

July Field Trip

On July 11th, 14 members met early on a fine morning at Point Lobos Ave. and Camino del Mar in San Francisco, for a most enjoyable field trip led by Mr. Arthur H. Myer. We were favored by a warm sun and absence cf fog, as we walked from our starting point through the grounds of the Veterans Facility near Fort Miley, where we saw cliff swallows nesting high on the hospital building, and a quail perched on a cornice well above the ground; through Lincoln Park and down to a trail along the beautiful ocean, where all were interested in observing 3 pigeon guillemots flying and resting on the water, also one on tcp of a high rock, where there may have been a nest.

The flicker was observed on the side of a dry bank looking for insects, and in a sunny hollow full of bushes we saw quite a few birds, including the female Anna hummingbird feeding a young one perched on a twig.

Coming to a parting of the ways, Mrs. Myer and half the party took the "high read", while others took the "low road" with Mr. Myer, and went along a somewhat rougher trail above the shore on the way back to Lands End.

After lunch, we went to one of the lakes in Golden Gate Park, where among other varieties, we saw a female mallard, with her 3 young ones, looking for crumbs along the shore.

High Lights of June and July Meetings

A State Co-ordinator of Conservation has been appointed, which should result in more effective conservation programs. Efforts to secure Butano forest in the Santa Cruz mountains, for a state park are progressing, and the situation in regard to the East Bay Regional Park is receiving active attention.

A Scholarship to the California Audubon Nature Camp was awarded to Mr. Harry Curleux Adamson, student of Ornithology and Bird Artist, by The Audubon Association of the Pacific.

A "CARE" package sent to Kurt Merkel, ornithologist, Frankfort, Germany, was gratefully acknowledged. Four packages have been sent; made possible by contributions received at the meetings of this association.

Dr. Frank A. Pitelka, President of the Cooper Club, told of a German periodical "Ornithological Monthly Reviews", formerly published in Heidelberg which has not been revived because of lack of paper. As this publication is a highly desirable one, a fund was subscribed by some Eastern ornithologists to supply paper for one issue. Dr. Pitelka suggested that perhaps, Western ornithologists might also wish to contribute an amount sufficient for one issue. A most interesting talk on "Display Behavior of Hummingbirds" was given by Dr. Pitelka.

Ninety-two members of the National Audubon Society have joined the Audubon Association of the Pacific. The hope was expressed that more members of the Association of the Pacific will wish to join the National Audubon Society in joint membership.

Enthusiastic reports were given by several members, who had completed a two weeks' session of the Audubon Nature Camp at Norden, Calif.
