


Newer Vegetables

J. L. Criswell of Chicago grew vines nine feet tall, with some fruits that weighed over 2 pounds and "many tomatoes that ranged from 1½ to 2 pounds." His fifty plants supplied tomatoes for the neighborhood.

The huge fruits have few seed, a mild non-acid flavor, and meaty flesh; they are borne on potato-leaved plants of amazing vigor. Reports of success come from many sections of the country but we do not recommend this variety for southern and southwestern states. Elsewhere, you will eventually grow this variety. Why not be ahead of your neighbors? Pkt., 50c.

C-186 Sensation Hybrid Cucumber. 65 days. Rarely is a vegetable variety of ideal shape, size, color, and table quality, combined with amazingly heavy yield. Seed is produced by crossing two pure-bred parent strains—an expensive process, but the cost is justified by the superlative product. The fruits average six to eight inches long, with dark green skin, firm white flesh and small seed cavity. The plants have a full measure of hybrid vigor, the quality which has made hybrid corn so great a success. Vines are heavy, foliage abundant, and growth is strong and fast. 



B-34 Green-pod Bush Bean Rival. 52 days. Beans have come a long way since grandmother had to pull the strings off before cooking. Home gardeners have long had stringless varieties which would delight her heart, but plant breeders keep trying to improve them; and Dr. W. J. Zaumayer of the U. S. plant breeding station at Beltsville, Md., took the lead when he produced Rival. Its straight, 6-inch, semi-round pods are not only stringless but completely without fibre, so that they almost melt in your mouth. Their color, dull green in the field, becomes bright green when cooked, canned or frozen. And finally, their yield far exceeds that of other top quality varieties. Seed as yet is very scarce so we must limit each buyer to one packet. Pkt. (1½ oz.), 50c.







Rugged Swiss Cauliflower

C-66 Cauliflower Ideal. 60 days. Our springs are rugged for a cauliflower plant, which may freeze at first, then have to mature in summer heat. Weedless Lawn, With Far Less Work, Now in Reach of Everyone

Chemical aids are transforming garden methods. Insects, diseases and weeds which have reduced harvests for generations, in spite of back-breaking efforts to control them, are being conquered by sprays and dusts.

Fantastic pictures of the farm of the future are painted by experiment station prophets, some of whom predict that harmful insects will be exterminated, and the sprayer will entirely displace the cultivator, with crop yields breaking records.

For the amateur, perhaps the greatest change that chemicals have produced is in lawn-making, a problem which interests every home owner. A weedless lawn is now within reach of everyone, with far less work than it took a few years ago to maintain the average stand of grass mixed with forty-percent weeds.

A Modern Lawn Program

Equipment needed for an up-to-date lawn program consists of a 2,4D sprayer, a sprinkler which will mix soluble plant food with the hose water, and a lawn mower, of course. In the spring, before the dandelions bloom, spray with 2,4D. When the weeds die down, apply a soluble plant food, mixed with the hose water, to speed up the spreading of grass into the bare spots left by dying weeds.

When warm weather begins, and the first tiny sprouts of crab grass appear, spray the lawn with sel-tox, using the special 2,4D sprayer. If any new weed growth appears, apply a second spray of 2,4D, followed by a soluble plantfood application in the hose water.

Midsummer will slow down growth of the fine lawn grasses, and stimulate crab grass seedlings, if any have survived the first sel-tox spraying. A second application should be made to make sure these plants do not go to seed; and another light meal of plant food, via the hose water, will keep your grasses green and growing during the hot weather.

A fall application of 2,4D is used by many, to destroy any weed seedlings which may have germinated during the late summer, and insure a clean lawn to start the new year.

Remember that both sel-tox and 2,4D will take hold better if the lawn is mowed just before they are applied.

Original commercial form of 2,4D, this is a liquid, which is diluted with water and sprayed on the plants to be killed. Many regard it as the most effective form of the chemical. Flower Seed Cultures—How to Sow

IN FIVE paragraphs below, designated A, B, C, D and E, we cover in considerable detail the methods of starting flower seeds which are available to the amateur without a greenhouse, and which cover well the needs of an outdoor garden. In the flower seed section in the case of each flower listed, information is given as to the cultural methods which can be used for that subject.

