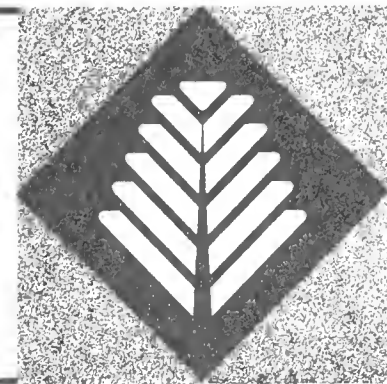

Big doings in the future include pursuing a new master plan for the Arboretum in cooperation with our friends in the Arboretum Foundation and the Seattle Department of Parks and Recreation. NEW AT UNION BAY

The next time you visit the Center, take a stroll around back and see something new. The Center, in cooperation with the City of Seattle Solid Waste Utility, has installed a new Test Garden that utilizes Cedar Grove composted yard trimmings in various combinations with soil and as a mulch. Tests will record garden plant growth, water movement and retention, and other factors. Signage further explains the project.

GARDEN HISTORY TOUR

The Oregon Trail brought new people and plants to the Northwest 150 years ago. Garden historian Kathy Mendelson discusses regional horticultural history during this tour to the Vancouver/Portland area. First, visit Fort Vancouver to see vegetables, herbs, grains and flowers commonly used in the 1830's. Next, discover the influence of "Johnny Appleseed" during our visit to the 1850's Pioneer Orchard of Bybee House (over 150 heirloom fruit varieties). Finally, visit Fir Acres (now Lewis & Clark College), an opulent example of a 1920's formal terraced garden.

FLORA OF MT. RAINIER & MT. ST. HELENS

The rugged beauty of Mt. Rainier has been shaped by mud flows, frost, avalanche, and erosion. The region around Mt. St. Helens is still recovering from the devastation of a major eruption. This tour explores the relationships between the terrain and the plants of Mt. Rainier, and the recolonization of Mt. St. Helens.

NATURAL HISTORY OF THE OLYMPIC PENINSULA

The Olympic Peninsula offers a unique combination of plant and animal communities shaped by geology, topography, weather patterns and other forces. Study sites to be

visited include the Willaby Creek Nature Trail at Lake Quinalt, the Hoh rainforest and the loop hike in the Hall of Mosses, the terraced forest communities of the Southeast corner of the Peninsula, and the high elevation sub-alpine forest and meadow near Hurricane Ridge.
