Oh, let us hold to the one ambition, and apply ourselves to its fulfillment, remembering the advice Shakespeare gave us

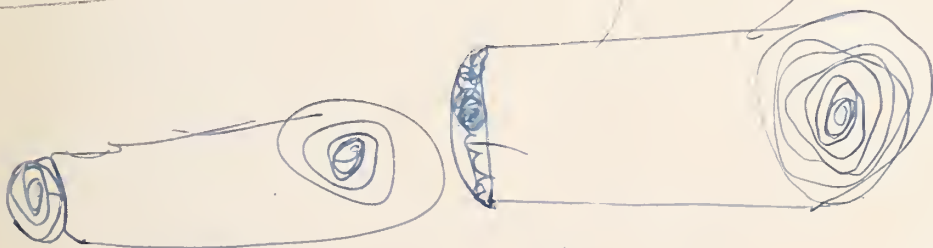
