I'm very sad to see this season come to an end, even though I'm very tired. If I would have been a full-time head coach, it would have been everything I had ever dreamed it would. But trying to juggle two different jobs made me walk the tightrope all season."

If Susquehanna wins the MAC crown next year, Perna will know his tightrope act was a show-stopper.

Winter Sports Highlights

Men's Basketball

With a starting lineup that often included four sophomores and a junior, rookie head coach **Dan Perna** directed the team to a 9-7 MAC-Northwest Division record which was good enough for second place and an MAC playoff berth.

Junior guard and co-captain **J.R. Thatcher of Easton, Pa.**, led the team in scoring (15.5 ppg) and had a brilliant 26-point performance against the top-ranked NCAA Division III team in the University of Scranton. 6-4 junior **Scott Mangold of Berkeley Heights, N.J.**, was the top rebounder (7.1 per game).

Women's Basketball

Even though the Lady Crusaders had their first losing season since the 1979-80 campaign, first-year head coach **Mark Hribar** was pleased with how the team won six of its last eight games for a final record of 10-13.

Fellow senior co-captain **Tricia Ross of Hazleton, Pa.**, led the team in scoring average (12.8 per game) and rebounding (7.0 per game).

Wrestling

After starting the season by winning two of its first three dual meets for 22nd-year head coach **Charlie Kunes**, injuries plagued the Crusaders the rest of the way in a 4-11-1 season.

Despite the team record, senior co-captain **Chris Lahrecque** had a dazzling 19-2 regular season that included a second place finish at 167 pounds at the Lebanon Valley Tournament.

Men's Swimming

Despite having only one senior on the squad, ninth-year head coach **Ged Schweikert** saw his young Crusaders come within one victory of equalling the record for most victories in a season as they finished at 6-5.

The squad's lone senior was co-captain **Rob Turner of Media, Pa.**, who led the squad in the long-distance freestyle events (500- and 1,000-yard).

Sophomore **Coozie Kegel of Lancaster, Pa.**, also was a top performer in the freestyle sprints (50- and 100-yard).

Women's Swimming

Under **Schweikert**, the Lady Crusaders swam their way to a record breaking nine victories in a 9-3 campaign that included wins against Division II foes Lock Haven (135-92) and Mansfield (103-69).

Freshman sensation **Carrie Healey of Paramus, N.J.**, set school records in both the 200-yard freestyle (2:05.91) and the 500-yard freestyle (5:41.87). She was also the squad's top performer in the 100-yard freestyle, 100-yard breaststroke and 200-yard individual medley.

In the backstroke, freshman transfer **Stephanie Grant of Blue Bell, Pa.**, was one of the best in the conference in both the 100- and 200-yard.

■ Results of an empirical investigation and validation study conducted by accounting professor **Edward Schwan** shows there are "significant correlations" between the graduate point average and scores on the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT), the undergraduate grade point average and the junior/senior grade point average. Dr. Schwan's findings have been featured in the *Journal of Education for Business*. Schwan says the study once was required by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), but was dropped due to the difficulty of the task. Schwan says that the test results support previous studies of admissions to graduate study.

Physical Plant Needs: \$8.5 Million

Based on the findings of a comprehensive facilities audit, the University seeks funds to support a program of internal renovation and expansion to improve the quality of campus living and learning environments.

To accommodate space needs for the School of Fine Arts and Communications, several alternatives are being considered for art and dance studios, gallery space, and a small instructional theatre.

Other areas targeted for improvement include residence halls, Bogard and Steele halls as well as Selmsgrove Hall.

SUSQUEHANNA ALUMNUS

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Their subjects range from Hebrew inscriptions to the rise and decline of union solidarity in Western Pennsylvania, the poets of the Great War, and the Northumbrian Renaissance.

While they may never reach the best seller list of books, they are in demand by students and professors around the world.

They are the publications of the Susquehanna University Press, an increasingly prolific publisher of scholarly research. Susquehanna is believed to be the smallest college or university in North America to boast a university press.

"A university press helps scholars advance their careers, lets new perspectives be known, and makes a university a lively place for scholars to be," says David N. Wiley, director of the Susquehanna University Press.

Since 1981, Susquehanna has approved more than 60 manuscripts for publication. Two books published in 1986-87 and 1987-88 have been named among the best academic books published in their respective years by *Choice* magazine, a journal used by librarians as a reference for scholarly books. One of the two was written by a Susquehanna professor.

Others are drawing national attention. *Mature Christianity* is described by scholars as a "groundbreaking book in Jewish-Christian dialogue," according to Wiley.

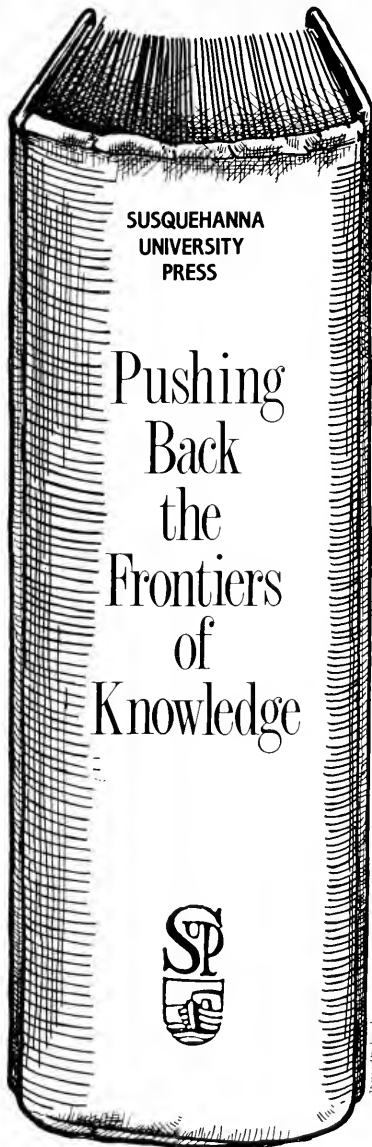
"Authors are turning to university presses to publish serious scholarly research," Wiley says.

The first university press at Susquehanna can be traced back to 1935 as a combined effort with the Susquehanna University Studies, an annual collection of scholarly articles.

While Susquehanna University Studies has remained active, the Susquehanna University Press became dormant in the mid-1960s. It was resurrected in 1980 by a group of faculty and a willing Thomas Yoseloff, chairman of Associated University Presses of America, which has offices in New York, London and Toronto.

"There has always been an interest among the faculty to be involved actively in scholarly publication," Wiley says.

The Press was accepted conditionally with Associated University Presses from 1981 to 1983, and met its challenges. Wiley, a full-time member of the Religion and Philosophy department, assumed the directorship. An editorial committee of six faculty and three administrators was organized.



Eight manuscripts were reviewed and approved for publication within the two-year period.

"From the very beginning, we wanted to be known as a quality press," says French professor Nancy A. Cairns, a member of the first editorial committee.

Wiley credits Cairns for soliciting the most manuscripts on behalf of Susquehanna. One of those manuscripts, *The Worlds of Andre Maurois*, written by Susquehanna French professor Jack Kolbert, was selected by *Choice* magazine as one of the best academic books for 1986-87.

Cairns' contributions are characteristic of faculty support for the Press. Occasionally some are called upon to serve as readers to review the manuscript. Others serve on the editorial committee.

"The work of the committee has been the ideal work of a classroom," Wiley says. "The committee provides a setting where faculty of different disciplines can engage in serious discussion on a written text."

Each month, committee members representing varied disciplines gather to review readers' critiques and recommendations for publication. Based on the reader's report, the committee suggests revisions, or approves or rejects publication.

"There is a renewed belief among those who have served on the committee that there are still very competent scholars and teachers in the world. We have seen very valuable works from writers and readers — both young and old," Wiley says.

The SU Press secures foremost authorities to provide a critique of manuscripts. "Most of the people who read for us don't have to do it. They're established in their fields, but they want to see the profession survive."

Susquehanna's relationship with Associated University Presses has been an important factor in attracting scholars' works. Authors pay no direct costs, and yet receive royalties after a certain number of books are sold.

"Publish or perish is the scholar's dilemma," Yoseloff once told a reporter. "Yet the fact is that civilization must publish or perish. For the lack of publication — of the means of dissemination of the fruits of research — perils the whole syndrome of research and teaching."

Susquehanna's progress pleases Yoseloff.

"Susquehanna books are in sufficient demand.

Advice from a journalist

If At First You Don't Succeed . . .

The following text is an edited version of the 1988 Commencement Address delivered by Bettina Gregory, senior Washington correspondent for ABC News.

DR. CUNNINGHAM, DISTINGUISHED members of the faculty, ladies and gentlemen, and the class of 1988. I am really glad to be back in this part of Pennsylvania. It is a particular pleasure for me not to be reporting on a certain nearby reactor.

I get very nervous when I have to stand up and speak to an audience live. It reminds me very much of the way I felt the very first time I had to broadcast live on the network. I joined ABC news in 1974 and I was a radio correspondent, which meant that I wrote and read five-minute newscasts for the FM radio network.

I was looking for an opportunity to break into the television side of the business, so I made myself available whenever one of the big stars would not come out to cover some story that occurred on a weekend or at 3 a.m. They could call upon Gregory and off I would go.

My first big break is a story which the graduates may not even remember because it happened so long ago, but perhaps some of the parents will. It was the story of Karen Ann Quinlan. Miss Quinlan fell into a coma with severe brain damage after mixing alcohol with tranquilizers. At that time everybody believed that if they took away the respirator that was hooked to her body, she would die.

It was my job to cover the trial. The right to die with dignity became a national issue at that point. Her parents, Roman Catholics, did not believe that Miss Quinlan should have to be attached to the machine. They wanted to remove it. There was a trial in Morristown, New Jersey, and I flew every day in a helicopter from New York City.

I remember the day of the verdict. For the very first time I was going to be the lead on the

evening news broadcast. I whipped out a yellow pad, got back into the chopper and I thought, "I'll write my script on the flight back to New York."

We took off and flew straight into a line of thunderstorms. I spent the entire time praying we would land safely. We did, but I still had that blank page of paper staring me in the face.

It was about 5 p.m. eastern time, I should tell you at this point. In those days we did three broadcasts of the evening news: 6, 6:30 and 7 p.m.

It was also the days when we were using film. Now, everything is videotaped, and it needs no time for processing. But we had film and it required about 40 minutes to process. We had just enough time to process the film, but not enough time to cut and edit the spots.

It was going to be my job to sit on that little egg box set next to Harry Reasoner. He was the sole anchorman then.

My job was to narrate the opening of the show, make some remarks, and then describe the film as it rolled by. There was only one small problem. I had absolutely no idea what was going to go by when.

I saw that clock hit 10 seconds to 6. My knees were shaking and my lips were trembling and I was so nervous and I did not know how I was going to be able to speak. So I looked to Mr. Reasoner, the voice of wisdom and experience, for a few words of encouragement.

And here's what he said to me: "Don't worry, little girl, it's only the first broadcast. Only 11 million people are watching you."

Somehow I got through that show. I cannot report that it was my best work, but I am grateful to say that I'm still employed by ABC News.

What I would like to speak to you about is a few lessons which you might need as you approach the more practical side of life, that is the trials and tribulations of trying to get a job, of

trying to succeed, of trying to make your way forward from this day. In short, I would like to say a few words to you about success and failure.

You should not be afraid to take risks. You can only have great achievement where you risk failure.

I would not be standing here addressing this class if I didn't take risks in doing my stories. Since we are located near Three Mile Island, I'd like to tell this group one story about the very first day of the accident. I was there, standing outside in that little island opposite the plant, waiting with local officials, state officials, more and more reporters to find out what was going on inside that reactor.

I arrived there very early in the morning. We waited and waited and there was no news about what was happening. Every once in a while, somebody would come out and say: "Well somebody'll be along in a little bit and explain it all to you. Don't worry; it's all going to be fine."

Eventually, it was about 2 in the afternoon, and we had had no word about what was going on. I had one crew there and finally an official from the utility came out. Everybody gathered round, and you've seen that sort — cameras and reporters around this person as he began briefing us — when I began thinking, he's not giving us any information.

Suddenly I thought about what else might be happening. Whenever you're covering an event you have to ask: What is going on here? But also, why is it going on? And why is it going on now?

I suddenly looked down the road about a hundred yards. I saw some movement. I took a great risk because I only had one crew and I could end up with no official speaking in my piece. I saw some cars leaving and so I said, "ABC, follow me."

Susquehanna University Nondiscrimination Policy

Off we marched down the road, and the risk paid off. I was able to obtain the only interviews that day with the workers who had been inside the plant when the emergency was declared. They had been kept back to be detoxified for some hours, and they were now leaving.

That was one reason that the news conference was taking place at that very hour to distract our attention. But I ended up with an exclusive report because I took the risk.

Let's talk about failure for a moment. We are celebrating your success today. But there will be times from now on where you will not succeed.

I got my first paying job at a radio station in Long Island, New York, where I was paid the princely sum of \$2.50 an hour. I worked during the day as a reporter in the press room covering the county government, the Nassau County government.

I worked in the evening doing two newscasts an hour. I engineered my own board. I took in the weather forecast. I made calls to find out who won the local school board elections.

This is quite an education. I mean, it's sort of the theory of "sink or swim" and you've got to swim to survive this. I thought I was doing quite well. In fact, I had been looking for jobs in New York City trying to move upward and onward in the world of broadcasting, when the news director from this station called me into his office, and he said: "You know, we've had a cutback here, and I've got to cut the staff. There are two people I have picked out as candidates, and I have decided we could save one of them."

I thought maybe things were looking up for me, but I was wrong. He said: "There's this other young woman here who shows a lot of promise as the only female DJ we have. But you, on the other hand, have absolutely no talent and no ability in the news business, so you are fired." Well, the next day I went to work as a free-lance reporter for *The New York Times*.

The point I'm trying to make is that whether or not someone is making an objective assessment of your failure depends on who is making that assessment.

About a year later I encountered the same gentleman. I was now working for WCBS Radio in New York, and he came up to me and he said: "You know, I was really wrong about you. And I have to apologize to you for the statement that I made to you."

And I said, "Well, you know, I was very upset at the time, but I want to thank you. Because, had you not fired me I probably would have worked at your station for another year and

would not be getting on with my career as I am now. So it really worked out just fine for both of us."

Many, many talented people have been called failures in their youth. I was recently reading about Beethoven. He had an early composition teacher who told him he had no talent. Albert Einstein was considered a mathematical dummy because he didn't understand the simplest mathematical relationships, because he simply could not accept the assumption.

So, please, do not be afraid to fail. The measure of a person's worth is not that they failed, because we all will fail one time or another, but how many times do you get back up and try again. That is how you are going to succeed in life.

That brings me to my third and final point that I would like to share with you, and that is what I think is the most important quality to succeed in any field. It's very simple. It's persistence.

There are people who are geniuses who do not succeed because they simply do not persist in their endeavors. The one quality which will help you get ahead is to not accept failure as a definitive moment in your life.

We all set our own limitations. The most important thing you have to learn is to say not that I have failed at doing this, but I will persist in trying, and I have not succeeded in doing this yet. It's important to believe in yourself. It's important to believe that you can push those barriers back.

It's important to set small goals for yourself, not to say that you're going to become the greatest engineer, doctor, lawyer or journalist alive, but that you are going to get through this course, or write this paper, or do what is the first step toward your goal.

Set personal goals for yourself. Write them; refer to them; and chart your own progress. If you look at the quality all these people have who have succeeded — and succeeded in great measure — it is one very simple thing. They persist in their efforts, and they do not give up no matter who slams the door in their face, no matter how many times they try and fail. They keep on.

My job as a journalist is basically to tell the truth, to tell stories as truthfully as I can possibly do that. I must persist in that effort even when faced with great obstacles. I'd like to tell you a true story of what happened to me some years ago. I was on my way to Atlanta, where I thought I was covering a story about a federal

years, young and struggling presses have been referred to Susquehanna for advice.

While talk about maintaining standards may dominate the conversation, it is easy to see that David Wiley takes great pride in the accomplishments of the Susquehanna University Press.

Wiley has packed the responsibilities of soliciting manuscripts and promoting the press around his duties as a full-time professor. Committee members have come to know him as an organized leader whose diligence is paying off for the Press.

If the increase in approved manuscripts is any indication, Susquehanna University Press is close to reaching one of its original goals of approving 20 titles per year. Wiley has estimated that the Press could approve 16 titles by the end of 1987-88.

■ **Rabbi Arthur Schneider**, world ecumenical leader and president of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation, who delivered the Baccalaureate homily.

"Susquehanna University is honored to recognize this distinguished group of leaders. Their contributions are diverse and the examples they offer are outstanding," University President Joel Cunningham said.

Since Bettina Gregory joined ABC News in 1974, she has reported on international crises, disasters, scandals, and sweeping government changes.

Viewers and listeners have heard her report on the Three Mile Island nuclear accident, the White House view of the Iran crisis, the 1985 TWA hijacking incident, the PATCO air traffic controllers strike, the Royal Wedding of Prince Charles and Princess Diana, the General Services Administration corruption scandal, the EPA Superfund scandal, and the Love Canal Investigation of hazardous waste disposal.

"While educating the American public on a broad range of issues, Bettina Gregory has held to the highest standards of professional reporting," Cunningham said.

In 1983, Gregory was named among the nation's top 10 investigative reporters by TV Guide. She also holds the Women in Communications Clarion Award for her investigative series on the General Services

Henry Hood, M.D.

Hood, a neurosurgeon, is chief executive officer of the major regional medical center for northcentral and northeastern Pennsylvania and one of the largest ambulatory care centers in the nation.

Hood attended Cornell University and received his medical degree from Cornell University Medical College. He was appointed to the Geisinger Medical Center staff in 1957 and became director of the Department of Neurosurgery in 1958. He has served as the chief executive of Geisinger since 1974.

Under Hood's leadership, Geisinger has experienced dramatic growth. Since 1981, Hood has been president of the Geisinger Foundation, a general corporate organization approved by the directors of Geisinger Medical Center and its related organizations. The corporation is comprised of the Geisinger Foundation and seven corporate affiliates.

Hood directs the entire Geisinger system which includes the Geisinger Foundation, the Geisinger Medical Center, the Geisinger Clinic, GWV Medical Center in Wilkes-Barre, Geisinger System Services, Marworth (an alcohol treatment center north of Scranton), and Moshannon Valley Inc. (facilities occupied by medical clinics in Philipsburg and Houtzdale).

In 1982, Hood was named Medical Executive of the Year, the highest award given by the American College of Medical Group Administrators.

Bishop Miller is the first person elected to lead the Allegheny Synod of the newly-formed ELCA. The synod is made up of seven counties in the Allegheny Mountain area of western Pennsylvania.

Susquehanna awarded Miller an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree for "faithful stewardship in serving the needs of church and community with distinction and devotion."

Prior to his election, Miller was assistant to the bishop of the former LCA Central Pennsylvania Synod for 15 years. He also has served pastorates in the Pennsylvania communities of Altoona, Lykens, and Reedsville in addition to Albany, N.Y.

Miller is a graduate of Hartwick (N.Y.) College and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia. His wife, the former Jean Rothermel, is a 1950 Susquehanna graduate.



Rabbi Arthur Schneider

Founder and president of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation, Rabbi Schneider was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws for his "success in building the basis for freedom and peace in the world."

Schneider has met with Soviets to promote religious tolerance, and he has aided causes in Spain, Hungary, and northern Ireland.

Schneider's study and travel have earned him recognition as an authority on foreign policy as well as religious affairs. Congress and the United Nations frequently seek his advice on dealing with the religiously and politically oppressed.

A native of Vienna, Schneider came to the United States as a teen in 1947 after losing his family to the Holocaust. He recently celebrated his 25th year serving New York City's Park East Synagogue.

Schneider is a member of the Holocaust Commission, the Council of Foreign Relations, and the U.S. Japan Foundation. In 1982, he was named Clergyman of the Year by the Protestant Council of Churches.

Faith, Values Endure All Challenges

The following text is the homily delivered by Rabbi Arthur Schneier during the 1988 Baccalaureate. Rabbi Schneier is president of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation and senior rabbi at Park East Synagogue, New York City.

Yesterday's prophetic portion, I write in synagogues across the world, is the prophesy of Jeremiah. Heal me and I shall be healed. Save me and I shall be saved.

Friends, I firmly believe that God heals us. I firmly believe that God saves us. The fact that I stand here before you today is really a response to my plea to God to heal me and to save me.

Let me begin with a confession. I came to these blessed shores of the United States in 1947, a survivor of the Holocaust whose family perished in the gas chambers of Auschwitz and Dresden Stadt. Oh, how during these days I prayed to God and pleaded with him — "Save me oh Lord" — and He did.

But not only did He save me and others, but He healed our wounds. And so I have a love affair with America because the healing process took place in the land of the free. The healing process took place in the land of opportunity and that gave me the courage and the motivation and the determination to use whatever abilities I have to seek religious understanding, tolerance and religious freedom for those who are deprived of it in countries which lack the religious freedom which we enjoy.

I would say that the two significant challenges that I've encountered from early childhood — and I really didn't have much of a childhood — were the question of daily survival and constant change. And friends, this has been the lot of the Jewish people from the days of Abraham — survival and change.

Do you know what it means to build a community in one place and then 200 or 300 years later face expulsion and destruction? Driven from country to country, dislodged and persecuted, we learned a lesson from this experience that can be applied to a period in civilization that has been on the brink of nuclear holocaust and has witnessed the most radical changes brought about by science and technology.

What has been our stabilizer and anchor in the sea of change is faith in God, acceptance of His Law, and the practice of a value system that is timeless and can withstand any political, economical and social winds.

You, the graduating class, will be experiencing change as you leave this beautiful campus of Susquehanna University. Life will have changed for you because life is something very dynamic, it's not static. As you enter a changed world, remember, you need an anchor; you need a stabilizer to get through it.

Political systems, feudalism, royalty,

dictatorship. Such concepts are already outdated even as they continue to exist in some countries. We know that sooner or later they will vanish as did the dynastic order of China and the Pharaohs of Egypt.

Survival and change. How do we face the technological and scientific changes that threaten the family, and yes, that threaten Mother Earth? How do we face generational conflict? How do we face hunger and poverty? As we face it, strengthened by the eternal values of the Judeo-Christian religion, that must serve as our anchoring force, the stabilizer that enables us to cope with the shifting winds of change and to find solutions to what ails the human family today.

In my travels throughout the world, my friends, I find more and more the hunger and thirst of people to return to the basics, and the deep yearning of faith.

It's interesting that I will be the recipient of an honorary degree from Susquehanna University, one of the oldest Lutheran institutions in our country. I still remember my first encounter in 1966, in the city of Riga, with the then-93-year-old Archbishop of the Lutheran Church while at the first interfaith team of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation to the Soviet Union.

He, too, offered the prayer to God, "Save me and I shall be saved." He thanked us just for our physical presence. And here I am facing you so many years later on this very auspicious occasion.

But I also remember the first conversation with the then Minister of Religious Affairs of the Soviet Union who said to us: "Religion is only for old people. It's a dying breed." And those of you who are old enough will remember the cover of *Time* magazine in the '60s when there were advocates right here in this country who said "God is dead." Well I have some very good

news. God is very much alive — very much alive here in this free land and very much alive in the lands of oppression.

Sometimes faith flourishes in the lands of oppression. There's greater sacrifice and greater commitment because we take everything for granted here. Even communist governments are recognizing the fact that God is here to stay, that they cannot fight man's yearning and thirst for the spirit and the spiritual.

Just recently in the Soviet Union, we find the importation of Bibles that was unheard of before. I was very proud of my son, who's an ordained rabbi and the first rabbi ever to officiate the Passover service at Moscow synagogue for the millennium of the Russian Orthodox Church which will take place in June. Some of you may have seen the picture in *The New York Times* of Mikhail Gorbachev meeting with the patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church, the patriarch of Moscow, Patriarch Freeman. In connection with that meeting, he said, and I quote: "Believers are Soviet people — workers, patriots. And they have the full right to express their convictions with dignity. Democratization concerns them too."

Brezhnev would not have said it. And Stalin certainly would not have said it. They honestly believed that they could wipe out faith. Yet Gorbachev's a pragmatist. He's beginning to see that you need those sectors of society who have the faith, who have the belief who may be helpful in overcoming the stagnation that set in.

How times have changed. President Reagan, in preparation of the Moscow summit, just two weeks ago met with religious leaders at the White House. Religious freedom is very much on the agenda of the summit — again, a breakthrough. The Minister

of Religious Affairs of Hungary on a visit last October admitted the experience of the last 40 years has made it clear that a social society such as ours cannot be billed separately for believers and non-believers. We can reach our goal of raising the material and cultural level of our people only through the cooperation of the entire nation.

With this aim ever in our minds and hearts, we will continue to build our country with the help of Hungary's many religious communities.

Changes are taking place in the world scene. In China during the cultural revolution where all churches were closed, where priests and ministers were incarcerated and sent to the farms, you have renewal and rebirth and revival.

Just two months ago, I led a small delegation to Havana, Cuba and met the cigarless, more mellowed Fidel Castro in a midnight meeting. Even this great ideologue is seeking to reach out. Twenty-seven years of Castro rule could not destroy God in the minds and the hearts of the people.

So it's interesting that we see this unbelievable renewal and rebirth and thirst for the very values that make Susquehanna University the outstanding institution that it is, the very important ethical and moral values that will help you as you enter the world, as you leave this university. They will be your stabilizers, they will be your anchors.

And so my prescription is in the words of Micah we read this morning, "What does the Lord require of you but to do justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Let these be your guidelines.

It is with each individual, each human soul that faith in God and belief in timeless spiritual values must begin. Each one of us has the potential and the capacity to transform ourselves in meeting the challenges of the world by bringing out what is best in ourselves. What is required most in this new world as we enter the 21st century is reliance in faith.

It's a global village. We're no longer isolated from one another. We're interdependent, bound together by instant communication, rapid transportation and the fact that we live in this global village. Therefore, we have to strive to pull together to preserve that global village.

Not ideological debate, not theological debate, but working together as a human family can build a better world we dream of. And so I want to invoke that beautiful covenant God made with Noah and man. Covenant is reflected in the rainbow. And what is the rainbow? It's an assurance that there will be no future destruction of our civilization. In this beautiful countryside, you've observed the rainbow more often than I as a city dweller in New York. But if you look at the rainbow, it consists of distinct colors that blend together to provide many marvelous new hues.

The rainbow is really the symbolism of diversity and pluralism. That's what makes America great. Diversity and pluralism, that's why I love America. All of us have our loyalties,

our commitments to our traditions. And we better preserve our commitments to our traditions. The idea of the melting pot is not reality. It's pluralism that made this country great and will continue to make it great. So we retain our commitments to our traditions, to our nations, to our beliefs, the challenge that faces all of us. Diversity in unity. If we are able to pull together, to blend together, we will yet see the fulfillment of God's promise to Noah, that there will be no more future floods, there will be no more

parole violator, when I heard there had been a hijacking over Nebraska. I immediately called the office.

The plane was scheduled to land at Kansas City Airport. I called to ask if they needed me to help out covering this thing in Kansas City.

"Oh, no," they said. "We have two cars and two crews on the way to Kansas City. You just go ahead to Atlanta and do your story." Off I flew.

Upon my arrival, there was an ABC crew there to meet me, and they said: "Hurry up, and come with us. The plane has been diverted to Atlanta. It's going to land here in a few minutes, and you are covering the hijacking!" So off we went, down to a very remote corner of the airfield.

I found a young man in a general aviation hangar who had a short-wave radio. He was willing to put the phone up next to the radio where both he and I could hear the communication between the FBI and the hijacker in the cockpit. Darkness fell and the situation was still at a stalemate. About 10 p.m. we heard that negotiations had broken down, and they were going to bring the situation to an end by force.

About 20 FBI agents, some of them carrying rifles, came running out and literally shot in the door of the plane. They went aboard the plane. There was shooting; there was screaming. Men, women, children came running off the plane. There was noise, madness, confusion and, suddenly, silence.

In my one ear, I had that little round thing that looks like a hearing aid, you've seen broadcasters wearing this. This is known as interrupted feedback, IFB. The director sitting in New York or wherever the show is originating, can yell at you while you are broadcasting live.

In my other ear I had the telephone, which was still up next to the radio on the other end, and I heard that the hijacker was believed to be wounded and had grabbed a woman hostage.

At any rate the situation was still going on. In my IFB ear, I hear the director in New York saying, "Oh, the wires are running with urgent bulletins that the hijacking is over and the hijacker has been taken into custody."

destruction. That mankind will be blessed with shalom, peace. Peace for the entire world.

This is my prayer for you, for all of us. And this is the challenge we must face. I'm grateful and honored to give this message of faith, of hope, particularly to the graduates. And when you go through life as I have and as you go through trial and tribulation, joy and adversity, remember, invoke that prayer. "Save me and I shall be saved. Heal me and I shall be healed." Thank you.

I said, "No, no, that's not correct. Let me explain to you what's happening. I have this phone, and I hear in my other ear . . ."

"Oh, CBS is going on with a live special report."

I said, "Let me explain to you what's happening."

"Oh, NBC is going on the air. We want to do a live special report and report that it's over too."

I said, "Well, that's fine, but I'm not doing it."

"Oh, yes you are," says the director.

"Oh, no I'm not," says I.

"Oh, yes you are," says he. "In ten, nine, eight, seven . . ."

This is the moment for a decision. You literally see your entire broadcast career flash before your eyes. I felt like Huckleberry Finn in that famous scene in the book where he frees the slave Jim, believing he is doing the wrong thing when in fact he is doing the correct thing, and he says, "All right, I'll go to hell."

I heard the anchorman introducing me live on the air. And he said something like: "Well, we understand that the hijacking is all over down there in Atlanta. Isn't that right, Bettina?"

I took a deep breath and said, "No, it's not." I told the truth as best I could.

Well, I might have been wrong, but since there is safety in numbers, I wouldn't have been very wrong. But I thought to myself, I will tell the story as I believe it to be the case.

As it turned out, I did the correct thing. My persistence saved me in the end. The others were wrong. And as it turned out, the director who was trying to pressure me so unfairly into doing what was not right is no longer working at ABC news, and I am.

So to the graduates of the Class of 1988, I want to leave you with a very simple message. Please don't be afraid to take risks. Nothing ventured, nothing gained. Don't be afraid of failure. The problem is not failing, but failing to do something about it, to try again. The key to success, in my business and I think in most any other, is to persist and persist until you do eventually succeed.

I want to wish you all great success, a lot of love, and a lot of luck in the lives that you will go forward with from this your Commencement day. Thank you.

Soviets Look Beyond System for Economic Answers

If the Soviet Union wants to be a key player in the developing global economy, Soviet leaders will have to look beyond its closed economic system to free enterprise for new ideas, new technology, and a new sense of competition.

"In other countries, what's happening in small and medium businesses is the lightning rod that attracts all those ideas," says Susquehanna University management professor William A. Ward. "With no entrepreneurs and very few small businesses and development opportunities, what can the Soviet Union offer but more of the same? As a world player, it cannot continue to live a closed system."

The 'glasnost' policy of liberalization announced by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev last fall legitimizes such opportunities through family enterprises and cooperatives "in the truest Marxist sense" where all workers are owners.

Despite 'glasnost' and the rapidly-approaching date of 1992, when treaties call for Europe to be fully integrated as a Common Market, Ward predicts it will be decades before appreciable change takes place.

"Mikhail Gorbachev sees the problem and realizes they are falling behind, yet he can't do it alone. Now it's a question whether or not they (Soviets) can formulate, implement and manage those changes. Right now, their cumbersome system, history and bureaucracy conspires against that entrepreneurial spirit."

Consider the family who wants to open a restaurant. Also consider the roadblocks that family members face before grand opening. Ward illustrates his point:

There are no Small Business Administrations or Small Business Development Centers for advice. Loan programs are practically unheard of.

There are more hurdles. How do they receive clearance for a business location? How do they secure utilities, equipment, and supplies? After the restaurant opens, how can they be assured that they will always have a food supply?

"The system will change slowly. It's one thing for Gorbachev to announce the change, but it's much more difficult to change it. It will require wholesale adjustments in the system. There's no precedence for this in the Soviet Union."

Ward, a board member of the International Council for Small Business and vice president of its U.S. affiliate, says the Soviet Union should study China's lessons of liberalization which could make the nation "the Japan of the 21st century" because of its natural resources, population, entrepreneurial spirit and energy for businesses to grow if it wishes to become a major economic player.

After 40 years of communism, China is developing new commercial codes, contracts, and ways of doing business.

"The Chinese are saying 'We need small businesses and entrepreneurs to come up with all

the ideas and products that will improve the economy, the quality of life and the health of our country." Ward says. "A lot is going on there with business development, privatization, entrepreneurship and private ownership. They've leaptfrogged ahead of the Soviets.

"There is a tremendous amount of innovation and development and technology and productivity that comes from entrepreneurs and small business," Ward points to the American small business successes in the software industry which boast Lotus 1,2,3 and Apple computers.

"Look at what they have done for our economy," Ward says. "The free enterprise system gives anyone the opportunity who has a great idea to try their hand at it."

William A. Ward is professor of management at the Sigmund Weis School of Business, Susquehanna University, and currently holds the Alan R. Warehime endowed chair in business administration. His career experience includes Presidential appointments during the Nixon and Ford administrations, reviewing major policy decisions and actions of domestic and international programs.

Track Works 'The Taylor Way' at Susquehanna

Susquehanna University men's head track and field coach Jim Taylor isn't accustomed to losing.

One glance at his successful coaching record indicates that fact. After finishing at 3-6 in his first year, Taylor's teams haven't lost since and have produced five national champions and 21 All-Americans. Taylor took over a losing Susquehanna program 10 years ago after leaving the track program he initiated at Selinsgrove Area High School which had won 56 straight meets.

The Crusaders presently enjoy a string of 64 straight meet victories, among the nation's longest. They also have won six of the last seven Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) team championships, the largest NCAA Division III conference.

Taylor is proud of those accomplishments, yet his most enjoyable victories have come off the track in the bigger game of life.

"That's what it's all about — that's what college is for in the first place," he says. "You look at these individuals now and you'd like to think that you had some kind of positive influence on them. You like to see them draw on something in their athletic experience that made them better professionals in life."

Ernie Meisel '83 has found that to be true. A 1983 graduate with a bachelor's degree in business, Meisel was team captain in his senior year and was an NCAA Division III qualifier in the 200-meter dash and a member of the 400-meter relay team which placed sixth at nationals.

Now financial accounting manager for Keystone Railway Equipment Co. of Camp Hill, Meisel knows much of that was made possible by Taylor's guidance.

"For one thing, Coach Taylor stresses dedication, both to the sport and education. He always stresses studies and other activities in addition to track," Meisel says.

Scott Heller '82 was a pole vaulter and a captain on Taylor's first MAC championship team in 1982.

Now practicing law in Morristown, N.J., Heller remains in contact with his former coach and helps locate prospective student athletes.

"He's been the greatest," Heller says. "I remember how he often stressed that he wanted to make us first-class people as well as first-class runners. It was very important to him that we conducted ourselves in the proper manner at all times. He didn't want to hear of any 'hot dog' comments from the other coaches."

In Taylor's first year at Susquehanna, there were few 'hot dog' comments as the team lost six of its first seven meets. But by the end of the season, the fortunes of Susquehanna track were already beginning to change.

"We ended up winning our last two meets and that seemed to get things going. But I don't think anyone thought we'd go undefeated the next season," Heller says. "Coach Taylor was able to get people excited about track."

It's that enthusiasm which enables Taylor to lure

some of track's elite students to Susquehanna.

One of those recruits was Mike Spangler '88 of Abbotstown. A multiple state champion at South Western High School, Spangler was recruited by most of the top Division I track programs and narrowed his choices to Maryland, Penn State, Villanova and Susquehanna.

Spangler is a four-time Division III national champion and a seven-time All-American. Spangler, who hopes to qualify for the Olympic trials this season, graduated magna cum laude.

Spangler knows track works the Taylor way. "He really does allow you to be flexible between your various activities," Spangler says. "When it comes to being on the team, he lets you know when you should be there, but he also knows there are other things."

Spangler hopes to follow in Taylor's footsteps by teaching school and coaching track this fall. (In addition to coaching, Taylor teaches science full time

at Selinsgrove Area Middle School.)

"Jim is an excellent recruiter and motivator. In any given year, he has the kind of team that can beat us," says Paul Kaiser, head coach of the Division II Shippensburg University men's track team.

"(Taylor) has the type of team which is capable of competing with just about anyone. He's the type of guy you like to coach against."

Coaching has little to do with the success, Taylor says. He shrugs and says the credit should go to the athletes.

"Certainly I'm proud of all the accomplishments, but it's been a lot of factors. It's been the type of athlete we've been able to attract and a lot of hard work on their part once they got here," he says. "When you're successful, it's certainly not by one person."

Maybe not, but when it comes to track and field, success seems to follow Taylor.

A Salute to Sports Standouts

Mike Spangler '88 of Abbottstown and **Candy Lain '88** of Sussex, N.J. received Susquehanna University's top athletic awards for 1987-88, while Altoona businessman **Donald B. Wissinger '50** received the Dr. Russell W. Gilbert Memorial Award for his contributions and interest in Susquehanna University athletics.

SPANGLER, a four-year letterman and two-year team captain, was honored as the top senior athlete. He also received the Blair Heaton Award, presented annually to the athlete who best displays the qualities of the three-sport alumnus who later taught and coached at Selinsgrove Area High School and Susquehanna.

Spangler is a four-time Division III national champion and a seven-time All-American in track and field. He also holds university and conference records in the 100, 200 and 400 and has anchored the record-setting 1,600-meter relay team.

A history major, Spangler touted a 3.56 grade point average with a 3.93 in his major. He has been named to the Conference's all-academic team.

LAIN was a three-year letterwinner in field hockey and has earned four letters in track. She received the Association of Women Students Award as outstanding senior female athlete.

Named the best defensive player on this year's field hockey squad, Lain was a defensive starter on the championship team of 1986.

This year, Lain was captain of the track team and its top performer. She was a four-event winner in the final quadrangular against Delaware Valley, Gettysburg and Lycoming (100-400-meter hurdles, high jump and anchor for the 1,600-meter relay) and missed qualifying for the Division III championships by 16 seconds in the 400-meter intermediates at the Millersville Metrics.

WISSINGER is vice president of the Altoona-based E.R. Wissinger Inc., a family-owned chain of supermarkets and shopping centers. While at

Susquehanna, he was a four-year football and baseball letterwinner. He maintains a deep interest in Susquehanna sports, is a member of the University's Board of Directors, and is active in Altoona community affairs.

"Don epitomizes a Susquehanna graduate and also represents everything we can hope for in our Gilbert Award recipient," says athletic director Don Harnum. "He continues to be highly interested in our sports program as well as the University at large, while maintaining a large, family-owned business."

From Streisand to Springsteen Tomlyn Wows the Pop Music Industry



Visiting Susquehanna this year brought fond memories to Bo Tomlyn (aka Bruce Rogers '73). Tomlyn, a prominent pop synthesist, returned to present a weeklong seminar and concert for Susquehanna students. It also gave Tomlyn a chance to share his progress with his former professor, Jack Fries.

Bo Tomlyn's (aka Bruce Rogers '73) continued relationship with Susquehanna made his recent return to campus a memorable one.

One of the top synthesists in the pop music industry, Tomlyn's credits include programming synthesizers and playing keyboards in recording sessions with such artists as Michael Jackson, Lionel Richie, Barry Manilow, Barbra Streisand, Chicago, Bruce Springsteen and Elton John.

Some of his more recent recording efforts include performances on "The Love Theme" from the motion picture "St. Elmo's Fire" by David Foster and the duet by Julio Iglesias and Stevie Wonder entitled "My Love."

Tomlyn's efforts are responsible for much of the musical image created for many of today's top artists.

"They (the artists) are the people that stand up on stage, and the ones who people know by their faces and their voices," says Tomlyn. "But there's got to be someone behind that artist, creating them as the audience knows them."

Although much of Tomlyn's style today is a result of his creativity, he learned many of the fundamentals as a Susquehanna student. Jack Fries, associate professor of music, well remembers Tomlyn's musical direction.

"He was unlike a lot of our music majors in that he was diversified but he leaned toward pop music," Fries says. "He would often show me some of the pieces of music he created. He did a lot of singing on campus as well."

Since Tomlyn graduated from Susquehanna in 1973, Fries says that he has often stopped to give his former instructor an "update on his progress."

Tomlyn's return this year came in conjunction with Alumni Weekend, but this time Tomlyn became the instructor and Fries a student. Tomlyn presented a weeklong seminar on synthesis and a concert using the technique.

"The biggest thing about the course was taking something as complicated as the synthesizer and watching someone take you to its highest possible point in one week," Fries says.

Tomlyn's first exposure to the field came in 1970 when his mother encouraged him to take a course in music synthesis. He's come a long way from that initial course, but then again, so has the synthesized music field.

"The creative end of it has gone nuts," says Tomlyn. "We've barely scratched the surface."

It's that creativity that keeps Tomlyn's interest high as he produces beautiful music in concert.

"The quality of his own songs and arrangements is just magnificent," Fries says. "The other thing that I find remarkable is his ability to hear such detail in sound and music."

For Tomlyn, that ability comes from a simple principle.

"Music to me is something that comes from the heart — you either feel it inside or you don't."

The 1987-88 giving year will long be remembered at Susquehanna as giving to the University surpassed goals at record-breaking levels. Total giving to the University reached \$4,699,659, representing a 45 percent increase from 1986-87 and a 300 percent increase from five years earlier.

Supporters met the March 1988 announcement of the largest capital campaign in university history enthusiastically. To date, more than \$13 million has been committed toward the Window of Opportunity campaign's \$22 million goal.

Support also broke the goal set for the Susquehanna University Fund, the annual fund that helps the University provide student financial aid, attract distinguished professors and scholars, and offer strong programs and facilities.

Contributions to the SUF increased 12 percent in 1987-88, totaling \$924,901, exceeding the \$900,000 goal. Contributions to the SUF in 1986-87 totaled \$827,845. Thirty-nine percent of Susquehanna's alumni contributed to the SUF, increasing three percentage points from 1986-87 and exceeding the national average of 22.6 percent.

Other achievements for 1987-88 include:

▶ The National Committee on Annual Giving, led by Carl Campbell '65, personally contacted 250 alumni on behalf of the SUF resulting in gifts totaling \$133,722.

▶ The Parents Executive Committee, led by Jack '57 and Joan Bishop, raised \$53,183 from 401 families. This year, \$40,159 of the Parents Fund monies will be used in support of the Blough-Weis Library. The Parents Executive Committee also sponsored the fall Parents Weekend '87, published and distributed a Parents' Handbook, and hosted receptions to welcome freshman parents.

▶ More than 400 Campus Phonathon student volunteers, led by Bill Mikus '89, raised \$105,352 for the SUF, exceeding their goal of \$100,000. Student volunteers contacted 5,637 alumni and secured 2,800 pledges in 18 nights of calling.

▶ The Class of 1938 Reunion Gift Committee, led by Herbert C. Lauver '38, set out to raise \$25,000 in recognition of the golden anniversary of their graduation from Susquehanna. Committee members personally contacted each class member and raised \$34,270. Of this total, \$33,485 will establish the Class of

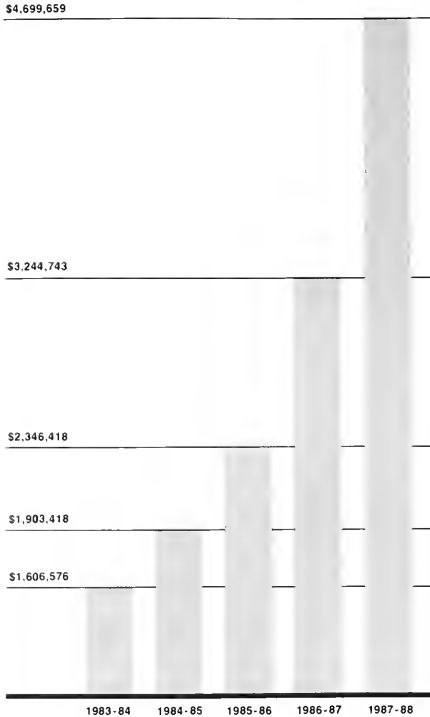

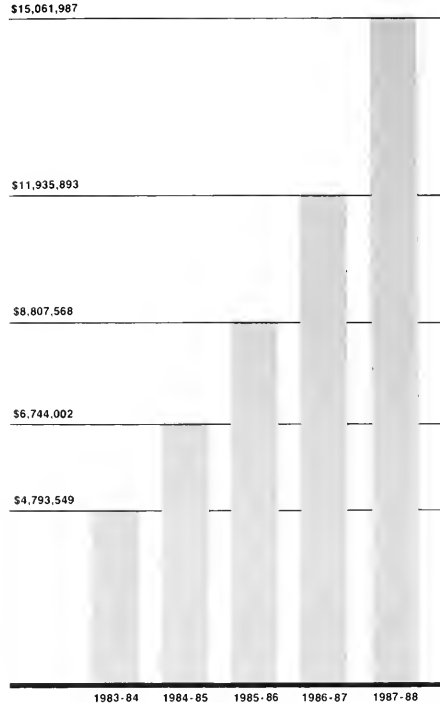
Total Giving to Susquehanna

1938 Faculty Research and Development Fund

► The Class of 1963 captured a part of Susquehanna history as the first 25th reunion class to make a special gift in honor of their reunion. The reunion gift committee, led by Joseph R. Joyce '63, set a goal of \$25,000. In less than five months, committee members contacted 152 class members and raised a total of \$34,959. Of this total, \$25,905 will be used to establish the Class of 1963 Scholarship Fund in honor of President Emeritus Gustave Weber.

► The Class of 1988 Senior Pledge Program volunteers, led by Mark Thorsheim '88, took the

Senior Class by storm. Program volunteers challenged their classmates to join the "'88 Club" by making three-year pledges to the SUF totaling \$88. The senior class topped their \$12,000 goal and broke a Susquehanna record for this program by raising \$14,496, with 53 percent of the class participating.

► Business and Industry Campaign volunteers, led by Truman H. Purdy of Sunbury, exceeded their \$100,000 goal by collecting \$121,832 from 150 Susquehanna Valley businesses and industries, including \$25,000 in challenge gifts to the SUF.

► The University held its first Donor Recognition Dinner to thank Susquehanna supporters for their generosity.

This banner year of giving extends an era of exceptional growth at Susquehanna. Total giving in 1981-82 totalled \$1,118,000 compared to \$4,699,659 in 1987-88.

Susquehanna is indebted to the many volunteers and their leaders who encourage others to invest in the university's future.



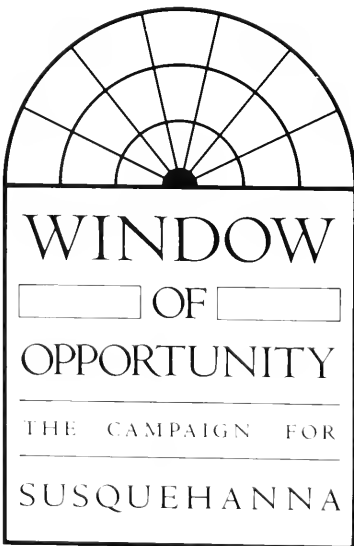

When they made the appointment, they told me that they'd like me to consider chairing the 1987-88 SUF campaign.

Since I had already committed myself to a few other projects, I was afraid that I wouldn't be able to give the SUF the attention it deserved. But, as I sat and listened to them talk about Susquehanna, I started to reconsider. They reminded me of the tremendous progress that the University is making in so many areas — admissions are up, the campus has never looked better, our faculty is growing, and our financial condition has never been stronger. They told me that literally thousands of people would be willing to help me meet the impressive \$900,000 goal — they said it would be challenging and a lot of fun. After listening to all of this, I was so filled with pride and enthusiasm for Susquehanna, that the next thing I knew I saying "Yes! I'll chair the 1987-88 SUF."

That was one of the very best decisions I made last year. And now, it is my honor and privilege to thank each and every one of you who helped to make 1987-88 the best year ever for the Susquehanna University Fund. Thanks to you, I am able to report that as of June 30, 1988, the SUF exceeded its 1987-88 goal of \$900,000 by reaching an all-time record total of \$924,901. This represents a 12 percent increase over



1986-87 results. But as far as I am concerned, the most impressive statistic is the record-breaking 39 percent alumni participation percentage, representing an increase of more than 200 new alumni donors.

This success is the result of the work and enthusiasm of a dedicated group of Susquehanna University Fund volunteers. More than 400 alumni, parents, students and local businesspersons volunteered throughout the year to help make our record-breaking results possible.

My sincere thanks and appreciation is extended to the Vice-Chairs and members of the National Committee of Annual Giving who contacted

many of you for a leadership commitment to the SUF: members of the Parents Executive Committee, who under the leadership of Jack '57 and Joan Bishop increased parent giving to a record high of \$53,183; our student phanathon volunteers and their chairman, Bill Mikus '89, whose efforts netted \$105,352; Susquehanna's dedicated and loyal Class Agents; Business and Industry campaign chairman Truman Purdy, his steering committee, and volunteer team who successfully met two challenge gifts totaling \$25,000 to raise \$121,832; and members of the Class of 1988, led by Mark Thorsheim '88, whose three-year commitments to the SUF total \$14,496.

I would also like to congratulate and recognize the reunion gift efforts of the Class of 1938 and the Class of 1963. Led by chairman Herb Lauver '38, the Class of 1938 raised \$34,270 in honor of their 50th reunion, and mounting the first ever 25th reunion campaign, chairman Joe Joyce '63 and his committee raised \$34,939.

And, to each of you whose name appears in the list that follows — "Thank you" for responding so generously when one of these volunteers called on you.

My early morning visitors were right . . . this was fun, thousands of you did help, and because of that, the challenge of raising \$900,000 was made easier. Thank you again for all that you've done to make 1987-88 a record breaker for the SUF. I hope we can count on your continued support next year.

