SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

"Where is Mr. Wall's room?" "Where is Miss Kinney's room?" These were the oft repeated questions the older students readily answered September 5, 1940, the first day of school. The 120 boys and girls who were asking these questions were the ones who a few months before had received certificates showing they had finished elementary school. They were trying to find the Freshmen rooms of Mr. Wall and Miss Jacqueline Kinney, to which they had been assigned. These Freshmen soon became accustomed to changing classes and all that's new and at first difficult about high school, then settled down to a year of work.

The next year about 100 Sophomores were divided between the rooms of Mr. Kennerly and Miss Louise Tunstall with seventeen boys assigned to Mr. Williams. During the year Mr. Kennerly left for a position at Washington and was succeeded by Mr. Lentz.

On September 3, after a short summer vacation, the schoolground again echoed with the sound of pupils renewing old acquaintances, and the beginning of new ones. Our Junior Class was assigned to the rooms of Mrs. Eula A. Ivey and Miss Elsie Nunn, with Mr. Williams taking a few boys. The year was filled with hard work and little or no time for amusement. The Junior-Senior Banquet was the outstanding social event of the year, due to war restrictions. The banquet took place during the month of April, at the Archdale Methodist Church Hut. The decorations were prepared by Jean Davis and Mary Louise White. Lois Myers presided as Toastmistress. During the year class rings were selected and when received the class was very well pleased. April 30 arrives—"Oh happy day" for most of us. Report cards read "promoted to eleventh grade." We were now ready for the goal toward which we had been striving for ten long years.

Mr. McLeod, our principal, left after graduation to become superintendent of the Asheboro schools, being replaced by Mr. Wagoner from Farmer. A few days before school was to reopen the people were stunned by the sudden death of Mr. Wagoner. Mr. Abernathy of Ramseur filled the position and school was ready to begin.

The school doors opened September 9, with twenty-four boys and thirty-nine girls entering the room of Mrs. Gurney Peace, Senior teacher. Schedules and courses were planned and school was really underway. During the fall term the Seniors were shown a movie at the Center Theatre as a prize for winning a War Bond drive at school. Anaesthetics which helped to ease the pain of mid-term exams were a chicken stew at the home of Jean Davis and a Christmas party at the home of Valeria Mendenhall, both members of the Senior Class. Seniors were members of the various clubs which were active this year. Some were active in athletics under the direction of Miss Nunn and Mr. Abernathy, others had prominent parts in the Beta Club under the direction of Mrs. Clarke. During the year three of our classmates left, leaving sixty students to finish the year. Plans were made to publish an annual. A staff was selected from the high school and they immediately began on this project.

The Seniors are proud of having won the P.T.A. Banner twice this year and they also appreciated the thoughtfulness of their grade mothers. Several Seniors were on the baseball team which began its practice in the spring under the direction of their coach, Mr. Abernathy. Work was begun on the Senior play by eleven members of the class under the direction of Mrs. Peace. The play "Mary-Go-Round" was scheduled for May 5. After selecting calling cards, invitations, and caps and gowns all are looking forward to graduation.







The purpose of the Trinity Beta Club has been to render service, and to encourage leadership, honesty, loyalty, patriotism, and scholastic excellence.

The Beta Club has selected as its yearly project to assist in the library. The Beta members were student librarians and acted as chargers and dischargers of books. They prepared over 300 books for library circulation. After an inventory was taken a complete file of the books in the library was made.

The library assistants each had a period in which they performed the duties of the librarian. They were as follows: First period, Lois Myers and Lois Wagoner; second period, Jewel Pless, Dorothy Parrish, Gordon Lindley, and Dorothy Jean Coltrane; third period, Mary Louise White, Isabelle Snider; fourth period, Mary Barnes; fifth period, Billy Pugh, Richard Reddick; sixth period, Thorman Duncan and Elmer Simpson.

In addition to these duties, Lois Myers was in charge of the incoming periodicals; Bernice Jester made a record of the overdue books; Valeria Mendenhall made a file of clippings. After school hours Thurman Duncan and Elmer Simpson charged and discharged books and kept the library in order. Bernice Jester, Mary Barnes, Mary Louise White, Jean Davis, Valeria Mendenhall have been responsible, under supervision, for the preparation of the large number of new books for circulation.

One, upon observation, could not help noticing the great improvement in the library as the result of this activity. Each member is proud to have done his part in helping the school and students in this manner.

In cooperation with the National Beta Club council, Gordon Lindley, the secretary of our local chapter, took a survey of the seniors to determine their choice of a college.

An honor roll, posted each grading period by Dorothy Jean Coltrane, gave recognition to those who have excelled scholastically. There is a wholehearted effort upon the part of the Beta Club to encourage a high scholastic record.

This has been a year of war and the need for civilian support has been great. The Beta Club sponsored a scrap paper collection contest in which the school as a whole did its part toward making the day of peace closer. The members of the club were assigned various rooms in which they were responsible for collecting, weighing, and recording the paper. A total of 10,200 pounds was collected and sold to the salvage company. Dorothy Parrish and Jewel Pless arranged with a paper company for the removal of the paper. Mrs. LeRoy Hancock's sixth grade, winner of the contest, was given baseball equipment as a prize. A movie, "Get Hep To Love," was presented in which paper was charged as admission. The proceeds from the sale of the paper was donated to the Red Cross. By means of this activity, our club has aided in paper salvage for the war effort, added needed athletic equipment to the school, and contributed to the Red Cross.

The members of the Beta Club have taken pride in the activities which they have attempted, and hope that through them they have rendered real service.

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
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