A Sow in the bed, border or row where the plants are to grow. The soil should be loamy, with well pulverized surface. With heavy soil inclined to cake and crack, it is usually best to grow plants in a seed bed (B) and transplant to the permanent place. Loosen the soil where seeds are to be sown, with the trowel, or hoe, several inches deep. Rake smooth. Broadcast small seeds and cover them lightly four or five times their diameter. Very small seeds may be merely pressed in. Larger seeds may be planted singly, well covered, but more thickly than plants are wanted. Firm the soil well over the seed. Watering now becomes of great importance. At no time should the soil be allowed to become hard and dry, yet excessive watering may cause the seeds to rot, sour the soil, or cause "damping off." When the plants appear, thin them out, allowing each to grow singly, without crowding. The distance between them is governed by their ultimate size and spread. Excess plants may usually be moved to a new location.

B Sow in outdoor seed bed, to be transplanted. The seed bed in the open should be of loose, mellow loam, raised slightly above the surrounding surface, and preferably surrounded by a wooden curb, to prevent rain washing across it. It should not be wider than four feet, so it can be worked easily. Shelter from high winds is valuable, but damp and shady corners are not desirable. Full sun is advisable when seedlings are up; while shade when needed, as in mid-summer for perennial seedlings, is best supplied by a lath or cloth canopy, which can be removed in damp and cloudy weather. Sow the seeds in rows which may be as close as five inches. Sowing and watering are the same as described in "A" above. Seedlings may be transplanted when they make true leaves, the second pair of leaves to appear; or they may be left until larger before being moved to their permanent location. Perennials should be moved from the seed bed to a nursery row, to grow until fall before being moved to the border.

C Sow in flat, pot or pan outdoors or in a cold frame. This method is applicable to slow germinating subjects, some of which may take a year to germinate. Fill the receptacle with potting soil as described in "D," firm the soil and broadcast the seed, covering four or five times their diameter. Place the receptacle in a shaded location, where there is free air circulation. During the spring, summer and fall, water often enough to prevent soil from drying out.

While our cultural instructions are definite, detailed and exceptionally thorough, they should be supplemented by reading in good gardening books and by obtaining, at first hand, advice from successful gardeners in your neighborhood. Success in gardening requires study, and the opportunity for enlarging one's information and trying out new things is one of the most fascinating features of gardening.

A mulch of peat moss will help retain moisture. In winter, place in a protected place outdoors and cover with leaves. Have patience with slow germinating subjects; do not disturb too quickly. Any live seed will eventually grow if given time enough, provided soil, moisture supply, etc., are right. When seedlings appear and make true leaves, transplant to pots, nursery row or permanent location. If moss forms on soil surface, sprinkle fresh earth over top.

D Sow indoors in a box, pot or pan. This method may be followed where there is a window facing south, enjoying sunlight most of the day. Use a standard florists' pot or pan (shallow pot) or a "flat," which is a shallow box, with holes bored in the bottom for drainage. Cover the drainage holes in pot or box with broken pottery; fill with potting soil. This is a mixture of half sand and half black loam. It may be obtained from florists. Firm the soil, and sow the seeds in rows, marking each row to identify the sowing. Water by setting the box or pot in water, so that it soaks up from below, or use a fine spray which does not wash the soil. Place in a dark place, covered with a wet newspaper blanket until the seeds sprout. As soon as sprouts appear bring into full light. Cover the box or pot with glass to check evaporation, but when moisture collects on glass wipe it off, and prop up one end of the glass to allow air to circulate during the sunny part of the day. A temperature not below 50 degrees at night, or 75 degrees by day, is best. Do not allow the soil to dry out. When the seedlings have made true leaves (the second set), they should be transplanted to other flats, giving at least two inches of space apart; or they may be moved to small pots or to an outdoor seed bed or border.