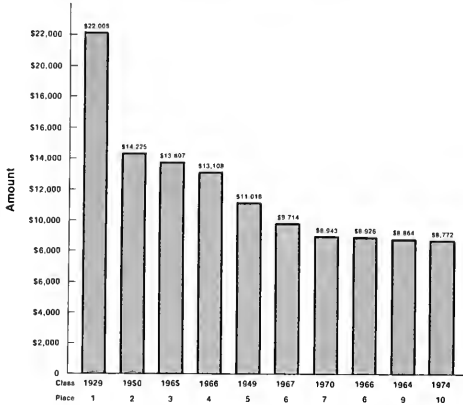

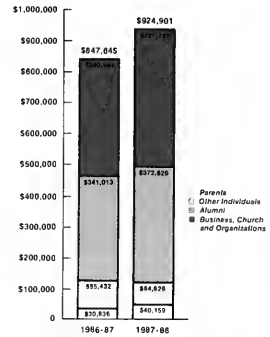

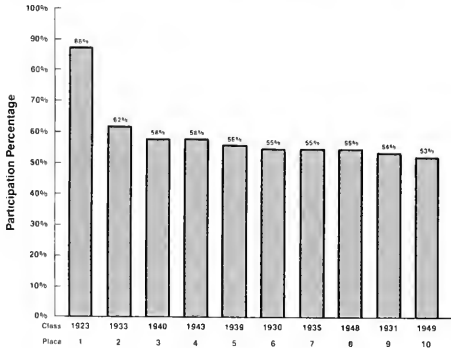
Top Ten Classes by Total Contribution to the SUF



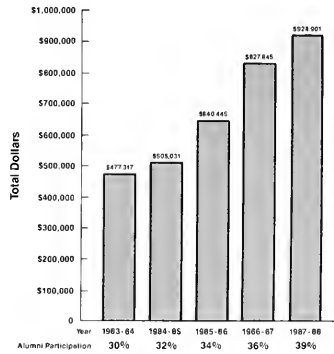
Who Contributes to the SUF



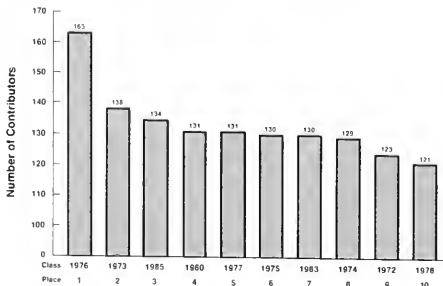
Top Ten Classes By Percentage of Class Contributing to the SUF



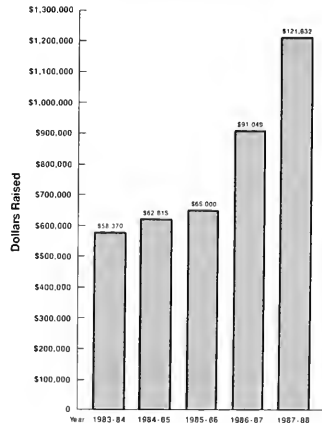
Growth in the SUF (Total Dollars and Alumni Participation)

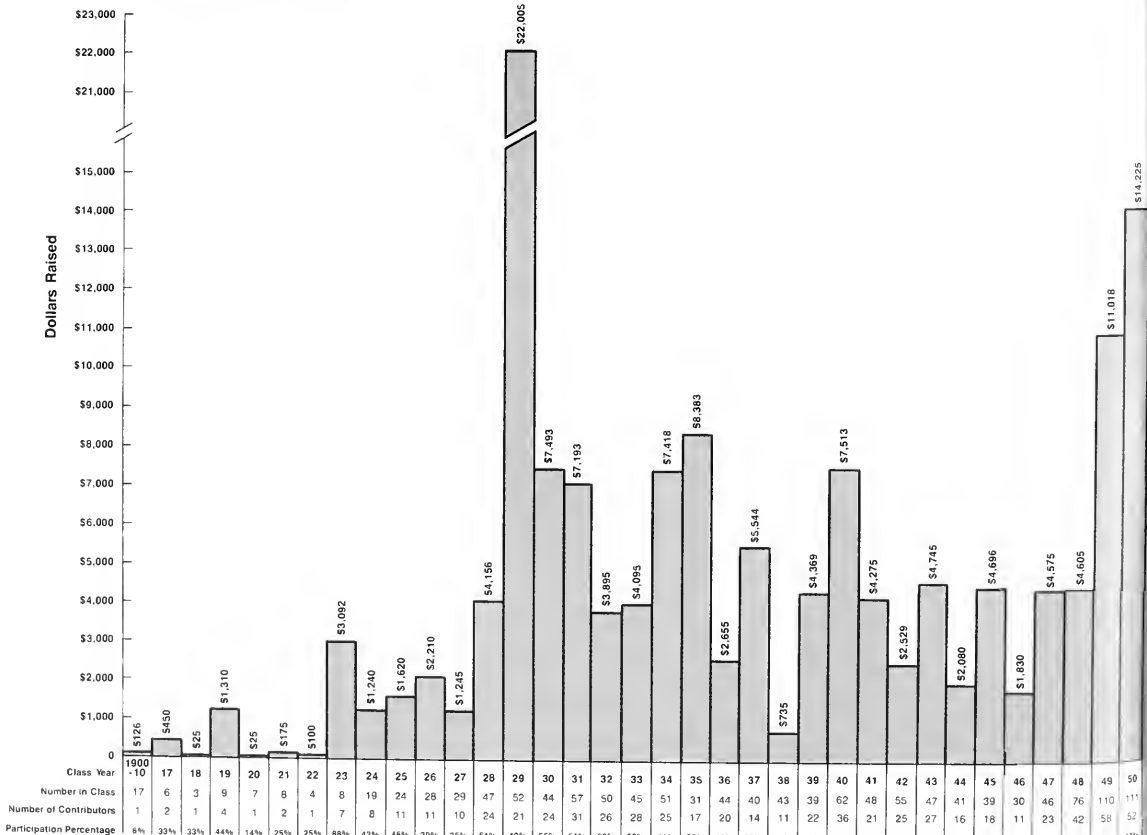

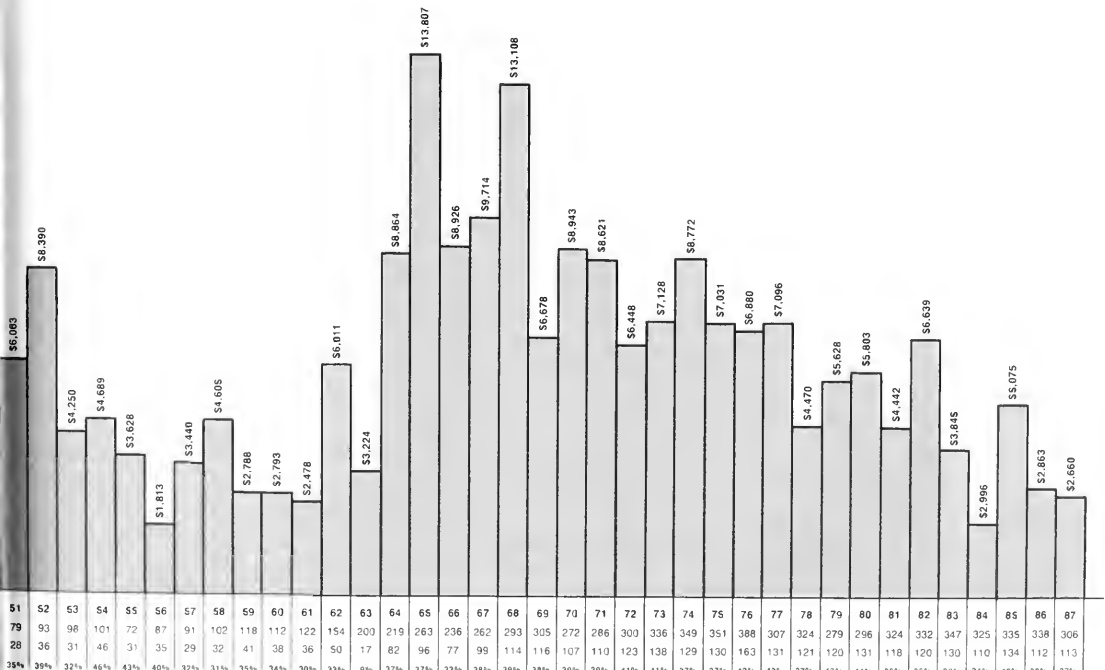

Susquehanna Cited Among America's Best Colleges

Susquehanna University once again has been cited among the nation's top 25 comprehensive colleges by *U.S. News & World Report*.

Susquehanna is the only Pennsylvania institution that has been ranked in three consecutive surveys among small comprehensive colleges. Susquehanna was ranked 17th among the 167 U.S. institutions that enroll between 1,500 and 2,500 students.

The magazine stated that "beyond admitting good students, keeping a strong faculty and supporting both with sufficient resources, the best small comprehensive

colleges offer students the fruits of both academic worlds: the vast array of liberal arts and professional programs found at larger universities and the personal settings traditional at schools specializing in the liberal arts."

The magazine used five measures to judge educational quality: the school's selectivity; the strength of its faculty; its instructional budget per student; the resources available for its educational programs; a college's ability to see its entering students through to graduation.

Susquehanna received especially high marks for its high percentage of student retention and for its course in career planning that is required of all students for graduation. *U.S. News & World Report* based its ranking on Susquehanna's Class of 1986 which boasted a higher than 71 percent retention rate.

Amos Alonzo Stagg Day 1988

will go down in Susquehanna history as being more than a football ceremony to honor a pair of the University's legendary gridiron coaches.

The weekend of October 22 will be remembered as a celebration of some 50 years of Crusader athletics and a tribute to two men that largely made it all possible.

Few will remember the weekend more than A.A. Stagg Jr., 89, and his wife Arvilla. Stagg Jr. coached 26 years at Susquehanna, 17 as head football coach. He was honored during a halftime ceremony at the Susquehanna-Widener football game, and was presented an honorary Doctor of Science degree later that day.

"In 1924, I went out and visited colleges from Salt Lake City to Boston as part of the Olympic trials. I visited some 160 colleges and, as far as beauty, Susquehanna is in the top 10 percent," Stagg said of his return.

"The combination of it being a college that is trying to turn out good people and bright people to live happy lives is the best way to go."

"Coach Stagg said that he was honored by Susquehanna as he was presented a Doctor of Science degree. But this man, who gave so much life to the University, honored Susquehanna by returning to campus," said Jim Campbell '63, Director of Alumni Relations. (See Commentary, Page 2.)

His father, the legendary A.A. Stagg Sr. who ranks third in NCAA history in all-time coaching victories (314), co-coached the team to a 21-19-3 record with his son for six years (1947-52). Stagg Sr. died in 1965 at the age of 102.

Stagg Jr. was joined by a reunion of nearly 100 of his former athletes for the festivities. Many held fond memories of "Coach."

"If I had to select 10 of the most compassionate and understanding men I've been around, Coach Stagg would be one of them and would be high on the list," said Susquehanna professor emeritus Robert M. Bastress '39 of Selingsgrove. Bastress, who was a running back from 1933-34 and 1937-38, owns the school's ninth best career rushing mark (1,517) and eighth-best seasonal total (660 in 1938).

"Amos Alonzo Stagg Jr. was a real gentleman who was dedicated to each of his players. He had a good value system and he passed it on to his players," said Samuel D. Ross Jr. '54 of Carlisle, a running back at Susquehanna from 1951-53. Ross is now president of Pennsylvania Blue Shield.

"Mr. Stagg had an intense interest in his players as people and not just as football players."

Stagg's feelings for his former players were still apparent upon his return to Susquehanna

"Both Mrs. Stagg and I enjoyed our trip immensely. One of the most delicious parts was that I had a chance to meet and talk with some of the former team members I had coached as well as a host of friends," said Stagg.

"While I was away and the years passed, I got very hungry to see my former friends. I have a deep interest in my former players who have worked so hard for Susquehanna and me."

Stagg and his former players displayed their deep feelings during an emotional halftime ceremony in which Stagg, the former athlete, and others in the crowd were caught up in the moment. President Joel Cunningham presented Stagg with a framed photograph of young Stagg and his father on the Susquehanna bench flanked by players Bob O'Gara '51, of Middletown, NJ and Dick Burley '53, of Muncy.

"It was the unanimous opinion of all the returnees that the Stagg celebration was the finest weekend that we've had here in a long while," said Larry Isaacs '43 of Selingsgrove, a Stagg Era tailback. A retired corporate financial executive, Isaacs is now a visiting professor of business practice at Susquehanna. "The thing that impressed everyone was the vigor, pep and interest in current activities shown by Coach and Mrs. Stagg."

Stagg also had a positive influence on the 1988 Crusader football team during his visit, as he addressed the squad prior to their Friday practice. The Crusaders were to play Widener University the next day in a game which could have earned them their third-straight Middle Atlantic Conference title.

All 82 players joined the coaches, managers and boosters in a circle around Stagg. In a spirited 10-minute talk, Stagg praised the players for their hard work, retold his favorite motivational story ("Pour on the Welsh Coals") and warned the squad of its opposition on Saturday.

"That (Stagg's speech) was really inspirational," said noseguard John Garrett '90 of Lebanon as he snapped on his helmet before practice.

"It was a thrill for our players," says current head football coach Rocky Rees. "They touched the history and tradition of the game that most kids don't get an opportunity to experience."

Unfortunately, the Crusaders dropped the 16-10 contest to the Pioneers of Widener.

"That Widener cornerback did a fine job," Stagg told a reporter from the *Philadelphia Inquirer*. "And that Number 98 (defensive end John Collins) is a tough son of a gun. They made it tough for my team today."

Stagg Reunion Pays Tribute to Legendary Coaches

There are those at Notre Dame who will tell you that the spirit of Knute Rockne is still alive on their campus.

After Stagg Day at Susquehanna, we know "The Spirit of Stagg" is alive and well on ours. As Coach and Mrs. Stagg returned home to Susquehanna, it became evident that Amos Alonzo Stagg Jr. was more than a coach at Susquehanna during his 26-year tenure. Whether or not his former players realized it at the time, it was evident during the reunion that this man had a profound and positive influence not only on the lives of "his boys," but on the lives of everyone on campus during those years.

The magic of the Stagg name brought people back to campus from far and near. Some had not returned for 40 years or more.

Television and print reporters — many of whom were not born when Stagg coached his last game at Susquehanna — were captivated by this vibrant, energetic man of nearly 90 years.

President Joel Cunningham presented Coach Stagg with a framed photo of Stagg and his father during an

emotional ceremony, surrounded by nearly 100 of his former athletes. Emotions continued to run high throughout the day. Teammates who had not seen each other for more than 20 years, in some cases, shared in this joyful reunion.

Coach Stagg said he was honored that Susquehanna awarded him an honorary Doctor of Science degree. But it really was Stagg who honored Susquehanna with the time he gave this university and with his return to campus.

The words that best describe Stagg's devotion to Susquehanna are those he used to characterize the success of Susquehanna football: "... Great teams don't occur by accident. They come from the spirit and the very hard work of athletes who love their college and their teammates. There also has to be an intense desire and leadership called heart within the team, as well as superior coaching and loyal backing."

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Grant Supports Opportunities for Cultural Diversity

The grant has been provided through AAL's Affirmation of Lutheran Higher Education Program. Since its introduction in 1980, the AAL program has provided more than \$7.4 million in grants to Lutheran colleges and universities in the U.S.

Women, the Arts, and Society

Symposium Draws International Dialogue

More than 800 scholars, performing artists and students gathered November 3-5 at Susquehanna University for what is believed to be the most diverse symposium ever on "Women, the Arts, and Society."

The symposium featured performances and presentations by 200 scholars and artists from as far as Nigeria, England, and Germany. Highlighting the conference as keynote speakers were artist Judy Chicago and literary scholars Sandra Gilbert and Susan Gubar.

"Art embodies vision. If women and men can share their visions of the world and themselves, they can learn to live together without oppression," said symposium co-chair Susan R. Bowers. "We hope this conference helped all of us to appreciate the art of the women who have come before us — our mothers, grandmothers, and aunts — as well as that of women who come from very different ethnic and cultural backgrounds from our own."

Planning for the symposium began in early 1987 when Bowers and co-chair Ron Dotterer, Susquehanna University and board members of the *Susquehanna University Studies*, proposed the idea to President Joel Cunningham. Board members for the scholarly journal envisioned the symposium as a way to stimulate a pool of scholarly papers for the *Studies*.

Their idea won approval and funding from the Fund for Excellence, a fund established in 1985 celebrating the inauguration of Cunningham. The Fund for Excellence is awarded annually to support activities which make an impact on teachers' and learners' lives and contribute to the increasing quality of Susquehanna. The symposium also drew support from the Pennsylvania Humanities Council and the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts.

"We were particularly pleased to have this symposium serve as an expression of Susquehanna's commitment to increased cultural diversity and to the recognition of the contributions of women to the arts and society," Cunningham said.

Jeanne Neff, vice president for academic affairs, said planners envisioned a relatively small gathering of

scholars at the outset. "When the call for papers went out, however, the response was overwhelming. The more than 200 papers and performances chosen for the program represented only about half of the proposals received. It also became apparent that a community wider than University faculty and students was anxious to become involved."

Symposium coordinator Dolly Diers estimated that more than 2,000 hours were spent preparing for the event.

Members of the Susquehanna faculty and administration served as session moderators, along with colleagues from Bucknell University, members of a local women's spirituality group, local artists and crafts people. The university Women's Auxiliary sponsored a concert and provided bed and breakfast accommodations for many participants. Student groups such as Arts Alive, writing tutors, and honorary societies such as Sigma Tau Delta in English and Sigma Alpha Iota in Music offered support. Members of the Panhellenic Council and the brothers of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity also provided assistance.

With topics ranging from quilting to bodybuilding, the symposium was grouped into 59 sessions on education, emerging issues in women's art, film and photography, literature, minority artists, music, mythology, political issues, theatre, and visual arts. The symposium opened with performances by the Susquehanna flute ensemble and Women's Choir as well as an art exhibit by award-winning faculty artists Florence Putterman, Dorothy Masom and David Lauer.

Although the symposium was November 3-5, Susquehanna celebrated the arts during the entire fall semester.

Other artists and lecturers throughout the semester included: Janet Arnold, costumer to British stage and television, sponsored by the Apple-Zimmerman Fund for Elizabethan Studies; Gene Dahmen, Former president of the Boston Bar Association, Woodrow Wilson visiting fellow; Siv Cedering, Visiting Writers Series; Anne Imelda Radice, director of the National

Museum for Women in the Arts; Faith Burgess, dean of the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia; musicians Martha Leader, Mary Tooke, Emily Corbato, Carol Lyn Butcher and Calvert Johnson; Dorothy Gillespie, artist, Woodrow Wilson fellow; Mirta Mulhare, opera composer, sponsored by the Meet the Composer program; The Western Opera Theatre of the San Francisco Opera Company, presenting the opera "Madame Butterfly"; and Lili Bitá, Greek actress.

Leaders in Art, Literary Criticism Serves as Keynoters

Three leaders in the world of women's art and literature highlighted the national symposium on "Women, the Arts and Society" at Susquehanna.

Distinguished literary scholars Susan Gubar and Sandra Gilbert delivered the symposium's first major address on constructing an anthology of literature by women. Gubar and Gilbert edited *The Norton Anthology of Literature by Women*, the first single anthology of the literature produced by English-speaking women between the 14th Century and the Present.

"Through their collaborative work, both in the analysis of women's writing and in the gathering of women writers into anthologies, they have shaped a solid, credible and lasting body of insight and knowledge about women in literature," said Jeanne Neff, vice president of academic affairs.

Gilbert, an English professor at Princeton, and Gubar, and English professor at Indiana University, helped to establish the field of study of literature by women. The anthology they co-edited spans six centuries and constitutes a historic first step toward redefining the canon of great literature.

Visual artist and writer Judy Chicago discussed her contributions to the female point of view in art through her works, "The Birth Project," "Powerplay," and her current project "Holocaust Project 1990."

Chicago is best known for "The Dinner Party," a multi-media project which symbolizes the history of women in a series of 39 place settings, "a reinterpretation of 'The Last Supper' from the point of view of those who have done the cooking and set the table." The creation of "The Dinner Party" involved more than 400 people and five years in the making.

Chicago worked with talented needleworkers in producing "The Birth Project," after interviewing hundreds of women about birth related experiences. "Powerplay" is an exhibition of paintings, drawings, tapestries, and bronzes that demonstrate the adverse effects that power and the desire for power have on men and women in society.

"I think there's still tremendous resistance to the idea that we, as women, can shape the direction of art," Chicago said. "The same problems exist for art that exist for the society in general."

Chicago and her husband, photographer Donald Woodman, are currently working on the "Holocaust Project 1990" to illustrate the need to keep the horror of the Holocaust fresh in the public mind.

Sports

Fall Athletes Rise to All-Stars

Susquehanna athletes were well represented on post-season All-Star teams as 18 Crusaders received honors. Although none of the 1988 Crusader fall squads copped Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) team titles, most remained in title contention until late in the season.

Football

Despite losing 16 starters from the 1987 championship 8-2 squad, the Crusaders came close to winning their third straight MAC title. Fourth-year head coach **Rocky Rees** guided the squad to a 6-2 record and third place in the MAC, 6-4 overall.

On that conference slate was a 16-10 loss to eventual co-champion Widener University in which the Pioneers scored their first touchdown on a disputed fourth and inches call.

Regardless, Rees saw his young team mature from a 1-3 start and go on to win five of its last six contests, including road victories over MAC powers Juniata (21-20) and Lycoming (23-0).

Senior halfback **Joe Witt** of **Shamokin** set six school records, while sophomore cornerback **Cory Mahry** of **Pottsville** tied another in his first year of collegiate football.

Witt set new standards for career all-purpose yardage (4,062), scoring (180), kickoff-return yardage (1,336), and kickoff returns (1,336), as well as single-season all-purpose yardage (1,367) and single-game receiving yardage (215 vs. Lycoming). Witt was selected to the MAC First Team All-Stars and was voted team "Most Valuable Player."

Mahry tallied 10 interceptions, tying the school single-season record (**Mike Fabian**, 1971). He also was tied for second in the final NCAA Division III national rankings (1.1 interceptions/game).

Senior inside linebacker **Trevor Henry** of **Camp Hill** was a Division III Preseason All-American according to *College Football Preview* and was one of *USA Today's* "Players to Watch" in Division III. Henry proved worthy of those accolades during the season, leading the team in tackles with 140 (53 solo, 69 initial hits) and earned MAC First Team honors and was named the squad's "Best Defensive Player."

Joining Witt and Henry on the MAC First Team All-Stars was junior center **Colin Howlett** of **Allentown**, who moved to center in mid-season after starting the year at tackle.

Selections to the MAC Second Team All-Stars included senior fullback and "Best Offensive Player" **Cusnu Iacavazzi** of **Belle Mead, NJ**, and seniors **John Hopkins** of **Wellsboro** at offensive tackle, and **Kenny Jones** of **Mahwah, NJ** at defensive end. Juniors on that team included split end **Chris Elvidge** of **Collegetown**, noseguard **John Garrett** of **Lehannon**, and strong safety **Willie Starace** of **Old Bridge, NJ**. Sophomores included offensive guard **Matt Caretti** of **Shoemakersville**, punter **John Hall** of **Cortland, NY** and place kicker **Randy Helt** of **Camp Hill**.

Crusader gridders also received academic honors. Senior inside linebacker **Rich Roth** of **Dresher** and sophomore quarterback **David Battisti** of **Susquehanna** were named to the GTE CoSIDA District 2 College Division Academic All-America Football Team. The squad included Division II and III players, from a six-state area with a 3.2 Grade Point Average (GPA).

Cross Country

Tenth-year head coach **Stan Seiple** guided the Crusader harriers to a 4-3 overall record as he earned his 100th career victory as head coach (100-23-1).

Although injuries and illness hampered the squad at the MAC Championships and led to a 12th-place finish, senior **Ed Fallon** of **Old Bridge, NJ** completed his best season with the team's top finish at the MAC competition (22nd). He finished first for the Crusaders in several meets, sharing that honor with junior captain **Marty Martynuska** of **Lilly**.

Seiple retired at season's end and former Susquehanna women's track head coach (1984-85) and men's track assistant (1981-85) **Bob Remaley** of **Richfield** was named as his successor. A distance coach for the men's track team, Remaley accumulated a 12-7 record as women's head coach.

Field Hockey

After getting off to a 3-0 start while outscoring their opponents 10-0, the Lady Crusaders had scoring problems for the remainder of the season and finished 5-7-1 for 13th-year head coach **Connie Harnum**.

Despite the record, junior left link **Wendy Sharkus** of **Easton** was selected to the MAC Northwest All-Star team. Junior goalie **Beth Parillo** of **Brookside, NJ** finished tenth in the MAC in goalie save percentage at 875 (112 saves/16 goals). Freshman wing **Peggy Bobb** of **Middleburg** led the squad in scoring with four goals.

Soccer

The men's soccer team opened the season by winning six of its first ten matches, including a 3-1 MAC-NW mark and a victory over Division II Bloomsburg

University (2-1). The team surpassed its 1987 win total (4) by mid-season.

A loss to the nationally-ranked University of Scranton was followed by another setback to top-ranked Elizabethtown. A seven-game slide brought the team's final record to 6-11 for second-year head coach **Terry Molloy**.

Senior forward and co-captain **Bill Mueller** of **Berkeley Heights, NJ** broke the school record for goals in a career as he scored 13 of the team's 18 goals, giving him 28 for his career. Mueller was selected to the MAC Second Team All-Stars for his efforts.

Senior goalie **Rob Ancipink** of **Fanwood, NJ** had another solid year, toting a .758 save percentage (132 saves/42 goals) and a 2.47 goals against average. Junior co-captain and midfielder **Dennis McManus** of **Spring Lake Heights, NJ** also played well in the midfield and heads the list of underclassmen

Volleyball

Under the guidance of first-year head coach **Carole Templon**, the 1988 women's volleyball team posted its second-straight winning season at 17-14 and battled from a MAC playoff spot down to season's end.

Although Elizabethtown took the final playoff spot, junior setter/hitter and captain **Jennifer Davis** of **York** was named to the MAC-Northwest Section All-Stars after leading the team in digs (36), finishing second in kill attempts (257), and completing 134 with a .358 kill percentage. The two-time Susquehanna MVP also was first on the squad in set attempts (354), assists (672), and services aces (59).

Senior hitter **Tracy Gillin** of **Conemaugh** earned post-season honors with her selection to the GTE/CoSIDA District 2 College Division Academic All-America Volleyball Team.

Susquehanna faculty members have long been revered by students for their dedication to good teaching. What has not been so visible over the years is the contribution of individual professors to their academic disciplines as scholars and artists of distinction.

The faculty who come to Susquehanna in the 1990s will bring to the classroom and research laboratory the new knowledge and

technologies exploding in all disciplines. Here, they will meet a community of seasoned colleagues who will pass on the University's traditions and assist in the development of teaching skills.

For new and old alike, the excitement and momentum of a good regional school on the way to becoming a distinctive and nationally well-regarded presence in higher education, make Susquehanna an especially attractive professional "home." For the University, the presence of a strong and distinguished faculty is the most enduring symbol and the foundation of our past and future claim to quality.

As you read the faculty essays here, I invite you to reflect on your own experience at Susquehanna and the professors who had the greatest influence on your development. Your success and achievements are the best proof of their labor, and also the best thanks.

Early in the newsmagazine these Haitian women are waiting and those that are not are holding their breath and the hands of men tense with a bullet expectation. And I've read, too, that the wind tonight may have come from their mourning, the beating of their arms in the air sending this record warm front north. I've read about fractals, the Russian Dolls of the universe, diamonds made of diamonds made of diamonds diminishing in size; I've learned the Butterfly Effect, how chaos is not chaos, how some slaughter in Haiti flaps its wings and churns into my grip on the arm of my son, my clenched teeth and hiss as he flutters

his free arm and wails and changes the future of weather in a country east of us where a father will choose, he thinks, to stun his son to obedience. And when I leave him to let the dog walk me into sense, the unnatural wind chatters the branches that skitter her to a barking panic on our street of sculpted shrubbery where Christmas bulbs, in one yard, might be arranged into language if you're angled, across the road, upstairs—positioned like an antenna straining for a distant station, my son in his window watching me handle the dog, my breath without its winter clouds, nothing he'd believe could join the southern grief of a warm front.

He rides the bus to his sister's climbs the stairs to the porch where she keeps cat-stones on the railing.

There is a phone call in her fists: "Cal is dead," she says, flinging one knobbed rock at the yard's empty space.

He follows a pinstripe up his factory pants, not losing it from cuff to belt while he thinks of ways to die in the mill,

what his brother might have forgotten.

With a second stone his sister carves the railing: "A crane," she murmurs, grinds a second line, and the tracks run off the bannister's cliff edge. Choking on Throwaways

Reusable materials could ease solid-waste crisis

In recent months, we've become accustomed to the news of daily closings of landfills, the rarer openings of improved waste disposal sites, and the escalating costs of disposal.

All seem to be the results of the recently instituted regulations of Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Resources (DER).

Reports indicate that the DER is aware of many of the potential problems and that, at least, a partial or short-term "solution" is to ship our garbage out of this region, say, to Western Pennsylvania.

This and other information leads us to believe that, as new landfills begin to replace those closing antiquated "dumps," we can rest assured that we'll be able to rid ourselves of waste efficiently, albeit at higher costs. It leads us to believe that we'll be doing our part as responsible citizens by following the mandatory recycling regulations.

The ultimate goal of DER and other lawmakers seems to be further prevention, while helping to clean up leaking, outdated waste disposal sites that are degrading our environment. No one can fault them for attempting these notable aims. However, we've not begun to attack the real problem.

legislators and local officials to focus their attention and energy on forcing industry to create reusable—not recyclable—products. Reusable products would be returned to the marketplace in their original state after being cleaned, sterilized, refilled or whatever its original use dictates.

This solution to the waste-disposal problem would require a radical change in our lifestyles. We'd be expected to return those goods when they've exceeded their usefulness.

It's time that we realize that our society gives companies the incentive to produce throwaway products and even recyclable products at ever-escalating rates. Companies will continue to produce them because we continue to purchase them.

Meanwhile, the shrinking number of waste-disposal sites, despite some improvements, will continue to be overloaded, and our environment will continue to be degraded. Our costs for disposal will continue to rise while our natural-resource base will continue to shrink.

This will happen unless each of us becomes more willing to push for more sound inducements, legislation, and enforcements to reduce, and even eliminate, portions of the growing volume of waste we find necessary to dump into someone else's backyard. Such actions would make far fewer demands on the continued exploration and mining of many related natural resources used to produce the vast quantities and forms of energy required to make, transport and bury garbage. Our environment and our society would benefit from such positive actions.

Why do humans require throwaways when there is "no away?" It's a matter of choice. We can either continue to bury ourselves and others in garbage or we can refuse to accept programmed obsolescence of the present-day garbage we have been using and dumping.

Even wild animals seem to have better sense than to defile their environments than we have demonstrated historically.

Time for Sanity

In big-time college athletics

There comes a time when a basketball recruit has to realize that no one will care about his jump shot after he graduates.

That statement applies to 95 percent of major college athletes — a fact many coaches and administrators know all too well.

Maybe that's why the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), with its controversial Proposition 48 and even more controversial Proposal 42, seeks to make potential athletes crack the books before they get to college.

College and university presidents and boards of trustees have to take charge and make sure that athletes are admitted to their institutions for the right reason—to get an education.

No longer should colleges and universities be used as training camps for professional athletes. Presidents and trustees must not allow coaches to decide this issue, or they will lose control over their institutions.

Who should be allowed to attend college? If athletes are admitted on a standard divorced from the usual admissions policy, what message is delivered? Division I folks—those in the schools where athletics

are serious sources of revenue—are caught in a bind created by conflicting desires: admitting student-athletes for academic reasons versus generating huge sums of money to operate entire programs. Pity the athletic director who sees a 15 percent decrease in football and basketball attendance when his teams start to lose.

This problem came to light with the recent emotional response to Proposal 42, which denies athletic scholarships to those recruits who do not have both a 700 score on the Scholastic Aptitude Test and a minimum high school grade point average in core curriculum classes.

Those making the most noise over Proposal 42 are doing so because they see their pool of athletic talent dwindling—a symptom of a pernicious disease caused by the need to win. They disguise this fear by claiming that Proposal 42 is racially discriminatory.

But under Prop 42, no one is denied an education. The same people who would fail to qualify under the proposal can still receive aid based on need and don't lose an opportunity to attend college. They also could attend a school affiliated with the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) or a junior or community college.

Many presidents and trustees have been influenced by coaches and athletic directors and have engaged in the exploitation of student-athletes for the sole purpose of winning. Instead, these leaders should be working to create a campus environment that properly balances athletics and academics.

That environment should limit to 21 hours per week the time an athlete participates in any sport. Seasons should be shortened. And athletes should not be disciplined for missing tutoring or film sessions, weight training or practices.

Some of these universities can learn a lesson from schools like Duke, Notre Dame, Stanford and Penn State, where leaders refuse to muddle their priorities, yet still have high levels of athletic success. All of these schools, incidentally, voted in favor of Prop 42.

Division III schools are not included in the recent NCAA academic push because they maintain a balance between athletics and academics. Athletes in Division III are indistinguishable from the rest of the students at their schools.

There is another major difference between the divisions. Division III programs are not financed through gate receipts and TV revenues. Presidents and boards of trustees make budget decisions. If Division I did the same thing, it would help bring sanity to major college athletics.

No one has all the answers to the problems plaguing big-time college sports. But one thing is certain: Balance between athletics and academics must be restored.

Tuition, Fees Set for 1989-90

Citing its commitment to provide quality instruction, facilities and services for students, Susquehanna University's Board of Directors has approved higher tuition and fees for 1989-90.

The comprehensive fee for first-year students next year will be \$15,100. Of that figure, tuition and fees will be \$11,500 and room and board will be \$3,600.

The comprehensive fee for sophomores, juniors and seniors will be \$14,120 with \$10,520 for tuition and fees and \$3,600 for room and board.

These changes reflect an increase of 16.69 percent and 9.12 percent respectively from this year's comprehensive fee of \$12,940.

In announcing the Board's action, President Joel Cunningham said its decision reaffirms the University's commitment to quality.

"Increased academic quality will be our most valuable asset possible in attracting students, faculty, and financial support for years to come," Cunningham said. "We are firmly convinced this is the best course for Susquehanna. Our highest priority is to provide the outstanding faculty, programs and facilities required to attract and support outstanding students."

Cunningham said that a higher fee was set for freshmen because they stand to reap greater benefits from improvements over the longer term.

Sanctions Imposed on Fraternity

Susquehanna University has placed disciplinary sanctions on the Iota Eta Chapter of the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, as a result of a February 24 fight involving members of Lambda Chi Alpha and the Phi Sigma Kappa fraternities.

The university-imposed sanctions include a substantial reduction in membership and two-year probation, ending May 31, 1991. University officials also issued a warning that a violation of the probation could result in immediate suspension of fraternity recognition.

Dean of students Dorothy M. Anderson said that the University acknowledged that other Lambda Chi Alpha members played a part in breaking up the incident and taking immediate action to discipline those involved.

"Had that not occurred, the University would have suspended recognition of the fraternity for a minimum of two years," Anderson said.

Sanctions call for admitting no new members through May 1990. Membership will be reduced from 86 to 65 through May 1991.

Anderson also said that the national office of Lambda Chi Alpha will be informed of the February 24 incident and asked to convene an Alumni Board of Control, a provision of the national fraternity. This board will:

- Review the current membership to recommend disassociation or expulsion of specific members and associates;
- Evaluate the process of admitting new members into the fraternity; and
- Recommend programs that will help the fraternity to improve its image.

Anderson said the fraternity's performance will be reviewed formally each spring and fall through May 1991.

Former Basketball Star Makes Points as Susquehanna Chaplain

God's work is what Susquehanna University chaplain Chris Thomforde wanted to do in the game of life. He's still winning, just like he did on the basketball court 20 years ago at Princeton's Jadwin Gymnasium.

The 6'10" Thomforde certainly looks the part of a National Basketball Association (NBA) prospect and college All-American as he strides across the Susquehanna campus, towering above passersby. And his schedule's as congested as the tough man-to-man defenses he once faced.

"He's a tough person to schedule meetings with," says Irene Wagner, Thomforde's secretary. "During a busy day, he could have meetings or counseling sessions with students about every 45 minutes. I couldn't begin to tell you how many hours he puts in because he works a full day and might come back in the evening or have a service elsewhere."

Thomforde always found a way to beat those defenses in college as he earned All-Ivy League status in 1967 and '68 and was an honorable mention All-American in 1967 while averaging 14.2 points per game and 9.5 rebounds per game during his career.

He continues to beat the defense at Susquehanna as he now scores points with the students, his wife Christine and four children. As students praise their chaplain, there is little, if any, mention of his storied athletic past.

"I've worked closely with him over the past couple months and I can tell you that he's a very caring individual who wants what's best for the students," says student deacon Bob Herr '90, Lancaster, Pa.

"Nobody's ever asked me that much about my basketball career. That's one of the reasons I like it so much here because people take me seriously for who I am," says Thomforde, who is in his third year at Susquehanna. "My basketball exploits have become more distant."

Those "exploits" include starting as center on the Princeton University teams that won or shared the Ivy League title for three straight years from 1967-69 and made two trips to the NCAA Division I tournament (1967, '69).

Thomforde was featured with former Providence College head coach Gary Walters on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* in 1967 as the squad finished 25-3, still the best record in University history. That record included advancing to the East Regional final before losing 78-70 in overtime to a North Carolina squad it had beaten earlier in the year.

In college, Thomforde played with the likes of Geoff Petrie, a later NBA star, and against present NBA great Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, then Lew Alcindor of UCLA.

"I believe one of the reasons Jabbar has lasted as long in the NBA as he has is because he played college basketball at a time when slam dunking was not allowed. He had to learn to shoot and certainly did."

Following his Princeton career, Thomforde was drafted by the New York Knickerbockers of the National Basketball Association (NBA) and the then-New York Nets of the American Basketball Association (ABA) in 1969. But he grew tired of playing basketball and the rigors of college studying after earning his history degree at Princeton. Instead of playing professional basketball, he elected to go abroad as an instructor in

Western Languages and Medieval European History at Tanghai University in Taiwan for two years.

He returned to the United States in 1971 and entered the Yale University Divinity School for biblical studies, church history and philosophy. From the time he was in third grade, Thomforde wanted to become a Lutheran minister.

But basketball resurfaced again in the summer of 1973 when Red Holtzman, then the head coach of New York Knicks, invited Thomforde to his rookie camp. This time, Thomforde gave pro basketball a try.

"I made it through the rookie camp, which kind of surprised me," Thomforde recalls. "Then they put me up against the big boys."

"We practiced for two weeks. My job was to guard Willis Reed in the morning and then David DeBusschere (both Hall of Famers) in the afternoon. Needless to say, it made for a long day."

Although Thomforde ultimately didn't make the Knick roster, it taught him valuable lessons he uses today.

"I was very impressed with how hard the people on that team (the Knicks) worked. I remember seeing Walt Frazier (another Hall of Famer) working in practice and I've never seen anybody in any job work harder," Thomforde says. "I was also impressed with their idea of 'You're only as good as your weakest player.' I was received well and taken seriously in practice."

The lessons Thomforde learned from the Knicks were a reflection of Holtzman. He also played for legendary coaches Bill van Breda Kolff and Pete Carril at Princeton, both of whom had an impact on his life.

"They were both extremely intense people who were to be taken seriously. That seemed to be the same way people played for them. Their players really reflected their character."

The pleasure wasn't just Thomforde's. "He was totally unselfish as a basketball player. He gave a commitment to the game with an ultimate effort at all times. I remember he played his first season for me with a cracked heel bone and never complained," says Carril, who is still head coach of the Tigers. "The quality of this fellow is just mind-boggling. I've seen him face adversity and how well he behaves."

"He's probably the finest human being I've ever met in my life. No one could ever come close. He gave a sermon here at Princeton on why one had to believe in God and it was the best presentation. He must be of God's work."

Around Susquehanna, that work includes teaching a "Foundations in Western Literature" class, starting a program of taking students to Washington, D.C. to work with the homeless, serving on the University executive staff, and performing all the daily functions of a college chaplain.

It's a demanding schedule, but one that Thomforde executes and enjoys as much as swishing a six-foot hook shot.

"Everywhere we went, we were received at the highest level. But that is not to say that our differences were glossed over. There was a willingness on both sides to discuss difficult issues. Not least among those was the issue of ordination of women."

Reverend Nakamura holds advanced degrees from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and Princeton University.

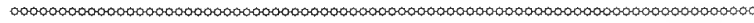

He was also involved in sponsorship of many sporting events including the Lady Keystone Open golf tournament and the Big 33 all-star football game. Among his survivors is a son, **Gerald N. Hall**, who is a member of Susquehanna's board of directors.

Students with hearing impairments will receive some special encouragement and financial assistance, thanks to a scholarship bequeathed by the father of a 1978 graduate.

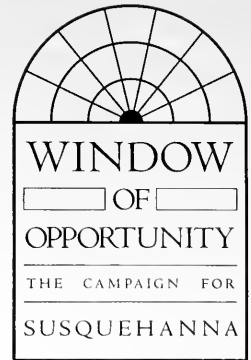

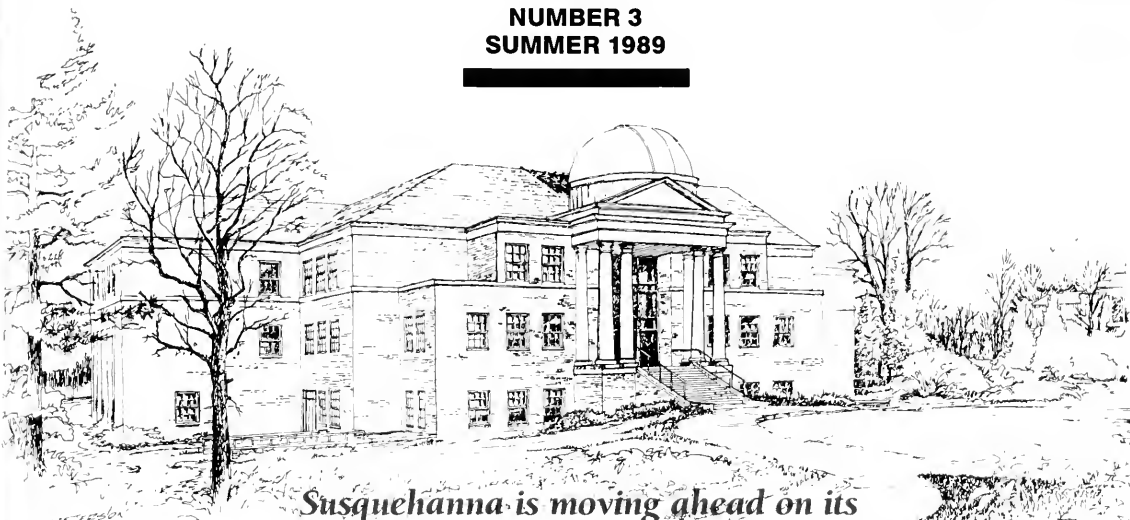

Science Hall Expansion Begins

Work has begun on the multi-million dollar expansion and renovation of Fisher Science Hall, Susquehanna University's center for scientific study and research. The project cost is expected to exceed \$5.5 million.

"Susquehanna is moving ahead on its ambitious goals of quality. A strong science program, complete with students and faculty of the highest caliber, requires the kind of outstanding facilities that will be provided by this project," says President Joel Cunningham.

The design

Plans call for an extensive renovation of the existing 45,000-square-foot building and construction of a 23,000-square-foot addition on its north side. Construction began in late June; completion is targeted for late 1990. Most of the existing facility will be used throughout renovation and construction.

Project architects are Celli-Flynn Associates of Pittsburgh. General contractor is R.S. Mowery and Sons Inc., Carlisle.

Susquehanna's five science disciplines—biology, chemistry, geology, physics, and psychology—will

be grouped by floor. The facility will feature a three-story, open atrium.

The design also will provide various specialized areas including:

- *Specialty rooms* for the life sciences, such as an isotope lab and a histology/microtechnique room;
- *Smaller research laboratories* to supplement existing large classrooms and laboratories maintained for general science instruction.
- *Faculty and student lounges* for each department, reflecting the importance of faculty-student interaction.

A result of extensive study

Plans for the expansion are a result of a four-year planning and evaluation process. Faculty and administrators examined national science trends and the effectiveness of the Susquehanna curriculum.

Susquehanna's commitment to strengthening the sciences comes as many national groups are expressing concern over the quality of science education in America and the shrinking number of science graduates. The National Science Board estimates that only 12 percent of America's specialists

in science and mathematics are under 35 years of age.

While national consultants praise Susquehanna's faculty and curriculum, their studies also show that Susquehanna could well serve more science students. More than 160 of Susquehanna's 1,450 students are science majors, with an additional 550 students taking science core courses.

Consultant Lois Pfisterer of the University of Oklahoma told Susquehanna that its sciences "introduce an array of contemporary topics and techniques not often found in small college settings."

Funding the project

As a result of the study, Susquehanna's Board of Directors made the renovation and expansion of Fisher Science Hall one of the highest priorities in its current \$22 million capital campaign.

To date, more than \$18.5 million has been raised from alumni, friends and foundations, including \$3.7 million for the science project. Of those funds, Susquehanna has received a \$300,000 matching grant from The Pew Charitable Trusts and a \$350,000 challenge grant from The Kresge Foundation which

Gilbert Award to Isaacs Witt, Gillin Named Top Athletes

Football halfback **Joe Witt** of Shamokin and volleyball/softball standout **Tracy Gillin** of Conemaugh received the Blair Heaton and A.W.A. (Association of Women's Athletics) awards as the top senior and female athletes for 1988-89.

Retired corporate executive and visiting professor of business practice **Lawrence M. Isaacs** '43 of Selingsgrove received the Dr. Russell W. Gilbert Award for his long association with Susquehanna and its athletic program and for his exemplary service to others.

A senior co-captain in football, **Witt** set Susquehanna career records for all-purpose yardage (4,062), scoring (180), kickoff-return yardage (1,336) and kickoff returns (58), as well as single-season all-purpose yardage (1,367) and single-game receiving yardage (216 vs. Lycoming).

Witt helped the Crusaders to a 28-14 record, two MAC championships and a trip to the Division III playoffs over the last three seasons.

Witt also was the squad's leading receiver this season with the second-highest single-season yardage total (30/691 yards) and finished his career in second place on the all-time receiving yardage list with 1,644 (Al Bucca, 1,994, 1984-87).

For his efforts, **Witt** was chosen as a Division III All-American, First Team MAC All-Star, and the team's Most Valuable Player this season.

"It's only appropriate that we recognize **Joe** for his outstanding contribution to the program here at Susquehanna. He reflects the true attitude of the student athlete here. He's a great athlete, a good student and tremendous human being," says **Rocky Rees**, head football coach. "In my 18 years of coaching, **Joe** would rank in the top five as one of the best people with whom I've come in contact."

Gillin, who since has been named to the second team of the Softball Academic All-American College division, was the Best Defensive Player for Susquehanna softball and volleyball.

On the diamond, she had a fielding percentage of .932 (5 errors in 73 chances) while finishing at the plate with a .320 average including a double, a triple, 11 walks, 11 runs scored, and 6 stolen bases.

In her three years since transferring from Methodist College, **Gillin** set school records with the fewest strikeouts per at-bat in a career (1.11 in 180 at-bats) and in a season (0.00, 2 times) and with the most stolen bases (24). She was a MAC-Northeast Section All-Star last season and the squad's Co-Most Valuable Player in the same year.

In volleyball, she was one of the squad's top players in digs over the past three seasons and was a main contributor. The Lady Crusaders have had 17 consecutive

winning seasons.

A communications major with a 3.68 grade point average (GPA), **Gillin** was selected to the CoSIDA District 2 College Division Volleyball Academic All-American Team and twice to the MAC All-Academic Team.

"She's a talented athlete who could probably succeed in whatever she attempts," says volleyball/softball head coach **Carole Templon**. "She's proven to be a quality student/athlete, as evidenced by her awards."

Isaacs was a three-sport athlete at Susquehanna (baseball, basketball, football) from 1940-43 and is best remembered as a starting halfback for head coach **Amos Alonzo Stagg Jr.**

Prior to retirement, **Isaacs** was Chief Financial Officer for Federated Department Stores Inc. and also held executive positions with Allis-Chalmers, RCA, Price-Waterhouse and Bethlehem Steel. He is presently a visiting professor of business practice, vice chair of Susquehanna's Board of Directors, and national chair of the Window of Opportunity capital campaign.

"Larry was a dynamic athlete here who was best described by determination and dedication," says athletic director **Don Harnum**. "He's displayed those same qualities not only in his professional career, but in how he cares about Susquehanna."

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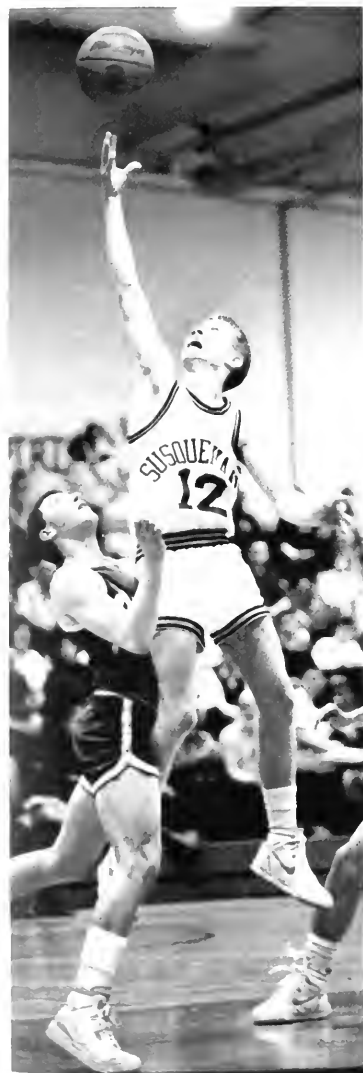

Season Standouts

1988-89 was another highly successful season for Crusader sports as the 17 varsity men's and women's squads combined for a record of 176-124-2, with a Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) team championship and several seasonal bests.



Sophomore point guard, Will Ciercierski, scored a career-high 29 points in Susquehanna's 78-71 MAC North Championship victory over Scranton.

Men's Basketball

The men's basketball team of 14th-year head coach Don Harnum was the big story. The squad won the MAC-Northern Division title with a 78-71 victory over the University of Scranton at O.W. Houts Gymnasium before 1,079 fans, the largest crowd to attend a home Crusader men's basketball game.

The win sent Harnum's troops to the NCAA Division III tournament and the Middle Atlantic Regional, where they fell to host Franklin & Marshall, 59-54.

Despite the loss, the Crusaders finished at 18-10 for Harnum, who copped his 200th win at Susquehanna in a 67-64 win over King's in the first round of the MAC Playoffs. He also was named MAC-North Coach of the Year as his squad pulled off its second MAC-North title in his last three years as coach.

