It is an education institution, scientific in character because we cannot dispense knowledge until we have it." This kernel of clarity is particularly timely for us as we engage in planning intended to greatly improve the Washington Park Arboretum and to establish the Union Bay Gardens and Union Bay Natural Areas with displays, plant collections, and educational programs for years to come. Explorer Packs in the Arboretum




Registrations will be filled in the order received. Enrollment is limited and classes fill rapidly, so register early. A portion of your fee may cover refreshments and speaker expenses.

Arboretum Greenhouse Transformed: Under the direction of a team from Leadership Tomorrow working in cooperation with the University and the Arboretum Foundation, the instructional greenhouse adjacent to the Graham Visitors Center in the Arboretum got a recent face lift. Working on designs created by artists form Street Smart Art, several dozen young painters from Garfield Community Center and St. Therese School completed a series of six interior wall murals. Seafirst Bank provided \$1000 for this project, and Leadership Tomorrow Team Members contributed another \$400. The Arboretum Foundation matched those contributions with an additional \$1400.

Union Bay Gardens Planting Update: Many new plants have been added to the gardens around the Union Bay Campus. These include: Rhododendron ciliatum, Acer cappadocicum, Acer tataricum ssp. ginnala, Clerodendron crytophyllum, Pterostyrax hispida, Pterostyrax psilophylla, Weigela praecox, plus a number of Lagerstroemia selections.

Arboretum Master Plan Update: The Portico Group conducted a series of public workshops this past Spring. Their preliminary concepts for the Master Plan were then unveiled in late June, followed by additional public input during meetings this summer. There is a Master Plan Hotline (233-7929) on which you can receive the very latest information. Feasibility, Alternative Definement and Final Selection phases are next. Finalization of the Master Plan is anticipated in January, 1997.

Faculty Search: The Center has begun a search for a new faculty member in the area of Landscape Plant Science and Management. CUH's Kern Ewing will serve as chair of the search committee. We look forward to increasing our teaching and research faculty soon!

Senior Project Benefits Arboretum Outreach: For her senior project, College of Forest Resources student Shannon Hooson reviewed and expanded the Arboretum's Explorer Pack Program. Explorer Packs provide youth groups and families the tools and information to undertake intensive, self-guided adventures in the Arboretum. Shannon researched similar programs at other institutions, conducted a users survey, and then developed two new (and soon to be available) packs.

New After-School Projects: A new series of After-School Projects for youth at the Garfield and Yesler Terrace Community Centers began recently. Projects were planned based on information gathered by a second team from Leadership Tomorrow. Working with Arboretum Foundation volunteers and University staff, children are given an opportunity to study plants through a variety of fun hands-on activities. The Arboretum Foundation has provided \$600 towards this project, Viacom has donated \$500, and SAFECO has donated \$500.


