## Sweet Peas

The plants should not be raised for two successive seasons on the same ground.
Sweet peas should not be planted on the same ground after culinary peas.
Excessive manuring with stable manure in the row immediately before sowing the seed is not desirable. Ground intended for sweet peas, if not left in good conGround intended ior sweet peas, if not left in gooden after taking the last crop, will be better for manuring the previous Fall rather than at the Spring seeding.

The use of artificial fertilizers, bone meal, nitrate of soda, etc., can be made in the Spring at the time of planting or soon after.