Leading the squad's effort in the playoffs was point guard Will Ciercierski '91 of Lewistown, who poured in 17 and 29 points respectively against King's and Scranton in the playoffs. Ciercierski went on to earn MAC-North Most Valuable Player honors. Captain and off guard J.R. Thatcher '89 of Easton also earned a spot on the MAC-North All-Stars and was the team's MVP.

Men's Track

The spring spotlight was on the men's track team and 11th-year head coach Jim Taylor. His team completed an undefeated decade with a 6-0 season that stretched its win streak to 70.

The Crusaders also made a strong defense for the MAC title it had captured six of the previous seven years, leading after 11 events before finishing fourth.

Lance Kern '90 of Dupont led the squad's effort, capturing the high jump title at the MAC meet with a meet-record leap of 6' 8 1/2". Captain and long jumper Scott McWilliams '89 of Gibsonia also provided inspiration for the squad and earned MVP honors.

Women's Swimming

Other top performances included the women's swimming team of 10th-year head coach Ged Schweikert. The Lady Crusaders stroked their way to a new school record for wins with a 10-3 mark that included a school-high sixth-place finish at the MAC Championships.

A pair of freshmen led the team's efforts. Page Malin of Chalfont finished second and sixth respectively in the 100- and 200-yard breast-stroke at MAC's, setting new school records. Tracy Tinsley of Mountaintop copped fifth in the 100- and 500-yard freestyle events at MAC's and also set a school record in the 100.

Golf

The Crusader golf team had its best season under head coach Greg Felty, capturing titles in two tournaments and finishing with a 39-7-1 record.

Freshman Rob Rohrbach of Ephrata won the team's low-stroke award with an average of 80.4.

Men's Tennis

On the tennis courts, ninth-year head coach Gary Fincke nearly guided his men's tennis team to its best season under his direction as it tied for the most wins in an 11-3 campaign. Unfortunately, the squad dropped a hard-fought 5-4 decision to Albright that kept it from the MAC-Northwest Section title.

Captain and top-seed Chris Biddle '89 of Flourtown earned his second team MVP as he was 10-4 in singles and 10-3 in number one doubles with fourth-seed Andrew Cox '92 of Point Pleasant, NJ.

As it turned out, the Wards got a closer look than they had hoped. For four days, they were surrounded by the political face of the powerful communist country and witnessed the so-called "Beijing Massacre."

Dr. Ward was one of five Americans selected by the Eastern Academy of Management to tour China and present lectures on entrepreneurship. Kevin was doing independent study on Chinese business for Carl Bellas, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business.

The Wards arrived in Beijing two days before the violence, but were awakened that early Sunday morning by the sounds of machine gun and canon fire. Their hotel, the Great Wall Sheraton Inn, was just three miles from Tiananmen Square, the center of the violence in the Chinese capital.

Although the violence curtailed Dr. Ward's plans to deliver a lecture on Chinese entrepreneurship at Beijing University, he still managed to tour a hospital used to treat victims and to interview business leaders.

Meanwhile, Kevin was busy talking with students on the Beijing streets, getting their side of the story. Because he was a student, Kevin was given a battle flag used in the protests. He also was entrusted to bring back student literature to spread "the truth" about the violence.

From Beijing, the Wards flew to Shanghai for two days before traveling to Hong Kong, where Dr. Ward spoke at a conference on "Managing in a Global Economy," sponsored by the Eastern Academy of Management and the Chinese University of Hong Kong. They returned to the Harrisburg International Airport on June 15.

Throughout his trip, Ward and his son were interviewed by regional and national media, including the University public relations office. The following includes excerpts from several of those interviews.

Q: What was it like to be in Beijing during all the violence?

BILL: It was a situation of utter chaos and a total breakdown in leadership, organization and communication. It was like a giant rolling mob scene for about 2½ days with sporadic and incidental violence of all kinds within about two miles of Tiananmen Square. I thought the students weren't well organized and the army wasn't prepared for what happened.

Q: Did you see the actual massacre?

BILL: I don't know how you could witness something that big, but we certainly witnessed parts of it.

Q: Were you in any immediate danger?

BILL: We were walking across Beijing University on Monday (the day after violence broke out) and turned at the corner. There were about 40 troops with AK-47s standing about 20 feet away from us. I didn't know at that point what the situation was going to be. Fortunately, one of the officers walked over and saluted and said, "This is a place where foreigners should not be." I readily agreed and was happy to turn back and go

the other way. We didn't look for trouble. We tried to move cautiously and prudently, but we had business we had to do.

Q: Were you surprised by the Government's action?
BILL: No one was prepared for the move by the troops and so I don't believe anyone was prepared for the level of violence that occurred.

Q: Why do you think it happened?
BILL: In China, they don't have a Highway Patrol or National Guard. Instead, they have two kinds of police, the Traffic Police, those who wear white uniforms, and the Criminal Police, those who wear green uniforms. In Beijing, those police were largely ineffective against the protests so the only instrument they could use to deal with it was the Army. The students had blocked all the intersections with buses and had done some \$40 million in damage in a couple days. I don't believe any government can allow all the shops to be closed and all kinds of incidental violence in its capital city. The Army was used with reluctance. I think essentially the idea was to move and push them out with physical muscle. As the troops got in there, the people (protestors) pelted them with rocks and bricks. That lasted for a few minutes, but eventually the fire bombs came. I think the troops immediately considered themselves to be in great jeopardy and consequently took the weapons at their disposal to make openings.

Q: What was your reaction to the violence?
BILL: It was a catastrophe and great tragedy because it could have been avoided many times along the way. I feel sorry for the people of China, the United States and the world. China has a fifth of the world's people living there and it was just coming onto the scene as a wonderful partner in all of the world's activities. Now, with the repression that is taking place, it may set the destiny of China back a quarter of a century or so.

Q: What do you think of the American policy toward China during all of this?

BILL: We need to continue George Bush's policy of moderation and constraint and not let the Bamboo Curtain descend on China and isolate it from the rest of the world for another 25 years.

Q: What was the situation like in Shanghai?

BILL: Shanghai was calmer than Beijing. When we got there, the hardest problem was transportation. Most of what had happened in Beijing happened in Shanghai. All the intersections were blocked and barricaded, but there were no troops, no shooting, no open violence.

The day we were in Shanghai, they burned the train and we were probably about a half-mile from that main railroad line. That was probably the biggest excitement there.

People in Shanghai are quite a bit different from Beijing. Shanghai's the commercial and business center and they don't have as high a level of political intensity. I observed the students at Shanghai trying to get all the workers to strike. I saw them set up the barricades about 6 a.m. and they'd talk to the workers trying to get them to strike. But about 70 percent of the work force reported normally. The city was fairly active and I didn't feel threatened.

Q: What do you think the long-range outcome will be?
BILL: Other countries, particularly Japan, have adopted a business-as-usual policy. The day we were leaving Hong Kong, the Japanese were returning 4,000 employees and supervisors back to Beijing for business as usual on Monday. Any good policy must have balance between ideological/political content and functional/pragmatic content. The United States has more than 680 joint business ventures in China representing an investment of \$3.8 billion. In addition, the Chinese market bought almost \$14 billion of American goods and services last year. We need to continue President Bush's policy of moderation and restraint so we don't cut off our noses to spite our political face.

Q: How can the Chinese government continue a business as usual practice after such a tragic situation?

BILL: In truth, Beijing represents almost a singular instance of violence. The Chinese government sees things in a much larger and broader context that covers a larger and broader period of time. The Chinese government sees that Beijing situation as a road block to its continuing commitment for economic development and international business. Therefore, the Chinese government hopes that China will be able to continue business and other activities with the rest of the world.

Q: Kevin, you communicated with the students involved in the protests and brought home a flag and some of their literature. How did this happen?

KEVIN: Some industrial engineering students gave me some literature and their flag. They told me to take it out and tell the real story that wasn't being told on government television.

Q: What did the student literature contain?
KEVIN: The students wanted me to tell the truth. We saw for five days on Chinese government television that 20 students were wounded. The students wanted the real story to be told about the high number of casualties and the fatalities on both sides.

Q: How did you get the literature and battle flag out of China?

KEVIN: I put the literature in plastic bags and taped it to my chest and I tied the flag around my waist underneath my pants like a belt. When we left from the Shanghai airport and were going through the metal detector, I had to forfeit a couple of rolls of film. I was able to bring out four more rolls which the metal detector didn't catch.

Q: What are you going to do with this material?
KEVIN: I've already been in contact with some Chinese students (at American universities) that the students told me about. I plan on sending them the literature.

Q: What do you think the future holds?
KEVIN: I think it's the beginning of a movement toward more liberalism. But, as it stands now, until the old guard leaves—no way.



Project House members go to The White House

For the second time in five months, students from Susquehanna University played a role in the unveiling of federal plans to encourage volunteerism.

Five students and two staff members from Susquehanna were invited to The White House to hear President George Bush outline plans of his long-promised Youth Engaged in Service to America initiative. Bush said he would use the presidency to encourage volunteerism without making service a condition of federal student aid or forcing postponement of college and a career.

Susquehanna students in February attended a bill introduction ceremony organized by Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass. The Kennedy bill would provide funds for schools and community organizations that seek to expand volunteer service programs.

University Choir Releases Compact Disk, Cassette

The Susquehanna University Choir and Chamber Singers are making history by recording and producing their first compact disk and tape cassette. And they can be yours.

Conductor Cyril Stretansky says that Volume VIII featuring the University Choir and the Chamber Singers will soon be on sale.

require that Susquehanna provide the remaining funds for the project.

"Because the project has received such strong support, we are confident that it will be successful," Cunningham says. "This project has been carefully conceived. It has the strong support of the Board of Directors and the faculty. It is essential to achieving the goals of Susquehanna's long-range plan."

Sciences at SU: Then and now

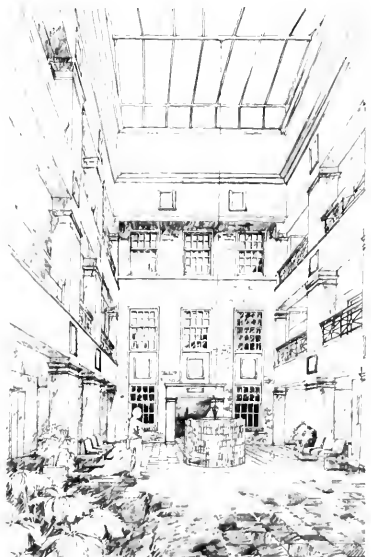
When Fisher Science Hall was built in 1962, it was designed to house the biology, chemistry and physics departments for a student body of 1,150. At that time, less emphasis was placed on research as an essential tool for instruction.

Susquehanna today has more than 1,450 students, and has added majors in geology and biochemistry as well as an emphasis of experimental psychology. Students are actively involved in research on topics as varied as robotics, the effects of acid rain, biochemical analysis of anticancer agents and fiber optics. However, growth in the sciences has pushed several offices to other campus locations.

"The opportunity to become involved in research is a primary reason why half of Susquehanna's science students go on to professional or graduate school within three years of graduation," Cunningham says.

Since 1975, 90 percent of those Susquehanna graduates who applied to professional programs in medicine, dentistry and veterinary medicine have been accepted—nearly twice the national average.

"Strengthening the sciences will result in measurable progress toward the University's primary goal—to attract highly able students and to serve them through distinguished programs in each of our three schools," Cunningham says.

Susquehanna University this year paid tribute to leaders in business, education, interfaith relations and social justice at Susquehanna's 131st Baccalaureate and Commencement.

The University Board of Directors conferred degrees on:
■ **Millard D. Fuller**, founder and executive director of Habitat for Humanity, based in Americus, Ga. Fuller also gave the Commencement address.

■ **William H. Keeler**, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Baltimore and most recently Bishop of Harrisburg. Archbishop Keeler presented the Baccalaureate homily.

■ **John H. Wall '30**, retired corporate executive of Naples, Fla.

■ Susquehanna also presented an honorary degree posthumously to **Richard R. Green**, chancellor of the New York City School System. (See related story.)

"Recognizing these four individuals is a fitting testimony to their remarkable accomplishments and the esteem in which their work is held," President Joel Cunningham said.

Millard D. Fuller

It has been almost 25 years since millionaire Millard Fuller left his wealth behind to help America's poor. Fuller is best known for founding Habitat for Humanity, a non-profit ecumenical housing ministry to eliminate poverty housing.

Today there are more than 240 affiliated projects in the U.S. and Canada and more than 50 projects in 25 developing countries.

After graduating from law school at the University of Alabama in 1960, Fuller practiced law and was co-founder of Fuller and Dees Marketing Group, a business that made him a millionaire before the age of 30.

In 1966, Fuller divested himself of his wealth. He then directed a \$10 million fund-raising campaign for Tougaloo College, a black college related to the United Church of Christ (Disciples of Christ). He and his family also worked in Georgia and Zaire, Africa before founding Habitat for Humanity in 1977.

This year, Susquehanna students began sharing Fuller's work by assisting a Habitat for Humanity project on New York City's Lower East Side. Next year, Susquehanna University will establish its own Habitat for Humanity campus chapter.

William H. Keeler

Keeler was honored by Susquehanna University at his last public address as Bishop of Harrisburg. Two days later, he was installed as Archbishop of Baltimore, the nation's oldest Catholic diocese.

Susquehanna, a Lutheran institution, recognized Keeler for his leadership in building interfaith bonds.

As chair of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs from 1984 to 1987, Keeler helped arrange Pope John Paul II's meetings with Jewish leaders in Florida and South Carolina during the 1987 papal visit.

For five years he led the Diocese of Harrisburg, a 15-county area of more than 218,000 Catholics in Central Pennsylvania, which includes Selinsgrove. He also has served as secretary to the tribunal Diocese of Harrisburg (1956-58), Vice Chancellor of the Diocese of Harrisburg, Papal Chamberlain and Prelate of Honor to Pope Paul VI, Chancellor, Auxiliary Bishop and Vicar General.

A native of Lebanon, Pa., Keeler is a graduate of St. Charles Seminary, Philadelphia, and the Pontifical Gregorian University, Rome.

John H. Wall '30

Susquehanna honored the 1930 graduate for his impressive business career that included re-organizing several major corporations. Despite earning a college degree at the height of the Great Depression, John Wall climbed the corporate ladder rapidly.

Within 10 years after graduation, he was general manager of Bernardin Bottle Cap Company, the nation's oldest manufacturer of closures for glass containers. In 1950, Wall became vice president of Kent Plastics Corporation.

He joined Servel, Inc. in 1955 as vice president of the refrigeration manufacturing firm. When Servel acquired Burgess Battery Company in Freeport, Ill. in 1964, he became president of that company for one year until he was named president of Servel. During Wall's tenure with Servel, the company also took over Sonotone, a hearing aid manufacturer.

Richard R. Green

Richard R. Green, chancellor of the New York City Schools since January 1988, was a self-made man. He was described by *The New York Times* as a "tough-minded, tenacious school superintendent who is neither afraid to speak his mind nor take action."

While he faced many battles with the New York City Schools job, he also had some early successes. He implemented a summer kindergarten for more than 7,000 children. Following a rash of student assaults on teachers, Green threatened to expel those involved, leading to a decrease in violence.

Green came to New York from Minneapolis where he was raised in a public housing project on the city's poor north side. In the same city, he spent most of his career, including eight years as superintendent of the 50-school system. In Minneapolis, he became known for his emphasis on teaching social responsibility.

Green attended Augsburg College (a sister Lutheran college) on an athletic scholarship. After receiving a master's degree at St. Cloud College, he began teaching delinquent pupils. In 1972, he earned a doctorate from Harvard University; his education was supported largely by some of Minneapolis' top business leaders.

In 1984, Green received the Executive Educator's Award. In 1982, he won the Hubert H. Humphrey Labor Award and the Urban League Family of the Year award.

Scholarship Established in Memory of Richard Green

Susquehanna University has established a scholarship in memory of New York City Schools Chancellor Richard R. Green, a 1989 honorary degree recipient from Susquehanna. Mr. Green died unexpectedly on May 10, 1989.

During Commencement exercises, an honorary Doctor of Laws was conferred posthumously upon Mr. Green. University President Joel Cunningham also announced that a memorial scholarship in Mr. Green's name has been established for academically talented minority students. Carol Gibson, Mr. Green's chief of staff, accepted the honors.

Prior to his death, Mr. Green had accepted Susquehanna's invitation to receive the honorary degree.

"Richard Green will be remembered for his energy and commitment to making children the center of America's culture by creating safe and effective schools," President Cunningham said. "This leading Black educator took on the toughest job in American education, one that few were willing to accept. While his leadership was not without conflict, he persisted in decreasing violence and implementing educational programs."

The Richard R. Green Memorial Scholarship will be awarded to academically talented minority students enrolling in the fall of 1990. Estimates for an individual scholarship range from \$1,500 to \$10,000 depending on need.

Heroes are where you find them. To Dick Sheehy and other clients of the Morris (NJ) Chapter of the Association for Retarded Citizens, Douglas A. Freer '85 is a hero.

It was last April when Freer, an employee of the ARC in Chester, NJ, noticed that Dick Sheehy had stopped breathing. He was experiencing a seizure.

"I realized what was happening," Freer says. "I rolled Dick onto the floor and opened his airway. This allowed him to begin breathing again. Then all we needed to do was keep him stabilized until the ambulance arrived."

While Freer downplays his heroic role, the Chester Home Group hasn't discounted what the Susquehanna grad did. The group cited him as April Employee of the Month. The awards ceremony was even more meaningful for Freer as client Dick Sheehy—the man he rescued—looked on.

In addition to his ARC work, Freer is preparing to enter the Episcopal priesthood. He is serving as an intern at St. Bernard Episcopal Church, Bernardsville, NJ.

Mary Coughlin '82 can look out of her office window and enjoy a wonderful view of New York City's South Street Seaport section. She can, but she seldom does.

As vice president of CIC Asset Management Corporation, Coughlin's days are quite full. She is a global fixed income portfolio manager for CIC, which is a subsidiary of Continental Insurance Company. Friday evening, members of the Class of 1939 joined President Joel Cunningham and wife, Trudy, at Pine Lawn for a special reception prior to the 50th Class Reunion dinner. More than 300 University donors attended the annual President's Recognition Dinner at the Degenstein Campus Center while others gathered at an Alumni Barbecue. The evening finished on a festive note as all groups were invited to a get-together in Houts Gymnasium, featuring a jazz ensemble led by Jack Fries '61.

Saturday greeted alumni with a full slate of events. While some attended Professor Wally Growney's session on personal computers, others participated in a five-kilometer Fun Run. Steve Deckard '86 of Selmsgrove captured the men's title, running the course in 22 minutes, 39 seconds. George Kirchner '64 of Allentown took second place with 24 minutes, 50 seconds. Marketing professor **Kenneth O. Fladmark** will be the first to hold the **Charles B. Degenstein Professorial Chair** at Susquehanna University.

The endowed gift from one of Susquehanna's greatest benefactors will provide special resources for research, study and travel to the holder of the Degenstein Chair.

The position is named in honor of retired Weis Markets executive Charles B. Degenstein of Selingsgrove. "Susquehanna is deeply grateful to Charles Degenstein for providing the resources that will help us attract and retain exceptional scholars and teachers for years to come. His love for Susquehanna can be seen in many ways on this campus," said President Joel Cunningham.

Fladmark, who has been on the Susquehanna faculty since 1961, has distinguished himself in the classroom and the marketing field. He is frequently sought by regional communities, business, and industry on issues relating to small town revitalization, image surveys and the like. He also created and directed Susquehanna's first evening program and coordinated international study programs in Copenhagen, Denmark and Oxford, England.

Fladmark will hold the Degenstein Chair from 1989 to 1992.

In honor of former bank president **Norman E. Walz**, First National Trust Bank of Sunbury has established a fund at Susquehanna University to encourage and support faculty scholarship and teaching.

The Norman E. Walz Endowment was established "as an expression of deep appreciation to the man whose distinguished career in banking spanned over 40 years and culminated in his service as First National's president from 1969 to 1976," according to the endowment announcement. The gift also recognized Walz's 18 years on the Susquehanna University Board of Directors and as board treasurer from 1961 to 1979.

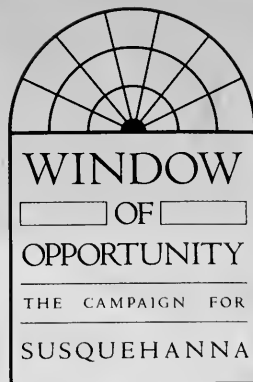
"The bank's decision to select this particular use was made after a careful review of University priorities that matched most closely Mr. Walz's own experiences," said President Joel Cunningham. "Mr. Walz's colleagues remember him as a constant learner and enthusiastic scholar—traits that we want to support in our students and faculty."

Income from the Walz Fund will be directed toward activities that will give faculty exposure to organizations beyond the academic environment to enhance scholarship and teaching.

The Susquehanna University Fund has been named among the top 10 annual giving programs in the nation.

Susquehanna recently received a Distinguished Achievement Award in a national competition sponsored by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education and the USX Foundation. The award cites Susquehanna's staff and volunteer effort for its "excellent planning, management and results."

Linda Skinner '85, director of annual giving, accepted a \$500 grant from USX and a plaque for Susquehanna at the national CASE assembly last month. In the past five months, annual giving has more than doubled with 39 percent alumni participation—almost twice the national average. This year, contributions to the SUF exceeded the \$1 million goal.

THE 1988-89 YEAR has been truly a remarkable year for Susquehanna University. The extraordinary generosity of members of the Susquehanna community has established levels of giving that may remain unchallenged for some time. All development goals were surpassed in 1988-89. Total giving to the University reached \$8,325,564, representing an increase of 77 percent from 1987-88 and an increase of over 400 percent from five years earlier.

The Capital Campaign continues to be met enthusiastically. The positive response from campaign participants moves the campaign forward with exciting momentum raising, to date, over \$19.3

million toward the Window of Opportunity \$22 million goal.

The \$1 million goal for the Annual Fund was surpassed and a new level of total alumni donor participation established. Contributions to the SUF increased nearly 10 percent in 1988-89 totaling \$1,014,464, exceeding the \$1 million goal. This compares to contributions in 1987-88 that totaled \$924,901. In 1988-89, forty percent of Susquehanna's alumni contributed to the SUF, increasing one percentage point from last year and ten percentage points from five years ago and exceeding the national average of 22.6 percent. The Annual Fund assists the

University in providing funds for student financial aid, for faculty support, and for program diversity and facilities. This year the Annual Fund was one of nine schools nationwide to be awarded the CASE/USX Distinguished Achievement Award.

Other significant accomplishments for 1988-89 include:

- The Class of 1939 commemorated the 50th anniversary of their graduation from Susquehanna by establishing *The Class of 1939 Annual Fund Endowment*. The Class of 1939 Reunion Gift Committee, led by Robert M. Bastress, raised over \$73,000. Of this total, \$70,422 is designated for the



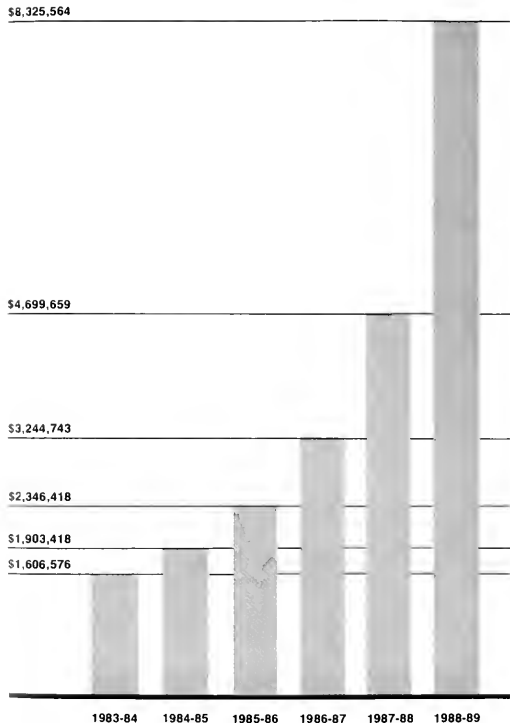

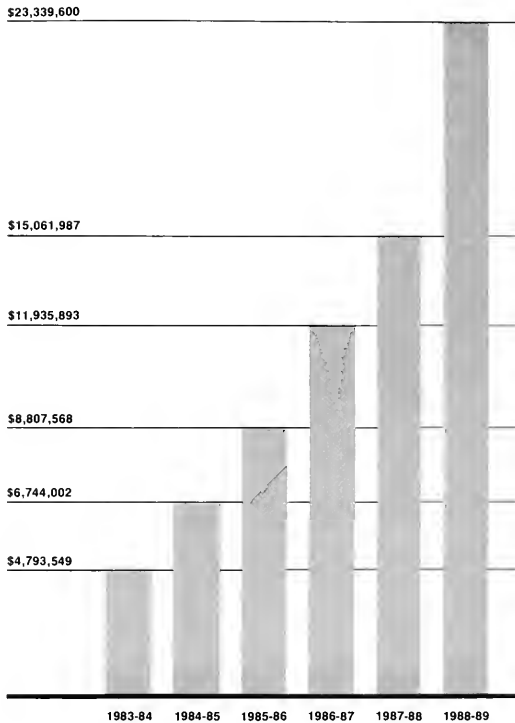

class endowment fund. The enthusiasm of this class has resulted in a record level of giving for this program.

- The Class of 1964 celebrated its 25th reunion and to commemorate this special time, the Reunion Gift Committee, led by George Kirchner, set a goal of \$25,000. Exceeding this goal, the class proudly raised over \$40,000.
- The National Committee on Annual Giving, led by Carl Campbell '65, personally contacted alumni to challenge them to support the SUF. Since its inception, the National Committee has made nearly 1,000 calls in support of the Susquehanna University Fund.
- The local Business and Industry Campaign completed another successful year. Chairman Henry

Truslow and his enthusiastic and dedicated volunteers secured over 140 gifts, including a \$25,000 challenge gift, bringing the total amount raised to \$123,520 - a record level.

- Again this year, funds raised through the Parents Executive Committee were targeted for the Blough-Weis Library. The committee, led by Jack '57 and Joan Bishop, secured gifts totaling \$53,850.
- Members of the Class of 1989, under the direction of Senior Class agent, Beth Ann Biml, pledged their support to Susquehanna through the Senior Class Pledge program. Susquehanna is most grateful to these young men and women as they honor their University and their graduating class.
- More than 500 student volunteers, under the

leadership of Laura Butler '90 and Betsy Van Tuyl '90, raised over \$155,821 for the SUF. These enthusiastic student volunteers contacted more than 7,000 alumni and parents and secured 3,600 pledges in 28 nights of calling.

This extraordinary year of giving has, indeed, established an unprecedented level of generosity. 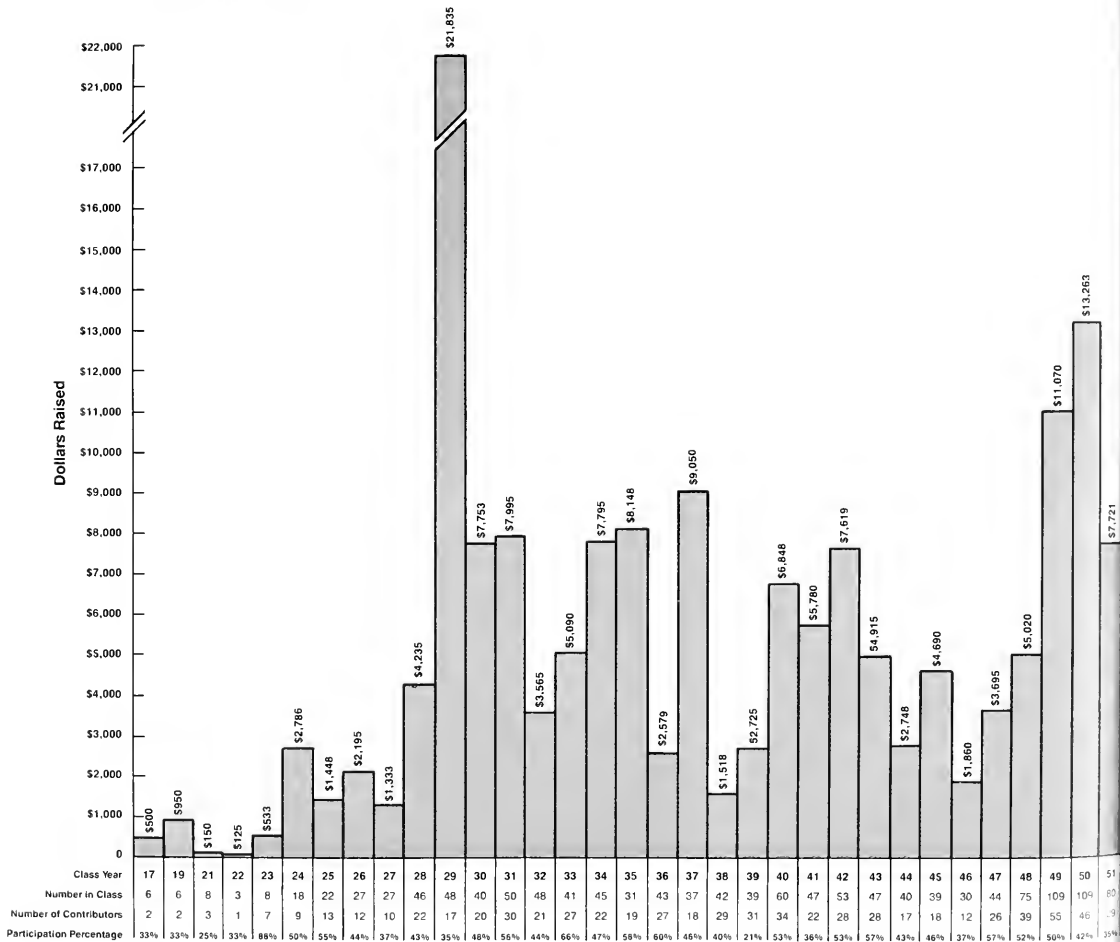

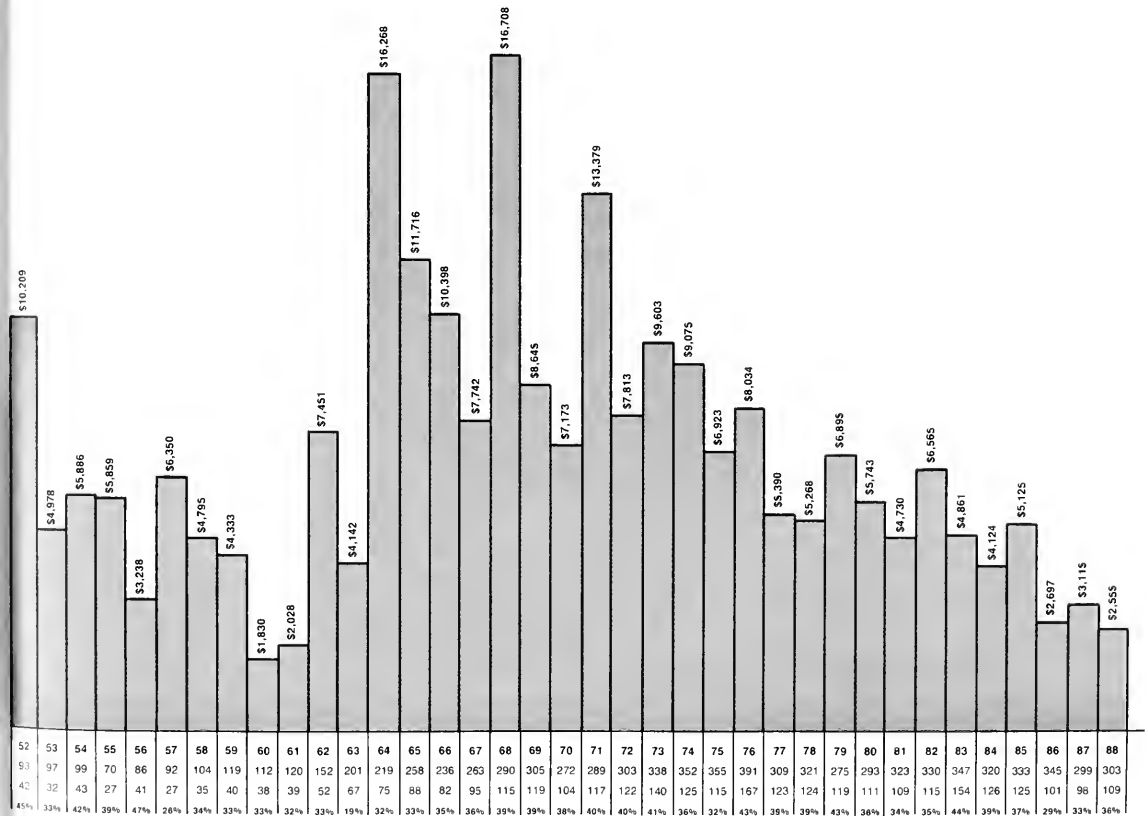

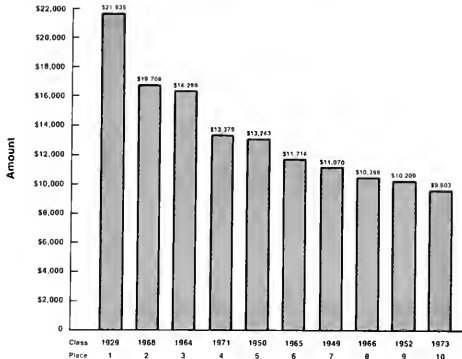
SUF Results by Class



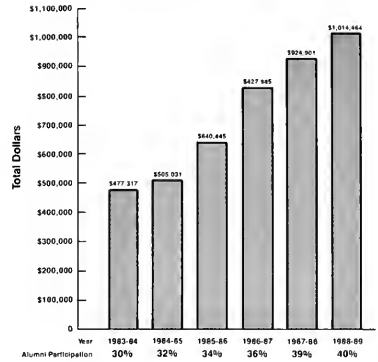
University Fund



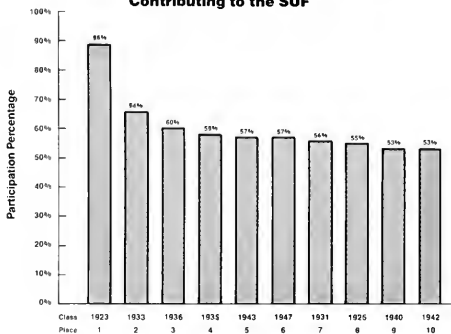
Top Ten Classes by Total Contribution to the SUF



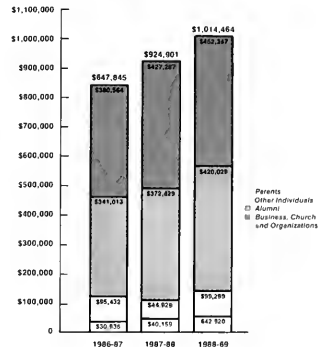
Growth in the SUF
(Total Dollars and Alumni Participation)



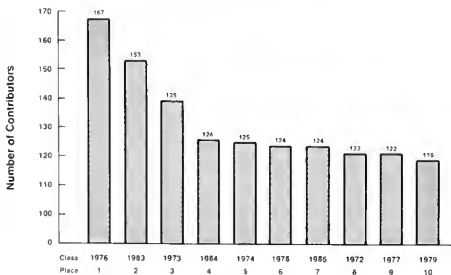
Top Ten Classes By Percentage of Class Contributing to the SUF



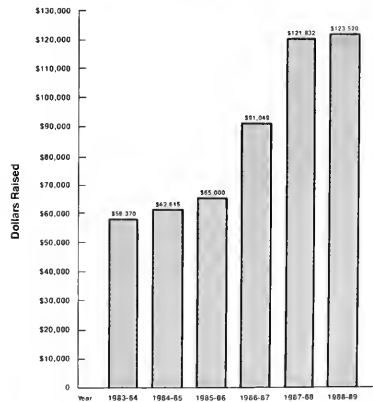
Who Contributes to the SUF

Blough-Weis Library Dedicated

U.S. Poet Laureate Guest Speaker

The Blough-Weis Library was dedicated under sunny skies September 17 in front of approximately 300 faculty, students and friends of the University.

Harold Nemerov, poet laureate of the United States, and Evan Farber, librarian at Earlham College in Indiana, were given honorary degrees at the ceremony.

Nemerov was the featured speaker at the dedication and spoke compellingly on the mysteries of library scholarship. Farber, whose course-integrated library program is cited as a national model, presented a special workshop the day before the dedication.

"Three years ago we began a needs assessment for the capital campaign and the library came first on that list of priorities," President Joel L. Cunningham told the audience.

"Together, University faculty, students, administrators and design architects gave shape and form to a vision for the library's development."

"Finally, the generous gift of Robert and Patricia Weis, with continued support from Mrs. Helen Decker Blough, made possible the beginning of the renovation work in the spring of 1988, resulting in the splendid facility we dedicate today."

Architect for the project was the firm of Spillman, Farmer, Shoemaker, Pell and Wildin of Bethlehem, PA. The contractor was R.S. Mowery and Sons.

Plaques, replicas of a larger one unveiled inside the library, were presented to the Blough and Weis families in honor of their leadership and support of

the University and its library.

Helen Blough, of Hawley, was present for the ceremony along with her daughter, Mrs. Howard Wents. In addition to Robert and Patricia Weis, their children, Colleen, Jonathan and Jennifer Weis Monsky, also attended.

"Libraries have meant a great deal to me from my early days," commented Robert Weis. "It is a joy for me, as I know it is for Patricia and for Mrs. Blough, to have helped to achieve this splendid facility. May it stand as a symbol of excellence in the liberal arts and sciences—the core of Susquehanna University—today and for many years to come."

The Weis family has a long history of service to Susquehanna and its library. Robert Weis, vice president and treasurer of Weis Markets, Inc., has been a member of the University's board of directors since 1970. In 1983, he established the Harry Weis Library Endowment in honor of his father, a 1900 graduate of the university.

The Blough family likewise has been a long-time benefactor to Susquehanna University.



Mr. Blough, an alumnus, was chairman and chief executive officer of U.S. Steel Corporation. He served on the University's board for 26 years. In 1974, following a previous library expansion, the facility was named the Roger M. Blough Learning Center in his honor.

Mr. Blough, in 1984, created the Helen Decker Blough Library Fund for the acquisition of books. Following Mr. Blough's death, in 1985, Mrs. Blough made additional gifts in support of the library.

The \$1.5 million renovation created:

- Expanded space, permitting the collection to grow to 300,000 volumes from its current 178,000 volumes of books.
- Increased space for public seating and study permitting

the library to accommodate more than one-third of the students at any time.

- Increased capacity for use of the latest telecommunications, data transmission and environmental control technologies available to libraries.

Among specific improvements, a 24-hour study center and micro-computer lab has been created in the lower level. The center contains 40 carrels for individual use.

Also on the lower level, a multi-media seminar room has been outfitted with satellite downlink capability and a large screen monitor for videos, films and slide projections. In the ground floor music library, the numbers of compact disk players have been increased for use with

several hundred recently purchased recordings. The renovated first floor features attractive gallery display space for collections. Facilities also have been provided to computerize the card catalog. A new periodical reading room will encourage browsing and leisurely reading among students and other users. The curriculum library now has its own room with new shelving, computers and special seating.

The second floor features lounges, areas for group study and individual study carrels. Special collections are housed in the Jane Conrad Apple Room for Rare Books.

The Honors Program, which now will be based in the library, will have a room on the second floor for use by honors students and housing the program's book collection.

All of the improvements were aimed at increasing the University's on-campus resources for learning and fostering the abilities of students to become independent, self-directed learners.

Following the dedication ceremonies, guests toured the library, assisted by student guides.

440 Freshmen Welcomed Following Banner Admissions Year

Last year, Susquehanna University was listed by *USA Today* newspaper as one of the universities whose applications for admission had increased significantly from the previous year.

As the 1989-90 academic year began, Susquehanna welcomed 440 freshmen to campus, bringing the total enrollment to a record 1,529 full-time students.

The 440 freshmen represent an 8.7 percent increase from the previous year. That is the same percentage increase of total applications (1,865 this year). Of this year's freshmen class, 36 percent come from the top fifth of their high school class, up slightly from 34 percent the previous year.

A total of 16 percent more freshmen are in the honors program and 72 percent of those students come from the top fifth of their class. This year's honors class averaged 1,210 on their SAT's (580 Verbal, 630 Math).

Included among this year's class are ten valedictorians.

Volunteer Program \$6,000 Grant Recipient; Enters Partnership with Lincoln

Susquehanna University's community service volunteer program, honored last spring with an invitation to a news conference on volunteerism held by President Bush on the White House lawn, was the recipient of a \$6,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Campus Compact, a project of the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities.

Under the grant, Susquehanna enters into a partnership with Lincoln University to assist Lincoln in establishing a volunteer center on its campus.

Susquehanna University, with well-established student community service programs in place, will share existing resources and develop new resources to assist Lincoln.

Lincoln University, founded for the higher education of black youth, will aid Susquehanna in strengthening support and retention of its minority students.

"Basically we will both share resources and areas of expertise. Lincoln wants to establish a strong student volunteer center. Lincoln, in turn, will help us in developing a campus community that is pluralistic and culturally diverse," said Debbie Woods, Susquehanna's director of volunteer programs.

Susquehanna already has begun to develop a program in support of minorities by hiring Jonathan Poullard as director of minority concerns and by starting a new volunteer project, the Student Association for Cultural Awareness (S.A.C.A.). S.A.C.A.'s main goals are to enhance cultural awareness, provide a support group for minority students, and help develop and implement

programs and services designed to retain minority students.

Presently, approximately 250 Susquehanna University students are involved in the Project House System, which enables groups of students involved in volunteer

community service to live together in special housing.

Projects include the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, Big Brother/Big Sister program, the local senior citizens' center, Selingsgrove Center (a state run facility for mentally handicapped adults), and P.L.U.S. (Project Literacy, U.S.) among others.

Susquehanna's volunteer programs have been recognized with awards such as the Keystone Award of Merit by the Governor's Private Sector Initiatives Task Force in 1984, and President Reagan's Program for Private Sector Initiatives for outstanding community service in 1987.

Woods and the associate dean of students at Lincoln University already have met to discuss plans for the partnership.

Among the methods used will be on-going communications to identify specific areas of need on both campuses, cooperative weekend workshops, and specific cooperative service activities.

Student leaders from both campuses will help to organize and run the workshops. A newsletter also is planned.

In addition, student volunteer leaders will participate in PA Campus Compact regional conferences and workshops.

Both campuses intend to continue the partnership after the completion of the grant period. Future plans include credit earning student community service internship exchanges and student semester exchanges at both universities.

"BIGFOOT" Hopes to Take Straight Path to Professional Football

Susquehanna University placekicker **Randy Helt** of **Camp Hill** is a dinosaur in the world of football—one called "Bigfoot" in the Susquehanna University football camp.

But if this dinosaur has his way, he could resurrect his species from extinction.

Helt is straight-on placekicker who has a bonafide shot of cracking the exclusive soccer-style kicking ranks of the National Football League (NFL). At least, former Washington Redskins straight-on placekicking great Mark Moseley thinks so.

"He's probably the best kicker I've seen at his age," says Moseley, who is Helt's mentor and had a pretty-fair leg himself as many experts believe he's destined for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

"His kicking style is a lot like mine, although he's a much bigger kicker. I think he's probably farther along

Davis Provides Leadership on Volleyball Court, in Campus Life

For **Jennifer Davis** of **York**, a day on campus is like a night on the volleyball court—she just follows the bouncing ball until she wins the point.

A senior marketing major, Davis does it all on the Susquehanna campus from serving as president of the Student Government Association (SGA), to captain of the volleyball team for the second-consecutive year, to corresponding secretary for Alpha Delta Pi sorority, to senior representative on the 1989 Homecoming Court. Along the way, she still manages to carry a 3.24 Grade Point Average (GPA).

Ultimately, her frenzied, all-out style as a 5'7" hitter/setter on the volleyball court is the secret to handling her daily schedule.

"I like to stay busy and keep involved. I was like that in high school too," says Davis, who graduated from York Suburban High School.

"She gave a speech at opening convocation this year about the importance of being a well-rounded student, and she really does believe that and live her life that way," says **Dorothy Anderson**, dean of students. "She's a wonderful example of all that can be good in a student."

In volleyball, Davis has not only been "good," she's been exceptional during her Susquehanna career. She earned the team "Most Valuable Player" award during each of her first three years and was selected to the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) - Northwest Section All-Stars last season.

Once again this year, Davis was an MAC All-Star and should bid for team-MVP honors as she was near the top in nearly every statistical category and helped guide the squad to one of its best seasons ever at 23-11.



But it's not just her statistics that have made her such a valuable asset to her team.

"She definitely has provided leadership for the team. She's an intelligent player who always plays within herself and in control, even when the team sometimes got rattled," says second-year head coach **Carole Templon**.

"I enjoy being captain, although sometimes I don't know if it's the best thing. I'm a pretty intense player and I say some harsh things to some of my teammates at times," says Davis. "I hope they (the other teammates) don't take offense, but I've been around volleyball for a long time and I'm just trying to use my experience to help."

To say Davis enjoys the game of volleyball is an understatement—she's a fanatic. The end of the season at Susquehanna could be just the beginning for her.

"I play more when I'm home than I do here. When I was in high school, I played more year-round," she explains.

Because of her zest for the game, Davis would like to see volleyball coaching on her horizon. Unfortunately, a career in marketing might make that difficult.

"I'd like to coach, the problem is that the hours involved in a career in marketing and volleyball coaching aren't very compatible. But I really would like to get into it. I coached at volleyball camps over the summer and it's really great."

Based on her expertise in time management in college, coaching can't be too far off for Davis.

at his age than I was."

Helt got his kicking start at a camp sponsored by Moseley at Western Maryland College. He was 14 at the time and he and his father were looking for something he could do during the Summer. They stumbled across an ad in the local paper for Moseley's camp and "it just snowballed after that camp" according to Randy.

Now the 6'3", 248-pound junior has the build of past NFL straight-on kicking great Tom Dempsey, who still holds the league's longest field goal of 63-yards, and the leg-strength to match.

With the help of the tee on field goals and extra-points last year, Helt connected from as far away as 68-yards in practice, and was 12 of 14 in field goals for the season. He led the team in scoring with 60 points and was the top kicker in scoring in the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) with 58 points.

Although his longest game field goal was "only" from 46 yards, that kick came with seven seconds and gave his team a heart-stopping 21-20 win at Juniata College. He had three field goals in the final quarter of that game and earned MAC "Player of the Week" honors for his efforts. His stats for the year also earned him selection to three All-American teams at season's end, including the Associated Press "Little All-America" team.

The NCAA outlawed the tee for this season, but Helt hasn't lost any distance as evidenced by his three for four performance in a scrimmage with Gettysburg that included a field goal from 48-yards and two others from 42. He's also hit from 58-yards in practice.

His kicks have earned him the nickname of "Bigfoot" from the Crusader coaching staff. But if Helt's dream comes true, those kicks could earn him something "bigger" down the road.

"Making it in the NFL is always in the back of my mind. But first things have to come first," says Helt.

"A lot of NFL teams have been by. I think he's on everyone's list and they've sent someone to verify his ability," says Susquehanna head coach Rocky Rees.

Helt's arrival to Susquehanna was some good fortune for Rees, who recruited him out of Cedar Cliff High School, only to watch him go to the Division-IAA University of Delaware.

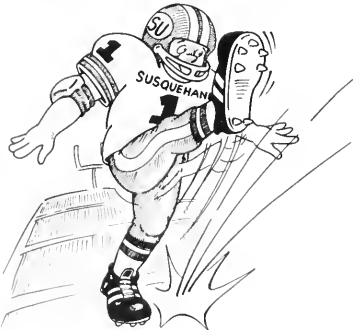
A personality clash with Delaware head coach Harold "Tubby" Raymond found Helt heading for Morgantown, W. Va. and Division-I West Virginia University. This time, West Virginia head coach Don Nehlen agreed that Helt's leg was strong-enough, but only for kick-offs and not placekicking.

On the advice of Moseley, Helt decided to transfer once again—this time to a school where he could step in and become the placekicker.

After narrowing his decision down to Glassboro State, Lebanon Valley, and Susquehanna, Helt opted to join Rees and the Crusaders.

"I knew the coaches at Susquehanna and I felt like they'd take me in, so to speak, and that's just what happened. We have a good relationship," Helt says.

"There are quite a bit of family ideals here and I think they've helped to make the program successful."

communications major from Upper Saddle River, NJ, was named homecoming queen in pre-game ceremonies.

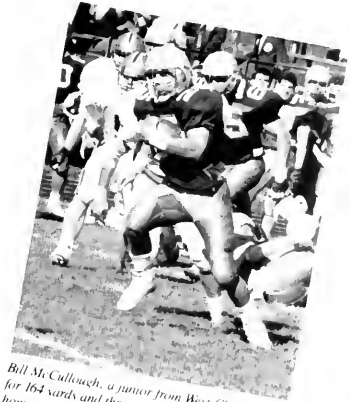

Today, students everywhere are being challenged to keep up with the momentous changes taking place so rapidly in Eastern

Europe, South Africa, Central America and around the globe.

Because of the enormous challenges and opportunities these changes represent, Susquehanna's commitment to expand cultural diversity on campus is especially timely. President Joel Cunningham describes the University's emphasis on international and multicultural education as "essential in preparing students for life in an increasingly diverse world."

The University is hiring faculty and staff of more diverse backgrounds, is seeking to enroll a greater number of minority and international students, and its curriculum reflects an appreciation for different perspectives. In addition, a director of multicultural affairs was appointed last year to develop activities and programming so that students will have more opportunities to understand and learn from cultural pluralism.

Sweeping international changes will challenge students to broaden their knowledge and understanding of other cultures if they are to adapt to new realities. Expert business consultant and former U.S. Treasury Secretary William Simon commented during a recent lecture at Susquehanna that "the emergence of Eastern Europe in a new economic and trade zone represents the greatest new business marketing opportunity since the rebuilding of western Europe after World War II. Speaking from a business perspective, I believe that within a few years, there may be only two kinds of business leaders: those who think globally, and those who are unemployed."



Whether or not students will find themselves competing in the international marketplace, most will be increasingly

influenced in one way or another by international events. They will undoubtedly live near and work with people of other races, religions and nationalities. Susquehanna is attempting to create a climate on campus that is more reflective of the pluralistic, multicultural society that students can expect to find in their future places of employment and communities.

