CLASS HISTORY

O happy day! This was the cry of the 84 students who entered the rooms of Miss Morgan and Miss Cranford in the summer of 1944. It was our first day in high school and boy—how thrilled we were! But we soon changed our tune when we started to fill out schedule cards, change classes and wait until 12:30 for lunch. Everyone was wishing for those good old care-free grammar grade days back but when we sorta' got in the swing of things, we learned it was really fun after all. Our Freshman year went off with a bang with James Swiggett, president; Lloyd Canoy, vice president; Joyce Scoggin, secretary; and Mary Ellen Silman, treasurer of Miss Cranford's homeroom. In Miss Morgan's room, Brown Cumby served as president with Charles Snyder, Betsy Fowler, and Frances Frazier, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, respectively. Although this wasn't a very exciting year, we looked forward to the next year with enthusiasm because we had finally learned the fundamentals of high school.

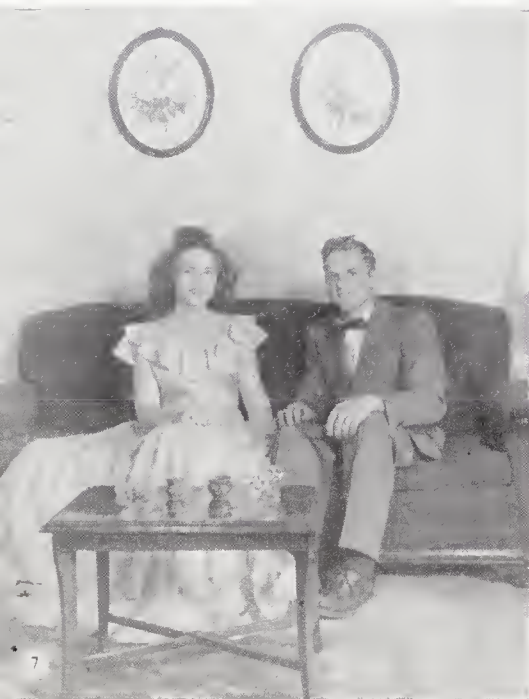
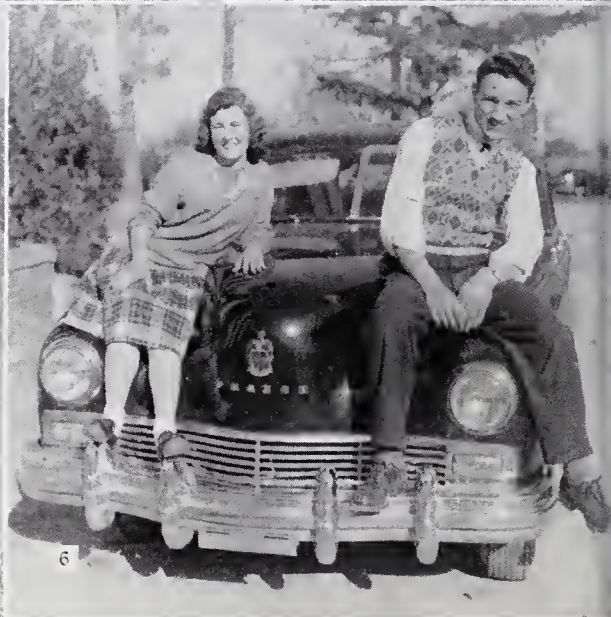
Then came our sophomore year under the direction of Miss Cranford and Miss Phillips. Many worth while things happened to us during the year starting off with the election of class officers which were as follows: Miss Cranford's room; president, James Swiggett; vice president, Charles Snyder; secretary, Mary Lee White; and treasurer, Molly Younts. In Miss Phillips room, Brown Cumby was re-elected president with Lloyd Canoy serving as vice president, Betty Jones as secretary and Frances Frazier, treasurer. During the year, Miss Phillips had to resign and Mr. Harpe, a veteran of the war, took her place. He was soon well-known and liked throughout the school. For the first time as Trinity we had a May Queen to which four of our class served as attendants. Also class rings were ordered, eight members of the class were taken into the Beta Club and several participated in various sports of the school. Another important change was made this year was a new principal, Mr. L. H. Koon. He immediately won the heart of everyone by being friendly and kind and showing no partiality whatsoever.

Another year, and with Charles Snyder presiding over the class, things soon got under way our Junior year. James Swiggett was elected vice president, Betty Jones, secretary, and Frances Frazier, treasurer. A few days before Thanksgiving, we received word that our class rings were at the post office. Everyone floated on air for two or three days and then the thrill of getting them was all over. During the year, one of our classmates, Virginia Steed, died. She was missed by everyone in school, not only her class. Eight more members were taken into the Beta Club with seven of us, and Miss Cranford, attending the annual Beta Club convention held in Winston-Salem. After deciding on the theme, "An Old Fashioned Garden," for our Junior-Senior banquet, we entertained the seniors and faculty at the Emerywood Country Club on April 4, 1947. A few days preceding commencement, our class presented the Junior play, a three act comedy entitled "Eyes of Love" under the direction of Miss Cranford, our teacher.

Finally the big year has arrived when we can be labeled as "dignified seniors". Although it seems the same as before, we are looked up to by our underclassmen somewhat as an example. To start off what we hope will be a successful year, the following officers have been elected: Lloyd Canoy, president; Betty Jones, vice president; Frances Frazier, secretary; Opal Myers, treasurer. Frances Frazier was elected by the girls of our class and the faculty as the D.A.R. Good Citizen from our school. Naomi Fowler and Paul Myers, our entries into the annual popularity contest, won the title of "King and Queen of the Harvest Festival". Several members of our class are taking part in the various sports and activities of the school. On December 18, Mrs. Peace served as hostess for our Christmas party at the Home Economics Building. Our invitations and calling cards have been selected and ordered. We are very glad to have two former students Alice Royals Thomas and Nell Lackey back to graduate with us.

With the red rose as our class flower; red and white, our colors, "What We Are To Be We Are Now Becoming" our motto, we are looking forward to a happy and successful future as we all part and go down that open road of life.

FACTS ABOUT OUR SCHOOL

Whether we realize it or not we who are students of Trinity High School are fortunate in our privilege of attending school in a location where education has been paramount for more than a century.

In 1939 was held the 100th commencement on this spot. From a small beginning, Trinity developed from an academy to a Union Institute and finally to a Methodist College founded and directed for a number of years by Dr. Braxton Craven.

In 1893 Trinity College was moved to Durham and later became Duke University. Since 1893, this community has been served by a high school and graded school.

Today, our enrollment is 940, and our membership is 905. We are proud of our faculty which includes nine high school teachers, 14 grammar grade teachers, two music teachers, and principal. There are five helpers in the office. Our ten buses are driven by efficient drivers who make altogether 18 loads twice a day.

We are served by six competent women in the cafeteria who serve around 700 meals a day. The construction of a new cafeteria and gymnasium is well under way.

Of interest to most of us is the fact that of our faculty, six are former alumni. They are: Mrs. John Payne, Mrs. Le Roy Hancock, Mrs. Gurney Peace, Mr. E. W. Welborn, Miss Carrie Cranford, and Mr. Sidney Underwood.
