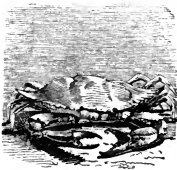

Who drives a gay team.

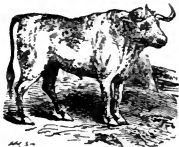


**K** is the village Kirk,

Bright, witty, and keen.



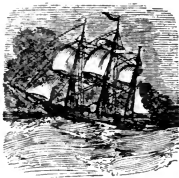
**O** is the farmer's Ox,