Susquehanna's efforts to recruit more minority

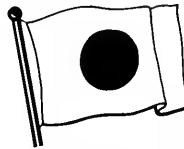

and foreign students have resulted in a healthy increase in applications, although the total numbers still remain low. Over the past four years, freshman-year applications by minority and foreign students increased 93.8 percent from 32 to 62 students, while the number of students who were accepted went up from nine to 13. Presently, there are 45 minority students attending Susquehanna, representing about three percent of the full-time students who enrolled this year.

"We seek minority students who are a good match with Susquehanna," says Dean of Academic Services Pamela White. "In no way do we want to meet the desire for minority students at Susquehanna at the students' own expense."

"Everyone in the Admissions Office has been making an extra effort to visit high schools with significant numbers of minority students to make them aware of the opportunities of a private education at Susquehanna," says Denise Moy, associate director of admissions.

To help needy, academically talented minority students meet the cost of education, Susquehanna recently established a new financial aid opportunity, the Richard R. Green Scholarship, which was named in memory of the distinguished black chancellor of New York City schools. The scholarship was awarded for the first time last year and is one of many financial aid packages that are available to students who demonstrate need.



In recent years, a greater number of international students have been attracted to the University. Thanks to an agreement between

Japan's Senshu University and Susquehanna, there are several full-time students from Senshu who attend Susquehanna each year; another 25-30 Senshu students attend during the summer, and a group of 8-10 students spend six weeks at the beginning of spring semester attending classes and living with American students in the residence halls.

Susquehanna students also benefit from the presence of students from other foreign countries, including two students from Namibia (three next year) who are enrolled through a special program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America.

Chaplain Christopher Thomforde, who recently chaired a University task force on

cultural diversity, comments: "Building a culturally diverse student body is definitely very important, but students only stay for four years. One of the most important steps we must take is to cultivate a culturally diverse faculty and staff."

An aggressive campaign to increase the number of minority faculty has been led by the deans of Susquehanna's three schools and Vice President Jeanne Neff. "Our courses in African-American history and literature are not yet being taught by the persons whose cultural experience is being described," Neff notes. "We want the best and the brightest faculty possible at Susquehanna, and we are convinced that there are minority group members available who meet that description."

The percentage of minority faculty has risen in the past three years, from four percent in 1986-87 to five percent this year.

The University has also recognized the importance of increasing the number of minority group members among administrative staff and has developed new, stronger guidelines and procedures to facilitate these hirings.



One of the most significant steps Susquehanna has taken to heighten awareness of cultural diversity is to include in its

curriculum the historical and contemporary contributions to society of women and minority groups. All courses approved for the core curriculum must meet this guideline. The English Department has added literature courses that reflect the contributions of women and minorities, and the History Department offers courses in both African and African-American culture. A Minorities course is now required for the Sociology major, and new courses on women's studies have been or will be added to

the Sociology and Psychology Department curricula. The Department of Philosophy and Religion offers courses in History of the Jewish People and Jewish Culture and Literature. The Music Department has added the study of jazz and its roots in African-American culture.

Jonathan Poullard, director of multicultural affairs, notes, "It is important that the faculty and staff be trained on issues of cultural diversity. Then, not only will the faculty of color discuss these issues, but the University as a whole will begin to discuss them." The 1989-90 academic year began with a workshop for all faculty on diversity in the curriculum and more are planned.

Many departmental curricula contain strong international elements as well. Susquehanna maintains a general education requirement in foreign language and a lively international study program, including student placements in Japan, Africa, Latin America and Europe.

Special efforts to emphasize cultural diversity have been made in the planning of lectures and conferences on campus. This winter, for example, students had the opportunity to hear Woodrow Wilson Fellow Fumiko Mori Halloran, a widely published writer on Japanese social issues; civil rights leader James Farmer; and Dr. Eric Lincoln, a black theologian from Duke University. A series of speakers on multicultural issues in education came to campus in the fall, and Susquehanna sponsored its first national conference on "Women, the Arts, and Society" in the fall of 1988, which brought more than 500 national scholars and performers to campus.

It should come as no surprise that student interest in multicultural issues is also growing on the University's campus. A national increase in social awareness and activism on the part of entering students is mirrored at Susquehanna in the establishment of local chapters of the National Organization for Women and the Student Environmental Action Coalition, and in the emergence of such groups as the Gay-Lesbian Alliance for Susquehanna Students, and

Students Allied for Cultural Awareness (SACA). SACA originally was formed as the Minority Concerns Club to provide a cultural support system for minority students. Today SACA counts more than 50 students as members, representing a cross-section of the student body, and seeks to foster greater cultural diversity and cross-cultural understanding at Susquehanna.

"SACA's name is derived from the Spanish verb 'sacar,' which means to take out. Our goal has been to take out monotone and replace it with diversity," says Sima Blackmon of Gaithersburg, MD, a senior political science major who is a student leader of SACA.

"What I think is unique about SACA is that the members are from different states, beliefs and backgrounds, and everyone is working together for the same cause."

Together with the director of multicultural affairs, SACA mounted an aggressive program of events this past year for students and the larger campus community. Events included Cultural Diversity Month in October; a birthday tribute to Martin Luther King in January, followed by Black History Month in February, and Women's Week in April.

The University also has developed an exchange program with historically black Lincoln University in which Susquehanna students are helping Lincoln students develop successful volunteer programs, and Lincoln students are assisting Susquehanna in developing its cultural awareness. Dr. Niara Sudarkasa, president of Lincoln University, will be Susquehanna's commencement speaker in May.



The University recognizes that special care must be taken within the campus community to create an environment that is

hospitable and supportive of diversity. Multicultural Affairs Director Poullard plays an important role in helping students integrate successfully into student life. He has established a peer network among similar administrators at other regional institutions, which has allowed minority students at those universities to become acquainted with a larger peer group and to take advantage of programming on other campuses.

"I feel the issue of cultural diversity is long in coming to Susquehanna University," says Poullard. "In order for cultural diversity to really become evident here, it will take more economic resources and most importantly, a willingness of the community as a whole to embrace, understand and nurture the beauty of difference. The work has begun, but we are far from where we'd like to be."

As Susquehanna works to increase the level of cultural diversity on campus for the benefit of all of its students, it has begun the evolution towards a climate more reflective of the world today.

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Susquehanna University Nondiscrimination Policy

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Farmer educates Susquehanna on civil rights



As founder and former national director of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) and a leading activist of civil rights and social reform, **James Farmer** culminated Susquehanna's celebration of Black History

Month with his lecture on "A Living History of the Civil Rights Movement."

Addressing an audience at the Weber Chapel Auditorium, Farmer called the civil rights movement of the 1960's "this nation's finest hour" and warned that racism is on the rise once again, particularly on college campuses.

"I grieve when I see the hatred and polarization that is rampant in our country today," said Farmer during his lecture. "I think that it is greater today than any time in my memory—particularly among young people and particularly on college campuses."

"Part of this is because students are young and don't know what happened to get us where we are today. They believe, as the majority of the people believe according to polls since 1975, that there's no longer any racial discrimination, except in reverse," he said. "They believe blacks got too much too fast."

Farmer prefaced these statements by giving his audience a history lesson, educating the students in attendance. The audience responded by punctuating his speech with frequent applause.

He recounted, in detail, the events surrounding the well-known incident involved in the recent movie "Mississippi Burning" in which three civil rights

workers, two white and one black, were killed at the hands of a lynch mob in Philadelphia, Mississippi.

The victims were members of his civil rights staff and Farmer told students of the detailed investigation he conducted on their deaths, discrediting the movie which cited only the FBI's investigative efforts.

"The movie is fiction," he said. "We had to drag the FBI in kicking and screaming."

Farmer should know about the events in Mississippi at that time as he is considered to be one of the "big four" in the American Civil Rights Movement, joining such activists as Martin Luther King Jr., Roy Wilkins, and Whitney Young. He is probably best remembered for being the first to lead the dangerous freedom rides into Mississippi in 1961, which resulted in his spending considerable time in jail and nearly cost him his life.

"James Farmer really opened the eyes of the students with his accounts of the civil rights struggle. So many people have seen the movie 'Mississippi Burning' and Dr. Farmer pointed out so many untruths," said senior Sima Blackmon, student leader of SACA.

"James Farmer was an extraordinary and compelling speaker and captivated the audience with his charismatic personality."

Earth Week 1990

Student environmentalists unite campus, community and region

In celebration of national Earth Day, Susquehanna's Student Environmental Action Coalition (SEAC) symbolically buried the "Old Earth" on April 22 and began a week of educational activities involving the campus, community, and region.

In a candlelight ceremony, a paper mache globe was placed in a "grave" with a tombstone marker. A time capsule was inside the globe, containing such items as a styrofoam cup, an aerosol can, a disposable diaper, and a container of leaded gasoline.

Senior David Kearney of Berwyn, PA, and freshman Christine Sanderson of Mechanicsburg, PA, are co-ordinators of newly formed SEAC. Founded in the fall of 1989, the group already has more than 35 members and was named the area Earth Day coordinator of nearly 30 other colleges and universities.

"My goal is to bring people together with a common concern and help them realize that while things may seem to be out of control on a global level, we can work together on a local level to bring about change," says Sanderson, an environmental science/management major. "I want to bridge the gap between the government, the public, and scientists to help solve environmental problems."

The events planned for Earth Week were a first step toward her goal. SEAC worked in cooperation with the Department of Transportation's "Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful" campaign, for example, to sponsor art and writing contests for area schools. The local mall displayed the children's handwork.

The University's volunteer projects were actively involved as well. The Boy Scout project demonstrated minimum-impact camping and hosted an overnight camp-out featuring a folk singer sponsored by project CAUSE (Careful Alcohol Use Saves Everyone).

Environmental films, forums, panel discussions, and debates tackled subjects ranging from global warming

to household hazardous wastes. Farmers from the Susquehanna Valley were specially invited to a presentation by Walnut Acres, an internationally successful organic farm.

A waste and energy consumption audit of the campus targeted areas for improvement: a "Trash Monster" demonstration helped the campus and community prepare for mandatory recycling; a writing campaign (on recycled paper) targeted styrofoam use by area businesses; and a canoe trip on the Susquehanna River and a cycle-thon by the Cycling Club promoted alternative forms of transportation.

The week concluded with the planting of the "Tree of Hope," an optimistic sign. "So many students, faculty, and townspeople are rushing up to me, excited about what we're doing," Sanderson says. "They all have ideas and concerns, and they want to get involved. I see their faces when they talk about the environment, and I know they're becoming more aware."

Energy crisis heats up as fuel prices go down

As fuel prices have dropped, consumers have become complacent about conservation, a trend that worries Geology Professor Robert Goodspeed. He warns that unless we continue to conserve non-renewable resources, we will run out before alternative energy sources can be made practical.

Once gas, oil and coal supplies are depleted, they will not be replenished for millions of years. "Obviously, we can't wait around for that," Goodspeed says. "If we don't do our best to conserve more than we have in the past, a crunch will be forced upon us by nature."

Goodspeed suggests that higher fuel prices could do

much to ease the situation. The energy crisis of the 1970s was followed by increased exploration and discovery of new sources of natural gas and oil, resulting in reduced prices for fuel. When prices are low, consumers are less likely to conserve, and fuel companies are less motivated to find more reserves. "Humans have a much greater incentive to conserve if it is economically induced," notes Goodspeed.

He suggests that additional monies collected by fuel companies be used to search for new gas and oil reserves; to increase efficiency of appliances, automobiles, and equipment; and to improve the practicality of alternative energy sources, such as wind, solar, and geothermal.

As the rate of energy consumption continues to rise, particularly in developing Third World nations, and the U.S. becomes increasingly dependent on imported gas and oil, the need to manage resources efficiently becomes that much more vital. "We have a moral obligation to conserve and make our resources last longer," Goodspeed emphasizes.

Alumni Career Service Program Now Available

Keep up with the changing face of the career/job market. The Career Development and Placement Center is offering a new formalized alumni career services program to all Susquehanna alumni in an effort to better serve our growing alumni population. The service will be implemented July 1.

Interested alumni can participate in one year of the service by completing the application below and sending it with a \$35 check payable to S.U.A.C.S. Participants will be provided the following for one year:

1. Each registrant receives two volumes of the current year's College Placement Annual. All receive Vol. 1, the comprehensive guide to career planning. This booklet contains excellent insights and tips on job search strategies, resume and letter writing and interview skills. The other volumes are specific to certain academic majors and job type and contain opportunity listings with specific employers. These publications retail for \$25.
2. Upon request, an annual resume critique by the CD&P staff would be performed.
3. An employer resume referral service is included in which candidates and prospective employers complete matching data input sheets and, as employer job listings are received, alumni resumes meeting those requirements are sent to the employer

listing the vacancy. Employers are then free to contact the alumni candidates directly. No limits are placed on the number of times a candidate's resume is sent per year.

Recent research suggests that the majority of participants in most alumni career service programs have been graduates from that school for five years or less. Networking and personal referrals are the primary method of job attainment for the more experienced graduates.

Education majors are also being afforded a one-year similar service for the \$35 annual fee and should register by completing the application below. The education package consists of the following:

1. A copy of the ASCUS Annual, a 50-page comprehensive job search guide for education majors (an \$8 value).
2. Up to 10 free sets of credentials mailed to prospective employers (\$2 per set thereafter).
3. Periodically, a job vacancy listing bulletin.
4. A fact sheet of current resources to use on the job search.

Notice

In order to bring our records keeping system in line with the employment process of the 1990's, student placement files will be retained for only three years following graduation. The exception will be educational credentials which have a five year limit.

Beginning with this year's 1990 graduating class, all placement files with the Career Development and Placement Center for the graduated classes prior to June 1987 will be destroyed or, upon written request, returned to the individual provided those files are non-confidential/open. For education majors, it will be the classes prior to June 1985.

If you are affected by this new procedure, you have until July 31, 1990 to notify the Career Development and Placement Center if you wish to have your old placement file returned. Otherwise, it will automatically be discarded.

Laurie Pankuck — From Walk-on to Sharpshooting Basketball Star

When Laurie Pankuck "walks on" to the O. W. Houts Gymnasium floor, she's made a career of dissecting opposing defenses with her scoring prowess.

But then again, it's not surprising when this 5'8" junior guard from Berkeley Heights, NJ does well "walking on" anywhere. After all, she's the fifth women's basketball player in Susquehanna history to surpass 1,000 points for her career, but the first "walk-on," or non-recruited player, to do so.

At the conclusion of this past season, Pankuck not only surpassed 1,000, she presently stands fourth in career scoring (1,038).

In addition to her career numbers, she led this year's squad to the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC)-Northwest Section co-championship, despite a starting line-up that included three freshmen and a sophomore in addition to herself. She is also ranked among the Division III leaders in scoring (19.6 ppg) and free throw percentage (97 of 123, 78.9%), and led the MAC-Northern Division in scoring (21.8 ppg), while being among the Top 10 in free throw percentage, field goal percentage and rebounding.

Prior to attending Susquehanna, Pankuck was a three-sport athlete at Governor Livingston High School, earning letters in soccer, basketball, and softball. She was a sensation in soccer and attracted the interest of several Division I schools by setting her school record for career goals (97). She also finished as the school's third-leading scorer in basketball (1,350), attracting the attention of other Division III programs. Yet, she chose to attend Susquehanna for academic reasons.

As a freshman, Pankuck started to play pick-up games with some of the women's basketball players. Those games led to Pankuck joining the 1987-88 squad as a walk-on.

"After seeing her play, I was really amazed," recalls third-year coach Mark Hribar. "Besides her ability, you don't find many kids who lead as well as Laurie. She handles herself well both on and off the court, even though she's such a competitor."

Pankuck uses skill, not might, to bring down her challengers. "It's sometimes hard to compete when you're not as big as some of the other players, and

you really get pushed around. I have to rely on my quickness."

She may not be big, but she certainly frightens opposing coaches, particularly given the fact that she's only a junior, and she just keeps getting better.

Even with all the accolades, Pankuck doesn't like to focus on personal achievement. "My main goal involves the team," she says. "I see a lot of potential in this team. The goal I have before I graduate is to win the MAC championship together."

As an English major with a minor in communications, her post-graduation goal is to succeed in the competitive field of broadcasting.

Crusader Winter Sports Teams Complete Successful 1989-90 Campaign

With four of the five squads finishing above .500 in their final records, the 1989-90 Susquehanna University winter sports season was one of the best in recent history as the Crusader squads combined for a record of 56-35 (.615 winning percentage).

MEN'S BASKETBALL

After winning their second-consecutive Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC)-Northwest Section title and first under rookie-head coach Frank Marcinek, the Crusaders came within one shot of vying for back-to-back MAC-North titles losing to FDU-Madison 60-57 in the playoffs and finished the season at 17-9.

Despite the loss, junior guard Will Ciecierski of Lewistown provided team leadership throughout the year, leading the squad in scoring (160 ppg), while finishing nationally-ranked in free throw percentage (101 of 113/89.4%). He also earned selection to the Second Team Division III All-Middle Atlantic District team, as well as the Second Team MAC All-Stars for the second-consecutive year.

6'8" senior center Don McLoughlin of Old Bridge, NJ, who finished first on the team in rebounds (7.9 per game) and third in scoring (13.3 ppg), earned selection to the MAC First Team All-Stars.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Even with a young starting line-up that included three freshmen, a sophomore, and a junior, the Lady Crusaders still managed to earn a share of the MAC-Northwest Section title with a 7-3 conference mark, while finishing 16-10 overall under third-year head coach Mark Hribar.

Junior co-captain and off guard Laurie Pankuck of

Berkeley Heights, NJ was the driving force behind the team's rise to the top of the MAC standings this season as she finished nationally-ranked in both scoring (19.6 ppg) and free throw percentage (97 of 123/78.9%), while leading the Northern Division in scoring (21.8 ppg).

WRESTLING

Under the direction of 24th-year head coach Charlie Kunes, the Crusader grapplers came within one victory of tying the school record for wins in a season (11-3, 1971), finishing at 10-5 in the dual meet season.

In addition to the record, the squad also had a successful showing in the MAC Championships at King's College, having five wrestlers earn placement in their weight classes to help the team to a six-place finish, its best since 1987 (7th place).

Heading the list of placemen was freshman Andy Watkins of Forty-Fort, who placed second at heavyweight, finish 18-5 on the year.

Senior captain Rick Moskowitz also placed at MAC's for the third-straight year at 190, earning his highest placement ever with a third to go along with a season mark of 17-1. Freshman Matt Schwenk of East Greenville took fourth at 118-pounds and finished at 18-8, while sophomore Matt Lachenmayr of Whitehouse Station, NJ and junior Ray Swartz of Hanover took sixth at 158 and 177 respectively. A transfer from Delaware Valley, Lachenmayr finished the year at 13-9, while Swartz was 11-13-1.

SWIMMING

Under the 11th-year head coach Ged Schweikert, the men's and women's swimming teams completed solid seasons.

The women once again finished with a winning season at 8-5 and placed eighth at the MAC Championships at Dickinson College.

Youth once again headed the Lady Crusader effort with junior Stephanie Grant of Blue Bell, sophomore Paige Malin of Chalfont, and freshman Amy Clark of S. Dartmouth, MA leading the way. Grant placed fifth in the 100- and 200-yard backstroke and was a member of three placewinning relay teams. Clark was fifth in the 200- individual medley and seventh in the 100-yard freestyle and also was on three placewinning relays, while Malin took fifth and seventh in the 100 and 200-yard breaststroke events respectively and was a member of one placewinning relay.

Although the men finished the regular season at 5-6 and were tenth at MAC's, Schweikert was pleased with the squad's development, particularly among the young swimmers.

Heading the underclassmen was freshman Scott Blanchard of Cedarhurst, NY, who broke the school record in the 200-yard breaststroke (2:22.47) and finished 14th in the event at MAC's, while swimming a leg on two placewinning relays.

Photographer makes his New York debut:

Art instructor documents Amish and Old Order Mennonites

With the opening of a one-man show in the Ledell Gallery in New York City, photographer David Lauer realized the dream of every artist.

His images of Amish and Old Order Mennonites will be exhibited at the Anita Shapolsky Gallery this summer in Jim Thorpe, PA, culminating the documentary work of 15 years. Lauer will open the show with a slide lecture on June 23.

In the tradition of Edward S. Curtis, who documented the disappearing American Indian in the 19th century, Lauer seeks to record the lifestyle of these unusual communities before urbanization forces them to leave Central Pennsylvania.

Lauer was assisted on this project by junior Ann Beggs of Fair Haven, NJ and recent graduate Erik Rank '88 of Boiceville, NY, both of whom had their work published in the past two years of *The Best College Photography*:

"My subject is an American subculture that within the passage of time will inevitably change, lost to life's process of evolution," explains Lauer, an instructor in Susquehanna's Department of Art. "The Plain People struggle to remain separate from the progress of the outside world, but signs of change are visible even in their dress. One of the churches in the area now permits women to wear printed fabrics, and another ruled just two years ago that women can carry purses for the first time."

Much of Lauer's sensitivity to the Plain People comes from his own Mennonite ancestry and the eight years he lived with a family in his native Snyder County. The great-great-grandson of the founder of a Mennonite church in nearby Juniata County, Lauer shared daily farm chores, participated in work parties, and joined in celebrations and worship with a family of seven. At the same time, he struggled to establish his own studio.

Aware that people mistrust what they don't understand, Lauer hopes to dispel myths about the Amish and Old Order Mennonites while diligently protecting their privacy. Often exploited and seldom understood, the Plain People have maintained a simple lifestyle of hard work and strict adherence to Biblical doctrines, living much as their ancestors did in the 1800s.

"I have great love and respect for these people," Lauer says. "I'm very careful where I show my work, and I'm very particular about who publishes my photographs."

Unlike the exploitive photographers who stalk the Plain People with long lenses from the woods or the side of the road, Lauer understands and respects their reluctance to being photographed.

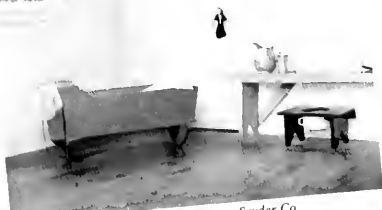
By approaching the Plain People directly, establishing guidelines with the elders of each church in the area, and submitting all his images to an advisory board, Lauer has developed a trusting relationship with the community.

He has been invited to document many significant events, ranging from the departure of a church whose members decided that Central Pennsylvania had become too progressive, to his trademark photograph of a six-year-old boy wearing his first pair of pants.

Lauer's efforts have been rewarded. His work is displayed in such major museums as the Philadelphia Museum of Art and is included in Amish and Mennonite historical collections throughout the United States and Canada. His images have also been featured in *American Artist Magazine* and illustrate six books on the Plain People and Pennsylvania.

"Molly and Polly," a photograph of two Mennonite draft horses, is in former President Reagan's personal collection.

A nominee for the Governor's Award of Excellence in the Arts, Lauer is the only Pennsylvania artist who has been selected for the annual exhibit at the State Museum in Harrisburg for 10 consecutive years. He also was granted a Special Achievement Award by the Pennsylvania Senate for his photographic documentation within the Commonwealth.

Susquehanna University Sets Tuition, Fees for 1990-91

Citing its commitment to enhanced quality and value in education, Susquehanna University's board of directors has approved higher tuition and fees for the 1990-91 academic year. In doing so, the board again this year set lower tuition increases for continuing students.

Comprehensive fees for first-year students next year will be \$16,970; for sophomores, \$16,390; and for juniors and seniors, \$15,410. These figures represent an increase of \$1,870 for freshmen and \$1,290 for continuing students.

In announcing the board's action, President Joel Cunningham said, "We are convinced that investing additional resources in educational programs is in the best interests of Susquehanna students. Our decision to focus on quality is resulting in enhancements that will benefit students during their undergraduate years and throughout their lives."

Cunningham said that the higher increase for freshmen reflects both the board's commitment to moderating fee increases for continuing students and the fact that entering students will benefit more fully from the improvements the university is making.

Susquehanna has made excellent progress in recent years in achieving quality in academic programs and student life. This year fourteen new members joined the faculty, bringing teaching and research credentials that are among the strongest in the university's history. Applications for admission are near record highs at a time when those at many other strong institutions are down. An annual retention rate of 90 percent ranks with those of the most prestigious colleges in the country.

"Continuing to improve quality of academic programs and facilities requires additional resources," Cunningham

commented. "As is true of virtually all independent colleges, the largest component of Susquehanna's income comes from student tuition and fees, which account for approximately three-quarters of the university's annual income."

Susquehanna has achieved remarkable success recently in its fund-raising efforts. Alumni and parent gifts in the university's annual fund have increased substantially and the five-year capital gifts campaign which began two years ago is far ahead of schedule in nearing its \$22 million goal.

Combined revenue from tuition and fees, gifts, grants and endowment income will make possible additional improvements. An \$18 million capital investment program begun this year will provide major renovation of four residence halls and three academic buildings. In 1990-91, faculty will be added in the molecular biology, psychology and communications programs, and the Blough-Weis Library's catalog and circulation system will be automated to provide improved access to Susquehanna's growing library holdings and to those in libraries throughout the Northeast.

Recognizing that college costs are a heavy burden for many families, Cunningham said, "Susquehanna remains committed to a financial aid program that is sensitive and responsive to student needs. Virtually all students who demonstrate need will be assisted." More than half of Susquehanna's students receive some form of financial assistance.

Cunningham concluded, "In today's increasingly complex world, a first-class education is an investment for the long term. We believe our focus on quality will be of value throughout the lives of our students."

Encaustic Art Show/Convention

Susquehanna University will host the 2nd International Encaustic Convention from June 22-24, 1990. An art show featuring encaustic paintings from around the globe will be on display in the Blough-Weis Library from June 1-24. Library hours will be Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., and Saturday, June 23, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Encaustic painting is an ancient art form used by the Egyptians and Greeks before oil paintings were discovered. Wax pigment is heated, layers applied and then heated again to seal the work. This art form is seeing a strong revival internationally because it survives so well through the ages. 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Family business consultant, David Bork

Susquehanna University's Sigmund Weis School of Business recently played a major role in addressing the issues facing small business on both the regional and international fronts as it successfully unveiled its new Family Business Program and served as a co-sponsor of The 35th World Conference of the International Council for Small Business (ICSB).

The Family Business Program made its debut May 31-June 1 as some 70 regional family business executives joined with leading experts in a workshop entitled "Creating a Healthy Family Business."

A week later The Weis School joined with The School of Government and Business Administration at George Washington University, the United States Small Business Administration, Bell Atlantic, the National Federation of Independent Business, *Entrepreneur* magazine, and the School of Business Administration at the University of Dayton, as co-sponsor of ICSB's World Conference June 7-10 in Arlington, VA. The conference drew small business entrepreneurs, government officials and educators from over 45 countries.

"We believe it's important to strengthen family business in the United States and think the Family Business Program is one way we can serve the needs of both our students and the regional business community," says Carl Bellas, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business. "We're also pleased that our faculty played such a major role in an international conference."

Family Business Program Created

In the United States, according to the experts, 90 percent of the 15 million businesses are family-owned and operated, but only 30 percent of all first-generation businesses survive into the next generation. Those numbers prompted the creation of the Family Business Program, which found Susquehanna joining only a handful of business schools nationally offering a program in this field.

Professor of Management **Bill Sauer** is director of the program, which is being funded partially by a grant from the Charles Deegenstein Foundation.

By the fall semester, Sauer hopes to have the program in place. Five basic activities are envisioned for the new program:

- Organizing and conducting workshops and seminars for family businesses.
- Building and operating a family business network for the purpose of sharing information and encouraging mutual assistance on family business issues.
- Developing library reference collections of books, journals, and articles on family businesses and family business issues.
- Encouraging Susquehanna University faculty, and others, to conduct research in this field that will be of value both to area family businesses and to faculty and students at business schools throughout the country.
- Developing an undergraduate course on family businesses at Susquehanna.

The nation's foremost pioneer in counseling family businesses, **David Bork**, served as keynote speaker and conference leader in the program's initial workshop.

As founder of the Bork Institute for Family Business in Aspen, CO, whose mission is to help families remain positively connected and successful in their businesses, Bork has been featured in *Fortune* magazine, *The Wall Street Journal*, *USA Today*, *Money* magazine and *The Washington Post* for his expertise in the field. He worked with over 250 families, assisting them in dealing with such issues as succession, bringing children into the firm, sibling rivalry, divorce, and other issues affecting family firms.

He was joined by several noted family business executives in a panel discussion May 31 as a highlight of the workshop. The panel included:

- **Dan and Gary Baylor '69**. Dan is the founder of Country Cupboard in Lewisburg, one of the largest gift shop/ restaurant operations on the East Coast. When Gary succeeded his father as president, Dan retired, only to start a new enterprise — Brook Park Farms.
- **Dick Yuengling**, president of the Yuengling Brewery, which was founded in 1829 and is the oldest brewery in the United States. He is the fifth generation of Yuenglings to run the business. He began his work there as a teenager, later left and started his own successful distributorship, only to return and buy the business when his father became ill.
- **Dick Rosenberg**, chairman of Big V Supermarkets in New York. He took over the family business, and with

his parents remaining as active participants, built it into a major enterprise and then sold it.

- **Andree Phillips** and **Rick Fenstamaker**. Andree is president of Radiant Steel Products Corporation, a steel fabricating firm in Williamsport which she took over several years after her father's death and, with no previous experience, brought the firm back from the edge of bankruptcy. She has since brought her son, Rick, into the business and he presently serves as plant manager.

- **Louis Sheetz**, vice president of marketing for Sheetz Convenience Stores based in Altoona. He and his brothers have built a chain of 185 convenience stores located throughout Pennsylvania, Ohio, and West Virginia.

- **Steven Hoffman '72, CPA**, a tax partner with the accounting firm of KPMG Peat Marwick specializing in tax planning, also was a featured workshop speaker.

Susquehanna Joins NASA in Joint Venture

Susquehanna University has been selected by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) to participate in a joint space science research program called the NASA JOint Venture (JOVE) Initiative. Susquehanna is one of only 15 colleges and universities across the nation, and the only Pennsylvania school, selected for this three-year pilot project.

In announcing the partnership, President Joel Cunningham said: "We are enthusiastic about the research opportunities this joint venture with NASA will provide Susquehanna faculty and students. We also appreciate the leadership of scientists of the University of Arizona in supporting Susquehanna's participation and the encouragement of Congressman George Gekas."

Dr. Richard W. H. Kozlowski, associate professor and head of the physics department, and **Dr. Fred A. Grosse**, professor of physics, are Susquehanna's JOVE faculty research associates. Beginning this summer, they are studying the atmospheres and surfaces of Venus, Mercury, and the Moon, in collaboration with Dr. Donald Hunt of the Department of Planetary Sciences at the University of Arizona, using observational data from ground-based facilities and from spacecraft. They intend to analyze data from the Magellan to Venus and Galileo to Jupiter missions as it becomes available. Dr. Kozlowski and Dr. Grosse will involve their students in this research and will develop contemporary space science curriculum units for both basic and upper level physics courses at Susquehanna. An outreach program for local elementary and/or secondary schools will also be a part of Susquehanna's space science program.

The JOVE Initiative began last year as a way to broaden the participation of university scientists and students in analyzing the flood of space science data that will be pouring in from upcoming observatory missions. According to NASA, 1989-1993 will be the "Golden Age of Space Science" because of the many new launches planned during this five-year period. The program also hopes to expose many more students to the excitement of the space sciences, thereby addressing national needs in science and engineering education.

Susquehanna University's participation in this new venture is one of many new developments in its approach to science education. A greater emphasis has been placed on student/faculty collaborative research throughout the sciences; new curricular focus has been placed on the life sciences; and the major renovation and expansion of Fisher Science Hall, to be completed this fall, will bring together science and psychology departments in one location to encourage interdisciplinary cooperation. The building includes an observatory which houses the largest reflecting telescope of its kind in Pennsylvania, a gift from the University of Arizona's Lunar and Planetary Laboratory

University Starts Habitat for Humanity Chapter

A campus chapter of the international housing program Habitat for Humanity has been established at Susquehanna University. Students, faculty and volunteers from nearby communities met in the spring to elect officers, officially launching the program.

Habitat for Humanity International is a grassroots, Christian housing ministry whose objective is to eliminate poverty housing. By using as much volunteer labor and donated materials as possible, homes and apartments are built or renovated, and sold to families in need at no profit and no interest. The cost of the home is repaid over a fixed time period, and the payments finance additional building projects. Homeowners also are required to contribute "sweat equity" by participating in the project. Susquehanna students became interested in forming a University chapter after working on Habitat housing projects last year in Bloomsburg, New York City and Baltimore. **Chaplain Christopher Thomforde**, who organized the day-long excursions to those cities, comments, "With the opening of a Habitat chapter at Susquehanna, the students will eventually be able to apply what they have learned elsewhere to assist surrounding communities here on an ongoing basis."

The first step towards this goal was the establishment of a campus chapter. The actual selection and building of projects will not begin until an affiliate project is established—an autonomous, nonprofit corporation with its own board of directors and committee structure. Student involvement in the campus chapter is expected to grow, especially since it has been approved to be part of the Project House system for the 1990-91 academic year.

Dr. Jerrell W. Habegger, assistant professor of accounting, is faculty advisor to the Habitat chapter.

"We hope to become an affiliate project within the next several months," Habegger said. "Right now we are in the process of identifying areas of the county with the greatest need and building community commitment to the Habitat program."

Habegger added that Susquehanna students will continue to help with projects in other cities. "If alumni or other friends of the University know of Habitat affiliates in their cities that would welcome college students, I would like to know about them," he said.

Sudarkasa's Speech Culminates First Year of Susquehanna/Lincoln Partnership

In the Spring of 1989 the Pennsylvania Campus Compact organization approved a one-year grant under which Susquehanna University and historically black Lincoln University developed a program of exchange to stimulate development of a centralized volunteer center at Lincoln similar to Susquehanna's Center for Volunteer Programs, and to assist Susquehanna in increasing cultural awareness and developing an effective Office of Multicultural Affairs.

Dr. Niara Sudarkasa, president of Lincoln, culminated the first year's activities by presenting the commencement address.

Activities this year have included: exchange visits by administrative staff and three one-day exchange visits of 3-5 students from each institution; an overnight exchange visit at Lincoln; a joint community service program in Harrisburg; and a quarterly Campus Connection newsletter distributed to students, staff and faculty at both institutions. A joint presentation on the partnership was made at the Pennsylvania Campus Compact conference in the spring.

Proposed future plans include a student intern exchange; and a joint staff development workshop for student life personnel from both institutions.

The partnership with Lincoln University is one example of Susquehanna's efforts to increase the level of multicultural diversity and community responsibility on its campus.



Fisher Science Hall Taking Shape

The \$6.3 million renovation and expansion of Fisher Science Hall continues on schedule and alumni should notice an obvious new addition to the building with their next visit to campus.

The dome, constructed to house the University's new telescope, is now in place atop Fisher on the Seibert Hall side of the building. 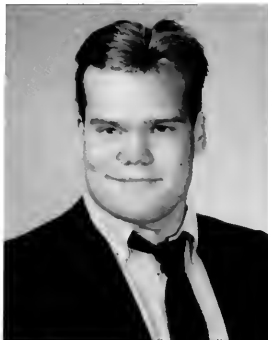

He anchored possibly the best offensive line in school history this season as the Crusaders finished second in rushing (206.1 yds./game) and total offense (335.9 yds./game) in the MAC.

A human resource management major at Susquehanna, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Howlett of 1840 Troxell St. in Allentown.

"Colin was one of our top leaders both on and off the field," says rookie Susquehanna football head coach **Steve Briggs**, who was an assistant the past two years.

"He's had a tremendous work ethic which has allowed him to be the best he could be and it is fitting that he receive this award. We are extremely proud of him."

The Blair Heaton Memorial Award is given annually to the senior man who best typifies the devotion to scholarship and athletics and the self-discipline and courage shown on the playing field by the late Blair Heaton. A 1942 Susquehanna graduate, Heaton starred in football and track and later returned to Susquehanna as a mathematics professor and coach. Also a former teacher at Selingsgrove Area High School, he died in 1960 at the age of 41.

A 5'7" setter/hitter in volleyball, **Davis** was a three-year captain and earned the squad's "Most Valuable Player" award during all four years of her Susquehanna

career. She also was a two-time MAC-Northwest Section All-Star.

This season, she helped the squad tie the school record for best-record ever, finishing 23-11 (tying the 1984 record) and qualify for the MAC playoffs for only the second-time in school history. On the year, she played in 90 of 96 games, finishing second in kills (174), set assists (390) and defensive digs (103). Also, she finished third with 27 solo blocks and had the least number of pass receiving errors (10). The six games Davis missed were due to her commitment as Student Government Association (SGA) President.

A graduate of **York Suburban High School**, she is a marketing major at Susquehanna and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alton Davis, 2467 Schoolhouse Lane, York.

"Jen has been a great team leader through example," says second-year Lady Crusader volleyball coach **Carole Tempon**. "She's one of the most talented and knowledgeable volleyball players I know and worked hard all season both for the team, and to improve her own skills. She'll be hard to replace."

Women's Track Team Hurdles Small Numbers in Record-Setting Year

Third-year women's track head coach **Tom Moore** knew he had brought in an excellent recruiting class for the 1990 season, but still thought his team was at least a year away from great success with only 10 members on the roster, including six freshmen.

As the season unfolded, Moore watched his small but talented squad make an impact instantly, setting a new school record for wins in a season with an 8-1 record (Old Record: 6-2, 1985), and earn its highest team

placement at the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) Championships since 1985, finishing fourth.

Along the way, freshman **Michele Duffy** of Danville wasted no time in earning respect. She won the triple jump (37' 8 1/2") and 100-meter hurdles (15.52 seconds), setting meet records in both, while finishing second in the long jump (6' 8") at MAC's as she went on to become Susquehanna's first female track All-American by finishing third in the triple jump (37' 9") at the NCAA Division III Championships.

All the success so fast surpassed Moore's wildest expectations.

"I didn't think we would do 8-1. I knew what the freshmen were capable of, but I just thought we'd improve upon the season before and see them do their personal bests," says Moore.

"I knew if they kept working hard, the records would come. I just didn't think it would be this soon."

Moore's program turned around from an 0-7 mark in 1989 to go 8-1 this year, including wins in its last five. That turnaround brings back memories of the 1979-80 men's track seasons which found current men's head coach **Jim Taylor**, who also works with the women in the running events, beginning his illustrious Susquehanna career with a 3-6 mark in 1979, only to come back with a perfect 10-0 mark the next year.

Moore was a standout freshman jumper on that 1980 squad. Not surprisingly, he has tried to build his program in the mold of Taylor's men's teams, which have gone 74-7 since his arrival with six MAC titles.

"Since I've come to Susquehanna, I've learned so much from him. Not just about coaching, but life in general," says Moore.

"When I took over the program, Coach Taylor and I decided to try and set up a women's program which was comparable to the men's. We didn't make a time reference, but we knew if we got some good recruits, we could turn things around quickly."

"I really started to get involved in the program about a year ago as far as concentrating an effort into it," says Taylor, who guided the men to a 5-1 record and fourth place MAC finish this year. "We've really just brought the women in to work with the men and think of the program, more or less, like one team doing everything together."

"I was very impressed with the accomplishments of this year's women's team, not because I didn't think they had the ability. I think we probably had as good of a recruiting year with the women as we've ever had. Obviously, the people we got in were very good."

As a matter of fact, freshmen copped all the women's

track team awards at this year's Sports Awards Banquet. In addition to Duffy, who took the Outstanding Runner Award, **Liz Nicodemus** of Wellsboro earned the Best Fieldwoman Award after placing in the shotput, discus and javelin at MAC's and throughout the year, and **Karen Warner** of Vienna, VA took the Most Valuable Athlete Award after competing in as many as six events during the season (high jump, long jump, triple jump, 100-meter hurdles, 400-meter intermediate hurdles, and the 400-meter relay), placing third in the high jump (4' 11 3/4") and fifth in the long jump (6' 6 1/2") at MAC's.

In addition to the award winners, all but one member of this year's team returns next season. With increased numbers, and a brand-new "Sprint Surface" track to train on, it might not be long before Susquehanna contends for a women's MAC team title. Moore certainly hopes so.

"My ultimate goal is obviously to win the MAC Championship," he says. "We wouldn't be fair to ourselves if we didn't strive to become MAC Champions. I don't know if we can do it, but that's the ultimate goal."

As for Taylor, who should know the right ingredients to win the title, he agrees that an MAC Championship may not be on the horizon, yet. But, then again...

"If we can keep everybody together and add some people, we could challenge," he says.

Largest Senior Class Graduates As 393 Earn Degrees

Susquehanna University conferred degrees upon 393 students and the largest senior class in its history, at its 132nd Baccalaureate and Commencement on Sunday, May 20.

The University also paid tribute to four distinguished leaders in the fields of education, medicine, international affairs and social service. Honorary degrees were conferred on:

- **Dr. Niara Sudarkasa**, president of Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. Sudarkasa delivered the Commencement address and received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters for her accomplishments in higher education.
- **Dr. Howard E. Morgan**, director of the Sigfried and Janet Weis Center for Research, Geisinger Clinic, Danville, PA. Morgan, widely recognized for his research and investigation into cardiovascular disease, received an honorary Doctor of Science.
- **Dr. Claude A. Buss**, professor emeritus of Stanford University, CA, and currently professor of Asian Area Studies in the Department of National Security Affairs at the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, CA. A distinguished diplomat and historian who received a masters degree from Susquehanna in 1924. Buss received an honorary Doctor of Laws.
- **Rev. Thomas W. Hurlocker**, president of Tressler Lutheran Services in Mechanicsburg, PA. Hurlocker received an honorary Doctor of Divinity for his accomplishments in the health and social services field. He was also the Baccalaureate preacher.

Niara Sudarkasa, Ph.D.

An internationally known and widely published scholar, Dr. Niara Sudarkasa is the first woman president of Lincoln University. In 1986, she was unanimously selected from among 103 nominees to head this historically black institution.

Dr. Sudarkasa has received many other "firsts." At the University of Michigan, she was the first African-American woman to receive tenure, the first to become full professor in the College of Arts and Sciences, the first to head an academic center, and the first to serve as associate vice president for academic affairs.

It was particularly fitting that Dr. Sudarkasa be Susquehanna's commencement speaker because of a special partnership that exists between the two schools. Through a grant last year from the Pennsylvania Campus Compact, Susquehanna students are helping Lincoln students develop successful volunteer programs, and Lincoln students are assisting Susquehanna in developing a higher level of multicultural diversity and awareness.

Born Gloria A. Marshall in Ft. Lauderdale, FL, and recognized early as a gifted child, Dr. Sudarkasa received her undergraduate education as a Ford Foundation Early Entrance Scholar at Fisk University and Oberlin College. She graduated from Oberlin in 1957 at the age of 18, ranking in the top ten percent of her class. She earned the masters and Ph.D. in anthropology from Columbia University in 1959 and 1964, respectively.

Recognized internationally for her pioneering research on Yoruba women traders of Nigeria, Dr. Sudarkasa's more recent publications and presentations on the African roots of African-American family organization have been acclaimed as "brilliant and highly original."

A former Senior Fulbright Research Fellow and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, Dr. Sudarkasa has received numerous academic fellowships, grants, awards, and professional honors.

Howard E. Morgan, M.D.

Dr. Howard Morgan has led a distinguished career in the field of cardiovascular disease research for more than 35 years. He earned his medical degree from Johns Hopkins University and completed his residency training at Vanderbilt University Medical Center. He served as professor of physiology at Vanderbilt and as associate dean for research and Evan Pugh and J. Lloyd Huck Professor of Physiology at the Milton S. Eshelby Medical Center of the Pennsylvania State University. He is the Charles B. Degenstein Distinguished Scientist in the Geisinger Clinic.

At Geisinger, where he has been since 1987, Dr. Morgan directs programs of basic investigation into cardiovascular disease. He oversees 25 research scientists who occupy laboratories in the Weis Center for Research.

Dr. Morgan has served as president of the American Heart Association and the American Physiological Society, and has received prestigious awards from both organizations. He has been cited for distinguished service by the American Society of Biological Chemists and has been named a Hughes Scholar by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. He is a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.

Claude A. Buss, Ph.D.

Claude Buss was just 20 years old when Susquehanna University awarded him the master of arts in 1924. After graduating from Sunbury High School in 1919, Buss attended Washington Missionary College in Washington, D.C., receiving a bachelor of arts in 1922. At 23, he earned his Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania.

According to Buss, it was as a graduate student at Susquehanna that he learned the fundamentals of the

teaching profession and was introduced to the attractions of scholarship and public service. A distinguished career that has taken him all over the world had its beginning on the campus of Susquehanna. Says Buss, "Susquehanna was indeed my bridge [to] the rest of the world." In 1970, he returned to Susquehanna to accept the University's Alumni Award for Achievement.

Dr. Buss has had a remarkable career in teaching and government service. He spent several years in China in the U.S. Foreign Service and taught at the University of Southern California prior to becoming an executive assistant to the United States High Commissioner in the Philippines in 1941. He was interned by the Japanese when they took Manila, but due to his reputation as a scholar in Asian affairs, he was permitted to do research at the University of Tokyo.

Following the war, Dr. Buss became professor of history at Stanford University. At the same time, he continued to carry out special government assignments and was on General Douglas MacArthur's staff during the Occupation of Japan. He has lectured throughout Southeast Asia and twice served as a Fulbright Teaching Fellow in the Philippines. He is the author of many books on international relations and the Far East, and his articles have appeared in numerous popular and professional magazines.

Rev. Thomas W. Hurlocker

Rev. Hurlocker is president of one of the largest Lutheran social ministry organizations in the nation. Tressler Lutheran Services, headquartered in Mechanicsburg, provides health and social services through such programs as nursing care, residential services, adoption services for special needs children, foster care, counseling, education, refugee services and community-based services to the elderly. TLS currently employs 1,750 persons in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Delaware and provides services at 24 locations.

A native of North Carolina, Hurlocker received his bachelor of arts degree in sociology from Lehigh College in 1960 and his master of divinity from Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg. He also received an M.S. in counseling and human relations from Shippensburg University. Rev. Hurlocker is an ordained Lutheran minister and member of the First Lutheran Church in Carlisle, PA, where he served as senior pastor in the late 1960's, and the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. He has been an executive with Tressler Lutheran Services, formerly Tressler-Lutheran Service Associates, for the past 18 years.

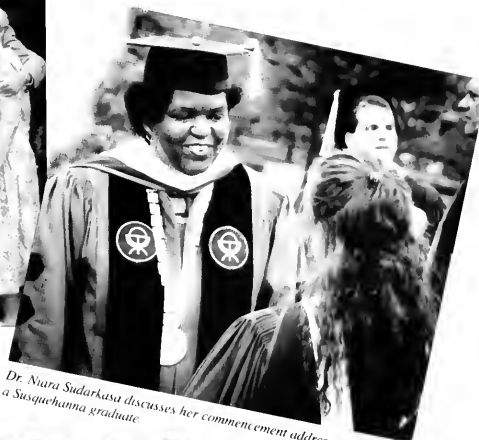

Introducing the individuals "who showed great promise during the roaring '80s and who should have what it takes to survive the more bearish '90s," the magazine predicted, "It will take a special breed of banker, broker, or investor to prevail in what promises to be a difficult decade."

Strangfeld has been employed by Prudential since 1977 and was previously a senior vice president of Prudential Capital Corporation. His office is in London, England.



David L. Stocum '61

Stocum Becomes Dean of Science School

David L. Stocum '61 was chosen from more than 200 candidates as dean of the School of Science at Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis. He was previously a professor in the Department of Cell and Structural Biology at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana.

When the appointment was announced last fall, Stocum said, "I think this school is on the verge of becoming what I believe is an excellent school of science. It is a good one now, and what it takes to be an excellent school of science is a faculty who are both productive in research and who have a real commitment to undergraduate teaching and education. Right now, I think we are in a position to capitalize on making this a center for teaching, education and research excellence."

Stocum is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, author and co-author of more than 60 research publications, and has made numerous presentations in his field at national and international symposia and seminars. He also has served on several scientific panels and been awarded research grants from the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health.

Joe W. Kleinbauer '63, and Louise Kresge Isaacs '45, were honored during Alumni Weekend, receiving the Alumni Association's Achievement Award and Service Award respectively.

"These individuals have been chosen to receive the highest alumni honors because of their exemplary dedication and energies," said Charles H. "Buss" Carr, alumni awards committee chairman. The medals were presented by William A. Lewis '68, president of the Alumni Association, at its annual awards luncheon.

Kleinbauer graduated in 1963 with a business degree in marketing, joining F.W. Woolworth as a management trainee. Shortly thereafter he became manager, then owner, of Snyder's Men Shop in Selinsgrove, renaming the business the now familiar "J Kleinbauer, Inc." His store once survived the ravages of fire, and temporarily relocated with the help of nearly 100 volunteers two weeks before Christmas. But he was back in business within months. Kleinbauer started out small, but today employs 24 people and has physically expanded the store so that he offers a complete line of women's clothing and furnishings as well as men's.

Kleinbauer's is famous for its courteous, helpful, personal service — qualities which begin at the top. In addition to his workload as a businessman, he has been an active leader in many civic and charitable causes, and has a strong love of Susquehanna.

When Louise Kresge Isaacs attended Susquehanna University, she was involved in just about everything on campus, which may have been a foreshadowing of things to come during the next 45 years. She graduated with a degree in Music Education and taught public school music for four years. In 1946, she married her college sweetheart, Larry Isaacs '43, and they raised four children.

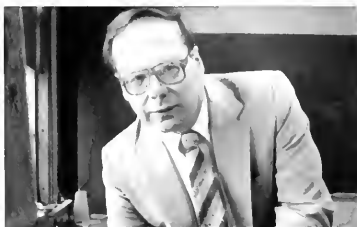
From 1979-1982, he was general manager of the Harrisburg Symphony Association and most recently, was general manager of the Youngstown (Ohio) Symphony Society.

Thanks to the generosity of a Selinsgrove benefactor, **Dr. Frank W. Fletcher**, professor and head of the Department of Geological and Environmental Science, has been named the first holder of a Charles B. Degenstein Professorial Chair in the School of Arts and Sciences.

Fletcher will hold the Charles B. Degenstein Chair in Environmental Science and receive special resources for research, study and professional travel. The position is named in honor of retired Weis Markets executive **Charles B. Degenstein** of Selinsgrove, who endowed resources to enable Susquehanna to attract and retain exceptional scholars and teachers. This is the second Degenstein Chair at Susquehanna, the first having been established last year in the University's Sigmund Weis School of Business.