E Sow in a hotbed or cold frame. A cold frame or a hotbed heated by manure or other means may be used. The best method with flower seeds is to sow seeds in flats, which are placed in the frame. With manure heated beds, seeds should not be sown until the temperature of the newly made bed has dropped to 90 degrees. Watering and ventilation are important. On sunny spring days, always prop up one end of the sash to prevent overheating, which may occur quickly and cause spindly growth. Do not allow the soil to dry out. When the seedlings have made true leaves, they should be transplanted to other flats, spaced two inches apart each way; or to the soil in the hotbed, or to an outdoor location, if late enough.



S-39 Caserta. The first All-America Gold Medal Winner for Vegetables since 1935. This fine squash was developed by Dr. Lawrence C. Curtis of the University of Connecticut Experiment Station. 


QUANTITY in beets is measured by an even, globular shape, uniformity in size, bright, even color, flavor, fine texture and tenderness. Here, as with all vegetables, the difference between a fine and a mediocre strain of one variety may be as great as between different varieties.

Our best seed is grown only from transplanted roots, which are taken up in the fall, carefully graded, and transplanted again to produce seed. Only beets which conform to the highest quality standards are planted for seed.

All beets keep well in winter when properly stored. A special sowing should be made in midsummer to produce the storage crop.

As soon as soil can be worked in the spring, sow one seed to the inch, in drill half inch deep. Firm soil well over seed and water well if required. Thin when roots begin to make globes, to stand 4 inches apart in row. Cook discards with their tops.

Quantity needed to sow: 15 ft. row, 1 pkt.; 60 ft. row, 1 oz.; acre, 7 lbs. (Rows 18 in. apart).



B77 BEEET PERFECTED DETROIT. Pkt., 15c.





Cabbage Culture: After frost proof date, set out plants for early crop. Late varieties may be sown outdoors in June. Space small early types 12 inches apart, medium 18 inches, large late 2 feet. Water well and protect from worms and aphids.

Early Melons for Home Gardens

IN NO other crop does quality respond more quickly to careful breeding. Our special strains are selected for size, color, flavor and thick flesh.

Since even light frosts kill melon plants, and seeds do not germinate well until the ground is warm, only early varieties succeed in the northern states. 

BECAUSE of the long growing season required by all onions grown from seed, most amateur gardeners use onion sets for producing both green onions, and mature bulbs. 





Spinach

SPINACH demands cool, moist weather. Seed should be sown at the earliest possible moment in spring in rows one foot apart and thinned to six inches in the row. It matures in 45 to 50 days and quickly runs to seed in warm weather. The Antvorskov variety listed below, is most free from this tendency.

Home gardeners have generally adopted Swiss Chard and New Zealand Spinach as a greens crop, as both may be cut many times and will produce a continuous crop all summer and until freezing weather in the fall. A fall crop of spinach may be sown in late July or August and will find the cool, moist autumn weather favorable for growth. 



Hardy Lilies for Spring Planting

NO ORDERS ACCEPTED AFTER
APRIL 10th, 1949

HARDY lily bulbs, of 1948 crop, carried over the winter in cold storage, may be planted in the spring, and will blossom in mid-summer, when the garden needs their glory.

They are especially suitable for planting in borders, and enjoy a position where they are protected by the shade of surrounding plants. Light, well-drained soil is recommended. Bulbs should be planted 6 to 8 inches deep.

Many varieties develop roots on the stem up to two or three inches from the ground. These roots are voracious feeders, and on them depend greatly the number and size of flowers. When they appear, the plant should receive a top dressing of good rich soil on which they can feed freely.

For the smaller varieties, plant in clumps, each bulb about 6 inches apart, leaving more space for the strong and larger species. The most striking mode of planting is in groups of 3 to 9 bulbs in a mass.

A Good Growing Tip

As soon as dormant Roses are properly pruned and planted, hill them up with 3 or 4 inches of moist soil. This keeps the wind from drying the plants and helps them to leaf out more quickly. Remove soil gradually as plants begin growing.


