### ***Building Name Change***

On April 16, 1990, the name of the Conference Hall at the Center was officially changed to Northwest Horticultural Society Hall. Upon approval by appropriate committees and University President Gerberding, the name change recognizes the continuing contribution of the Society to horticulture education. This announcement was made at the annual meeting of the Northwest Horticultural Society.

## **Arbor Fest—Second Successful Year**

"Polishing the Emerald Crown," the cooperative program between the Center and Jerry Clark, City Arborist, continued to focus efforts on the importance of trees. The Sunday program in the Washington Park Arboretum was an overwhelming success with many people stopping by to chat with our "Talking Trees." Mary Ellen Mulder, Arboretum Foundation Gift Shop Book Sales Coordinator presented an outstanding display of books about trees for both adults and children. The Tuesday ProHort program focused on proper tree care for professionals. The other lectures during the week were also well attended and plans are already under way for expanded programs next year.

## **People, Plants, Horticulture**

Evaluation and expansion of the outreach programs of the Center began in 1981. The current activity summary indicates that the activities of the Center place second on the University campus. Activities conducted by Center faculty, staff, graduate students, and volunteers included 203 lectures and seminars, 173 demonstration/guided tours, and 96 seminars at the new Northwest Garden and Flower Show with a combined attendance of 17,751. In addition, 398 other horticultural meetings (attendance of 21,788) were conducted by other horticulture/urban forestry groups on our two sites. The Miller Horticulture Library handled 3,019 individuals and 1,112 telephone inquiries, whereas the Graham Visitors Center counted 22,012 individuals, and 8,678 telephone calls. The King County Master Gardeners also handled 1,975 inquiries there. A large number of other campus and community groups extensively use both sites. Total contacts handled both on and off our facilities during 1989 were 116,354. This does not include attendance on the Washington Park Arboretum grounds as we have no accurate counting procedure presently. Does the telephone really ever stop ringing?

## **Hort Field Day—Another Great Success**

Luck prevailed and beautiful spring weather greeted the 135 participants in the fourth annual Hort Field Day. From 14 area high schools—Auburn, Cascade (Everett), Lynnwood, Enumclaw, Everett, Franklin Pierce, Kent FFA, Lakewood, North Kitsap, Tahoma, Vashon, and Washington (Tacoma), these young ladies and men participated in 12 field events. Have you ever seen a team of young people plant a tree, trim around a styrofoam cup without shredding it, or create a brick pathway—properly? This year's winner was Franklin Pierce (Tacoma). All events, equipment, and scoring were handled by members of the Washington Association of Landscape Professionals, who consider this the perfect opportunity to work with this area's future urban horticulture leaders. Jeffrey D. Henning, Landscape Innovations, Woodinville, was the W.A.L.P. coordinator.

# PROGRAMS IN THE WASHINGTON PARK ARBORETUM

The bright colors and vivid displays of spring have developed into summer's lush greens and rich textures. The serenity of a summertime walk brings refreshment to our senses—a perfect place for a relaxing afternoon or destination for out-of-town guests. For a change of pace, try visiting the Arboretum by canoe, and explore the waterways and wildlife around Foster Island and the Waterfront Trail. Canoes are available at the University's Waterfront Activity Center (543-2217) near Husky Stadium.

## Master Gardeners