"Susquehanna University is grateful to Charles Degenstein for his generous support for excellence in Susquehanna's faculty," said President Joel Cunningham.

In 1983, a multimillion-dollar commitment from Degenstein made possible the creation of the Sigmund Weis School of Business in memory of the Sunbury-based supermarket chain founder and Degenstein's father-in-law. In 1981, the Degenstein Campus Center was named in honor of the benefactor.

Cunningham said: "In bestowing this honor on Frank Fletcher, Susquehanna University recognizes his outstanding achievements as a teacher and a scholar. He is especially successful in helping students achieve their full potential."

As a former dean of Arts and Sciences, Fletcher contributed substantially to the shape of the University's core curriculum, and he has been an architect for the University's forward-looking program in environmental and geological science. He has received several awards of distinction including the Lindback Award for Distinguished Teaching, Outstanding Educator of America and Professor of the Year.

Fletcher is president of Environmetrics, Inc., which conducts environmental audits for commercial and industrial clients. A member and former fellow of the Geological Society of America, he has published numerous articles on geological topics. Fletcher has served as a member of the University's board of directors. He joined the faculty of Susquehanna University in 1962.

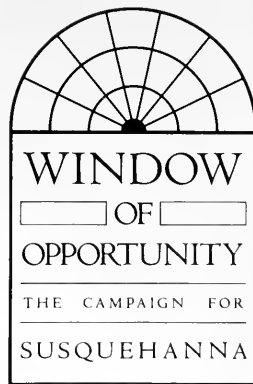


For the second year in a row, the Susquehanna University Fund has been named among the top annual giving programs in the nation.

SUSQUEHANNA UNIVERSITY has completed another year of outstanding achievement in its fund raising endeavors. Gifts to Susquehanna University totaled more than \$5,970,000 in 1989-90. The generosity of many alumni and friends is responsible for the significant changes taking place on the Susquehanna campus.

The Window of Opportunity Campaign continues to move to higher levels of success. Robert F. Weis, vice president and treasurer of Weis Markets, Inc. and campaign steering committee chair, commented, "All alumni and friends of Susquehanna University should take particular pride in this remarkable accomplishment. Not only has the campaign goal of \$22 million now been attained, but because of the enthusiasm, dedication, and outstanding generosity of the Susquehanna community, we have achieved our goal a year before we had originally anticipated. On behalf of the University, I am pleased to have this opportunity to thank all of those who have helped us meet this challenge and enabled us to look significantly beyond what we initially thought possible."

As of June 30, over \$23.8 million had been committed to the five-year Window of Opportunity campaign which will move to the Special and General Gifts phase of the campaign in the fall of 1990 and come to a close next year.

A significant factor in the campaign's success was the University's ability to meet the contribution goals of both a Pew Charitable Trusts matching grant of \$300,000 and a Kresge Foundation challenge grant of \$350,000. These funds were earmarked for the largest project in the campaign, the renovation and expansion of Fisher Science Hall. The University also was awarded \$250,000 from the Josiah W. and Bessie H. Kline Foundation, Inc. of Harrisburg, bringing its total commitment to the \$6.3 million science building project to \$300,000.

Results of the Window of Opportunity campaign are now clearly visible on campus as facilities renovation and expansion move forward. The Blough-Weis Library was completed in the fall of 1989. The Fisher Science Hall was rededicated on October 28, 1990. Other improvements were made to Bogar and Heilman Halls, both are academic facilities, and two student residence halls, Aikens and Smith.

Less visible but vitally important to the University's

financial health has been the growth in its endowment. Since the campaign began in July, 1987, the endowment has grown from \$11.9 million to over \$26 million.

The Susquehanna University Fund has surpassed previous records and set a new level of total dollars contributed. Gifts to the SUF for 1989-90 totalled \$1,026,150. Again this year, 40% of Susquehanna's alumni contributed to the annual fund thus continuing a remarkable level of participation that well exceeds the national average. The Annual Fund was recognized for the second consecutive year for its distinguished achievement by the Council for the Advancement in Support of Education and the USX Foundation. Susquehanna was one of only 14 annual funds nationwide to be honored during 1989-90. Significant accomplishments that contributed to the success of the annual fund in 1989-90 are:

- The National Committee on Annual Giving led by Donald E. Wissinger '50 successfully completed another remarkable year of giving. The National Committee has been responsible in a large measure to the outstanding success that the annual fund continues to enjoy.

- The local Business and Industry Campaign completed another outstanding year of generous support. The Business and Industry Campaign was chaired by George and Margaret Keller who led their volunteers to a very successful campaign securing over 150 gifts and raising a total amount of \$122,977.

- The Parents Executive Committee chaired by Jack '57 and Joan Bishop secured gifts totaling \$62,520. The funds raised through the Parents Executive Committee were directed to the Blough-Weis Library.

- Senior Class Agent, Angie Johnson, led the Class of 1990 to a successful Senior Class Pledge Program. Members of the Class of 1990 pledged their support to Susquehanna through the dedicated work of many senior class volunteers.

- Student volunteers numbering over 300 under the leadership of Betsy Van Tuyl '90, Aaron Billger '91 and Mark Zimmerman '91 successfully raised over \$170,240 in pledges for the Susquehanna University Fund. These dedicated callers contacted more than 6,717 alumni and parents in 28 nights of calling.

Fourteen new members joined the faculty, bringing teaching and research credentials that are among the strongest in the University's history. We recruited an exceptionally strong academic class for the fall of 1990, with the highest average SAT scores of any Susquehanna class in the last 15 years. 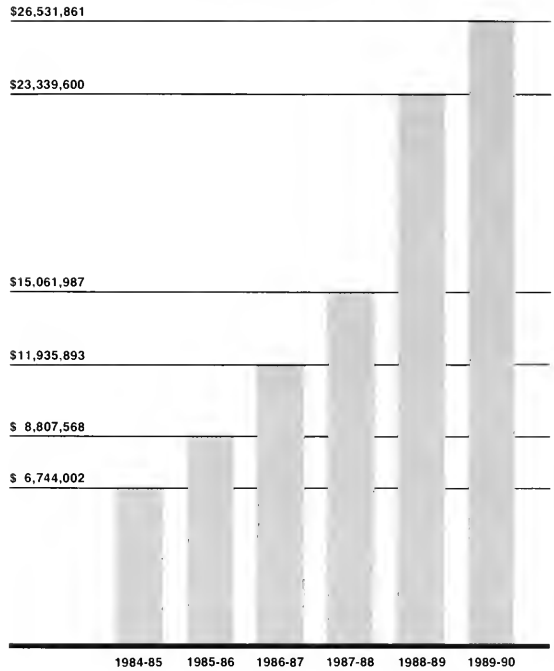
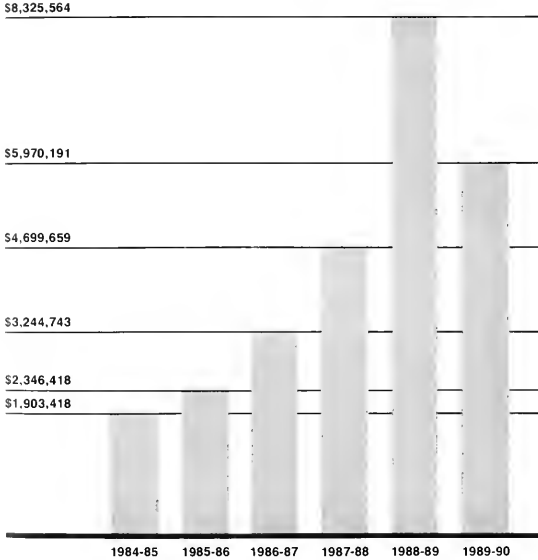

Class reunion giving continues to be an exciting program for the University. The 25th and 50th reunion classes celebrated their reunions during Alumni Weekend.

- The Class of 1940 commemorated the 50th anniversary of their graduation from Susquehanna by establishing **The Class of 1940 Scholarship Fund Endowment**. The Class of 1940 Gift Committee chaired by Florence Rothermel Latsha raised over \$22,000. Of this total, \$21,958 is designated for the class scholarship fund. The enthusiasm of the class

members enabled the class to significantly exceed their original goal of \$15,000.

- The Class of 1965 celebrated its 25th reunion with enthusiasm and generosity. As special recognition for their 25 years, the class presented President Cunningham with a check representing gifts that totaled \$55,862. Of this total, \$44,055 reflects gifts made to the special campaign for the Susquehanna University Fund.

The 1989-90 year was one of continued strong levels of giving. Sustaining alumni participation

while at the same time increasing dollars raised reflects a measure of confidence and support by alumni. 

The William Latimer Small Landes Scholarship Fund was established in 1980 under the will of his wife, Eleanor R. Landes of York, PA, and enhanced by the generous gifts of their grandson, William L. S. Landes, of the Class of '71, and his family. In awarding the scholarship, preference is to be given to liberal arts majors from York County, PA.

The Robert E. and E. Betty Lauf Scholarship Fund was established in 1983 by Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Lauf of Selingsrove, PA. The annual income is used to award a \$500 scholarship grant to a well-qualified student majoring in journalism or business administration. The student must maintain at least a B average.

The Lauver Accounting Scholarship was established in 1984 by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond C. Lauver to support deserving students enrolled in the University's Accounting Department.

The Sallie Burns Lenker Scholarship gives preference to graduates of Line Mountain High School, Dalmatia, PA, with the understanding that recipients shall, upon achieving earning capacity, make in gratitude an appropriate contribution to the scholarship fund.

The Elizabeth Epler Long Scholarship was established in 1987 by her bequest to benefit students according to their financial need and academic achievement.

The Frank Lowry Scholarship was established by Mrs. Lowry in memory of her husband, a former member of the University's Board of Directors.

The Lutheran Brotherhood Scholarship was created through a challenge grant sponsored by Lutheran Brotherhood in order to establish a scholarship fund at Susquehanna to benefit Lutheran students.

The May Sanborn MacDougall Scholarship was established in 1963 by the Board of Directors in grateful appreciation of the service rendered to the University by Robert E. MacDougall as director of development.

The Rev. and Mrs. J. Frank Matter Scholarship was established in 1949, with preference given to worthy students interested in the ministry.

The Mr. and Mrs. James D. McCarthy Scholarship was established by Mr. and Mrs. C. Deane McCarthy.

The John C. McCune II '37 Scholarship Fund was established by Marjorie Wolfe McCune '43 in memory of her husband, with income to be awarded to students majoring in the humanities.

The H. and L. Messeri Scholarship was established by Dr. Jonathan Messeri, former president of the University, for a worthy student.

The Rev. Harry C. Michael '17 Scholarship is provided by Miss Martha K. Michael.

The M. P. Moller Scholarship was established by Mr. M. P. Moller of Hagerstown, MD.

The E. M. Morgan Scholarship was established by his daughter, Mrs. Hewitt B. McCloskey.

The Della Granly Ocker Scholarship was established by the will of Mrs. Della G. Ocker of Harrisburg, PA, for worthy students planning to enter the ministry.

The Dr. George H. Parkes Scholarship was established by Dr. and Mrs. J. Paul H. Hively as an expression of appreciation for the inspiration received from Dr. Parkes, a leading Williamsport, PA, educator.

The Luther C. Peter Scholarship was established in 1955 by Mrs. Carrie C. Peter in memory of her husband.

The Dr. Edward A. and Marion R. Phillips Scholarship Fund was established in 1983 under the will of Marion R. Phillips of Selingsrove, PA, for students from Selingsrove Area High School to attend Susquehanna University. Recipients must have been residents of the Selingsrove Area School District for three years prior to entering Susquehanna.

The Minnie and Karl Rabey Scholarship was established by Vi L. Messeri in honor of her parents. The scholarship is awarded on the basis of need and merit.

The Charles A. Rahter Scholarship Fund was established in 1978 by a grant from the Landfall Foundation and by gifts from friends and former students of Dr. Rahter for deserving students majoring in English.

The Joseph L. and Greta M. Ray Scholarship gives preference to students from Sunbury.

The John and Verna Reidler Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 by the Reidler Foundation. Preference is given to students from the Hazleton, PA, area, with any surplus applied to needy students from Luzerne, Schuylkill, and eastern Northumberland counties.

The George A. and Maude L. Rhoades Scholarship Fund was established under the will of George A. Rhoads. The interest is to be awarded annually to students of the University who plan to become Lutheran ministers.

The Ella Ritter Scholarship, established in 1951 by bequest, is awarded to a woman desiring to pursue a premedical course of study.

The Dr. Bryan C. Rothfuss '23 Scholarship Fund was established in 1985 by his bequest.

The Salevan Scholarship Fund was established under the will of Gereon W. Salevan '29 in memory of Gereon W. Salevan and her husband, T. Marshall Salevan. Income from this fund will provide scholarship aid to worthy but needy students with a preference given to those students interested in premedical studies and careers in science.

The Shearer-Weber Scholarship was established by Dr. and Mrs. Gustave W. Weber H '77 in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Luther R. Shearer and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Weber.

The Jack P. '40 and D. Jeanne Shippe Scholarship was established to commemorate the Shippe's abiding interest in Susquehanna University and in deserving young men and women. Mr. Shippe was a member of the Class of 1940. The scholarship is to be awarded annually to a deserving Susquehanna student with demonstrated financial need.

The Erle I. Shober II '35, H'57 and Marjorie S. Shober Scholarship Fund was established in 1986 by the Board of Directors of Susquehanna University in recognition of Dr. and Mrs. Shober's invaluable service to the University, and on the occasion of Dr. Shober's retirement as Chairman of the Board.

The Amanda and Elizabeth Smith Scholarship is awarded with preference given to students studying for the ministry.

The Lillian V. Johanson Smith Scholarship was established in 1943 by her sister, Miss A. E. Johanson, her brother, Dr. A. M. Johanson, and her husband, Dr. G. Morris Smith, to be awarded to a needy student who, in the judgement of the University's scholarship committee, shows the marks of scholarly achievement coupled with dedication to the Christian spirit.

The Helen Soper '28 Music Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 under the will of Helen Ott Soper and by gifts from the family. The income is to be awarded annually to deserving music students, with preference given to residents of Selingsrove or the Central Susquehanna Valley.

The Nellie V. Spangler Scholarship was established by her bequest. The scholarship is granted to students from Selingsrove, Shikellamy, or West Snyder High Schools.

The Clyde R. Spitzner '37 Scholarship was established in honor of this member of the Board of Directors by the Philadelphia Alumni Club.

The Amos Alunzo Stagg H '89 Scholarship was established in 1965. Income from this fund will provide scholarship support to a deserving scholar athlete.

The Charles Steele Business Scholarship was established in 1984 under the will of Mary Steele '14 in memory of her father, a longtime Susquehanna director and benefactor. The scholarship is awarded to a talented sophomore taking a business course leading to a degree in business administration.

The Mary Steele '14 Piano Scholarship was established in 1984 under the will of Mary Steele '14, and is awarded to a sophomore who shows sufficient talent to complete the course for a degree in music.

The Mary Steele '14 Scholarship was established by the late Charles Steele of Northumberland, PA, with preference given to nominees selected by the family of Charles Steele.

The Surdna Foundation Scholarship Endowment was established in 1987 to provide support for deserving students with financial need.

The Nancy Schell Taylor Memorial Scholarship was established in her memory in 1984 by her husband, James W. Taylor, and her family. The recipient is chosen by the director of financial aid in consultation with members of the family.

The Tressler Science Scholarship Fund was established in 1989 under the will of Allen C. Tressler '29. Income from this fund is to be awarded to students enrolled in and pursuing courses in science as selected major or study. Preference is to be given to full-time students from lower Northumberland County and upper Dauphin County who maintain a grade point average of 2.5 or more and display financial need. Awards are made with a request that recipients shall, upon achieving earning capacity, make in gratitude an appropriate contribution to the scholarship fund.

The Emery H. Turnbach Scholarship was established in 1986 by Lorraine Turnbach Benjamin, a member of the Class of 1943, in honor of her grandfather. In awarding the scholarship, preference is to be given to students from Butler Township, Sugarloaf Township, Black Creek Township, and Conyngham Borough of Pennsylvania, or other worthy students of Pennsylvania.

The Katherine M. Vastine Scholarship was established by bequest from Katherine M. Vastine, with preference given to (1) members of the family; (2) the congregation of St. John's Lutheran Church of Maryberry Township, Montour County, PA; (3) residents of Rush Township, Northumberland County, PA; (4) other worthy students of Susquehanna University.

The Wagner Scholarship Fund was established under the will of Gereon W. Salevan '29 in memory of her parents, Dr. and Mrs. Milton E. Wagner, and her brother, Seneca M. Wagner. Income from this fund will provide scholarship aid to worthy but needy students with a preference given to those interested in premedical studies and careers in science.

The Dr. George R. Wentzel '33 Scholarship was established by his son, Gary Wentzel, and his daughter, Carol Wentzel Felix '66 in memory of her father. Preference is to be given to students majoring in the sciences and mathematics, and special consideration is to be given to students interested in pursuing a career in medicine and other health related fields.

The Wicand Scholarship was established by the Rev. W. R. Wicand, D.D., in grateful remembrance of the importance of the Missionary Institute, now Susquehanna University, in his life.

The E. E. Wissinger Family Scholarship Fund was established by Mr. and Mrs. Wissinger in recognition of the role of Susquehanna University in the education of their son, Donald '50, his wife Flora '51, and their grandchildren, Scott '76, Donna '78, Jane '81, and Diane '84. The scholarship is to be awarded in accordance with the University's financial aid policies, and preference is to be given to students from Blair County, PA.

The George B. Wolf Scholarship was established in 1947 by a bequest of this former Board member.

The Women's Auxiliary Scholarship was established by members of the Auxiliary to support needy and promising students.

The Woodruff Alumni Scholarship was established by 1961 by alumni of the University and Dr. John I. Woodruff, Class of 1888, then the oldest living Susquehanna alumna.

The Zarfios Memorial Scholarship was established by Donald W. Zarfios in memory of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence E. Zarfios.

Loan Funds

The George P. '31 and Anna L. Bailey Loan Fund, established in 1983, gives preference to Central Pennsylvania students who maintain a better than average academic record.

The Thomas H. G. Beaver Loan Fund was established by Miss Elizabeth T. Beaver, his daughter, for use by Lutheran students.

The Roger M. '25, H '53 and Helen D. Blough H'87 Loan Fund, established in 1972 by Dr. Roger M. Blough '25 and Helen D. Blough, is repayable at a reasonable rate of interest.

The Gula Virginia Charlton '36 Student Loan Fund, established in 1983 under the will of Gula V. Charlton '36 of Bedford, PA, is used to provide assistance in the form of low-interest loans to students majoring in music at Susquehanna University.

The Gulf Oil Corporation Loan Fund was established through an award made to the University by the corporation. This loan is not based on need.

The Reverend Cleason Becker King Loan Fund, established in 1952 by his daughter, Mrs. Myrtle King Graham, and his wife, Mrs. Angie C. King Byers, is to be used as a loan fund for pretheological students.

The Rev. Mervyn W. Remaly Memorial Student Loan Fund, provided by Mabel L. Remaly, offers low-interest loans to students.

The Raymond E. and Ruth L. Roush Student Loan Fund was established through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Roush. This fund is to provide assistance for academically qualified but financially needy full-time students with a preference given to students residing in Snyder County, Pennsylvania. This fund is to be administered in accordance with the established University policies for such funds.

The Temple Student Loan Fund was established by the Temple Lutheran Church of Altoona, PA, as a revolving loan fund to help students preparing for a full-time Christian service.

The York-Hanover Alumni Club Loan Fund was established in 1961 as a source of support for students by the York-Hanover Alumni Club.

Library Endowments

The Helen Decker Blough H'87 Library Fund was established in 1985 by Roger and Helen Blough to enhance the University's ability to build specialized collections of distinction. Mr. Blough was a member of the Class of 1925, chairman of United States Steel, and a longtime member of Susquehanna's Board of Directors.

The Mary Bowersox Library Fund was established in 1990 by Mrs. Mary Bowersox in memory of her husband, Roy H. Bowersox and the Albert Whiteley family with special remembrance for William Whiteley who was a member of the Class of 1935. The income for this fund will purchase books and periodicals for the enrichment of the library.

The Drumm Memorial Book Fund, established by the Drumm family in 1977, provides income for the purchase of volumes for the Religion Department.

The Russell W. and Joyce K. Gilbert Memorial Library Fund was established in 1985 by Viola Gilbert, other family members, and friends to commemorate Dr. Gilbert's 40 years of service to Susquehanna University as a professor of German, and Joyce Gilbert's service of nearly 20 years as assistant registrar. This fund is used to support the purchase of volumes for the library.

The Goyer Foundation Fund, established in 1981 through a grant from the foundation, provides for the purchase of volumes for the library.

The Lawrence M. '43 and Louise Kresge Isaacs '45 Library Fund was established by Mr. and Mrs. Isaacs to support acquisitions in the humanities.

Thomas L. Isaacs Memorial Book Fund, established in 1980 by his family provides funds to secure books, publications, and/or services in the area of economics and general business.

The Anne Schuore Memorial Fund, established in 1982 by her husband, Howard Schuore, provides for the purchase of books in a variety of areas.

The Brian '98 and Blanche Teats Memorial Fund was established in 1985 under the will of Blanche Teats. The fund provides for the purchase of magazines, periodicals, and books for the library.

The Harry Weis '00 Library Endowment, established in 1983 by Robert and Patricia Weis in memory of his father, provides for the annual purchase of books and periodicals for the enrichment of the library.

Endowed Lectureships and Performance Funds

The Jane Conrad Apple and Joan Apple Zimmerman '48 Fund, established in 1980, sponsors lectures or seminars at Susquehanna University by recognized scholars in the field of Elizabethan studies; supports an annual production of an Elizabethan play presented preferably in the Benjamin Apple Theatre; and purchases worthy library holdings related to the Elizabethan period.

The Distinguished Visitor Program at Susquehanna was established in 1988 by George E. and Margaret Lauer Harris, members of the Class of '64 and '66. Income from the endowment is to be used to support lectures, seminars or residencies by nationally recognized leaders in business, government or education on central topics in the public interest. A program committee, appointed by the president, will include the donors or their representatives, interested alumni or friends, and faculty. The committee will seek suggestions from campus and will select speakers and topics.

The Hilda Karniol Endowment for the Arts was established by her son and daughter-in-law, William and Lynne Karniol, to honor her devotion to the arts and her service to Susquehanna. The income is to be awarded at the discretion of the president of the University to those purposes that will enhance the role of the arts on campus.

The Ottaway-Daily Item Lectureship in Public Affairs, established by Ottaway Newspapers Inc. in 1977, brings to the Susquehanna campus and Central Pennsylvania men and women of outstanding reputation in the fields of journalism and public affairs.

The Charles A. Rabter Memorial Lectureship was established in 1977 by his widow and friends to provide resources to bring prominent scholars in the field of British literature to campus.

The Sigmund Weis '03 Memorial Lecture was established in 1979 by Mrs. Claire G. Weis in memory of her husband, namesake of the Sigmund Weis School of Business. The endowment brings to campus prominent personalities from business and public life to speak on matters of interest to the University and the community.

The Carl M. '63 and Kathryn W. Moyer Unrestricted Endowment Fund was established in 1986. Income is to be used to support the University's most urgent needs.

The Alice Mussleman '12 Music Fund was established by her bequest in 1987 for use within the music department.

The Presidential Discretionary Fund for Excellence was established by the Board of Directors of Susquehanna University in 1985 upon the occasion of the inauguration of Joel Cunningham as 13th president of Susquehanna University. Annual income provides funding for unique opportunities for the University's students, faculty, and friends.

The Florence and Saul Putterman Fund for the Visual Arts was established in 1986 by Florence Putterman, a member of the Susquehanna art faculty, and her husband Saul, a member of Susquehanna's Board of Directors, to provide the University with resources for constructing a new visual arts facility, including appropriate gallery space to promote the visual arts. Until the University has appropriate funds in hand for construction for such a facility, income from the Putterman Fund will be available for expenditure to support the visual arts.

The Katherine P. Reed Music Fund was established by her bequest for use in the music program.

The Alice Pope Shade Fund was established in 1983 by her daughter, Rebecca Shade Mignot '54. The income is available annually for discretionary use by the religion department.

The **Charles Steele Fund** was established by his bequest. The income is to be used by the University at its discretion.

The **Surdna Foundation Endowment** was established in 1982 to support campus work opportunities for students with financial need.

The **Ruth Larue Thompson '21 Fund** was established by bequest for discretionary use by the University.

The **Tressler Accounting Endowment Fund** was established in 1989 under the will of Allen C. Tressler '29. This fund is intended to provide support for faculty and curricular development in the accounting program and to provide scholarship aid for students enrolled in pursuing courses in accounting as their selected major of study. Scholarship awards are to be made with a preference given to full-time students from lower Northumberland County and upper Dauphin County who maintain a grade point average of 2.5 or more and who display financial need. Awards are made with a request that recipient shall, upon achieving earning capacity, make in gratitude an appropriate contribution to the scholarship fund.

The **George W. and Elizabeth H. Wagenseller Academic Program Endowment** income is to be used by the dean of the University for special projects and purposes that may not be covered by the operating budget and will benefit the academic program of the University.

The **Norman E. Walz Endowment for Faculty Development** was established at Susquehanna University in 1987 by a gift from the First National Trust Bank of Sunbury, as an expression of deep appreciation to the man whose distinguished career in banking spanned more than 40 years and culminated in his service as First National's president (1969-76). In endowing the Walz Faculty Development Fund at Susquehanna, the bank also recognized Mr. Walz' 18 years of loyal and dedicated service to the University as a member of its Board of Directors and as its treasurer (1961-79). After his retirement from both institutions, Mr. Walz continued to serve First National as vice-chairman of its board and, at Susquehanna, as a director emeritus.

Income from this fund is to be expended under the direction of the vice president for academic affairs. It should be directed toward those activities which will bring faculty members into direct, sustained contact with organizations beyond the academic environment, in the hope that exposure to new environments will enhance currency and vitality in scholarship and in teaching. In selecting faculty to receive this award, the vice president will pay special attention to proposals that link scholarly pursuits to the actual practices and policies of non-academic organizations.

The **Williamson/Spitzner Unrestricted Endowment Fund** was established in 1986 through a bequest by Ms. Elizabeth Williamson in honor and memory of Clyde R. Spitzner, Class of '37 and longtime member of Susquehanna's Board of Directors.

The **Stella Freeman Weis Cultural Endowment** annually sponsors critically acclaimed artists in performance at Susquehanna. This fund was established in 1976 by Robert and Patricia Weis in memory of his mother.

The **Witmer Endowment for the Performing Arts** was established in 1981 by the family, friends, and business associates of the late Ralph Witmer '15 to perpetuate his lifelong interests in the University and in the Central Susquehanna Valley. The income from this fund is used annually to help support the Susquehanna University Artist Series.

Special Endowment Funds

The **Claude G. Aikens '11 Business Fund** was established by his family for use within the Department of Business Administration.

The **Katharine Heldt Aucker '44 Endowment** was established by bequest for use by the University.

The **J. Edgar Bishop '25 Unrestricted Endowment Fund** was established by a bequest from Mr. Bishop's estate, and by members of Mr. Bishop's family. Income from the fund is to be used to support the University's highest priorities.

The **Class of 1938 Faculty Research and Development Fund** was established by members of the Class in honor of their 50th Reunion, and provides development resources for the faculty's continued professional growth.

The **Class of 1939 Susquehanna University Fund Endowment** was established by the Class of 1939 in honor of their 50th class reunion. Through this gift, the class endows, in perpetuity, a yearly gift to the annual Susquehanna University Fund and thus provides a lasting remembrance of the Class of 1939. The S.U.F. supports Susquehanna's highest priority needs in people, programs, and facilities. In appreciation and recognition of this gift, the University will perpetually include the Class of 1939 in appropriate honor roll listings of support.

The **Degenstein Endowments** were contributed by Charles B. Degenstein to establish the Sigmund Weis School of Business and to maintain the Charles B. Degenstein Campus Center.

The **James W. Garrett Endowment Fund** was established in 1984 by Sally F. '68 and Richard E. Caruso '65 as a means of honoring his former coach and friend.

The **Miller H. Gearhart '30 Endowment Fund** was established by a bequest from Mr. Gearhart's estate.

The **Albert F. Goetz Foundation Endowment** was established for the use by the University in the area of professional development.

The **Robert and Jane Harding Unrestricted Endowment Fund** was established in 1986 by Mr. and Mrs. Harding, parents of Scott Harding '88. The income is to be used to support the University's most urgent needs.

The **Mahala Gladfelter Holzapple Fund** was established in 1973 under the will of Dr. George E. Holzapple.

The **Lawrence M. '43 and Louise Kresge '45 Isaacs Endowment for Music** was established by Mr. and Mrs. Isaacs, members of the classes of 1943 and 1945, respectively. The fund is a reflection of the Isaacs' long-standing commitment to excellence in the music program at Susquehanna University and is in recognition of the vital role the music program has played in the life of the University and of the surrounding community.

In awarding income from the fund, approximately 80 percent should be expended annually for music scholarships. The remaining income from the endowment may be expended annually for the professional development of music faculty members and/or music performance at the discretion of the president of the University or the vice president for academic affairs.

The **Euphemia Brown Kerns '14 Fund** was established by bequest of her daughter, Martha E. Kerns, for use within the music department.

The **Lauver Accounting Fund** was established in 1985 by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond C. Lauver to support the Accounting Department.

The **March Fund for Accounting** was established in 1988 by Mr. and Mrs. Terry L. March '67. Income from this endowment is to be used for the enhancement of Susquehanna's accounting program as recommended by the dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business and approved by the president. In selecting the most effective use of these funds, preference is to be given to support for activities which sustain the professional development of senior members of the accounting faculty.

Endowed Prizes and Awards

The **Chemistry Award**, established in 1979 by the Parents Association, annually recognizes an outstanding student majoring in chemistry.

The **Elizabeth G. Eyster '72 Award in Music**, established in 1972 by friends, relatives, and parents of Elizabeth G. Eyster '72, is to be awarded annually by the Music Department to an outstanding

junior student whose performance and academic accomplishment gives promise of outstanding musical achievement.

The **Pi Sigma Alpha Award**, established in 1979 by the Parents Association, recognizes annually an outstanding student majoring in political science.

The **William A. Russ History Award**, established in honor of the late Dr. William A. Russ Jr., professor of history at Susquehanna University 1933-1968, is given annually to a history student entering the junior or senior year. The award is based on academic accomplishment, promise as a scholar, and contributions to the study and pursuit of history.

The **Clyde R. Spitzner '37 Fund** was established by Dr. and Mrs. Gustave W. Weber in memory of a devoted alumnus, member of the Board of Directors, and friend. The annual income provides a most valuable trophy for the varsity football and men's varsity basketball teams.

The **Deborah J. Wissing '77 Prize in Business**, established in her memory by her family in 1977, is awarded annually to a business student who has distinguished him or herself academically.

Other Prizes and Awards

The **Herb Deibler Piano Award** is given annually in memory of J. Minerva Herb and Helen H. Deibler, and in honor of Robert S. Deibler, to a senior music student with a concentration in piano who has developed superior performance abilities.

The **Steven C. Fiedler Memorial Prize** was established in 1988 by Mr. Fiedler's parents, and is to be awarded to a student majoring in the fine arts, who, upon the completion of the second year, has excelled in the area of portraying or interpreting some fundamental truth of the Judaic-Christian tradition.

The **Amhrose and Ida Fredrickson Foundation Scholarship Award** was established in 1988 by the trustees of the foundation to continue the lifetime philanthropy of Mr. Fredrickson, a longtime friend of the University, and his wife Ida '21. The award is to be made annually to an able student with significant financial need.

The **Juliet Gibson '88 Literary Prize** was established in 1988 in memory of Miss Gibson, and is to be awarded annually to a student writer who has produced a work of significant merit.

The **Joyce Gilbert Memorial Award of the Women's Auxiliary** was established by the Women's Auxiliary of Susquehanna University in memory of Joyce K. Gilbert, an alumna who served as assistant registrar for 19 years, in recognition of her dedication in assisting students to achieve scholarship and academic excellence. This award is given to encourage deserving students toward academic achievement.

The **Lindback Foundation Scholarship Award**, a mark of the University's highest recognition, is granted annually, upon recommendation of the faculty, to a student entering the senior year who has demonstrated a high level of scholastic attainment, character, personality, and all-around ability.

The **Physics Prize**, established in 1987 by Jeff Ries '86, a physics major, is to be awarded annually to a junior physics student with a cumulative grade point average of 2.75 or better who exhibits a strong interest in physics.

The **Preser Foundation Music Scholarship Award** is given annually to an outstanding music major entering the senior year.

The **Stine-Robison Mathematical Prize**, established in memory of the Reverend Doctor H. M. Stine and Dr. George M. Robison, is awarded annually to the student who has the highest average in the study of mathematics during the freshman and sophomore years.

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University Unveils New Fisher Science Hall

physics departments for a student body of 1,150. At that time, less emphasis was placed on research as an essential tool for instruction.

Susquehanna today has more than 1,400 students and has added majors in geology, biochemistry, and psychology. The new Fisher Science Hall, now bringing together five departments in one building, will encourage increased interdisciplinary cooperation, provide facilities for greater student/faculty collaborative research, and place a new curricular focus in the life sciences.

"As we hoped—and as we dared to believe—the Susquehanna family has had the resolve, the commitment and the vision to make this facility a reality," said University President Joel Cunningham in welcoming remarks. "To each and every one of you who has a part in this magnificent accomplishment, please accept Susquehanna's heartfelt thanks."

Chairman of the Board Harold C. O'Connor noted that support for the project has come from many sectors of the Susquehanna community—alumni, faculty, board, staff and friends of the University. In announcing that the project was within \$100,000 of being fully funded, he expressed appreciation to all who supported the campaign for the new Fisher Hall with gifts small and large.

The keynote speech of the rededication ceremony was delivered by Dr. Donald M. Hunten, Regents professor of planetary sciences at the University of Arizona, who is collaborating with Susquehanna University on the NASA/University Joint Venture (JOVE) Initiative. Hunten stepped in for Dr. David Morrison, chief of the Space Science Division at NASA's Ames Research Center, who at the last minute was unable to attend due to an illness in his family.

Dr. Hunten spoke about the important role astronomy education and future space exploration play in changing attitudes about the need for science education. He referred specifically to the NASA/JOVE Initiative, which requires students to use telescopes and computers to analyze data from space missions, as an effective way to interest students in science.

Hunten is collaborating with Susquehanna physics professors and JOVE faculty research associates Dr. Richard Kozlowski and Dr. Fred Grosse, on studies of the atmosphere and surfaces of Venus, Mercury and the Moon. The University of Arizona's Lunar and Planetary Laboratory has supported Susquehanna additionally through the donation of the largest reflecting telescope of its kind in Pennsylvania, now housed in the new observatory.

Guests attending the rededication of Fisher Science Hall also heard remarks by Dean of Arts and Sciences Donald Housley, Charles B. Degenstein Professor of Environmental Science Frank Fletcher, and junior

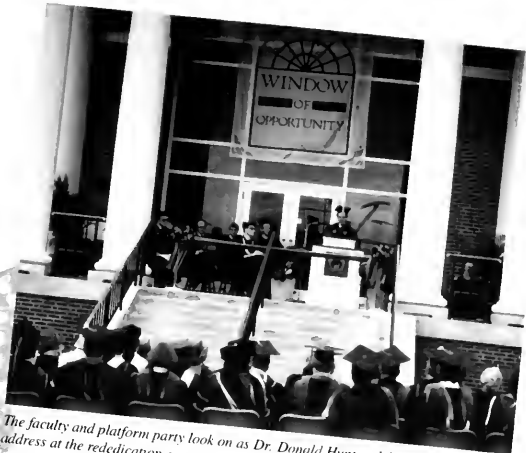


On Sunday afternoon, October 28, more than 400 friends of Susquehanna University gathered at the new entrance to Fisher Science Hall to witness the rededication of the newly renovated and expanded building. This celebration signaled the culmination of a 16-month, \$6.3 million project, the largest within the Window of Opportunity Capital Campaign, providing a modern, up-to-date science facility for Susquehanna students and faculty.

When Fisher Science Hall was built in 1962, it was designed to house the biology, chemistry and

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biochemistry major Marie Burns. Chaplain Christopher M. Thomforde opened the ceremony with words of prayer. A celebratory reception was held in the new building immediately following the ceremony where guests mingled with students and faculty, and explored the new spaces at their leisure.

Preparing for the Future

The renovation and expansion of Fisher Science Hall is an important step in achieving the University's primary goal: to attract highly able students and to serve them through distinguished programs in each of its three schools. Strong science programs are considered central to distinction in the School of Arts and Sciences.

Susquehanna's commitment to strengthening its science programs comes as many national groups are expressing concern over the quality of science education in America and the shrinking number of science graduates. Colleges and universities of Susquehanna's size are a prime source of science graduates because of the opportunities they provide

students to build strong mentor relationships with faculty, gain a solid understanding of scientific principles, and participate in original research at the undergraduate level. Even before the Fisher Science Hall project was completed, Susquehanna's science enrollments had begun to increase, up more than 30 percent between 1988 and 1990.

Designed for Excellence

The new facility provides a variety of distinctive spaces, including:

- specialty rooms for the life sciences,
- a doubled number of laboratories,
- a new greenhouse,
- a MacIntosh computer lab and
- an observatory

The new Fisher Science Hall is student-centered and encourages informal exchange. The spacious atrium draws together students and faculty from all departments. In addition, each department has a "zone" where students can study close to faculty and labs, or relax with classmates and professors.

Junior biochemistry major Marie Burns says, "Working side by side with faculty and getting individual attention is the best that a student can ask for and that's what it's like at Susquehanna." Last spring, Burns conducted collaborative research on anti-cancer agents with University Professor of Biochemistry Tom McGrath. After graduation, she plans to attend graduate school in biochemistry or a related field, and work toward both M.D. and Ph.D. degrees.

The University intends that Fisher Science Hall benefit all of Susquehanna's students. Classes in non-science subjects will be taught in its four lecture rooms, so every student may be exposed to the science environment.

The new Fisher Science Hall is one of the most striking and compelling buildings on the Susquehanna campus. It represents Susquehanna's commitment to its students, to its faculty and to excellence in education. The building also represents, in a very special way, how the University's Board of Directors, faculty, alumni and friends have worked together to make a very challenging project a reality.

and Syrian populations of the city, and she took the extraordinary step of seeking an alliance with the strongest Muslim ruler in the region. This startling effort to achieve peace and stability in the region by reaching out to join with people who were seen as subhuman by many of her fellow crusaders was thwarted by Alice's father, the King. She was exiled, and her 3-year-old daughter was taken from her and given to another Crusader ruler as guardian. Five years later, after her father's death, Alice finally succeeded in returning to power and immediately tried to form another alliance, this time with the Byzantine Greeks, again reaching out to a group regarded as different and unacceptable by many crusaders. Once again, the old-guard crusader knights blocked her ambitions and duplicitously managed to marry her by-then-9-year-old daughter to a French nobleman, thereby giving him a higher claim to rule Antioch than Princess Alice's. Historian Steven Runciman, in his multi-volume history of the crusades, notes that after this last abuse, Princess Alice, who was still not yet 30, returned to exile for "the remainder of her short existence." The crusader knights of Antioch and Jerusalem were relieved to have tricked their way out of what they regarded as Alice's foolish ideas, but, as Runciman goes on to note, the death and destruction which followed her departure from Antioch showed Princess Alice was not so foolish after all.

So if I am asked to offer a specific example of a crusader, I think I'll choose Princess Alice of Antioch, for, despite the fact that her personal crusade was ultimately not successful, the vision which I would like to think guided her—of respect for diversity, willingness to set aside the deep prejudices of her community, and bravery in the face of long odds—is a valuable antidote to the many more poisonous crusader examples. Unlike so many of the others, she was apparently welcomed and appreciated by many of the people on whom the crusader rule was imposed.

Over the years since the medieval crusades, the terms "crusade" and "crusader" have come to mean something more successful than their historic referents. General Eisenhower and Prime Minister Churchill spoke inspiringly of the Crusade for Europe in World War II. In recent years, our news has been full of crusades—crusades for children, for highway safety, for the care of the environment, for civil rights, and for many other causes. Somehow it seems we need the word "crusade" to convey that we really mean business and that our mission is worthy of sacrifice. It was just this sort of thinking that caused Susquehanna's Luther Grossman to call his team the Crusaders in 1922.

And it is in that spirit today that, having considered Squirrels, Turkeys, River Hawks, and who knows what else, we have chosen to remain the Susquehanna Crusaders. And, as I welcome you to Susquehanna, I urge you to use your four years here to prepare for a life filled with the energetic pursuit of important goals, which is the essence of the meaning of the name Crusaders today.

But more than that I challenge you to be Welcome Crusaders, people whose commitment to understanding and serving others, to courtesy, and to fairness will cause those with whom you contend to respect, to appreciate, and, yes, even to welcome you.

... If problems arise, renew your efforts with the energy and dedication of a crusade. Those of us on the faculty and staff of the University are here both to challenge and to support you. As you begin your Susquehanna life, please know that we look forward to knowing you and to doing everything we can to help you thrive here.



WELCOME CRUSADERS

(Note: The following are excerpts from a speech delivered by President Joel Cunningham at the 1990 Convocation in September. The Convocation ceremony marks the beginning of the academic year and is attended by the new freshman class. Cunningham reflected on recent criticism of the use of the name "Crusaders" for Susquehanna's athletic teams.)

... AS PRESIDENT of the University it is my happy duty to call together this academic community for its 133rd year and to welcome and challenge the newest members of the University, you members of the class of 1994.

... THIS CONVOCATION CEREMONY is a formal way of recognizing and affirming the emotions of transition, challenge, and opportunity which this day carries for you and for your parents. This time of reflection and commitment is likely to be one of those occasions which you will hold in memory as a milestone experience.

... IT IS A PRIVILEGE to welcome you to Susquehanna University. My title today is "Welcome Crusaders," which you will see is a modest play on words.

You probably already know Susquehanna's school colors and athletic team name. Our colors are orange and maroon, and our name is the Crusaders. The colors were chosen before 1900. (Some have wondered whether color blindness was more widespread then.) And the name Crusaders was first used in 1922 after a young athletic director named Luther Grossman committed Susquehanna to a "crusade for amateur athletics" and, in particular, to distancing the University from the growing pattern of football becoming big business even at small colleges.

There were competing candidates for Susquehanna's athletic name or mascot—bears, Indians, birds, or whatever—I haven't found a record of them. Over the years since 1922, the name Crusaders has come to have other uses and meanings on campus. The campus newspaper became "The Crusader" in the 1960s; pictures of knights in medieval chain mail or on horseback slipped into common usage in athletic publications and uniforms; and even the snack bar in the Degenstein Campus Center came to be called the Crusader Castle. Not much notice seems to have been taken of the fact that these visual portrayals of the word "crusader" moved us away from the original meaning of our nickname.

But then a new sensitivity arose. A few years ago I received a letter from a mother of a prospective student asking how a fine school like Susquehanna could allow itself to be associated with a group of bloodthirsty devils like the medieval crusaders, and others joined in questioning the implied connection. They complained that the crusading knights of the 11th through the 14th century were male, mean, badly organized, and ultimately unsuccessful.

So we talked some about the possibility of a change. Most such conversations fell quickly to joking; we trotted out such possibilities as the Susquehanna Squirrels, or Turkeys (noting that Benjamin Franklin wanted the wild turkey to be the national symbol of the United States instead of the Bald Eagle which he thought of as too vicious a predator).

At one point a planning group gave some thought to the idea of taking on another name, possibly the River Hawks, but a senior Board member whose ties to Susquehanna athletics go back more than fifty years put an end to such talk by observing that River Hawks might quickly be changed to River Rats and that the medieval crusaders weren't much meaner than hawks anyway.

So, Crusaders it is, even though the origin of the word carries some baggage that is not very comfortable in

today's world. Our best course seems to be to face that baggage squarely.

In the year 1095, i.e. nearly 900 years ago, Pope Urban II, responded to an appeal from the Byzantine emperor by proclaiming a crusade to free the people of the eastern churches and to take control of the city of Jerusalem.

Within four years, in July of 1099, after many false starts and considerable misbehavior, a European crusader army captured Jerusalem from its Muslim rulers. Even though the Muslims had allowed Christians and Jews to live in peace in Jerusalem, the conquest in 1099 was brutal and complete. Arab historian Amin Maalouf, in his book "The Crusades Through Arab Eyes," tells of the terrible message about the fall of Jerusalem, which was delivered soon after to the caliph's court in Baghdad.

Maalouf reports that "[t]he exiles still trembled when they spoke of the fall of the city: they stared into space as though they could still see the fairhaired and heavily armed warriors spilling through the streets, swords in hand, slaughtering men, women, and children, plundering houses, and sacking mosques.

... when the killing stopped, not a single Muslim was left alive within the city walls... Thousands of others lay in pools of blood on the doorsteps of their homes or alongside the mosques...

"The fate of the Jews of Jerusalem was no less atrocious... The entire community gathered in the main synagogue to pray. The [Crusaders] barricaded all the exits and stacked... wood... in a ring around the building. The temple was then put to the torch. Those who managed to escape were massacred in the neighbouring alleyways. The rest were burned alive."

The crusaders' control of Jerusalem, which was established by this terrible onslaught, lasted for 88 years until the Muslims retook the city (with much less loss of life) in 1187. And there was continuing crusade warfare in the mideast for more than 300 years.

Most of the stories of the crusaders are ugly, and we could argue that one ought not to dwell on them—any more than followers of athletic teams called Bears, Eagles, Hawks, or Bulls would want to dwell on the images of the injuries done to prey by their athletic emblems.

Yet, surely, some of the crusaders had qualities we value today. As I was thinking about this heavy topic last week, one of my colleagues asked me if I had managed to find an example of a welcome crusader, a single knight perhaps, who might serve as a counter-example to the crusaders' bloodcurdling image. I thought about the question a bit and came up with a possible candidate.

As you might imagine, much of the detail of the lives of the crusaders has been lost over the past 900 years, and there is a good deal of room for error or misinterpretation, but keeping this in mind, I do have an example: Princess Alice of Antioch. The daughter of the third Crusader King of Jerusalem, she was born around 1107 some eight years after the knights captured the Holy City. Before she was 20, Princess Alice married the Crusader Prince of Antioch, who just four years later was killed in battle. Following his death, Alice took his place as the ruler of Antioch. Remarkably, she had the support of the Armenian, Greek,

Freshman Class Academically Strongest in Years

The 403 students (358 freshmen, 45 transfer students) who compose the 1990-91 freshman class at Susquehanna University have the highest average class rank and Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores of any Susquehanna class in the last 17 years.

"It is a talented, diverse, highly capable and service-oriented class," says Pamela White, dean of admissions.

The new class, which was selected from one of the largest freshman applicant pools on record, found 71 percent of the students ranked in the top two-fifths of their respective high school classes with 18 percent graduating within the top 10 percent. On the SATs, 22 percent scored above 1,100 (out of 1,600) with eight of those students scoring above 1,300.

"We are particularly pleased with the academic ability of this freshman class in light of recent reports that SAT scores dropped nationally for the third consecutive year," adds White.

Along with the impressive academic credentials, one quarter of the class was inducted into the National Honor Society by their junior year in high school and nine led the organization as president or vice president. Forty-six members of the class are enrolling in Susquehanna's Honors Program, the largest group in the nine year history of the program.

By all indications, Susquehanna's Project House volunteer system is continuing to thrive with the arrival of the Class of 1994. In addition to their participation in high school activities, 110 students did volunteer work through their schools. 112 students also were active in volunteer work in their respective communities, while 122 were active in their churches and synagogues.

While about half of the freshman class come from Pennsylvania, the following states also are represented: California, Connecticut, Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, Massachusetts, Maine, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, and Washington. Eight countries are also represented by this year's freshman class in Belgium, Germany, India, Namibia, the Soviet Union, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

Sixty-four percent of the incoming class have majors in the School of Arts and Sciences, 24 percent in the Sigmund Weis School of Business, and 12 percent in the School of Fine Arts and Communications.

Susquehanna/Lincoln Universities Grow Through Unique Partnership

At a time when racial tension has been high on college campuses, students at Susquehanna and Lincoln Universities are working together to explore an exchange of volunteerism and cultural diversity to help enrich both campus communities.

"Our society is no longer black and white. It is

partnerships like the one that exists between Susquehanna and Lincoln which help people grow together," says Lincoln University junior David Haines.

"The partnership between our schools has truly helped me to understand minority issues and it has made me more aware of all people around me," adds Susquehanna sophomore Christine Sanderson of Mechanicsburg.

Supported by a renewed mini-grant from the Pennsylvania Campus Compact Intercampus Collaborative Effort Program, Susquehanna and its nationally acclaimed volunteer Project House System have developed a partnership with the historically black Lincoln University to swap strengths.

Susquehanna has a rich tradition of service to the community and an established Volunteer Center which acts as a clearinghouse for community service activities, while Lincoln is the oldest college in the United States to have as its original purpose the education of youth of African descent.

The partnership was a vision of Susquehanna University President Joel Cunningham and President Niara Sudarkasa of Lincoln University.

"President Sudarkasa and I saw a partnership between the two institutions as an attractive opportunity for growth on both campuses. We are both delighted at the success of the program," says Cunningham.

The partnership activities began with the formation of small student core groups from both campuses to set goals and expectations of the grant.

"The core committee members represent students on both campuses who have an interest in making both schools stronger," says Lincoln senior Leandra Casson. "We are committed to much more than our two-pronged objectives of service and diversity. We want to educate students to be functional citizens and give back to any community whether they are African Americans or white."

Susquehanna and Lincoln students met in Harrisburg, a point equal distant from both campuses, to participate in a joint service project with an inner-city community center. Together, Susquehanna and Lincoln students canvassed downtown Harrisburg neighborhoods, visiting homes to ask survey questions regarding the construction of a new community park and playground.

"The service projects are a key to developing our volunteer center at Lincoln because we are really a city within a city and we need to strive for the same relationship that Susquehanna has with its community," says senior Lorraine Woods of Lincoln.

Most recently students from both schools met at Susquehanna for a weekend retreat and spent a Saturday afternoon visiting homes in Selingsgrove asking for canned food as part of WNEP-TV's Feed-A-Friend project.

