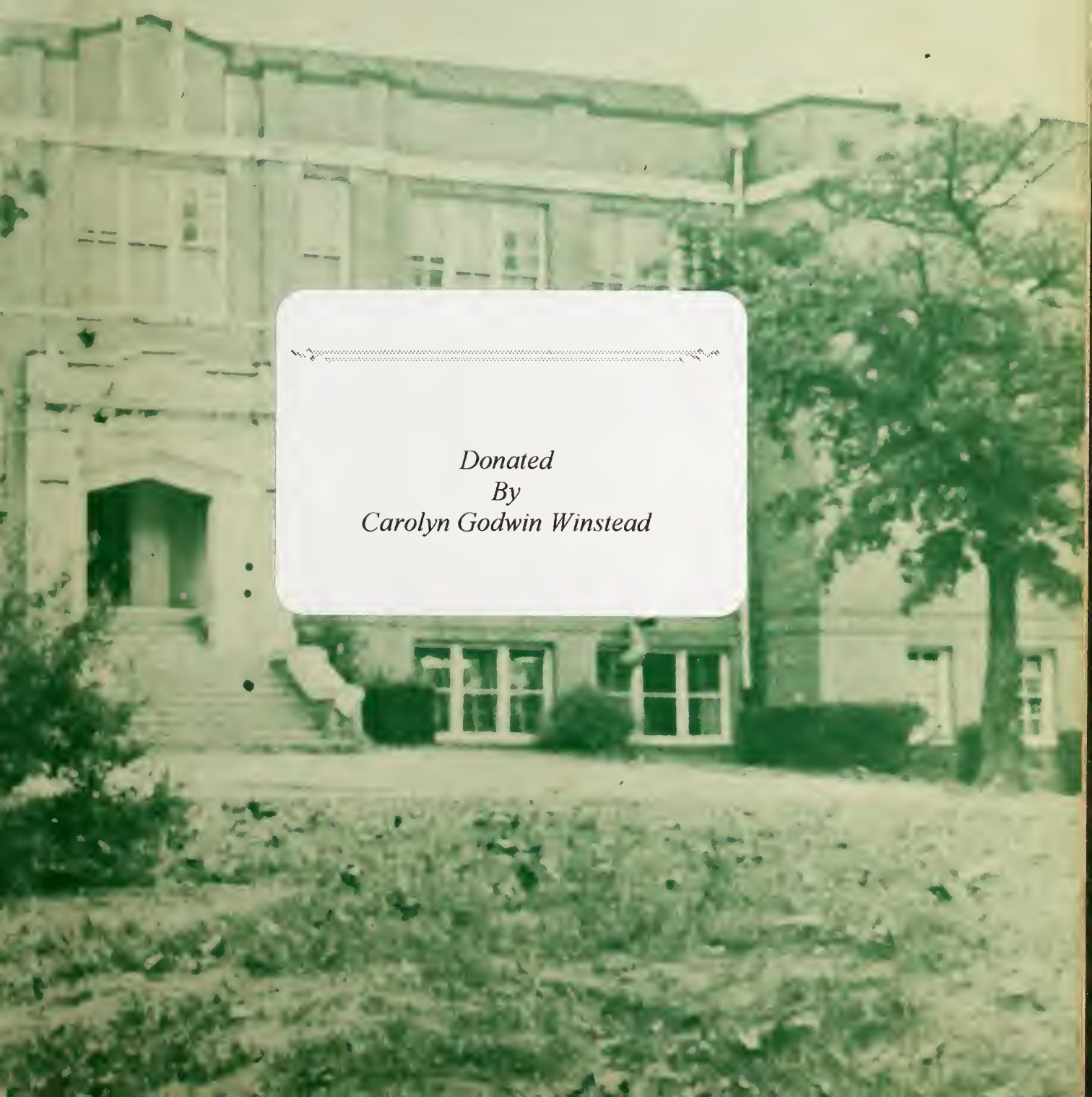

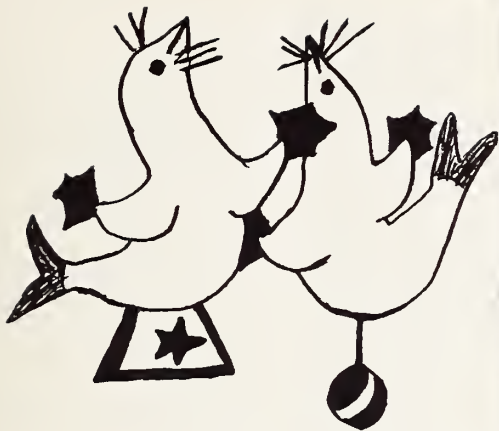
Foreword

Friends, do you care to take a trip? Of course you do, as everyone likes to travel. Then quickly get aboard my magic carpet. I'm going to take a trip back through the past twelve years. The past twelve years that we, now seniors, have spent in Wilson's Mills School as students. All ready? Then off we go!

What's this we see? Oh, yes it is a bright September day in 1943. Let's take a look in the first grade room. There are forty-three small girls and boys coming through the door as students for the first time in their lives. There I see a small woman, Miss Nellie Reece Barnes, making each one feel at home. Yes, she was wonderful to us during our first year as we learned to read and write.

The second year found our class divided. Miss Margaret Stephenson and Mrs. Atwood Uzzle taught us that year. Perhaps what we remember most about that year was the many pupils who came to Mrs. Atwood Uzzle in case of a headache or a scratch. She was wonderful to everyone as the school nurse.

Our third year found all forty of us under the direction of Mrs. Nelda Cotton. It was really an eventful year for us because we became regular mathematicians as we tackled multiplication and division. Also the introduction to the noun marked a year that we'll never forget because we still find ourselves wrestling with problems in English.

During the fourth grade, we were taught by Miss Dorothy Poston and Mrs. Nelson Wilson. Rosalee Johnson joined our class that year. We really went around the world in our first geography course.

Mrs. Nelson Wilson and Mrs. Strickland taught us in the fifth grade. For our teachers in the sixth grade we had Mrs. Howard Mitchiner and Mrs. Thompson. I'm sure the ones in Mrs. Mitchiner's room will never forget that year for we spent nine whole months without a single boy in the classroom.

The Junior year was one of the very best in our lives. Mrs. Carl K. Parrish was the home room teacher. Percy Lynch, Bobby Renfrow, and Ray Casey were added to our roll. That year we gave our Junior Play "Raggedy Nan." None of us will ever forget those play practices. As the Junior Year wore on we planned the banquet we gave the Seniors in the spring. The theme of it was the Mardi Gras. We had hardly finished singing the farewell song to the Seniors when we grabbed our suitcases and set out for Washington and four days of breath taking sight.

Now friends, we are at the end of our trip. As we look at the Seniors for the last time we see twenty boys and girls who have traveled the long and hard trip with the reward - a diploma always in sight.

As we leave we can hardly believe it has been twelve years, they seem so short now. What does the future hold for us? No one knows, but I'm sure each Senior will meet his obligation by putting his best foot forward.