Together the core groups have published a newsletter called *Campus Connections*, which is distributed campus-wide at both universities. Sudarkasa also delivered the 1990 Susquehanna spring commencement address and was awarded an honorary doctor of humane letters. During Susquehanna's black history month, Lincoln's gospel choir participated in Susquehanna's musical tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Extended goals of the grant include continued Lincoln collaboration with Susquehanna's Volunteer Center and Office of Multicultural Affairs, a possible faculty exchange, and more extensive joint service projects and student exchanges to include student government leaders and both student and professional employees of the Student Life Office.

"I believe the excitement and enthusiasm expressed by all students, faculty and staff involved in the partnership activities are evidence of the partnership's success," says Director of Volunteer Programs at Susquehanna Deborah Woods.

Campus Academic Network Has University "ON LINE" for 1990-91

With the push of a couple of buttons, Susquehanna University students have been able to "hook-up" with the world this year.

The fall semester found Susquehanna entering the first phase of a three-year Campus Academic Network Development Plan. The plan centers around a major upgrade of the University computer labs which will augment and extend the StarLAN (Local Area Network) currently operating in Seibert Hall. StarLAN allows access to the Pennsylvania Research and Economic Partnership Network (PREPnet), a high-capacity data-communications network linked to other world-wide networks such as Internet.

StarLAN offers students access to such features as electronic mail and the most recent versions of programs for word-processing and statistical analysis. Connection to other services, such as access to the Career Development and Placement Department's SIGPLUS computerized guidance system, have also been possible through the University's modem hook-up.

When it became a member of the network a year ago, Susquehanna became one of the first schools of its size to join PREPnet, which now has a membership of 24 businesses, colleges, and universities. Last year, both StarLAN and PREPnet were accessible to Susquehanna students, but only through the computer lab in Seibert Hall. This year, students are able to access these services through computer labs in the Blough-Weis Library and in Steele Hall, increasing the number of available terminals from 19 to 56. The Seibert lab has also been equipped this year with new AT&T 386SX micro-computers with full-color, high-resolution graphics. Laser printers were also acquired for all three computer labs.

The networking power of StarLAN has increased the use of electronic mail at Susquehanna, with all full-time faculty and students assigned an electronic mail address. Besides using electronic mail through the computer labs, students and faculty have been able to work through a modem hook-up in their homes or residence hall rooms if they own a personal computer.

The next two years of the Campus Academic Network Development Plan will see connection of the remote PCs and terminals to the Blough-Weis Library, which expects to complete its automation project by Fall 1991.

"The centerpiece of library automation is the public catalog," says Peter Deekle, University librarian and director of Susquehanna's Honor's Program. "The computer catalog will not simply replace the traditional 3x5 card catalog, but provide for the future linkage to other collection and remote data-bases."

"The library system will make the fullest use possible of StarLAN and support the concept of a scholar's work station wherever its users are located."

1940, 1990 Crusaders Share Recipe for Success

Although the sport of football has changed a great deal over the past 50 years, the 1990 Susquehanna University football team used the same recipe of academic and athletic balance for success as the 1940 undefeated Crusader football team which was honored at halftime of the Parents' Day game with Widener University.

The 1990 Crusaders completed their fifth straight winning season in 1990 (7-3), and featured three Academic All-Americans and campus leaders among its roster in quarterback **David Battisti**, offensive guard **Matt Caretti**, and nose guard **John Garrett**.

The 1940 squad finished 7-0-1 and was the first great team under Susquehanna's legendary 17-year head coach **Amos Alonzo Stagg Jr.** (1935-54). In addition to the success on the field, the 1940 squad had its share of academic excellence and went on to produce five doctors and/or dentists, a scientist, two industrial executives, and the manager of a major veteran's hospital among its 25-man roster.

Although the present Crusaders had almost four times the number of players, didn't feature any two-way players, and were much bigger and stronger than their 1940 predecessors, the formula for football Susquehanna style was the same for present 28-year-old rookie head coach **Steve Briggs** as it was for Stagg, now 92.

"The balance between academics and athletics is the whole philosophy of Susquehanna and that's why we get the epitome of the true student athlete," says Briggs. "We strive for all of our kids to be academically oriented and they know our school philosophy that we're an academic institution first and foremost."

"Athletics, like academics, demands long hours of practice and drill which weed out the lazy and those lacking deep purpose," says Stagg. "College gives the athlete faith and confidence to succeed, and athletics gives the student the staying power necessary for achievement."

Achievement is exactly what players from Stagg's 1940 team did on the field, although it wasn't easy. Fielding the smallest team in his first six years, he molded the squad into a winner, despite having to fill

holes each day at practice due to late classes.

"Since we had very few players, it was sometimes hard to get enough together to scrimmage at practice because of class," recalls **Phil Templin '42 of Meadville**, an offensive center and linebacker in 1940 who is now a retired senior research chemist from Gulf Oil Co.

"A lot of the players had labs until 4 o'clock and I remember we had to run plays against the tackling dummies, instead of other players, during some days," says **Larry Isaacs '43 of Selingsgrove**, who is presently a visiting professor of business practice at Susquehanna and previously had been chief financial officer for Federated Department Stores Inc.

Despite the small numbers, Stagg's squad rolled to victories in its first two games over the University of Buffalo (20-6) and American University (33-13), and then got a touchdown by fullback **Steve Zeravica** in the third week to stop Swarthmore's 12-game winning streak (7-0).

Faced with several injuries and a slick field due to a driving snow storm, Susquehanna suffered its lone blemish against then-undefeated Juniata in a scoreless tie.

"I remember that game was played in slop. It was the kind of day where you'd slide 6 to 10 feet every time you tried to stop," says Templin. "Both teams were capable of scoring, but not under those conditions."

The squad rebounded from its first blemish with victories at the City College of New York (14-7) and Allegheny (27-12). Those wins gave the Crusaders a 5-0-1 record and set up a homecoming showdown with undefeated Moravian. Touted as having its strongest team ever, Moravian powered its way to victories in its first six games while outscoring its opponents 182-9.

Despite the unfavorable odds, Stagg had his team ready.

"Coach Stagg had scouted a number of their games because they always played on Friday nights in Bethlehem," recalls **Sam Fletcher '41 of Northumberland**, retired director of the Wilkes-Barre Veterans' Hospital. "Coach Stagg and Moravian's coach Judd Timm had a little rivalry going and every time Moravian would score, Timm would know where Stagg

was and he turn and wave up to him."

Apparently, Stagg was observing more than Timm's wave as he designed an overshifted 6-3-2 defense which stymied the powerful Greyhound attack and forced four turnovers before an estimated 3,000 fans at University Field, the largest crowd in school history at that time. Zeravica's 23-yard touchdown pass to end **Blair Heaton** midway through the second quarter proved to be the only scoring as the Crusaders pulled off the upset.

"They were supposed to beat the tar out of us, but somehow we got six points and it held up for the rest of the game," says Templin.

The following week, the Crusaders nailed down only the second undefeated season in school history at that time with a victory over Hartwick (13-0). The win completed a magical season where Stagg masterfully crafted a team with special chemistry.

"As it turned out, most of our team ended up being professional people and I think that quality was a plus. Our I.Q. probably helped us learn our plays and study the game better," he adds. "I think we also had a sense of togetherness that other teams didn't have because we played together for three years."

Templin shared that togetherness with Stagg and many of his former teammates as they rekindled fond memories from the Fall of 1940 during their October reunion.

Sports Teams Complete Successful Fall Season

As always, the fall season produced plenty of beautiful foliage on the Susquehanna campus, and much success on the Crusader athletic fields. Four of the five varsity teams posted .500 or better records with a combined mark of 43-30-4 (.558 winning percentage) and were also represented on various post-season all-star teams.

Despite losing starting senior quarterback **David Battisti of Susquehanna**, the school's all-time leading passer, to a season-ending knee injury in the season's fourth week, rookie head coach **Steve Briggs** held the football team together to produce the program's fifth-straight winning season, finishing 7-3 overall, 6-2 and tied for second in the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC).

After getting off to a slow start, the field hockey team rallied for victories in four of its last five games to finish 5-5-3 for 15th-year head coach **Connie Harnum**.

The Crusader men's cross country team had a season of peaks and valleys in 1990, but finished with a 3-1 record for second-year head coach **Bob Remaley**.

Fourth-year head coach **Terry Molloy** continued to try and build the soccer program, and took a young squad into competition in the strong MAC-Northeast.

Although the team suffered through a 5-12-1 campaign, several young players give the team a better outlook for the future.

After equalling the best record in school history at 23-11 (1984) while advancing to the MAC playoffs a year ago, the Lady Crusaders went one step further in 1990, finishing 23-9 while advancing to the semi-finals of the MAC Championships, for third year head coach **Carole Templon**.



PERSPECTIVES ON THE PERSIAN GULF

While the Persian Gulf war was one of the shortest conflicts in recent history, its effects most certainly will be felt for years to come. Warehouse Distinguished Professor of Business Administration William A. Ward and Degenstein Distinguished Professor of Environmental Science Frank W. Fletcher have been interviewed in recent months by regional and national news reporters about the political and environmental effects of the Persian Gulf War. Some of their views are reported here.

Ward, who was a member of the Nixon and Ford White House staffs and has been quoted numerous times in *USA Today* stories on the war, believes stability and moderation will be the main theme for the 1990s. "I think we're going to see a number of conferences held on the Arab-Israeli situation," Ward says. "The United States wants moderate Arabs to lead those conferences and negotiate peace with the Israelis, who also must not give in to radicalism on their part."

Ward also believes economic issues, such as the reordering of energy supplies, should be addressed. "New policies that take into account world price and demand have to be hammered out by the world's principal energy consumers. . . countries like Brazil, Japan, European nations, and the United States," he says.

Kunes Celebrates 25th Anniversary

It was a season of joy and sadness as the Susquehanna University wrestling program celebrated its 25th Anniversary Season and said goodbye to the only head coach the team had ever known, **Charles Kunes (25th yr., 160-161-7)**. With six returning letter winners and four returning MAC place winners, the season looked to be one of the best ever.

The Crusader wrestling team started the 1990-91 season with three straight victories before falling to Lycoming. The team then went on a 6-0-1 streak by outscoring their opponents 200-91 over the next seven matches. Leading the team during that streak was junior **Todd Maynard (150)** who went on a 6-0-1 streak of his own, scoring 20 team points.

The 1990-91 Crusaders completed the dream season at home against the Muhlenberg Mules on February 16, 1991. They entered the final dual meet of the season with an 11-3-1 record and a last chance for Charlie

Kunes' team to break the 12-win plateau.

The pressure on the 1990-91 team was especially high since a number of wrestling alumni were present to honor their coach and cheer the team on to the victory mark. On hand were members of the first squad, **Art Ebersberger** and **Steve Vak ('68)**, as well as former All-Americans **Ken Tashjy ('82)**, **Steve Deckard ('85)**, **Ken Peifer ('86)** and **Chris Labrecque ('88)**. The Crusader wrestlers did not disappoint their predecessors as they went on to defeat Muhlenberg 28-19.

It was a record 12th victory and the 160th win of Coach Kunes' career. Over his 25-year tenure, Kunes had 13 winning seasons and produced several top wrestlers. Selmsgrove's **Bill ('71)** and **Rick Bechtel ('72)**, Susquehanna's only undefeated wrestlers, were among those proudly standing by their coach in a pre-meet gathering in honor of the 25 seasons. Also present was Susquehanna's first MAC champion **Bill Bryson**

('81), who gave one of the most memorable recollections of the Charles Kunes era during the banquet which followed the meet.

Following the banquet, **Whitney Gay ('71)** summed up the feelings of the day, "We all belong to a select club that is bonded together by one man, Coach Kunes. He has a way of reaching out to people that affects you for the rest of your life." Present wrestler **Matt Schwenk ('93)** echoed those sentiments, "If I could be like anyone else, I'd want to be like Coach Kunes."

Sophomore **Todd Ericson ('93)** also added his name to the list of Kunes' accomplishments as he broke the single season record for falls when he recorded his tenth of the year at the MAC tournament.

But the 25th anniversary season still had some surprises to come as sophomore **Andy Watkins ('91, 21-6-1)** became Kunes' fifth All-American by placing third at the NCAA All-American III championships at 190 after finishing second in the Middle Atlantic Conference championships at Haverford College, Haverford, PA.

The 1990-91 squad presented Coach Kunes with a plaque designed by team captain **Ray Swartz ('91)** that said it all. "After 25 years of thick and thin, you still come out a winner."

Winter Sports Round-Up

The Lady Crusader basketball team created some magic of their own this season by posting a 23-5 record and winning the MAC-Northwest title, MAC-Northern Division title and advancing into the NCAA Division III Sweet 16 before falling to Southern Maine.

The team's lone senior, **Laurie Pankuck ('91)**, drew the most attention to the women's program as she finished her four-year career with 1,539 points (2nd on the all-time list) for an average of 16 points-per-game (3rd). Pankuck also became only the second Lady Crusader ever to score 500 points in a season as she pumped in 501 (4th on the season high list) this year. She was honored by receiving her second consecutive MAC-NW All-Star selection.

MAC Northern Division Coach of the Year **Mark Hribar (4th yr., 60-38)** brought the team to its first NCAA playoff birth since 1986 and its first NCAA playoff victory since 1982. With four returning starters and 13 underclassmen on the roster, the Lady Crusaders should be in the thick of things for years to come.

The Susquehanna University men's basketball team finished a frustrating 11-14 season by just missing the MAC playoffs with a 98-93 loss to Scranton. The 1990-91 season was highlighted by senior **Will Ciecierski ('91)** as he became the latest Crusader to score 1,000 points in his career. He would finish the year with 1,206 points and 13th in the nation for free-throw percentage (86.9%). Ciecierski was selected to the Division III All-Middle Atlantic District first team, while junior **Craig Harper ('92)** was voted to the District's second team for his 19.8 points-per-game scoring average.

The men's and women's swimming teams both finished the 1990-91 season with 6-4 records. Two records fell this season as sophomore **Amy Clark ('93)** broke the 500 meter freestyle mark (5:36.04) and the 400 meter medley relay team of **David Moretz ('94)**, **Scott Blanchard ('93)**, **Rob Mark ('93)** and **Jon Grove ('91)** placed seventh at the Middle Atlantic conference championships in a school record 3:51.52

Forgotten casualties

Gulf war widow's crusade

FORT LEONARD WOOD, Mo. — Looking out over the hills of Mark Twain National Forest, Army Capt. Karen Bnosky gently rolls her husband's bent wedding band between her fingers.

The band hangs from a gold chain around her neck, serving as a warm reminder of her 15-month marriage to Army Lt. Jeffrey J. Bnosky.

"He thought it was the nearest thing to be married," she says.

Jeffrey Bnosky, 25, of Hometown, Pa., was the last allied soldier to die in the Persian Gulf during Operation Desert Shield, before combat began.

Now, his 26-year-old widow, an Army nurse from Milwaukee, Wis., is talking about her grief as she campaigns to make sure the 108 people killed before Operation Desert Storm started aren't forgotten.

Bnosky was killed Jan. 13 in a jeep accident — only four hours after he and his wife, both deployed in Saudi Arabia spent two romantic days together in the desert.

"Ever since the air war and then the ground war started, I have felt as though America was forgetting all those who died during Operation Desert Shield," Karen says.

"It's really bothered me that all people care about is the war casualties," and that the "casualties are low. But to those of us who were affected by the casualties, it was too many."

The Bnoskys met at Fort Leonard Wood in fall of 1987, shortly after each arrived.

He had just graduated from Susquehanna University in Selingsgrove, Pa., with a geology degree.

"We met at a soccer game," Karen says, sitting in her green uniform at the officer's club. The 63,000-acre base, about 110 miles southwest of St. Louis, is home to the Army's Engineering School.

Jeffrey, a member of Company D of the 5th Engineering Battalion, was to get out of the service this June. Karen planned to stay longer. He was looking forward to

fishing, hunting and riding his mountain bike.

"He didn't really know what he wanted to do," says Karen.

Then came the threat of war, and everything changed.

On Oct. 25, Jeffrey left for Saudi Arabia. Karen arrived nine weeks later with the 93rd Evacuation Hospital of Fort Leonard Wood to work in the emergency room.

"A lot of people were dreading it, but I was excited," she says of her deployment to the gulf. "I was going to see him again."

On Jan. 9, Jeffrey contacted her base chaplain, saying he would arrive at the Army Hospital in two days.

"His time couldn't go fast enough. I just wanted to see him," Karen says.

As she waited for his arrival, she kept herself busy any way she could, even shoeing bags full of sand.

"Jeffrey was out of the vehicle before I knew he was there," she says. "We had big smiles on our faces."

He brought her gifts — the only ones he could find: rolls of toilet paper, Kool-Aid, food.

"That night we sat in the back of his vehicle and made plans for after the war. Karen says. They'd go on a cruise, maybe get a dog, "have our 2.5 children."

That night, when the Baskin-Robbins

truck came by, they shared a pint of Very Berry Strawberry.

The next day, they ate cheeseburgers and french fries at a hamburger stand just outside Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

On their last night together, sitting outside a tent on a picnic table, they each took off their gold bands and exchanged wedding vows again.

Then, it was time for him to leave. It was 10:30 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 13.

"We cried and hugged, and didn't care who was watching," Karen says. "He was real worried about me."

He asked a friend of his at her base to please watch out for his wife.

Four hours after he left, Karen went to mass in a sand-colored tent. She sat on a picnic bench, "praying to God to make it end and everyone come home OK."

"I felt a real peace inside," she says. "God wouldn't give me anything I couldn't handle."

At the same time, 2:30 p.m., in a heavy rain, Jeffrey's jeep collided with an Army tractor-trailer rig. Jeffrey, sitting on the passenger side, was killed instantly. His wedding band was bent.

The next morning, as Karen sat on a cot, pulling up her boots, she saw the hospital commander, the chaplain and a nurse walking toward her.

"I had just seen him. How could one person be alive one minute, and dead the next?" she says, looking down. Then she looks up.

"There's going to be a lot of homecomings, but my husband is not coming home."

Karen came home to the USA in January, buried her husband less than a mile from where he grew up, and returned to Fort Leonard Wood. She's not working as a nurse for the moment — she doesn't have "10% of me to give" right now. Instead she spends her time working with base support groups and helping families who still have loved ones overseas.

If the USA can remember one thing, she says, it's "Don't forget about all the people that didn't come home."

Two days after his death, Jeffrey Bnosky was promoted from first lieutenant to captain.

Finally, Ward points out the environmental implications that could result from Iraq's destruction of Kuwaiti oil fields. "Saddam Hussein has got to be the greatest environmental criminal of the 20th century," he says. "The clean-up costs will be enormous, and who's going to pay for it? Plus, if the pollution caused by burning oil fields were to migrate and affect the health of Southeast Asia's agricultural crops, then what happens?"

Dr. Frank W. Fletcher, head of Susquehanna's geology department, continues. "The war has had an ongoing environmental impact well beyond the oil spills we're now familiar with. Everyone's been concerned about the danger posed by Saddam Hussein, often to the exclusion of anything else, while we have overlooked the damage to our future posed by the war itself."

Fletcher cites the air pollution problems caused by burning oil fields which can cause climatic changes in the region. From a scientific perspective, the effects of a burning oil field can be compared to the eruption of a volcano, which spews gases and dust particles in the atmosphere. According to Fletcher, scientists will use volcanic research and models to predict climatic changes in the Gulf region which affect agricultural growing seasons and water supplies.

In addition, Fletcher points out the Persian Gulf war has provided many field research opportunities for scientists, and environmental experts in particular. "Scientists are astounding clinicians," he says. "In the midst of tragedy and chaos, we're out there doing our own thing, without regard to the political and social results of the crisis." In 1972 during Hurricane Agnes, while most people were evacuating their homes, Fletcher was right in the thick of things measuring the height of the flood waves.

"We're kind of a weird bunch that way," he continues. "While no one would ever say that it's worth the cost to learn all these things, this war gives us an opportunity for study that we would never be able to run planned experiments on. The Saudis have a number of outstanding environmentalists, and experts are converging on the Gulf from all over the world," he says. "Bringing so many scientific minds to bear on the same problem should result in our being able to destroy oil slicks much more effectively in the future."

Ward predicts, "The decade of the 1990s will have the Middle East situation as one of its focal points. The issues are long-standing and the stakes very high. However, the 1990s represent the first occasion in many years when many of the world's 'great players' have common interests, so I think we can be optimistic about the prospects."

Software Aided Marines in Persian Gulf

Mason W. Brown '88 and Reed A. Starr '88 have developed a computer software product which the United States Marine Corps used in its Desert Storm operations in the Middle East.

Brown, who is vice president and chief operating officer of American Information Systems, Inc. (AIS) in Wellsboro, Pa., and Starr, software engineer, developed an executive information system (EIS) called RediMaster, which was chosen by the Second Marine Aircraft Wing. According to Brown, RediMaster is easy to use and

inexpensive. It uses colorful graphics and information is obtained by an instantaneous point-and-click system.

"The turnover of military people at an installation is inherently immense, so the Marines were interested in a system that would be easy for newcomers to learn" said Brown. "In addition, most other software packages would not have allowed them to develop EIS applications fast enough to respond to volatile combat situations."

Major Dymond R. Dempster, information systems management officer for the Second Marine Aircraft

Wing, told Brown before the allied troops moved on Iraq, "RediMaster will help us do the job and accomplish the mission we're assigned." RediMaster gave the unit instant access to information on logistics status, aviation weather conditions, and personnel availability. It also delivered up-to-the-minute intelligence information and reports from the front.

AIS has an enviable client list. Brown and Starr count among their RediMaster customers such well-known

University Adopts New Logo

Susquehanna has adopted a new graphic identity which is now beginning to appear on University publications and other printed materials.

In 1990, an advisory committee composed of a representative group of students, faculty, alumni, and administrators assisted Susquehanna's Office of Public Relations and Publications in developing the new program. The group's goal was to create a "signature" for Susquehanna that could be used throughout its publications to better convey the institution's strength and quality.

The staff and committee worked closely with Robert Rytter & Associates, the Baltimore firm which has designed Susquehanna's admissions literature for the last three years. The firm had also developed identity programs for institutions such as Johns Hopkins, the University of Arizona and Rensselaer.

The new University logo reflects Selinsgrove Hall, a familiar campus landmark which was the first building of the institution in 1858; the curves of the letter S and the Susquehanna River; the roadway connecting the University to the community of Selinsgrove; and the rolling hills of the Susquehanna Valley. This graphic was selected because it was thought to best capture important characteristics of Susquehanna: its academic excellence, friendliness, sense of tradition, liveliness, beautiful campus and service to the community.

A new University emblem was also created and the University seal was updated. The emblem contains all the elements of the new logo and will be applied to a variety of publications and merchandise. It was created to provide an alternative to the University seal which will be reserved for more official uses, such as the University catalog, diplomas and other documents, in addition to certain bookstore merchandise.

The advisory committee and designer also worked to create a graphic design for the Crusaders athletic program which has not had a single, common graphic image to depict Crusader sports.

"The way we have traditionally depicted our Crusaders nickname was by warriors on horseback, with shield and sword by their side, maybe because those are the images that naturally come to mind," says Athletic Director Don Harnum. "But what many people don't

know is how far those images are from why we originally became nicknamed the Crusaders."

Harnum explains that during the 1920s when college sports were becoming big business, Susquehanna's athletic director by contrast championed the ideal of amateur athleticism in college sports. According to *The Story of Susquehanna University*, published in 1958 by the Susquehanna University Press, the sports editor of a Philadelphia newspaper wrote that people had begun calling Susquehanna's football team the Crusaders because of their determination to put its athletics on a strictly amateur basis. The article went on to say that the team's motto was "Sports for all and sports for sports' sake."



"The new symbol is meant to be a better reflection of our roots and so far our fans' reaction to it has been very favorable," Harnum said.

The new Crusaders logo has been used so far on this year's football and basketball programs, sports schedule cards, and on various items sold in the campus bookstore.

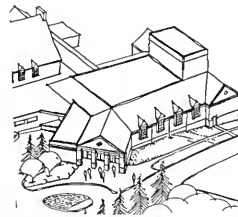
New Theater, Art Gallery Planned

Susquehanna's Board of Directors has authorized preparations for the renovation and expansion of the Degenstein Campus Center, adding 30,000 square feet to the existing 75,000 square-foot structure. The new facility will provide a 450-seat theater, theater work and teaching space, an art gallery, expanded meeting rooms and storage space, and renovated student life offices. Construction is scheduled for completion by fall of 1992.

"We are thrilled by the new educational, performance, and exhibition opportunities the creation of the new theater and art gallery will offer Susquehanna students and members of the public who are interested in the creative arts," said President Joel Cunningham. "We deeply appreciate the generosity that makes these improvements possible."

The University has received pledges of the full funds which are anticipated to be required for this project. The estimated cost is \$4.5 million. This project is one of several capital improvement projects made possible by gifts to the Window of Opportunity capital campaign, now in its final year of active campaigning.

An important feature of the expanded facility will be a "jewel box" theater which will provide an exceptionally intimate setting and acoustically tuned space. In planning the theater, Dean of Fine Arts and Communications Henry Diers set two primary goals. "We want to create a technically advanced, ideal performance space which will serve the department as a teaching lab as well,"



explains Diers, who previously designed theaters in Miami and New York. "We also expect the facility to serve the entire University community as a multi-purpose, 'public' space."

At a time when many people see the arts as a luxury, connecting the new theater to the Campus Center makes an important statement. "Theater is a vital part of college life, a vital part of a liberal education," Diers emphasizes.

"The new theater, along with an adjacent art gallery, will place the arts in the heart of the action at Susquehanna," says Vice President of Academic Affairs Jeanne N. Neff. "The arts will be visibly prominent, creating a constant presence and reminder of their integral role in an educational community."

Susquehanna Sets 1991-92 Tuition, Fees

Citing its commitment to maintain educational quality, Susquehanna University's board of directors has approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 1991-92 academic year. The new figures represent the lowest increases in ten years.

Comprehensive fees for next year's freshmen and sophomores will be \$17,980, for juniors, \$17,390; and for seniors, \$16,400. The costs for entering students will be 5.95% more than in 1990-91.

In announcing the board's action, President Joel Cunningham said, "The board is committed to keeping increases as low as possible without sacrificing educational quality. As we work to contain costs, we recognize that these efforts must not come at the expense of what is most crucial to students—an excellent education."

The value of a Susquehanna education is recognized in the new *Barron's 300 Best Baccs in Higher Education* which selected Susquehanna University from the more than three thousand public and private institutions in the United States. Selections were based on performance of the faculty, the depth and comprehensiveness of the curriculum, preparation of students for lives after graduation, and prices charged for services.

The value of a Susquehanna education has also been recognized by alumni and friends of the University whose support of the current capital campaign has dramatically increased the endowment and made possible a multi-million dollar campus renovation program. This spring the University broke ground for the expansion of the Degenstein Campus Center to provide new performance, exhibition, and student activities spaces—funded entirely by campaign gifts.

Recognizing the current economic times and the difficulty some families face in financing a quality education, Susquehanna offers an extensive financial aid program. All students who demonstrate need receive assistance and the University has committed to making prompt adjustments in aid to any student whose family's financial circumstances change suddenly in these times of economic recession.

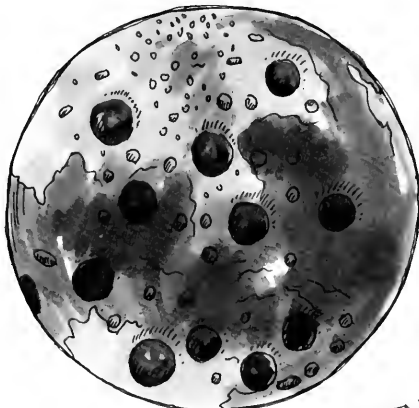
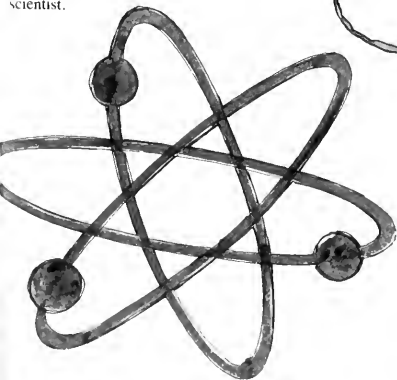

RESEARCH FOR ALL THE RIGHT REASONS

What does the moon's atmosphere have in common with something that kills fungus? And how does studying the dimensions of snowflakes relate to the development of a more powerful insecticide?

Normally, the aforementioned items have nothing to do with each other. But this summer, there was a connection: each topic was the subject of intensive scientific research at Susquehanna University.

Three junior biochemistry majors and three junior physics majors at Susquehanna were involved in research that ranged from corporate-sponsored studies of fungicide to University-funded analysis of the moon's atmosphere. And while all six of the young scientists did different things, each shared a common objective: the desire to learn more about what it means to be a scientist.



From Bugs to Fungus

Take, for example, Patti Ollivier of Orrtana, PA. Patti is a junior biochemistry major who hopes later to earn her Ph.D. in chemistry. Her research was one of two biochemistry projects this summer funded by Rohm and Haas Company.

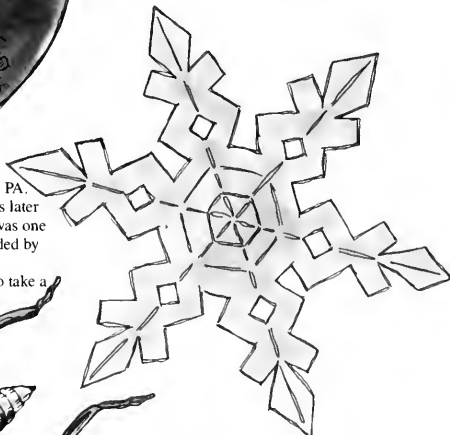
Generally speaking, Ollivier's project was to take a

Rohm and Haas chemical currently used as an insecticide and reproduce it. The scientific objectives of Ollivier's research were to investigate ways to more efficiently produce the chemical.

Like all of the Susquehanna summer research projects, however, the ends are not as important as the means. "What I want people to understand is that this is primarily a chance for these students to learn

about being scientists," says Tom McGrath, Ph.D., professor of chemistry at Susquehanna.

It was a chance, for instance, for Becky Valentine of Pittsburgh, PA, to see if she could come up with something that more effectively kills fungus. Rohm and Haas funded Valentine's project as well, and for good reason. Valentine, a junior who aspires to be a chemical engineer, took a commercially available



Rohm and Haas herbicide and tried to convert it into something even more potent.

"I've been getting companies to sponsor summer chemistry research at Susquehanna for years, and the companies look at it as a good investment," Dr. McGrath says. "They figure that they can get some experiments done at a low cost and maybe build some loyalty with these students."

Junior Michelle Kreger of Wellsboro, PA, has American Cyanamid to thank for her research this summer. The company is funding an ongoing project that focuses on organometallic compounds—compounds consisting of carbon and metal. Such compounds most normally function as catalysts that make it easier for two other agents to merge together.

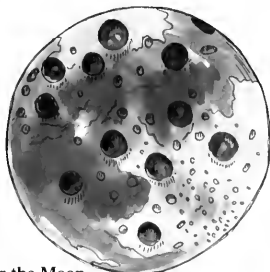
Kreger, who has visions of medical school, is helping Dr. McGrath react the organometallic compounds under new conditions to get new products.

The summer research projects create an ideal situation. Students learn the professional process of experimentation. They experience the science lab's

peaks and valleys. And they learn valuable lessons. "I want the students to know that there are good days and bad days in the lab," Dr. McGrath says. "Sometimes, you're just not as smart as the molecules."



Shooting for the Moon

Industry-sponsored projects don't monopolize the summertime research scene at Susquehanna. The University's physics department had three gems of its own out in the field, working at other universities.

Junior Eric Zizelmann of Tamaqua, PA, a physics major, figured he could get a better glimpse at the moon if he headed west. Zizelmann was at the University of Arizona in Tucson, where he was part of a study that uses a specially-designed 61-foot telescope to take pictures of the moon and its atmosphere. A sophisticated computer-software program then analyzes the photos.

The study is part of the NASA/JOVE program. Susquehanna is the only school in Pennsylvania, and one of just 15 colleges and universities nationwide, participating in the JOINT Venture (JOVE) space science research program with NASA.

Zizelmann studied under Richard Kozlowski, Ph.D. head of Susquehanna's physics department and a professor of physics at both Susquehanna and the University of Arizona.

"They're trying to find out where sodium—which is in the atmosphere of the moon—comes from," said Fred Grosse, Ph.D. a professor of physics at Susquehanna who is also active in the project. "They're trying to find out how the sodium gets there, and how it's distributed."

It's all part of the ongoing study of the moon in preparation for manned exploration. The moon's atmosphere is a very primitive one, called an exosphere.

An exosphere also exists at the outer edge of the earth's atmosphere and thereby determines what atoms escape into space. "What we're hoping is that, by learning about a real exosphere such as the moon's, we can learn more about how ours works," Grosse said.

Zizelmann's primary role in the project was to use the computer to look at the electronic images of the moon, which the telescope generates. Susquehanna's Kozlowski, along with Dr. Donald Hunten of the University of Arizona designed the light-capturing telescope that makes these enhanced images possible.

This fall, Susquehanna will get the SUN workstation computer that Kozlowski and Zizelmann used in Arizona. "We'll be able to do all the analysis here," Grosse says.



Does Lighting a Match Bring Rain?

Back to earth—or, more specifically, Ithaca, NY. That's where Susquehanna junior Prem Janardhan was involved in research of another sort at Cornell University. Janardhan is from India and is a Susquehanna University Presidential Scholar.

He majors in physics, computer science and math. As if that didn't keep him busy enough, Janardhan decided to take a trip up Route 81 and do some research on fractals this summer. To simplify an intangible topic, fractals are things with fractional dimensions.

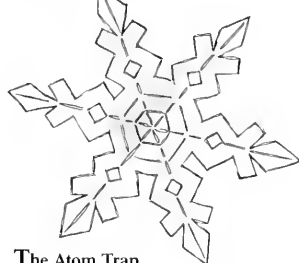
In other words, they are objects whose areas go beyond simple one-, two- or three-dimensional measurement systems. Most things in nature, in fact, are fractal objects.

Take snowflakes, for example. "If you put a snowflake under a microscope and look at the little edge of the

snowflake, you'll see that little edge looks just like a snowflake," Grosse said. "And then the snowflake pattern repeats itself and repeats itself. So you can never tell what magnifications you're looking at."

Janardhan's research related to how the smaller parts of the whole—measured "fractally"—can ultimately affect the larger parts of the whole. "Fractals are being used in things that are chaotic, like weather systems," Grosse explained.

"If you change even the smallest initial conditions a little bit," he adds, "you get a completely different weather system. If somebody lights a match in California at just the right time, you might get different weather over in New York City than you would have if they didn't light the match."



The Atom Trap

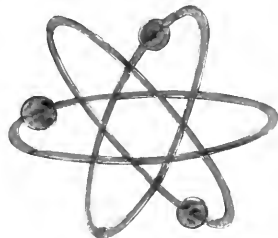
Shamokin's Melanie Williams, a Susquehanna University junior, tried to trap a rare chemical element in her research this summer. Williams, a physics major, did research on rubidium at the State University of New York at Brockport.

Why do Williams and her research group want to know about rubidium? For one thing, the element's rarity makes its properties difficult to understand.

Also, stimulated rubidium emits a radiation with a very precise frequency. Scientists use this for atomic clocks. "This is very precise time measurement," Grosse said. "You can verify Einstein's theory of general relativity this way by measuring how time slows down as you pull away from a gravitational field."

But to do more things with rubidium, scientists must study it further. "If you illuminate the atoms with a laser," Grosse said, "the photons will excite energy in the atoms and it lets you learn how the atoms work, how they are put together." Williams' role in this research was to make a laser beam that is circular instead of elliptical. This would ensure that radiation from the beam more uniformly exposed the rubidium.

Whether it's making laser beams circular, pictures of the moon more meaningful or fungicide more powerful, Susquehanna students are enhancing their professional futures. And a few of them might just find something that enhances the world's future. •

Board Chairman O'Connor Gains Distinction at Penn State

Penn State University recently honored Harold O'Connor, Susquehanna's chairman of the board, by granting him the prestigious Distinguished Alumni Award.

Penn State does not grant honorary doctorate degrees, making the Distinguished Alumni Award among the university's highest honors.

A 1952 graduate of Penn State, O'Connor's volunteer activity for his Alma Mater is matched only by his work at Susquehanna. O'Connor joined Susquehanna's board of directors in 1981. In 1983, he assumed the position of vice chairman, which he held until 1986. He served on the Committee on Academic Affairs and the Committee on Membership during his initial years at Susquehanna.

O'Connor ascended to chairman of the board in 1986. He also chairs the Board Executive Committee and served as chairman of the Board Solicitation Committee for "Window of Opportunity: The Campaign for Susquehanna University." He is a member of the campaign's Steering Committee and Major Gift Committee.

Under O'Connor's leadership, the board of directors has seen Susquehanna boost its endowment and exceed

its capital campaign goal. The endowment has jumped from \$8.8 million in 1986 to its present \$26.5 million. Susquehanna has already exceeded the "Window of Opportunity" Campaign's goal of \$22 million, with current pledges standing at \$32.4 million.

O'Connor's accomplishments and affiliations stretch well beyond any campus boundary. From 1966 to 1987, O'Connor was president and CEO of CHEMCUT Corporation, a subsidiary of West Germany's Schering AG, which supplies machinery and chemistry that aid in producing printed circuits. Some describe CHEMCUT as the world's most prominent corporation of its kind. O'Connor was a major player in CHEMCUT's creation, and helped lead the company to its current status.

He still serves as vice president and treasurer of Tussey Realty Company and as chairman of the board for Mellon Bank Central in State College. O'Connor lives in State College with his wife, Nancy, and continues to contribute to community organizations. He is a member of his Chamber of Commerce and a board member of Centre County Community Foundation, a public charity.

Tips for Financing a College Education

In an uncertain economy, the financial situation may look worrisome to current or prospective college students and their families. Yet Susquehanna's Director of Financial Aid Helen Nunn says that most families can still afford the college education of their son's or daughter's choice.

Nunn offers ten tips to help students and parents make the most of the financial assistance available during these uncertain times.

1. Investigate all your alternatives. Because the costs of higher education continue to go up while the potential student pool dwindles, many institutions are finding more resources to meet students' needs. Fewer families are paying the full expense of education, particularly at private colleges and universities.

2. Remember that financial aid programs are based on national figures. Don't assume that because you are doing well financially in your own community that you won't qualify for aid.

3. Gather enough information to draw your own conclusions about financial aid programs. Just because a friend doesn't qualify for a particular program doesn't mean you won't.

4. Explore the aid programs you're interested in with experienced financial aid staff. Let them tell you if you're eligible. Don't assume you won't qualify.

5. Ask whether funds are available directly through your chosen institution. Don't assume there's no financial aid available for you just because tuition costs continue to go up and the federal government isn't increasing its funding.

6. Look for academic or talent-based scholarships or incentives if you don't qualify for regular forms of aid. Apply if you think you might be eligible.

7. Consider *cost*, rather than *price*. One school's

price may be higher than another, but your final cost may not be. Compare the price and the financial aid packages being offered by each school to determine your *final* cost.

8. Be sure to also compare the aid packages you're being offered when you compare costs. Ask such questions as:

- Did this school meet our need?
- How much are we being asked to borrow and pay back later?
- How much is my son or daughter being asked to work?

9. Don't assume that a state-funded school is a better financial choice than a private school. Most state schools don't have enough aid to fund all needy students. The chance of having your need met is higher at a private school, and you actually could end up spending more of your own money at a state-funded school.

10. Finally, inform the financial aid office of any change in your financial status. The financial aid system is sensitive to family income changes, so it's important to provide this information. You're not locked into a financial aid package, even after the academic year begins. So don't let embarrassment or pride stand in your way.

Currently, more than half of Susquehanna students receive need-based aid. In 1990-91, Susquehanna students received more than \$8.8 million in financial aid from all sources.

Consumer Satisfaction Key to Small Town Revitalization

Small-town business districts that are struggling to survive economically may want to follow the advice of two Susquehanna University business professors who have completed a study on why people leave their communities to shop in malls or larger cities.

Professors of Management William J. Sauer and Kenneth Fladmark found that in the eyes of shoppers, small-town retailers could do a better job with the prices they charge, but received high marks for having friendly, knowledgeable store personnel, a convenient location, and nice atmosphere.

"Small-town merchants especially need to improve their customers' perception of fair-pricing and good value for the dollar," said Fladmark. "This requires salespeople who are not only friendly and who can answer questions about merchandise, but who present information about the product and services which justifies the price."

Perhaps more importantly, the study also revealed that people who expressed feelings of loyalty to the community generally were those who most often

frequented downtown stores. "The implications are clear," said Fladmark. "A small town has to offer social and commercial amenities that make its citizens feel good about the community so that people will want to give their business to downtown merchants."

Providing more free parking is another area where small towns could gain points with customers. "About two-thirds of those surveyed indicated that free parking was an important consideration in deciding where to shop," said Sauer. "But less than one-third felt there was enough of it in their towns."

Small-town retailers who feel pressured by competition to open on Sundays may be encouraged to know that less than one-quarter of the respondents felt that was important. However, more than half felt that mall department, mall specialty stores and strip stores should have Sunday hours.

Drs. Fladmark and Sauer surveyed 950 individuals in the communities of Danville, Milliflburg, Lewisburg, and Milton, and reported a 42% response rate.

"What we found in these towns probably is a good indication of what's happening in other small towns with populations of less than 15,000 and within two to three hours of urban areas," Sauer said.

Hegberg, associate professor of music, also appeared in June on a panel to discuss the recruitment of young people for work in the area of church music at the national conference of the ALCM at Emory University in Atlanta.

■ **Dr. Warren Fisher**, associate professor and head of the economics department, and co-author Anne Grambsch presented a paper at Warmwater Fisheries Symposium I in Phoenix, AZ, in June. The paper, "Measuring Recreational Fisheries Values," emphasized how to measure recreational values that are not reflected in anglers' spending.

Golf, Tennis, Track Enjoy Strong Season

The spring semester saw its share of sports success stories in 1991. Golf, men's and women's tennis, and men's and women's track all cranked out strong seasons. Baseball, softball and women's lacrosse struggled.

A Susquehanna fan's best bet this spring was to take a trip to the links, where the **Crusader golf team** was busy posting a perfect 5-0 record under head coach **Don Harnum**. Susquehanna finished with an approximate ranking of 25th in the nation, just missing the 22-team, NCAA tournament field.

The golfers strengthened their national standing when they placed second in a field of 21 squads at the annual Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletic Conference (MAC) tournament. Junior **Rob Rohrbach** represented Susquehanna strongly at the tourney, finishing second among 110 golfers.

For the season, junior **Pete Springstead** carried the best stroke average on the team with a mark of 78.0. **Rohrbach** was a notch behind with an 18-hole average of 78.2.

Head coach **Gary Fincke** earned his 100th victory when the men's tennis team beat Mansfield April 10th. The win was one of nine for the Crusaders, who lost only five. Susquehanna finished second to Elizabethtown in the MAC Northwest Section, sporting a 5-1 section record.

Junior **Abe Martin** played at first singles for the Crusaders, winning seven of his fourteen matches. **Andrew Cox**, also a junior, won six of his thirteen matches at second singles. Together on the first doubles squad, Martin and Cox took seven of their 15 matches.

On the women's side of the tennis court, coach **Connie Harnum** was pleasantly surprised with her young team. With only two seniors on the squad, the

Crusaders banged out a 6-4 overall record. In the MAC's Northwest Section, Susquehanna's 4-1 mark was second only to King's College. Sophomore **Stephanie Koch** held the number-one singles racquet, while senior **Annamarie Innamorati** played second singles.

The track teams shined again this spring, with the men's team posting a 6-1 meeting record for head coach **Jim Taylor** and the women's team racing to

a 5-2 mark for coach **Dick Hess**. At the 1991 MAC Track and Field Championships, the Crusader men finished fourth in an 18-team field. The women, in a 17-team field, also placed fourth.

Freshman **Phil Massenat** excelled in the field events for the men's team, while sophomore **Ron Rux** was the season's outstanding runner. For the women, senior **Michele Duffy** was tops in the field and sophomore **Wendy Hayes** sped her way to the top in the running events.

The diamonds were rough for both the baseball and softball teams this spring. In baseball, the Crusaders managed an 8-23-1 mark for head coach **Greg Christodulu**. Despite the difficult year, third baseman **Allan Valunas** made his mark in the MAC. Valunas led the Crusaders in seven offensive categories, hitting .415 and driving in 22 runs. The sophomore's season earned him a spot on the MAC Northwest League All-Star team.

Softball struggled as well this spring. The Crusaders were 712 overall, finishing at the bottom of the MAC Northwest with a 2-8 divisional record. But coach **Carole Templon** had her share of bright spots this season, including sophomore first baseman **Holly Whitesel** and junior pitcher/left fielder **Tara Encarnacion**. Whitesel led the team with a .346 batting average and 13 runs batted in. Encarnacion, Susquehanna's lone member of the MAC Northwest League All-Star Team, hit .305 and stole eight bases.

Coach **Terry Molloy's** women's lacrosse team had its share of trouble in its first full season at the varsity level (the team faced four varsity opponents in 1990), although the team did show promise for the future. Led by **Wendy Blackburn** on offense and **Courtney Steele** on defense, the women went 2-6 for the season.

Marcinek, Bogar Named To Coaching Positions

The Crusader men's basketball team has named **Frank Marcinek** as its new full-time head coach. As the head coach on a part-time basis the past two seasons, Marcinek compiled a 28-31 mark. Before that, Marcinek served as assistant coach at Susquehanna from 1982 to 1986, and again in 1988-89. During the '86-87 and '87-88 seasons, Marcinek was assistant coach at Ithaca College, where he earned his masters in physical education.

Also stepping into a head coaching role this summer was **Randall Bogar**, who will be the Crusaders' new wrestling coach. Bogar succeeds long-time coach **Charlie Kunes**, who until now had been Susquehanna's only head man on the mats. Bogar assisted Kunes for the last two years.

Soviet Humanitarian Speaks at Commencement

Seniors graduating from Susquehanna on Sunday, May 19, heard from a man who has overcome more than his share of adversity in life.

Dr. Alexander V. Suvorov, a blind and deaf psychologist, philosopher, and published poet from the Soviet Union, addressed seniors, their families and guests on the human capacity for overcoming difficulties and adversity, and on the value of community and communication.

Suvorov lost his hearing at the age of nine, and was born blind. His personal and academic accomplishments have been called a scientific miracle. His work as a research psychologist is primarily with deaf-blind children, and he has spent most of his career working for the rights and well-being of sensory-impaired people. He was presented an honorary Doctor of Letters during the Commencement ceremony.

His acceptance speech was brief, but the manner in which it was delivered gave the audience some appreciation for the difficulties that confront the deaf-blind. He had two interpreters by his side—one to interpret into English his remarks delivered in Russian—and the other a long-time Soviet colleague who assisted him through sign language.

Dr. Suvorov's communication skills were remarkable—particularly to those who take their own sight and hearing for granted. To watch him get about campus and meet with faculty, staff and students was to marvel at his courage and tenacity. To imagine his work as a psychologist and scholar was indeed inspiring. He and his colleague/interpreter Dr. Leonid Shavelzon are determined to prove that sensory-impaired persons can achieve great heights given the opportunity. From Selinsgrove, they traveled to Washington, D.C. and Boston to seek support for an International Center that would champion the rights of the sensory-impaired on a global basis.

During Commencement ceremonies, the University

also paid tribute to the following distinguished individuals who have made significant contributions toward the goal of international understanding:

■ An honorary Doctor of Science to Dr. Yevgeni P. Velikhov, distinguished physicist, vice president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, and chairman of the International Foundation, an organization dedicated to increasing cooperation between nations and people;

■ An honorary Doctor of Laws to Natalya A. Velikhova, founder and president of the international youth exchange program "Children as the Creators of the 21st Century," an independent, non-governmental, non-profit organization which arranges international youth exhibitions, conferences and seminars, sport competitions, concerts and festivals, as well as meetings with leading scientists, scholars, and high-ranking public officials;

■ An honorary Doctor of Laws to Dr. Frank Newman, president of the Education Commission of the States, a forum for the study of major educational issues which encourages cooperation among the states in forming policy and developing programs. He was president of the University of Rhode Island from 1974 to 1983, and is widely known as the author of the Newman Reports (*Report on Higher Education*, 1971, and *National Policy and Higher Education*, 1974).

■ An honorary Doctor of Divinity to The Rev. Herbert W. Chilstrom, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. A native of Litchfield, MN, Chilstrom received a bachelor of arts from Augsburg College, masters of theology from Augustana Theological Seminary and Princeton Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. from New York University. A respected spiritual leader and church statesman, Chilstrom became bishop of the ELCA in 1987. Among the many recognitions he has received, he was named a Knight of the Royal Order of the North Star by King Carl Gustav of Sweden for the effective social concern which characterizes his civic and religious involvement.

Bishop Chilstrom Tells Graduates to Serve Society

Students graduating from Susquehanna University in May were reminded of the "radical nature of Christian higher education" by ELCA Bishop Herbert W. Chilstrom who delivered the Baccalaureate address in Weber Chapel Auditorium.

His message to graduating seniors centered on the idea that "life is a gift received and a gift to be given in unselfish service to others"—a commencement theme which he said would most likely have been out of order on the secular campus. He said, "Whether one's work calls for giving counsel, or prescriptions, or financial advice, or sermons, or recitals, or drawings, or account balances—that is secondary to something that should be common to everything we do—to give ourselves."

He added that today when many people are motivated by personal interests and the desire for material possessions, church-related schools should instill "the passion to teach, the passion to learn, the passion to serve, the passion to pull others up so they can live." He concluded, "This is what lies at the heart of what we must be as schools of the church."

Dr. Hazel J. Brobst Brown '51 has been named the recipient of the 1991 Northeast Regional Faculty Member Award of the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT). Dr. Brown is professor of psychology at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) where she has worked for nearly 20 years.

Following her graduation from Susquehanna with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Social Studies and minors in Latin and Sociology, Dr. Brown earned a master of arts degree in guidance from Bucknell University and a doctor of education degree in school psychology from The Pennsylvania State University at University Park. AT&T Donates Computer Lab to University

Susquehanna University recently received the donation of a computer laboratory from AT&T, valued at approximately \$90,000. The addition of this fully equipped lab, which includes 18 6386SX/EL workstations and a 6386E/33 WorkGroup system Model S computer, completes the University's plan for the installation of computers in its academic facilities.

Susquehanna is one of 47 colleges and universities across the country and one of three schools in Pennsylvania to receive a computer lab from AT&T. The AT&T University Equipment Donation Program has supplied computers and data networking equipment to colleges and universities since 1984, but the donation of computer labs is new to the program.

Last year, Susquehanna University embarked on a three-year plan to create a campus-wide network that would include all three academic PC labs and enable access to all campus resources from centrally-located computers in the student residence halls. With the AT&T donation, there are now 60 computer workstations in academic halls and the Blough-Weis Library which are used for student instruction and study. From each station, students, faculty and staff can access the library's recently computerized card catalog and on-line catalogs at hundreds of libraries in North America; the University's career placement computer program for students, called Kinexis; campus electronic mail services; and PREPNET, a regional electronic mail and research network with gateways to national and international networks. Susquehanna was the first school of its size and type to join PREPNET.

The final phase of the campus academic network plan calls for extending the network to residence halls so that students will have the convenience of accessing the local campus network, STARLAN, and the regional network, PREPNET, from their living environment as well as from academic buildings.

Philanthropy

Through a generous bequest provision, the Nancy Cairns Scholarship Fund has been established in memory of Dr. Cairns, who died on September 29, 1990. The income from the fund will be used to provide scholarships for students majoring in French. In addition, Dr. Cairns bequeathed to Blough-Weis Library a Japanese print and a collection of rare French books.

Dr. Cairns came to Susquehanna University in 1963 as assistant professor of French. During her 27 years with the University, she served the Susquehanna community in many capacities: as head of the Department of Modern Languages, as a member of the editorial board of the Susquehanna University Press, a founding member of the John App Honor Society, and as an adviser to the Pi Delta Phi Honor Society. Also, she researched French literature of the sixteenth and twentieth centuries and the role of France in the American Revolution.

Dr. Cairns was an active proponent of international education and had served as secretary and president of the Pennsylvania Council for International Education. At the time of her death, Dr. Cairns was working on a book-length study of French literary criticism.

A Buss Family Scholarship has been endowed in honor and memory of Clara D. and William C. Buss to commemorate their unwavering belief in the importance of education and the role that Susquehanna played in the lives of their children and grandchildren. The scholarship was established by their sons, Dr. Claude A. Buss '24 and Dr. William Ceryl Buss '28, and their grandson, Dr. William Claude Buss. Preference will be given to students in the liberal arts, music, or pre-medical programs.

Mildred F. Hively has established the J. Paul H. (H'63) and Mildred F. Hively Scholarship Fund in memory of Dr. J. Paul H. Hively, to whom Susquehanna awarded the degree of doctor of humane letters for his contribution of time, talents and money to many humanitarian causes. Income from this fund will provide scholarship aid.

In memory of her daughter Elizabeth, Mrs. Blodwen A. Zeigler has established the Elizabeth Evans Zeigler '77 Scholarship Fund. Other family members also contributed. This fund will provide scholarships for communications and theater arts majors.

A bequest provision recently created the Helen B. Russell Library Endowment which honors the memory of her parents, Frederick T. Reiter and Emma E. Reiter. The income from the endowment will be used to purchase English and social science books for Blough-Weis Library.

During Alumni Weekend, the Classes of '41, '51, and '66 came back to Susquehanna bearing special gifts. To commemorate the 50th Reunion of the Class of 1941, Mary Emma Yoder Jones, on behalf of the Class, presented to President Joel Cunningham a gift in the amount of \$22,060 to establish an unrestricted endowment fund. A 40th Reunion Class gift of \$60,440 was given by Alice Greeger Pfeffer '51, and Fred Kelly—from the Class of 1966—presented a 25th Reunion Class gift of \$25,329. These two gifts were placed in the Susquehanna University Fund, which helps provide the University with vital operating funds.

Ronald A. Cohen joined the University Relations staff this summer as Susquehanna's new director of development. Cohen comes to Susquehanna from Clark University in Worcester, MA, where he was senior development officer since 1987. Before Clark, he was associate director for corporate relations at Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago, IL. Cohen graduated from Syracuse University in 1982 with a bachelor of arts degree in magazine journalism and political science.

"As I've been settling in, I've been welcomed by several alumni and am impressed by their strong feelings about Susquehanna," Cohen said. "I'm looking forward to meeting many other alumni over the coming months as we all work to keep Susquehanna going forward."

This year's annual report conveys some of Susquehanna's special character and recent success. It includes an overview of our core curriculum, which is the University's main means of giving students the skills and liberal studies that need to be at the center of each student's academic program. In addition, this report gives readers an up-to-date account of Susquehanna's nationally recognized program of student community service, which now involves more than half our students during their four years at Susquehanna.

The University has received outstanding support from alumni and friends over the past year. We gratefully acknowledge this support in the 1990-91 Honor Roll of Donors. The Window of Opportunity capital campaign has now exceeded its \$22 million goal by more than \$10 million. Susquehanna's endowment has increased by over 500 percent in the last five years and is at \$30 million for the first time in the University's history. For the 12th year in a row, Susquehanna has ended the year with a balanced budget. A detailed financial statement is included in this report.

In the year ahead, we will join many colleges and universities nationally in the work of finding ways to reduce costs and increase revenue. We are highly conscious of the financial pressures on the families of many of our students and are committed to limiting student fee increases as much as possible, while still allowing Susquehanna to continue its recent pattern of steady growth in the ability of its students and quality of its academic programs.

To all those who have contributed to Susquehanna's accomplishments through their service to the University and their generous financial support, thank you. It is an honor and pleasure for me to serve as president here.

The Susquehanna Spirit: Service to Others

very Tuesday evening, Misti Johnson gives two hours to people less fortunate than herself.

Johnson, a senior psychology major at Susquehanna, is active in the University's community service Project House which serves the Selinsgrove Center, a facility for mentally disabled adults. Each week, Johnson and other students in this project devote time to broadening the experiences of the residents of Selinsgrove Center.

"We work with 12 to 15 people each week," Johnson explains. "We either do crafts projects with them or play games in the game room. Sometimes we just take them for walks around the campus of the center. To work with their motor skills, we might do some low-impact aerobics or get a big ball and play with it outside."

On several special occasions during the year—Valentine's Day and Christmas, for example—the residents of Selinsgrove Center visit the student project house on Susquehanna's campus. "We also have an annual Halloween party," Johnson says, "where we carve pumpkins. We usually move into the living room then to dance."

Students' commitment to helping others manifests itself in many ways. In fact, never has the spirit of volunteerism at Susquehanna been stronger.

More than a Project

In 1987, President Reagan cited Susquehanna for outstanding community service through the White House Private Sector Initiatives Program. Susquehanna was the only college or university to receive the honor. In 1989, Susquehanna students travelled to the White House where they heard President Bush commend their continued commitment to youth service.

The program that helped garner such presidential praise is Susquehanna's Project House System. For over 15 years, student residential living groups have donated their service to specific community projects.

"Basically, a project is a group of students—usually 10 to 20—who have committed themselves to a minimum of two to four hours per student, per week,

to do volunteer work on a certain project," says Deborah Woods, director of Susquehanna's volunteer programs.

Since the Project House system began in 1976, Susquehanna students have given more than 135,000 hours of service in response to needs on campus and in the surrounding community. In this new academic year, 275 students will devote themselves to 15 different projects, including Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Adopt A Grandparent, Habitat for Humanity, and the Study Buddy tutoring program.

"The fact that over half of Susquehanna's students do volunteer work at some point over their four years here demonstrates the seriousness of their commitment," says Dorothy Anderson, dean of student life at Susquehanna. "When you step outside of yourself and make a difference in someone's life, it changes you forever. It makes you a better citizen. It makes you aware of what's going on around you and you can never close your eyes again."

The Project House System has received recognition as an innovative program partly because of its preferred living incentive. Students request the privilege of living together on the basis of their common interest in an approved project. Selected groups reside in University-owned houses and in beautifully restored Seibert Hall. The combination of group living and a commitment to volunteer community service provides the type of learning experience that allows students to grow and develop.

New Initiatives

Student volunteerism at Susquehanna is evident in many ways throughout the campus. The Project House System, fraternity and sorority activities, and campus-wide volunteer drives have long been a part of the Susquehanna experience. Several new initiatives over recent years have kept Susquehanna at the forefront of the student volunteerism movement, including its founding membership in the national Campus Compact as well as charter membership in Pennsylvania Campus Compact, a program of the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities. Susquehanna President Joel Cunningham's early involvement in these organizations and his commitment to creating and enhancing opportunities for student service have led to some exciting new programs.

Sharing Visions

In the spring of 1988, President Cunningham and Lincoln University President Niara Sudarkasa discussed ways the two institutions could share their strengths and cultivate areas critical to the student experience. Through mini-grants from the PA Campus Compact, a common vision became reality in the fall of 1989 with the launching of "Susquehanna and Lincoln Inter-Campus Community Connections."

Lacking an established volunteer center, Lincoln wanted to centralize and expand its existing community service activities. Susquehanna was seeking a greater degree of cultural diversity on its campus. What better university to turn to than historically black Lincoln University, founded in 1854 and situated 45 miles southwest of Philadelphia?

"Susquehanna has been working very hard to determine how we can better meet needs of minority students," says Susquehanna's Deborah Woods. "Lincoln has been able to offer us all kinds of ideas and suggestions."

The partnership's successes are encouraging. More than 10 day and weekend exchange visits have been made by students and administrators from each institution and joint service projects have been organized. Working through Susquehanna's Office of Multicultural Affairs, students established a Black Student Union which sponsors a variety of culturally diverse programs and activities. Lincoln opened its own volunteer center last fall and had a very successful first year, coordinating four community service programs involving more than 120 Lincoln students.

To date, each institution has gained significant student-service opportunities from the partnership which typifies cooperation, collaboration, and commitment to service. Upon notifying Susquehanna that a mini-grant was awarded to continue the program through 1991-92, Amy L. Hart, director of PA Campus Compact, called the program "a wonderful model for other schools."

Matching Interests to Service

To improve coordination of its increasing number of volunteer activities, Susquehanna University established a centralized clearinghouse for campus community service in the fall of 1989. The Center for Volunteer Programs has strengthened and made more visible an already strong campus entity.

This spring, a national volunteer program took notice and named Susquehanna one of fifty current campuses to participate in the Girafes on Campus program. The project is so named because it honors students "who stick their necks out" for others.

The program's overall goal is to motivate students to serve their communities and match interests to service projects. Susquehanna was an ideal choice for the program. "When community organizations or agencies need volunteers," says Woods, "they know that they can contact our volunteer center. And we will match the need with students who have indicated an interest."

The process operates in reverse order as well. Should a student come to the volunteer center and indicate an interest in a specific area of service, Woods and her staff will try to locate an appropriate service opportunity on campus or in the community.

"I am very proud of the commitment that Susquehanna students have made to serving others, working on behalf of the needy, for environmental causes, and improving community life on campus," says President Cunningham. "They have the ability to make a real difference in the lives of many people and in themselves."

A Core Curriculum for the 1990s

oday, many in the educational community are decrying a decline in liberal arts education. Susquehanna University, however, continues to produce graduates who have a strong liberal education; i.e. who are capable of continuing personal growth; have the flexibility to adjust to change; have a solid sense of personal values and commitment to service to others; and are prepared to enter leadership roles in their professions.

While Susquehanna's three Schools provide the flesh of career or preprofessional preparation at Susquehanna, the core curriculum provides the backbone, linking the various kinds of knowledge students need to be successful. It is the essence of a Susquehanna education and what makes it special.

Core courses extend across a student's four years and share an important set of goals which include:

- ▶ focusing on the interconnectedness of knowledge.

Core courses break down the barriers between disciplines and demonstrate that intellectual curiosity by its nature crosses such boundaries.

- ▶ teaching students to think well. Students should be able to find and use information; to draw and present valid conclusions; to approach problems creatively; and to make sound judgments based on both logic and insight.

- ▶ educating citizens of the world. The core stresses what it means to be a member of the diverse, human community today.



In a world where nations have become more interdependent, competency in foreign language is an advantage. Susan Johnson, director of the International Study Programs, oversees Susquehanna exchanges with universities in Japan, Russia, and Germany, and a wide array of study options in Europe, South America and the Far East.

Susquehanna's core reflects the recommendations of recent national commissions and task forces which have called for greater integration of liberal learning within the undergraduate curriculum. Vice President for Academic Affairs Jeanne Neff comments, "Susquehanna's core was forward-looking and innovative at the time of its adoption by faculty in 1985; now, we see many other schools of quality beginning to follow this same model. In the meantime, our faculty have experimented, evaluated and refined core courses over the past five years. The result is an even better educational product," she concludes.

Making the Transition

To help new students bridge the intellectual and cultural distance between high school and higher education, the core experience begins with areas

of personal development and personal growth. The "Orientation to Academe" course deals with everything from roommate problems to test anxiety. Volunteer faculty and administrators moderate small-group discussions throughout the first semester.

Susquehanna's career development program is a four-year approach which helps students identify career goals and acquire the appropriate strategies and skills to implement them. Susquehanna was the first university in the country to require students to take a career development course.

A traditional library research course has given way to an individualized "workbook" system by which students become familiar with Susquehanna's automated catalog and campus-based access to research networks and databases throughout the world. Librarians also work with faculty on individual class assignments which improve students' research skills.

The traditional physical education requirement has grown into a wellness and fitness program emphasizing lifelong habits of exercise, nutrition and health maintenance.

Skills for the '90s

Susquehanna continues to lead in the area of computer literacy by being one of a minority of colleges and universities to require all students to demonstrate competency in computer use. The "Using Computers" course prepares students for the computer applications they will encounter throughout the curriculum, from basic writing courses to accounting problems. Sections are taught by faculty in computer science, management and physics, and on occasion by members of the administrative staff.

Knowing how to use computers helps students with another core requirement—the Writing Seminar. Instructors and students are able to communicate through the local campus computer network as papers are drafted and revised. A livelier version of the traditional English composition course, the seminars are small, offer a variety of themes and topics, and each semester feature a visiting author whose work is read in common by all students. Susquehanna students also complete eight credits of "writing-intensive" coursework across the curriculum as a graduation requirement.

Other skills important for success in the '90s are competency in mathematics and logic, and foreign language. Competency in the first is demonstrated by courses in calculus, statistics or logic. Normally, students complete at least one year of a foreign language.

The Past Informs the Present

The heart of the core curriculum is found in the liberal arts foundation which reflects the University's essential character and values. Susquehanna's core recognizes that successful individuals must have an appreciation of those fields that have proven valuable century after century. Exposure to the humanities and arts—history, literature, the fine and performing arts—come through the "Heritage" component of the core.

In developing the "Heritage" courses, Susquehanna humanities faculty have taken special care to reflect the contribution of women, minority groups, and non-Western cultures in the development of civilization, even as the importance of the Western tradition is emphasized. Where other universities have attempted to replace traditional courses with exclusively contemporary models, and in doing so have provoked

heated debate. Susquehanna has adopted a more balanced approach which seeks to enlarge students' vision and broaden their understanding of a complex past.

Also central to a Susquehanna education is a special group of "Values" courses which ask students to explore the nature of ethical choice and the value systems which guide human thought and action. Intended to be intellectually challenging, "Values" courses encourage value formation within the context of personal and academic freedom.

"Contemporary World" courses aim to prepare students for the complex, fast-paced, and volatile modern world by helping them understand and appreciate their relationship to organizations, to other individuals and to the world of science and technology. Students fulfilling the social science requirement choose among courses in anthropology, sociology, human geography, political science and economics which study the major social systems by which civilizations are constructed.

Science offerings are equally broad, ranging from environmental geology to astronomy and clinical physics. Several, such as "Science and Technology," are interdisciplinary, and all science courses, including those designed for students in non-science majors, involve laboratory experiments.



"Values" courses are offered in philosophy, religion, and developmental psychology, and cover a wide variety of topics. Winifred and Gustave Weber Assistant Professor in the Humanities David Wisdo teaches such courses as Philosophy of Religion and Philosophy of Women.

Inventing the Future

The most innovative aspect of Susquehanna's core curriculum is its requirement of a Futures course, typically taken in the senior year. These courses are designed to be the culminating experience of the sequence of core courses, and seek to examine the various ways in which our expectations about the future influence our decisions, choices and actions. Futures courses are interdisciplinary and may be offered by any department of the University.

Framework for Success

An appreciation of the liberal arts and sciences is among the most valuable assets for students in both their professional and personal lives. It provides the framework for advanced and professional study

in science, law and medicine. Each year, many Susquehanna students enter graduate or professional school. The others — armed with flexibility, curiosity, and knowledge developed at Susquehanna—go immediately into the job market. Increasingly, the corporate world is seeking candidates who are liberally educated, have well-developed skills in communications and critical thinking, and have been exposed to a diverse, international community. Whatever their major, Susquehanna students' ability to place their work in a broader context makes them more attractive job candidates. The liberal education of the core, together with the thorough professional preparation that Susquehanna students receive in their "major" departments, prepare them to be successful citizens of the world.

1990-91 University Highlights

Strong Freshman Class

Susquehanna welcomed a new freshman class the fall of 1991 whose academic credentials match last year's record quality both in terms of high school class rank and Scholastic Aptitude Test scores. The University was also successful in maintaining a freshman class equal in size to the previous year's, despite the shrinking population of 18-year-olds nationwide. The Honors Program remains strong with average SAT scores of new Honors students reaching 1220, compared to 1200 last year. The Class of 1995 is also more geographically diverse, hailing from 17 states and 11 countries, including Burma, Germany, Japan, Namibia, and Russia.

Among America's Best

Susquehanna University was cited one of the top regional universities in the nation by *U.S. News & World Report*. The 1991 edition ranks Susquehanna eleventh among regional universities in the North. This is the fourth time Susquehanna has been cited in the annual "America's Best Colleges" report.

Russian Exchange Program

Susquehanna University has established a sister relationship with Yaroslavl State University in Russia, 170 miles north of Moscow. The exchange agreement developed through Susquehanna's direct contact with leaders in the scientific community in the Soviet Union—notably the vice president of the Soviet Academy of Science, Dr. Yevgeni Velikhov, who visited Susquehanna's campus twice in 1990-91 and received an honorary degree last May—and through the American Collegiate Consortium for East-West Cultural and Academic Exchange based at Middlebury College. Susquehanna joins other consortium members such as Swarthmore and Dickinson colleges, and Wittenberg University in efforts to expand undergraduate exchange between the United States and the rapidly changing Soviet Union.

The Susquehanna-Yaroslavl exchange program includes opportunities for joint research between the two institutions, sharing of information on teaching methods, and an exchange of faculty members and students. President Cunningham's visit to Yaroslavl in the summer of 1990 and Rector German Mironov's return visit to Susquehanna's campus the following December resulted in the first two Russian exchange students enrolling at Susquehanna the fall of 1991. In October, 1991, Susquehanna's Dean of Arts and Sciences Donald Housley and Dr. Susan Johnson, director of the International Study Programs, traveled to Yaroslavl University to discuss future faculty exchanges.

Improved Information Systems

In the spring of 1991, AT&T donated to Susquehanna a computer laboratory enabling the University to complete its plan to install computers in academic facilities. Susquehanna was one of 47 colleges and universities across the country and one of three schools in Pennsylvania to receive a computer lab from AT&T's University Equipment Donation Program. In addition, all 60 computer workstations in classroom buildings and the Blough-Weis Library are now connected to the main computer network. From each station, students and faculty can access the library's new computerized catalog and on-line catalogs at hundreds of libraries in North America; the University's career placement computer

program for students, Kinexis; campus electronic mail services; and PREPNET, a regional electronic mail and research network with gateways to national and international research networks.

The Susquehanna computer network will eventually be extended to all residence halls so that students have the option of accessing the network from their rooms.

Campaign Successes

A number of major capital improvements have been possible over the past year as gifts to the Window of Opportunity capital campaign continue to be received, with pledges and receipts now totalling \$32.4 million against an original goal of \$22 million. Support for major renovation and expansion of University facilities has come from gifts to the capital campaign and proceeds from an \$8.5 million general revenue bond issue.

The newly renovated and expanded Fisher Science Hall was dedicated in October of 1990, and since that time,

activity in the sciences has been growing rapidly. The University's 1990-91 goal of enrolling 200 science majors was exceeded by nearly 22 percent.

Ground was broken last spring to begin construction on a \$5 million addition to the Charles B. Degenstein Campus Center which will include an art gallery and theater, creating additional opportunities for students to practice their skills. The new facility is expected to be completed in the fall of 1992.

Improvements were made over the summer of 1991 in two residence halls, Reed and Aikens, and in Heilman Hall, home of the Department of Music and the dean of Fine Arts and Communications. To better accommodate prospective students and their families who visit Susquehanna, an addition was built to connect the Admissions and Financial Aid offices. Selingsrove Hall, the University's oldest building, also underwent renovation to enable structural and mechanical improvements to be made.

and library facilities, and the academic ability of peers has increased considerably since the survey was first used in 1987.

Career Development

A new record was set this year in student use of career placement services, and new career services offered were well received by students. Ninety-two percent of the senior class used one or more of major career services, as did 61 percent of the total student population. These figures exceed national averages of 75 percent and 45 percent, respectively. Student participation in career workshops also set a new high, exceeding 1989-90 statistics by 50 percent; student internships increased by 32 percent, and externships by 35 percent.

Despite economic conditions which have caused a depressed job market for college graduates generally, job placement interviews for Susquehanna students increased 30 percent over last year, with students participating in nearly 1,900 campus interviews. Susquehanna students appear to be holding their own with nearly 90 percent already employed or enrolled in graduate study by the fall following graduation.

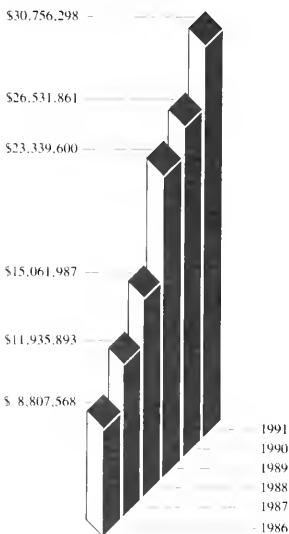
New career placement services include access to two major national job banks and introduction of "Career Navigator" software into Susquehanna's distinctive career planning course. Susquehanna was the first university in the nation to make use of the software, which takes students step-by-step through the entire career assessment and job search process.

Family Business Program

The Family Business Center in the Sigmund Weis School of Business was established in the spring of 1990 to develop a research center and provide a support network for family businesses, especially those in central Pennsylvania. About 90 percent of the 15 million businesses in the U.S. are family owned and operated, but only 30 percent of all first-generation businesses survive into the next generation. Regional business families have responded well to the program, exceeding attendance goals at each of four workshops held over the past year. Forty Susquehanna students in the marketing communications course took part in research projects on behalf of local family firms, and a new undergraduate course on Family Business was offered in the spring of 1991.

The Center's director, Dr. William Sauer, will continue to expand the program with the support of a newly created advisory board which includes David Geise, president of Furman Foods, Gary Baylor '69, president of Country Cupboard in Lewisburg, and Carol Hamm, vice president of Country Cupboard and new associate director of the Family Business Center. Additional workshops will be held in the coming year, and the center will begin publication of a family business newsletter to expand the network.

Agreements with Greek Societies

In 1990-91, agreements were made between the University and the nine Greek societies represented on campus, emphasizing the social responsibility and leadership role these groups play in student life. Outcomes of the agreement included a raising of the grade point average requirement for first-year students to rush, from 2.0 to 2.24, to insure more successful scholarship in the fraternities and sororities. Each group will also participate in a formal recognition review every three years.

Student Satisfaction Survey

Over the past five years, Susquehanna has made steady progress toward its goal of recruiting and retaining a student body with increasingly strong academic credentials, and providing them with the first-rate academic programs and facilities they require. In a survey of Susquehanna students conducted in the spring of 1991, satisfaction with faculty, academic programs, science

The University's 1990-91 goal of enrolling 200 science majors was exceeded by nearly 22 percent.

Growth in Women's Studies

A new minor emphasis in women's studies, an academic area that has grown dramatically in recent years, was developed during 1990-91. The new minor blends courses from many University disciplines which relate specifically to women and explores gender issues within social, cultural and political arenas. Examples of courses are The Biology of Women, Women in Literature, Women in Philosophy, and Gender Stereotypes.

Leadership Roles

Susquehanna administrators continue to assume leadership roles in national and international organizations. Director of the Blough-Weis Library Peter Deekle, who is immediate past president of the Pennsylvania Library Association, was elected to the board of directors of the national Interlibrary Delivery Service, and is a member of the national Association of College and Research Libraries' Task Force on Library Access Guidelines. He is also serving on the Community Advisory Board for WITF, the Public Broadcasting Service affiliate for south central Pennsylvania.

President Joel Cunningham assumed the presidency of the Sigma Chi international fraternity for a two-year term. He was also invited to serve as vice chairman of "Youth—Creators of the 21st Century" International Foundation which, having begun in 1989, is now achieving international exchanges involving thousands of students each year, primarily between the Soviet Union and the United States.

Recipients of Honorary Degrees

Susquehanna recognized the contributions of four outstanding individuals by awarding them honorary degrees during the 133rd Commencement exercises. Recipients included: Commencement speaker Dr. Alexander V. Suvorov, a blind and deaf Soviet psychologist, philosopher, and published poet; Baccalaureate speaker Herbert W. Chilstrom, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; Dr. Yevgeni P. Velikhov, physicist, vice president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, and chairman of the International Foundation; Natalya A. Velikhova, founder and president of the international youth exchange program "Children as the Creators of the 21st Century"; and Dr. Frank Newman, president of the Education Commission of the States in Denver, CO, and former president of the University of Rhode Island.

Crusader Highlights

Susquehanna sports squads saw their share of success this past year. For the 1990-91 women's basketball team, it was a winter of great achievement. Mark Hribar's squad posted 23 wins while advancing to the NCAA Division III "Sweet 16." In the fall of 1990, rookie coach Steve Briggs led the football team to a solid 7-3 finish and tied for second in the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC). With 23 wins, coach Carole Templon's women's volleyball team set a new school record and just missed an MAC championship.

Meanwhile, it was the farewell season for 25-year wrestling coach Charlie Kunes, Susquehanna's first and only wrestling coach. Kunes retired at the end of the academic year with a 1991 season record of 12-3-1.

The spring's top performers were the golf and men's tennis teams, sporting 5-0 and 5-1 marks respectively. With its second-place finish in the MAC tournament, the golf team narrowly missed an NCAA tournament berth.

Faculty Scholarship and Professional Contribution

Books in Print

A number of Susquehanna faculty members published books or had manuscripts accepted for publication during 1990-91. **Ronald Dotterer**, associate professor of English, co-edited two volumes of the *Susquehanna University Studies* which appeared as hardbound publications of the Susquehanna University Press: (with *Deborah Dash Moore* and *Steven M. Cohen*) *Jewish Settlement and Community in the Modern Western World*; and (with Assistant Professor of English *Susan Bowers*), *Politics, Gender and the Arts*. **Susan Albertine**, assistant professor of English, edited *Into Print: American Women in Literary Enterprise*, forthcoming from the University of Tennessee Press. **David Wisdo**, assistant professor of philosophy and holder of the Weber Chair in Humanities, had his book-length manuscript, *The Life of Irony and the Ethics of Belief*, accepted by the State University of New York Press. Associate Professor of Spanish **Robert Mowry**'s translation of *The Gospel According to Lucas Gavilan* was published by the University Press of America.

A textbook, *Fundamentals of Statistics for Psychology Students*, co-authored by **James Misanin**, professor of psychology, was published by Harper-Collins. Several volumes of poetry by **Gary Fincke**, associate professor of English, appeared during the past year: *Handing the Self Back* (Green Tower Press); *Plant Voices* (Yardbird Books); and *The Public Talk of Death*. Fincke also received a fellowship from the Pennsylvania Council for the Arts to complete a fourth poetry collection, *The Durable Word for Wonder*.

International Issues

A number of faculty members contributed to understanding the changing face of Europe and other current international developments. **Susan Johnson**, assistant professor of German, delivered a paper on "The Authorial Self in a Dissolving Country: GDR Writers Face German Unification" at a national conference on film and literature. **Antonin Rusek**, associate professor of economics, published articles on "Policy Interdependence in the Open Economies" (*Atlantic Economic Journal*) and "Problems in Economic Transition" (*Proceedings, 35th Annual International Conference on Small Business*). Dr. Rusek also served as consultant to Czechoslovakia's banking and finance system as the new democratic government in that country sought to stabilize its economy.

Ali Zadeh, assistant professor of economics, published an article on "OPEC, the World Oil Market and Problems with Economic Modeling" (*Western Illinois University Journal of Business*). **William Ward**, holder of the Alan B. Warehime Chair in Business Administration, and **Tracy Rishel**, assistant professor of management, co-authored an article on "Japan and the Dynamic Strategic Model" in the *Proceedings* of the 1990 Annual Meeting of the Decision Sciences Institute. **Mary Cianni**, assistant professor of management, presented a paper on "Management Development in Britain," for the Eastern Academy of Management meeting in May 1990.

National Grants

Several faculty members received research, study and equipment grants in national competition. **Sheryl Postman**, assistant professor of Spanish and Italian.

participated in a National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) summer seminar on Boccaccio at Yale University, and N.J.C. **Vasantkumar**, associate professor of sociology and anthropology, attended an NEH summer seminar at Duke University on "Generations, Cycles, and Modernity." **Linda McMillin**, assistant professor of history, received an NEH travel grant in support of her research on medieval women's religious communities in Spain. **Susan Bowers**, associate professor of English, was selected as Visiting Scholar in Humanities at the University of Oregon. **Margaret Peeler**, assistant professor of biology, worked on a collaborative research project at Carnegie-Mellon University with the support of a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF). She also received an NSF grant for the purchase of a fluorescent microscope. **Neil Potter**, professor of chemistry, was the recipient of an NSF grant for the purchase of a mass spectrometer. A three-year research project in astrophysics with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, named NASA/JOVE, continued with **Fred Grosse**, professor of physics, traveling to Arizona along with student **Eric Zizelmann '93** to evaluate data from the moon's atmosphere using a ground-based telescope.

Consulting and Applied Research

One of the ways in which students gain valuable real-world experience is by assisting faculty who serve as consultants to regional business, government and industry. **Jerrell Habegger**, assistant professor of accounting, and **Edward Schwan**, professor and head of the accounting department, conducted a research project for Deloitte and Touche on the career paths of small-college versus large university graduates. The project was supported by a grant from the recently established Norman Walz faculty development fund.

Wallace Growney, professor of mathematical science and management, and head of the mathematical science department, supervised several Ben Franklin Partnership grants in 1990-91 which utilized faculty and student expertise in computer software development. **Cynthia Ratz '91** worked on behalf of Computada Services, Inc.; **Prem Janardhan '93** and **Elizabeth Schneider '93** for American Information Systems, Inc.; and **Jennifer Dubuc '91** collaborated with Associate Professor of Mathematical Sciences James Handlan on a project for Spruce Run Graphics Company.

Thomas McGrath, professor of chemistry, conducted research with several student assistants during the summer of 1991. Biochemistry majors **Patti Ollivier '93** and **Becky Valentine '93** were involved in research funded by Rohm and Haas Company, while **Michelle Kreger '93** worked on research for American Cynamid. Physics major **Eric Zizelmann '93** spent the summer at the University of Arizona assisting physics professors **Richard Kozlowski** and **Fred Grosse** analyze data from the moon's atmosphere. **Prem Janardhan '93**, who majors in physics, computer science and math, did research at Cornell University while **Melanie Williams '93** joined a research group at the State University of New York at Brockport.

Jack Holt, associate professor of biology, received a grant from AMOCO to survey and document the ecological systems of five lakes in central Pennsylvania. Geoscience major **Keith Morris '91** gained experience as a field and laboratory assistant to Degenstein Distinguished Professor of Environmental Science **Frank Fletcher** whose firm Environmetrics, Inc. conducts environmental audits for commercial and industrial clients in the area.

Research on Women

An informal research group was formed during 1990-91, to allow for exchange among faculty whose study focuses on women and related issues. Faculty with this scholarly emphasis include **Leona Martin**, assistant professor of Spanish, who chaired a session on Spanish American Women Authors for the Northeast Modern Language Association Conference; **Susan Bowers**, associate professor of English, who presented papers at several conferences on modern women poets and novelists; **Susan Albertine**, assistant professor of English, who published articles on American women publishers; **Linda McMillin**, assistant professor of history, continuing her research on religious women in medieval Spain; **Susan Hegberg**, who provided program notes and performed at the Second Annual Festival of Women Composers; and **Beverly Romberger**, assistant professor of speech communications, whose collaborative research with **Mary Cianni**, assistant professor of management, on the experience of women within a major Northeastern corporation was selected as a "Best Paper" by the American Academy of Management Annual Meeting.

The Arts Scene

The professional contributions of faculty in the fine arts were many and varied. **Valerie Livingston**, assistant professor and head of the art department, presented her research on American artist W. Elmer Schofield in articles, lectures, and a videotape made for New Jersey public television. Long-time members of the studio faculty in art, **David Lauer** (photography), **Dorothy Masom** (painting), and **Florence Putterman** (painting, printmaking, sculpture) had their work featured in regional and national exhibits. A twenty-year retrospective of Putterman's work was organized by Penn State University and traveled to other regional colleges and universities. Dorothy Masom was an invited speaker at the Third International Encaustic Art Convention and Show at Eastern Washington University.

Jack Fries, associate professor of music, completed a major composition in six parts for woodwinds, voice and piano, entitled "Six Sketches" which was given honorable mention at the Symposium for New Woodwind Quintet Music held at the University of Georgia (Athens). **R. Louis Rossman**, professor and head of the Department of Music, published articles and lectured on music pedagogy and served as consultant on collegiate affairs for the Music Educators National Conference, Southern Division. **Susan Hegberg**, associate professor of music and an accomplished organist, performed at several national conferences and served as secretary/treasurer of Region I of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. **Cyril Stretansky** is choral consultant for the board of International Music Festivals, and served as a choral and instrument adjudicator for festivals in Montreal and Philadelphia. He was also selected to participate in an international choral seminar at Cambridge University.

Honors and Awards

The 1991 Lindback Award for Excellence in Teaching went to **Jane Barlow**, professor of classical languages and a member of the Susquehanna faculty since 1954. The John C. Horn Award for Scholarship and Service was given to **Susan Albertine**, assistant professor of English. **Susan Bowers**, associate professor of English, was selected by a committee of faculty, alumni, students, and administrators to receive the Sears Roebuck Foundation Award for outstanding teaching and contribution to the quality of instruction at the University.

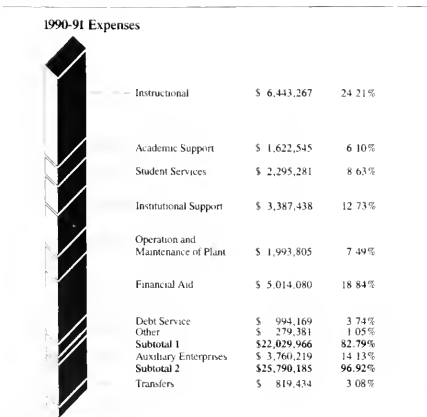

Notes to Financial Statements

I. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The significant accounting policies followed by Susquehanna University are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Accrual Basis

The financial statements of Susquehanna University have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the institution, the accounts of the institution are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the University's governing board. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized. While quasi-endowment funds have been established by the governing board for the same purpose as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment unrestricted funds may be expended for any purpose upon action of the governing board; likewise, quasi-endowment restricted funds may be expended, but in accordance with the purposes established by the original source of such funds.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other non-cash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables and similar assets is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment or similar funds, which is accounted for in the fund in which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in

the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Cash equivalents

The University considers certificates of deposit and other short-term savings instruments with original maturities of 30 days or less to be cash equivalents.

Reclassification

Prior year financial information has been reclassified to be comparable with current year presentation.

Total Columns on Financial Statements

Total columns on the balance sheet are captioned "Memorandum Only" to indicate that they are presented only to facilitate financial analysis. Such data is not comparable to a consolidation.

2. Investments

Investments are recorded at cost; investments received by gift are carried at market value at the date of acquisition. Quoted market values of investments of the funds indicated were as follows:

3. Endowment Fund

Assets of endowment funds, except those separately invested by donor request, were pooled on a market value basis beginning July 1, 1985. Under the market value basis each endowment fund purchases (or disposes) units in the pooled funds based on the market value of the pool at the time of purchase (disposal). Of the total units, each having a market value of approximately \$1.74, approximately 1,500,000 units were owned by unrestricted endowment, 12,300,000 by restricted endowment, 1,400,000 by quasi-endowment unrestricted, and 700,000 by quasi-endowment restricted at June 30, 1991. The cost of pooled endowment funds was \$24,261,686 as of June 30, 1991. The average annual yield per unit, exclusive of investment gains, was \$0.70 for the year ended June 30, 1991.

The University's spending policy regarding endowment income allows for spending endowment income to the lesser of actual yield from the previous calendar year or 5% of a three-year moving average of market value per unit of endowment fund investments. The spendable earnings are distributed to the units outstanding as of December 31 prior to the beginning of the fiscal year. The spendable earnings available for distribution to current funds during 1990-91 was \$0.61 per unit. The excess of actual yield over the policy's spending limit is shown as a non-mandatory transfer to the endowment fund for the years ended June 30, 1991 and June 30, 1990.

The University is the sole recipient of the income generated by certain trust funds held and administered by others. These funds are neither under the possession, nor under the control, of the University. The net income from these trusts amounted to approximately \$53,000 for each of the years ended June 30, 1991 and 1990.

During the year ended June 30, 1991, the University received current restricted fund bequests of \$132,341. These bequests were restricted and were transferred to quasi-endowment-restricted funds. At June 30, 1991, the cost of quasi-endowment unrestricted and quasi-endowment restricted funds totaled approximately \$3,100,000 and \$1,100,000, respectively.

The Housing-Dining-Student Center Bonds, bearing interest of 3% to 3.625%, require various annual principal payments. The approximate annual principal requirements range from \$73,000 for the year ending June 30, 1991 to \$103,000 for the year ended June 30, 2001. Annual principal payments decline after the year 2001 with final payments due June 30, 2011. Pursuant to the bond agreement, a Repair and Replacement fund is maintained.

The bonds and notes payable-PHEFA (Pennsylvania Higher Education Facilities Authority) require annual debt service payments of approximately \$351,000 including interest of approximately 6.7%. The PHEFA bonds were obtained to finance the construction of Blough-Weis Library and O.W. Houts Gymnasium.

During 1987 the University borrowed \$4,170,000 through the issuance of tax exempt bonds by the Snyder County Higher Education Authority (Refunding Series of 1987). The bonds are payable from sublease rentals which the University is obligated to pay to the Authority under leasing agreements between the two parties. The Authority has a secured interest in the unrestricted University net revenues and certain tangible property and equipment. The bonds mature in various amounts from 1993 to 2003 and bear interest ranging from 5.6% to 6.95%. Annual debt service payments range from \$272,000 to \$571,000 over the life of the bonds.

During 1990 the University borrowed \$8,500,000 through the issuance of tax-exempt revenue bonds by the Pennsylvania Higher Educational Facilities Authority (Series of 1990). The Authority has a secured interest in the unrestricted gross revenues of the University and certain tangible property and equipment. The bonds were issued to finance the costs of capital projects relating to certain academic and residence facilities on the University campus as further described in Note 8. The bonds mature in various amounts from 1991 to 2005 and bear interest ranging from 5.90% to 7.15%. The bonds require annual debt service payments of approximately \$925,000 over the life of the bonds.

The debt agreements described above also require certain debt service reserves and reserves for renewals and replacements. These reserves totaled \$1,982,478 at June 30, 1991 and are held by trustees or the debt issuer.

5. Property, Plant and Equipment

During 1991, Susquehanna University adopted the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 93, Recognition of Depreciation by Not-for-Profit Organizations, which requires the recording of depreciation of long-lived tangible assets. Also, the University made certain adjustments to its accounting records to reflect the results of an inventory of plant assets taken during the year.

Accordingly, investment in plant fund balance as of July 1, 1990 has been adjusted as follows:

Property, plant and equipment are generally stated at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts. Significant improvements or betterments are capitalized. All University assets are depreciated under the straight line method of depreciation.

6. Retirement Plan

For eligible employees, the University makes defined contributions to a national teachers' retirement plan which is administered by an independent organization. Total pension expense related to this plan amounted to approximately \$509,000 for the year ended June 30, 1991.

7. Pledges

Pledges totaling approximately \$5,100,000 are due to be collected over the next several years. The pledges have resulted from a capital campaign initiated by the University in 1987.

8. Commitments

The University has developed a capital investment plan to be completed by August 1992. The capital investment plan will be financed with gifts, grants, and internally designated funds, as well as the \$8,500,000 PHEFA bond proceeds, described in Note 4. Of the bond monies distributed to the University, 90% must be expended by March 1992 or the University will face a repayment penalty.

As part of the capital investment plan, the University has entered into a construction contract to renovate and expand the Degenstein Campus Center. Total costs of construction and equipment are estimated to aggregate \$5,330,000, which will be financed by a combination of gifts and unexpended plant funds. The project is scheduled for completion by the fall of 1992. As of June 30, 1991 approximately \$110,000 has been expended for this project.

During a year in which national and world events had a pronounced adverse effect on the economy, Susquehanna is especially grateful for having received such outstanding financial support.

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1990-91: The Year in Giving

Susquehanna's generous alumni and friends ensured another successful year for the University in 1990-91. Gifts totaling \$5,544,280 made this the third best year ever for fund-raising support, and reflected outstanding loyalty and support amid times of acute economic uncertainty.

As of June 30, 1991, Susquehanna had received over \$32.4 million in gifts and pledges toward the five-year *Window of Opportunity* campaign—nearly 50 percent more than the \$22 million goal.

The campaign's impact on Susquehanna and its programs continues to be felt across campus. The latest example is the Charles B. Degenstein Campus Center expansion and renovation project for which ground was broken in May 1991. Scheduled for completion in the fall of 1992, the expanded facility will include a new 450-seat "teaching" theater and an art gallery.

Window of Opportunity provided vital endowment funds in 1990-91, as well. Susquehanna's endowment, a prime indicator of its academic strength, has grown by 242 percent in the past five years, from \$8,807,568 to \$30,756,298 as of June 30, 1991. Twelve new endowed funds were established this past year.

In 1990-91, gifts to the Susquehanna University Fund, which provides vital operating support, totaled \$1,023,988. Alumni participation was almost 34 percent and parent support exceeded 32 percent. Board members contributed 17 percent of the dollars raised. The SUF is expected to surpass its five-year campaign goal of \$4.5 million by \$500,000.

Contributing to the success of the SUF during 1990-91 were:

- the work of the National Committee on Annual Giving, chaired by Donald E. Wissinger '50;
- the local Business and Industry Campaign, led by Marvin Rudnitsky, which secured over 130 gifts for a total of \$98,500;
- the Parents Executive Committee, which was chaired by John and Nancy Locke and raised gifts totaling \$44,100 for the Blough-Weis Library;

■ Senior Class Agent David Battisti directing the Class of 1991 through a successful Senior Class Pledge Program; and

■ over 400 student volunteers, led by Vicki Wilt '91, Karen Rosner '91 and Suzy Bianco '92, who raised \$157,280 in pledges for the Susquehanna University Fund. These dedicated volunteers telephoned 7,913 alumni and parents in just 33 nights.

Support during 1990-91 came from many other University friends, as well, including the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, which gave Susquehanna a generous gift of computer equipment valued at \$90,000.

Alumni celebrating milestone reunions also remembered Susquehanna University in generous fashion during Alumni Weekend in June. The Class of 1941 established an unrestricted endowment fund in the amount of \$22,060 in commemoration of its 50th reunion.

This was the first year in which the class celebrating its 40th reunion made a special gift to Susquehanna. The Class of 1951 started this new tradition in great style by presenting a check for \$60,440 to the University at the Alumni Awards Luncheon.

Finally, on the occasion of its 25th reunion, the Class of 1966 contributed \$25,329. Gifts from the Classes of '66 and '51 supported the Susquehanna University Fund.

This report lists only those cash gifts received in the 1990-91 fiscal year. After Susquehanna officially closes the books on *Window of Opportunity* in June 1992, the University will issue a special report that will include a final and complete listing of all campaign donors.

The University's future clearly lies with its alumni and friends, and with their continued support Susquehanna can reach even higher levels of excellence. For those who have given generously this year, Susquehanna is indeed grateful. Thank you.

Window of Opportunity Campaign

Dear Friends of Susquehanna:

What do you remember from March 1988?

A short list might include: postage increasing from 22 to 25 cents on a first-class letter, Donald Trump buying the Plaza Hotel in New York for \$390 million, a movie called "Moonstruck," and escalating tension south of the U.S. border in Panama.

If you were to ask me what I remember from March 1988, I know that somewhere in my response would be the words "anticipation" and "fear."

Why?

On March 26, 1988, we launched *Window of Opportunity: The Campaign for Susquehanna*. It was a beautiful evening and one whose mission was to deliver a strong charge to all of us: that the opportunities before Susquehanna were great, but that they would only be realized if alumni, parents and friends of the University stepped forward to fund them with their own significant financial support.

The Board of Directors had studied the opportunities and worked hard to develop a program that would engender the support needed to succeed. We on the Campaign Steering Committee had done the planning we believed would allow us to achieve the ambitious goals that had been set.

As we came to Evert Dining Hall that evening, we did so with excitement, with high spirits, and with great anticipation for what lay ahead. And, of course, with fear.

While we had done our homework to the best of our ability, the fact remained that this was an entirely new journey for Susquehanna. Who really knew how this *Window of Opportunity* program would be received by the Susquehanna family? Did our objectives match up with those of so many other individuals who also cared about the University? Could we really raise the seemingly enormous figure of \$22 million that would enable us to meet the challenges we had outlined?

Those questions—and others—cast a palpable uncertainty over our endeavor. Could we do it?

Susquehanna, of course *has* risen to meet the challenges with a surge of institutional adrenaline that continues today. A quick look around campus provides visible evidence that Susquehanna is alive with activity. Our students, our faculty and our staff have seized this moment and have helped raise the University to a new level of excellence in higher education, I believe. My ability to report to you campaign commitments totaling \$32.7 million—nearly \$11 million more than the target we set in March 1988—is clear proof that the one word we will forever associate with *Window of Opportunity* at Susquehanna is "success."

Perhaps there is a moral here: that fear, indeed, can be a wonderful motivator. Whether or not you shared my feeling 3-1/2 years ago, you probably at least questioned how Susquehanna would ever accomplish what it was setting out to do. The fact that so many of us have answered the call suggests that our University has a unique inner strength which has enabled it to position itself in eager anticipation—rather than fear—of its future. This is especially encouraging in a time which has presented difficult and threatening obstacles to all of private higher education.

Thank you for keeping Susquehanna a priority in your life, and for helping ensure that it will continue to be important in the lives of students and faculty here for many years.

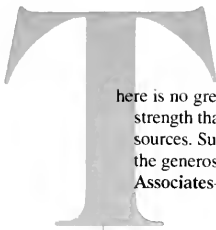

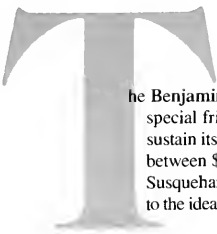

Endowment Funds at Susquehanna

Susquehanna is pleased to list the following endowed funds established during 1990-91. These funds represent a continuation of the exceptional growth in endowment over the last five years. The generosity of the individuals establishing these funds is deeply appreciated. The future of the University remains promising as the endowment continues to increase:

The Nancy A. Cairns Scholarship Fund was established in 1990 under the Will of Nancy A. Cairns. The income from this fund will provide scholarships for Susquehanna University students majoring in French.

The James M. '28 and Twila C. '30 Herold Scholarship Fund was endowed by Mr. Herold in honor of his wife's memory. Income from this endowment is to be awarded annually to well-qualified students with financial need, in accordance with University financial aid policies. In selecting Herold Scholars, preference will be given to students from Selinsgrove Area High School and Snyder County, Pennsylvania.

The Wagner Scholarship Fund was established under the Will of Gereon W. Salevan '29 in memory of her parents, Dr. and Mrs. Milton E. Wagner, and her brother, Seneca M. Wagner. Income from this fund will provide scholarship aid to worthy but needy students, with a preference given to those interested in pre-medical studies and careers in science.

The Salevan Scholarship Fund was established under the Will of Gereon W. Salevan '29 in memory of Gereon W.

Salevan and her husband, T. Marshall Salevan. Income from this fund will provide scholarship aid to worthy but needy students, with a preference given to those students interested in pre-medical studies and careers in science.

The Wainwright Family Scholarship Fund was established in 1990 by Mr. and Mrs. Mark H. Wainwright Jr. in honor of their daughter, Gig Wainwright, a member of the Class of 1990. Income from this fund is to be awarded to students who have achieved junior or senior standing, with preference given to students who are environmental science majors.

The Helen B. Russell Library Fund was established in 1990 through a bequest from the estate of Helen B. Russell. Income from this fund will be restricted to the purchase of library books relating to the fields of English and Social Sciences.

The Elizabeth Evans Zeigler '77 Scholarship Fund was established in 1990 in memory of Elizabeth by her mother, Mrs. Blodwen A. Zagler and by other members of her family. Elizabeth majored in communications and theater arts and was a member of the Class of 1977. Income from this fund will provide scholarship support to deserving students showing academic promise and financial need, with a preference given to students majoring in communications or theater arts.

The Beatrice V. Bowman Endowment Fund was created in 1990 through the Will of Beatrice V. Bowman. The fund is a memorial to Emory T. Bowman, Daisy M. Bowman and Robert T. Bowman '47. The income from this fund is to be used at the discretion of the University to support the history and literature departments.

The Buss Family Scholarship was endowed in honor and memory of Clara D. and William C. Buss of Sunbury, Pennsylvania, by their sons, Dr. Claude A. Buss '24 and Dr. William Ceryl Buss '28, and their grandson, Dr. William Claude Buss of Northumberland,

Pennsylvania, and Reolands, California, to commemorate Clara and William's unwavering belief in the importance of education in their family's future, and the role that Susquehanna played in the lives of their children and their children's children.

In awarding the scholarship, the University shall give preference to American-born, academically-able students of high moral standards who have financial need, and who are focusing their studies in the liberal arts, music, or pre-medical programs.

The Ronald Goodman '54 Scholarship Fund was established in 1990 through Mr. Goodman's Will. Income from this fund shall be used to provide financial assistance to needy students, with first preference being given to students majoring in music.

The Class of 1941 Unrestricted Endowment Fund was established by the members of the Class of 1941 in commemoration of the 50th reunion of their graduation from Susquehanna University, and will provide a lasting remembrance of the Class of 1941. Income from the fund will be used to support the University's highest priority needs.

The J. Paul H. ('63) and Mildred F. Hively Scholarship Fund was established in 1991 through the generosity of Mrs. Mildred F. Hively in accordance with the wishes of her husband, Dr. J. Paul H. Hively. Susquehanna University awarded Dr. Hively the degree of doctor of humane letters in 1963 for his contribution of time, talents and money to many humanitarian causes. This scholarship is a reflection of the unwavering belief in the importance of education and the knowledge of the financial challenges confronting many students. Income from this fund will provide scholarship aid for financially deserving students.

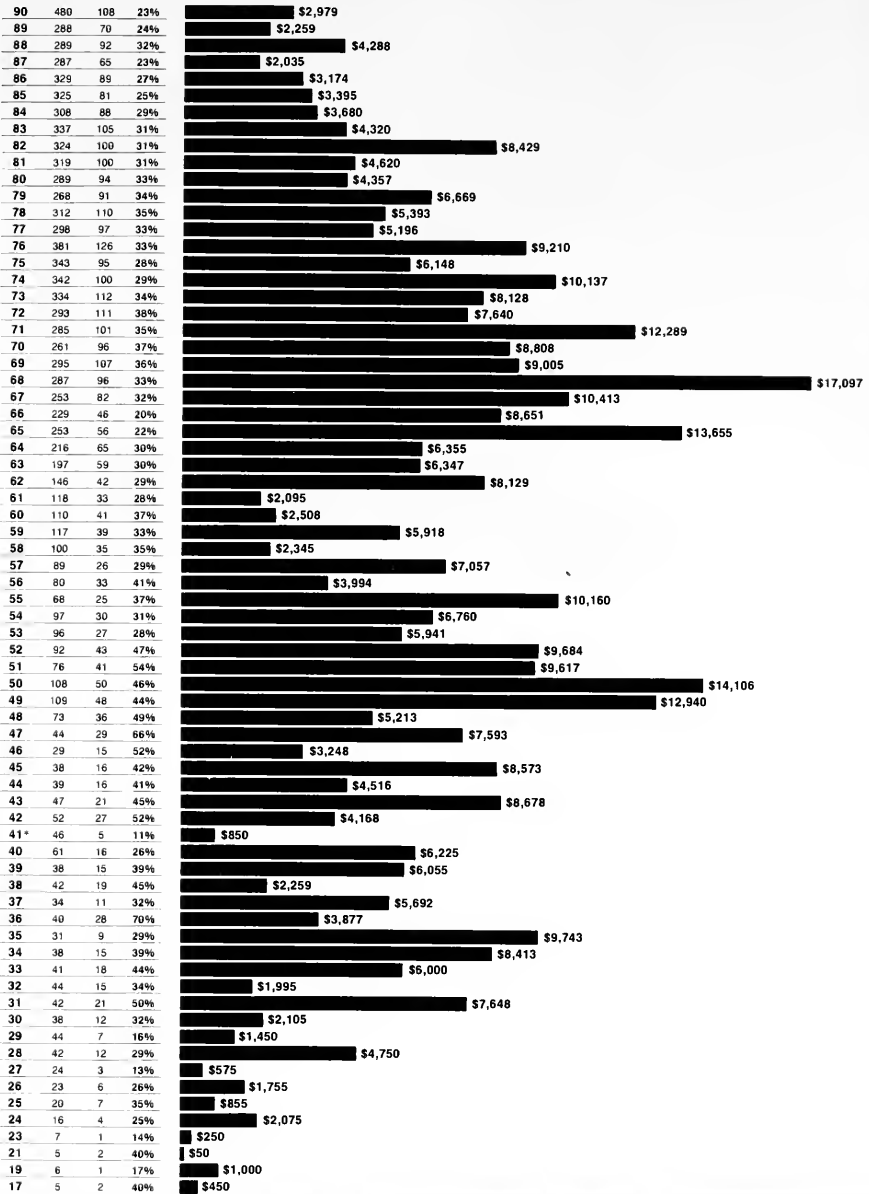

COST VS PRICE VS VALUE

Coping with College Sticker Shock

Y

ou're reviewing a college catalog and you get to the bottom line in the costs description.

Your first reaction is:

- Why is the price so high?
- How can we afford it?
- Is it worth it?
- All of the above.

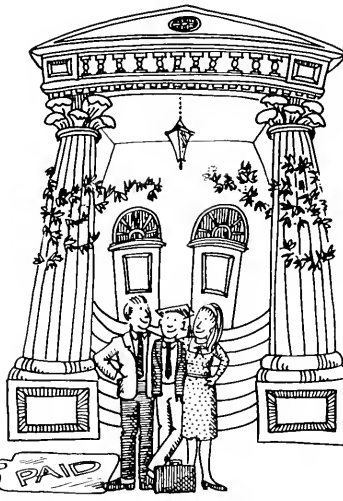
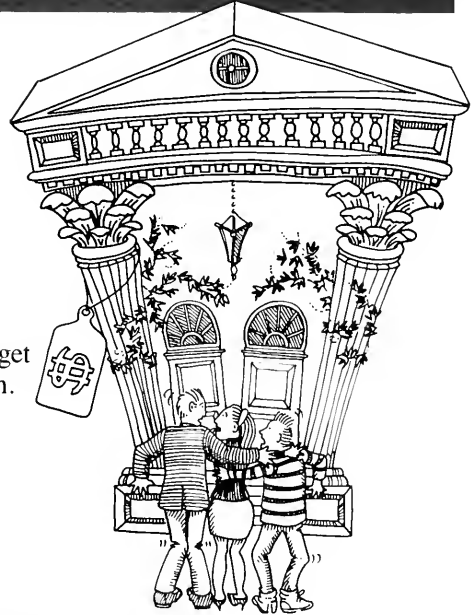
If these questions sound familiar, you have lots of company. Many people, even those in higher income brackets, are concerned about the high price of college education.

But a little knowledge can help you cope with college price sticker shock.

Try considering what the bottom line doesn't tell you: Your out-of-pocket cost after financial aid, the actual cost to the institution to provide that education, and the value of the college experience as preparation for life.

Consider the good news for Susquehanna students and their families: The pool of money available for financial aid is growing. The market value of the University's endowment has grown steadily to \$30.7 million in 1991 from \$8.8 million just five years earlier. Endowment income more than doubled from 1989 to 1991. And a slowing trend in tuition hikes fueled by vigorous efforts to control costs may make a Susquehanna education a better choice than ever for students and families seeking the best return for their educational dollar.

"We've come to be known as a solid undergraduate university because we made a conscious decision to focus on quality. But today that's really not enough. We also have to focus on giving good value with that quality," explains Sara Kirkland, vice president for University Relations.

"Seeking the best possible balance between the resources needed to achieve a first quality education and the burden that these fees put on students and their families is one of the real challenges facing strong colleges today," says Susquehanna President Joel Cunningham.

Susquehanna fee increases of more than nine percent annually in 89-90 and 90-91 slowed to less than six percent in 91-92. The University is also taking active steps to keep tuition and fees down by increasing other sources of revenues and trimming costs where possible.

The efforts are aimed at keeping Susquehanna University doing what it does best: providing a first-rate four-year undergraduate education. A demanding core curriculum helps students broaden experiences and develop critical thinking and communicating skills. Small classes, personal attention, and well-maintained facilities contribute to an atmosphere that nurtures learning. A strong commitment to career preparation provides the

skills, experience and guidance to successfully launch graduates into careers or graduate school. Such benefits attract students who clearly find a Susquehanna education "worth it."

Other signs also demonstrate value. A spring 1991 survey reported high and rising student satisfaction in key areas. Students rated faculty, academic programs, science and library facilities, and the academic ability of their peers even higher than five years earlier.

U.S. News & World Report, Barron's 300: Best Buys in College Education, Yale's The Insider's Guide to the Colleges, and Newsday have all recently reported favorably on the University. Despite a shrinking number of 18-year-olds nationally, inquiries, interviews, and applications at Susquehanna are increasing.

Many of those students who choose Susquehanna will find the cost—what they will be expected to pay—is lower than the University's price—the comprehensive tuition and fees total. A broad-based program of financial aid in the form of grants, loans, student employment and scholarships spells the very important difference. More than 55 percent of Susquehanna's nearly 1,400 students received some form of financial assistance last year.

As needs rise, Susquehanna is digging deeper than ever before into financial aid pockets. Costs of financial assistance grew 166 percent in 90-91 and an additional 21.4 percent this year to help fund a \$4.5 million aid package. To get first-hand information on a variety of options, students and families should contact the University's Office of Financial Aid early in the admissions application process.

In addition to direct financial aid, the University also subsidizes student tuitions indirectly. The expenditures most schools must make to educate and serve students are significantly higher than tuition and fees. For every \$70 Susquehanna collects in revenues from students, an additional \$30 comes from gifts and grants, investment income, endowment income, and auxiliary enterprises.

But higher education is an expensive proposition, and it's likely to get even more expensive. Talented faculty require competitive salaries. Goods and

services from lab equipment to utilities and insurance are increasingly expensive. Demand for student services is growing. All these factors and more contribute to education cost boosts that have been outpacing the rise in the consumer price index.

Dealing with that reality requires increasingly creative and aggressive strategies. Last fall, more than 150 faculty and staff members from across the campus participated in a series of discussion sessions to generate income-increasing and cost-trimming ideas.

"The effort produced a large number of suggestions," explains Joel Cunningham. "Some of the ideas were more symbolic than substantive.

and some will not work very well, but we also heard some very valuable ways to reduce expenses and raise revenues."

The exercise augmented an annual process that begins long before the Board of Directors votes on tuition rates. It begins, in fact, before the doors open for the fall semester. The process focuses not only on preliminary budgets for the year ahead, but also on analysis of alternative models based on projected enrollment, financial aid patterns and salaries.

It launches the delicate balancing act of supporting

educational programs, maintaining physical resources, and attracting and retaining talented faculty, staff, and students. Each key component must contribute to an atmosphere designed to nurture learning.

While budget questions are somewhat the same from year to year, the answers to those questions vary considerably. "This year, the answers are colored by the economic situation in the country, particularly in our region," explains Cunningham.

Difficult choices become even more difficult "as certain expenses rise uncomfortably," he points out. For Susquehanna, as most institutions, one of those uncomfortable expenses is health insurance. Rapid increases in that category alone have driven fringe benefits up 21 percent in the current year.

Faculty salaries are traditionally one of the strongest driving forces in higher education budgets. "The essence of the value in an undergraduate education is the interaction between faculty and students," stresses Dean of Academic Affairs Jeanne Neff. "The ability to attract faculty who are enthusiastic about teaching and supporting the work of students is critical to our mission."

Eighty percent of the Susquehanna faculty have doctorates and considerable classroom experience, but the average annual salary is below \$40,000. To provide competitive salaries, the University actively pursues a goal of setting salaries at the 80th percentile of four-year undergraduate schools around the country. Faculty and staff salaries at Susquehanna rose on average 6.5 percent during 90-91 but slowed to an average 3.5 percent in 91-92.

Other major budget factors include the costs of keeping up with expanding knowledge and increasingly sophisticated tools of knowledge. Price increases for instructional and scientific equipment and library books regularly outpace inflation. Advances in computer capabilities dictate frequent upgrades for instructional, administrative and student use.

Demand for student services, from enhanced career development and placement to public safety and security measures, is also increasing. For example, Susquehanna has recently expanded its counseling staff and provides specialized counseling programs to meet needs such as drug and alcohol abuse prevention.

"People are coming to expect that their needs will be met," explains Dorothy Anderson, dean of students. And, adds Anderson, not only do people expect more, but government regulation requires more. The University budget must regularly absorb the costs of state and federal regulations. Two prime examples include providing equal access to the handicapped and labeling laboratory supplies as required by Right to Know laws.

Capital projects require funds to improve both the living and learning atmosphere at the University. The success of the recent Window of Opportunity capital campaign, and growth in both the annual fund and endowment, fuel improvements and reflect a vote of confidence from University friends and benefactors.

The University's current five-year capital program, started in 87-88, targeted \$17.9 million for renovation and expansion of Fisher Science

This policy is in compliance with the requirements of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, regulations of the Internal Revenue Service, and all other applicable Federal, State and local statutes, ordinances, and regulations.

Continental-Susquehanna Link Spells Opportunity

Susquehanna students have gained yet another competitive edge in the job market, thanks to a successful Susquehanna graduate who helped forge a link between his company, the Continental Corporation, and the Sigmund Weis School of Business.

Continental has designated Susquehanna University as one of its ten executive schools nationwide and has awarded the University two annual scholarships on the recommendation of **Wayne Fisher**, a 1966 alumnus and executive vice president of the company.

Susquehanna becomes the first Pennsylvania school to join Continental's exclusive group, sharing the honor with such institutions as Princeton, William and Mary, and Rutgers University.

New York City-based Continental, the parent company of Continental Insurance, chooses the executive schools to help focus recruiting efforts on top-notch students, says Fisher.

"Each year, Continental hires about 150 college students right out of school for our employee training program," explains Fisher. "It's difficult for students to find jobs out of college and to narrow their focus to top companies, and it's equally difficult for us to go through the extraordinary influx of graduates each year and get only quality individuals.

"By designating executive schools like Susquehanna, Continental knows that it's working with institutions from which it can select the best and the brightest," he adds. "It's a win situation for the students, because they can be assured that we'll be looking very carefully at students from Susquehanna, as with those from other executive schools. Likewise, we get the advantage of being able to hire from among the best."

The Continental program bases selection of

executive schools on quality of academic programs and performance of graduates already working for Continental. Senior Continental executives who select an individual school for executive status also manage relations with that institution.

"We've hired a lot of graduates from Susquehanna in the past, and they've done very well here," Fisher said. "That played into the selection of Susquehanna as an executive school."

Fisher said that Continental will recruit from among all majors. "We do hire history and science majors," he said, "but Susquehanna's Sigmund Weis School of Business is an ideal place to focus our efforts."

Besides hiring Susquehanna students from all

academic disciplines, Continental will annually award scholarships to two Susquehanna students. The scholarships go to University-selected students who have maintained at least a 3.0 grade point average (GPA) and have demonstrated an interest in business. Selected students must display leadership qualities either in the classroom or through extra-curricular activities.

Susquehanna's first two Continental Scholarship winners are **Katharine H. Morris** of Rocky Hills, N.J., and **Douglas A. Boedecker** of Southampton, Pa. Morris, daughter of Helen and Robert Morris of Rocky Hills, is a senior psychology major with a 3.06 GPA. Boedecker, son of Gloria and Roy Boedecker of Southampton, is a senior accounting major with a 3.81 GPA.

The relationship demonstrates "that Susquehanna is genuinely interested in placing its students," said Morris. "The students are benefitting in every way. We gain both the connections and the interview skills that the people from Continental will help us develop."

Continental representatives visited Susquehanna last fall to present tips on job-seeking and interviewing skills. The corporation intends to sponsor such presentations each year. In addition, Fisher will visit Susquehanna this spring to participate in the Sigmund Weis School of Business executive-in-residence program.

"The relationship with Continental offers a great opportunity for students," said Dick Hess, the University's director of career development and placement. "They learn about working in their field of interest. And Continental brings in the applied, practical aspects of the working business world, which merge with the theoretical aspects taught in the classroom. So everybody gains something."

Hall, renovation of four residence halls, and major improvements to three academic halls. Another recent project fully automated the Blough-Weis Library's catalog and circulation system. An in-progress \$5 million addition to the Charles B. Degenstein Campus Center will add an art gallery and a 450-seat theater for dramatic and musical performances.

"Our major renovations will be followed by a period of careful maintenance—a good deal less expensive, but nevertheless very important," says Cunningham. "We need to protect our resources to avoid the serious deferred maintenance problems that plague so many colleges and universities."

But top-notch faculty, academic equipment and programs, and buildings are not the only reflections of an institution's value. Another key is in the students themselves. "The students contribute to one another in an atmosphere of mutual support," stresses Jeanne Neff.

"There's no guarantee that a student will come here and thrive, but the odds are high that they will benefit greatly from being part of this academic

community for four years," says Joel Cunningham. "The odds are quite good that it will make a positive difference in their lives and serve them well."

Steps that strengthen Susquehanna's ability to attract and serve first-rate students can only add value to the overall educational experience. "We have to maintain our momentum," stresses Kirkland. "This place has to keep getting better."

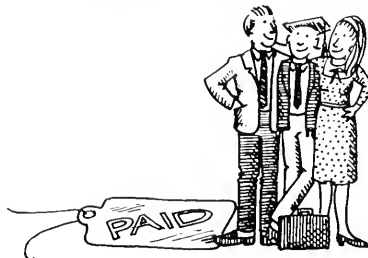
Phonathon Produces 2,000 Pledges

Susquehanna in The News

Good news travels fast, and for Susquehanna University this academic year it's traveled in the pages of *U.S. News & World Report*, *Newsday*, and *USA Today*, as well as in a live, on-campus interview on *Good Morning America*.

Susquehanna kicked off the 1991 academic year with a prized listing as "one of the top regional universities in the nation;" in *U.S. News & World Report's* annual America's best colleges issue ranking Susquehanna eleventh among regional universities in the North. It was the fourth time the annual best colleges issue included Susquehanna.

New York's *Newsday* also cited Susquehanna University in an article titled "Best Bets of a Bunch of Top-Flight Schools." The Long Island newspaper, assessing schools within a day's drive of the New York metropolitan area, cited colleges it said could deliver "high-quality at a less-than-expected cost."

An ABC-TV network camera crew came to campus in late September for a *Good Morning America* interview with University President Joel Cunningham. Historic Seibert Hall, home of the Sigmund Weis School of Business, flashed across national television screens as Cunningham, also president of Sigma Chi international fraternity, spoke on the hazards of fraternity hazing.

Director of Financial Aid Helen Nunn was quoted in the November 14 issue of *USA Today*. Nunn participated in the *USA Today/CASE Financial Aid/Admissions Hotline* held in Virginia by answering telephone calls for a four-hour shift. She was quoted when she answered the following question from a student in Oklahoma: "As an African-American student, can I get more aid from an interracial college?" Nunn's response: "Traditional colleges are competing with



each other to increase diversity on their campuses, and may offer more aid to minority students."

Dec. 7's national semifinal football game against Ithaca gave Susquehanna a healthy dose of national attention. Among the most notable media to focus on the game: *USA Today* included a full game analysis in its weekend edition the day before the game; *The New York Times* ran a full article previewing the game; ESPN—the national all-sports cable network—included scoring updates and game recaps on its college football report, as did ABC television. During the broadcast of the Stagg Bowl, ESPN gave a brief history of the Staggs' days at Susquehanna.

Business professor Bill Sauer's tips for how to avoid overspending when shopping for the Christmas holiday appeared in a variety of newspapers in late November/early December.

Galt Award Honors High School Teachers

Ever wish you could conjure up a special recognition for a teacher who has made a special difference in your high school career?

Academically talented Susquehanna University students got the chance to do just that recently. They nominated former high school teachers for a new University-sponsored teaching award. Three Pennsylvania high school teachers captured the honors in the debut year of the Russell Galt Award for Outstanding Teaching at the Secondary Level.

The first recipients are William G. Crossant, a music teacher at Huntingdon Area High School; Robert Yudinsky, a social studies teacher at Shenandoah Area High School; and Rosalie Aten, an English teacher at Berwick Area High School.

The award focuses attention on the important role secondary school teachers play in preparing students for college-level study. It also reflects the University faculty's strong belief that teachers serve as mentors and partners to help students develop educationally and personally.

The winners were nominated by Susquehanna University Scholars, students who earned at least a 3.4 grade point average in each semester of the previous academic year. Educators received their awards at the school's annual Scholars Recognition Dinner in November.

Susquehanna named the new award for the late Dr. Russell Galt, who served as dean of the University from 1938 to 1959. Widely respected in educational circles, Dr. Galt was also an expert on problems in the Near East. He had been a visiting professor at St. Lawrence University and dean of American University in Cairo, Egypt, for 17 years before coming to Susquehanna.

IN MEMORIAM • Jane Conrad Apple • 1922-1991



Jane Conrad Apple, a dedicated and dear friend of Susquehanna University, died on Sunday, October 13, 1991. She had served as a member of the University's board of directors and its Academic Affairs Committee since 1978.

Miss Apple also served as assistant secretary on the board of directors of Butter Krust Baking Company and was a member of the board of directors of the Apple Foundation and the Packwood House Museum. She was a charter member of the board of the G. Scott and Bessie K. Guyer Foundation. She had also served as a member of the board of directors of the John R. Kauffman Library in Sunbury.

In 1980, the Apple Foundation provided a generous gift to establish the Apple-Zimmerman Fund for Elizabethan Studies at Susquehanna in honor of Miss Apple, an Elizabethan literature scholar, and her sister, Joan Apple Zimmerman.

This fund makes it possible to bring renowned scholars and performers in the field of Elizabethan studies to the Susquehanna campus, and to increase library holdings related to the period.

Miss Apple's love for special books, and for Susquehanna, led to the creation in 1989 of the Jane Conrad Apple Room for Rare Books and Special Collections in the Blough-Weis Library. Her personal generosity and that of her family and friends made this room a reality.

Born in Sunbury, Miss Apple received a bachelor of arts degree in history and English from Bucknell University in 1944, a diploma from the Katharine Gibbs School in 1945, and a master of arts degree in history from Bucknell in 1965.

Miss Jane Apple, a wonderful and vital friend of the Susquehanna University community, will be greatly missed.

Crusaders Charge to Final Four

The Susquehanna football team rewrote school history this season as it charged all the way to the final four in the National College Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III playoffs.

It marks the school's first time ever in the national semifinals, as well as the longest season ever. Finishing on December 7 with an impressive 11-2 record, the team tied with the 1986 squad for the most wins in Susquehanna's 99-year football history.

The stellar season gave local fans plenty of opportunities to cheer the team on. The Crusaders played at home in two out of their three post-season playoff games, including an exciting last-quarter victory over arch-rival Lycoming to clinch the South region championship. The win avenged an earlier 35-31 loss to Lycoming, last year's NCAA Division III national runner-up.

The Crusaders, in only their second season under Head Coach Steve Briggs, attracted national attention in their quest. Besides getting coverage from *The New York Times* and *USA Today*, Susquehanna finished the season ranked in the top five teams in the nation and the top three in the East.

Several team members excelled both on and off the field. Jeff Rainess, a senior safety from Dover, N.J., joined only 49 other players from across the country as a national Academic All-American. A business administration major with a 3.83 grade point average, Rainess completed his season with a total of 54 tackles—nine of them for losses—and two interceptions.

Rainess and junior halfback George Day earned spots on the GTE District II Academic All-American team and the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) all-academic team. Day, an accounting major from Auburn, Pa., with a 3.82 grade point average, racked up 15 kickoff returns

for 270 yards, rushing gains of 202 yards, and a whopping per-carry average of 11.9.

The team also had three All-Americans. Glenn Davis, a senior offensive tackle from West Windsor, N.J., made the second team. Davis started in all 13 games and led the league's best offensive line.

Junior inside linebacker Andy Watkins of Forty-fort Pa., made the All-American third team. Watkins, who led the team in tackles for the second straight season, was named national defensive player of the week for his performance in the November 2 game.

Honorable mention ranking went to Cory Mabry, senior cornerback from Pottsville, Pa., who led the team in interceptions to become the school's all-time interception leader with a total of 29, including those made in the national playoffs.

Thirteen Susquehanna gridgers made the all-MAC teams, giving the University the most all-conference performers this season of any school in the MAC.

While a fall to the formidable Ithaca College Bombers broke this year's playoff fever, the team is already looking ahead to 1992. Many of the players who built the current strength, including the quarterback and most of the backfield, will return to help shape an exciting new season.

Crew, Field Hockey, Volleyball Excel



Susquehanna's fall sports success wasn't limited to the football field. The women's volleyball team narrowly missed a playoff spot, finishing with a solid 18-13 record. The field hockey team finished a win away from reaching the Middle Atlantic Conference playoffs, improving its record to 7-5-1 this past season.

On the water, the University's crew teams marked their first season with a full-time coach, Mark Fuller, by making a super showing at the Frostbite Regatta on the Schuylkill River in Philadelphia. Competing against 37 other schools, including Villanova, Columbia, George Washington University, the University of Pennsylvania and Notre Dame, the Susquehanna men earned a spot in the finals and finished eighth in the Men's Novice Eight. Susquehanna women also advanced to the finals in the Women's Novice Eight competition attracting 36 teams.



Homecoming '91 also marked the 40th reunion of the 1951 Crusader football team, one of Susquehanna's best. This squad posted a perfect 6-0-0 record and was led by the legendary coaches Amos Alonzo Stagg Sr. and Jr.



Winter Sports Show Promise

Looking ahead, Susquehanna anticipates an exciting campaign from its men's and women's basketball teams, its wrestling team and its swim teams.

The spotlight is already on the women's basketball team, off to a 6-2 start. Eleven of the 12 players who led the Crusaders to the National College Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III tournament a year ago are under the net for Susquehanna again. The University won its first national playoff contest last season and advanced to the nation's final 16.

Junior guard **Kristie Maravelli** is teaming up with junior forwards **Liz Nicodemus** and **Amy McCord** as Susquehanna tries to make it back to the national tournament. A talented trio of freshmen on the women's team ensures the Crusaders will be a force in the conference—and possibly the nation—for several years.

The men's basketball team, also off to a 7-3 start, returns seven players as it looks to make the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) playoffs after falling just one game short last season. Senior guard **Craig Harper** has a good chance to eclipse the 1,000-point mark this season. He will spearhead the Crusaders' efforts to climb back to the top of the conference. Junior forwards **Joe Stroup** and **Jim Mikolaichik** will give Harper the support he needs under the basket.

On the mats, Susquehanna wrestlers also look to improve upon last season. It won't be easy, since the Crusader grapplers of 1990-91 set an all-time school record with 12 victories. But junior **Andy Watkins**, who finished third in the nation among Division III 190-pounders last year, is back for another crack at it.

Susquehanna swimmers look to make an even bigger splash in 1991-92 after a successful campaign a year ago. Both the men's and women's teams finished with a 6-4 record in 1990-1991.

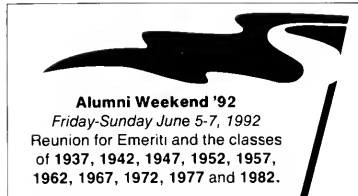

This instrument is used primarily to separate and analyze organic compounds and to analyze gases. The important research instrument is also a valuable learning tool in several courses.

Susquehanna University's Computing Center has received a grant from the **National Science Foundation** to fund the connection of the University's computers to the National Science Foundation Network.

The network, consisting of approximately 6,000 computers worldwide, enables the University's researchers to interact with colleagues from other universities and gives Susquehanna's students and faculty access to automated data bases, such as those in libraries at other universities.

Plugging into the power of consortia

They can help a Susquehanna student research a term paper, volunteer, experience diverse cultures, or find a job. They help faculty and staff gain opportunities to teach or study abroad, and to share ideas and exchange information with colleagues from other schools.

"They" are our ties to consortia and similar external partnerships. And they can enhance a Susquehanna education by stretching dollars, access to services and information, the ability to provide a multicultural environment, and the University's influence in educational circles and the community.

Often no more visible than names on letterheads, these intangible, but invaluable, connections create a dynamic synergy. Educational institutions working together can accomplish goals that might be impossible on their own.

Many are alliances that cost little or nothing in actual dollars. The primary contribution for most is faculty and staff time—a sweat equity that can produce big results.

Some consortia directly expand opportunities for students. As a member of the Lutheran College Consortium, as an affiliate of the Washington Center for internships, and as a participant in the Washington Semester at American University, Susquehanna is able to offer students a wide variety of work and study options in the nation's capital. The Office of Career Development and Placement actively participates in several regional consortia to expand student access to potential employers.

Affiliation with some other networks is consortial in spirit though not in name. Pennsylvania Campus Compact, its offshoot Susquehanna-Lincoln University partnership, and the Central Susquehanna Intermediate

Unit serving regional elementary and high schools, provide important community service opportunities for students and faculty.

"Susquehanna has a very strong tradition of student volunteerism," says University President Joel Cunningham. "Through Campus Compact we are spreading our influence and helping others, and also enriching the lives of our own students."

As an active member of the Associated College Libraries of Central Pennsylvania (ACLCP), Susquehanna can offer students not only reciprocal borrowing privileges at other member libraries but also computerized access to information in national data banks.

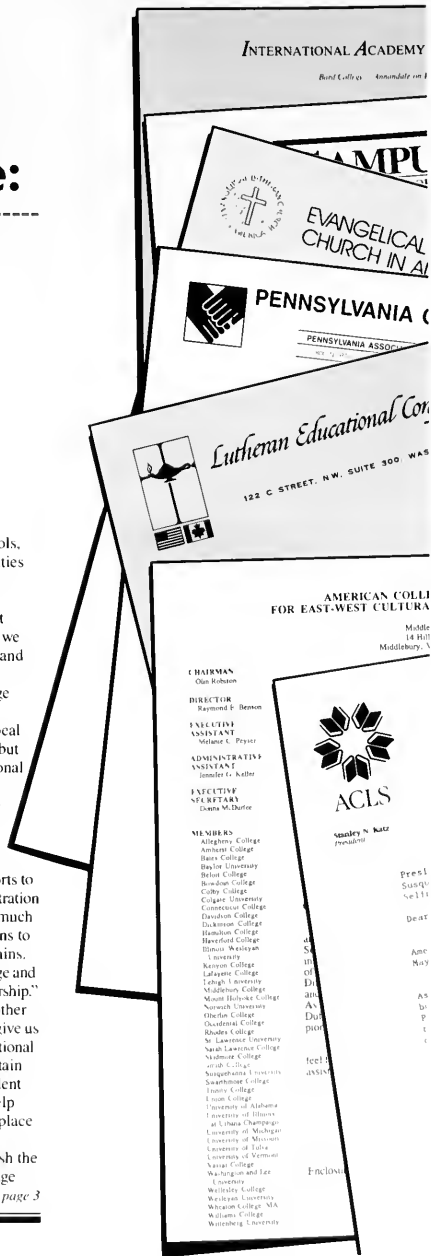
"It's helping us, and we're helping others take advantage of new technologies," explains Peter Deekle, director of the University's Blough-Weis Library.

The libraries have also launched deliberate efforts to coordinate purchases and develop areas of concentration to avoid duplication of holdings. "We're moving much more rapidly and readily toward making decisions to buy based on other schools' decisions," he explains. "The relationship is particularly valuable as college and university libraries move towards access over ownership."

While ACLCP provides information access, other consortia forge direct contacts. "Consortia often give us reach. They help small schools get into the international arena with contacts that would be difficult to obtain on their own," explains Jeanne Neff, vice president for academic affairs. "International consortia help bring the world to Susquehanna University and place Susquehanna in the world."

Membership in one such group helped establish the University's new Susquehanna-Yaroslavl Exchange

The seal is a cherished part of Susquehanna's identity since it is the symbol most alumni remember fondly from their University days.

To protect the dignity and authority of the official seal, the University has also adopted an emblem for most publications and merchandise. The round emblem echoes the design in our University logo, introduced in 1991 to provide a distinct and consistent graphic identity for Susquehanna. Such consistency is essential to increase our name recognition among external audiences as we work to recruit qualified students, faculty, and staff, as well as funds and other support.

While the seal with its newly added outlines of the continents continues to signify our place in the world to alumni, the less formal emblem and logo are even more visually tied to Susquehanna. Each links Selinsgrove Hall, the oldest building on campus, and our namesake, the Susquehanna River. The curve of the river also suggests an S shape and signifies the roadway connecting the University and the community of Selinsgrove and the rolling hills of the Susquehanna Valley.

To Our Readers

Beginning with the summer issue, you'll see a new look, a new name and, we hope, lots of familiar faces in our alumni quarterly.

The changes have evolved over the past 18 months as Susquehanna studied how best to provide alumni, parents and friends with news about each other and the University.

The most obvious change may well be our name. Although *Alumnus* has served us well in the past, a number of readers view the title as sexist and exclusionary. The current name also offers little distinction and name recognition for the University.

After considering numerous options and opinions, we have chosen *Susquehanna Today*. This emerged as a favorite among several groups and is a name we feel will serve the University and its varied constituencies well.

We are currently working with graphic designers to establish a new look for the publication. Our goal is to establish a distinct, easy-to-read, lively style reflecting the warmth and tradition associated with Susquehanna campus life.

While the physical size will remain roughly the same, a change in the paper weight will make the publication easier to fold, handle, and store. We plan on switching to recycled paper and will encourage our readers to recycle their copies after use.

These moves should also lead to cost savings, allowing us to expand the number of pages in some issues and deliver even more of what you want to see. But remember, we're still counting on you to supply much of the raw material, so keep those cards, letters, and pictures coming.

Program. Two students from Russia are currently studying here through the American Collegiate Consortium for East-West Cultural and Academic Exchange based at Middlebury College in Vermont.

Susquehanna is also hosting three Burmese students placed through Susquehanna's affiliation with the Bard College-based International Academy for Scholarship and the Arts. The Academy provides teaching and study opportunities for intellectuals, writers or scholars who have been denied basic freedoms of expression, opinion, or inquiry by politically repressive governments.

In yet another consortial affiliation, Susquehanna is the only U.S. college or university assuming a key governing role in International Foundation: Youth as Creators of the Twenty-First Century, an exchange program for high school youth. University President Joel Cunningham, a member of the group's board of directors, recently traveled to its headquarters in Russia to help plan the program's future.

Closer to home, still other groups provide important long-term benefits by supporting institutional, faculty and staff development through publications, conferences and workshops.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

(ELCA) Division for Higher Education and Schools sponsors several annual national meetings for Lutheran college administrators and faculty. "As member schools participate there is a tremendous opportunity for interactive development," stresses Jeanne Neff.

Meeting regularly with deans from other schools not only presents information and ideas in its own right, but also lays groundwork for valuable informal contacts, points out Dorothy Anderson, dean of students. "You get to know people. It becomes just that much easier to pick up the phone and call to find out how another campus is responding to current issues."

Business offices also regularly share important financial information, and a new offshoot of ELCA dedicated to risk management is also helping the University reduce insurance costs by joining with

other Lutheran colleges, reports University Treasurer Don Aungst.

But consortia also enhance the value of a Susquehanna education in ways beyond dollars, information and opportunity. Our associations send subtle, but valuable, messages about the University's identity and priorities. Affiliation with the American Council of Learned Societies, for example, reflects Susquehanna's central commitment to a broad-based liberal arts education. This and other highly-valued invitational memberships also link us with a cadre of nationally prestigious schools such as Swarthmore, Dartmouth, and Washington and Lee. Such connections help build the institution's reputation and visibility and attract the talented students and faculty who will carry the University into the next century.

Early Start To Job Study In Colleges

Big or small, universities and colleges are worrying more about the job outlook for their students. Perhaps surprisingly though, their concern is not so much for those graduating this recessionary year, but for those who are now just freshmen and sophomores.

Some college administrators say that juniors and seniors are already painfully aware of how bad the employment situation is. But they say bad the employment situation is. But they say younger students may be unrealistically optimistic about how easy it will be to enter the career they want by the time they graduate.

As a result, Texas A & M University in College Station, one of the nation's largest with 40,000 students, plans a seminar called, fittingly enough, "Reality 101." The seminar will start next fall for first- and second-year students, and as many as 7,000 could take part.

Dr. C. Wayne Terrell, the university's acting executive director of career planning, said the seminar's leaders would try to convince students that the job market could be tough even when there was not a recession. He wants the discussion to have "almost a shock effect on students."

They will be told that grade point average is important and that they must gain work experience during summers and possibly during the college year. Students will also be lectured on developing their personal skills, including the ability to be interviewed successfully, speak and write well and other basics like dressing properly.

Other colleges do much the same, but few

start before the crucial junior and senior years.

Another college has an innovative program aimed at young women seeking careers as business executives. The college, Susquehanna University, is a private institution in Selinsgrove, Pa., with 1,400 students. Its business school has started a new approach to the job market for women, who often have a harder time finding good jobs than male students. The approach involves a mentorship program in the second part of a woman's freshman year.

The aim, said Dr. Mary Cianni, assistant professor of management in the business school, is to get the women involved with mentoring early enough so that it can be useful in their career planning.

Each student has been assigned a woman to be her mentor—an alumna of the university successful in the business world. They include a manager of human resources at Quaker Oats and a senior industrial engineer at Equitable Life.

The program started two months ago, is not mandatory, but she said that 23 of the 25 women who are freshmen in the business school are participating. The school has a total enrollment of 400 students.

The program began with a day on campus for mentors to meet the freshmen. "One objective," Dr. Cianni explained, "was to provide a sounding board about the mentors' careers and how they handled work and family issues."

The students and mentors make such basic commitments as meeting twice a year from freshman through senior years, and keeping in touch through letters and by telephone. Both are asked to evaluate the program periodically. Also, the students must participate in other career programs offered by the university.

As in most undergraduate schools of business, Susquehanna requires a large number of liberal arts courses in addition to the business courses that are taken mostly in junior

and senior years.

"The goal is to help these women freshmen in the business school learn how to function in a mentor relationship so they will be able to create such relationships when they move into the business world," she said.

Susquehanna also has an "executive in residence" program, which brings a business executive to campus to talk to students, but the mentoring program helps provide women students with the skills and contacts that the men students generally already have.

"The guys learn to do it—to have mentors outside in the business world and to build networks," Dr. Cianni said.

Dr. Cianni said a research project she did at a large corporation showed her that women needed better networking skills.

She found that female managers "were acutely aware of an 'old boy network' and were excluded from some important social events

perceived to lead to career opportunities." These include golf, bowling, baseball and other outings, during which men shared experiences and ideas.

"Many of our women mentors wish there had been such a program when they were in school," Dr. Cianni said.

Catalyst Inc., a New York-based organization that does research on women's issues, contends that not only is there a "glass ceiling" that prevents many women from reaching top levels but there is also a "glass wall" that blocks them from gaining the broader line experience they need in addition to the staff jobs many hold as middle managers.

"Women," a recent Catalyst report stated, "'encounter a glass wall' early in their career that prevents them from getting critical experience they need to compete with men for top management positions."

The list includes feature coverage in the March 10 "Careers" column of *The New York Times* business section. The article focused on an interview with Dr. Mary Cianni, director of a new Sigmund Weis School of Business mentor program linking first-year women business majors with successful Susquehanna alumnae. FYI, we're reprinting the article with permission in this issue of *Alumnus*.

The University's chemistry road show attracted attention from both print and electronic media. Professors of Chemistry Neil Potter and Tom

McGrath and several Susquehanna students presented demonstrations at high schools in the New Jersey, Greater Philadelphia, Maryland, and Scranton/Wilkes-Barre/Hazleton areas. Two Scranton television stations and a children's television program in the Washington, DC, area featured the demonstrations, which also received coverage in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* and several other newspapers.

Susquehanna sports fans were in their glory on Feb. 29 as WYOU-TV televised live regional coverage of the Susquehanna-Albright men's basketball battle for the Middle Atlantic Conference Northern Division title. Susquehanna captured the honors 78-73 with

a dramatic overtime victory.

Susquehanna students also earned their share of press. Prem Janardhan, a junior computer science and math major, received honorable mention in *USA Today's* Academic All-Stars Team. Senior men's basketball swingman Craig Harper earned the headline and the lead story in the *Philadelphia Inquirer's* College Notes column after surpassing his career 1,000 point mark. A feature story in the *Philadelphia Daily News* also focused on Harper. December graduate and non-traditional student Salinda Arthur was the subject of a feature article in the *Harrisburg Patriot-News*.

Campus News

Susquehanna Sets Tuition, Fees for 1992-93

Susquehanna University's board of directors has approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 1992-93 academic year. The new figures represent the lowest percentage increase in 18 years.

Comprehensive fees for next year will be \$18,980. The \$1000 increase for entering students is 5.56 percent more than in 1991-92.

University President Joel Cunningham said, "We expect this increase to be smaller than those of most of the private colleges in our region. We are especially conscious of the economic pressures facing many students and their families this year, and we have made deliberate efforts to control expenditures while continuing to build quality in educational programs."

Several recent events demonstrate the educational value of a Susquehanna education. *U.S. News & World Report* named Susquehanna "one of the top regional universities in the nation" last fall. In a biennial survey conducted last spring, students ranked faculty, academic programs, science and library facilities, and the academic ability of their peers significantly higher than five years earlier. The University's latest career development and placement survey, completed in January, showed that Susquehanna graduates are not only holding their own in these challenging economic times, but actually experiencing an increase in overall employment and graduate school placement from previous years.

"Susquehanna seeks the best possible balance between the resources needed to provide a first quality education and the burden that fees place on students and their families," said Cunningham. The University offers a comprehensive financial aid program and is committed to review and assist assistance in response to changing family needs.

Elie Wiesel to Speak at 1992 Commencement

Nobel Peace Prize winner and Holocaust survivor Elie Wiesel has accepted an invitation to speak at the University's 134th commencement exercises on Sunday, May 17 at 3 p.m.

Widely known for his books about Nazi concentration camps which examine the most fundamental moral issues, Wiesel is a distinguished and popular speaker at forums and university campuses around the world. He has been an Andrew Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University since 1976, and has received many prestigious awards, including the Martin Luther King Jr. medallion. He is the author of more than 25 works.

During the commencement exercises, Wiesel will be awarded an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters.

Faculty/Staff Briefs

■ Professor of French **Jack Kolbert**, head of the Department of Modern Languages, has been elected an Honorary Fellow by the board of trustees of the Institute of American Universities in France. Kolbert is one of a small number of Americans to receive the honor in recognition of his contributions in international education and European studies.

■ Director of University Tutorial Services **Gary Fincke** is a finalist for the 1992 Pushcart Prize for outstanding work published in small presses and magazines. Fincke was nominated for poems published in *Poetry*, *The Gettysburg Review*, and *Poetry Northwest*. His collection of stories, *For Keepsies*, will be published in 1993 by Coffee House Press, a commercial publisher in Minneapolis.

■ Associate Professor **Ron Dotterer**, head of the Department of English, co-organized a national conference on "Film, Individualism and Community," held in March in Baltimore. Susquehanna co-sponsored the event with Salisbury State University in Maryland. In Memoriam

Orlando W. Houts

Orlando W. Houts, a longtime Susquehanna supporter and namesake of the University's main gymnasium, died on March 5 at his home in Lemont, Pennsylvania. An alumnus of Pennsylvania State University Class of 1922, he was chairman of the board of O.W. Houts & Son, Inc. in State College.

Houts began his business career in the 1920's, opening a sawmill. The mill grew into a lumber trade and building supply operation that played a key role in the development of State College, Fort Indiantown Gap and a dozen other military operations.

A lifelong gardener, Houts made numerous donations of trees, shrubs, and plants that grace the campuses of Susquehanna University and Pennsylvania State University.

Elected to the Susquehanna University Board of Directors in 1951, and the executive committee in 1958, Houts served for 31 years until 1983. In 1978, the Board voted to name the main gym in the Physical Education Center the Orlando W. Houts Gymnasium in recognition of his interest in Susquehanna and his lifelong concern for higher education and his fellow man.

Norman E. Walz

Norman E. Walz, a dedicated friend of the Susquehanna and a former member of the University's Board of Directors, died on January 21. He was the former president and director of The First National Trust Bank in Sunbury, where he had pursued a career in banking lasting more than 40 years.

Walz joined the bank staff in October of 1960 and served as senior vice president and senior trust officer before being named president in July of 1969. He was educated in Philadelphia, where he had been an officer of the Provident National Bank before moving to Sunbury.

He joined the University's Board of Directors in 1961 and served as the Board's treasurer until 1979, when he was named an emeritus member of the Board.

In 1987, The First National Trust Bank established the Norman E. Walz Endowment as an expression of deep appreciation for his distinguished career in banking and recognition of his distinguished service to the University.

Susquehanna Success Story Goes Co-Ed on the Court

Basketball success is nothing new to Susquehanna University, but there was a special excitement at Crusader co-ed doubleheaders this season.

Both the men's and women's basketball teams won Middle Atlantic Conference-Northern Division titles and earned NCAA Division III Tournament berths this year. Each had won their respective MAC-Northeast Section title over the past three years—the men in back-to-back seasons in 1988-90 and the women during the last two years—but the Northern Division sweep was a Susquehanna first.

As if the dual titles weren't enough, each team also won their championship in dramatic fashion, with the men scoring a 78-73 overtime win in front of a hostile Albright College crowd and a live regional television

audience on WYOU-TV. The women also won in overtime, although they scored their 83-80 victory over Juniata in the friendly confines of O.W. Houts Gymnasium.

"This team is going to be good in the future," says third-year men's head coach **Frank Marcinek**, who started only one senior with a junior, a sophomore and two freshmen. "Maybe the positive ending will get them rolling for next year."

"We went into the season gearing towards next year," says women's head coach **Mark Hribar**, now in his fifth year. "We only have one senior in our lineup and our best players were probably juniors."

The similarities don't stop with their rosters. Both have also been successful by using a 10-player rotation, pressure defense and a fast-breaking offense.

"I have noticed a similarity in the way we play. I think we both prefer to play at a faster tempo," says Marcinek. "Part of that is built on the fact that we each have pretty good depth in the program. When you have 9 to 11 players getting some playing time, you're more geared up for the style of play."

"Defensively, we both use pressure and have been able to hold people down scoring-wise," adds Hribar.

The frenetic wins has produced end-to-end action on the court and plays on the schedule for both teams. Apparently, winning has bred winning, depending on which team plays first.

"I think the intensity is there. When you know one team does well, the other one certainly wants to," says Hribar. "The winning has been contagious."

"I've become more of a proponent for men's-women's doubleheaders," says Marcinek. "One game seems to build on the other game and I think it makes for a better atmosphere, particularly when both teams are doing well."

turn first? A recent survey indicates that an overwhelming majority of you immediately scan the "Susquehannans on Parade" section to look for individuals and class years that you recognize. Isn't it always more enjoyable when you find familiar names?

It's also very frustrating when we pull out the file of an alum about whom we are writing an article or honoring with an award and find almost no material. However, the most grievous (and the most common) sin of omission is that of the incorrect address and telephone number—and this applies to your place of employment, too! Susquehanna's entire alumni program is based on the concept of communication between the University and its alumni, a process that becomes nearly impossible without current information. Not only are you inconvenienced by not receiving material from S.U. in a timely manner (if at all!), but it also causes our office to divert considerable time and resources from other projects as we attempt to correct errors and verify questionable facts. Even the invitations that you receive to alumni activities in your area are based on the information that we have in our files.

By now, I'm certain you've figured out the solution to this problem—KEEP US INFORMED! However, there is one more step that can help tremendously. In a few months, you will be receiving a questionnaire from the company we have engaged to publish our new alumni directory. You'll be hearing more about this soon, but for now, please just remember some of the points I've mentioned here and plan to complete the questionnaire as quickly and accurately as you can. All of us here at Susquehanna will appreciate it and, more importantly, so will your friends and classmates! Thank you!

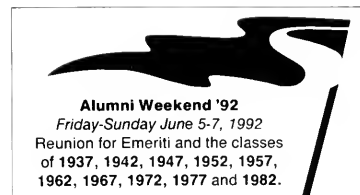

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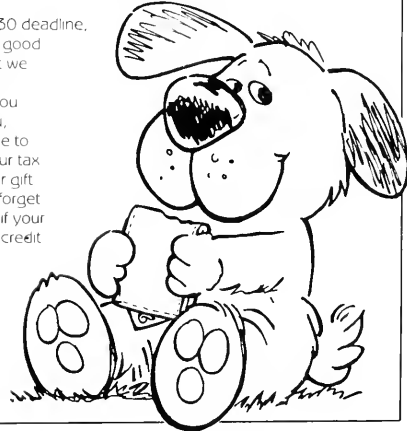

Newsmakers



Arlan K. Gilbert '55 has recently published *Historic Hillsdale College: Pioneering Higher Education 1844-1900*.

The book, described as a "unique and most comprehensive history of a small school of the 19th century," is the result of three years' work. His sources range from the archives of Hillsdale to scrapbooks and memory boxes of older Hillsdale alumni. The emphasis is on the school's significance in the national pattern of the nineteenth century. Hillsdale has recorded many firsts in the history of American education, including having the first college charter in the U.S. to include a guarantee of equal education for women and to prohibit discrimination because of race or color.

Dr. Gilbert also has a number of strong ties to Susquehanna. He was valedictorian of his class and an avid supporter of S.U. sports. His father, **Dr. Russell W. Gilbert, H'47**, was a professor of German at Susquehanna from 1930 until 1970. He was also well known for his enthusiasm for Crusader sports, and was named to the University's Sports Hall of Fame in 1980 as the outstanding fan. Arlan Gilbert's sister, **Joyce '54** was the assistant registrar here from 1959 until her death in 1979.

Gilbert earned his M.A. from the University of Delaware in 1957 and did his doctoral study at the University of Wisconsin. He has published many articles in historical magazines, and was named Hillsdale College Professor of the Year in 1984. He and his wife Carolyn reside in Hillsdale and are the parents of three children.

Arlan Gilbert's mother Viola still resides in Selinsgrove and has generously donated the Russell Gilbert Pennsylvania German Collection to Susquehanna University. The collection is placed in the Pennsylvania Room of the Blough-Weis Library.



Rudolph Sharpe '69 has been named Pennsylvania Secondary School Teacher of the Year in 1992. A faculty member in the Lower Dauphin School District, he was selected from a field of 169 candidates. Sharpe teaches a survey course of British literature, a course on English literature, and a class in the humanities enrichment program, and serves as the advisor for the freshman and senior classes. In his spare time, he teaches English composition at Harrisburg Area Community College.

Sharpe credits his great love for the English language to one of his teachers, and he has also been a tremendous influence on his own students who rave about his enthusiasm for the subject. Pennsylvania Governor Robert P. Casey said Sharpe "earns high praise from his colleagues for his superb and creative approach to the teaching of writing, and for his leadership in helping other teachers to use writing throughout the curriculum." Sharpe has been working with other Lower Dauphin teachers to develop a writing center where both students and teachers can learn to improve their writing skills in all areas of study.

Sharpe is the president of the Pennsylvania Council of Teachers of English and a member of the board of directors of the national council. He is also the president of the advisory board for the *Patriot-News* Scholastic Writing Awards.

Since he began teaching at Lower Dauphin 23 years ago, Sharpe has earned his master's degree from Shippensburg University and is presently working on his doctorate degree in rhetoric at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He lives in Hummelstown, PA, with his wife, **Marcia Spangler Sharpe '69**, and their two children, Amy and Jeremy.
